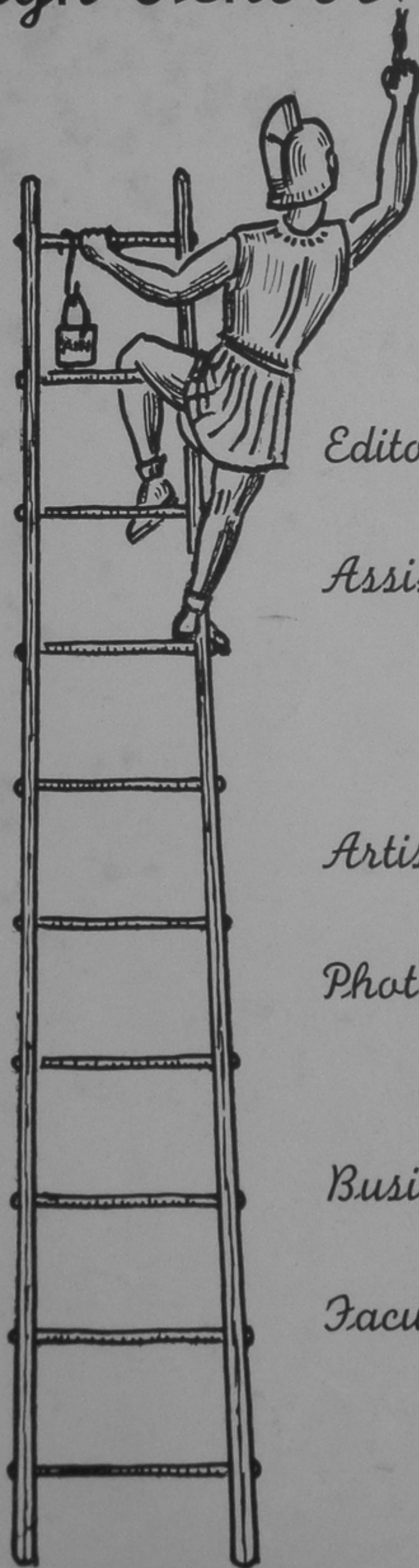

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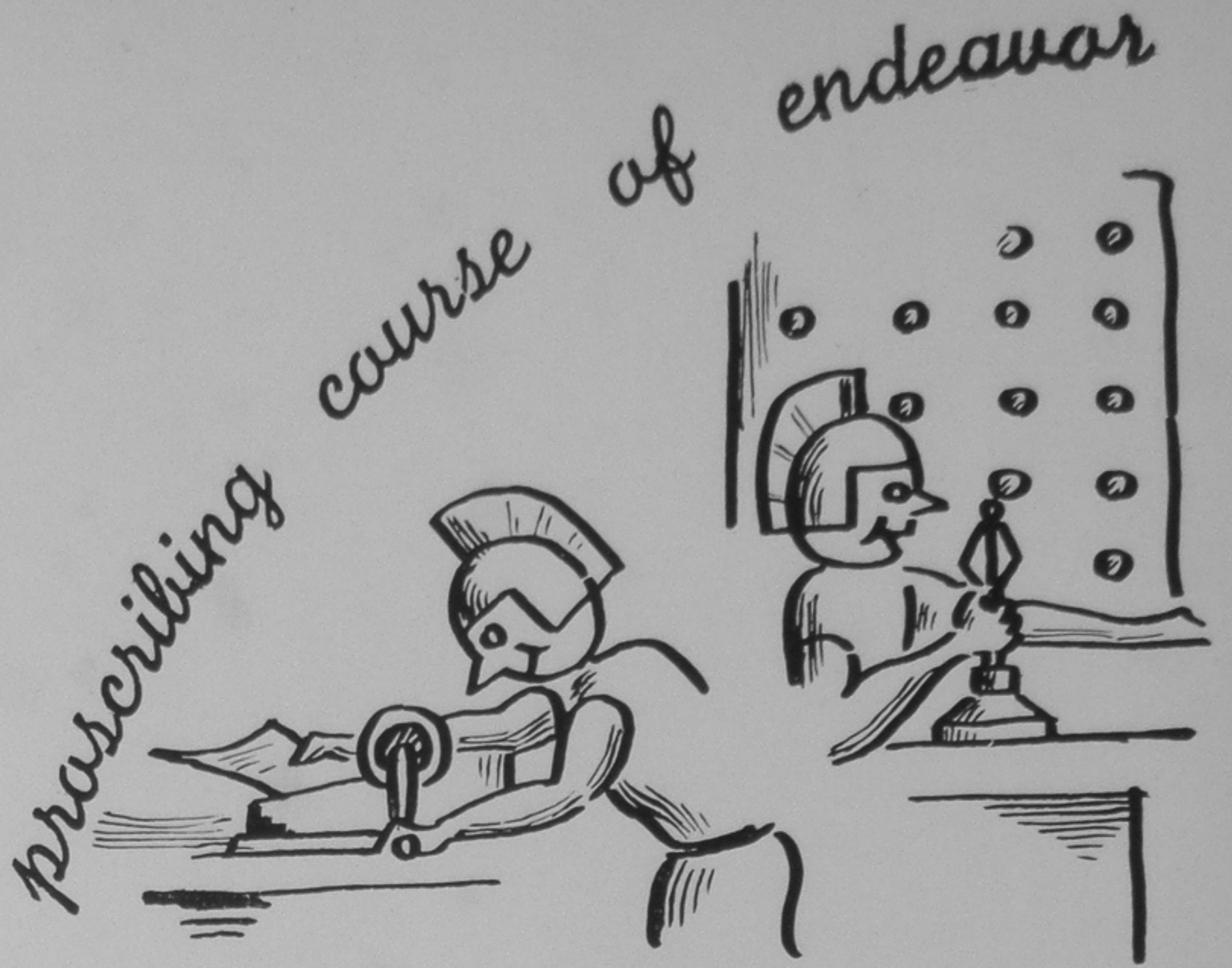

Ten years ago C. Sherman Dale accepted the position of principal at Portsmouth High School. During this time while he has been chief executive here he has done much toward making the school recognized as one of the outstanding secondary education schools in the state. Mr. Dale graduated from East Kentucky State Normal School at Richmond. Later he acquired his B. S. and M. A. degrees at the University of Illinois. Mr. W. D. Gilliland, Dean of Boys, was formerly principal of the high school. He returned last year to become the first dean of boys that the school has ever had. In this work he has been very successful. Mr. Gilliland received his B. S. degree at Ohio Wesleyan.

Dean Marion Galton came to Portsmouth High last September to take over the work of dean of girls. As advisor of Girls' League and Senior Honor Council, she has come to be well liked by every girl in school with whom she has come in contact. She graduated from the University of Michigan and received her M. A. at Columbia. She has been a member of the faculty at Battle Creek High School, and was Dean of Women at the Teachers College in Slippery Rock, Pennsylvania before she came here.

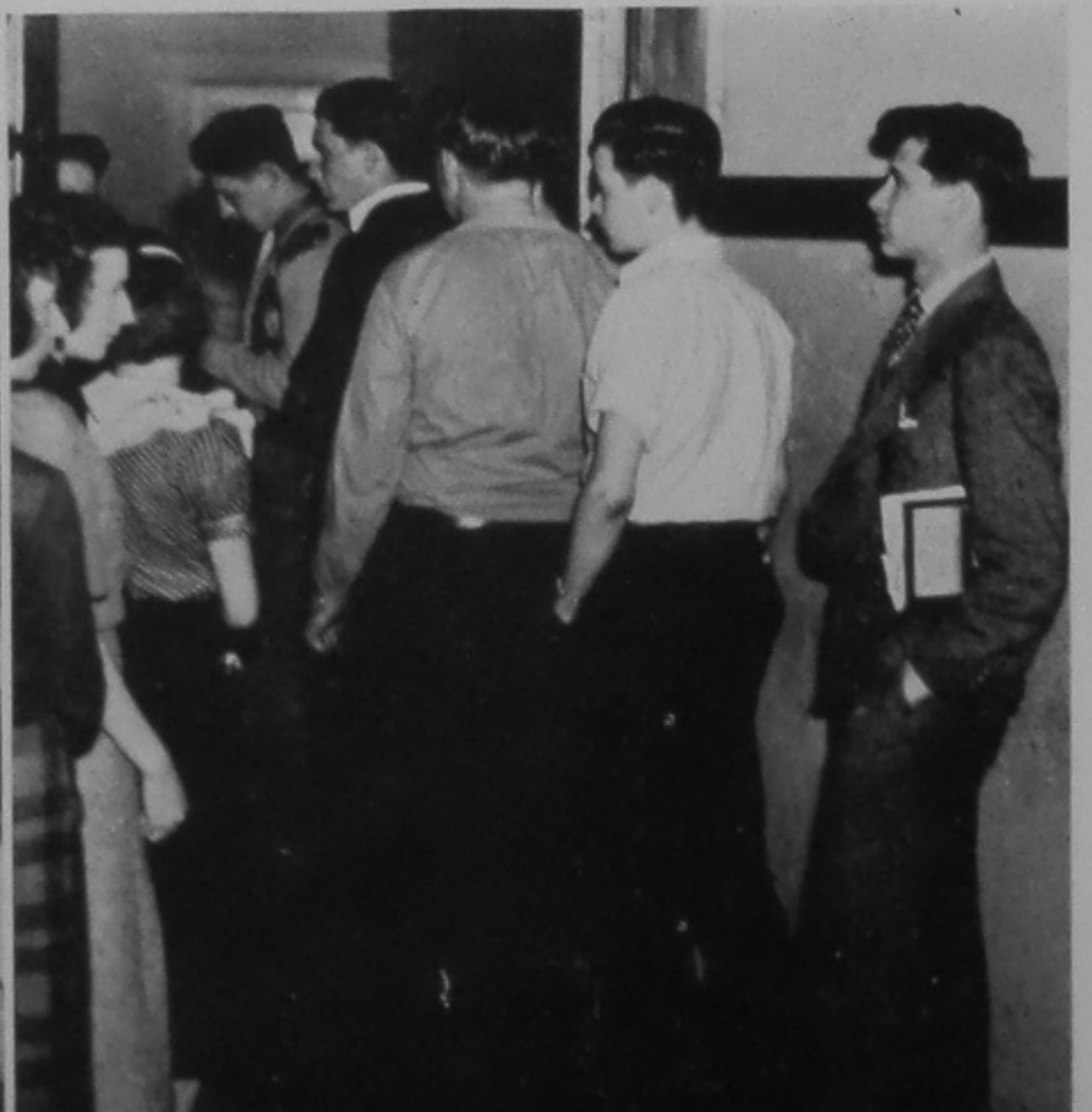


Morning, noon, and nite - five days a week -

Herein is presented a Trojan cameraman's view of a day at Portsmouth High School (see top photographer in action with emotional bystanders). Up in the foggy morn to the tinkle of the warning alarm clock, hastily performing the morning abolutions, trudging to school or thumbing the ride—then home room chatter and the last minute preparation and comparison of homework. Then the first class, (see left center for example of studious industry)—the more or less interesting lectures of the pedagogues, the terrors and joys of recitation, after these, supervised study with its accompaniment of concentration, lusty gum chewing and vacant stares.

Then the public address system hums—Assembly—come to the auditorium—a pleasant break from the monotony of study. In the third picture, Herr Schnabl seems rather amused at what's going on and Hazel Bachman, prominent scholar, is very attentive. After singing the Alma Mater song, refreshed and rejuvenated, back to the academic grind.

Noon approaches, indicated by a hollow feeling in the abdominal regions—concentration on the curricula may wane and many eyes focus on the clock—the bell rings—the short scheduled wait, a more or less decorous rush to the basement corridor, the lunch line—notice Walt Ressinger's nonchalant stance. Attentive selection of necessary proteins, vitamins for the midday provender, then at last—Food. After the lunch period, back to

afternoon classes, some rather ossified for excessive gastronomic activity, others still alert due to proper dieting.

Several short periods and again all attend the regular pulsations of the various timepieces as they move toward three—home room period—the final bell and the mass exit—(see illustration, right). Some with ponderous arm-loads of massive tomes, others with little or nothing; thus the student body wends its way home. Soon the halls are depopulated and the mice and janitors hold sway, albeit incessantly disturbed by play casts, clubs, scholarship teams, students, and last but not least, we hope, student journalists.

