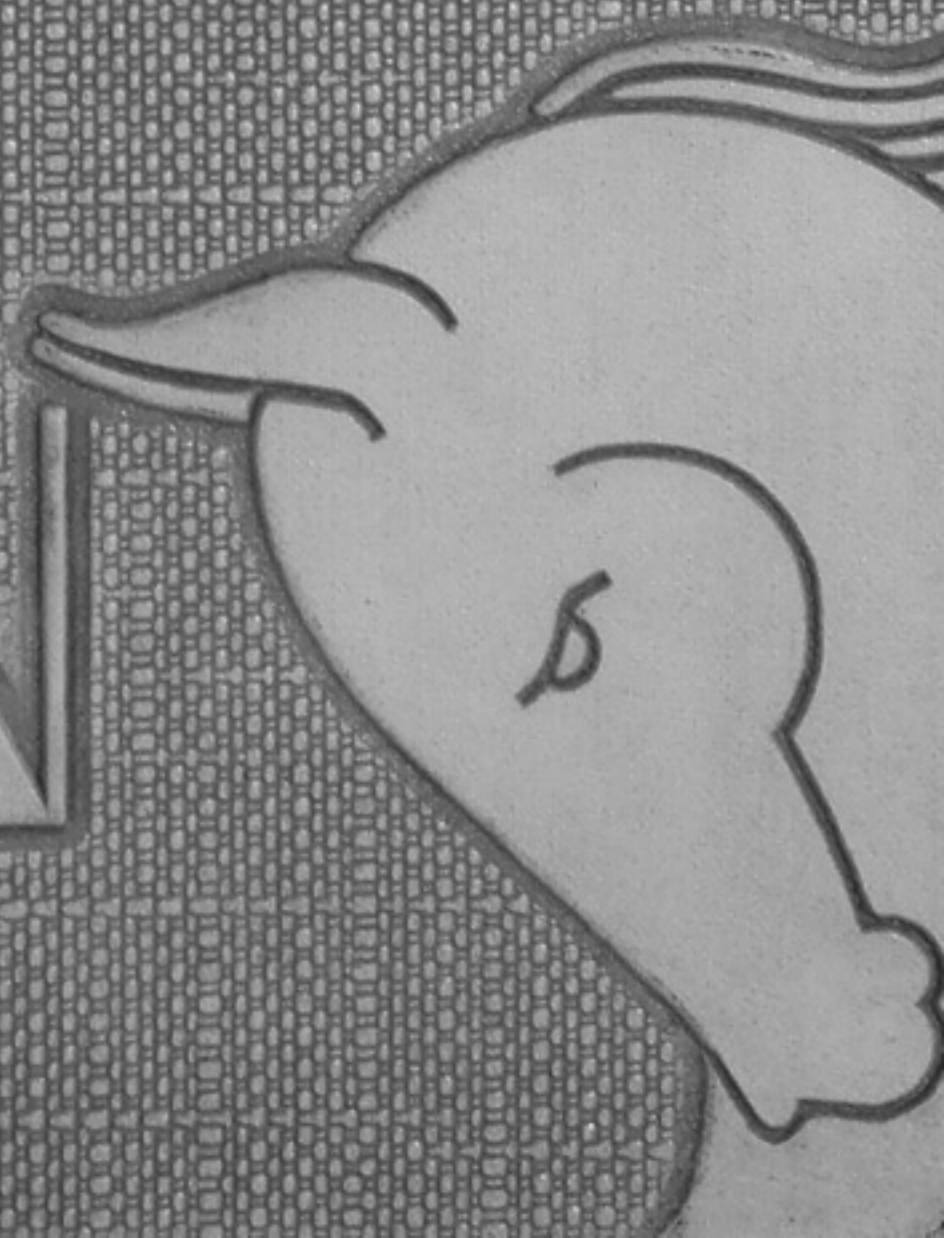

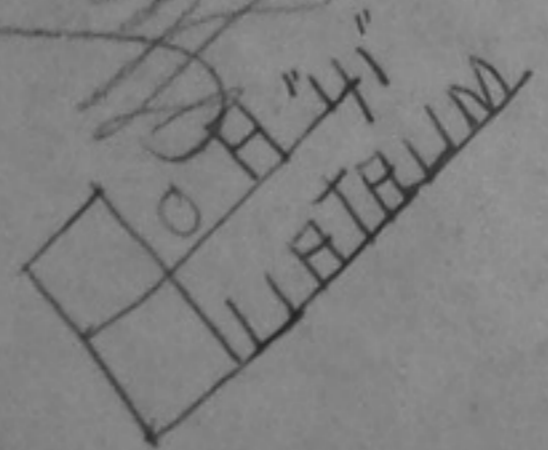

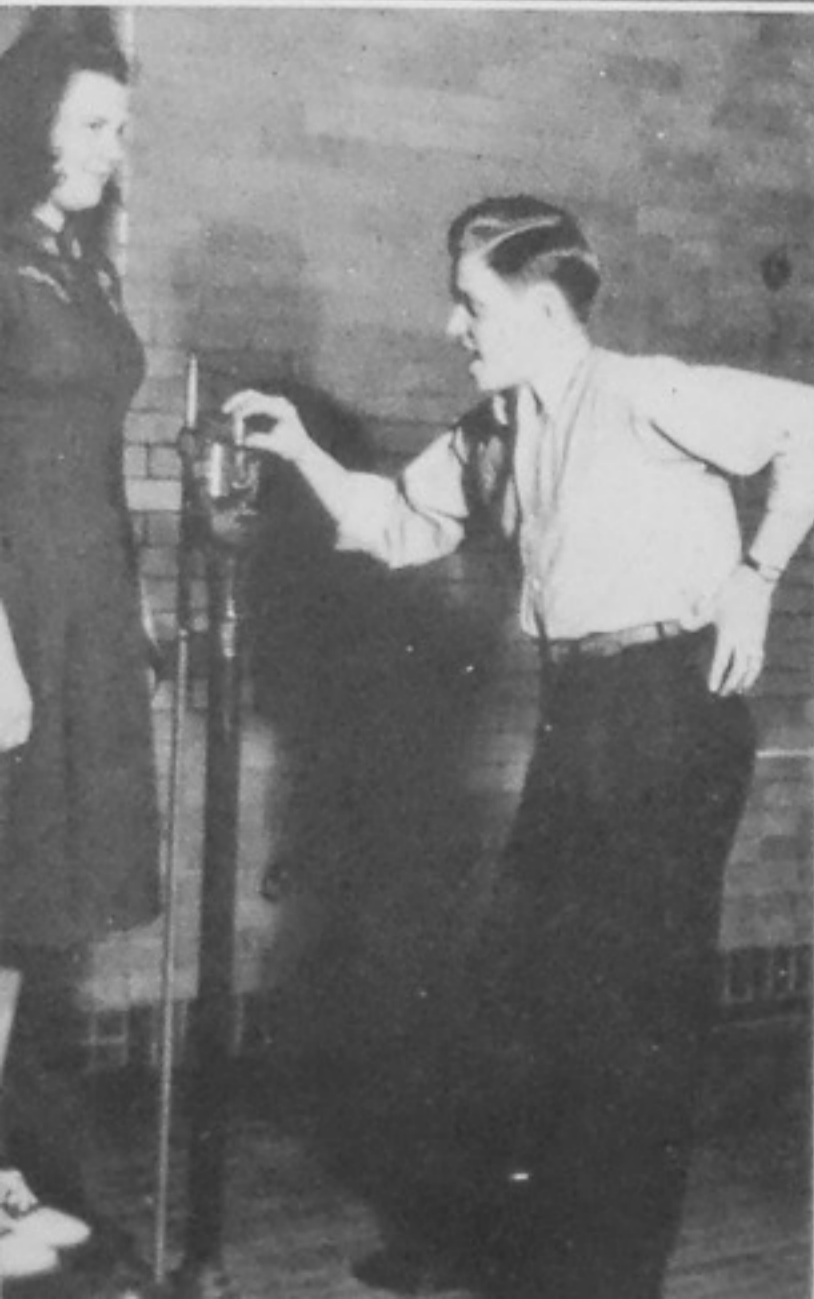

Stabilizing student life

Adept specialists administer adroitly to the needs of these corridors: the student council takes care of all minor details of administration; the more important duties are handled by the Board of Education, the principal and the Dean of Girls.

C. Sherman Dale has completed his twelfth year as principal of the high school. He received his B.S. and M.A. degrees at the University of Illinois, and he also attended East Kentucky State Normal School at Richmond. He has helped make this high school one of high rank, especially in scholarship and athletics.

This year several new members were elected to serve on the school board, and these, along with the old members, have as their leader Dr. Samuel Moorhead. They are (as shown in the picture on the opposite page) Dr. William Stone, Creighton Craigmiles, and Arthur Lynn, standing; Superintendent Frank Appel, Dr. Moorhead, Lawrence Daniels, and Wesley Ridenour, seated. The Board of Education has also taken full charge of the cafeteria, and it appointed Mr. Ridenour as the business manager. Miss Mary Stokely was appointed as dietician and manager of the cafeteria.

Miss Marion C. Galton, Dean of Girls, has completed her third year at the high school. She attended the University of Michigan, where she received a B.A. degree. She also received an M.A. degree

in Guidance at Columbia University. Miss Galton's friendly understanding makes her well liked by everyone.

At the beginning of the year Dean Galton appoints Senior girls to act as "big sisters" to the freshman girls. Thus the freshman girls become acquainted with the school.

Assisting Mr. Dale as secretaries and taking care of the office matters are Mrs. Forrest Cramer (Miss Kathryn Krall) and Miss Dorothy Bailey. Students, some of them from the commercial course, also help in the office. These students run errands, distribute the absence lists, and receive excellent practical training. Announcements and business matters are sent through these representatives to each home room in an advisory group quarter hour.

This year the Student Council sponsored several pay assemblies, the money derived

being given to the Scholarship Team and the Band for their trips to the respective contests at Athens and Columbus. One of the gatherings had a demonstration of the use and moulding of glass and its expanding importance.

Members of the Student Council also serve as monitors in various places of the halls on each floor in order to direct visitors and strangers and to aid students throughout the day.

Analyzing character needs

Personality is individual character and thoughts; scholarship means knowledge; and leadership is direction and guidance. These three qualities are the basis of the selection of fifteen seniors and one junior, known as the link girl, for Dean Galton's Honor Society. Every other Monday evening they meet with Miss Galton at the girls' homes to discuss manners, personalities, clothes, and other things interesting to the high school students.

Each council member has assigned to her a group of freshman girls to whom she acts as a guide, giving them advice on

various ideas and questions.

At the meetings of the council the members give reports on the progress they are making with their girls and suggestions are made to one another. Also during the meetings the girls discuss with the Dean the various colleges and professions in which they are interested.

Near the end of the school year the Honor Council invites all freshman girls to an exciting treasure hunt, and then the seniors, together with their newly chosen successors, entertain themselves royally at a big picnic.

Every high school needs an organization that all girls, from the shy, bewildered freshman to the sophisticated (so she thinks) senior, may join—one that will give study to self-development, the most important phase of under-graduate life. In order to promote and encourage this thought among the girl students, the Girls' League was formed several years ago. It functions under the personal guidance of Dean Marion Galton. It is the largest organization in the school in-as-much as every girl student is a member. The purpose of the organization is to encourage and promote closer cooperation among the girls and to develop personality, leadership, character, good citizenship, and similar ideals.

This year the League chose as its officers: Josephine Rickey, president; Mary Frances Pratt, vice president; Betty Hamner, secretary; and Aldene Henry, treasurer. Early in the school year, Dean Galton, sponsor, together with the officers, selected the chairmen of the various committees. Those who have served in these capacities during the past year are: Dorothy Rowe, health; Joan Babcock, hospitality; Sophie Werner, finance; Betty Ahrend, entertainment; Audrey McClure, program; Kathleen Danzer, publicity; and Phyllis Drew, membership. These girls and the officers form the Girls' League cabinet, which manages the business of the League

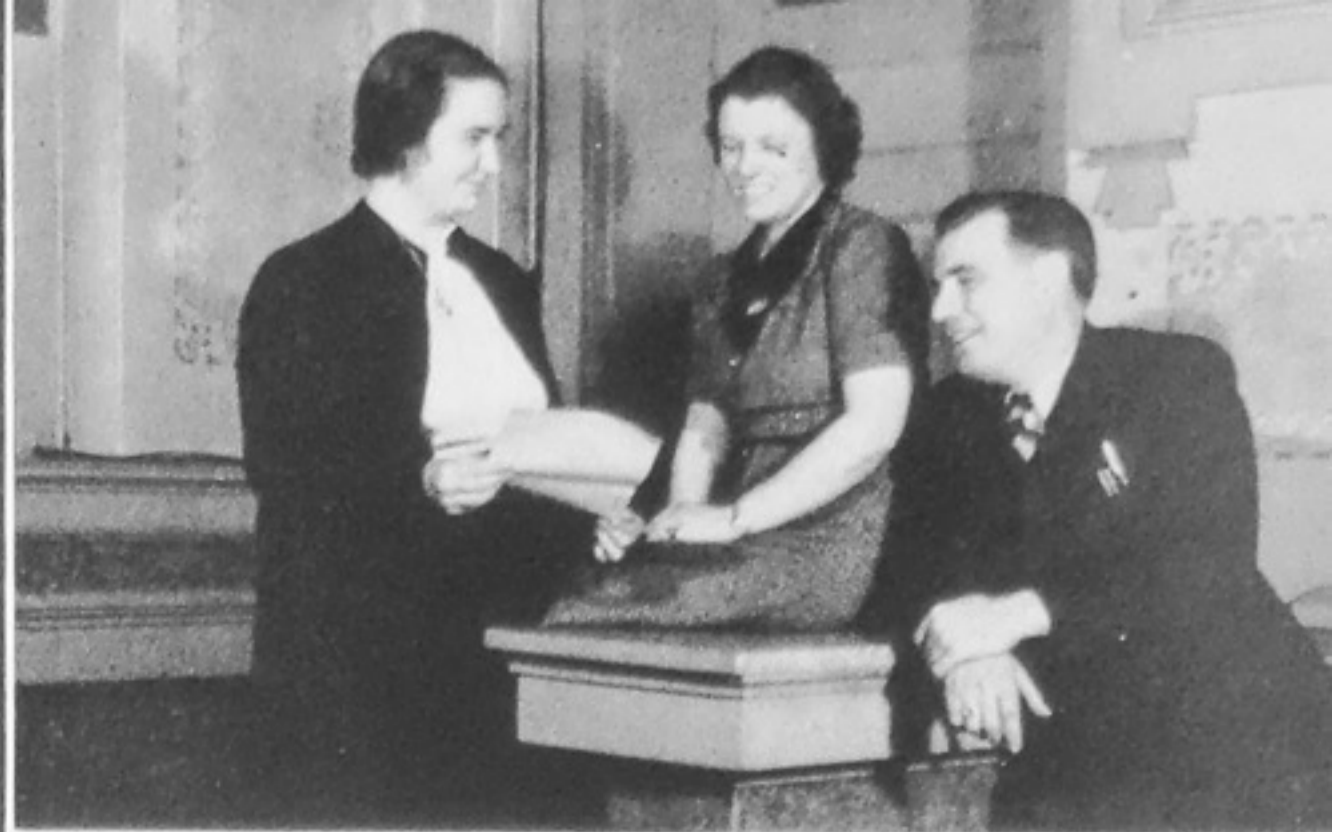
and plans the various activities for the club to follow throughout the year.

At its first assembly, held at the beginning of the school year, the League sponsored a program known as the "Big and Little Sister" movement. Each Freshman girl was assigned a Senior member to assist her in becoming acquainted with her new surroundings, to act as a counselor and to familiarize her with the building. Following the same idea for the mid-year Freshmen, the League and the Senior Honor Council planned an orientation day. At this time the new students were shown around the school and all the important places, such as the lunchroom and the offices of the principal and dean were pointed out and explained to them.

Throughout the year the League gave several afternoon tea dances, some for

members only, while others were for both the girls and boys. At one of the "girls-only affairs", the P. H. S. Girls' League acted as hostesses to the newly formed Sciotoville Girls' League. Several buses brought the Sciotoville girls down. Dancing and light refreshments made the afternoon a pleasant one.

