## PREFACE.

The compiler hardly deems it necessary to enter into any lengthy apology for the publication of this first Directory of the city of Portsmouth. If the work should be the means of giving a wider publicity to the growing importance of our city, and aiding the stranger and the citizen to find out many matters of importance and convenience, he shall be fully satisfied, and the book will have attained its humble object.

There are perhaps many who, being skeptical as to the ultimate importance that Portsmouth is destined to assume among the commercial and manufacturing cities of Ohio, will pronounce a work of this kind unnecessary and not demanded by the present commercial and industrial interests of the place. To such we might say, that such a feeling has a tendency to cripple and retard the onward march of progress and improvement. Faith and energy have accomplished glorious achievements both here and elsewhere that would be looked upon by such men as almost miraculous. Even the building of our Railroad leading out through the hills and iron region of southern Ohio, to the lakes of the north was looked upon by such men as impracticable, predicting that the means never could be raised for such a stupendous work. Yet a few energetic men—principally of this city—having faith, and believing that there are no great objects attained without labor and energy, by little beginnings, set the project moving. To-day there are 54 miles of the road in operation, and the means provided to finish the road.

It is not claimed that this book is entirely free from errors, indeed the reader should not expect a work of the kind to be perfectly accurate, yet, having taken great care in correctly compiling the matter and ascertaining the facts, it is hoped that it will be found sufficiently reliable to become a text-book of reference.

## Reminiscences of Portsmouth & Alexandria.

Alexandria, on the banks of the Ohio, immediately west of the Scioto, was laid out in 1797 by Alexander Parker. David Gharky, in a private memoir which he kept for the purpose of keeping the family history, and for a perusal of which we are indebted to his son, the present county Auditor, G. H. Gharky, says in relation to the town of Alexandria, "We arrived in Alexandria in October 1795, and had to pay half a dollar a hundred for my goods being convoyed in a boat from the city of Pittsburg, besides finding myself and making a full hand on the boat. My intention was to go to Chillicothe, but the Scioto was too low for boats to ascend, and the wagoners charged \$4 per cent. hauling goods to that point. I left my goods and walked to Chillicothe. Here I found a dissipated, sickly scene. Every person from the smallest child to the "oldest inhabitant," appeared like moving spectres, within the pales of the church yard at the midnight hour. I could find no work to suit me, and after staying there a week, being the laughing stock of the children on account of my fresh healthy color and hardy looks, I determined to return to Alexandria."

May 2d, 1800, I rented a little unfinished house of Col. Langham, (Mr. Parker's agent) for \$20 per year. \* \* I bought one out-lot and one in-lot, and received my deeds, by giving my bond for \$80.

In 1803 the North Western Territory was admitted as a State and Scioto county was marked out by commissioners from the Ohio Legislature. This is the era from which may be dated the feuds and strifes of the place. Until this time the inhabitants of Alexandria had lived together in peace and harmony as one great family, though no wise related, by the ties of blood, but by christianlike neighborship. They would aid and assist each other in time of need, and alleviate the wants, distresses, and misfortunes of all.

sympathy benevolence and charity; thus all the residents of the town, as well as strangers who came among us, received the aid which is due from humanity to the afflicted and oppressed.

But a majority of the humane portion moving off, the new comers not caring for its cultivation, this virtue became neglected, and a new rule was brought in vogue,—every one for himself.

It is not entirely certain that the adoption of this selfish policy spoken of here by Mr. Gharkey was absolutely the cause of the final fizzling out of the unfortunate town of Alexandria, yet it may be fairly presumed that such was the cause. From this period gradually the interests of the town began to decline, and to-day the would-be-city is a cultivated corn field and principally owned by Mr. Horace Crain.

A selfish policy, similar to that evinced by the early inhabitants of Alexandria, pursued as a system, will finally destroy the prosperity and drive off or repel a population from any place.