All engage in some form of recreation, either physical or intellectual, organized or unorganized, and characters are formed not only in class rooms, but also on the playing fields of Portsmouth, sand lots, upstairs studies and basement darkrooms and labs. Recreations vary with the seasons, for example, baseball and sockball vie with tennis in the spring before it is warm enough for aquatics (notice our depiction of this activity at Labold).

Then home to supper, the dishes, the evening paper, Lowell Thomas or Tommy Dorsey as the case may be, then homework, the bane of existence for some, for others a chance to excel, and reach the first rung of the ladder to achievement.

Social life, another important constitution of student existence—although most affairs are not seasonal, many follow the advice of Shakespeare in the spring—others spend their evenings in the popular set of calisthenic gyrations known as the "Big Apple"—still others prefer more conservative and less strenuous form of dancing (notice Betty McCauley and Charles ("Petty") Leichner trucking in approved fashion).

Then the Cameo, the Park Shoppe, or a good book, and so to bed, the end of a Trojan day.





Waxing patriotic on Constitution Day

Senior honor-functioning autonomy supported by Dean's advice

Discussions with one another and with the dean about manners, personality, character, and school problems, things which every girl should be interested in, make the meetings of the Senior Honor Council especially congenial. Every other Monday this group of fourteen or fifteen seniors and one junior, known as the "link girl" because

she makes a connection between one year's council and the next, get together at the home of one of the members. In the course of the evening's discussion, they report on the progress they have or haven't made with the group of freshmen girls which each Council member has assigned to her, and Dean Galton usually suggests some other



subject which they can talk over with these younger girls. In addition to trying to give the freshmen worthwhile notions and ideas, the Council has had a get-acquainted party which was remembered more for candied apples than anything else, a Christmas party with a Christmas tree and stockings, but no Santa Claus, an Easter celebration with eggs from Pitts' instead of the usual source, and a treasure hunt which ended with a weiner roast on reservoir hill.

In making these parties really enjoyable, the Senior Honor Council cooperated with the Girls' League of which it is a part. The League is the

largest organization in the school, for every girl, whether she wants to or not, automatically becomes a member of this group which has as its ideal and purpose, "To develop better cooperation among the girls of high school and a better personality for each girl." The first step toward carrying out this aim was the big and little sister movement last September. Each freshman girl had some junior or senior to answer all the questions and show her around the school until she became accustomed to the curriculum, a task that didn't take very long. For the mid-year freshmen the League along with Senior Honor planned an orientation day, when the newcomers were

shown the places in school, like the office and lunch room, with which they could soon grow familiar. Knowing that all girls are interested in how to dress and how to act, Dean Galton at special Girls' League assemblies, gave some very good pointers on make-up, school clothes, chewing gum, posture, finger nail polish, and table manners. The business of the League was managed by the Girls' League Cabinet, which the officers and the chairmen of various committees of the organization composed. They decided when to have get-togethers, what to serve, what programs to have for entertainment, and how to make and use money. The League alloted some

cash to Dean Galton to spend as she saw fit for persons in school who needed clothing.

The Dean chose six girls from the junior and senior classes to be her office assistants. Miss Galton herself remarked that she was very particular in her choice, for the girls had to meet certain requirements. The girls she selected have the gift of being able conveniently to forget office confidences; they made persons, strangers especially, who came to see the dean feel at ease. They are reliable and dependable in doing anything from answering the telephone to running errands, or making schedules.

