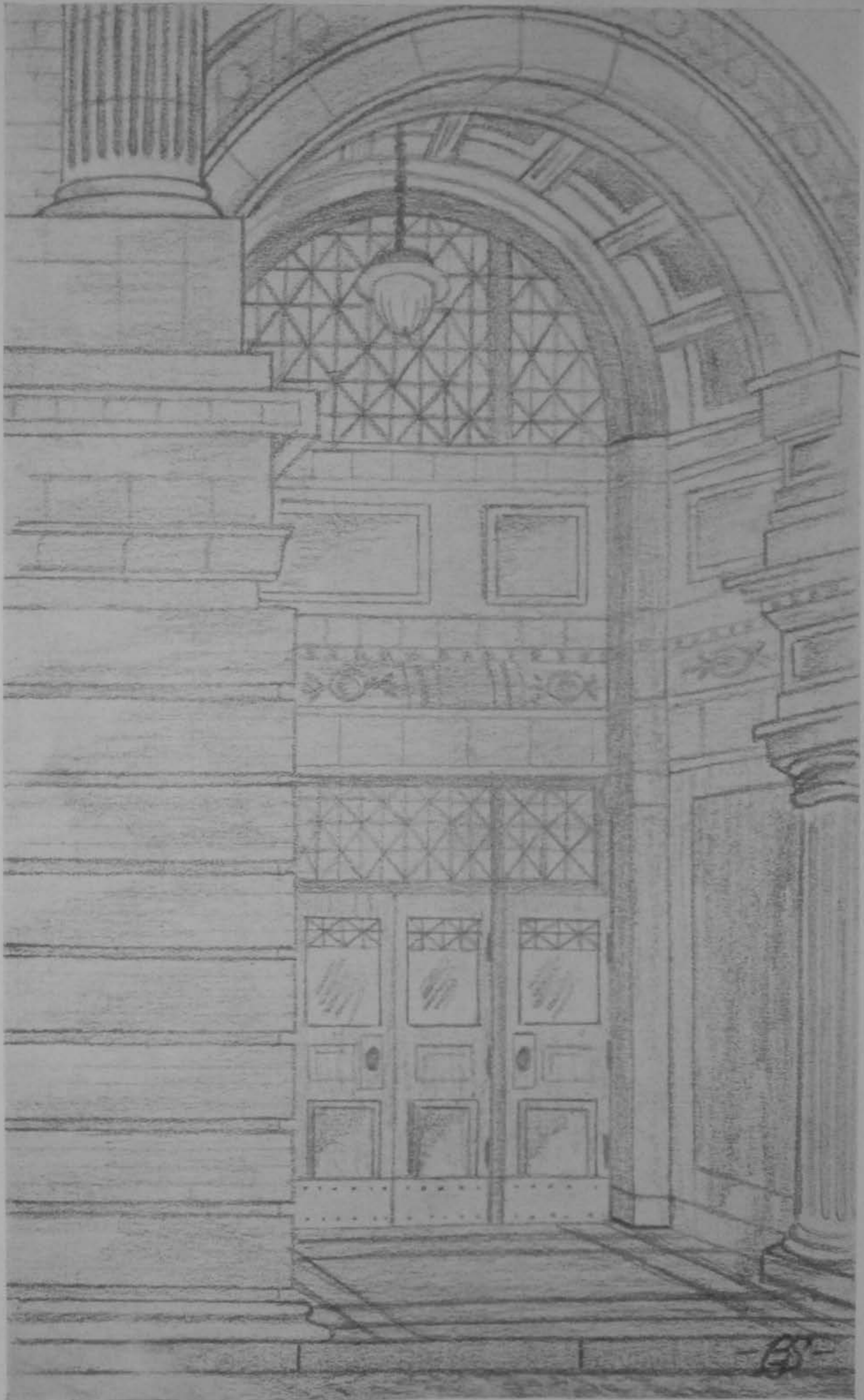

REALIZING the value of the band in the school's musical life, and wishing this organization success in the coming years, we, the members of the class of 1933, dedicate this Trojan to