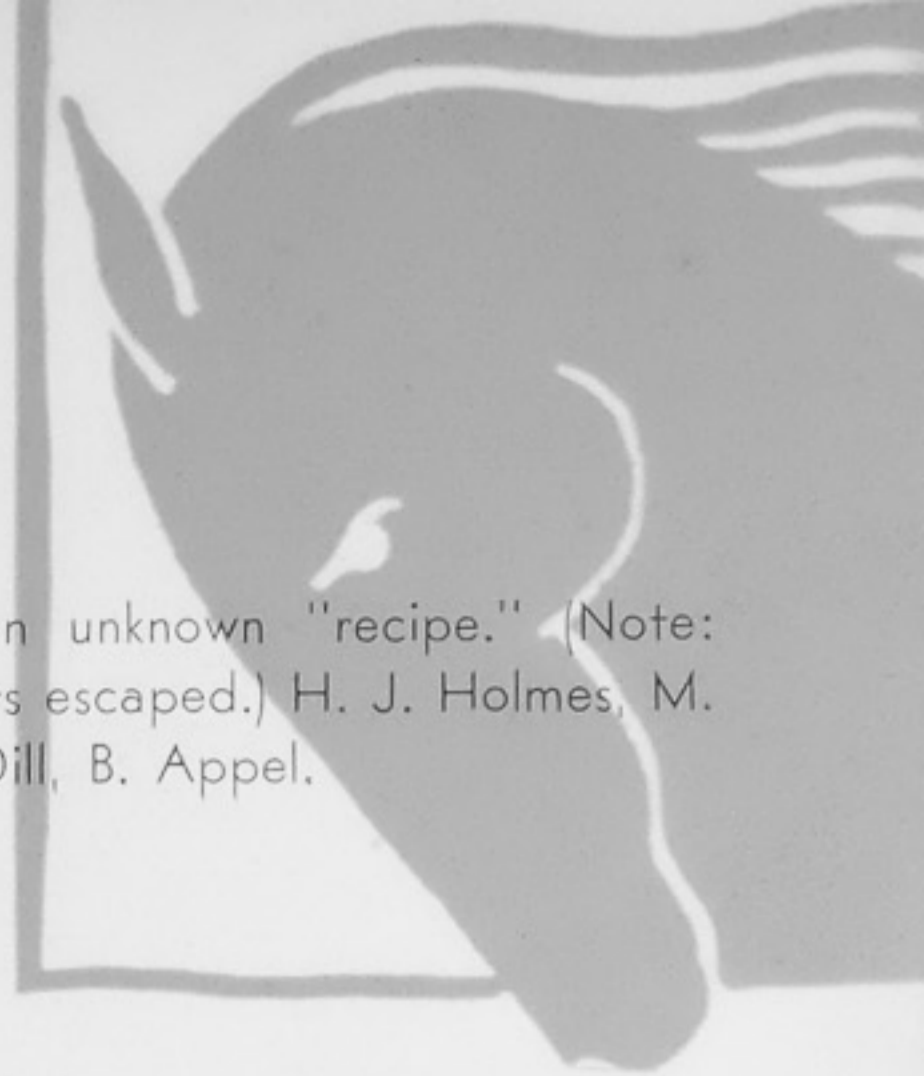

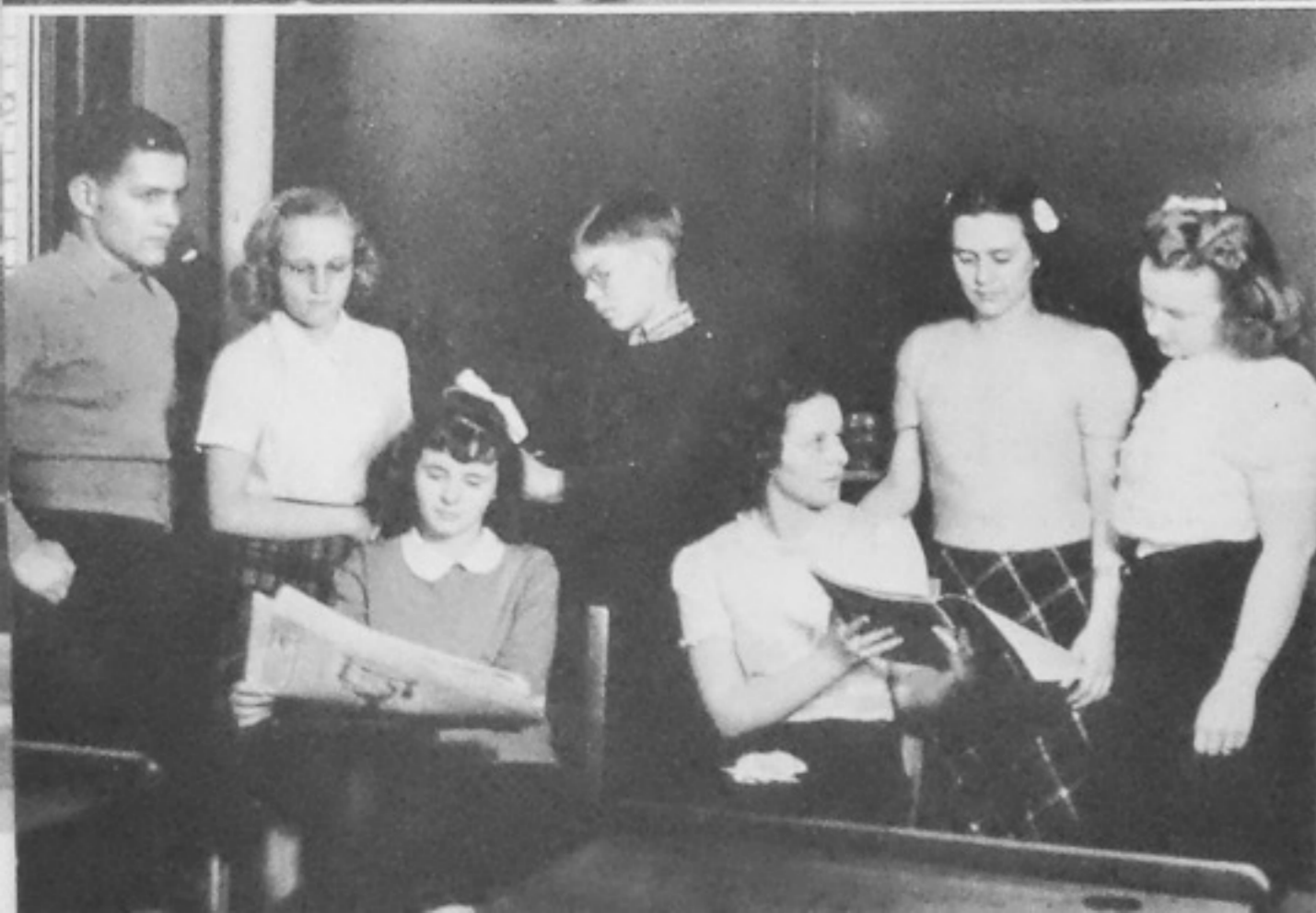


Our wagons hitched to stars

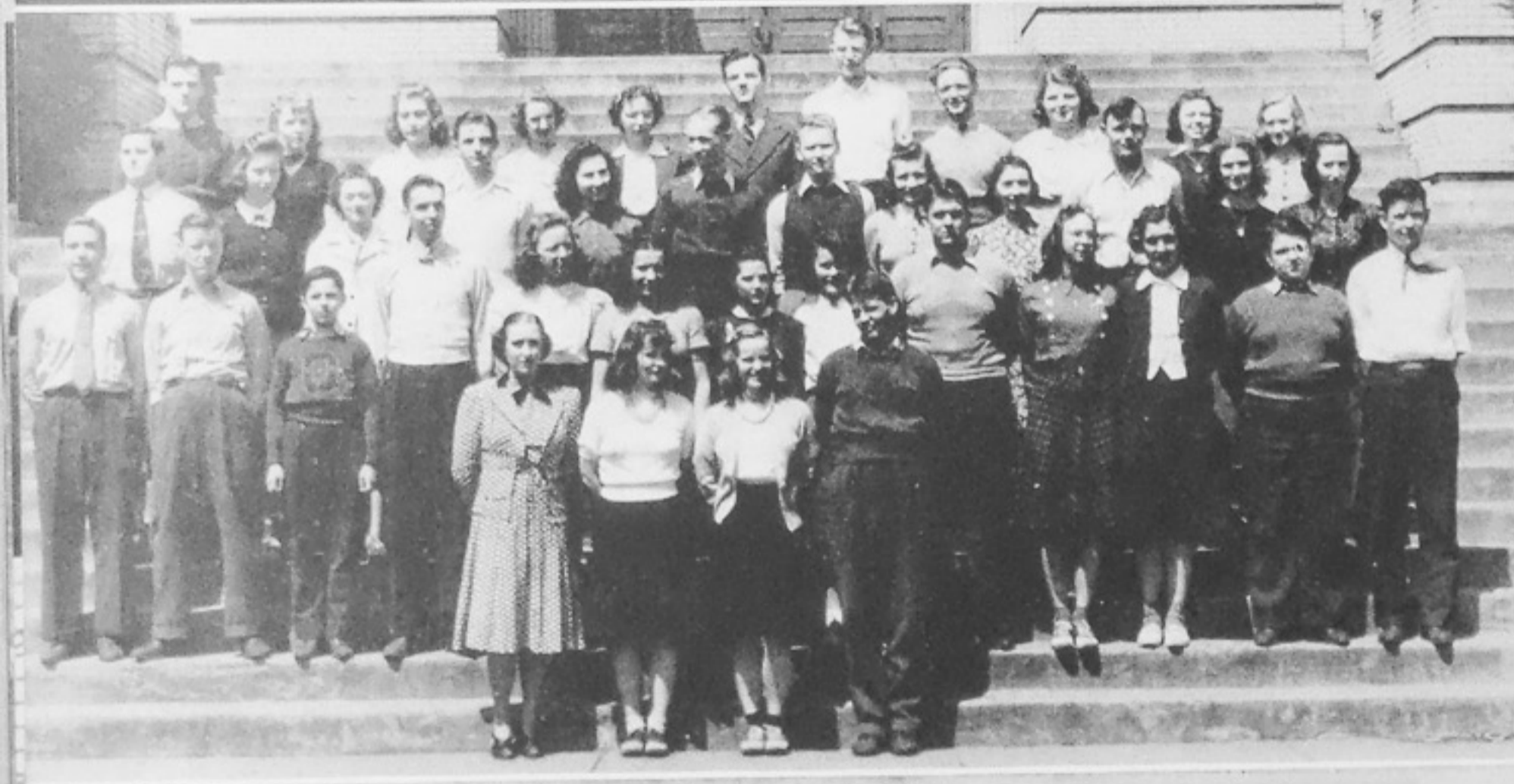

Delving into the exotic



"Et tu, Brute!" These immortal words uttered by that most famous of Romans are well-known to every Latin student. "Why?" they asked. "It's a dead language! Why do we study it?" Latin, as those wondering soon discovered, is a basic language for English, French, Spanish, Portuguese and many other languages. If one has a reading knowledge of Latin, he is able to learn these easily. Latin gives clues to the meanings of English words and enlarges one's vocabulary. Students taking the College Preparatory Course spend their first year studying Latin in general and learning the fundamental parts of the language. The second year consists largely of Caesar's Gallic wars.

Many students, especially those who are going to study law, medicine, or nursing, complete four years of Latin while in high school. The third and fourth years of Latin are taught by Miss Margaret Ball, who is also the advisor of the senior Latin Club, Plus Ultra. Miss Ball was graduated from Denison University, where she received her Ph.D. degree. Freshman and sophomore Latin are taught by Miss Anna Blazer and Miss Vera Conn, respectively. Miss Blazer received her B.A. degree at Ohio University, and she also attended Columbia University and the University of Wisconsin. Miss Conn was awarded her B.A. degree at Muskingam and her M.A. degree at Ohio State University. She also attended West Virginia University and Harvard. Miss Conn and Miss Blazer are co-advisors of the Inter Nos Club, and Miss Blazer is one of the senior class advisors.

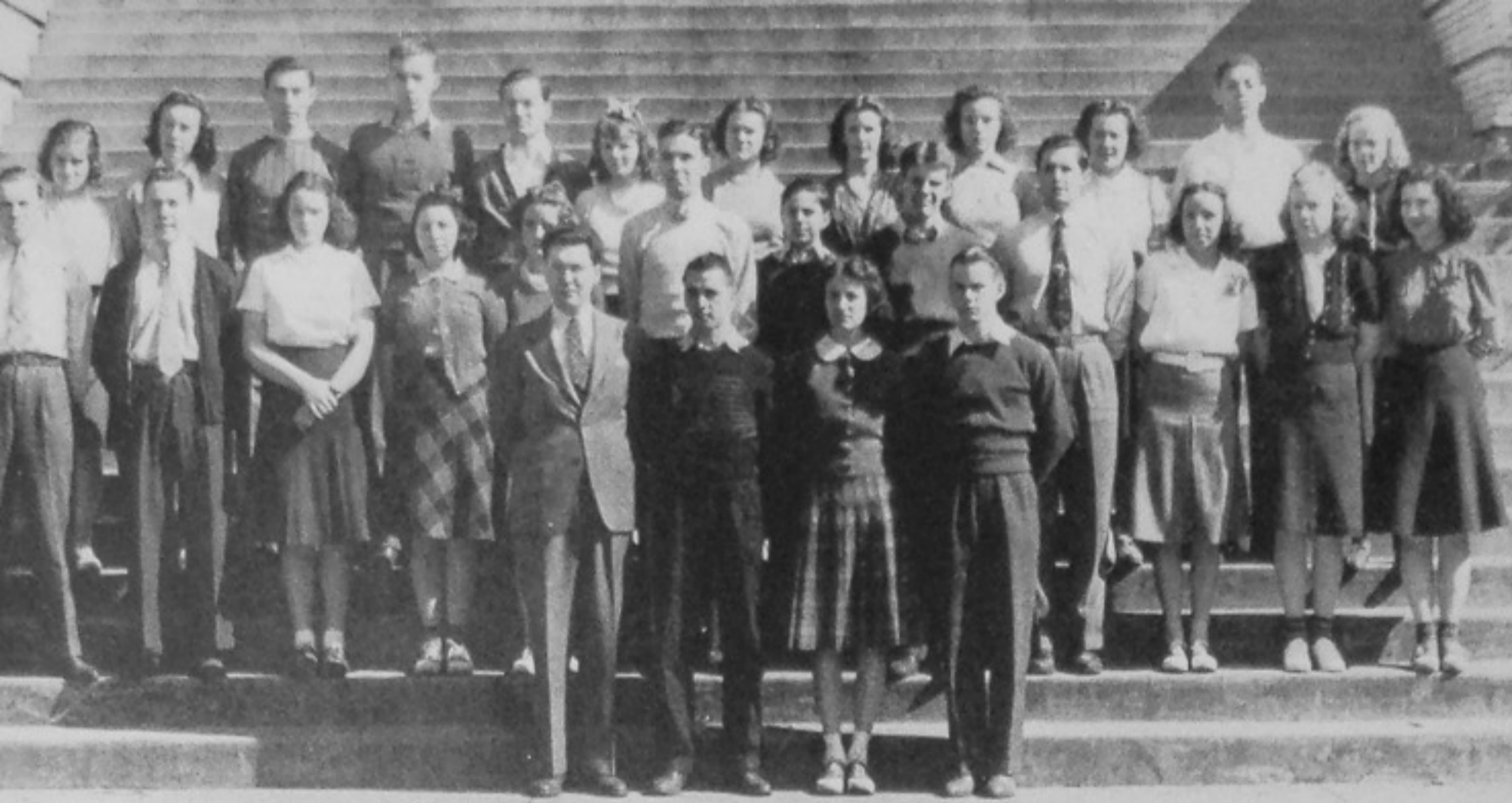
Other pupils choose to take Spanish or French during their last two years of high school work. French is probably one of the most pleasing of all the languages which are spoken. French students receive

French newspapers, "Le Petit Journal" and "La Vie." This year the senior French students studied "Monsieur Perrichon", a comedy in which a French family traveled in Switzerland and Southern France. The students acted in scenes from it. However, they did not have costumes or a stage, and one had to use his imagination.

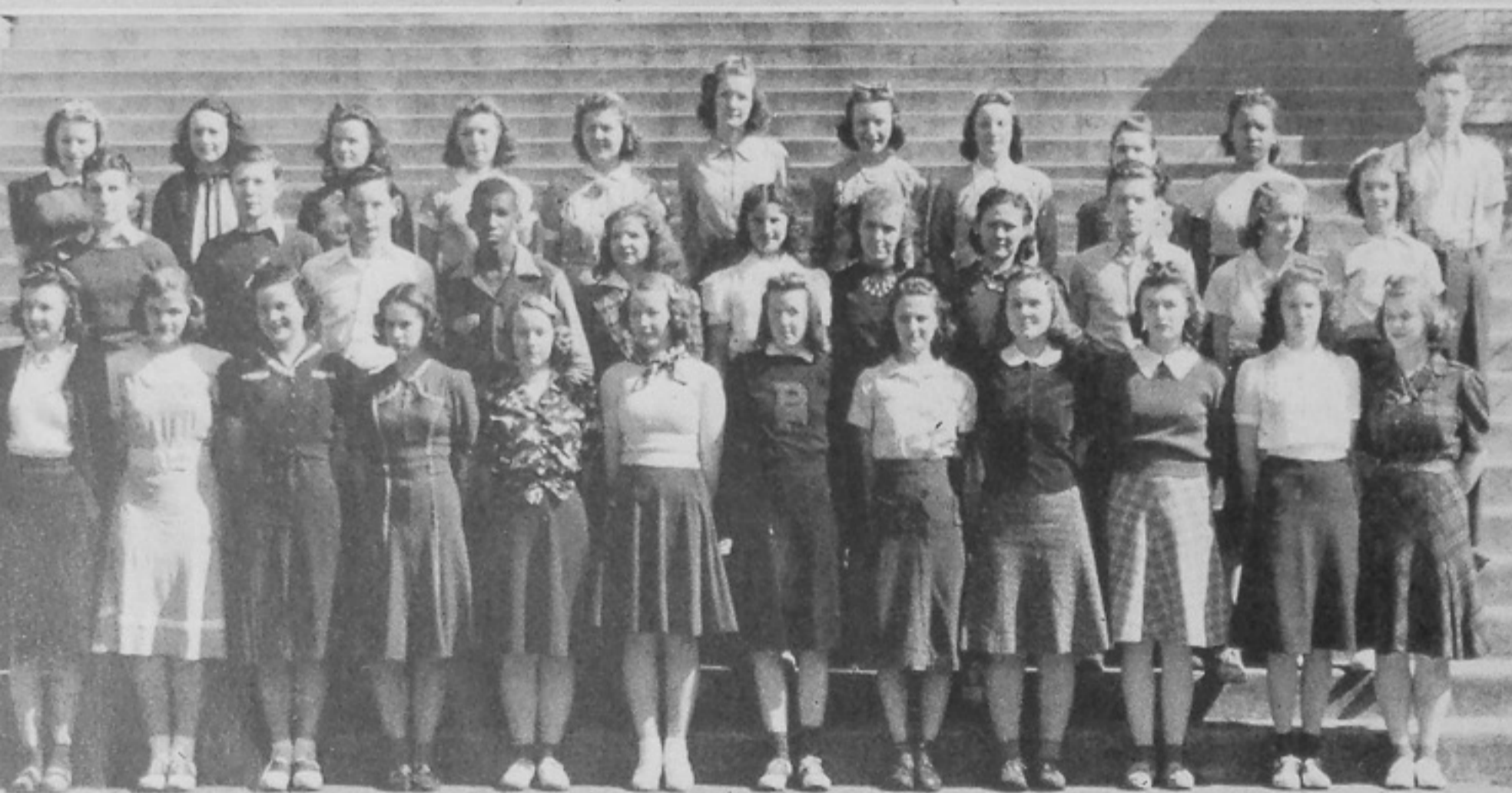
Miss Katherine Kauffman is the only French teacher in the high school, and she also teaches English. She is the advisor of Les Jeunes Modernes, the French Club, and is the faculty advisor of the yearbook. Miss Kauffman attended Ohio State University, where she received her B.A., B.S., and M.A. degrees.

Since war is being carried on in many European and Asiatic countries, many American tourists have turned toward the countries of Central and South America. In years to come the United States may be closer to the Latin-American countries than she is to England and France. The United States government is also making trade agreements with these countries and is trying to form a "Good Neighbor Policy." Thus it is wise to learn the Spanish language, for most of these countries speak either Spanish or a language derived from it.

Miss Margaret Rimer, who teaches Spanish and history, received her M.A. degree at Ohio State University. Jess Wagus, another Spanish teacher and advisor of the Spanish Club, received his B.A. degree at James Millikin University, Decatur, Illinois, and his M.A. degree at the University of Illinois. He also attended the Universidad Nacional in Mexico City. Mr. Wagus often bakes Mexican cakes for his students at Christmas. He also has many Indian relics and knows various Indian songs and war dances which he has presented to his pupils.

The club had the following officers this year: George Wiltsee, president; Jean Flood, vice president; Helen Davisson, secretary, and Jim Harsha, treasurer.

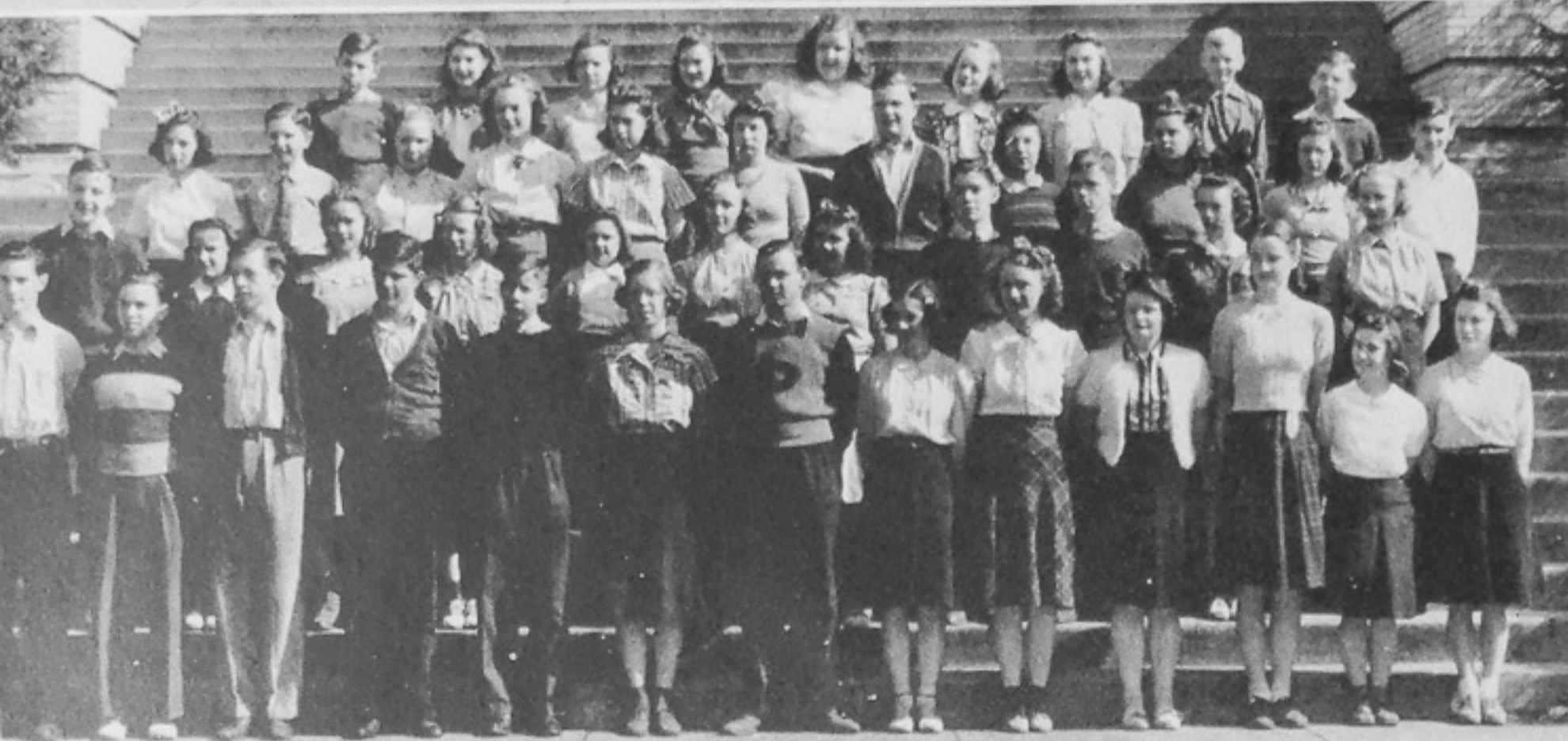

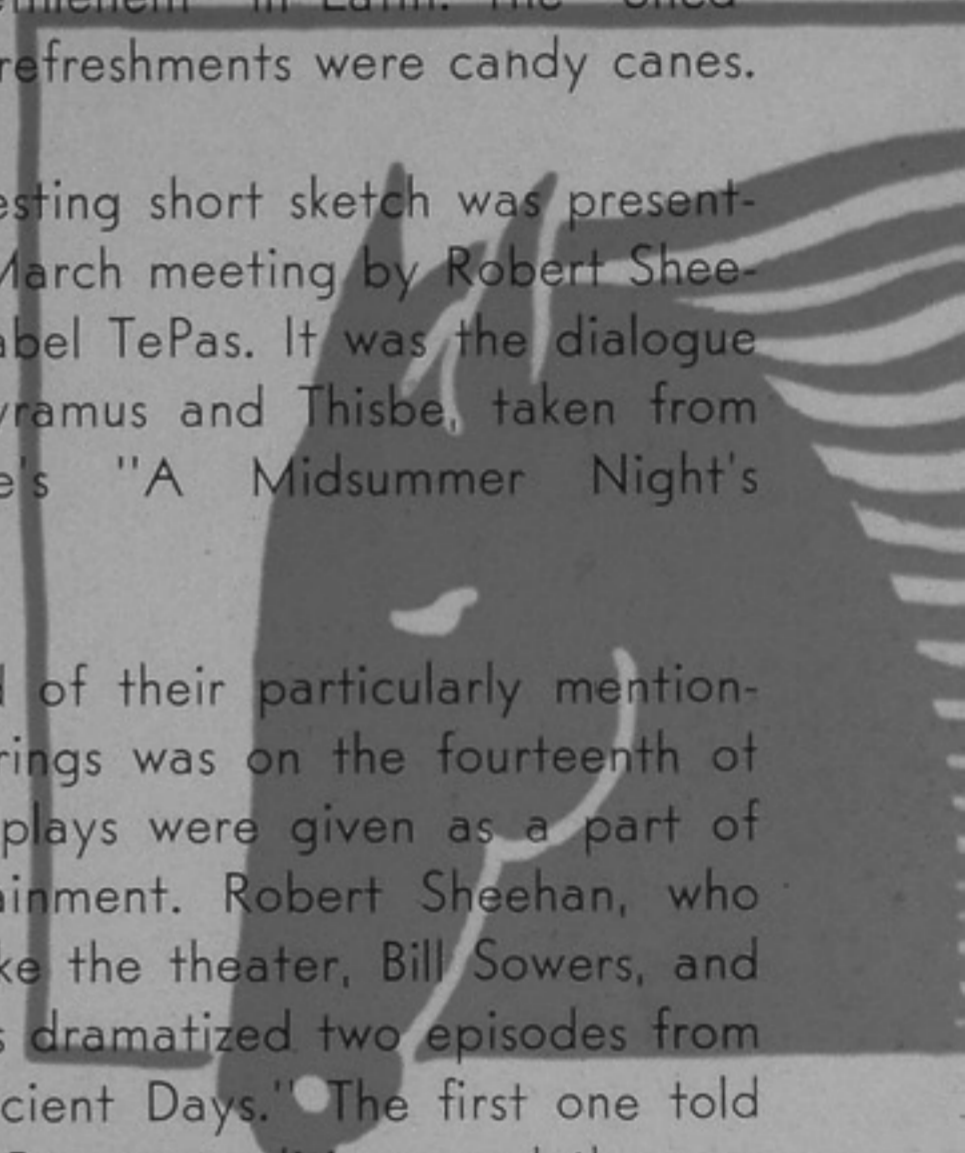

"Check!" chortles Herr Hitler as he blitzkriegs his pawns and mechanized horses into Norway. Again — "Check!" as his rooks attack France from the rear—bishops and knights and little pawns shoved aside, as the opponents maneuver defensively—and expensively—trying to avoid a checkmate—or a stalemate, attacking and perhaps checking in return.