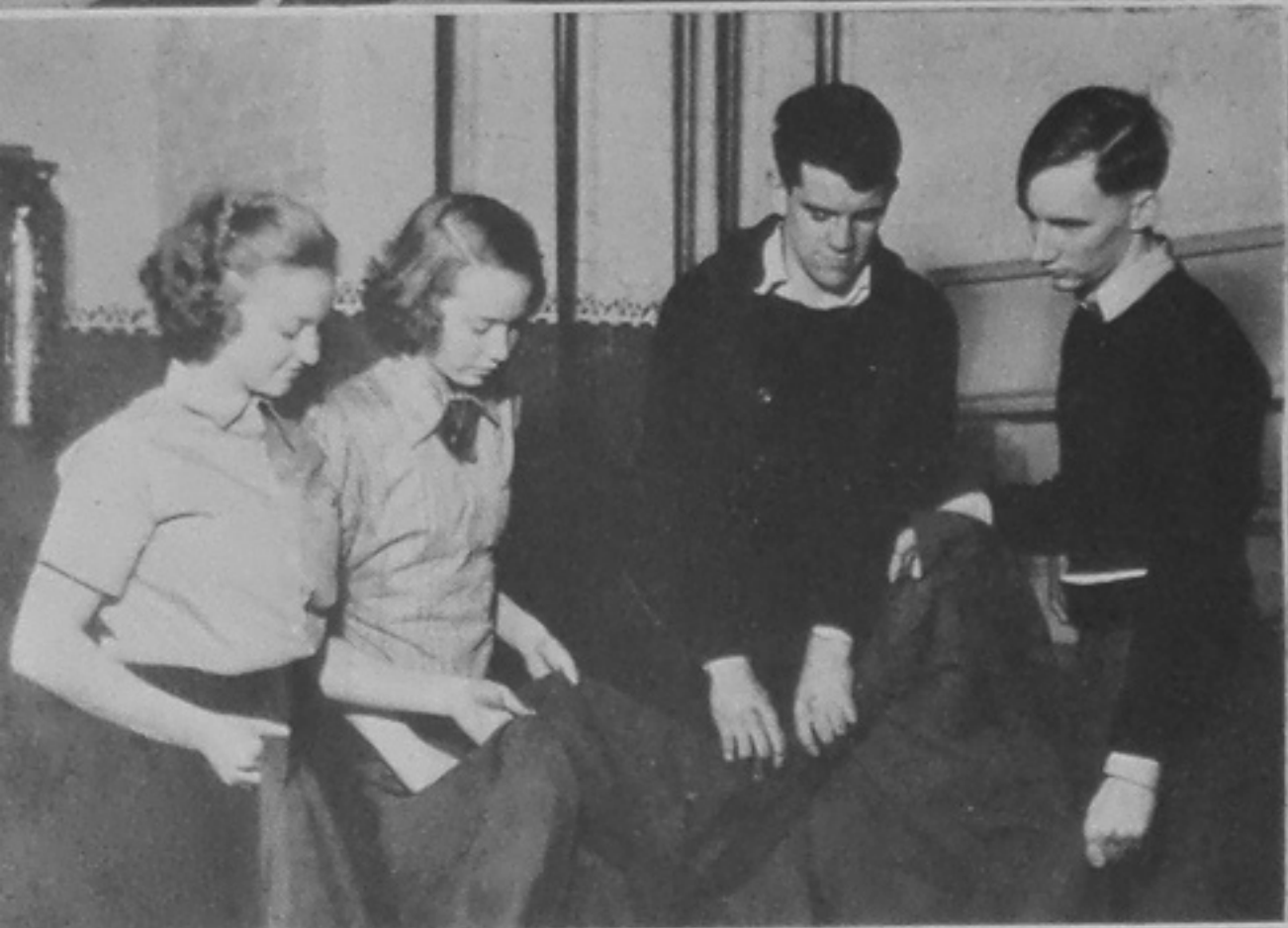

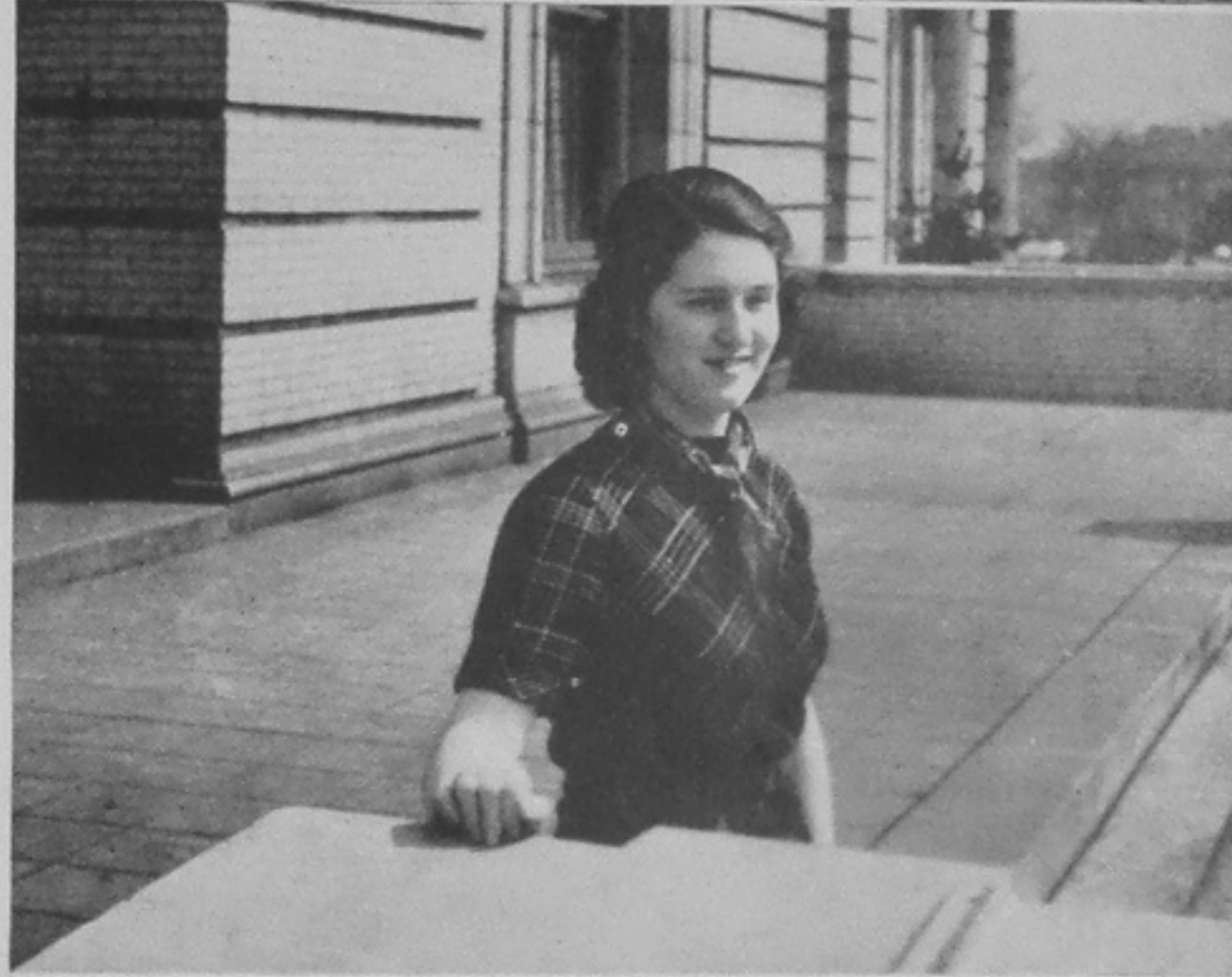
panoramic view of junior life

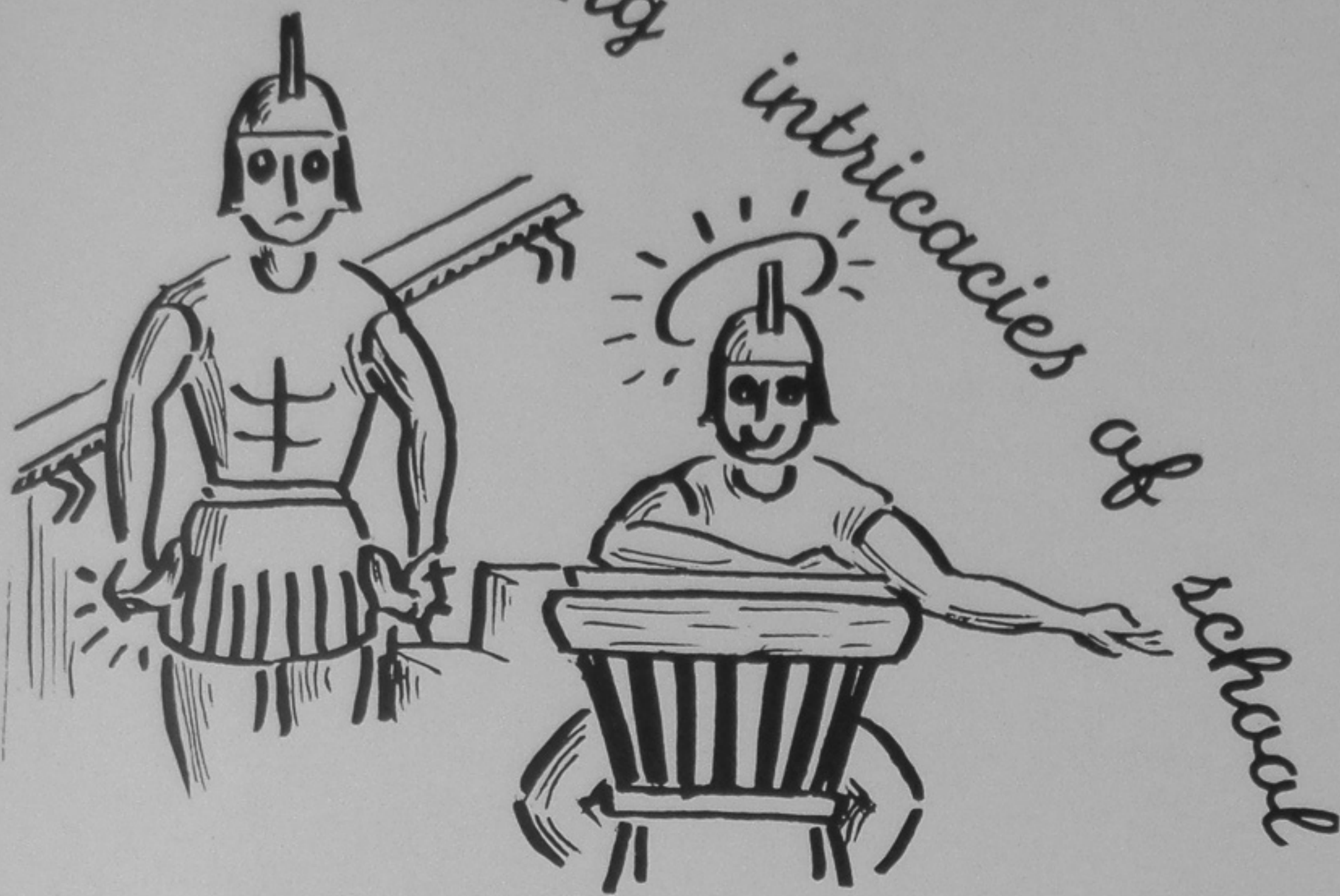

These cameramen, as well as the other members of the staff, are selected by Miss Katharine Kauffman, the supervisor of the TROJAN. Throughout the year the staff has been alert for "newsy" and "photographable" events and under the direction of Miss Kauffman, have tried to make the 1938 TROJAN an outstanding publication. Adding color to the issues were the special editions in honor of holidays: red and green for Christmas and orange for Hallowe'en. Two new interesting features of the paper this year were

the "news test," and the "guess what" contest, consisting of a picture to be identified. The ever popular "Who's Who" and the Student Forum were carried on in traditional style.

In the largest school division, the Echo received second class rating from the N. S. P. A., and third rating from the C. S. P. A. Miss Anderson is a member of the Board of Directors of the Journalism Association of Ohio Schools, whose convention in Columbus in the fall of 1937 was attended by many of the Echo Staff.

At this time Margaret Ida Gardner, last year's feature editor, was awarded the second place cup for a feature article written after an interview with "Dizzy" Dean. A smaller number also attended the district journalism convention held for the first time in Athens in April.

During the summer of 1937, 220 study hall was cleared of desks and chairs and refitted for use as a library. When the problem of converting a study hall into a library was undertaken, Mr. Dale sent a layout plan of the room and its dimensions to various library schools for assistance. Graduate students at one of the universities made it a classroom project for the summer, and each student prepared an elaborate and detailed sketch of the proposed library, incorporating all the new ideas for modern school libraries. Portsmouth High School library is now considered one of the best equipped in the state for a school of an enrollment of more than sixteen hundred.



The large room is well-lighted, and Venetian blinds have been placed at the windows. There are tables and chairs of oak finish to accommodate a capacity of two hundred students, whereas the old library could seat only forty students at a time. Steel book shelving also has been finished to match the other furnishings, which include a charging desk, book racks, magazine stands, card index cases, and a library chart. Recreational reading was encouraged this year, and the library includes on its shelves the latest works of selected fiction, besides current newspapers and magazines on world affairs.

Miss Gladys Nichols, the full time librarian, is assisted by an English teacher during each period of the school day. Six student assistants also are in the library at various times. An "open-door" policy was maintained this year. Students

could go to the library during any free period of the day without first obtaining permission.

At the beginning of the school term, the English teachers took their classes into the library where they were instructed in the mechanics of the Dewey decimal system, which characterizes the type and section classifications of the books.

Miss Nichols received her A. B. degree at Otterbein College, and her B. S. degree in Library Science at the University of Illinois. She also attended one summer session of the University of Cincinnati. Her previous work and experience was obtained in the library of the National Bank of Commerce in New York City, the North Carolina College for Women, Greensboro, North Carolina; and the library of Mansfield Senior High School. This is Miss Nichols third year in Portsmouth High School.

English is farther-reaching than any other subject, for everyone speaks, writes, reads, or listens. The principles of grammar are taught to improve both written and oral speech. The teachers strive to give the pupils a better appreciation of literature by the study of good stories, poems, and plays. The first two years give a general view of literature, while the last two are spent in the study of American and English literature. In the course three Shakespearean plays are read, discussed, and partially drama-

Preceptors - indoctrinating

tized. Through the new motion picture projection machine, this idea is furthered by the showing of pictures appropriate to the subject. During the study of versification the students even try their skill at writing jingles. In speech, which is part of the English course, the pupils learn to read aloud effectively, to recite selections, and to bring out the intellectual and emotional meanings. They also learn to make speeches fitting to all occasions. Those who wish to take further work may enter the debate and dramatics classes. This gives them the opportunity to get experience on the debate team and in one-act plays in assembly. Miss Dorothy Shultz obtained her B. A. degree at Ohio Wesleyan and also attended Ohio State University and the University of Michigan. She teaches public speaking, interpretive reading, and dramatics, and coaches debate and class plays. The "Revelers Club" moves forward under her sponsorship.

A new feature that has been added to the English department is remedial English for those students who have difficulty with English. Miss Ruth Gorsuch (pictured in the Mathematics section) has charge of these classes. She tries to give the pupils a different slant on English so that they can return after one or two semesters to their regular classes. Instead of textbooks they use workbooks and newspapers. Correct oral and written speech are emphasized by the memorizing of poems and the writing of news reviews, and to keep up with the times they have discussions of world events.

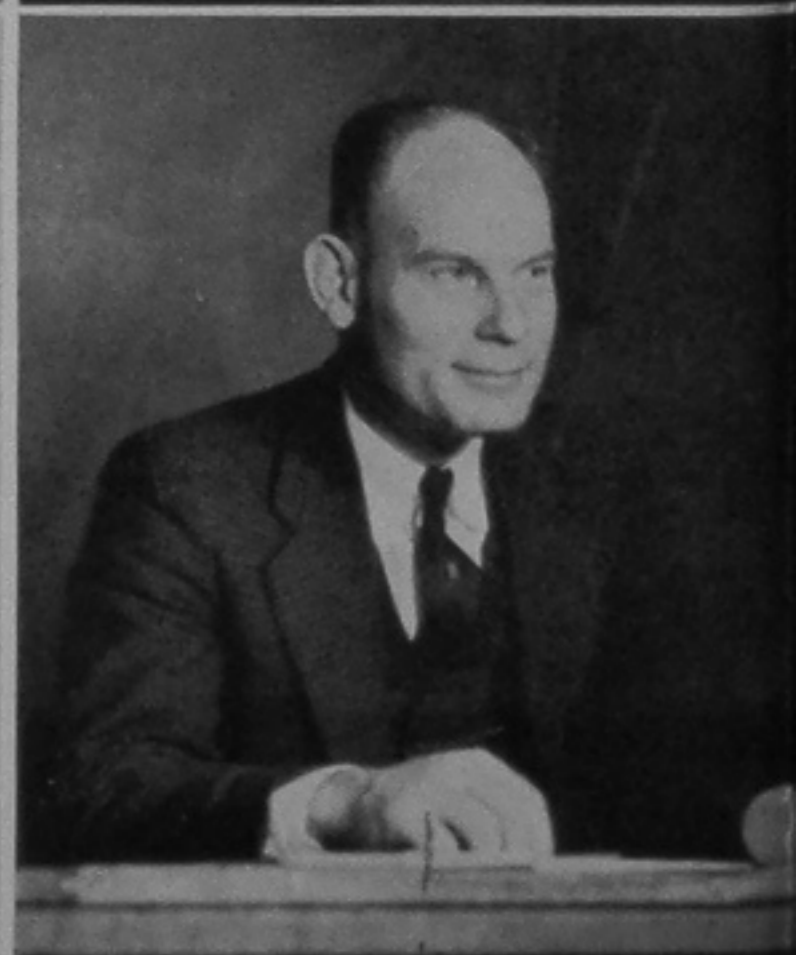
Industrial Arts - a group proficient in hand, mechanical arts

