

The well balanced program of trade and industrial education at PHS provides for the development of basic skills, safety judgment, and technical knowledge.






COACH BOB BROWNSON


The finest football coaching job in Ohio's high schools was done this year by Portsmouth High School's popular coach, Bob Brownson. More than 100 voters in Associated Press "Coach of the Year" poll handed this great honor to our own P. H. S. coach in recognition of his nine straight victories which gave the Trojans second place in state-wide ratings.

This was his second year at Portsmouth High, and in those two years he changed the record from our worst in 1951 with no wins to undefeated in 1953, the best record since 1938 when we had no losses and one tie.

He came here in 1952 from New London, Ohio, where he had accomplished a similar feat of building up a mediocre team into an undefeated team.

He teaches social living in the high school and has a B.S. in Ed. from Ashland College. He is now doing post-graduate work toward his master's degree at the University of Wisconsin.

PORTSMOUTH HIGH ROMPS COLUMBUS AQUINAS, 57-9, IN OPENER


Before a Mother's Night crowd of some 5,000 cheering fans, Portsmouth High's mighty Trojans, rated highly in the pre-season predictions, surpassed their expectations and exploded for nine touchdowns to swamp an outmanned Columbus eleven 57-9. One sparkling run after another thrilled the fans, as Leroy Carr and Preston Smith tallied three TD's each, Curt Gentry two, and Leo Brown one. But it was the defense who really turned in an outstanding performance. Hard, jarring tackles were responsible for eight Columbus fumbles, and the seemingly impenetrable Trojan forward wall stopped the Terriers so cold that they wound up with a minus ten yards rushing for their night's work. Coach Brownson was very impressed by his team's opening performance, which immediately shot the Trojans into focus for state football honors.


TROJANS CONTINUE WINNING WAYS OVER ASHLAND 26-0

Portsmouth High's rampaging Trojans scored the first three times they had their hands on the ball and then coasted to an easy 26-0 victory over the Ashland Tomcats. Leroy Carr, Portsmouth's free-wheeling halfback, raced for 3 touchdowns, and Wilson Jones added the final score in a game which saw the powerful Trojan offense pile up 363 yards rushing and 20 first downs to the Tomcats 75 yards and 6 first downs. The credit for this terrific defensive job goes to the mighty Trojan defense, which really made things miserable for the Ashland ball-carriers. Once again the Trojans displayed the power which earned them thoir No. 2 spot in the state.

TROJANS RUN WILD TO HAND WILDCATS 31-6 DEFEAT

A record crowd of over 8,000 fans jammed Municipal Stadium Oct. 3, 1953 to see Ohio's top





game of the week between the Portsmouth Trojans, number 4 in the state and unbeaten this season, and the Springfield Wildcats, number 2 in the state and also unbeaten. The Trojans, sparked by a tremendous offensive, spotted the Wildcats an early touchdown, and then proceeded to grind out 5 TD's and 266 yards rushing to completely outclass the Wildcats and roll to an impressive and well-earned victory. Particular evidense that this was a team victory was the fact that 5 Portsmouth High gridders got into the scoring act—Gentry, Smith, Carr, Brown, and Lawson. Once again the defensive unit turned in a terrific performance and held the Wildcats, labeled one of the toughest teams in the state, to only 131 net yards gained. This was a bright moment of glory for the fabulous 1953 Trojans.

TROJANS COAST TO EIGHTH STRAIGHT WIN OVER CINCY CENTRAL 32-6


Portsmouth High's touchdown twins—Leroy Carr and Curt Gentry—scored twice each to pace the Trojans to a one-sided 32-6 victory over an outclassed Cincinnati Central team and give

the Trojans their eighth straight grid victory over a 2-year span. The powerful offensive unit of the Trojans rolled up 478 yards from scrimmage and 18 first downs, while the stalwart defensive line, tougher than ever, held the Knights of Central to 85 yards and only two first downs. Obviously pointing to its important clash with Middletown the following Friday, the Trojans piled up an early 3-touchdown lead in the first quarter and then coasted to an easy victory.

TROJAN'S BATTLE TO 18-14 VICTORY OVER MIDDIES

Once again the mighty Trojans jumped into the state football spotlight in the game of the week—this time against the No. 4 team, the Middletown Middles. Fighting to protect their No. 2 place in the state, the powerful Trojans' offense tallied a touchdown in each of the first three quarters, and then had to battle furiously in the final two minutes of the final period to save their tremendous 18-14 victory over a typical never-say-die Middle squad. Curt Gentry hit Leo Brown with a 2-touchdown passes and "Smilin" Preston Smith churned


PORTSMOUTH BLANKS DAYTON STIVERS 26-0 FOR HOMECOMING VICTORY


The Trojans racked up their 10th straight victory as they defeated a stubborn Dayton Stivers team 26-0, before 5,000 happy Homecoming fans. The Trojan offense continued to roll as they ground out 434 yards rushing and 22 first downs in addition to their 4 TD's. Leroy Carr, with 2 TD's, Leo Brown, and Preston Smith tallied the Trojan scores. The defensive platoon turned in a great game as they held the Dayton club scoreless for their second shutout of the year. Mary Lou Brodbeck, Portsmouth's lovely homecoming queen, was honored in the pre-game ceremonies, and she presented the game ball to Co-Captains Jerry Sturgill and Gary Goodman.

For the first time since the Southern Ohio League was established in 1947, Portsmouth High walked off with the championship honors by soundly defeating Hamilton High 39-7 and thus ending league play undefeated. (The Trojans had previously defeated Springfield and Middletown.) The tremendous Trojan offense was unstoppable as Leroy Carr and Curt Gentry scored 2 TD's each and Wilson Jones and Preston Smith contributed the other scores. Apparently disturbed by their drop to the third place in the state, and still remembering the 68-0 lacing they received from Hamilton two years ago, the Trojans really walloped the Big Blue at their Homecoming. (The 2 scores which really broke Hamilton's back were Leroy Carr's tremendous 95-yard kickoff return and Curt Gentry's 80-yard TD run. After these the Big Blue seemed to fall to pieces.) Coach Brownson was very elated over this triumph and termed it as the high spot of his coaching career.

TROJANS THUMP STEUBENVILLE 58-0

Portsmouth High once again displayed its power football to clobber a hapless Steubenville Central crew 58-0 in a one-sided game at Municipal Stadium. Leroy Carr turned in one of the most dazzling displays of broken-field running ever seen here as he rambled for 5 touchdowns. Four of these came the first five times he handled the ball. Steubenville threatened to score once as the game closed but the vaunted Trojan defense, growing

ing year with a 44-0 victory over a fighting Ironton Tiger team for their ninth straight victory and first undefeated season since 1938. The Tigers, traditional rivals, naturally were up for this game, but despite this the Trojans' superior offensive power continued to roll. The Tigers, using a 6-3-2 defense, were willing to sacrifice short gains instead of letting the PHS backs go all the way and consequently the Trojans rolled up 22 first downs and almost 500 yards. Leo Brown closed out his high school football days by scoring three touchdowns and Leroy Carr, harassed by the Ironton defense all evening, added two more. Two other seniors, Wilson Jones and Don Wallace added the final markers. The defensive unit played one of their top games of the season by limiting the Ironton eleven to only 5 first downs and 38 yards rushing.










THE LIBRARY STAFF

Einar Helstrom directed the girls' glee club during chapel services throughout the year.


