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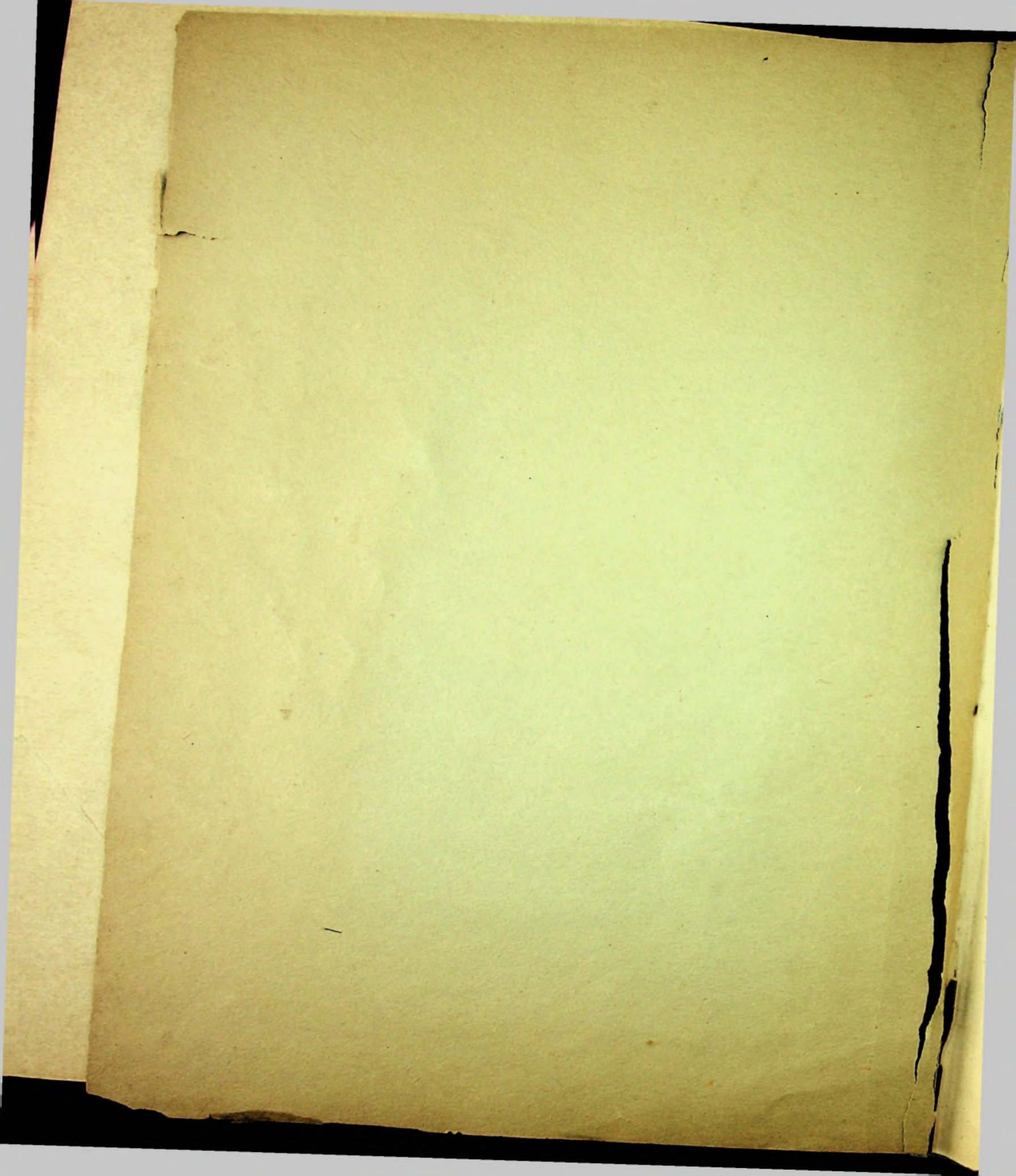

Lindsay School was built in 1927. It was named after John Lindsay, whose family was the second family to settle in Scioto County. The family came from Manchester in 1796 and built their home at the mouth of the Little Scioto River next to the Marshalls who was the first family to settle in Scioto County. It is in honor of this pioneer and his family who endured the hardships of the wilderness of Scioto County that we name our school, Lindsay School.