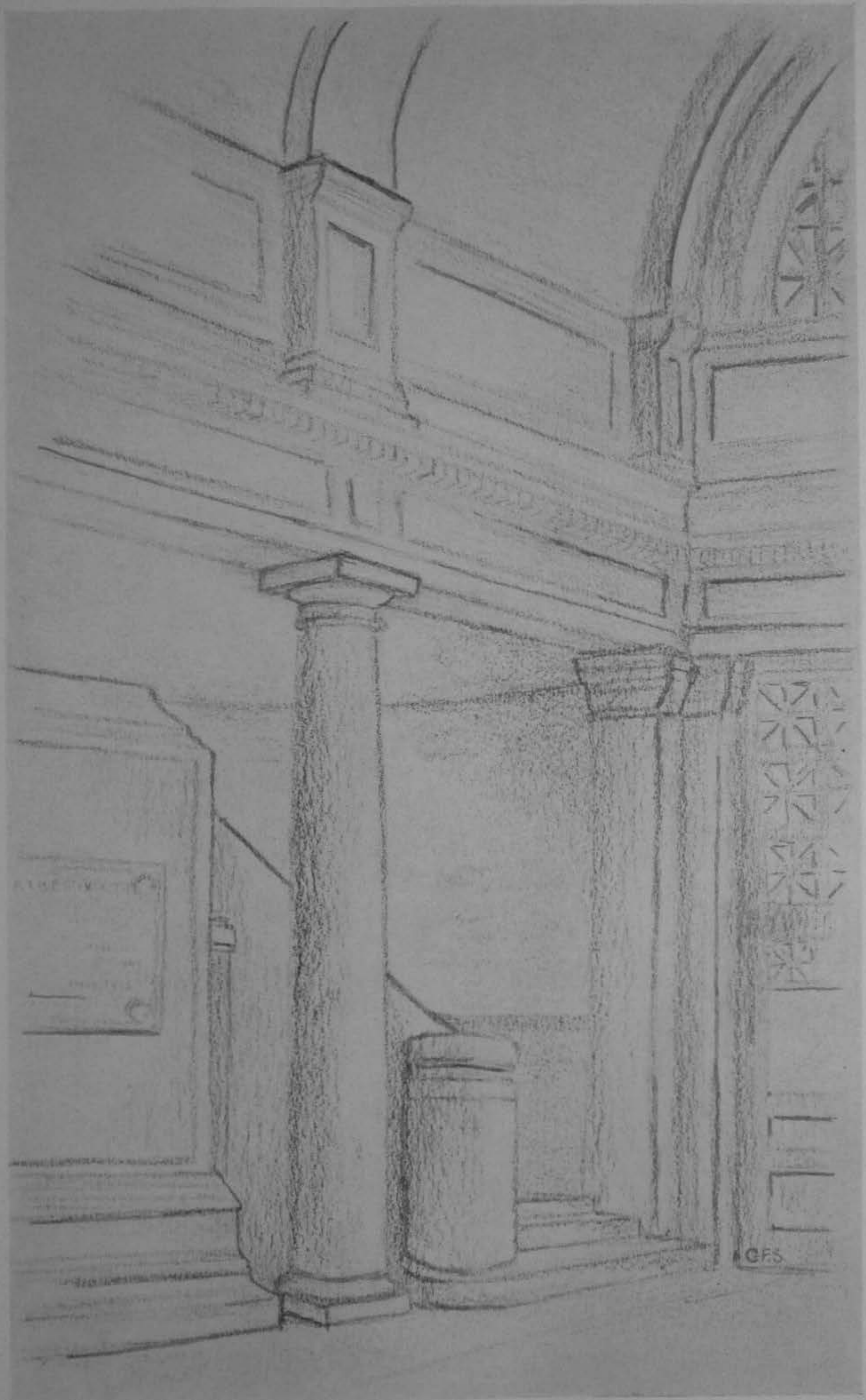

C. SHERMAN DALE has been principal of Portsmouth High School for five years, putting forth his supreme efforts to increase the curricula, to aid the faculty in any difficulties which they might encounter, and to improve the state-wide standing of the school.

MRS. LEONA W. FELSTED in the capacity of dean of girls has promoted their interests for two years. Through the Girls' League she has encouraged better morale and has been a perfect friend to the girls of the High School. The various council and personality-rating work of the dean has given her an unusually fine reputation as a dean of girls.