But such was not the policy pursued by the wise, generous and liberal Mr. Henry Massie, the proprietor of the town of Portsmouth. He laid out the city of Portsmouth in 1803, and offered to donate as many lots to each inhabitant as he owned in Alexandria, provided he would build on, or move to the lot or lots donated to him in Portsmouth.

Mr. Gharkey says "very advantageous offers were made to me, but adhering to the interests of my neighbors, I remained to my sorrow. The hope of getting the county seat located at Alexandria kept up a lively anticipation of our place over Portsmouth until the seat of justice was permanently established there, when we commenced to dwindle into that nothingness which our feuds brought us to."

In 1807 corn was very scarce and worth \$1 per bushel. On Christmas, 1808, the water was 37 inches deep in houses in the old town, below the Scioto, and swept away fences, haystacks, &c. &c. This was a se-

cond time within a month that they had been driven from their houses by high water. The weather was intensely cold, and the water falling very fast, in the language of Mr. G. cakes of ice were left suspended from the boughs of trees, like millstones hanging upon threads, which were indeed dangerous to passengers.

In April 1812, Rupe's Rifle Company marched to upper Sandusky, where Hull surrendered them to the British. In July 1813 Jacob Noel's regiment marched to the same point.

"In 1814," says Mr. G. "I sold out in Alexandria, to Parker Truitt, for \$450, and moved to Portsmouth, where I bought a lot of David Jones, with a two story house and a log stable, for \$200, and two lots from Henry Massie for \$60." In 1809 Stephen Smith opened a Ferry at the mouth of the Scioto, and in 1815 Mr. G. opened one on lands of Mr. Massie's above the mouth near what is now the west end of 2d street.

In 1815 Portsmouth was incorporated.

## CITY SCHOOLS.

For the facts contained in the following history we are indebted to Mr. Poe, of our city schools, as well as to its author, Mr. A. L. Child, Superintendent of the schools in 1839.

Previous to the commencement of this brief account of our schools, every thing in relation to their support and government was regulated by the then existing State laws and consequently their history back of this period could furnish very little that would be interesting.

On August 4th 1837, a motion was made in the town council by Joseph Riggs that a committee of three be appointed to propose a draft for an amendment to the charter of the town, and an important part in the amendment was to obtain especial control over the schools. The motion carried and the committee was appointed, consisting of J. Riggs, C. A. M. Damarin and Mr. Ross. On Dec. 1st, same year, this amendment was reported, and after some discussion, was passed.

It would seem there were members of the council who were rather inclined to building up an Academy instead of improving the Common Schools. This policy however was defeated, and the high position of our Common Schools is a monument to the wisdom of that act.

The amendment to the city charter was accordingly passed by the Legislature and is to-day the law.

April 21st, School Lot No: 130, was leased to Adonijah Crain, for 20 years, 5 or 6 of which had elapsed, to be re-valued every 5 years producing a rent of \$60 to 70 dollars per year.

On the 21st April 1838, a committee was appointed by council, to prepare sites for building school houses on, similar to those then in Cincinnati. Committee—J. Riggs, O. Overturf and G. J. Leet. It was decided to build one house on Lot No. 39. On June 1st contract

was outtred into with John Ratliff and Geo. Shulter at a cost of \$5,700.

On Sept. 6th, Washington Kinney, Jas Lodwick and Jas. Salisbury, as Directors of School District No. 1, made over the property of the district to the council in trust for the schools

July 29th, 1839, John Sample of Cincinnati was engaged as Superintendent of the public Schools, and Mrs. Wilcox as principal of Female department. Mr. Sample soon resigned and Mr. A. L. Child was engaged as Superintendent

In the winter of '39 and '40 a law was passed giving the council power to restrict the use of schools to youth between the ages of six and sixteen.

About 11 months after the schools went into operation, Messrs. J. V. Robinson, W. Kinney and G. J. Deet, trustees and visitors reported to the Council that the monthly pay of the teachers was \$197.50 or \$2,370 per annum, and the average attendance for the year past from July 6, 1840, was 2702.9. Amount in the hands of the city belonging to schools, \$2,179.36.