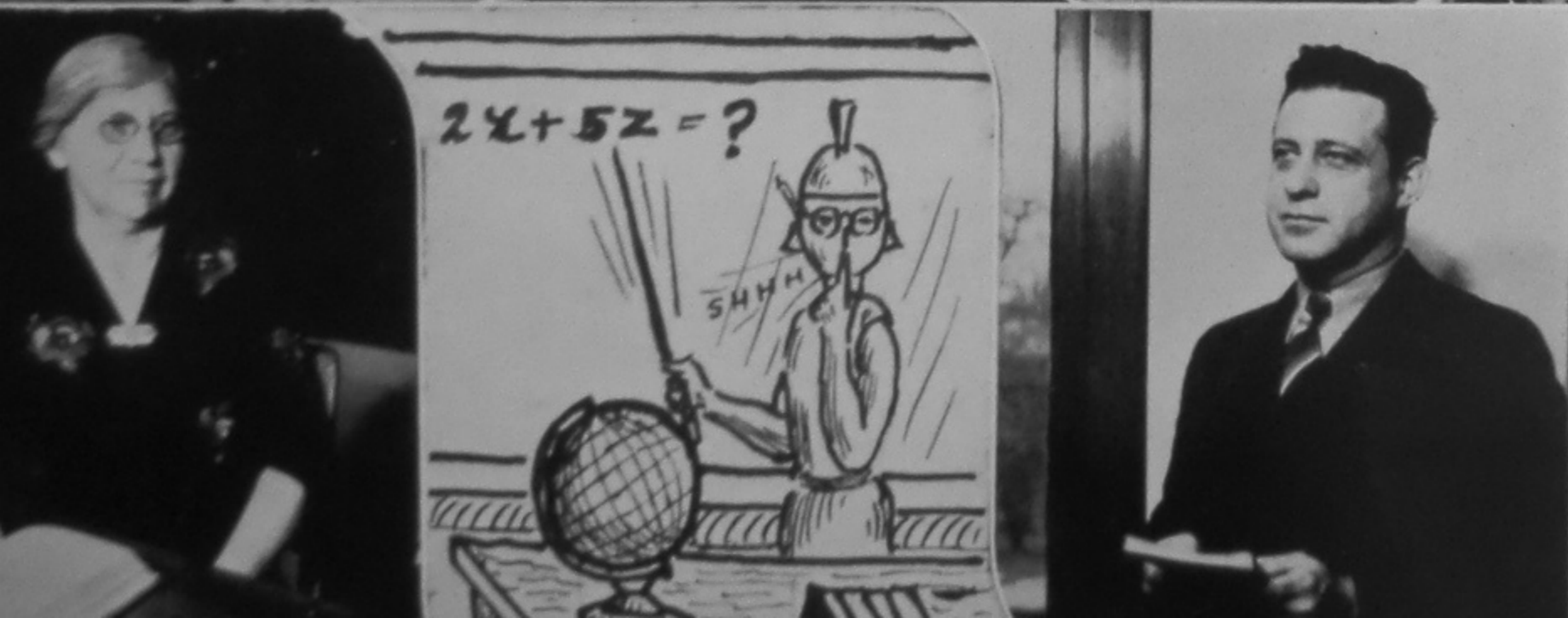

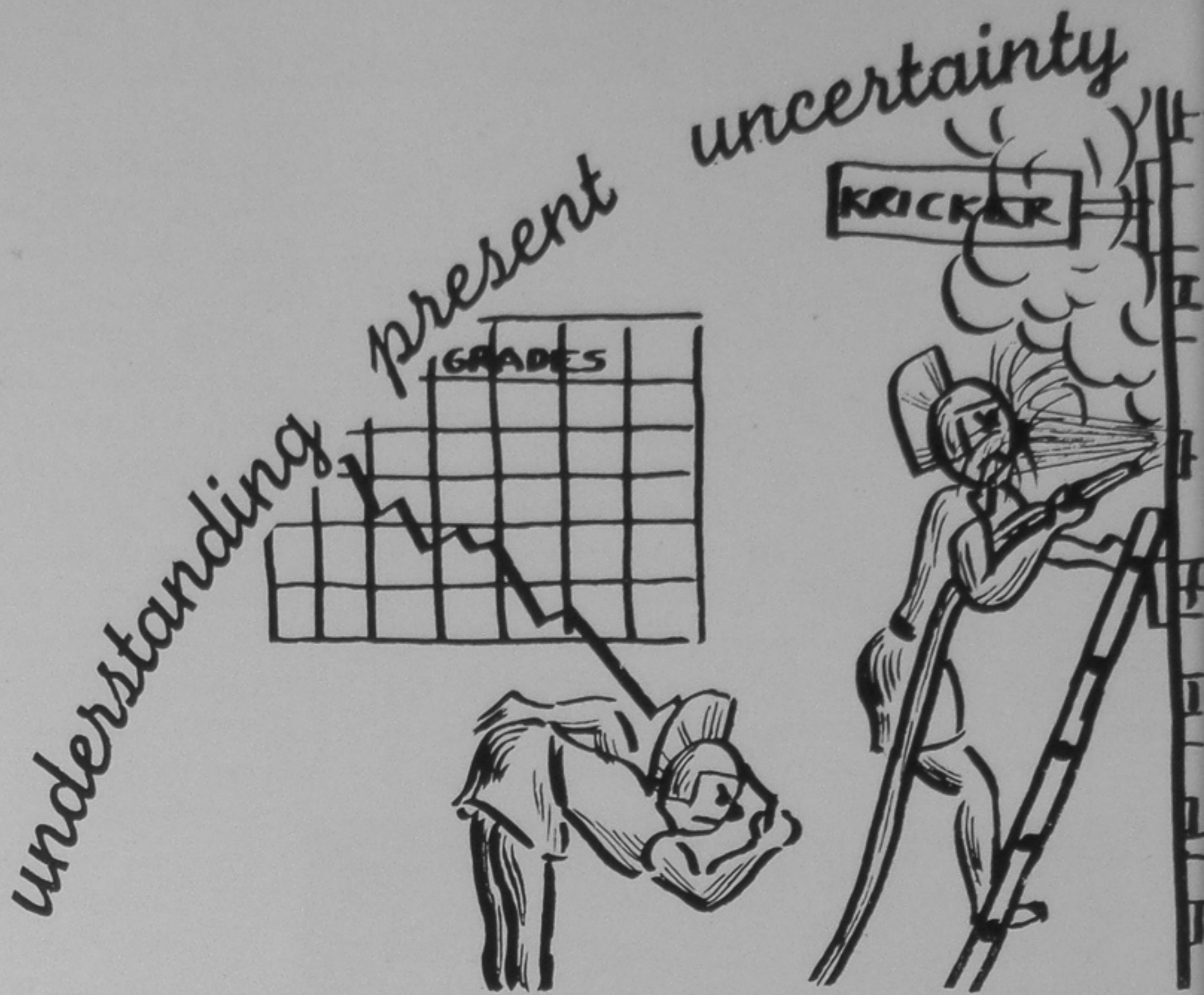

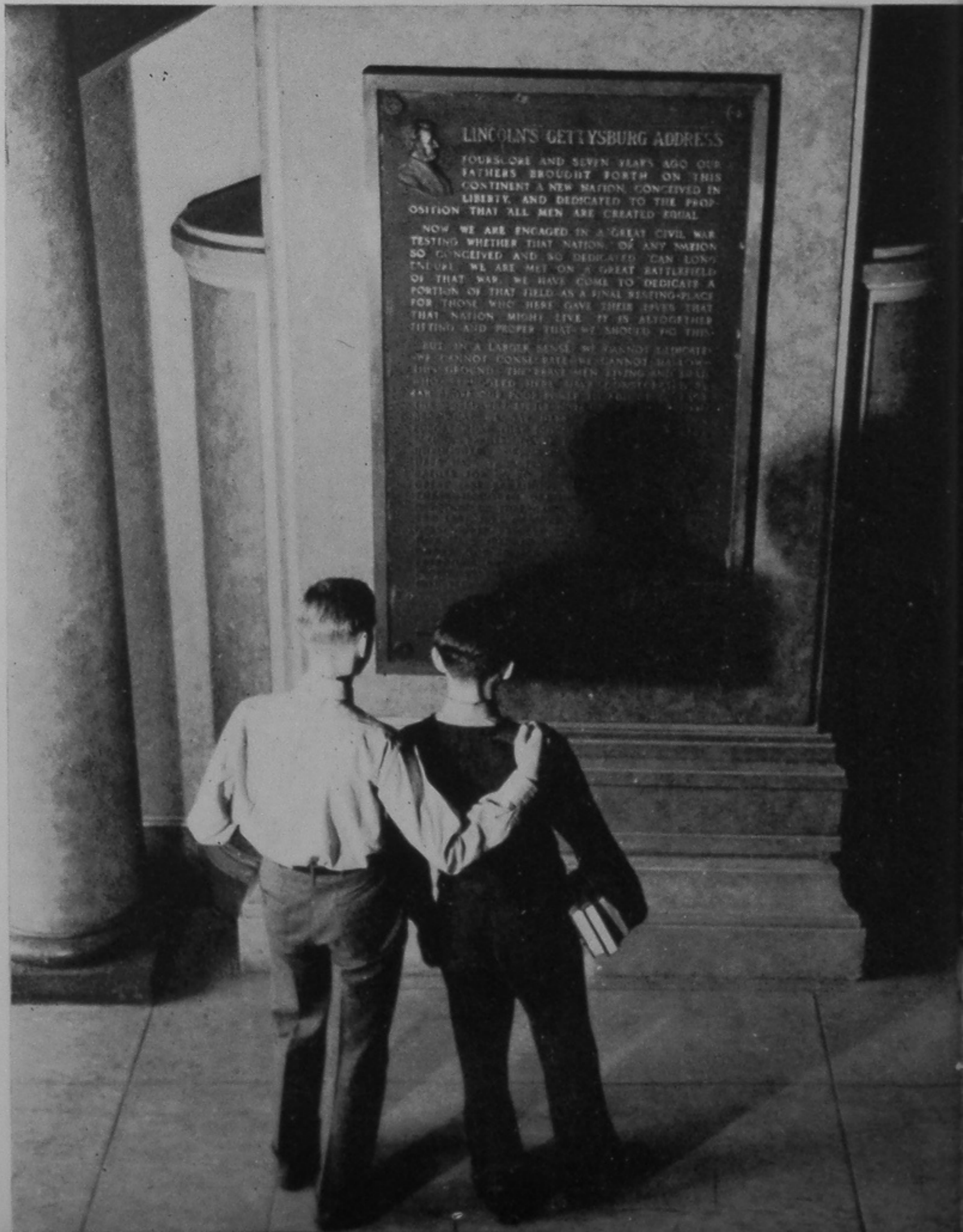

ducted, ended the program of the Y-Hi for their third successful year.

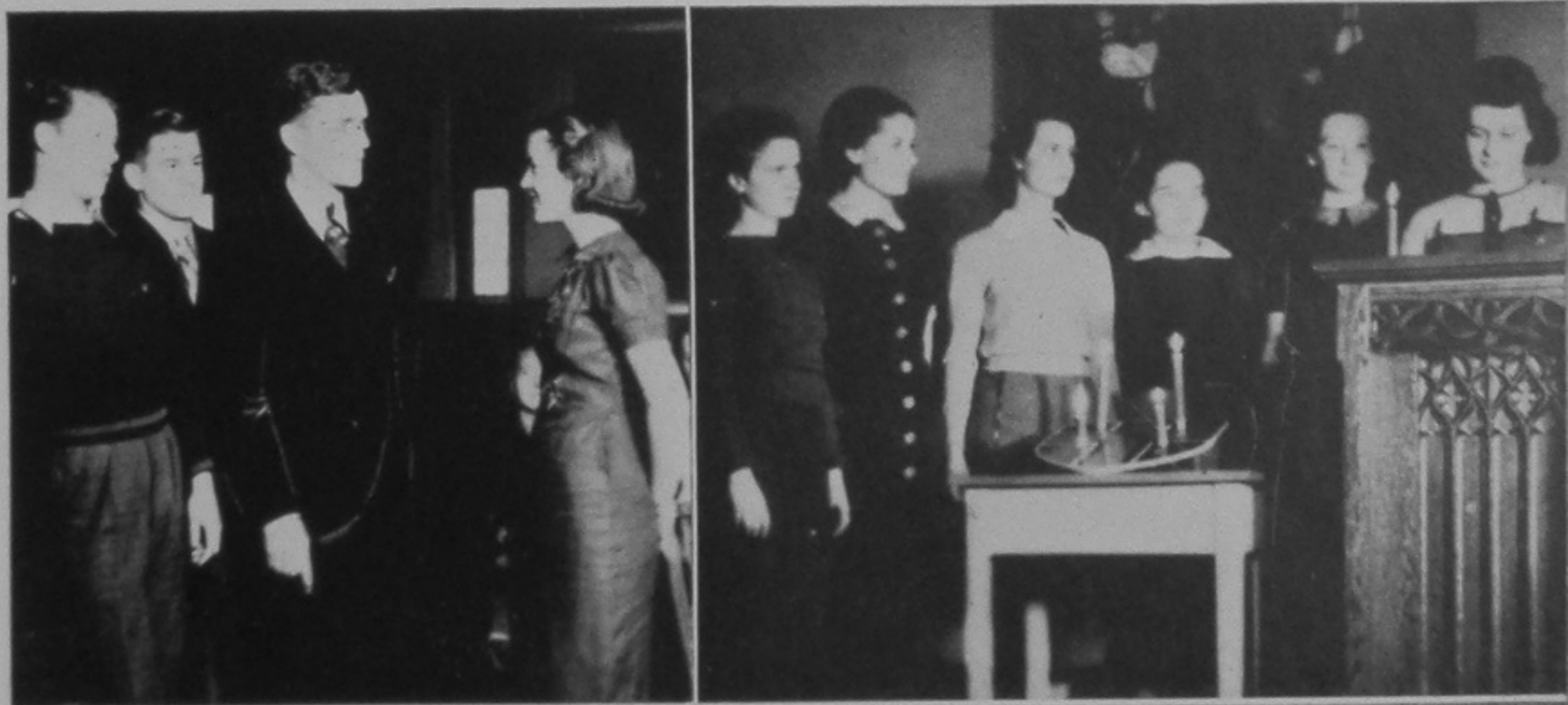

Pedagogic scientists - including natural sciences, finite facts

In the science department of the high school students first make practical application of the facts they have learned concerning their every day environment. General science, which is required of freshman students, is a subject which teaches the fundamentals of the science course. On this are based all the other scientific studies which follow in later years. General science students study the principles of the simple machines, collect butterflies, leaves, and bugs, and learn something of the various inventions which have proved most important to industrial science. The advanced subjects follow. Biology is a study of the life of plants and animals and involves many interesting experiments. Physics deals with sound,

heat, light, electricity, and machines. Students become adroit in experimentation and in calculating weight, density, and power. An especially detailed study is made of the facts concerning heat and light. Chemistry, which is taken in the senior year, includes a great many interesting experiments. The most important of the elements are studied and worked out with great care. This is followed by laboratory work on these elements and other compounds. By this means the students are able to observe for themselves and to reach practical and intelligent conclusion.

