This is the second book Pa has gotten for me to write in. The first one I have written all up not omitted a day. I have made three resolutions relative to this one. 1st to be very careful about my writing and try to improve every day. 2nd to write every night unless it is impossible. 3rd to mark every Sunday that I am absent from school. The weather is very cold the Thermometer stands at zero. Pa says that he thinks it is colder than it has been in the recollection of the oldest inhabitant.

Saturday 2

The weather moderated a little. I think I will try to keep an account of every thing that is bought for me and perhaps I can make a calculation of how much it costs Pa to keep me a year. Lizzie is sick again to night the effect of eating too much of some thing. I hope we will get to go to Sunday school any how, as it is the first Sunday in the year and we did not go to the celebration. Pa got me a fine pair of shoes to day they were... I don't know how much.

Sunday 3

Yesterday ma fell down stairs and hurt her right hand so that she can't do anything. Lizzie is sick, we have no girl and Mary and I have the work all to do, so we did not get to go to Sunday school or church. It has been snowing all the evening and everything is white and cold. I am very sorry that we were absent from school to day as it is the first Sunday in the year and we wanted so much not to be absent this quarter so we might have a red card however if we get a green one we will do well.

Monday, January 4, 1864

It snowed all night and nearly all day. The snow is several inches deep. We did not start to school as we expected to. The Prof. came this morning as usual. Mary got a letter from Mrs Harrison, no news of importance from below. Pa got a letter from Mr Shepherd who says that Mrs Rundel is dead. I have got a very bad cold. I am nearly sick with it. This evening I saw a sleigh all rigged up and the bells ringing as merrily as could be.

The weather about the same as yesterday only it did not snow any. There is considerable sleighing going on. Dr Pratt was here this evening. The children are all better again.

Friday 8

The sun shone beautiful all day long and had it not been for the wind it would have been a very pleasant day. Ma went down town and got me some red morocco and some pieces of ribbon for my (herssof) which I intend making for the fair. This evening while out on the walk the sleighs flying past and bells ringing so merrily I heard a laugh which made me start, for it sounded like one I had heard many times before. Clara E Swain

It was very pleasant to day. The sun was out all day. Pa is not very well my cold is better. Roby McCall was here to day, he is staying at Aunt Maria Moore's to go to school. Our thermometer was broken to day. Ma done up the work down stairs and oh it is so nice the safe is full of

light bread, pies and cakes but we cannot appreciate it as we would have done this time last year.

It is very cold yet but much pleasanter than last Sunday. We all went to Sunday school and stopped at Uncle Enos's to warm, going and coming. We got pretty school books. I got "Katie's Secret, Mary got "The Lost Key" and Jenny got the "Rebel Reclaimed".

This is Annie Lora's birthday she is one year old.

Friday, January 22, 1864

It has been a very pleasant day. Pa went down town this morning and got his dinner at the Ladie's Hall it was too far to come home. Jennie is much better. Aunt Maria and the children spent the day with us. Mary and I did not say any lesson today. I cannot imagine what is the reason we don't get a letter from Mifs Richardson we wrote to her on the fourth of last month.

Monday, October 3, 1864

I went to school as usual. Pa went to Cincinnati. The Hon Saml Calloway spoke at the market house this evening at 7 ½ O'clock. Mifs Annie Overdier stayed all night with us also Rachel Givens, Emmily McCall, Uncle Saul

McCall and his cousin Mr McCall and Mr Givens, Rachel's brother, and Uncle Reuben the house was full. There was a great crowd out to hear the speech about fifty persons came up from Beuna Vista but did get here until too late.

> Tuesday 4 All of the folks went away to day. The weather is very pleasant.

I feel tolerably well today, the measles have not broken out on me yet. Mrs Lodwick was in to see us today. Cora, Debbie, & Sallie Chandler were also in but I could not talk to them on account of coughing.

Tuesday, December 20, 1864

Today the measles broke out on me just as thick as they can be. I am a perfect sight. I have felt very badly all day & did not eat anything all day.

Kate Glidden was here.

Wednesday 21

I got a letter from Clara King today a good long letter. I tried to send a not to Em Spry but Jennie Wheeler did not call for it. Mifs Adams was in to see us. This is the first night of Bigelow Fair.

Thursday 22

Mell is here but talks of going home. I feel very well today but don't want to get up until tomorrow. This is the second night of Bigelow Fair.

Friday, December 23, 1864

I got up to day for the first time. I was in but eight days. Debbie Chandler has been very kind to me since I have been sick she came in almost every day & sometimes twice a day. Grandma came up today in a skiff. The wind is very high and it is very cold the pavements are sheets of ice. Mell & Mary went up home to day & left Ma alone.

