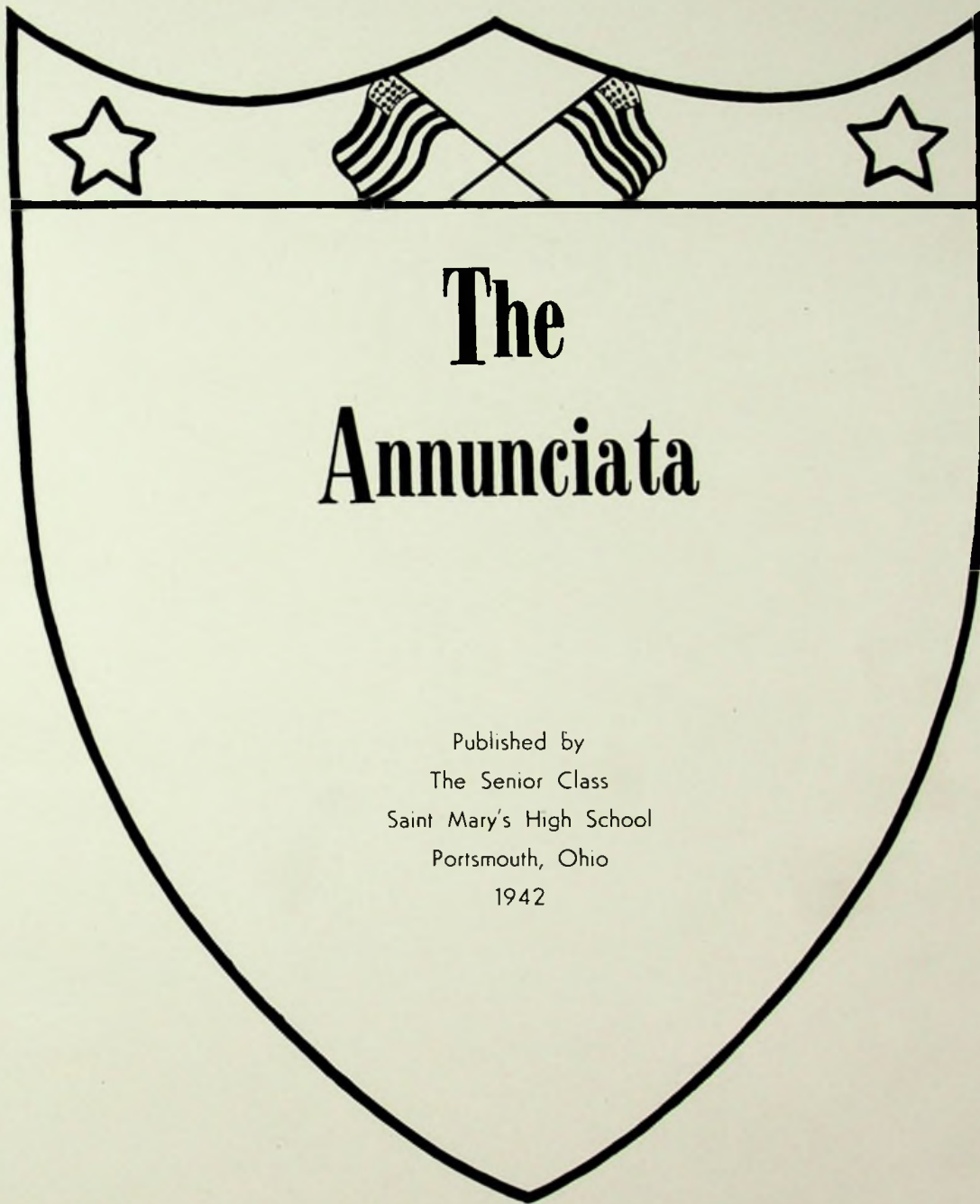

Foreword

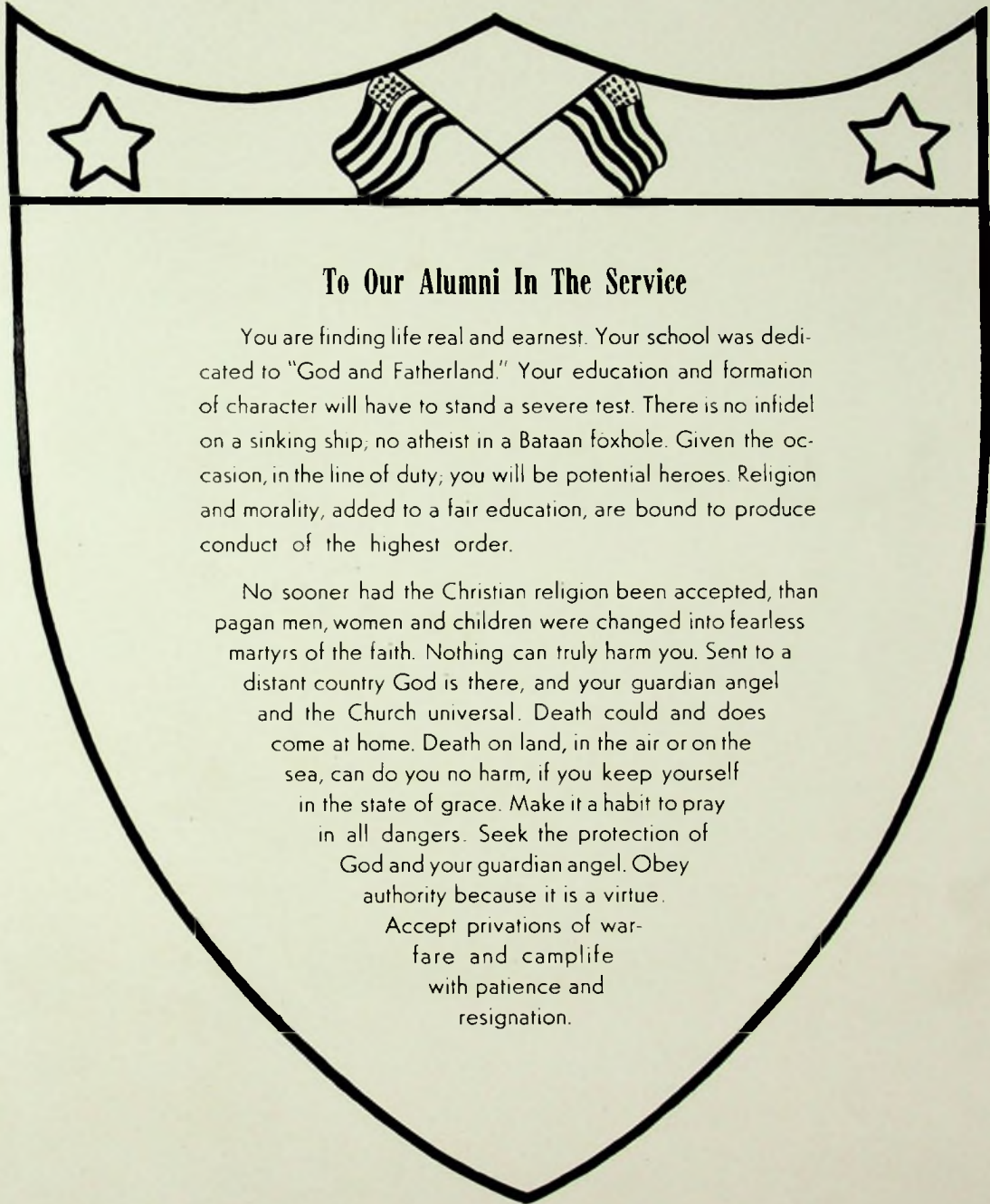