In the reports for 1841, there are great complaints about irregular attendance of pupils, and the lack of interest in the schools on the part of parents, there having only been an average attendance 223 for 1841. The expense for teachers that year was \$1,901.85.

The report of the Trustees for the year ending June 24, 1842, shows an increased interest in the schools, there having been purchased for the same a good set of astronomical, philosophical and geographical apparatus and maps. Am't paid teachers this year \$1,919.

The Schools are now under the superintendence of Mr. S. M. Holet, assisted by J. H. Poe and others, and are in the most prosperous condition that they have ever been. There is a public Library connected with the schools to which the pupils as well as the citizens have free access, for the building up of which David Rice made a liberal donation.

**Manufacturing & Productive Establishments**

**PORTSMOUTH IRON WORKS.**—Built by John Glover, Jacob P. Noel and others in 1831, and soon passed in to the hands of T. G. Gaylord & Co., by whom it is now owned and conducted. It manufactures all kinds of Bar and Boiler iron; its boiler iron being considered the best article manufactured anywhere. It employs about 150 hands, and built at a cost of \$175,000.

**PORTSMOUTH MANUFACTURING ESTABLISHMENT.**—Was built in 1852 by J. L. Ward, D. N. Murray and George Stevenson, at a cost of about \$50,000. It manufactures Steam Engines, Furnace and Mill Machinery, Cars, Car-wheels and heavy castings generally, employs from 40 to 80 hands. It is situated on the corner of 2d and Jefferson Streets.

**SCIOTO ROLLING MILL.**—Is situated at the west end of 3d street, and was commenced in 1855, by D. N. Murray, C. A. M. Damarin and J. W. Davis, who soon were joined by seven other stockholders. It was built at a cost of about \$85,000. It employs 120 hands.

**PORTSMOUTH GAS LIGHT COMPANY.**—Organized and built in 1855, by A. V. Barringer & Co., at a cost of \$11,000. Have laid about 3 miles of pipe through the principal streets of the city, and supply about 200 consumers. Gas was supplied to consumers for the first on the 1st day of October 1855. Office and works on 2d street below Market. Supplies gas to citizens at \$3 50 per cubic foot, and city lamp posts at \$25 pr year.

**PORTSMOUTH AXE FACTORY.**—Built in 1854 by McFarlins and H. R. Kinney, but is now owned by J. W. Smith. Makes double and single bit axes, runs steam engine and trip hammers. 5th St. bet. Market & Court.

**WASHINGTON FOUNDRY AND MACHINE SHOP.**—Built in 1856 by Henry Davis. This establishment casts and puts up Furnace machinery of every description, manufactures Steam engines of all sizes, Rolling Mill Machinery and Mill-wright work.

**PURDOM'S DOOR, SASH & BLIND FACTORY.**—Built in 1855 by J. W. Purdom, on 4th street, east of Chillicothe. Manufactures also Flooring, Shelving, window frames &c. One steam engine and two planing Machines.

**RHODES PLANING MILL.**—Built in 1850, Rhodes & Martin on 3d street between Gay and Bond. Manufactures Flooring Doors, Windows, Frames for same, Sash, Window Blinds and building materials generally. Runs steam engine and several machines.

**SCIOTO FOUNDRY.**—Front street, West end, Casts Stoves, Hollow-ware, Grates Plow-points, Threshing Machine Castings, &c. &c. Neill & Eberhart.

**THE SCIOTO & HOOKING VALLEY R. ROAD** was originally chartered to run from the town of Portsmouth on the Ohio River to Newark, in Licking county, by way of Piketon, Chillicothe, Lancaster and Amanda. Subsequently, however, its charter was altered and the route changed so as to lead through the towns of Webster, Jackson, Hamden, McArthur, Somerset &c. to Newark.