A group of would-be chess players, most of them history students, under the roof of Miss Katherine Kauffman, organized a chess club this year. Though not given much publicity, this is an extremely active and interested group (see p. 8). Their tournaments, so comparable to historical events, certainly help them to comprehend the "great game of chess" raging across the seas.

Social science consists chiefly of the study of ancient, modern, American, and world history, civics, and economics. Students of all courses usually take some of these subjects. Current affairs are also studied in nearly all classes. Newspapers for students are usually read and discussed once a week. A series of current events tests were given in advisory group meetings throughout the year. 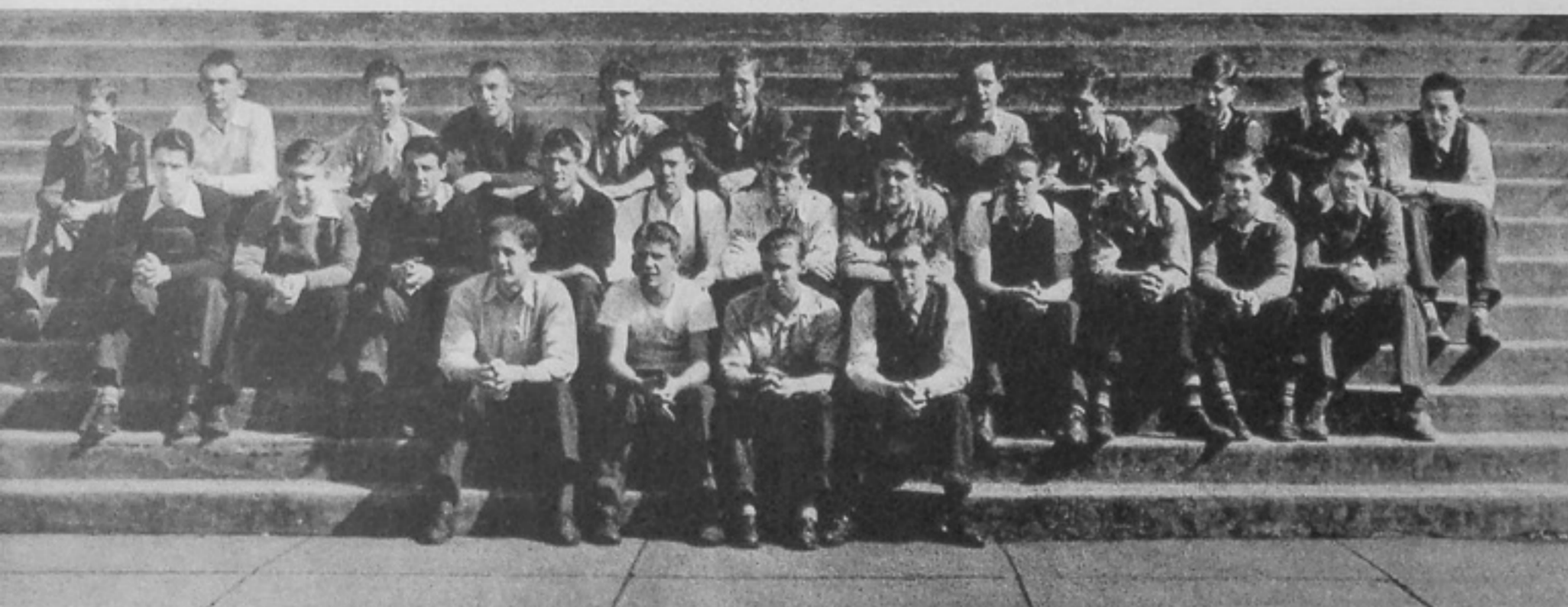

Probing into yesteryears

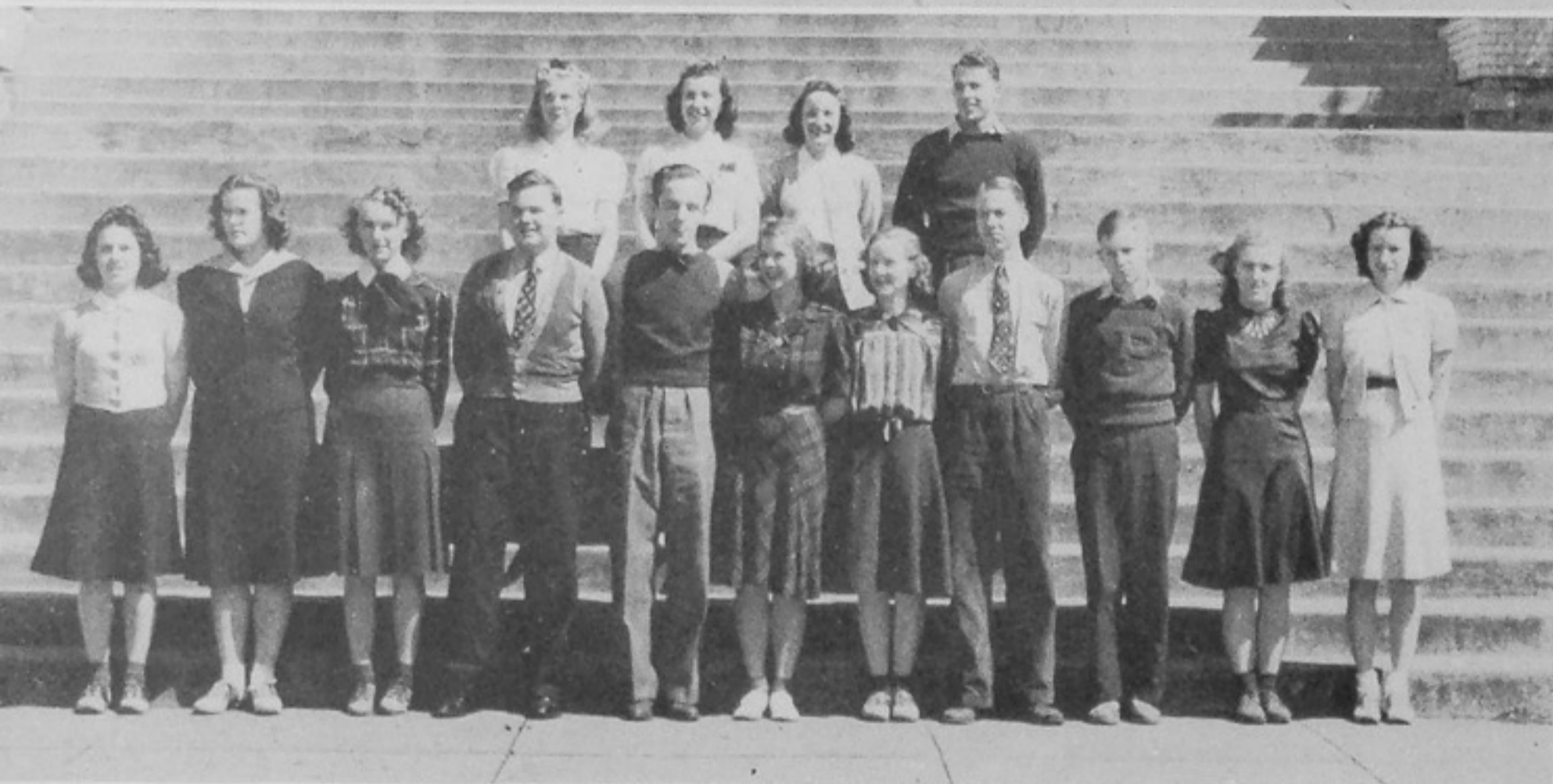

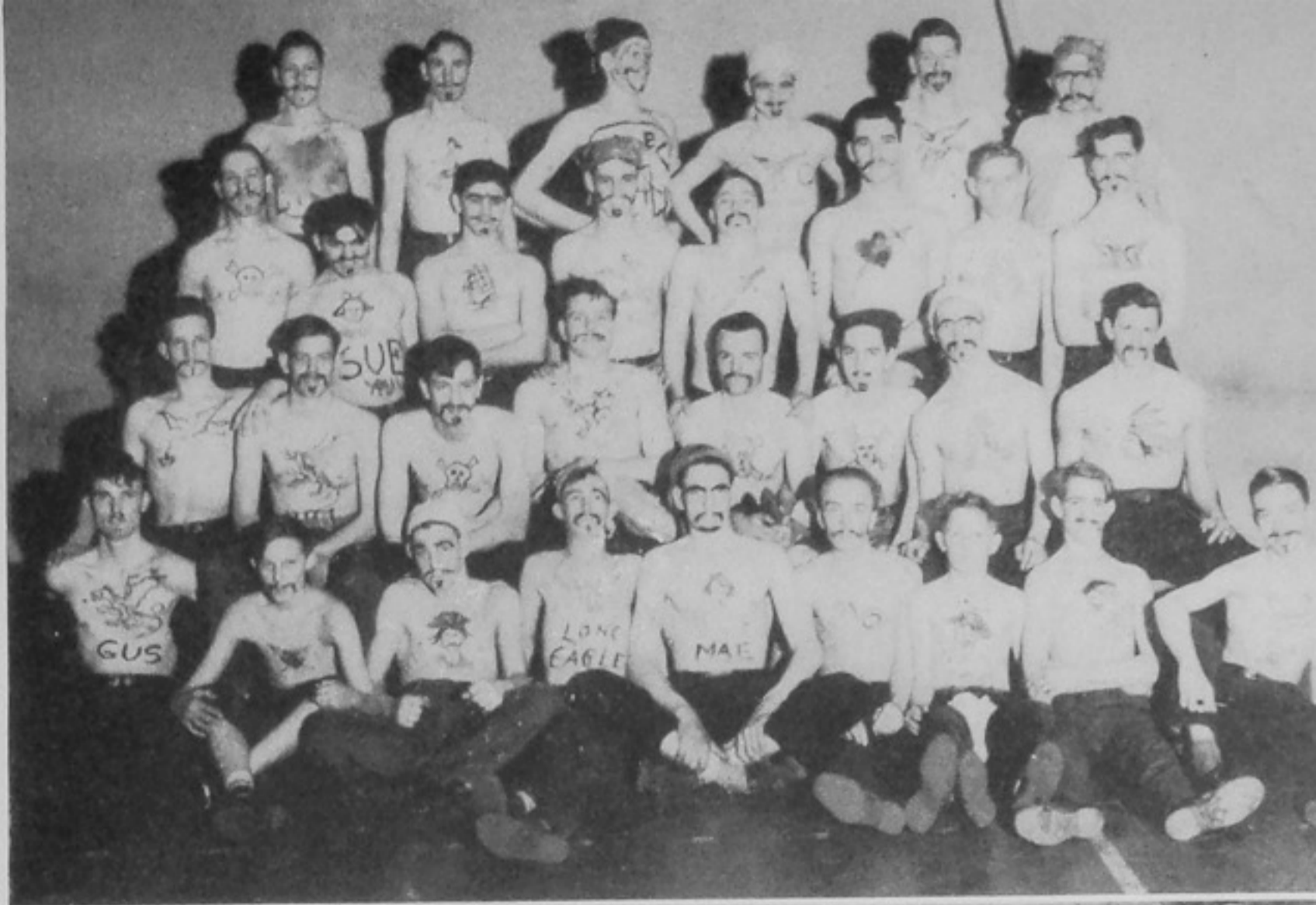

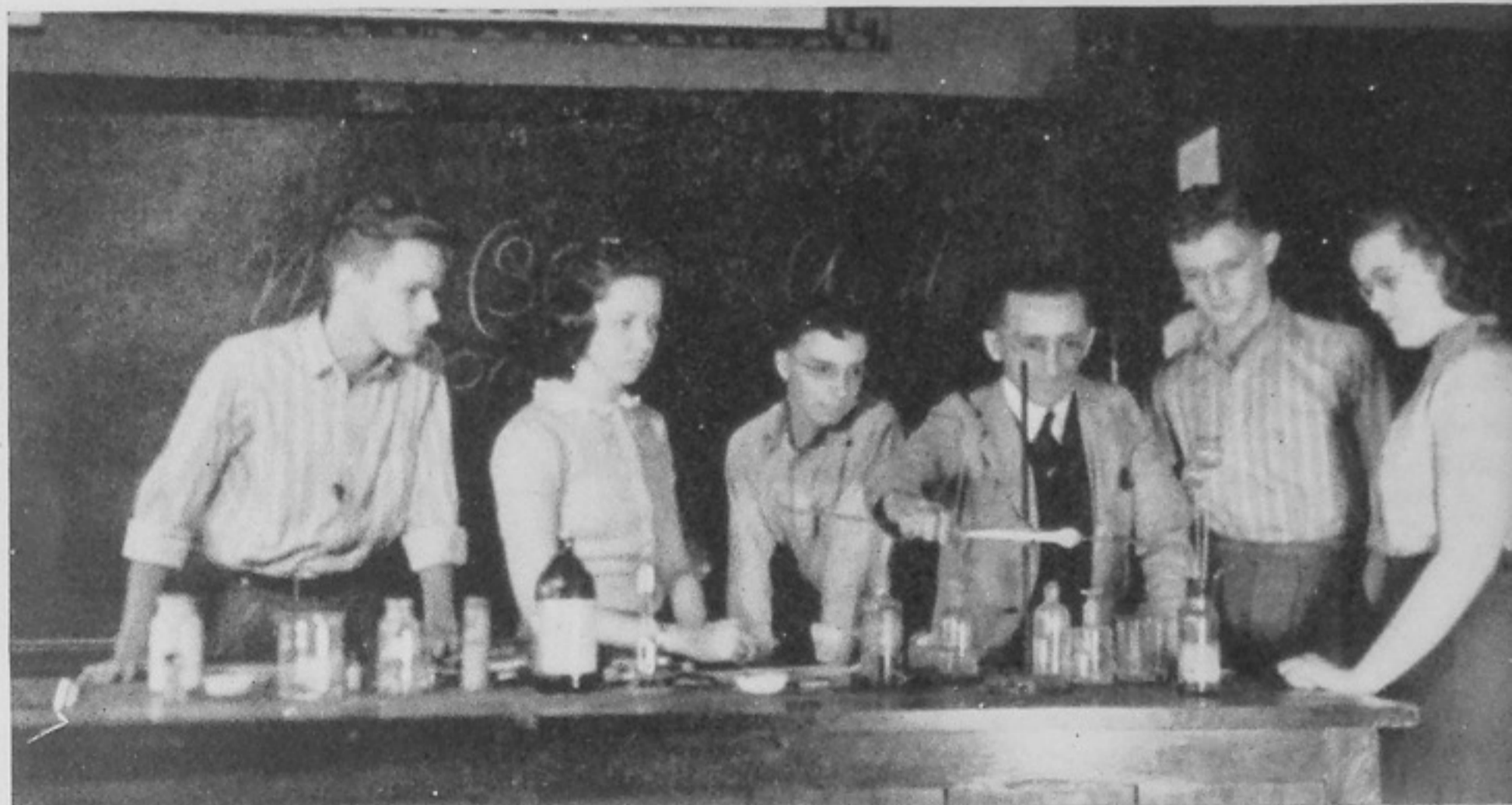
"Stirrups" of rare concoctions

During the year the club had such interesting speakers as Mr. Massie, who explained the danger of chemical warfare;

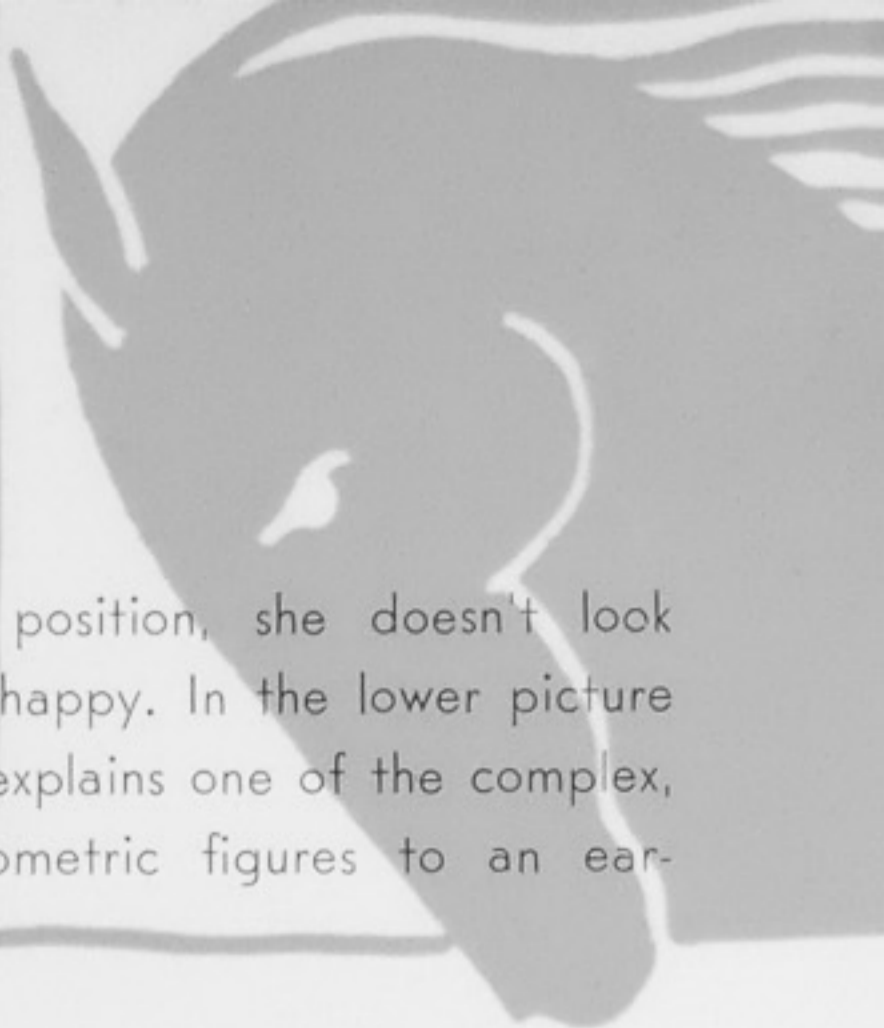

This year George Wiltsee was awarded the Bausch-Lomb award, an award presented to the senior showing the most adaptability in the field of science.

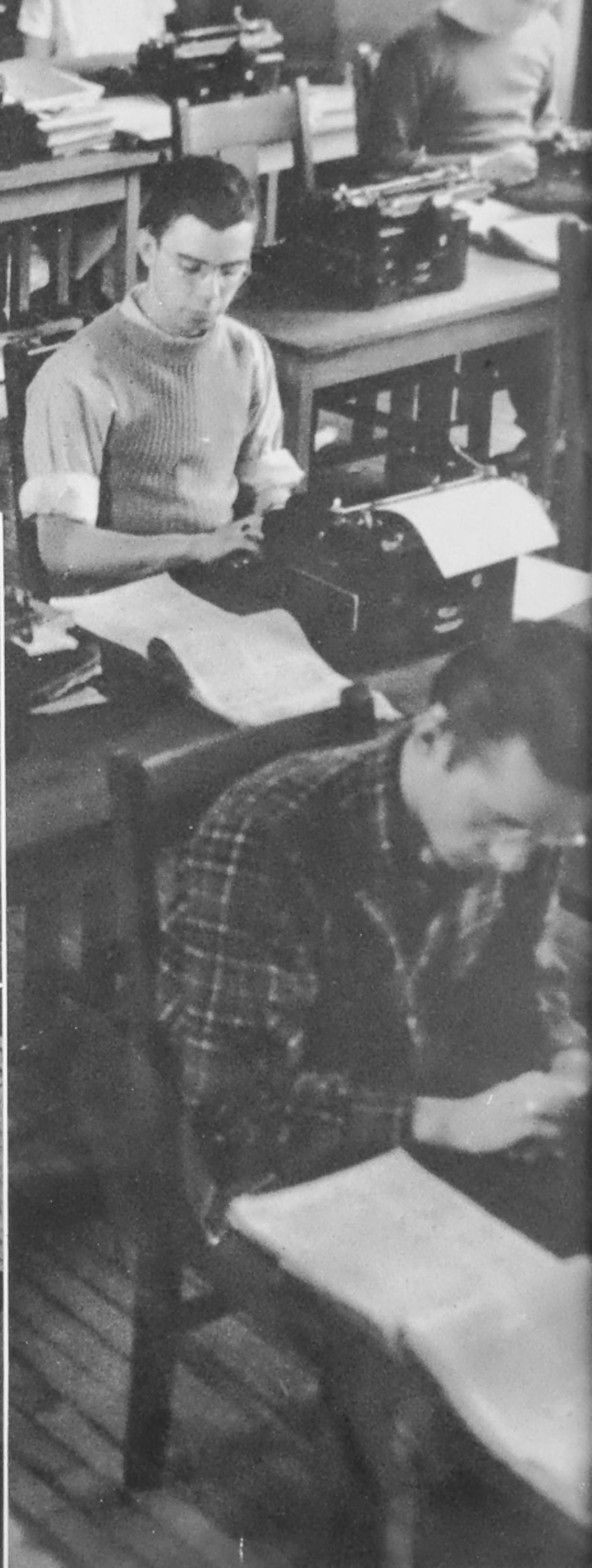

In brief – budget balancers

Perhaps typing and shorthand are the most important subjects in the commercial course. In typing, "practice makes perfect." At first the keyboard is taught and then the students practice until they become efficient typists. Many of them assist in the school offices.

The commercial course gives excellent training for those students who are planning to enter the business world. Many who are taking the commercial course go to business school after they have finished high school, and then they become stenographers, accountants, or hold other similar positions in offices.

Typing is similar to playing a piano and the places where the letters are must be memorized. The typewriters in school do not have the letters marked on the keys, but there are charts in the typing room which have the keyboard on them. Students become able to typewrite by the touch system. Shorthand is used very much in connection with typing. Usually a stenographer takes dictation in shorthand from the person he is working for, then he typewrites the dictation from the shorthand notebook. A new alphabet and a new way of writing words and letters must be learned, but shorthand saves very much time. However, it is very easy to forget how to write in shorthand, and some people cannot read it after they have written it. Although shorthand is essential, it is also necessary to write legible longhand in the business world.