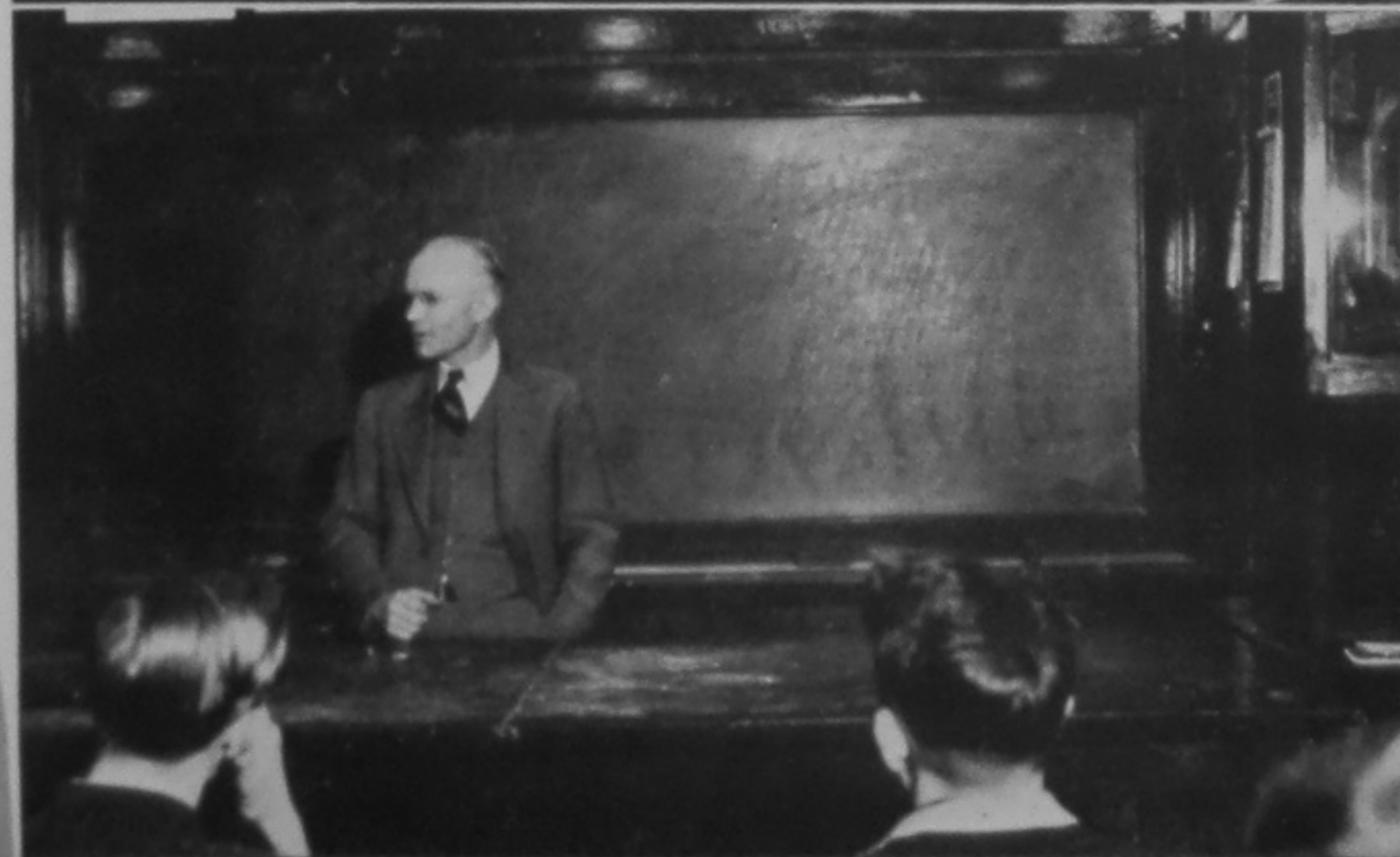

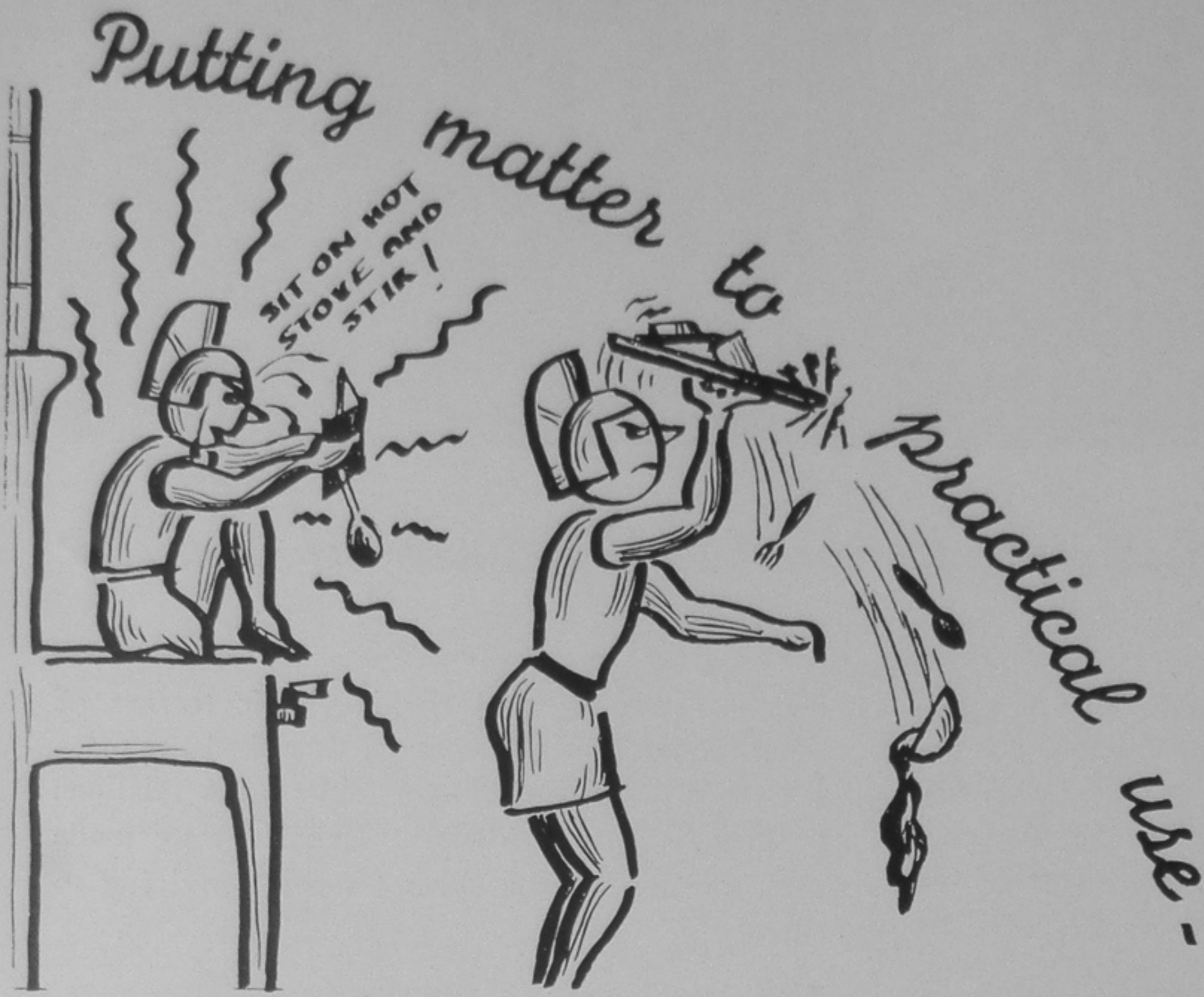

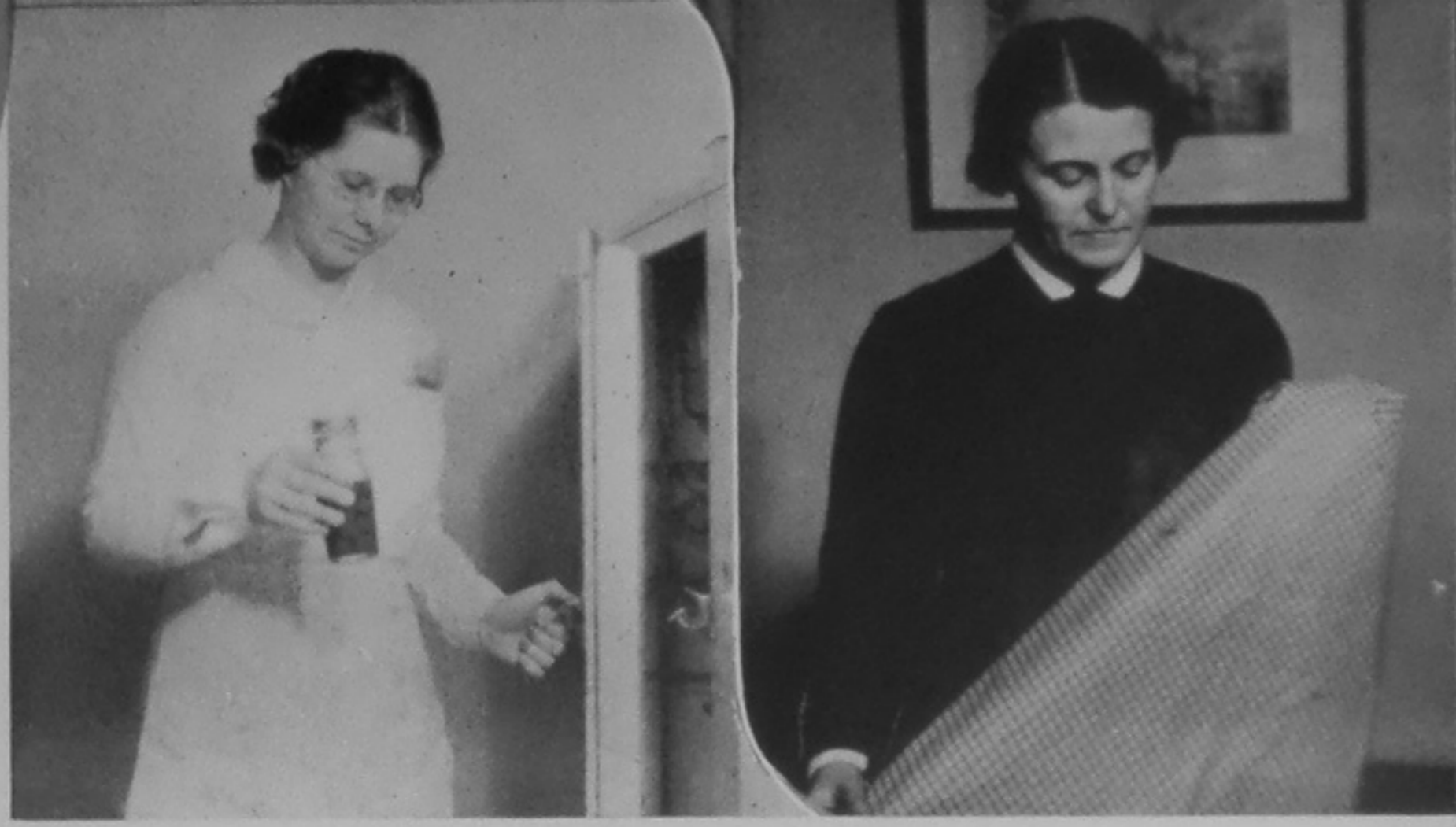

Culinary teachers - eager learners

The course in high school which does most to teach girls competency in meeting any domestic situation is Home Economics. While learning to become good cooks, neat seamstresses, and efficient home managers, the girls are taught all the secrets of balancing menus, being nimble with needles and budgeting incomes. In their cooking classes they learn to count calories, to use labor-saving kitchen devices, to become intimately acquainted with the value of vitamins, and most important, of course, to serve meals so attractively that they make one's mouth water to look at them.