EIGHTH GRADE

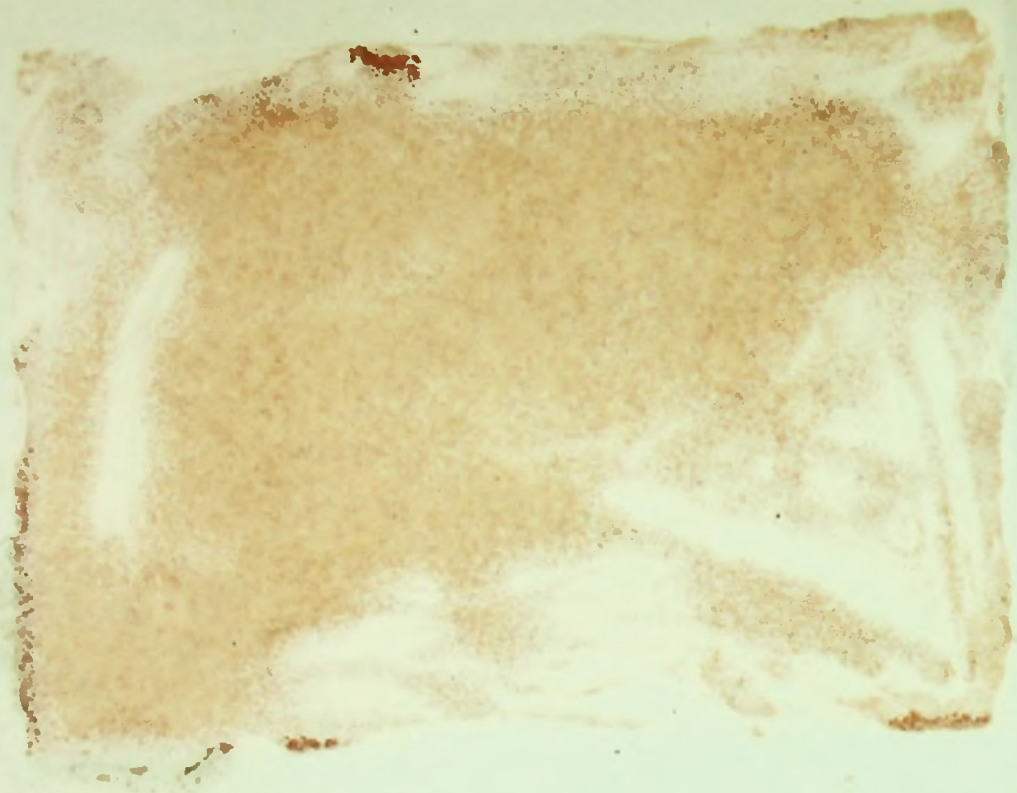

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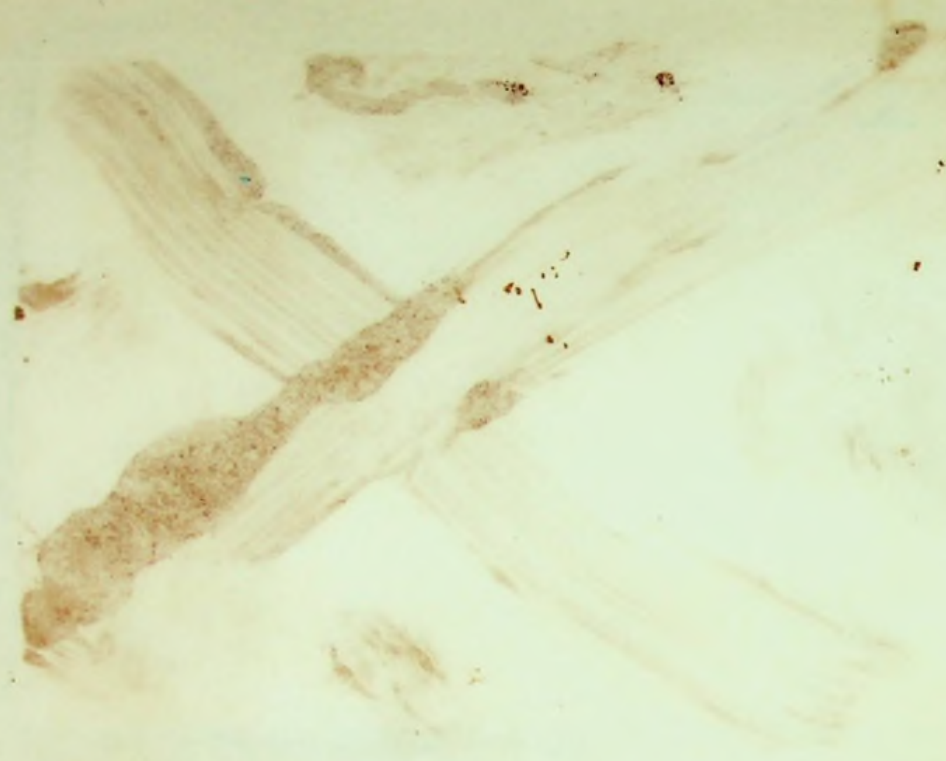
The Seventh Grade class has had an interesting year and if it were not for the heat and spring fever we would not mind staying on.