Saturday 24

It is growing warmer the ice & snow are melting Madge McKune was here this afternoon. Emma Spry was here & stayed quite a little while. I was so glad to see her it is the first time she has been to see me since I was sick. I knit nearly a whole sock today could have finished it but had no yarn.

Several days at the end of December have continuations on later pages.

Sunday 25

Bright, clear & cold the snow is nearly all gone This is the third day I have been up. Today is Christmas but of course will not be celebrated. Clara King has got home & I saw her to speak to her a few minutes I am so glad she is home. I also saw Belle Connolley today she has come home to spend her Christmas vacation. I wish it had been so that I could have treated my little Sunday School class to a Christmas Tree or something nice.

Later in Diary is this: Christmas Day continued.

Today the weather is very pleasant with the exception of the mud caused by the melting of the snow. Last Christmas the first I ever spent in the North, was very cold we could hardly keep warm in the house with a large fire. The Christmas before where we were at home in Y_ it was pleasant weather, we all got presents had company and enjoyed

ourselves very much. Perhaps we may here some tome but it doesn't seem much like it now. But still we have a great deal to be thankful for then we were all well and happy but had never had any of those contagious diseases to which all children are subject, now we have passed through them all safely and have them to dread no more. There we were cut off from communications with the rest of our friends and relations, here we

have them all around us and see them very often. We did not go to church today not one of us all of us children were too unwell & Mamma had to stay at home to see after us and get dinner as the girl was gone. I am afraid that we will none of us get out to the Sunday School Celebration on New Year's Eve. It was so cold last year that we could not go and this year we are all sick. I have not been to Sunday School but one Sunday since I got my class. Mamma told me today that Pa heard yesterday that Aunt Sallie Young's family were at Cincinnati the day before. I expect they are at Moscow before this time. And I think it will not be long before they come to see us.

Monday, December 26, 1864

Kate came today to stay several days with us but concluded to go home & stay with her mother this week while her mother is out of school and stay with me afterwards. She stayed all night however. Aunt Lizzie was here, Cora Conway & Debbie were also here. Debbie brought me her new Godey's Book to see the plates & read if I liked. Debbie has been very kind to me ever since I was taken sick & I shall always like her for it. Pa got us some books to write in next year. I do not like mine very well it is so unhandy. Mary Stropes got back from her frolhick, sorry that she went I guess.

Tuesday 27

This is a very gloomy looking day out side. It looked like it was going to rain this morning but did not. Kate went home today. Hannah Currie went home with her. This is the first day for a long time that no person has been in to see us. It is not very late and perhaps someone will come yet. I am going to take a blank book that I had already, for a journal. I like it better than the one Pa got for me. Mamma has gone up to Dr Crees and we are alone with Grandma. I am busy trying to get to work on my fancy articles for the fair in February.

Tuesday Dec. 27th continued

I have some ribbon and dolls and things but I lack one or two little things which I can do nothing without I practised some today, the first time for two weeks. Mifs Adams was here yesterday and she said that she wanted to have her Soiree next Thursday but would have to wait until Mary and I got well enough to go as she wanted all of her scholars present. She gave each of her Sunday School scholars a present of a little picture which was very pretty. Mary and Jenny each got one they being her scholars. Later in the evening Mrs Gregory came in and sat awhile with us. The weather is warm and getting warmer I believe.

Weather very pleasant the sun is out bright. Mamma has gone to take a ride on horseback may go out to Mrs Glidden's before she comes back. Emma Spry was here a few minutes this morning she is going up to her sister Mrs Pursell's to spend the day, says his mother said she might spend the day with me one day this week. Somehow or other I can't get to work at my pretty things. Mary and I took a music lesson. After Mamma came home she went down street and got the ribbon and thread to fix my needle book and I

Wednesday 28th continued

now have the pockets done and the pincushion so that it won't take long to finish it. Papa is very unwell, nearly sick. Today the shade for the brass clock which he sent for came and it was broken all to pieces. Uncle Enos brought the paper for papa and read the telegraph news for him and I read the rest, he has now gone to bed. Aunt Maria

was down to see us today and stayed quite a little while. Mrs Nichols and Belden called to day. I think she came in to see me and tell me about the meeting at Mr Holmes. Mary & I could not go but Debbie told me all about it. She looked so pretty this evening. I have almost persuaded Debbie and Emma Spry to keep a journal like mine, My Dear old Journal! Some parts of it are not written very neatly but for all that I would not take a good deal