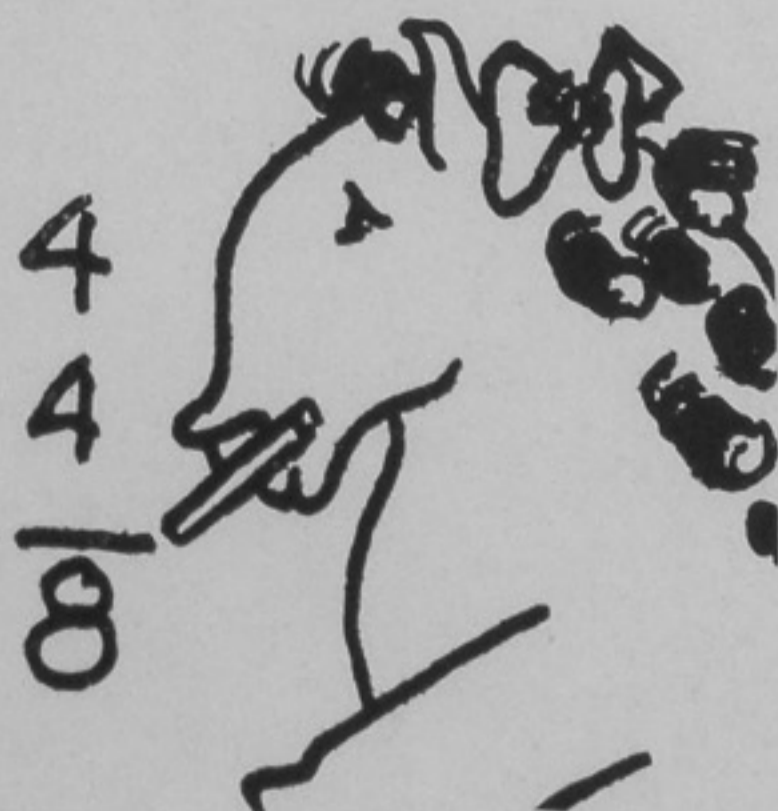

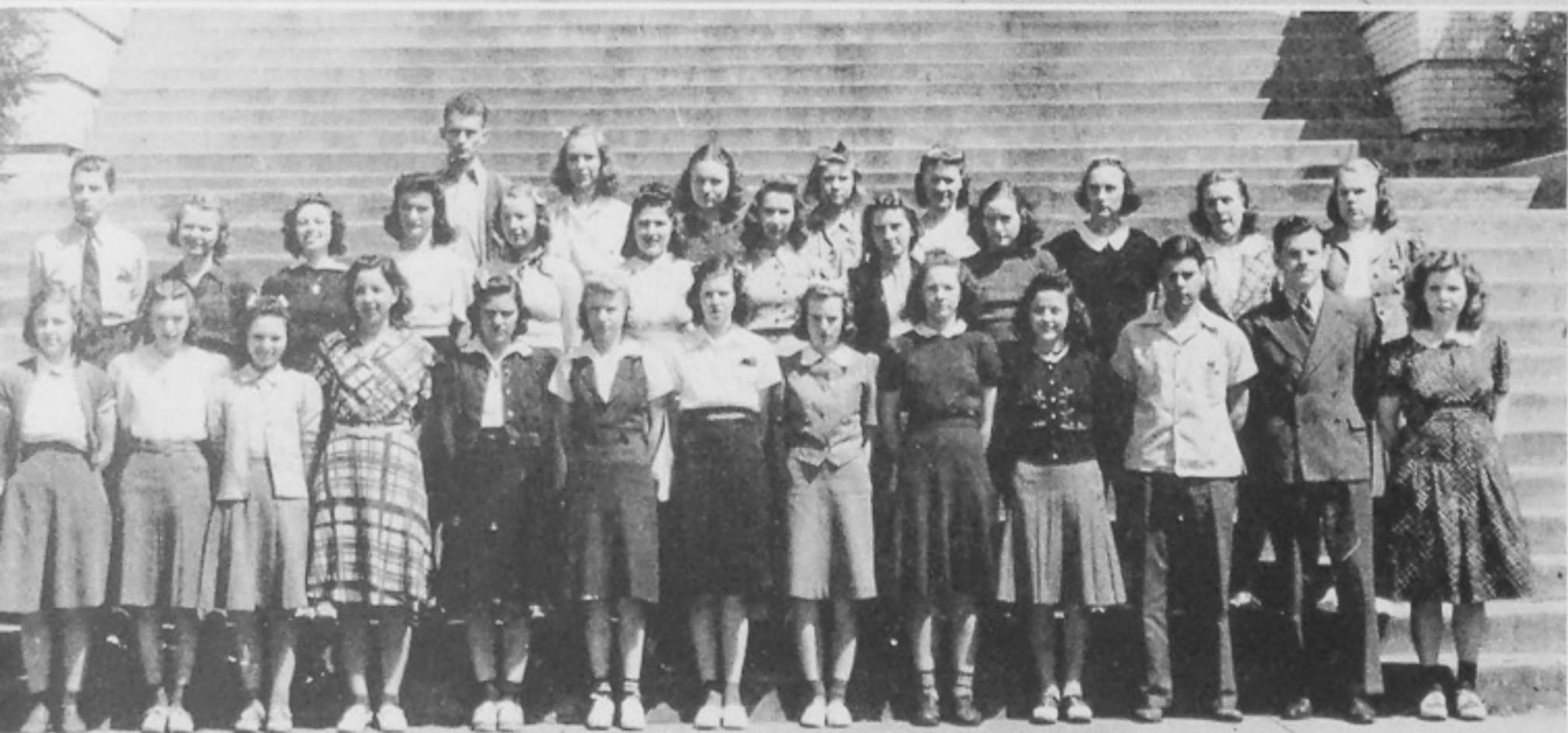

Designing economical homes

The Home Economics Course is perhaps the most important course in the high school for girls. Many girls, after they have finished high school become seamstresses, designers, interior decorators, waitresses, or housewives, and it is almost impossible for them to do any work of this kind without a knowledge of home economics.

This year the girls certainly have a beautiful room in which to work. It was just remodeled and it is as modern and beautiful as the kitchen of any housewife's dream. There is grey and black linoleum on the floor, and venetian blinds are at the windows. Along one side wall are closets, cabinets, and an electric refrigerator. There are white porcelain sink units with cabinets for dishes. Tables with colored tops and white chairs help to complete the room.

New stoves have been installed and everything is at the height of perfection. Small ornaments and plants have been placed throughout the room on the cabinets. Miss Dorothy Waller, food instructor, has a lovely white desk with a black top. She received her B. S. degree at Ohio State University and also attended Miami University. Besides teaching home economics, she is co-advisor of the Betty Lamp Club.

The girls also learn to be expert dress-makers, and many of them make their own clothes. In the sewing room, there are sewing machines and tables on which the girls cut their patterns and study. There is also an ironing board and an iron in order that the girls may press their clothes. This year the home economics department was in charge of making the costumes for the musical comedy. Miss Octavia Shinkle is the instructor in sewing. She received her B. S. degree at Miami University and her M. A. degree at Columbia University. She has also taken graduate work at the University of Chicago, and the University of Wisconsin. Together with Miss Waller, Miss Shinkle is an advisor of the Betty Lamp

Club. Besides teaching sewing and cooking, the teachers also instruct the girls in applying cosmetics and in buying the best brand and correct shade for each girl individually.

The home economics club is one of the most active clubs in the school. The girls often give dinners or teas for their mothers. Members are taken into the club by a point system, and they often sell candy at football and basketball games in order to get points.

Every year members of the club elect delegates to go to their state convention. This year the convention was held in Columbus, Ohio, April 12 and 13; five girls attended. Their expenses were paid by the club. A merit award was received for completing the requirements made by the Ohio Economic Association in activities, organizations, and progress. The girls from the club also provided refreshments at the Co-ed dance which was given in April.

On the opposite page a typical scene in the new modern kitchen is seen, as the girls practice serving and good manners, as well as the preparation of their wholesome meals. On page 89 are views of adjoining rooms, the attractively furnished American maple dining and living room; and the large-tabled sewing room, well fitted in both electric and foot-power machines and other conveniences.

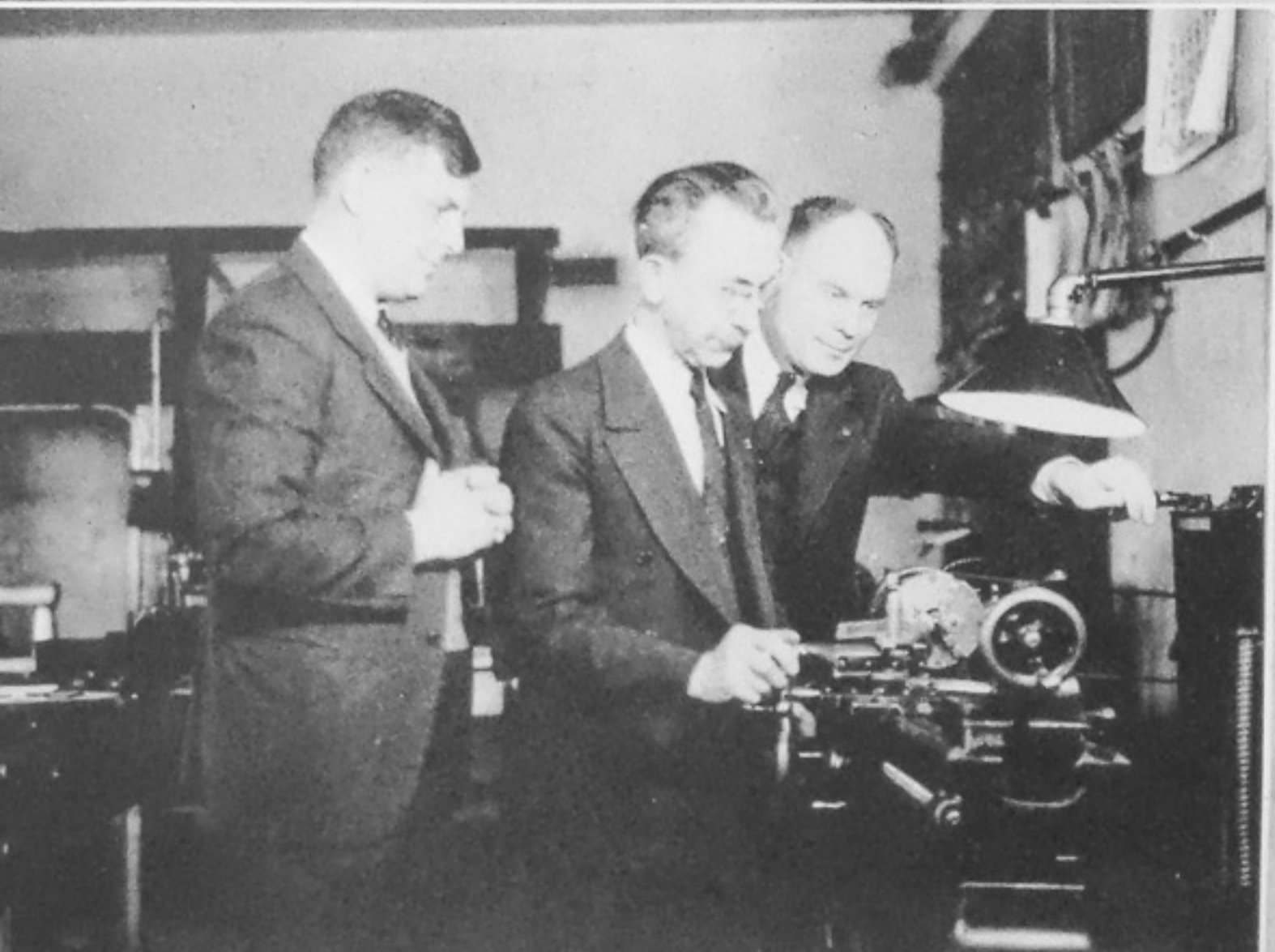

Apprenticeship to industry

For practical training and instruction in mechanics, the industrial arts course is provided for boys. Students learn to saw a piece of wood without sawing their fingers, and to use a hammer without mashing their thumbs. The three rooms set aside for mechanics are the woodshop, the machine shop, and the mechanical drawing room. Boys taking this course also take many other subjects.

Industrial arts teaches students to change the technical theories of design into practical applications. The boys make chairs, tables, bookracks, tie holders, and many articles that are useful around the house. They have plenty of equipment with which to work, and the woodshop was remodeled just this year. During the year the students in this department made large dictionary stands with shelves underneath for many class rooms. Last year they made wood panels to cover the places where there were formerly telephones. The boys can make almost everything—perhaps soon they will be making desks and chairs for the school. Fred Multer is in charge of the woodshop, and he is also co-advisor of the Industrial Arts Club and a coach. Mr. Multer received his B. A. E. and B. S. E. degrees at Ohio State University.

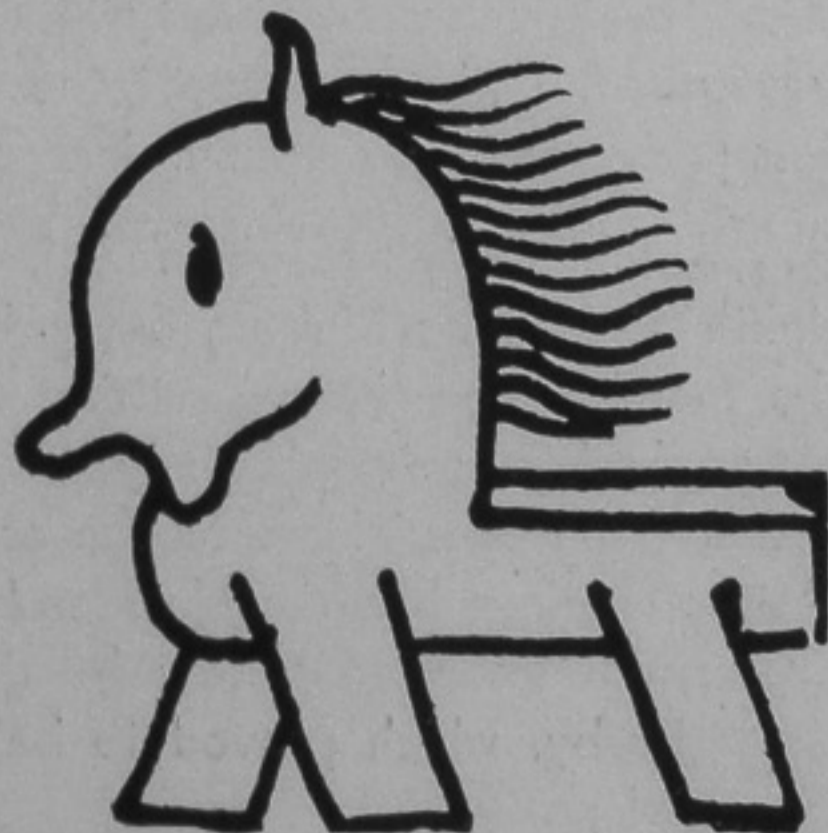
In the machine shop, A. L. Monrad not only teaches the boys to work with tools, but he also teaches blue printing. Because there is no machine with which to develop the blueprints, the boys use natural sunlight. Of course this cannot be done all year, but the boys don't mind waiting until spring. In the spring a young man's fancy turns to—blueprinting. Mr. Monrad received his M. E. degree from Oslo School of Technology, and he took graduate work at I. C. S. in Scranton, Pennsylvania and LaSalle Extension University of Chicago. He teaches machine shop and mechanical drawing, and he is a co-advisor of the Industrial Arts Club. Recently a display of

mechanical drawings were placed on the bulletin board in the second floor corridor. Some of these were charcoal drawings of scenes and designs; all were made under the supervision of Mr. Monrad.

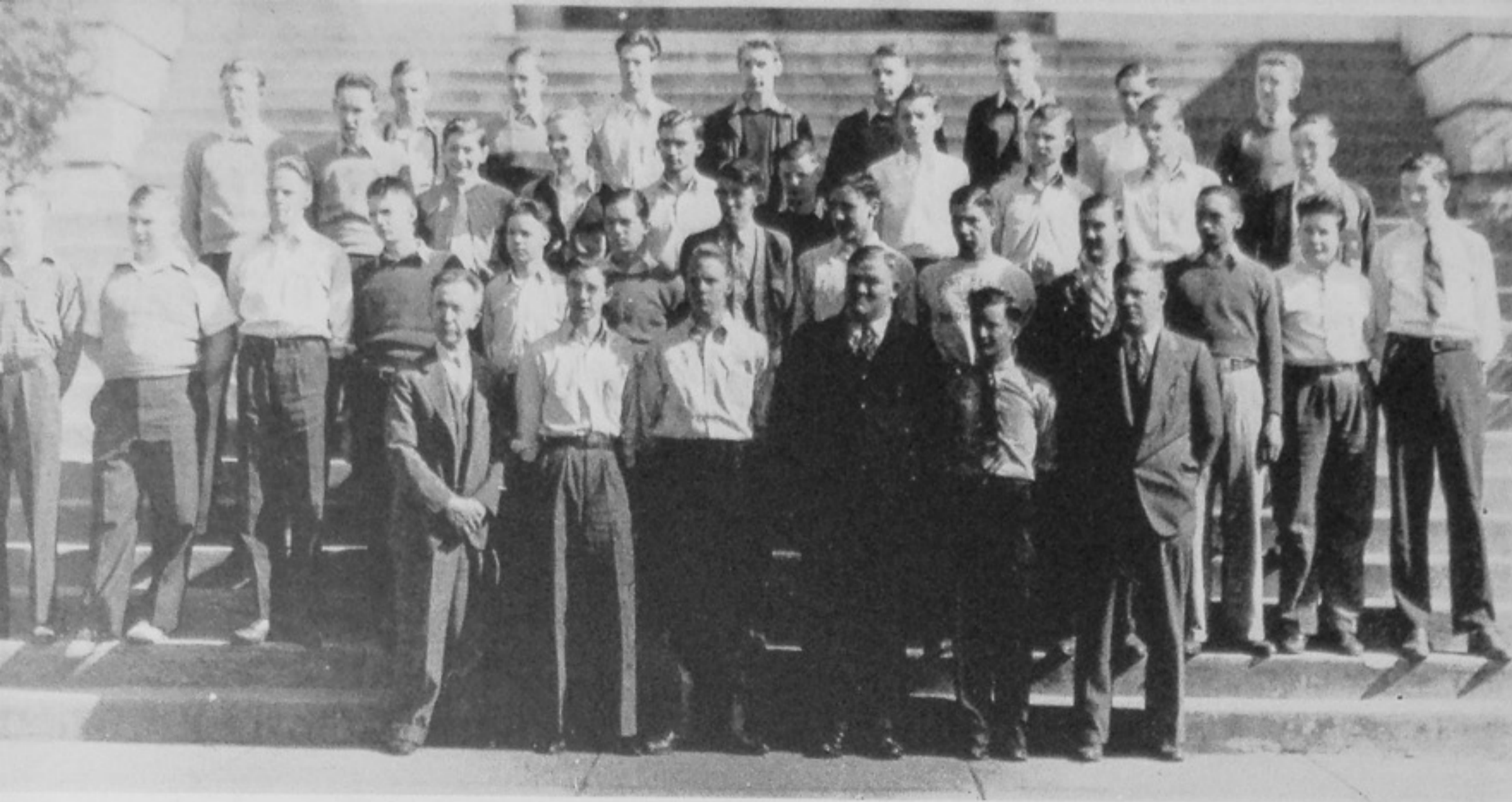

This club, composed entirely of boys, inspires in the students of the Manual Training course an interest in their subjects which might not otherwise be created. This alone would make the organization very worthwhile.