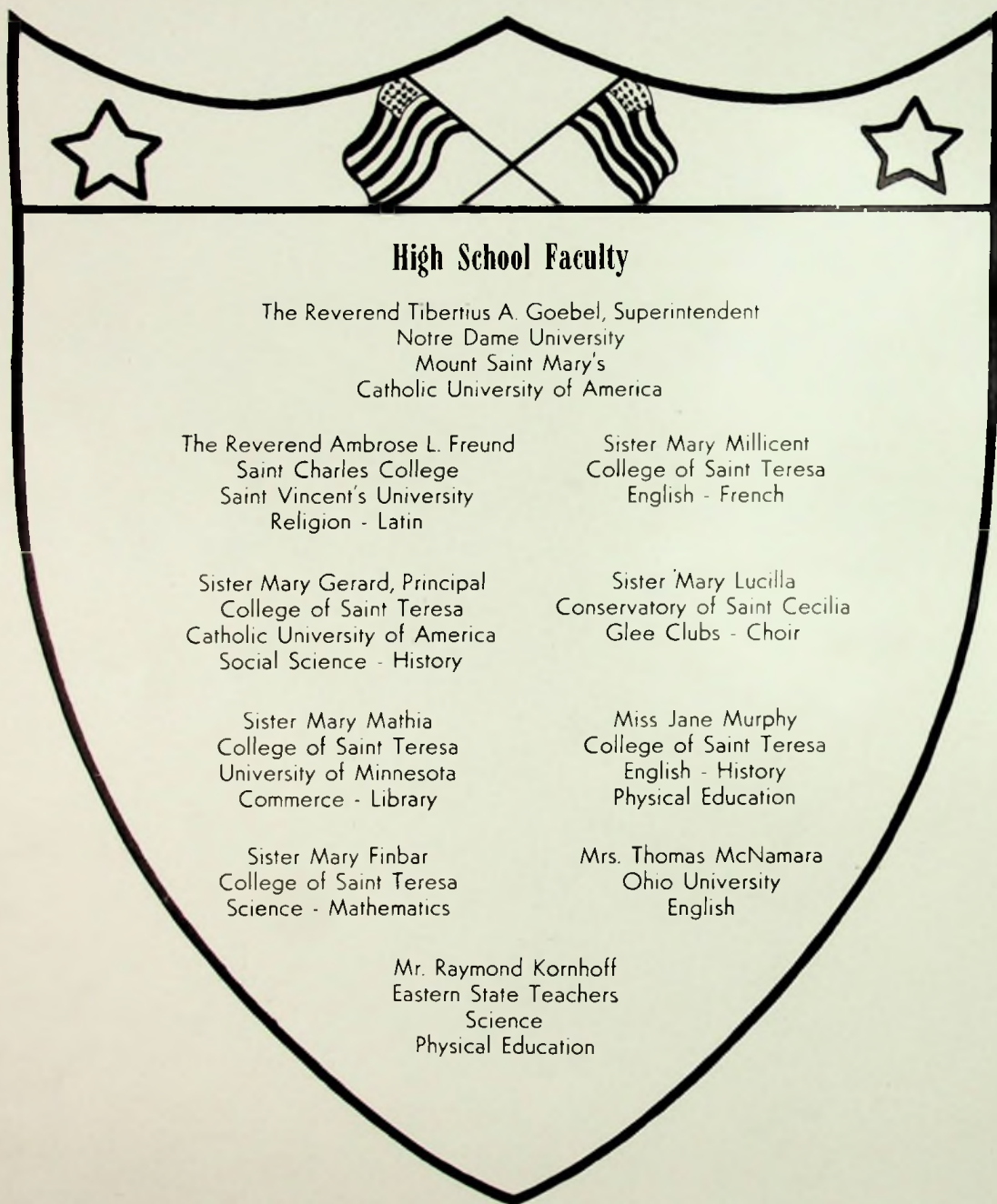


A Thought For The Day

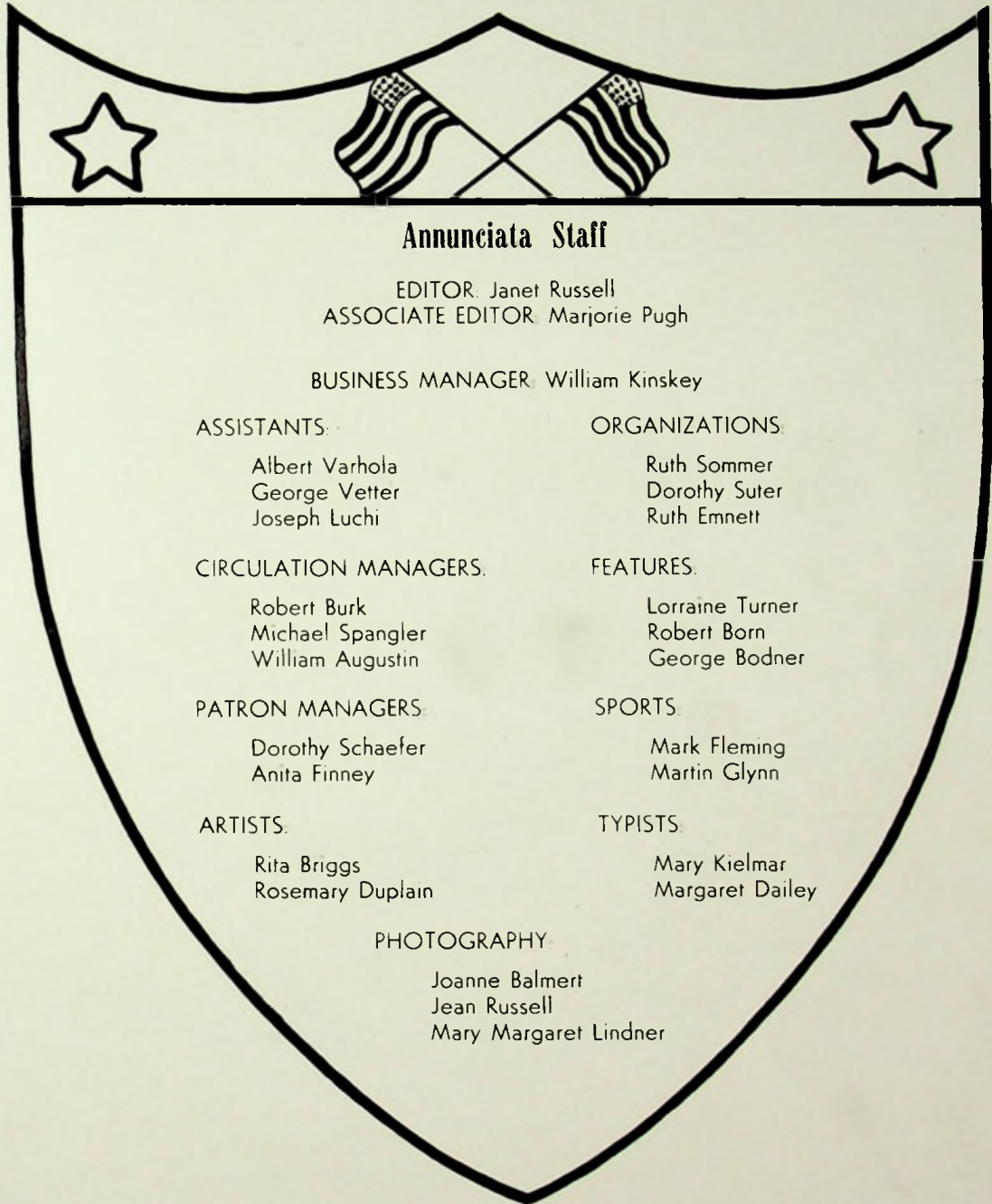