Starts another page: it. Today besides working on my needle case I knit a little pink mit for Lolie and put it on her after she was asleep, I expect she will not thank me tonight when she goes to suck her thumb. Today when I

went to try it on her she said "It fits enough" and didn't want to be bothered with it any more. Debbie said perhaps she would come and stay all night with me some night soon. Emma said that she got a good many things Christmas and she showed me a little box with things for sewing in it which her sister Mrs Pursell gave her. I did not get anything but a most ridiculous red cover for my nose which she knit and gave me. I suppose it would be very comfortable if it were only, fashionable but of course I can't wear it only I mean to see how long I can keep it just because she gave it to me and it is so funny and the only present I got. I am feeling very well and very wakeful but I don't think we will go to Mifs Adam's soiree which is to be a week from next Tuesday. The weather is damp and unfavorable for us to go out and especially at night. Oh! I do hope that Mrs Young and family will come soon. I think it was time that I had a note from Lizzie who must be at Moscow by this time at least. I have become very much attached to this book and regret giving it up but I think that the other one is so nice that I am anxious to get to writing in it.

Louisiana Moore Ricker Diaries Thursday, December 29, 1864

Last night while we were all asleep the weather turned very cold. Today Papa is no better and Mary Stropes is sick with the measles her sister Malissa is going to take care of her. Mamma is nearly worn but she thinks she had a chill tonight she took a

foot-bath & some hot tea and we are in hopes that she will be better tomorrow. I don't know what on earth we would do if Uncle Reuben was hot here he is so handy & just as good as he can be, he gets the meals, brings in coal & water makes the fires and in short does all the downstairs work.

Thursday Dec 29th continued.

Emma Spry was up to spend the day with me and I am afraid that she did not enjoy herself very much we were all sick or so nearly so that we could not wait on one another. She was very kind she helped mamma as much as she could and waited on the children. She brought her "Game of Authors" & "The Four Ports" and we played some, then she knit some and I worked on my needle book. I have the cushion ready to stuff and the pockets are all sewed on. Mary began to make a game of authors like Emma's. We have practised our piece until we can play it very well. Emma Wait called this afternoon to see how we were all getting along. Cora Conway brought me some yarn to finish my sock, she did not come until late and never even sat down.

Friday 30

Mifs Adams came this morning but we did not take any lesson. I finished my pair of socks & washed them. I made a "Game of Authors" nearly twice as large as Emma Spry's. Mary is no better & Uncle Reuben is still doing the work. I am very tired tonight & can't write much.

Saturday 31

Mifs Adams did not come today. Mrs Crees & Mrs Gregory were here. I practised four hours today. Cora Conway Debbie & Willie Molster were here this afternoon. The Society met at Mrs Currie's and there is to be an extra meeting there sometime during next week. This is the last time I will write in this book. Tomorrow I will write in my new book. The snow is quite deep and the sleigh bells are jingling by continually. Tonight while we are all asleep the old year will pass a way and the New Year

Saturday Dec 31st 1864

will come bringing its joys and its sorrows as the Old Year passed away with many things which it will be pleasant to remember in years to come. During

the last year Mary & I joined the church and I have been a member of Dr Pratts Bible Class until within two or three weeks when I had a class given me. I attended the Sabbath School Picnic at the Old Fort and enjoyed myself very much. But with all the pleasures there were some sorrows. The only daughter of Aunt Katy and the only one of my cousins for whom I had any affection died, and her funeral was preached in the church which she joined only a few weeks previous to her death. This evening at half past six the Sabbath school children have their annual New Year's Celebration I regret very much that none of us can go. None of us went last year either.

The End of the Diary of 1864

Appearing later in the diary is this note. It is in pencil which Louisiana had not used in the diary. It may have been added by her at a much later date or perhaps one of her descendants.

The High School Paper

Originated by six of the "C" Class girls March 21st 1864. Kate Glidden, Callie "California" Scott, Emma J. Spry, Clara L. King, Ella Holman & Louisiana M Moore. Who composed the entire editorial staff. Each contributor being obliged to copy, on the sheet, her own article. The name first proposed, The Wreath, probably suggested the flowery "Noms de Plume" which appear on the pages. This was later changed to "The Gem". The first number was read Friday afternoon, April 1st 1864 by the two who were appointed as readers, Emma J. Spry & Callie Scott. There being but one copy issued each time, owing to lack of press facilities, the copy probably became the property of one of the editors according to arrangement.

The only copy known to be in existence is nearly fifty years old, having been preserved by one of the editors.

Also in later pages is what appears to be a list of school students in the Second Street Building.