On the 11th of March, 1853, the road was mortgaged for a million of dollars, bearing interest annually at 7 per cent. 5 per cent. of the net earnings of the road after it is completed, is set apart to the redemption of those bonds.

The length of the Scioto and Hocking Valley Railroad from Portsmouth to Newark is 135 miles, and forms a through line to the Northern lakes. The estimated cost of the whole road from Portsmouth to Newark, including equipments, fixtures, depot grounds and contingencies, \$2,725,000 00 or \$20,000 per mile. The portion of the road from Portsmouth to Jackson cost 19,500 per mile.

The road is now in complete running order from this point to Hamden and is there joined by the Mariotta road; it is doing a paying business.

The officers of the road for the current year are:

E. A. Spencer, President, Thos. Kendall Superintendent, J. W. Collins Secy and Geo. Johnson Vice President. Directors: J. Riggs, C. A. M. Damarin, & Geo. Johnson of Scioto, J. W. Laird, of Jackson, J. K. Will of Vinton; F. Case, J. Webster, E. A. Spencer, and W. J. Richard of Perry.

Arrangements are made for the issuing and sale of bonds sufficient to complete the road.

**PEOPLES' FOUNDRY.**—On the corner of Chillicothe and 4th streets, now conducted by Mr. James Grimes. Besides casting all kinds of Stoves hollow-ware, and heavy castings, it casts a splendid article of iron fronts for business houses. A specimen of its work can be seen adorning the fronts of the stores of Massie block, corner of 2d and Market streets.

**FULLER & CARY'S SASH FACTORY.**—This establishment was built in 185-- on 5th street between Market and court, by Fuller & Cary, by whom it is now owned. It manufactures window and door frames, sash, flooring, and all kinds of carpenter's building materials. It runs a steam engine and several machines.

**HEGGIE & LEWIS' WHEELBARROW FACTORY.**—On Mill street near Gay, runs a steam engine and manufactures a large number of wheelbarrows for shipment.

**HALL'S WHEELBARROW FACTORY.**—On 2d street below Jefferson, owned by Wm. Hall, and manufactures wheelbarrows for shipment.

**SOAP & CANDLE FACTORY.**—On the Chillicothe pike, in the northern suburbs, owned by Chas. Rose. It is not now in operation, but is in good condition, and is capable of manufacturing these articles to almost any extent. This establishment is now for sale, the proprietor not having the means to stock and run in it. It can be bought low, and there is a good market here for soap and candles.

**MINERAL WATER FACTORY.**—Brown Reed & Co., are manufacturing mineral waters and crab cider in large quantities. This business has lately increased greatly in this city.

### Wholesale Mercantile Houses.

Although these establishments cannot be numbered among the producing houses, nor are they quite so instrumental in building up the interests of the city and community, yet the city is greatly indebted to them for building up a wholesale trade that takes in a very large extent of territory, and brings into the place a large commerce from the adjacent counties in Ohio and Kentucky.

J. F. TOWELL, (successor to J. Pursell.) This establishment was built up by J. Pursell and sells only at wholesale, and has a permanent and extensive trade.

R. Bell & Co., wholesale Shoe dealers. This establishment with its present extensive business has been built up principally under the superintendence of Mr. R. Bell and two of his present partners, Messrs. W. H. Ware and J. T. Vincent. It now enjoys an extensive trade, much larger than even the most sanguine friends of Portsmouth are aware of.

OAKES & TRACY.—This establishment also sells boots and shoes at wholesale, and is under the management of Mr. C. P. Tracy. Messrs. O. & T. are successors of R. Lloyd & Co., and C. P. Tracy & Co. They have great facilities for business, and Mr. Tracy is a young man ambitious of success, and will consequently do every thing in his power to keep and enlarge his trade.

Wm ELDEN has Clothing at wholesale, and is prepared to accommodate Furnacemen and country merchants at wholesale rates.