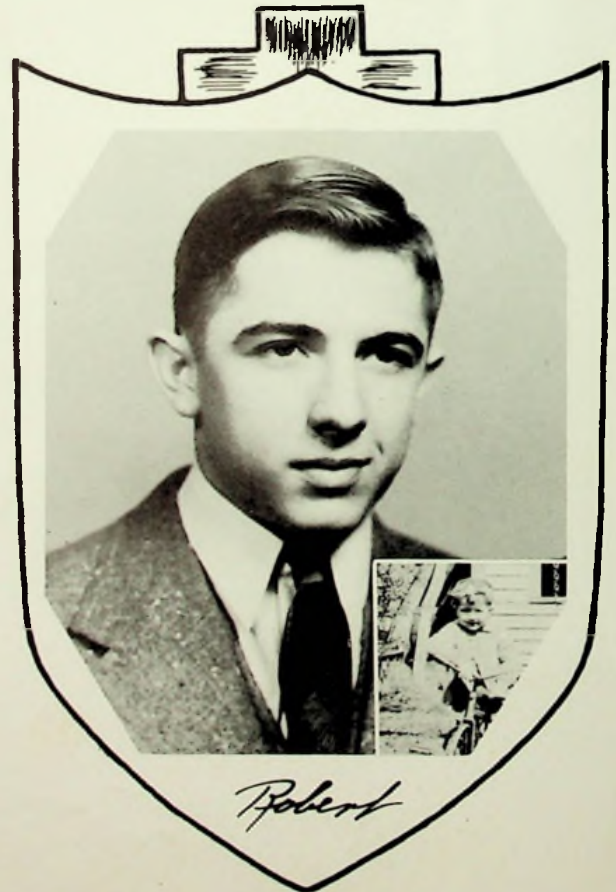


GEORGE BODNER