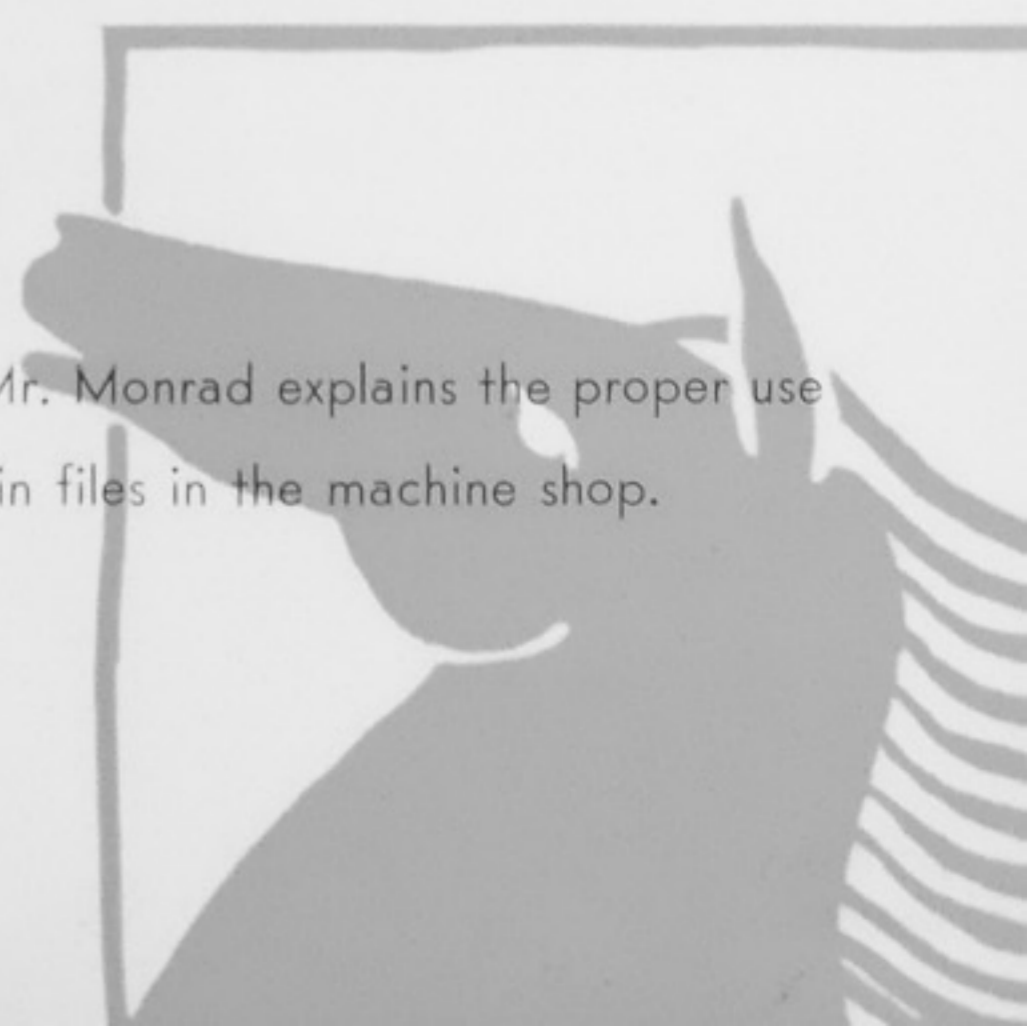

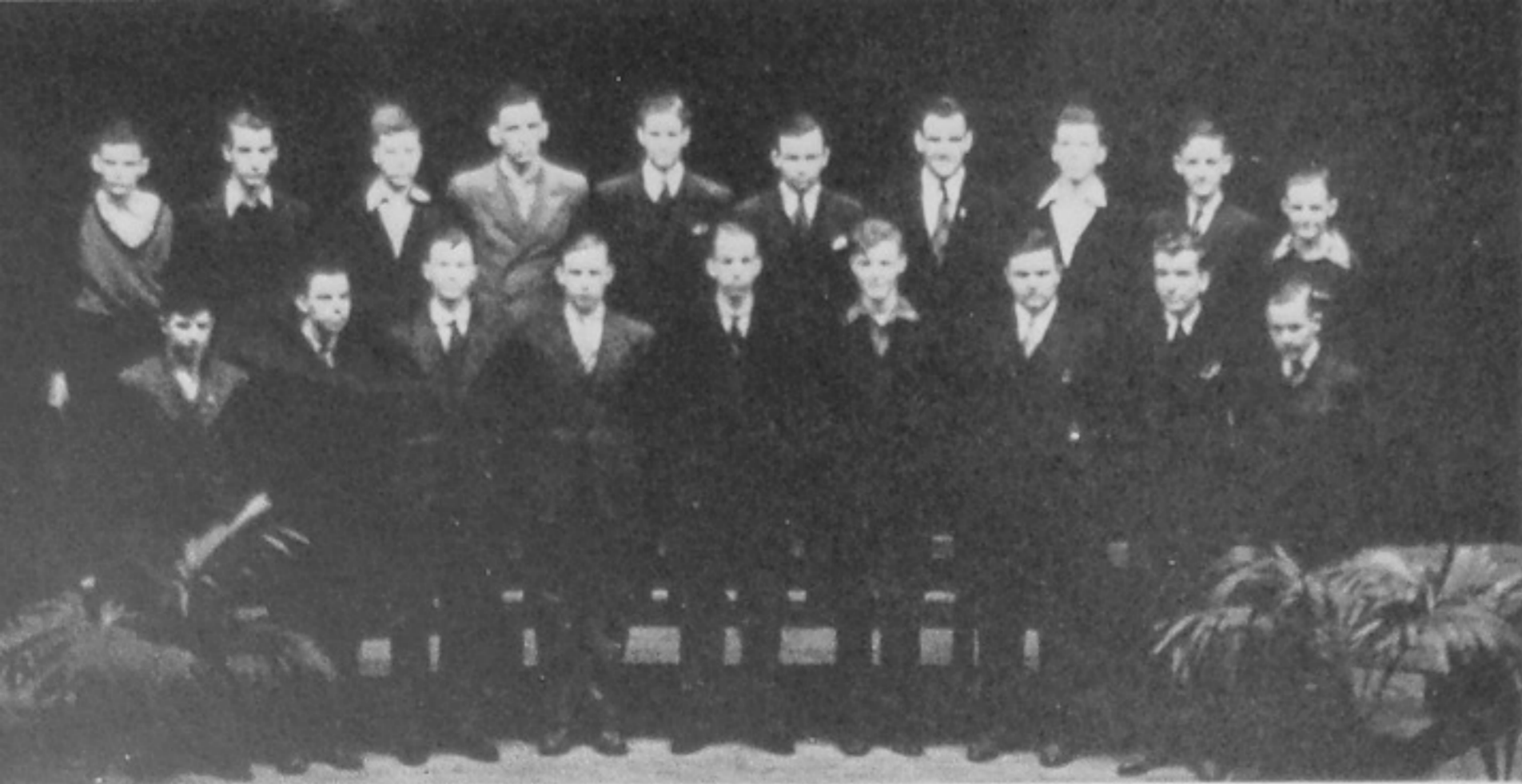

operation, speedy volleys, and tall players carried away the championship title.

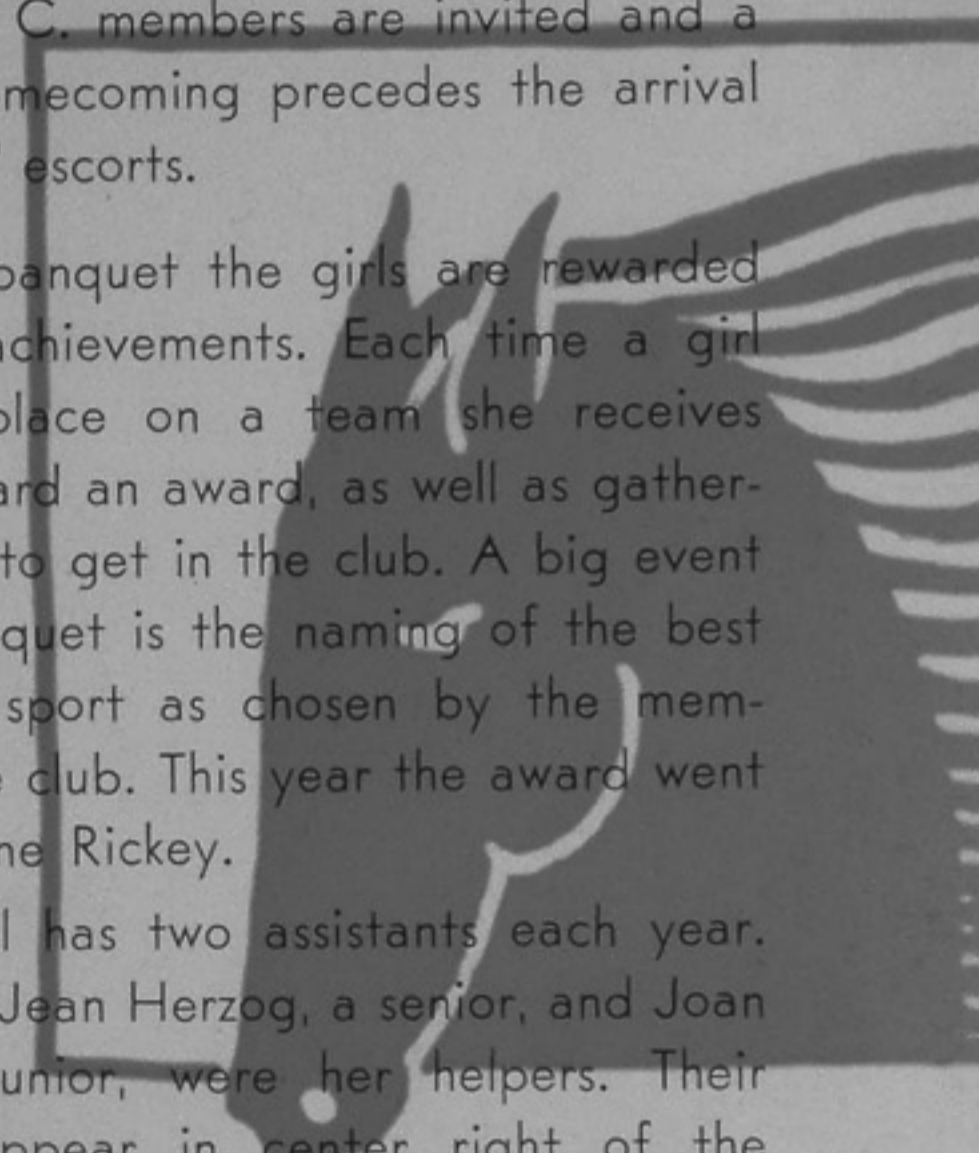

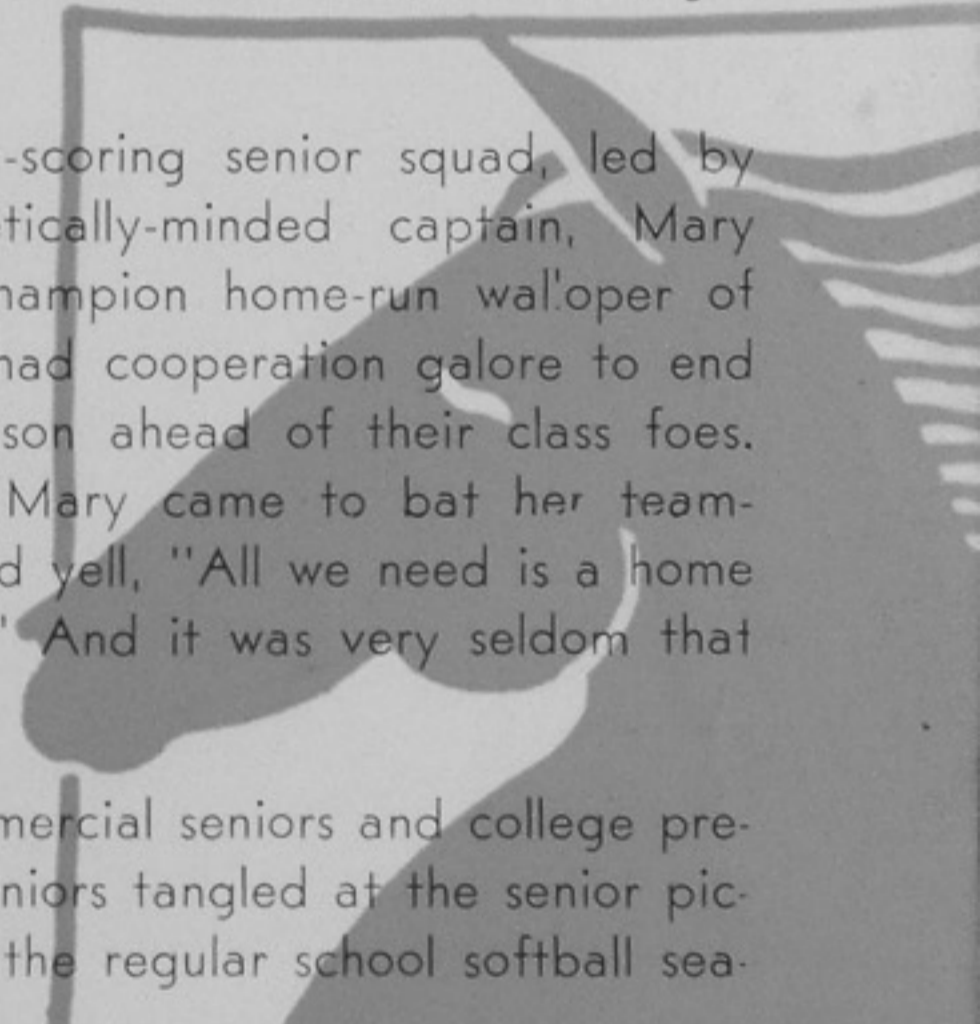
The juniors really worked with a will to win. Marjorie Griffin carried her team over a season of a few mishaps. These girls met

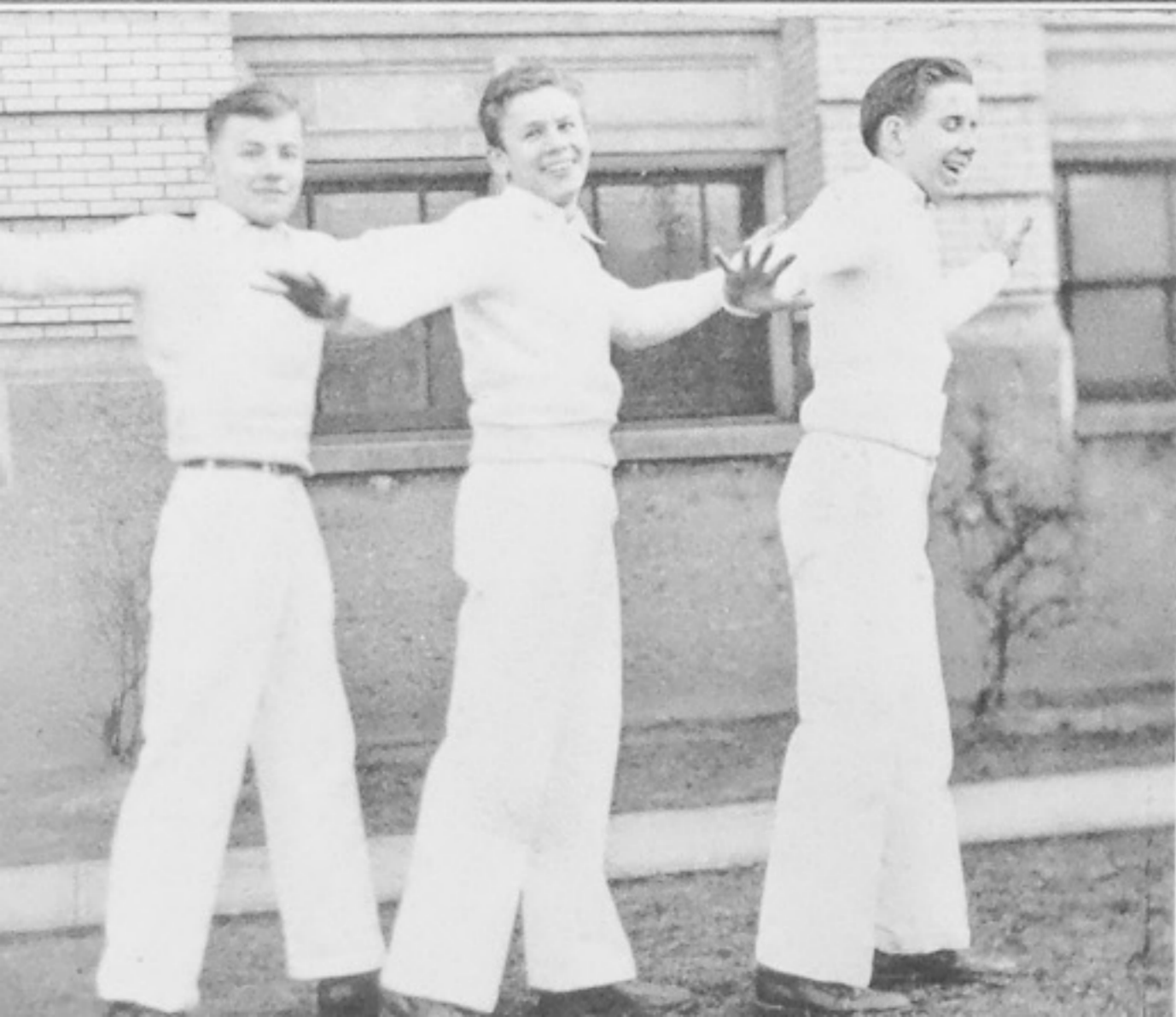
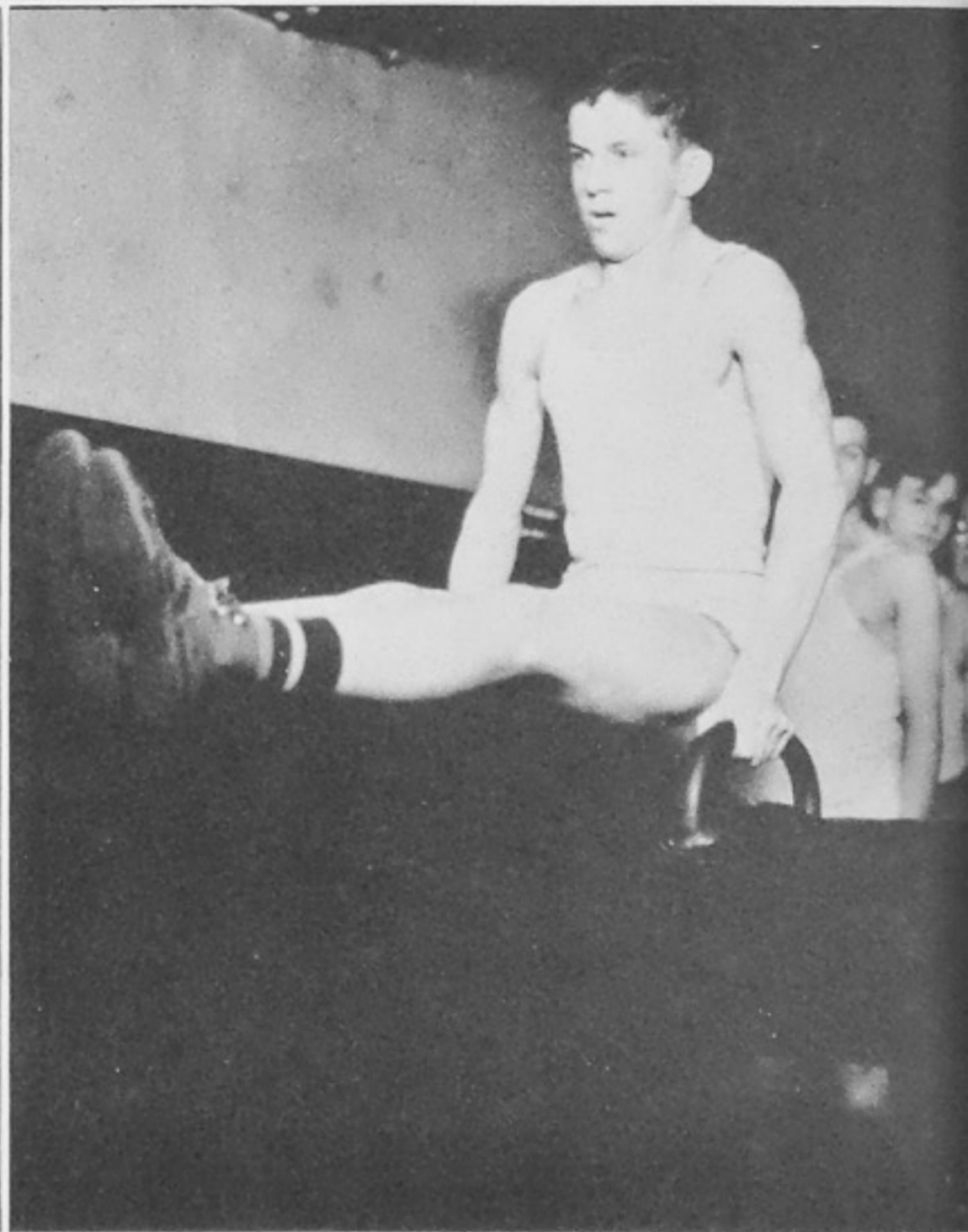
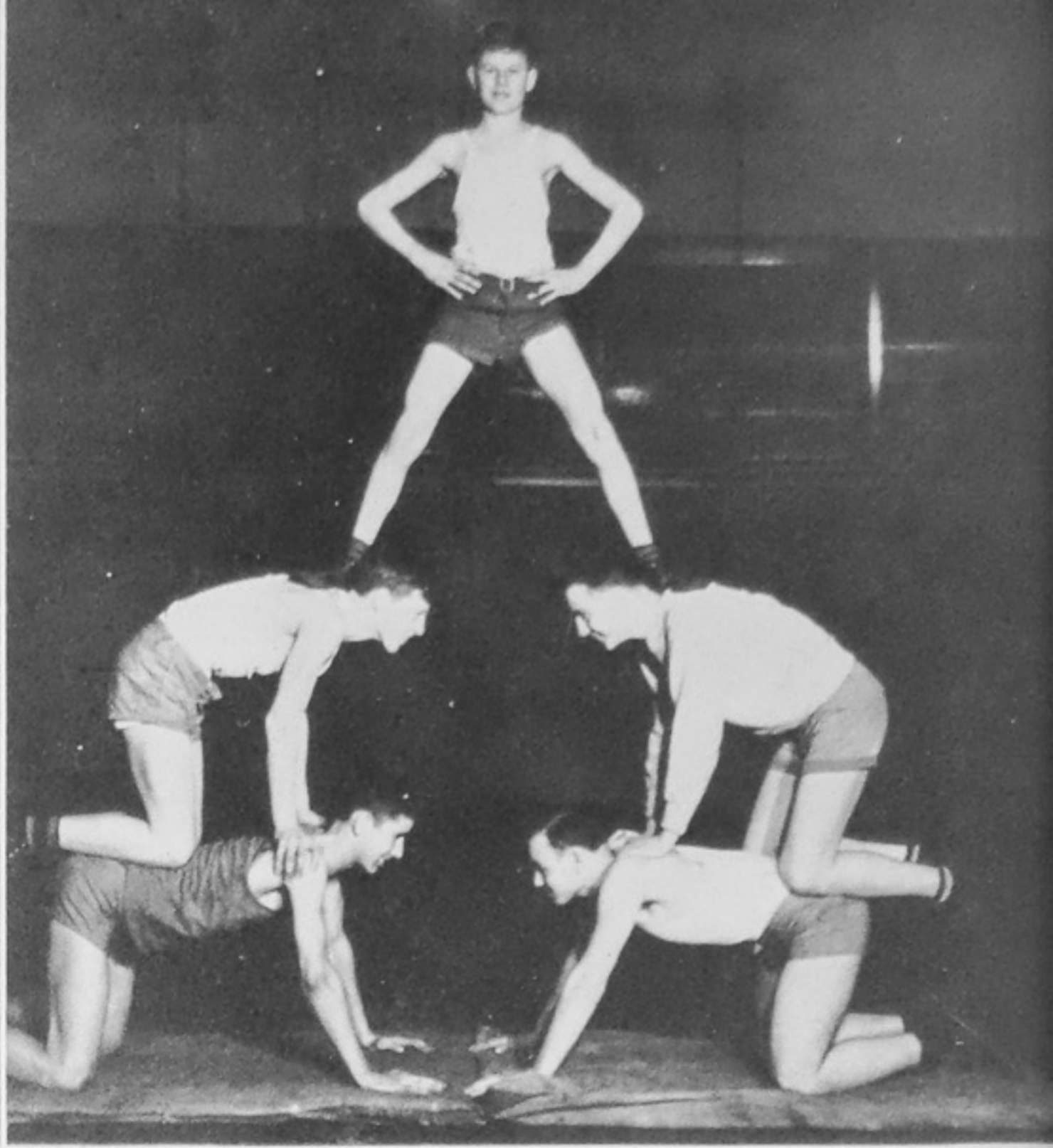
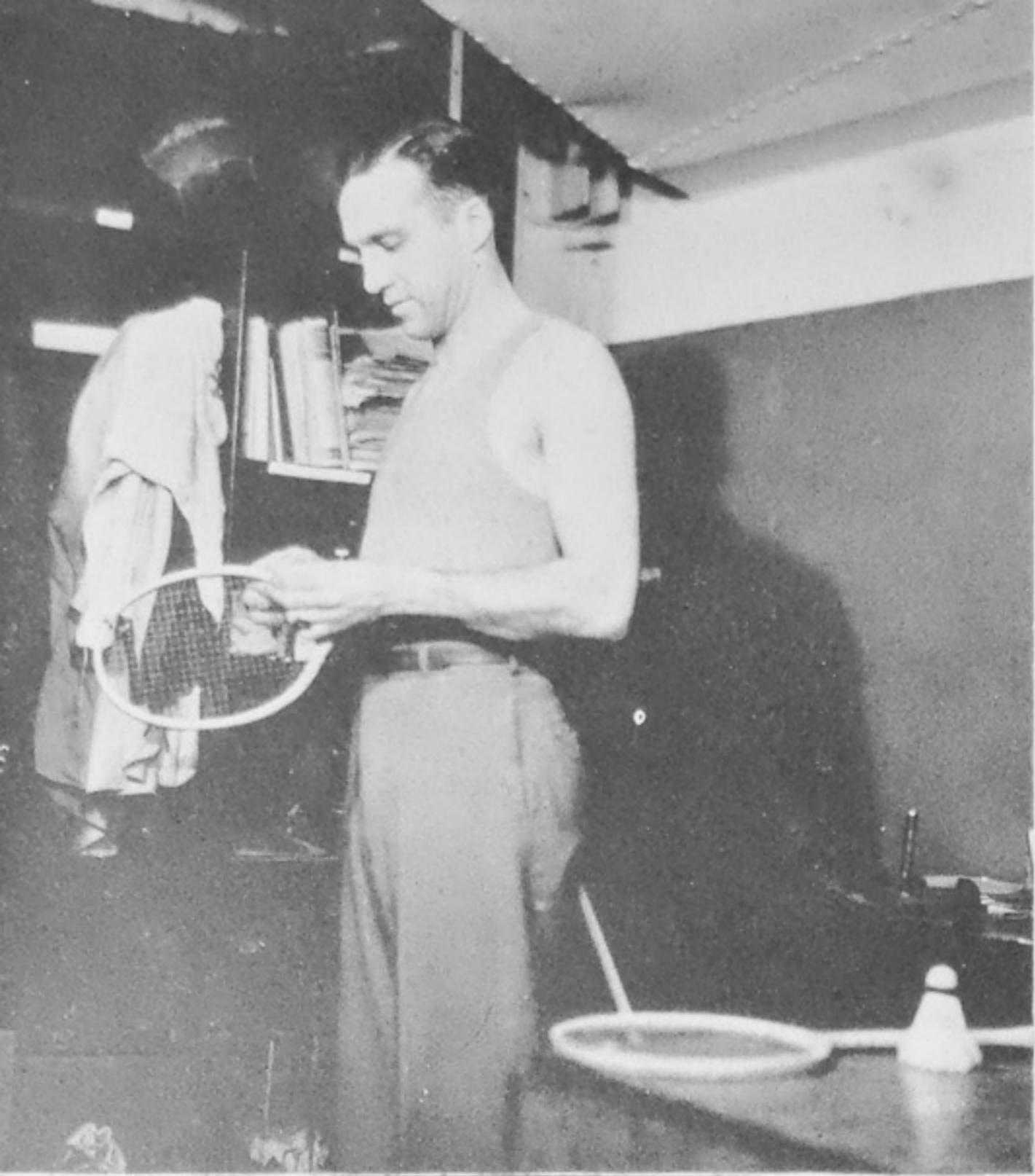
Modern dancing is new to most people in this city. The audience was given a chance to view a group at the demonstration. Festivities ended with a grand march and bowing to King Gym.