WHOLESALE GROCERIES.—Of these there are a great number and many heavy dealers.

C. A. M. Damarin & Co., have built up and are still supplying a very large trade in their line. Front st. below Jefferson,

M. B. Gilbert, (formerly M. and G. Gilbert) has also a large and old established house, always keeping a large stock on hand.

John Tillow is also prepared in this line to fill orders

to any amount, Front a few doors be the Biggs House. M. & S. Timmonds also fill orders from the country, although they accommodate themselves to the retail trade. Next door to Biggs House.

W. S. Brown & Son; on Front, below Market, have a very large stock in this line always on hand. This house is one of the oldest in the city, and one that is as well and favorably known as any other.

S. R. Ross, Front, below Market, has another large and well established house. He keeps a large stock on hand and supplies a trade spread over a large extent of territory.

Giles Gilbert, jr. in Massie block near the post office, has just opened a very extensive new establishment, Having been in the business for years, and having the location he has, he cannot fail in securing a heavy trade and permanently retaining it. Near post office.

C. P. Chandler & Co., has another very large house, on Market street, opposite the market house. It is comparatively a new house, yet it has already obtained a good trade, and is doing a good business.

Further upon Front, above Market there are:

Gunn & M. Colm, who are also selling at wholesale, and acting as forwarding and commission agents, and E. Gatos, who is also manufacturing candies and keeps everything in the confectionery line for the trade. Buskirk & Davis, on Front, between Court and Market, sell Groceries exclusively at wholesale, and have been for some years one of the leading houses.

W. P. Marlin, corner Court and Front, also sells at wholesale.

Liquor Houses.—There are four wholesale Liquor establishments in the city: J. B. Ormsby, Cutler & Brown, H. Densmore & Co., and Hugh Reilly, the latter just opened.

In the department of Hardware, there are 3 who sell at wholesale, D. N. Murray & Co, Ward, Waller & Cone, and Hibbs & Herd.

Methodist Episcopal Church—Bigelow chapel was built in 1835. Rev. B. N. Spahr regular minister in charge, stated preaching each Sabbath in forenoon and evening.

M. Church—Spencer chapel—Built in 1853, on 7th street between Chillicothe and Gay streets, Rev. L. A. Bradorick preacher in charge. Stated preaching each Sabbath forenoon and evening.

First Presbyterian Church—Built in 1852 on south west corner of Court and 3d streets. Rev. E. P. Pratt pastor, stated preaching each Sabbath forenoon and afternoon.

Episcopal church—Court street, east side, above 3d. Rev. Erasmus Burr, pastor. Preaching each Sabbath, forenoon and afternoon.

Baptist Church—Built in 1852 on 4th street, a few doors above court, north side. Wm. Allgood, pastor; stated service each Sabbath.

Methodist Protestant church, built in 1853 on 5th street between court and Chillicothe. Rev. Jacob Nichols pastor—preaching each Sabbath.

German Methodist church, 4th street below Market. Rev. Wm. Ketter minister—preaching each Sabbath, service forenoon and afternoon.

Lutheran German church—On 5th street bet court and Chillicothe, south side; Rev. Gotlob Weihlo pastor—service morning and evening each Sabbath.

Catholic, German church, west end of 3d street. Rev. Mr. Cargin minister. Service forenoon and afternoon.

Catholic Church, built in 1855 on sixth street, above Chillicothe, north side. Jas. O'Donohoo, pastor; service each Sabbath once a day in the forenoon.

Welsh church, recently purchased, on 3d street above Washington. Rev. Mr. Thomas, pastor.

Church built by and for the use of the colored people, on 5th street above market.

### A Historical Sketch of Newspapers Published in Portsmouth, from Aug. 1818, to the Present.

In the following historical sketch of the different newspapers that have been published in Portsmouth, we have taken great pains to get the facts and dates correctly. Our information has been gleaned partly from an old file of newspapers preserved by David Gharkey, and now in the possession of A. W. Williamson, Esq. (to whom we are indebted for a perusal of them) and partly from persons who have long resided here and are supposed to have recollected correctly.