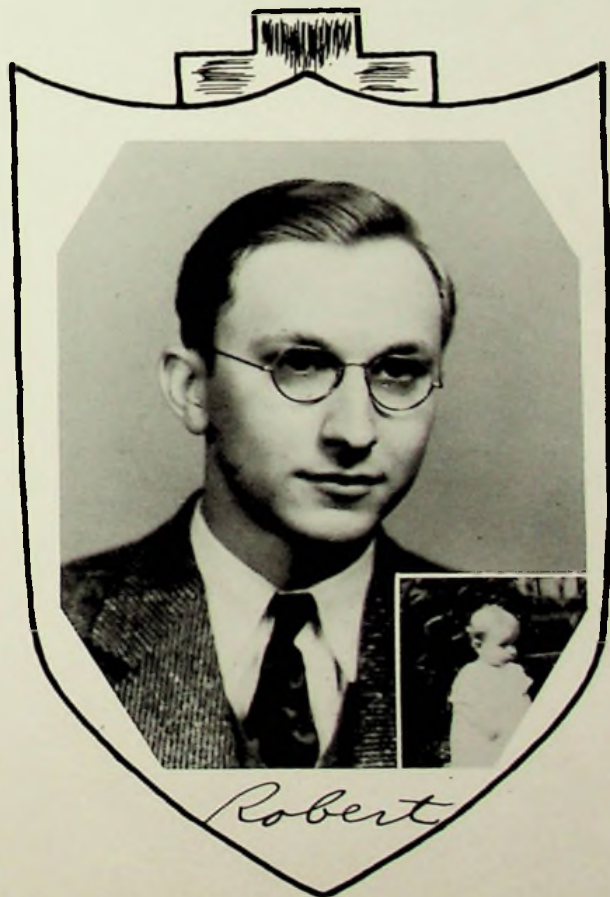


RITA BRIGGS

MARGARET DAILY

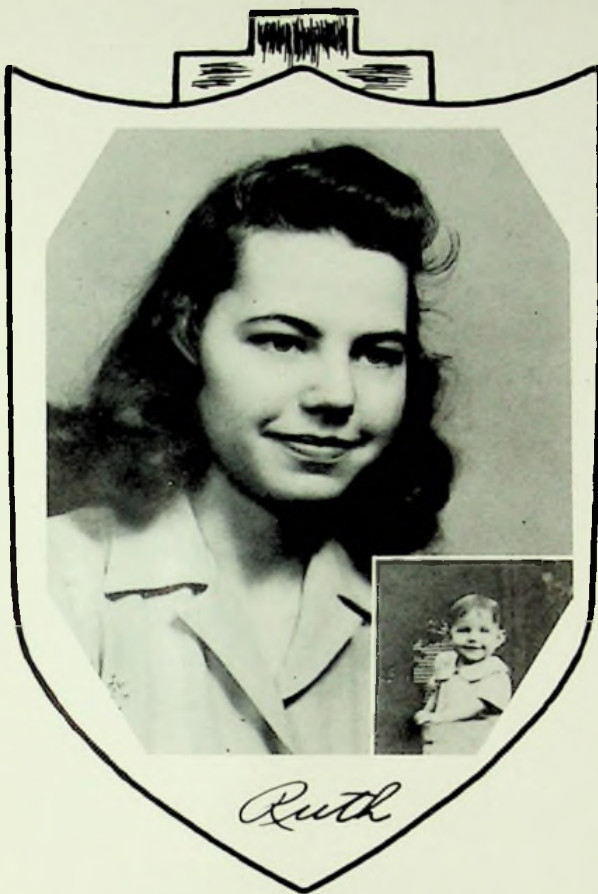