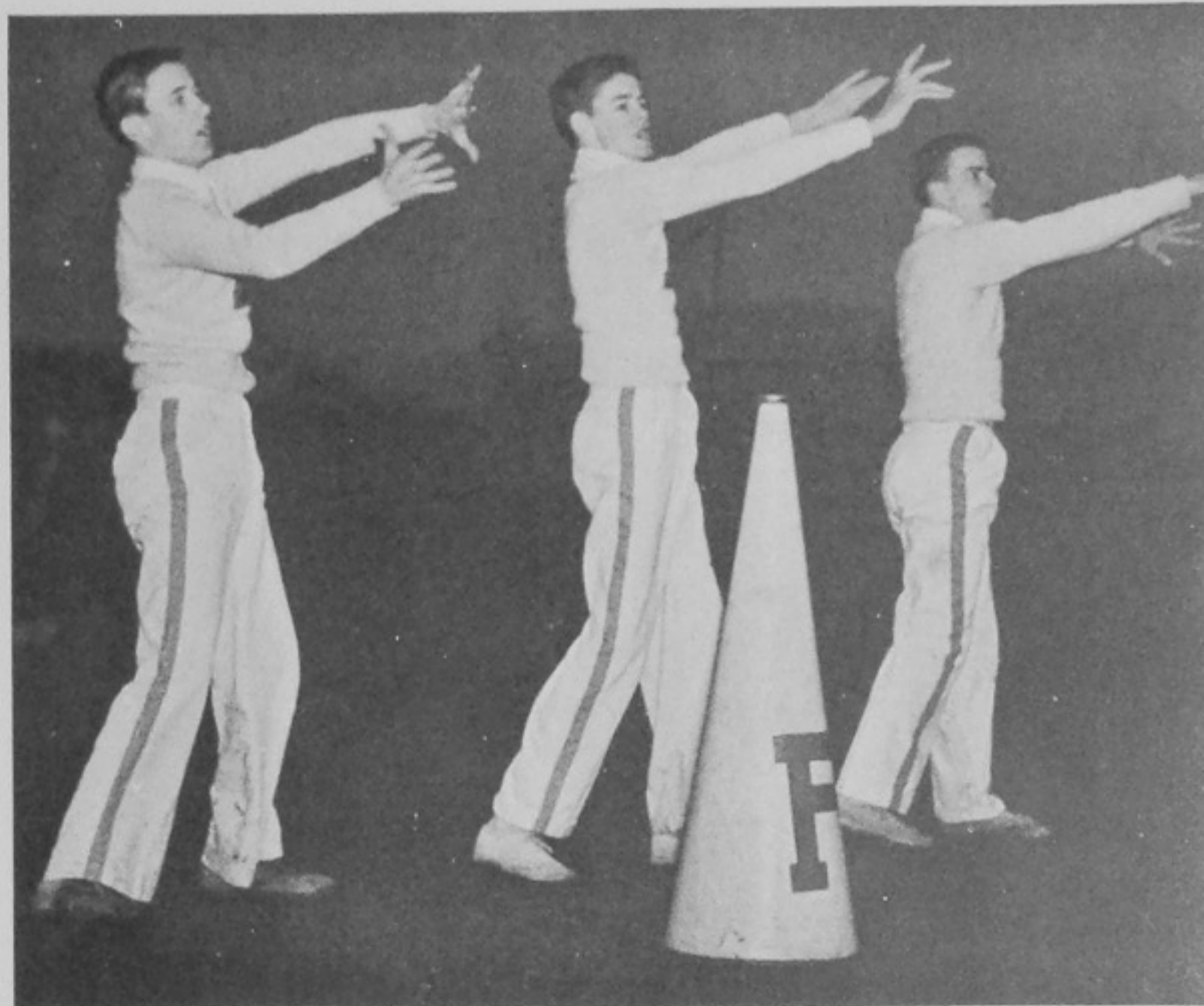

Variety, spice of gym life

Yelps and shouts of glee re-echo from the boys' gym, Willard Ellsesser's "sanctum sanctorium." "Peg" has been teaching physical education for ten years, the last three at Portsmouth High School. The enrollment of boys taking gym in P. H. S. is about three hundred and fifty. Gym is required for freshmen and sophomore boys but not for juniors or seniors.

Equipment in the boys' gym includes two shower rooms, a vaulting horse, parallel bars, a parallel ladder, and equipment for volleyball, basketball, badminton, and softball. Coach Ellsesser has expanded his program immensely and plans to go still farther next year.

The full program for boys in gym classes is as follows: September through October, calisthenics, such as limbering up exercises, and different kinds of games; November through December, work on all the apparatus, including side horse, parallel bars and ladder; January through February, a basketball tournament is conducted by "Peg" among all his classes (the winners receive banana splits, and the losers receive a whipping with newspapers as they run the gauntlet), March through the middle of April, a volleyball tournament similar to that of basketball is carried on by the boys. For the next three weeks the boys are given instruction in advanced tumbling, and during the remainder of the year baseball and

Ellsesser advises the boys in health programs, such as how to gain or lose weight. He also instructs them in good posture. He keeps a chart from the beginning of the year to the end on which are recorded the boys' improvement or lack of improvement throughout the year.

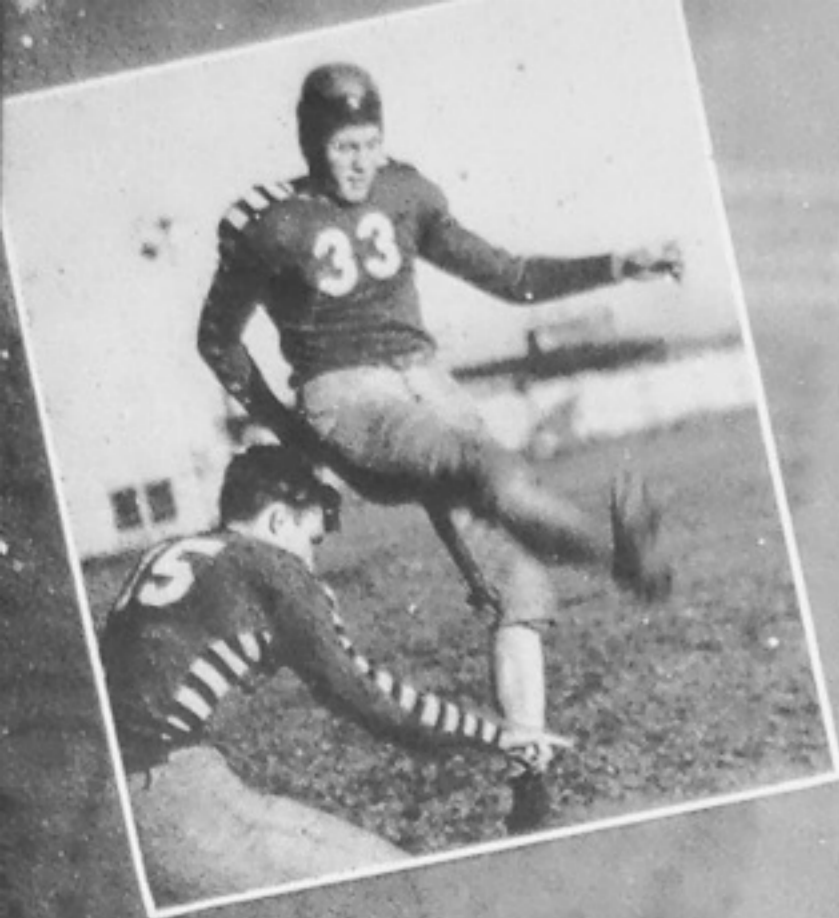
Besides teaching physical education all day long, "Peg" is assistant football coach, reserve football coach, reserve basketball coach and head baseball coach.

Cleats of football shoes which were to carry the Portsmouth Trojans through an undefeated season, began pounding the mud of Labold Field approximately a week before school started in September. Nearly 100 boys reported for practice under the capable direction of head coach Paul Jenkins, line coach Charles Ramey, and assistant coach Willard Ellsesser.

Jenkins formerly coached at Louisville Xavier High School and at Ashland, Ky. Charles Ramey came directly from the University of Cincinnati without former experience. Willard ("Peg") Ellsesser formerly coached New Boston's Tigers and was temporarily head coach of the Trojans prior to Jenkins' arrival.

Co-captains of this year's squad were both seniors, Jim Barker and Bob Frank. Other seniors on the Trojan powerhouse were: Parsons, Rayburn, Gibson, Warden, Kline, Kennedy, Norman, Ferguson, Little, Bourne, and Drake.

At the end of the regular season, Barker and Rayburn were placed on both the Associated Press and United Press All-Ohio football teams. Kline and Franck were given honorable mention on both teams, and Gibson and Parsons received honorable mention on the United Press team. Eugene Rayburn pulled in an additional honor by being picked up to go to Florida to play on a team of Ohio seniors in the Kumquat Bowl game in St. Petersburg. As a climax, our undefeated Trojans were given the honor of playing against Toledo Waite in the first Buckeye Bowl game in

Ohio State's massive horseshoe stadium in Columbus.

Coach Elmer Layden of Notre Dame University, one of the famed four horsemen, delivered the principal address at the annual football banquet held in Masonic Temple, December 6.

To take care of the football equipment during the year, Athletic Director Richard Hopkins employed nine boys. These boys worked hard all of the season to keep the Portsmouth football teams well dressed. A. Hobstetter and H. Leightenheimer handled the varsity. C. Brady and J. Stayer worked for the reserves. C. Miller, J. Henry, H. Zornes, and P. De Armond managed the sophomore and freshman teams. C. Combs was trainer for the Trojans.

Portsmouth's big Red and Blue inaugurated their season in Municipal Stadium on Friday night, September 22, against Akron South. The Trojans scored three touchdowns to win decisively 19 to 0. Combs scored on a pass from Barker and Brady, and Warden scored on short runs. Franck, Portsmouth center, was outstanding on defense. A week later on September 29, the Trojans conquered the Springfield Wildcats 34-0. Warden touched pay dirt three times, twice on runs of 41 and 42 yards. Combs caught a pass, and Barker plunged over for the other two markers. This game was consecutive win number 17 for the Trojans.

On October 6, the Trojans traveled to

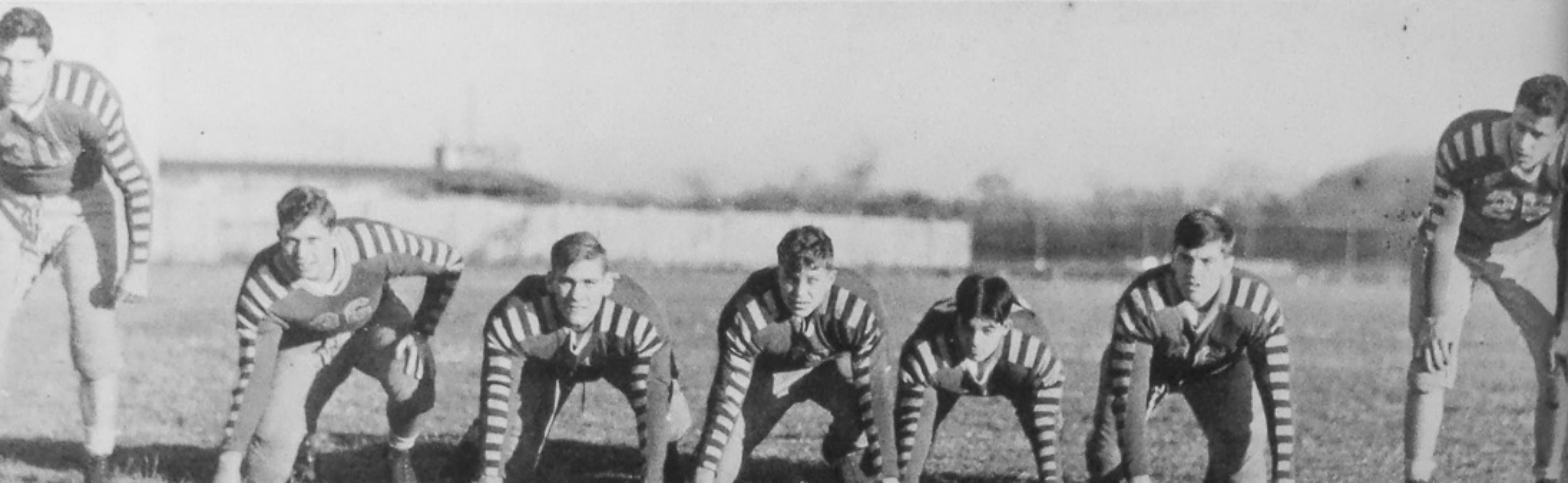
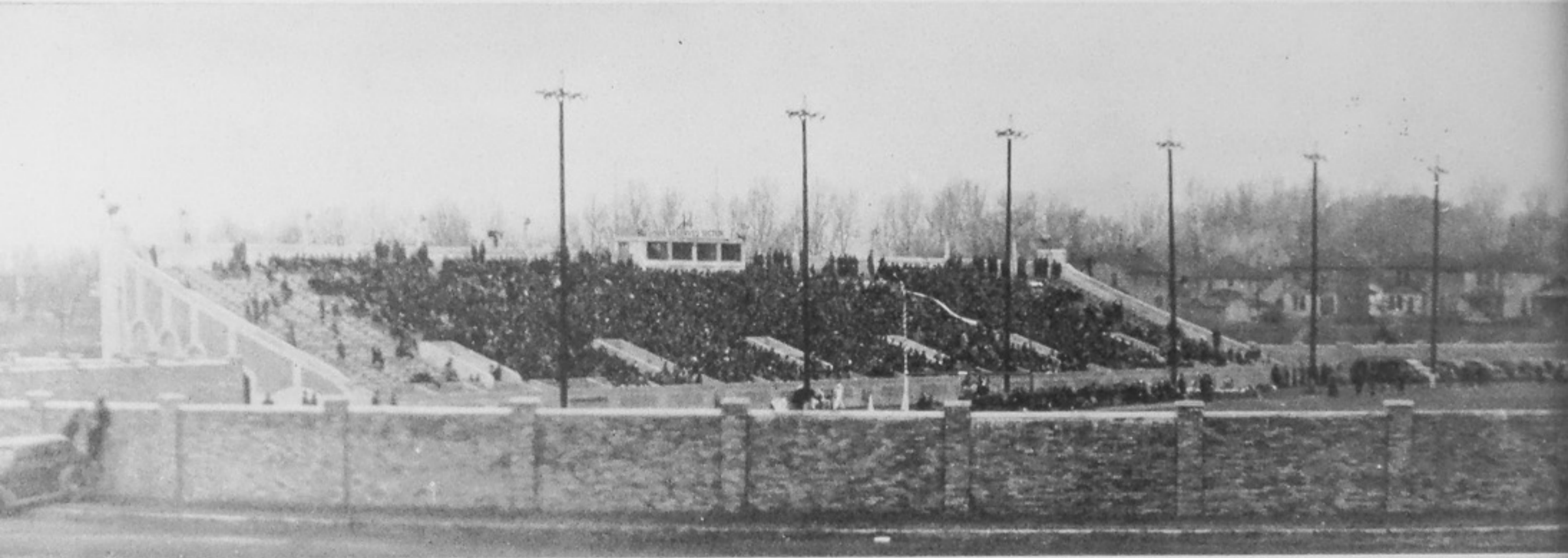

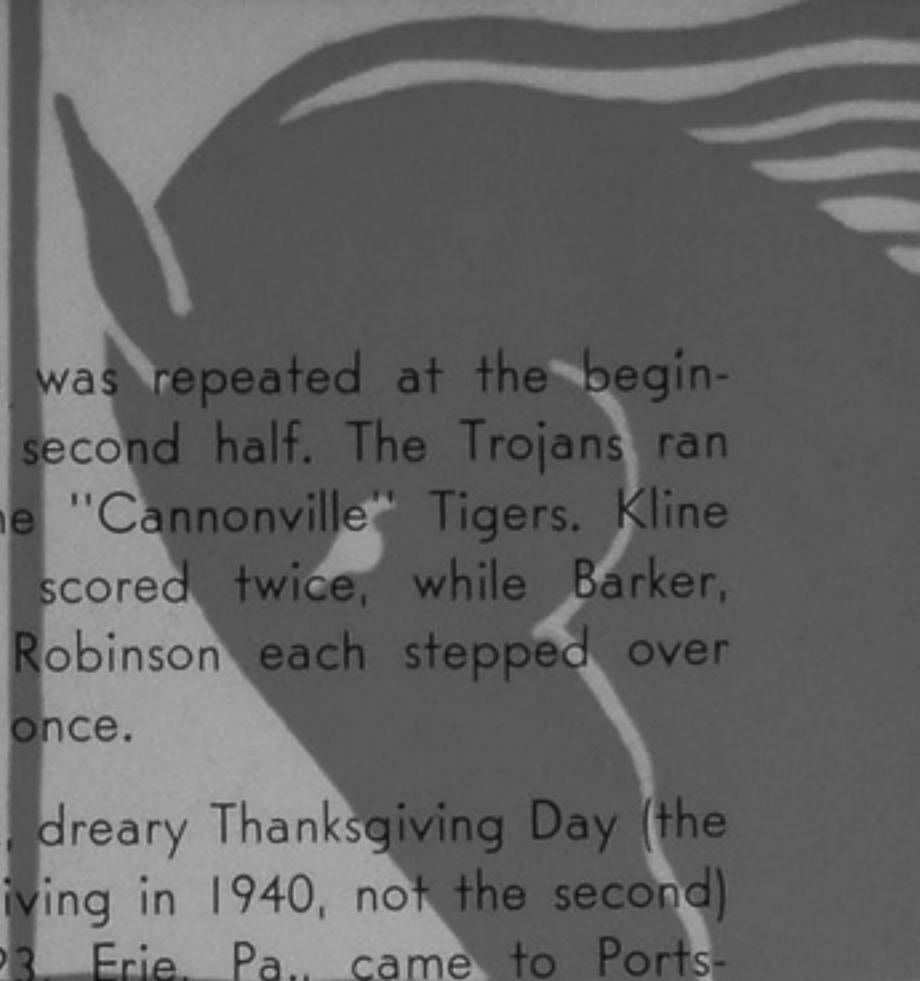

Steubenville, Ohio, and smashed a highly-praised Steubenville crew 39-0. Barker accounted for three touchdowns, Warden two, and Kennedy one.