The First paper that was ever issued in Portsmouth—THE PORTSMOUTH TIMES—was issued by Jeremiah Albot and a Mr. Chaney, on the 5th of August 1818. In the prospectus the editors say, in regard to the politics of the paper, that "they are friends to Republican institutions, and the General government as then administered, and will give their support to the administration, (Monroe's) so long as it adheres to the policy it now pursues." But they say, as "there is nothing in the political world to excite much interest, and as Europe reposes in peace, they intend to devote a small part of their paper in publishing accounts of the stupendous efforts now making throughout the Christian world for the diffusion of the scriptures and the spread of the Gospel."

In this paper we find an advertisement for Ohio Hotel kept by Henry Case, New Goods by Joseph Waddle, Sheriff Sales by N. Wheeler, Thos. Waller, President of the Commercial Bank of Scioto, Drugs and Medicines by Dr. Giles S. B. Hempstead. Henry Brush was a candidate for Congress: Haverhill, opposite Greenupsburg was laid out in Dec 12, 1818, by Asa Boynton. Mrs. Hannah Johnson advertises her husband, Kindle Johnson, as having left her bed without any cause whatever and OFFERS 3 cents and a bundle of straw, but no thanks to any one who will RETURN him.

March 17, 1819, the Times was discontinued for want of patronage, the editors remarking however that they did not attribute their failure to a want of liberality in their fellow citizens; but to the miserable state of our currency, and a lack of sufficient number of mail routes in the region.

March 4, 1820, Mr. C. Hopkins issued the first number of the Scioto TELEGRAPH, of Republican principles,—open to moderate and useful discussion.

In Oct. 1820, the Telegraph was enlarged and issued simultaneously in Portsmouth and Burlington, and the words "and Lawrence, Co. Gazette," added to it.

James and John Carnihan commenced the publication of the Portsmouth Gazette, July 30, 1825, on the corner of market and front streets. This paper announces itself in favor of the "American" policy, and Henry Clay the Hercules of America.

March 4, 1825, Ebenezer Corwin took charge of the Portsmouth Gazette and Lawrence Advertiser, and in connection with James Carnihan conducted it until Feb. 24th 1826. Messrs. Carnihan and Bingham issued a "Temporary Advertiser" for a few weeks only until they could get type from Baltimore to print.

The WESTERN TIMES on which was commenced on the 28th of April, eighteen hundred twenty-six.

The Times of July 27th of this year is in mourning for Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, who died on the 4th of July of the same year.

This paper was continued by Julius A. Bingham until the Spring or Summer of 1830.

On the first of January 1831, Mr. Elijah Glover commenced the publication of the Portsmouth Courier, edited by Edward Hamilton, opposed to the administration of Gen. Jackson. The inhabitants in the first number of the Courier is set down from the official census returns of Portsmouth at 1,073 inh.

At the end of the first year Mr. Hamilton retired from the editorial control of the Courier, and Elijah Glover was continued as its editor and proprietor.

In 1833 the Portsmouth Courier passed into the hands of S. G. Glover, and Wm. P. Camden, in 1834 it passed into the hands of E. Glover and Wm. P. Camden, in 1837 it passed into the hands of E. Hamilton and W. P. Camden, and in 1839 it passed into the hands of E. Hamilton and Simeon Clark, and the name was changed to the Portsmouth Tribune. It was continued by them up to March 19th, 1841. Not having all the files before us we may be mistaken as to the dates in Mr. Hamilton's time in publishing Tribune, and we believe Mr. Clark published the Tribune about one year in his own name previous to the union of the Tribune and Clipper. Also, that W. A. Hutchins published it in the interim about six months. Mr. Hamilton also conducted the Tribune for some time in his own name as soon as he commenced the publication.