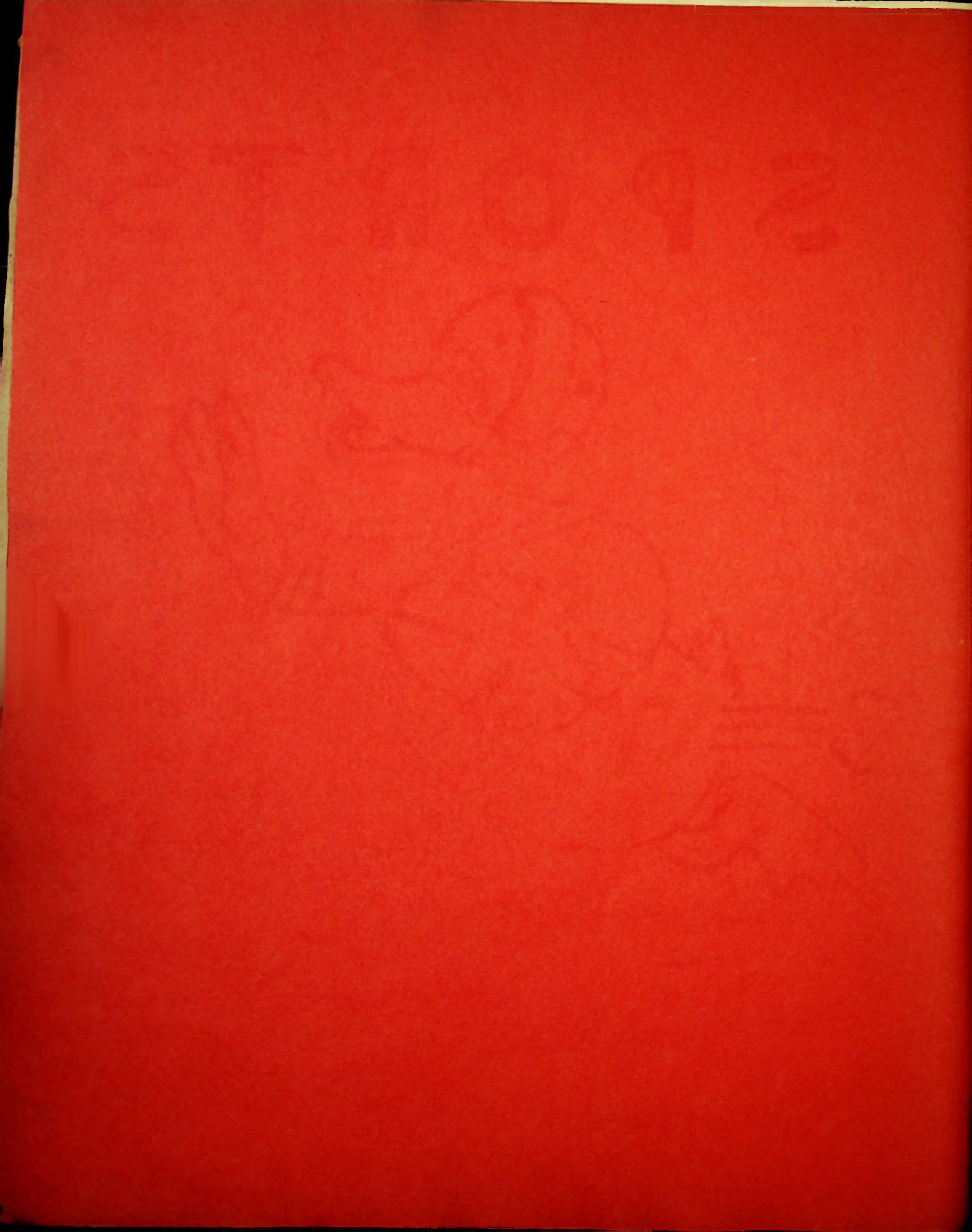
The thirty-five girls and boys from the seventh and eighth grades were directed in this operetta by Mr. Bricker and Miss Whitworth, who also played the accompaniment.