How to be a smart dresser with only a small sum to spend for clothing is only one of the problems which the clothing division of the domestic science department tries to solve. Studying color combinations and styles proved most interesting, especially when the girls, with the aid of their teachers, decided just which colors and styles were most becoming to them individually. Some of the outfits which were completed in class were shown in a style show as ample evidence of the worthwhile instruction which the girls had learned to put to actual use.

Miss Dorothy Waller, who acquired her B. S. degree at Ohio State and attended Miami University, teaches foods and is advisor of the Betty Lamp Club. 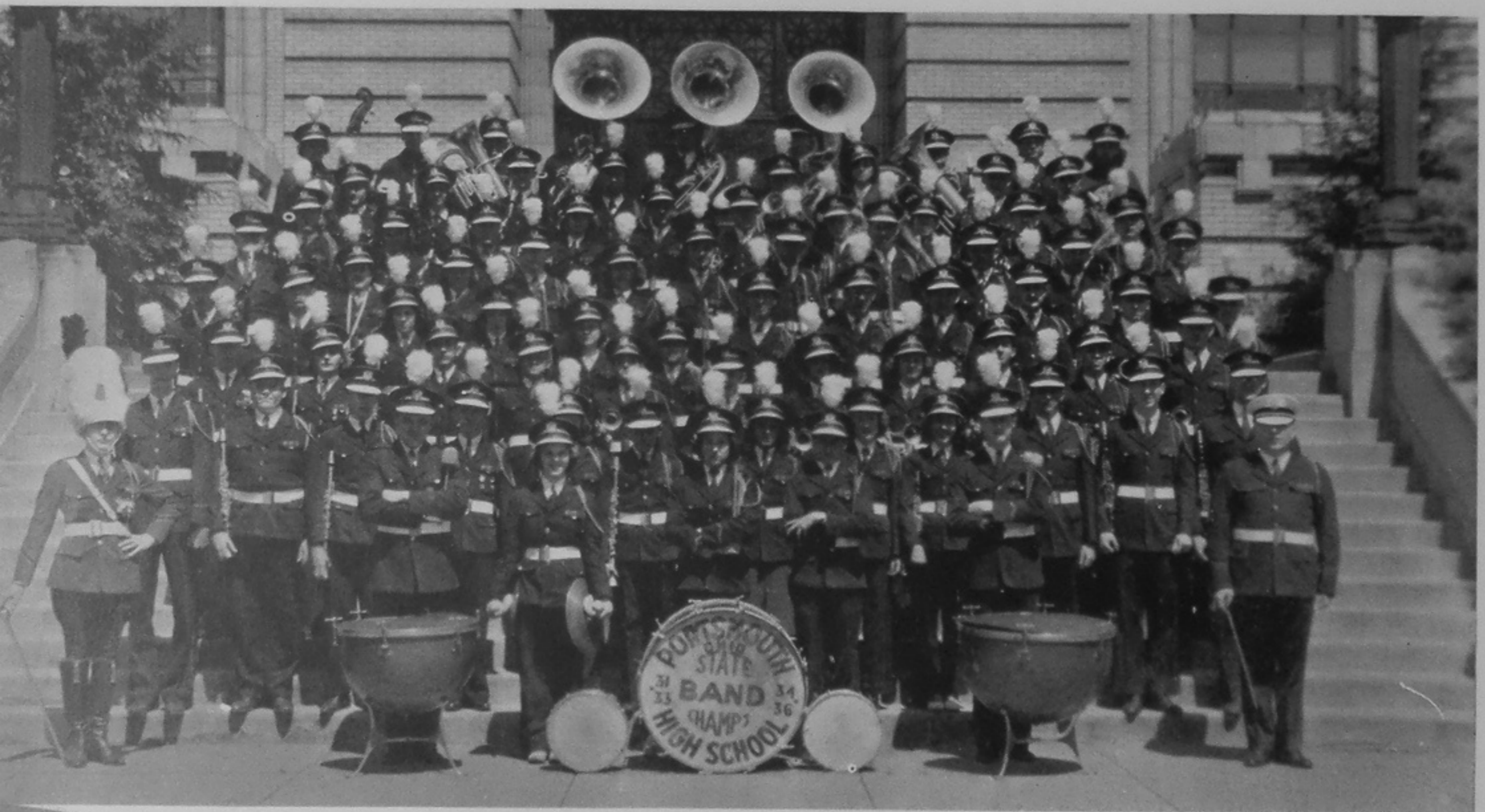

One of the largest aggregations of prospective football stars in the history of the school responded to the call of Head Coach Paul Jenkins as he began his second season as mentor of the Portsmouth Trojans. Line Coach Charles Ramey was the new addition to the staff of coaches. Willard Elsassor also began his second year at P. H. S. as assistant coach.

Throughout the season, the Trojans defeated their various opponents eight times, were defeated once at the hands of Huntington, and tied Middletown. Portsmouth lost no games to teams in the state of Ohio. This fact gave them the right to claim the mythical state championship along with other undefeated teams throughout the state.