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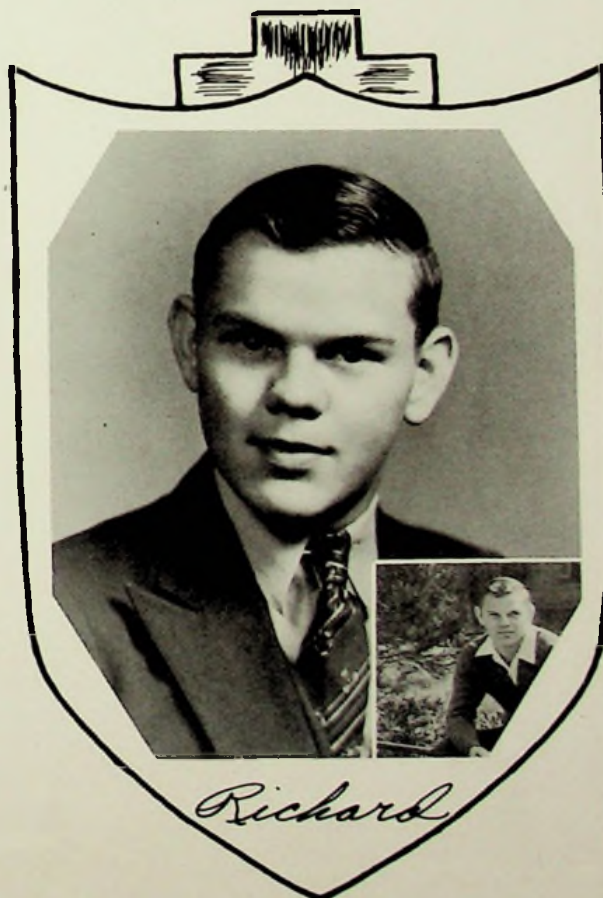