A heavy shadow was cast over Portsmouth High School and the community at large on April 13, 1933, when the death of Miss Margaret Ricker occurred. Miss Ricker was a member of the original staff of teachers in Portsmouth High School. 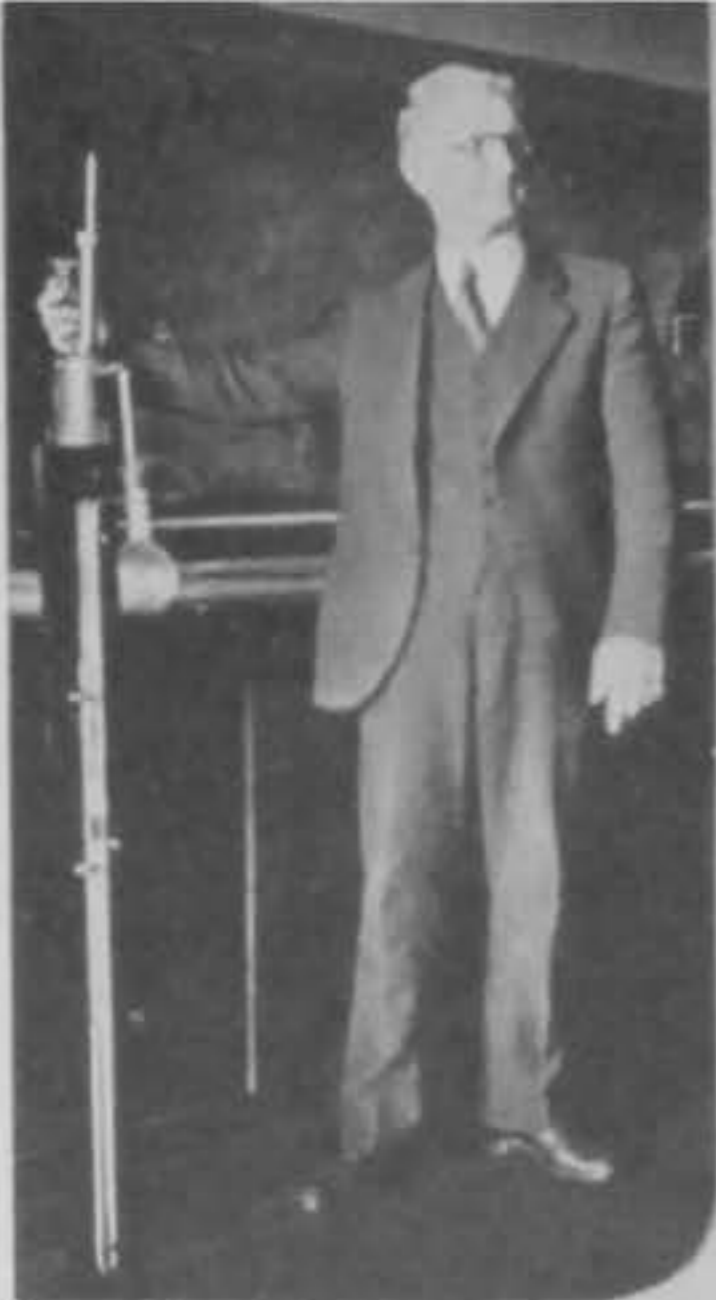

After electing Don Ferguson as president and choosing Miss Bell and Miss Ball as advisors, the class began their social activities with a Christmas party, and a Spring Dance the following April. Nor was their Sophomore year any less interesting. With James

Newman at the helm, they presented the play "Oh Kay"! and sponsored a skating party, closing the year with a peppy school dance.

Assembling in 320 for their Junior year, the class elected Charles Dearth, president, again choosing Miss Bell as sponsor aided by Mr. Pitts and Mr. Massie. The editing of the Echo, a Hallowe'en Dance, full of fun and surprises for all; the delightful dramatic production "Take My Advice", a novelty Leap Year Dance in the spring with the girls acting as escorts, filled out an exciting and full year climaxed by entertaining the Seniors with a Junior-Senior Banquet as their last class function as Juniors.

After giving a "spooky" Hallowe'en Dance, the Seniors played Santa Claus by entertaining the school with a Christmas Assembly. A large "April Fool" sign served as decorations for the delightful spring dance. To perfect the year, the commencement play, "Her Friend the King", coached by Miss Pfau, was given for the enjoyment of a large audience. The 1933 annual staff composed of members of the Senior class has published the year book under the supervision of Miss Kauffman, who gave much of her time and effort to this work. And so, graduation rolled around and on May the Fourth, the class of 1933 bade P. H. S. a fond adieu.

Witness: They result in student cooperation, student training in leadership and citizenship, student responsibility, and efficiency in school government.

Among the activities which it has sponsored have been the senior guide organization and the personality—plus councils for freshmen orientation; a leisure time conference directing attention to the increasing need for a higher type of activity to fill leisure hours; a vocational conference emphasizing vocational motives in general, with the fundamental principles underlying success in any field; a social program encouraging more complete participation on the part of girls attending these functions.

An interesting feature of the year's program was the series of films depicting woman's place in business and industry which gave a clearer view of woman's part in the economic world.