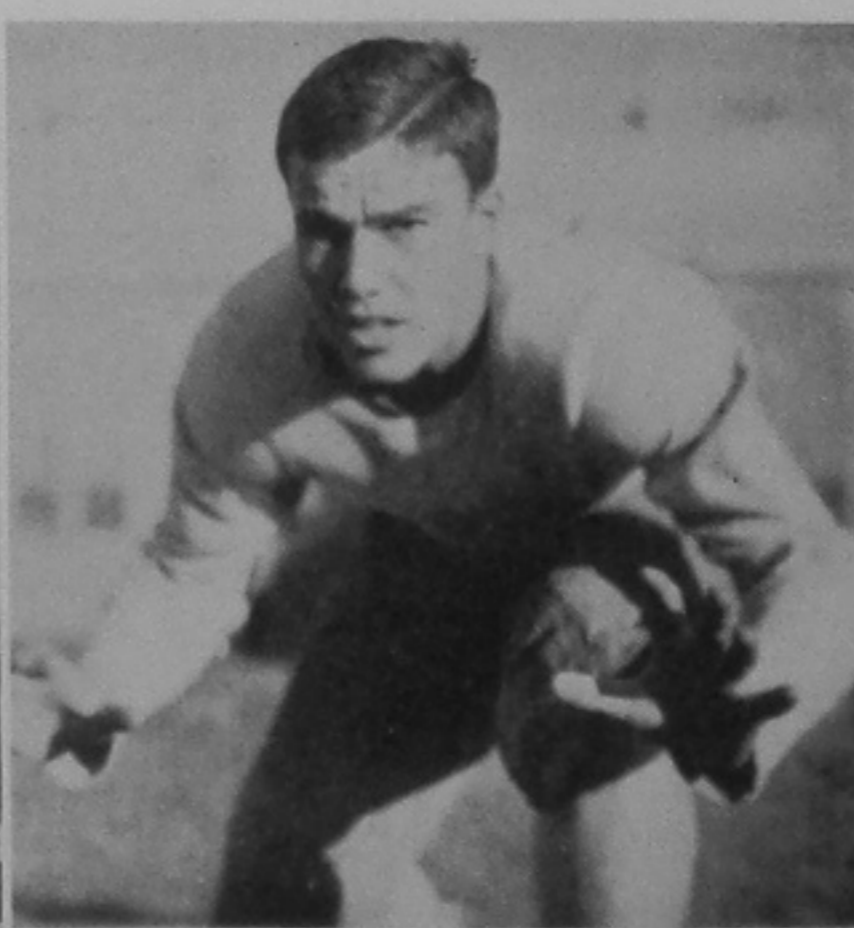

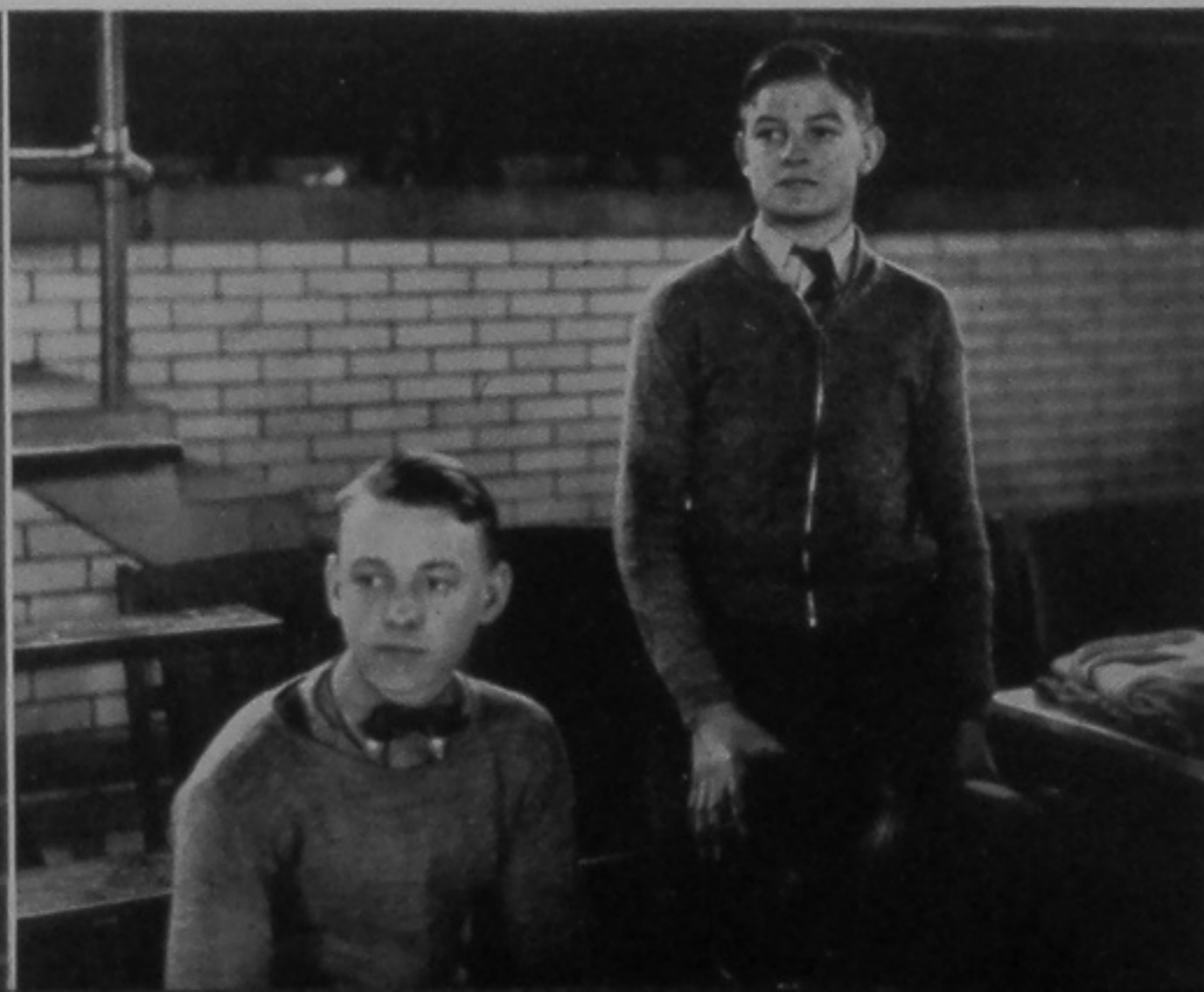

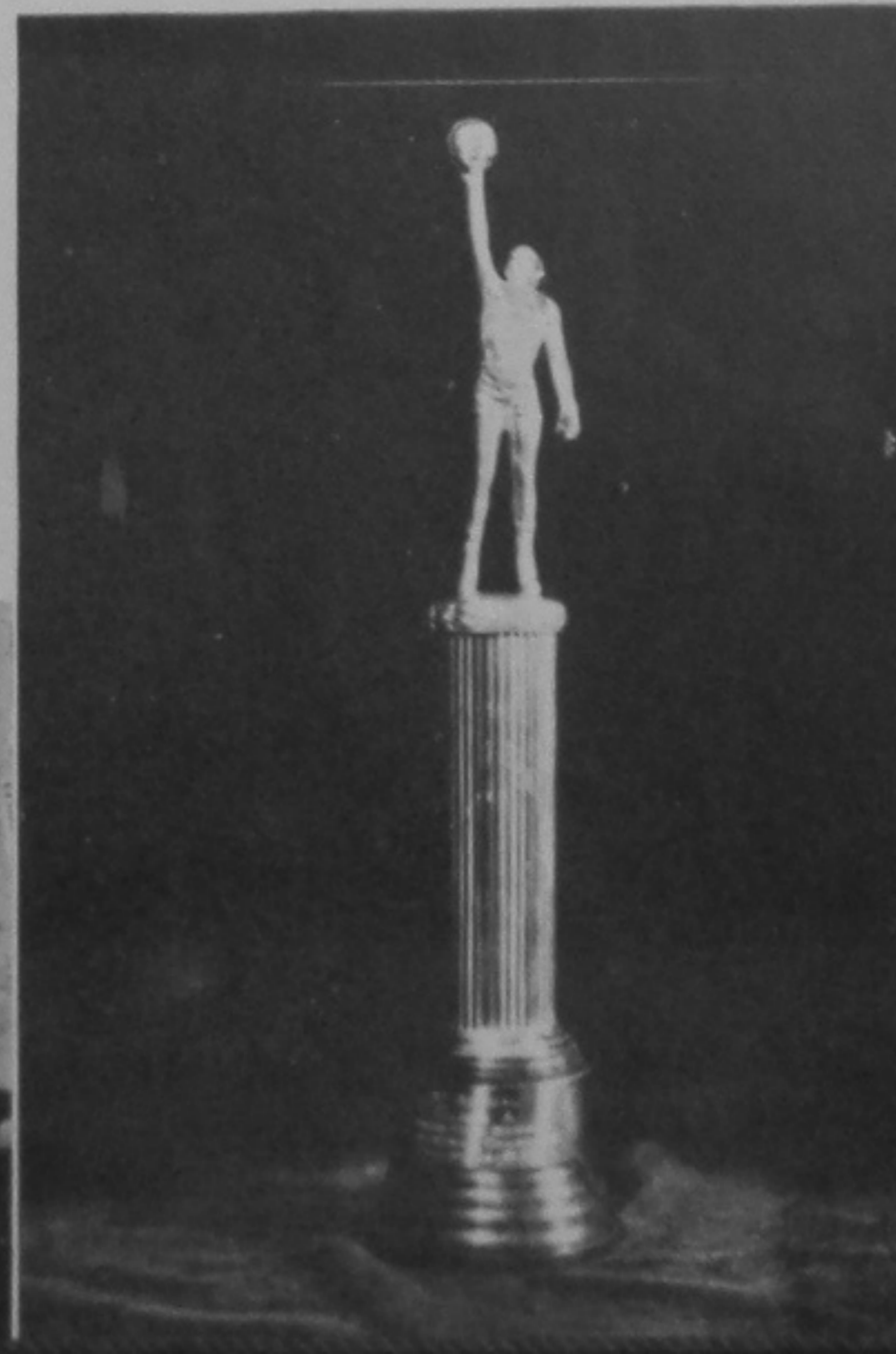
Fresh - well on their way to achieve basketball proficiency