In 1840 Wm. P. Camden commenced the publication of the Scioto VALLEY PIGEON, which was the first democratic paper ever published in Scioto County. It was continued up to March 1845, when it was sold to Anthony Drouillard, and he continued it until the summer of 1844.

In the summer of 1844 John Gharkey commenced the publication of the Democratic Revue, which was discontinued after the Presidential election.

In March 1845, A. Drouillard commenced the publication of the Portsmouth Clipper. It was continued by him up to Aug. 26, 1845, three months of this time W. C. Wheeler, who died at Burlington, Ohio, was one of the partners, and it was sold on April 20, July 29, 1845, about 1845, to Anthony Drouillard.

On the 26th day of August of the same year Stephen P. Drake bought one half of the Clipper, and the paper was continued six months by Drouillard & Drake, which partnership was dissolved on the 24th of February 1846, and the paper was sold to Stephen P. Drake.

On the 3d of March 1846, Stephen P. Drake issued the first number of the second volume of the Clipper, and continued its publication 3 years in his own name, save six months in the interim, to Edward Smith and

On the 7th day of March, 1848, the Tribune and Clipper were united by Messrs. Clark and Drake, and published by them up to the 22d day of November, 1849, on which day the partnership was dissolved and the office sold to Mr. John Hannah, who published the paper one year, viz. from Nov. 23, 1849, up to Nov. 22, 1850. On the 23d of November Stephen P. Drake, (after having been engaged in the Grocery business one year) bought of Mr. Hannah one-half of the office and formed a partnership under the firm of Drake & Hannah. They continued their weekly publication up to Dec. 8, 1850. On the 9th day of the same month and year they commenced the publication of the Daily and Weekly Tribune and Clipper without a single subscriber on their books, but as soon as the first No. was issued, they obtained nearly as large a subscription as that paper has to this day. Its publication was continued by them up to June 9th, 1852, when Mr. John Hannah, by a division of the office property, became the sole proprietor of the newspaper and continued the same up to September 9th, 1853, at which time he sold the office to Mr. A. McFarland, who continued to publish it up to April 12, 1853, when he associated with him in business, his brother, Dan McFarland, since which time up to the present, the papers have been continued by them under the names of the Daily Evening Tribune, and Portsmouth Weekly Tribune. All these publications were of the old whig school of politics up to the time of the introduction of what was called the Know Nothing Party. The proprietors took sides with that party and continue to advocate its principles up to the present.

The Portsmouth Enquirer was begun by Jordan & Ashley, April 6, 1848, who published two numbers. It was afterwards continued by F. Cleveland & J. Miller, Cleveland and Alex. Pearce, A. Roarock, and Geo. W. Nelson, up to about the middle of June, 1855. The first number of the Daily Dispatch was issued in hand-bill form by Cleveland & Miller, on the 21st of

Nov. 1849. After the first week, it was published in the usual form of four pages, and continued by Cleveland & Miller, Cleveland and Pearce, Pearce, Thompson & Norton, and Geo. W. Nelson, up to some time in October, 1855.

The Ohio Pennant, was issued on the 25th day of August, 1855, by Nelson & Horst, and afterwards by G. W. Nelson alone, and by Bickley & Nelson, and again by Nelson alone, up to June 18th, 1860.

The Daily Democratic Pennant was issued on the 10th day of February, 1866, by Messrs. Bickley & Nelson, and was discontinued on the 30th day of May, 1856.

The Daily Herald was commenced by A. L. Drake in March, 1855, and continued by them until June of the same year, when John Hanna, (now of the Metropolis office, Chillicothe,) bought the establishment and continued the publication of the Herald Daily and Weekly until Feb. 1856, when the establishment was purchased by Shannon Spence & Co. All the paper discontinued.