MARTIN GLYNN

LORRAINE TURNER

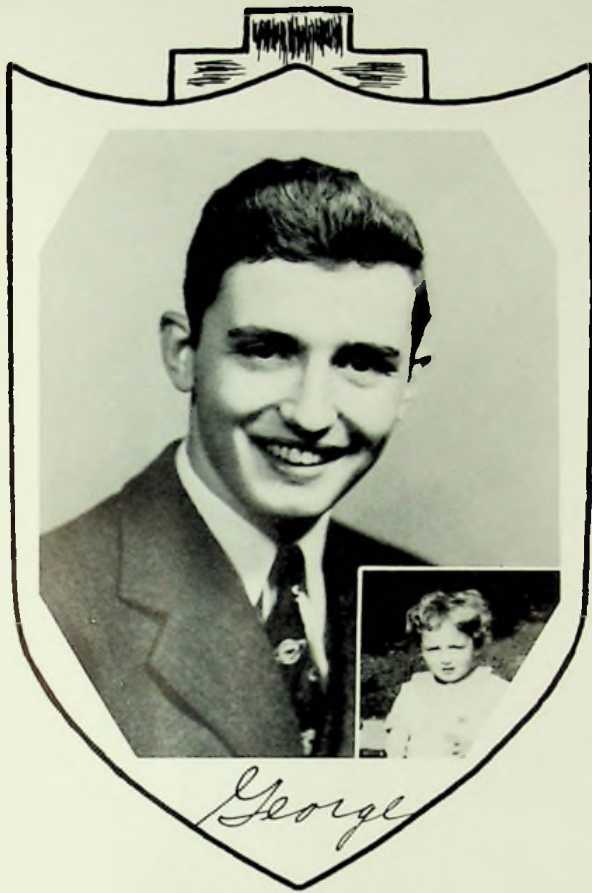