Chillicothe's strong Cavaliers came to Portsmouth on October 13 and were trounced 19-0. Parsons recovered a fumble for the first score. Barker scored another after a 65-yard drive, and Brady came through on an 8-yard reverse for the last one. Ferguson, Rayburn, and Franck, on the line, were strong on defense for Jenkins' boys.

The floodwall gang tackled Youngstown Chaney here on October 20 and sent them home with a 32-0 pasting. Chaney was not allowed one first down while Portsmouth's aerial attack clicked. Nine out of fourteen passes were completed. Barker scored twice while Warden, Apel, and Kline each rang the bell once. This made 20 wins in a row; there was to be no number 21.

Middletown ended Portsmouth's streak by battling the Trojans to a scoreless draw. Rain fell during the entire game, and the field was covered with mud. A punting duel developed between Barker of P. H. S. and Da Riff of Middletown. The Trojans came through in first downs with 8 against the Middies' 1. The Trojans lost their only chance to score when they fumbled on the Sailors' 1-yard line. Da Riff, Middle punter, was exceptionally good.

Huntington, W. Va., was the scene of Portsmouth's next victory. They defeated the Pony Express on November 3, 21-6. Blocking was excellent for the Trojans. Barker scored twice on plunges and Kline fired a pass to Combs for the other. The score at the half was 7 to 6 in Portsmouth's favor. Outstanding for Jenkins' eleven were Barker, Brady, Rayburn, Kline, and Andrews.

Two weeks later on November 17 the Trojans ambled into Ironton, Ohio, and definitely massacred their annual rivals 48-0. Portsmouth started the game off by scoring a touchdown on the kick-off. This

performance was repeated at the beginning of the second half. The Trojans ran wild over the "Cannonville" Tigers. Kline and Combs scored twice, while Barker, Brady, and Robinson each stepped over the goal line once.

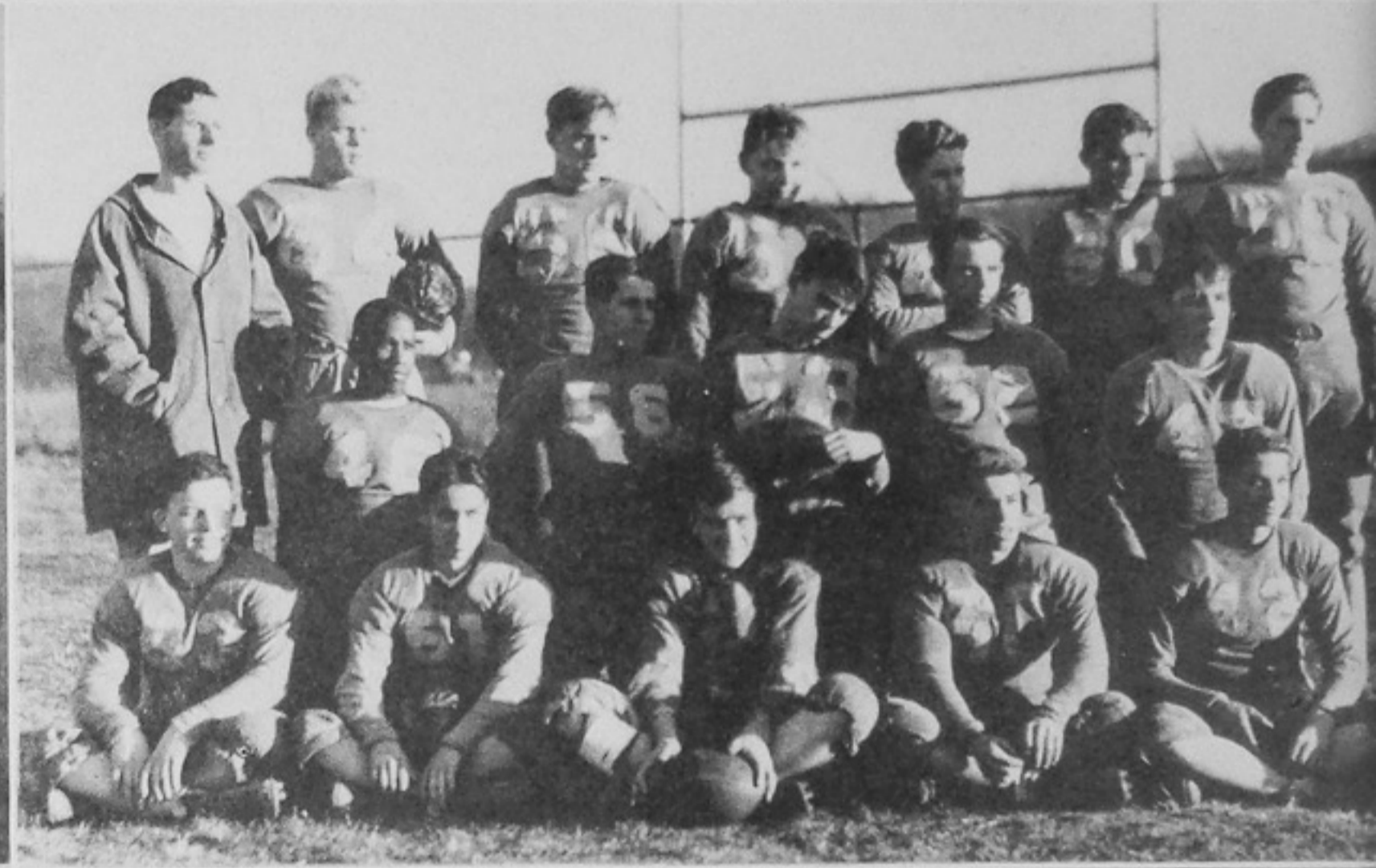
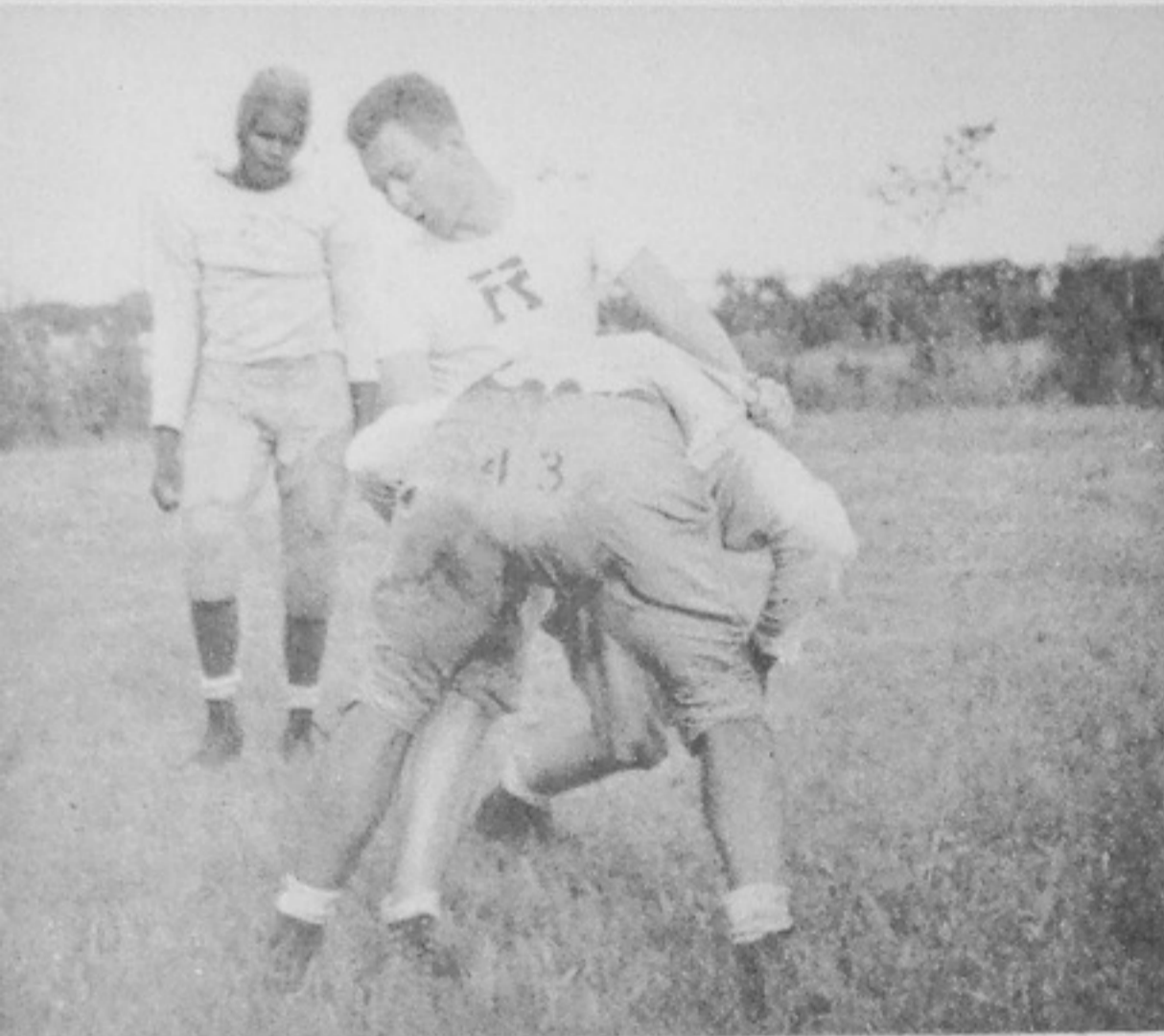
On a dark, dreary Thanksgiving Day (the first Thanksgiving in 1940, not the second) November 23, Erie, Pa., came to Portsmouth and were set back 25 to 6. Parsons, ace end, scored twice, on a pass and on a blocked kick. Combs snagged one of Kline's torrid heaves for one and Barker plunged for another score. Erie East managed to chalk up their only score with the aid of a pass during the last few minutes of play.

Coach Ellsesser coached the Portsmouth Reserves while carrying on his duties as assistant to Coach Jenkins. He gave them valuable pointers during the year that will help them when they advance to Jenkins' supervision. The reserves during the season won 7 games and lost 1.

On September 29 they ran up a huge score against the Black Fork varsity, 33 to 0. On October 5, they finally outscored the Wurtland, Kentucky varsity 19-13. October 10 found them barely ekeing out a win over a rugged Fullerton McKell, Ky., eleven, 7 to 0. Two days later, October 12, they were given their only beating by a more experienced Vanceburg, Ky., team, to the tune of 20-0. Portsmouth's reserves showed themselves superior to reserves from Huntington, W. Va., by trouncing them on October 19 and November 9, 34 to 0 and 6 to 0. One game was played in Huntington and one was played here. On November 10 the reserves went to Beaver, Ohio, and walloped the Beaver High School juggernaut, 62-0. Every man on the squad was able to show his football skill in this game. In their last game of the season they again encountered the Vanceburg, Ky., team and won by a decisive score, 26 to 0. These boys will be counted on to give the Trojans much help in future years.

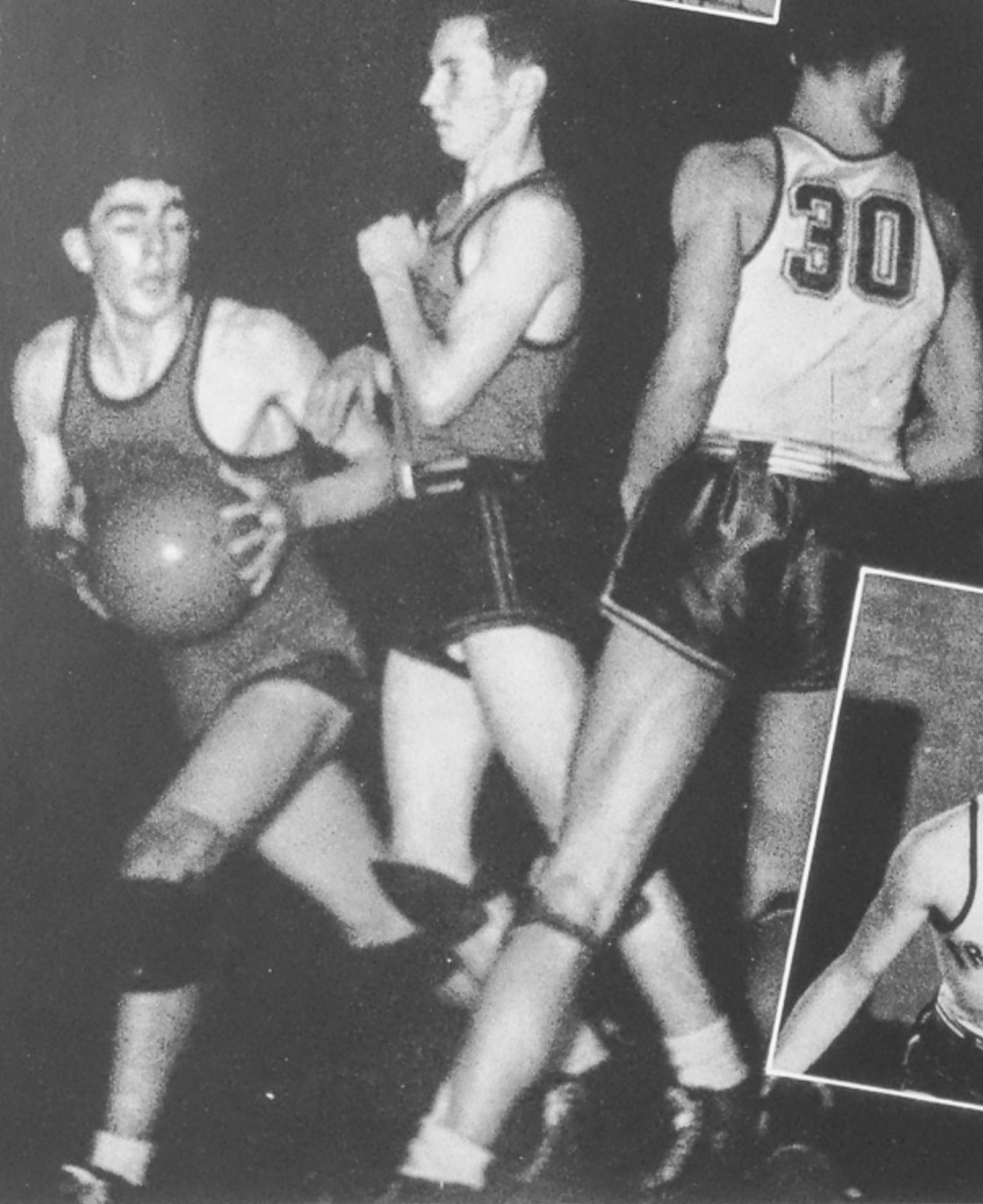
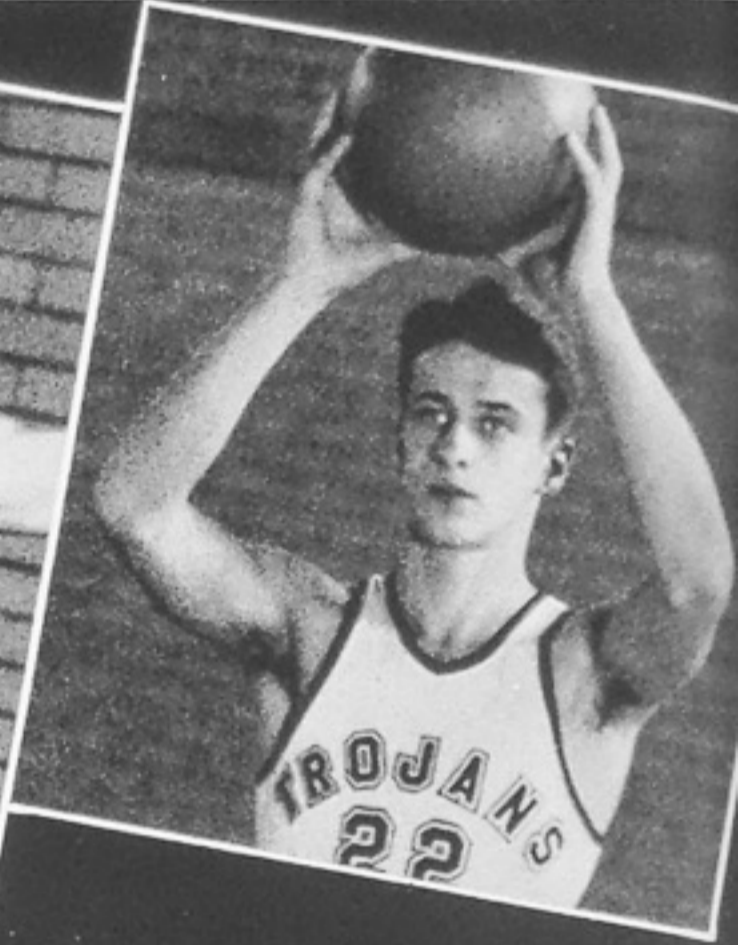
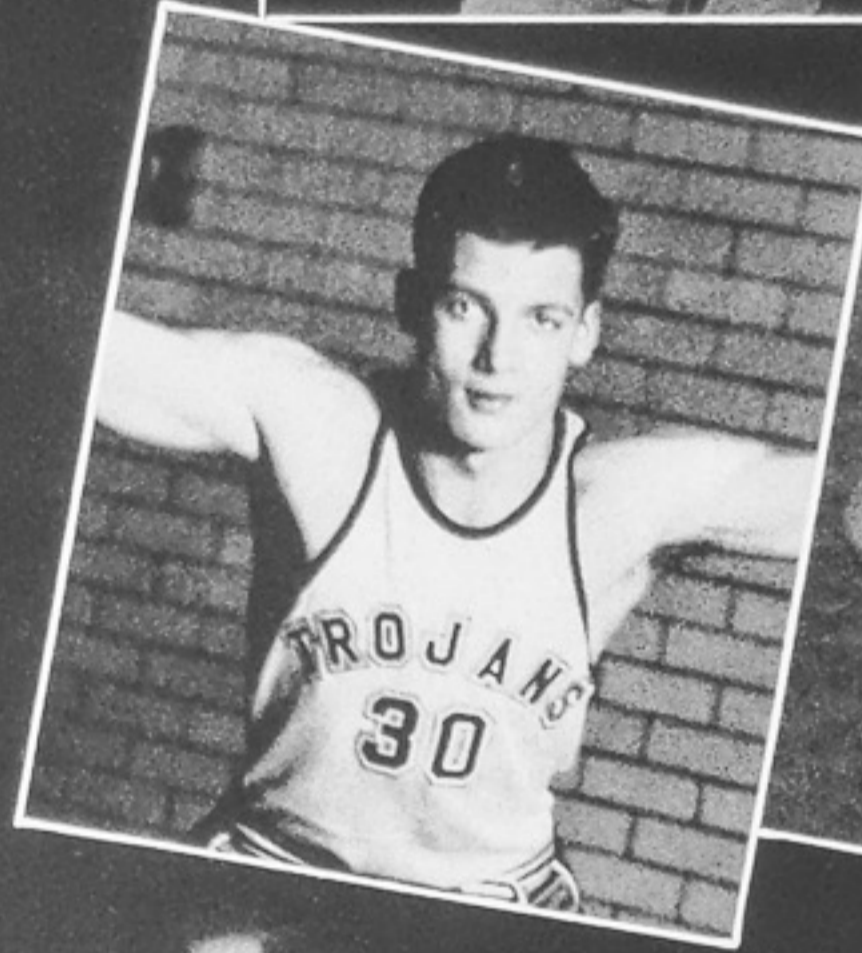
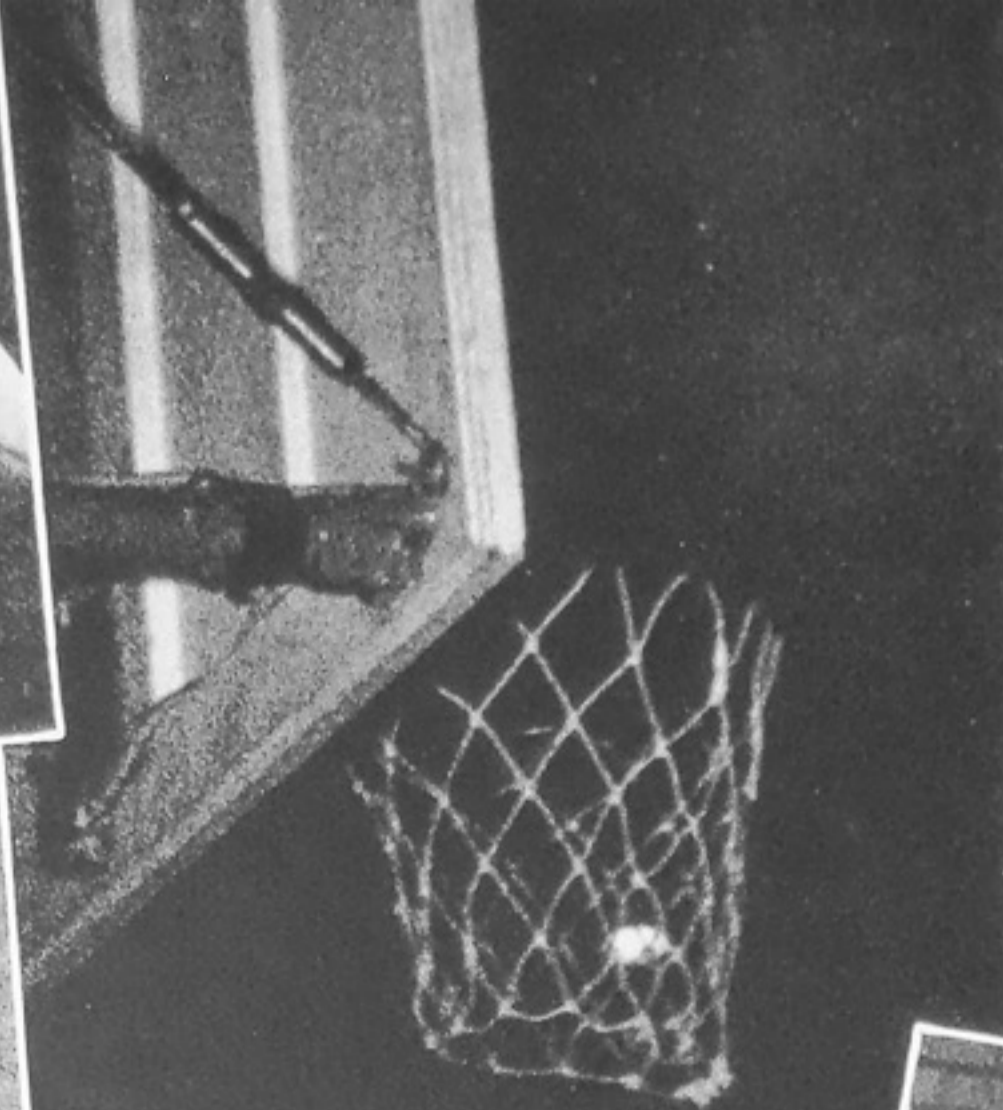
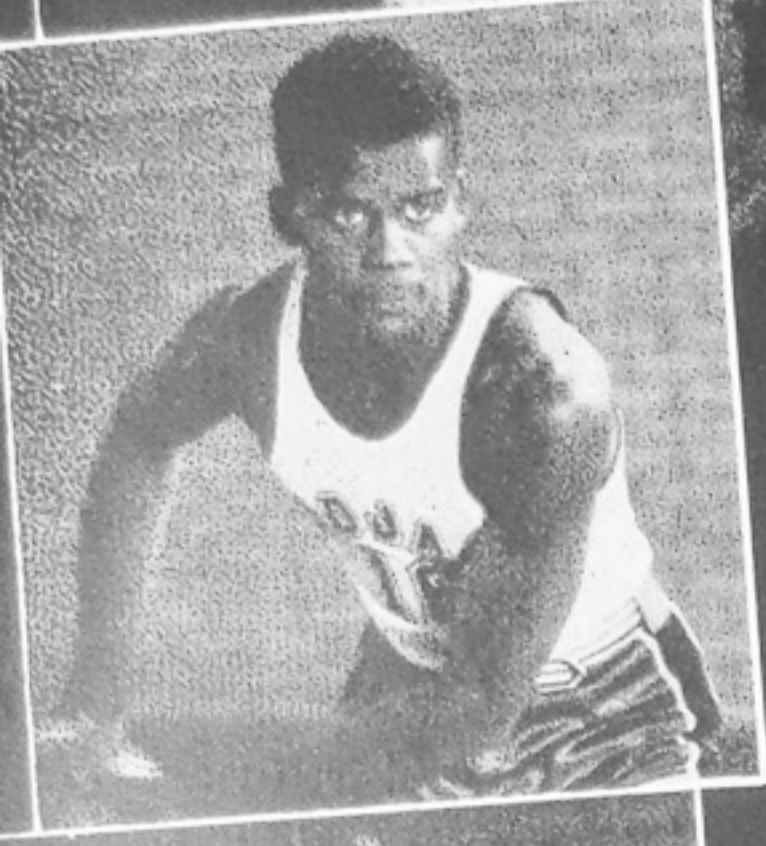
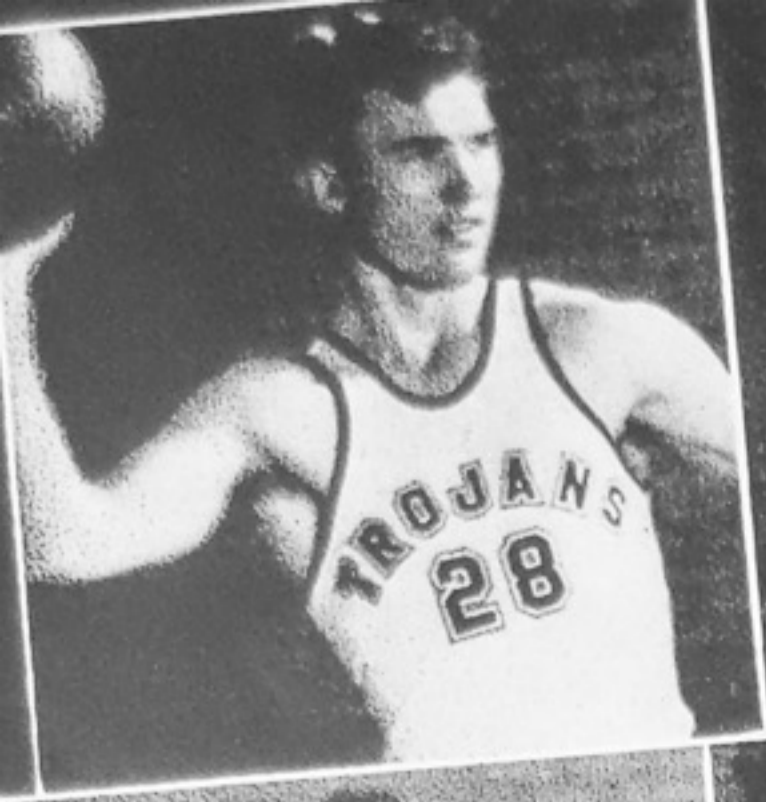
One of the high school faculty, James McElhaney ("Mac"), has charge of all grade school athletics, in which extensive training program all elementary schools in the city