The first number of the Scioto Valley Republican was issued the first day of September, 1857, by Stephen P. Drake, and continued in his name until Jan. 20th, 1853, when he sold one-half the establishment to Samuel P. Drake, who published the paper under the firm name of S. P. Drake & Co. until April 1, 1866, since which time it has been published by Stephen P. Drake.

The Life Boat, a temperance paper, was established by Jacob Miller in March, 1851. E. Glover and N. H. Parker were his successors. It was discontinued in the fall of 1853. There was a Daily (The Daily News) published in the office for some weeks.

The Greenup Record, was published in the Republican office, (and circulated in Kentucky) commencing April 1st, 1853, and discontinued some time in October, 1857, by S. P. Drake & Co.

The first No. of the Portsmouth Daily Times was

issued on the 2d day June, 1856, by Messrs. Shannon, Hoy & Co.

The present publisher of the Republican seems to be the oldest publisher, now engaged in the business, in the city. He has lived here long enough to see many of the ups and downs of his brethren of the press, and has asked the compiler of this book to say to his readers that he is much indebted to the inhabitants of Portsmouth and surrounding country for their many acts of kindness and liberality extended to him. These acts he says are carefully laid up in the basket of a grateful heart. He hopes long to continue the same friendly and agreeable intercourse with them, and he hopes it will be to the mutual advantage of both editor and people for him to do so.

Dan'l Boon, the paper says died, in Boon settlement, in Missouri Sept 1818, while watching a deer lick, with his gun in his hand.  
Sept 2, 1818, Wm Lodwick & Co. advertises Dry Goods for sale.  
Aug 10, 1818 Henry Coto, advertises Ohio Hotel, Benjamin Melcher calls upon his customers to come and settle. Lari McDougal carries on the Wheel and Carting making business.  
Sept. 23d, Josiah Shackford, Dan'l Corwin, Wilson Giles, Geo. Clark, John H. Thornton, Jas. Abbott and A. G. Sargent give notice to farmers that they have commenced building a flouring mill in Portsmouth. Jas Salisbury advertises a stock of Saddlery.

Peter Kehoe calls on his customers to come and settle up, and advertises a stock of Boots and Shoes.  
The population of Cincinnati is set down as less than the Spy, at 9,120.  
Geo. W. Offiers offers to sell lands within 32 1/2 miles of Portsmouth in 3 rare lots at a low price.  
A notice in the Gazette of Nov. 5, 1818, reads as follows: "We are sorry to inform our readers that two wagon loads of Specie left here yesterday for Philadelphia, intended to replenish the coffers of the Ingber bank.—Chillicothe Supporter."

December, 10, 1818.—The editor says the Ohio river presents an animated and interesting appearance. At this place we have a prospect of about 3 miles, and while writing there are no less than 18 boats in sight, in fact there had hardly been so many in the last four or five days when there were less than 5 or 6 in sight.  
"Now Orleans is said to have increased in population full three-fourths since its annexation to the United States and now contains 40,000 inhabitants. It is thought the Yellow Fever would not be quoin there under a proper system of police, & all this thought will be so far improved by next season & so gradually to contribute to its extinction.—Portsmouth Gazette, Dec. 1819

March 20, 1820, Silas Cole and Rowell Orain, as parties, that an application will be made to the next Court of Common Pleas, to have the town of Alexandria vacated.

July 4th, 1820. At a "grand celebration" an oration was delivered by S. M. Tracy and toasts offered by Dr. Horsey, Gen. Bondall, Major Wheeler and others.

In March 25, 1820, in relation to the settlement of the Missouri Compromise, the Scioto Telegraph says: "From our Congressional reports the reader will perceive that the Missouri question is at length determined. Although we cannot congratulate ourselves, yet as a majority in both houses, have decided the bill shall pass without restriction, it becomes us, although we do it with reluctance, to accede to the measure.— The existence of slavery in so considerable a portion of the United States is an evil of the greatest magnitude, and a stain on our national character, which it would be difficult to justify or efface, and its further extension ought to be prevented."