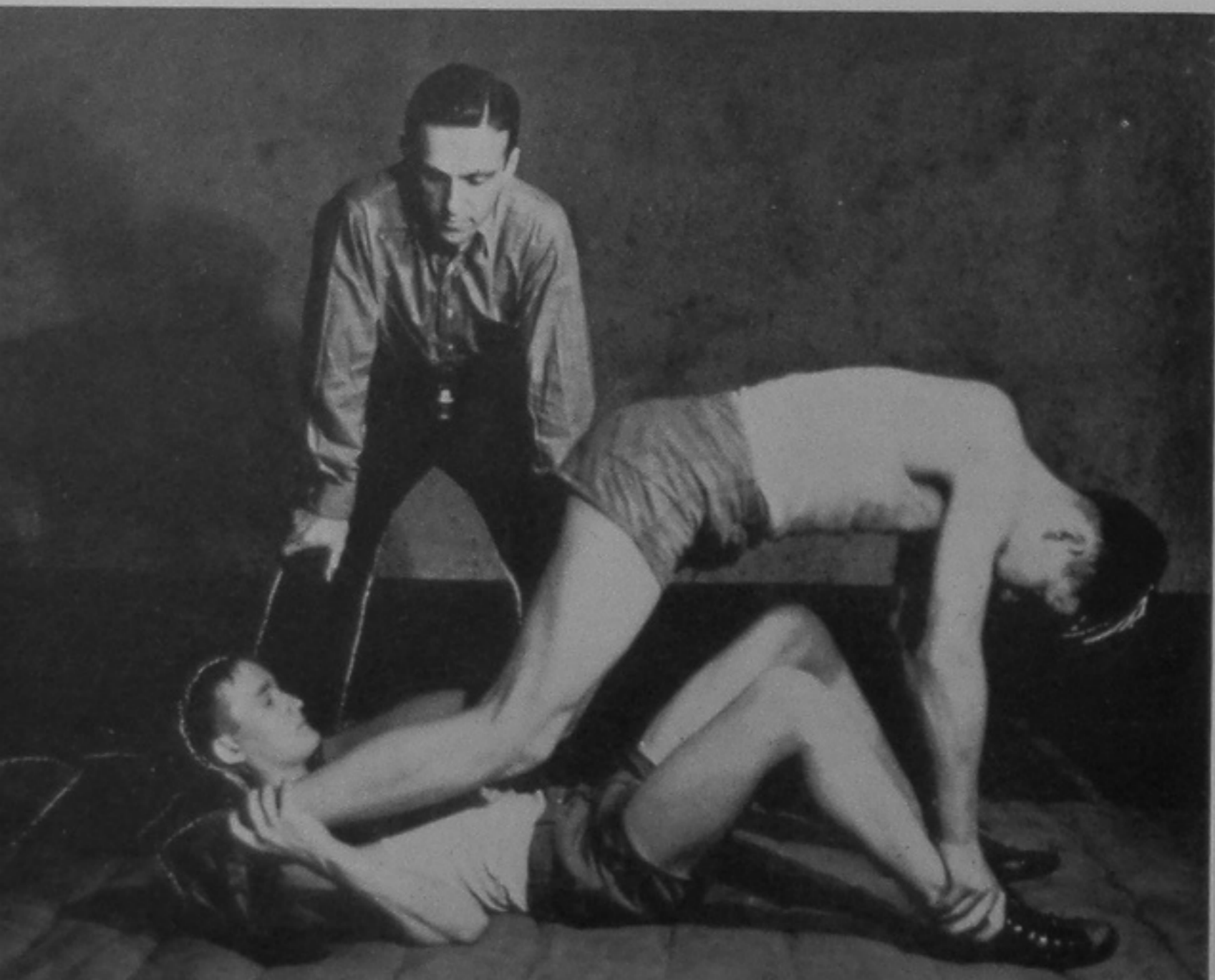


Intramural basketball league - comparatively new institution,

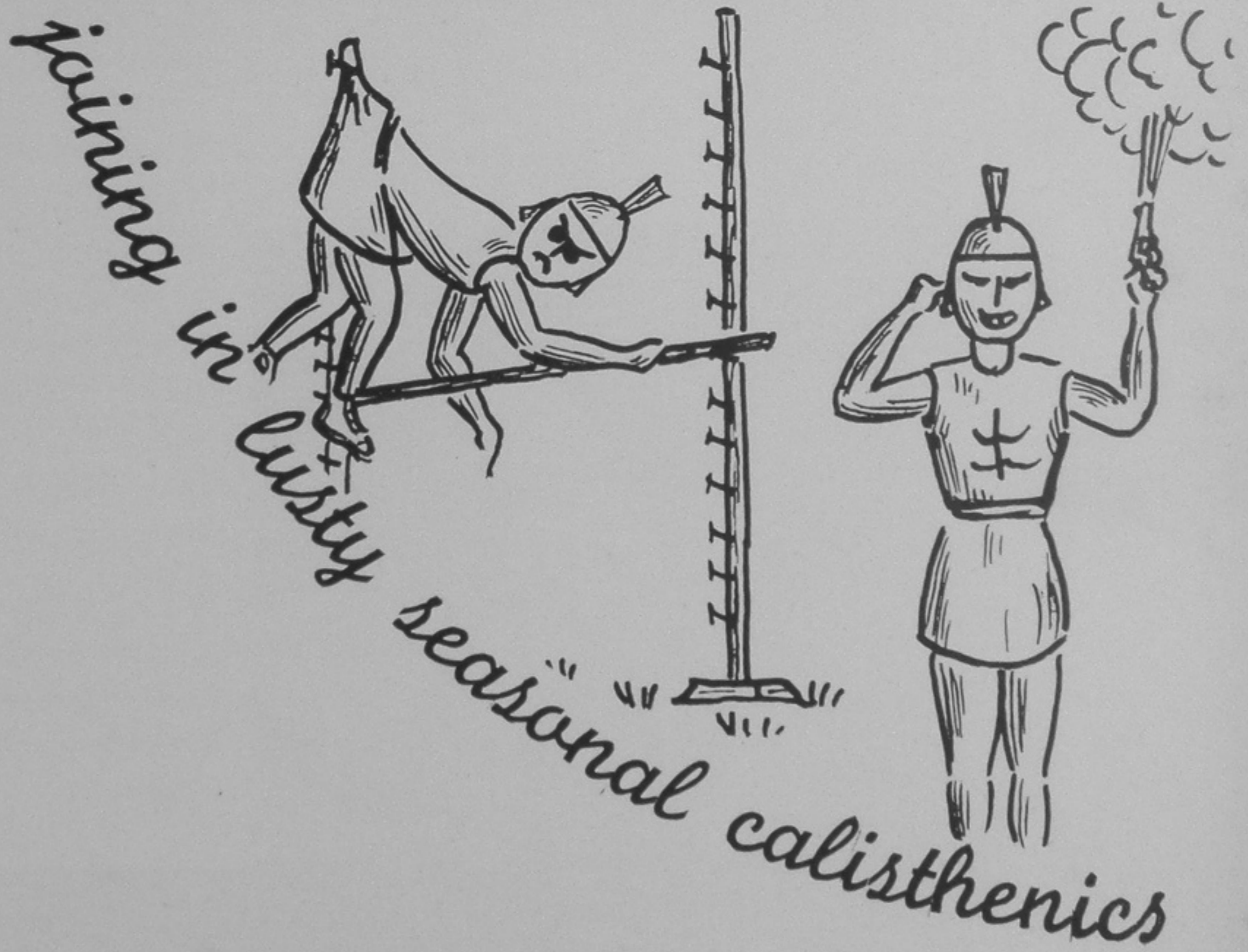

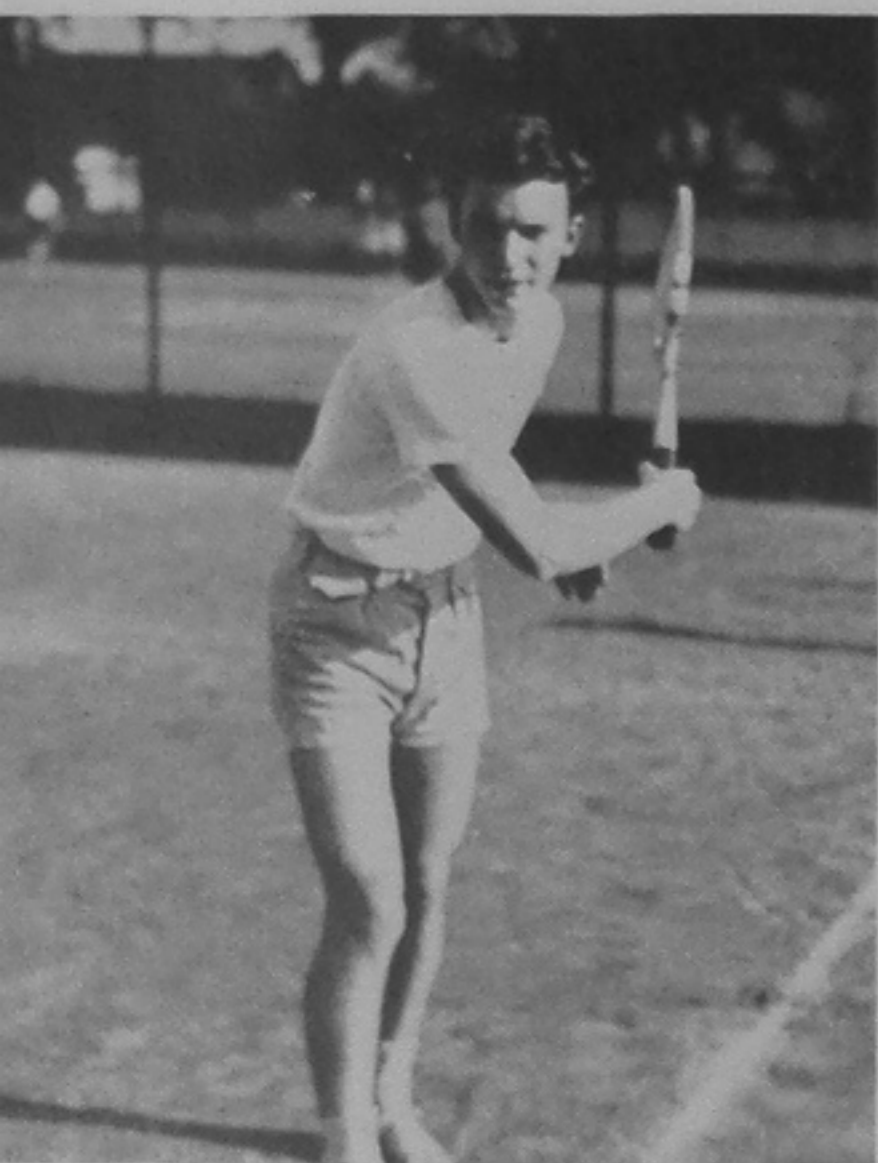

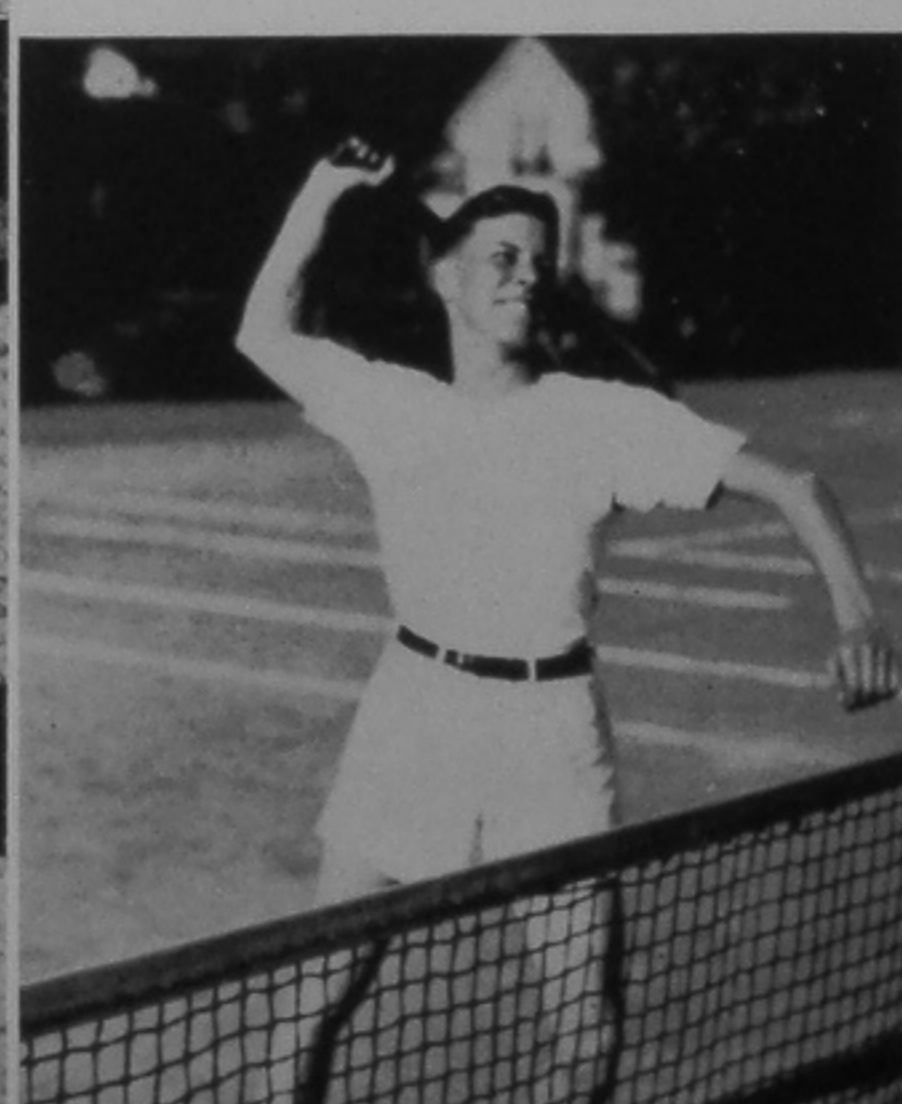

Baseball, first, foremost of spring athletics

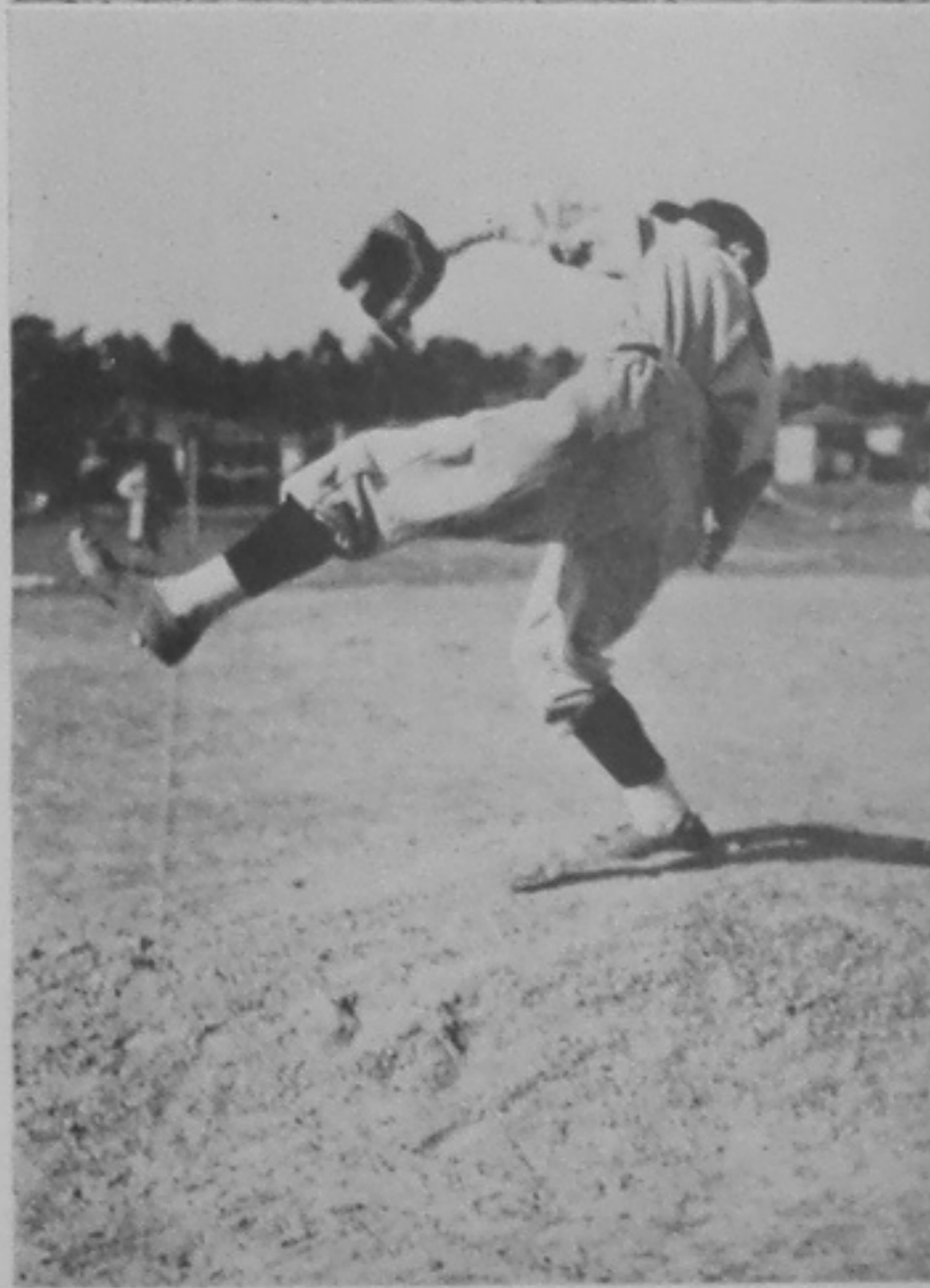

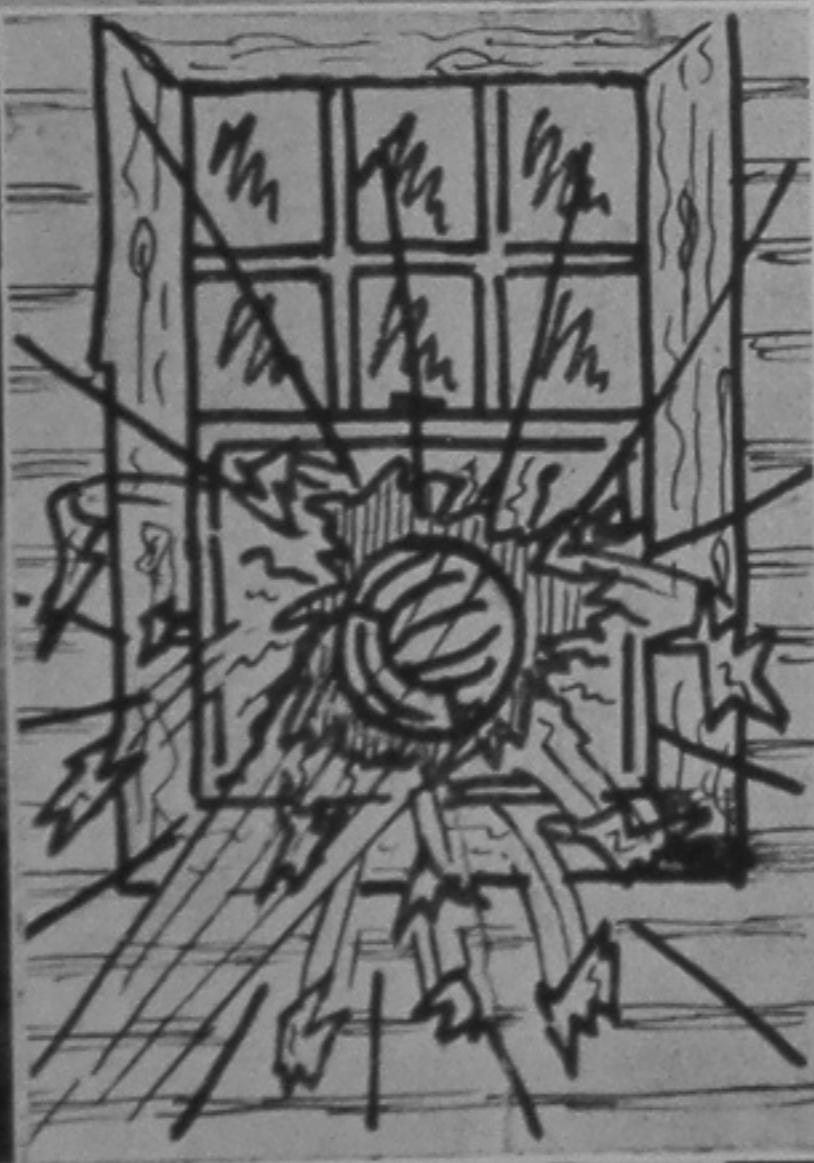