The ball was snapped and Wolff's toe connected with the pigskin. The ball sped majestically through the uprights for a perfect field goal, a heartbreaking defeat for the Trojans. The final score was: Toledo 9, Portsmouth 7. This game ended a brilliant season for Portsmouth High School's fighting Trojans.

Cagesters place in league

Football duds changed into cage clothes as practice started Monday, December 4, following the Buckeye Bowl battle in Columbus. Six veterans returned from last year's team including four seniors: Kline, Barker,

Parsons, and Norman. The first three graduated at mid-year. Jenkins was in charge of the varsity while Ellsesser handled the reserves, Coach Lorentz supervised the Tots or freshmen team, and Multer took charge of the intramural league. Portsmouth captured second place in the Southern Ohio Scholastic League. Delbert Rice, junior, was selected as All-League forward.

December 15, the Trojans opened their 1939-40 cage season by barely topping Columbus South's Bulldogs 30-29. Portsmouth was sluggish because of lack of practice and their rebounding was slow. Parsons shot a foul with a minute and 13 seconds left to play. The Trojans stalled beautifully. Albans, forward, starred for Columbus. Kline was high scorer with seven for P. H. S.

Dayton Roosevelt defeated the Trojans here, December 22, 32-30. This game was exceptionally thrilling as 2 overtimes were played before Roosevelt dumped in the winning goal. Marker, lanky 6' 3" pivot man, was the shining light for Dayton by scoring 15 points. Rice led Portsmouth scorers with 12.

Portsmouth traveled to Marietta December 27 and was set back 27-26. The game was fast and exciting from beginning to end. The scoring was almost evenly divided; Barker led with eight points.

Akron North's Vikings traveled to Portsmouth December 29 and gave the Trojans a beating, 27-19. Akron North was last year's Ohio High School champion. Akron came through mostly on foul shots by sinking 11 out of 15. Rice again led the scorers with 11 points.

Alliance High School's Aviators came to town on January 3 for the first cage contest of 1940, and were soundly whipped 34-12. This was the first athletic engagement of any kind between Portsmouth and Alliance. Barker was absent from the squad this game. Rice again led in scoring with 10 points. The reserves played most of the last quarter.

The Trojans entertained Norwood's Indians here January 5, and edged them 34-22. As usual Rice came through as high point man with 17 points.

Iron's Tigers came to town January 9 and tripped up the Trojans 33-26. This was the first win for an Ironton basketball team over one from Portsmouth since 1935. During the heated struggle Apel suffered a brain concussion as one of Ironton's men fell on his head. Parsons was removed from the game on fouls. Cales of Ironton led both teams in scoring with 12. Kline led his teammates with 7.

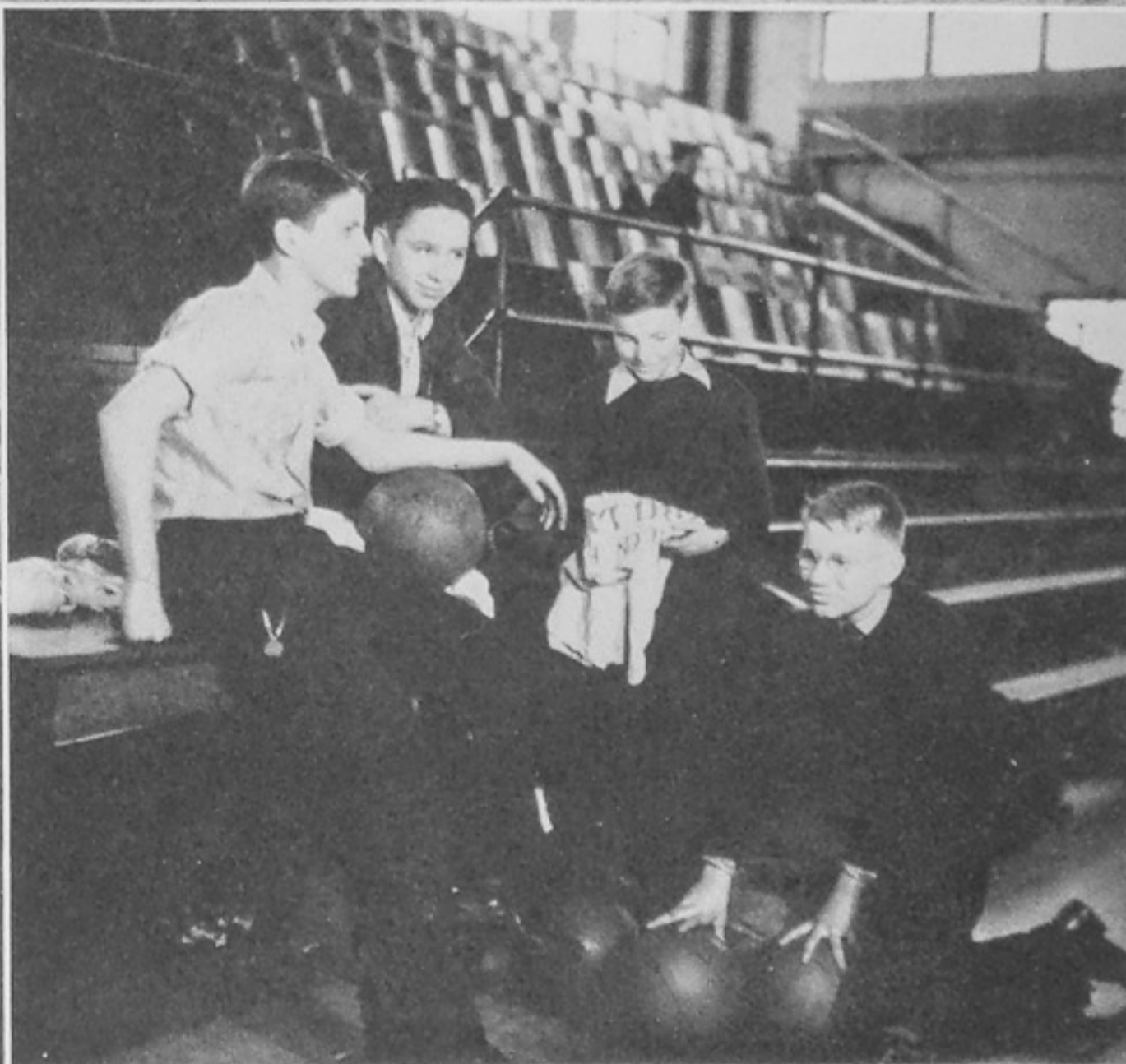
Portsmouth High School's Trojans traveled to Norwood for their next game January 12, and came out on top 34-26. This was their second win over the Indians this year. Norman and Kline battled for the right of top scorer as both scored 9 points. Barker was back with the squad for this road trip.

On the next night, January 13, Portsmouth traveled to Middletown and was defeated, 35-26. Two of the Trojans again battled for top place honors in scoring as Rice and Norman scored 6 each. Norman was the star of both the Norwood and Middletown fray with his defensive work.

Chillicothe's Cavaliers came to Portsmouth on January 17 and upset the Trojan basketeters, 37-22. Chillicothe's team was fast and strong on defense. Three Trojans

scored 4 points each, Rice, Barker, and Brady. The points were well divided among the Trojans. Kline and Norman scored three while Babcock and Parsons garnered 2 apiece.

Two nights later, on January 19, the Trojans surprised every fan in Grant Gym by thoroughly walloping the Springfield Wildcats, 49-22. Every shot counted as

every boy played like a veteran. Pass work and defensive work clicked like that of champions. This was truly an upset as Springfield was spoken of as a very strong team. Kline led the Portsmouth boys in scoring with 17. Every boy came in for his share of points.

Huntington, W. Va., was the next stop

for Coach Jenkins' boys on January 25. They won out over the Pony Express, 30-28. Echols, reserve forward, flipped in the tying basket and an overtime was required for the victory.

Up to this point in the season our neighboring Sciotoville quintet had been mowing down all opposition. They were led by "Tich" Davis, one of the leading scorers among high school basketball players in Ohio. They challenged the Portsmouth Trojans and the game was played in Grant Gym on January 27, just one day before Kline, Barker, and Parsons of Portsmouth and Davis and Carson of Sciotoville graduated. Eighteen hundred people jammed into the Union Street fieldhouse to watch the Trojans smack the Tartans, 44-18. The flashy Davis was held to 6 measly points by Kline. Rice led Portsmouth scorers with 17.

On February 2, minus the services of Barker, Kline, and Parsons our revamped Trojans started on a six-game winning spree. They defeated Dayton Roosevelt, there, 32-27. Apel returned to the squad after recovery from his head injury and led his team-mates with 10.

The next evening, February 3, in Springfield the Trojans defeated the Wildcats, 36-31. By virtue of this win the Trojans clinched second place in the Southern Ohio Scholastic League. Rice garnered 16 points to lead his mates in point-getting.

Portsmouth welcomed Huntington here February 9 and stopped the Pony Express, 41-31. Joe Babcock showed the fans his cage ability in this fray by leading his mates with 11 points.

The Trojans broke even with the Middies of Middletown by eking out a 27-25 victory here on February 16. This game was fast and evenly matched throughout the 32 minutes. Rice again led his companions with 11 points.

Ironton, Ohio, became the scene of next week's battle on February 23. This game turned out to be entirely different from the Tigers' defeat of the Trojans earlier in the season. The Trojans led all the way except once early in the game, when the score was tied. Rice again proved his worth to the team by garnering 15 points.

In their last scheduled game of the season in Chillicothe, February 27, the Trojans beat the Cavaliers, 19-14. The game was a defensive battle from start to finish. Apel injured his ankle during play. Rice again led his comrades with 6 points.

Portsmouth's next and last cage game of the season was at Athens on March 1, when they entered the Southeastern District Class A tournament. A new entry in the district this year, Lancaster, proved their downfall. The Gales were watching for Rice and held him to 2 points. Norman led his team-mates with 8 points. The final score was 33-27, in favor of Lancaster. The Trojans ended their season with a 12 won, 7 lost record, excluding the tournament game. The boys got off to a bad start but came through with a fair report.

Portsmouth High School's Reserves under Ellsesser were also entered in the Southern Ohio Scholastic Reserve League. They finished in third place during the season. All of their games were played in Grant Gym before the varsity game except games out of town with teams in their league.

Their first game was with Central Catholic's reserves. Robinson led his team to a 36-15 win by connecting for 8 points. In their first league game they were edged out in a tight defensive duel, 14-12. To enliven things the boys staged a free-for-all in the second half. Game honors were divided between Horton and Triggs, who scored 3 points each against Dayton Roosevelt's reserves.

This year's team was bolstered by the return of four veterans—Ken Brady, outfielder; R. Robinson, infielder; D. Rice, catcher; and P. Jones, southpaw twirler. P. Triggs, O. Apel, P. Dupuy, D. Gardner, B. Williams, and D. Boop also had seen a little service but were not counted on as veterans this year, even though they are valuable to the present team.

Ellsesser's nine engaged in a heavier schedule than usual this year. On Saturday, May 4, they met the Greenfield, Ohio, nine and were defeated, 2 to 1. Paul Jones pitched for the Trojans and twirled a remarkable game. He whiffed ten Greenfield batters and issued two "Annie Oakleys", or walks. The Trojans scored their only run on an error and Apel's double down the third-base line. Thus was the Trojan's first contest of the season, while Greenfield had participated in seven previous games. Coach Ellsesser revealed that the Greenfield pitcher faced by the Trojans was recently signed by the Brooklyn Dodgers, major league team.

At Labold Field on Tuesday, May 7, the Trojan baseballers clashed with the Sciotoville Tartans and whipped them, 8 to 2. Paul Triggs started this game for Ellsesser and fanned 10 while issuing only one base on balls. Apel and Rice each cracked out two hits in three tries at the plate. Rice smacked a triple to knock in two runs. The next afternoon Portsmouth's Trojans trav-

eled to Ashland, Ky., and walloped the Tomcats, 8 to 4. Paul Jones started and held the Cats to 1 hit in 5 innings and Bill Reeg limited them to 1 hit in the remaining 2 innings. Robinson led the Trojan attack with three hits in four trips to the plate. "Rich" and Goodan both slugged out round-trippers. This marked the first engagement of these teams on the square diamond.

On Saturday, April 26, the Trojan netters won one match and lost another. They beat Greenfield, 6 to 1, and lost to Washington Court House, 4 to 3. In the Washington C. H. tilt Doan and Young won singles matches, while Samson and Head captured their doubles match. Against Greenfield, Friel, Doan, Samson, Head, and Young captured singles and Friel and Doan won their doubles match.

This year's tennis team also competed against teams from Parkersburg, W. Va., Marietta, Chillicothe, Gallipolis, in the District Tournament at Athens, and in the Southern Ohio League meet here.

Ed Doan and Bill Friel reached the finals of the state tennis tournament in Columbus on May 25, winning a cup for the team, although they were defeated by Youngstown Rayen's doubles team. Samson lost in the second round of the singles tourney.

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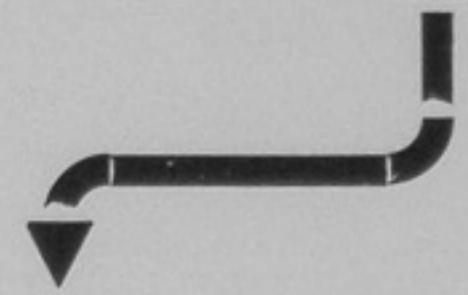
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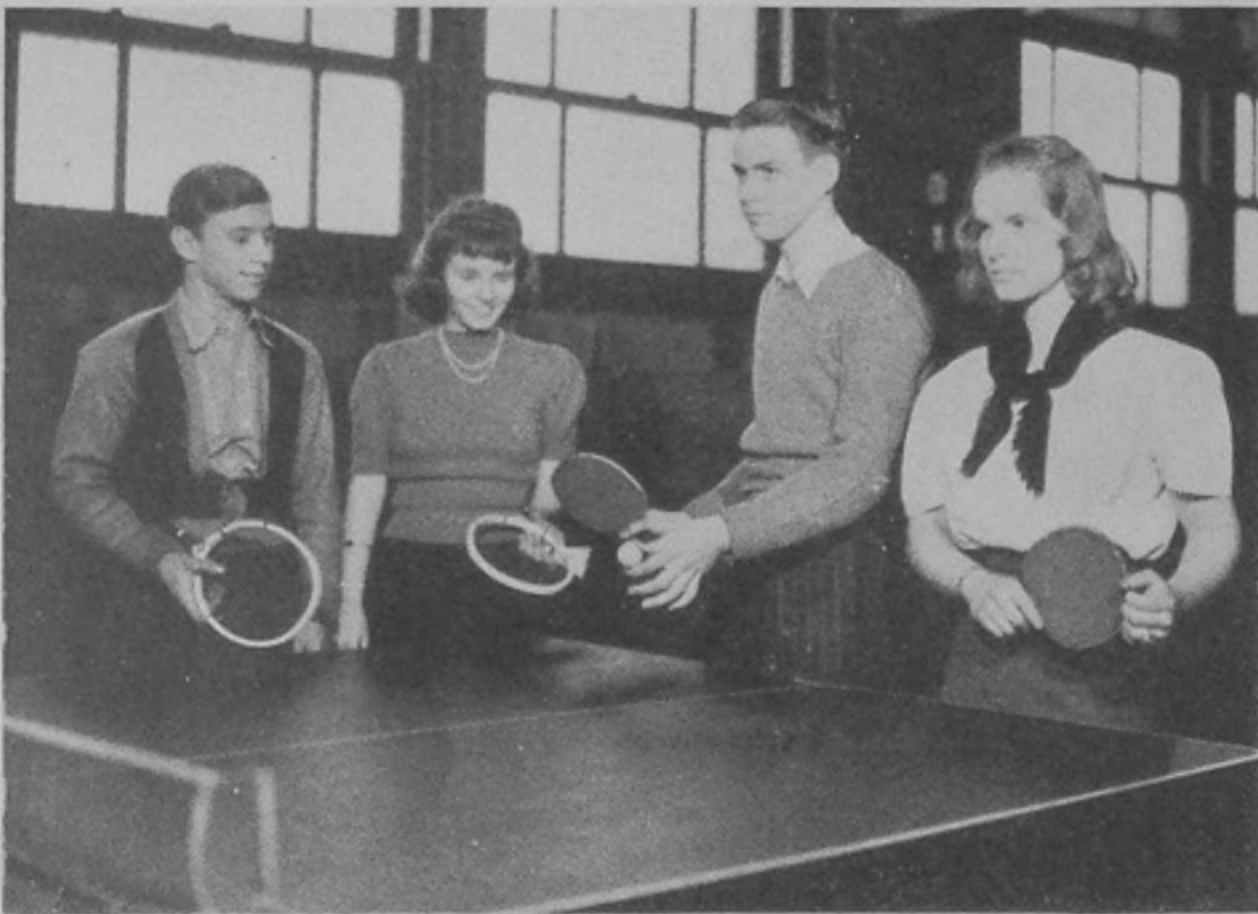