The social program included the "mixers" for incoming Freshmen in September and January; a "kid" party, a "backwards" party, and a "job" party, the annual mother-daughter tea during the Christmas season, a series of teas during the leisure-time conference, and a tea honoring newly elected officers in April. Special ceremonies installing new officers, senior guides and senior honor counsellors for the year 1933-34 concluded the year's activities of the League.

DALE played four games and made a fine showing. He is a graduating Senior, and so will not be back next year.

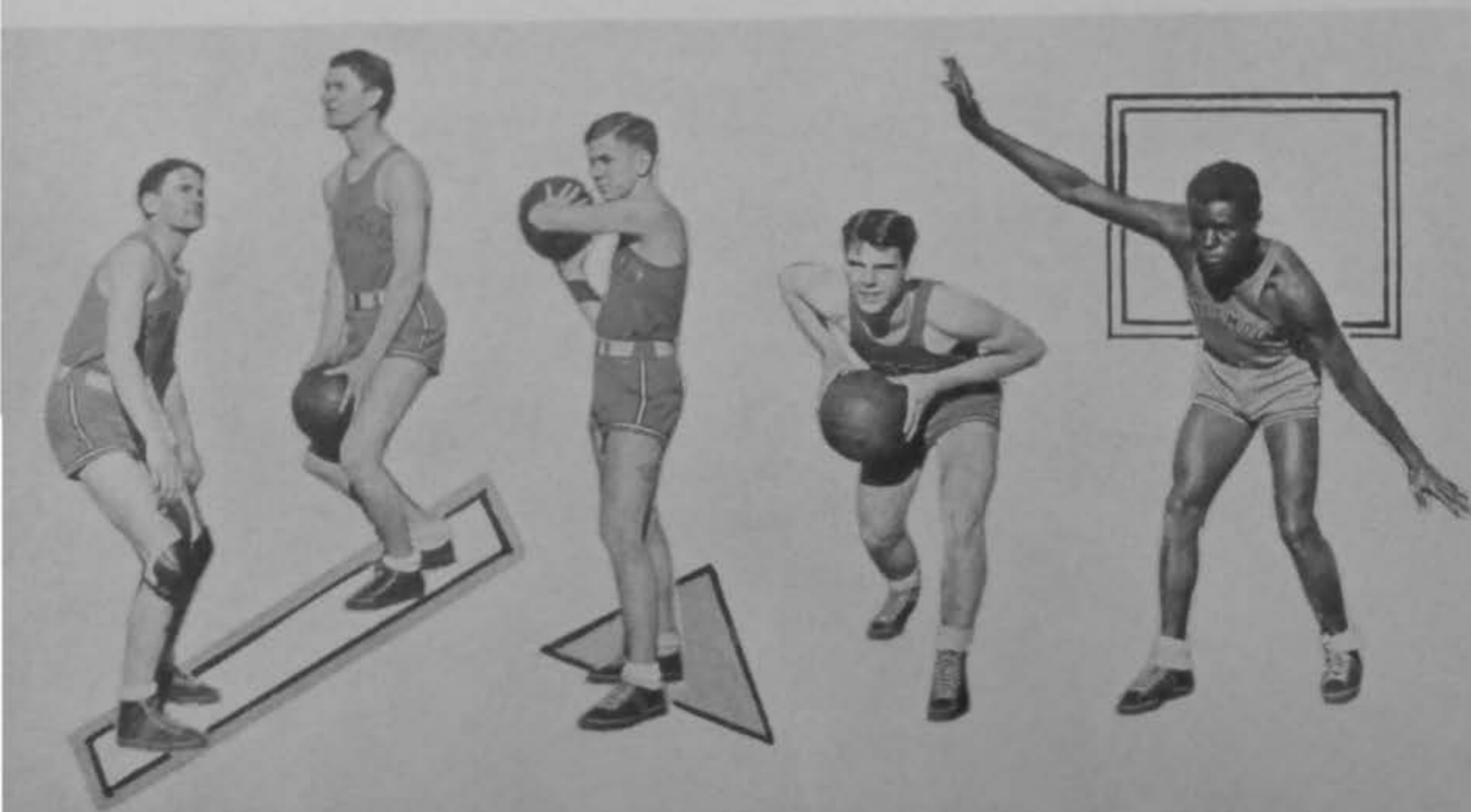
HOTZ made an impressive debut in mid-season, advancing from the Tots to the Varsity. Many times during the latter part of the season he was the high point man.

Undefeated in 17 games, the Trojan Tots, the newest addition of a basketball team to Portsmouth High School, completed their first season.

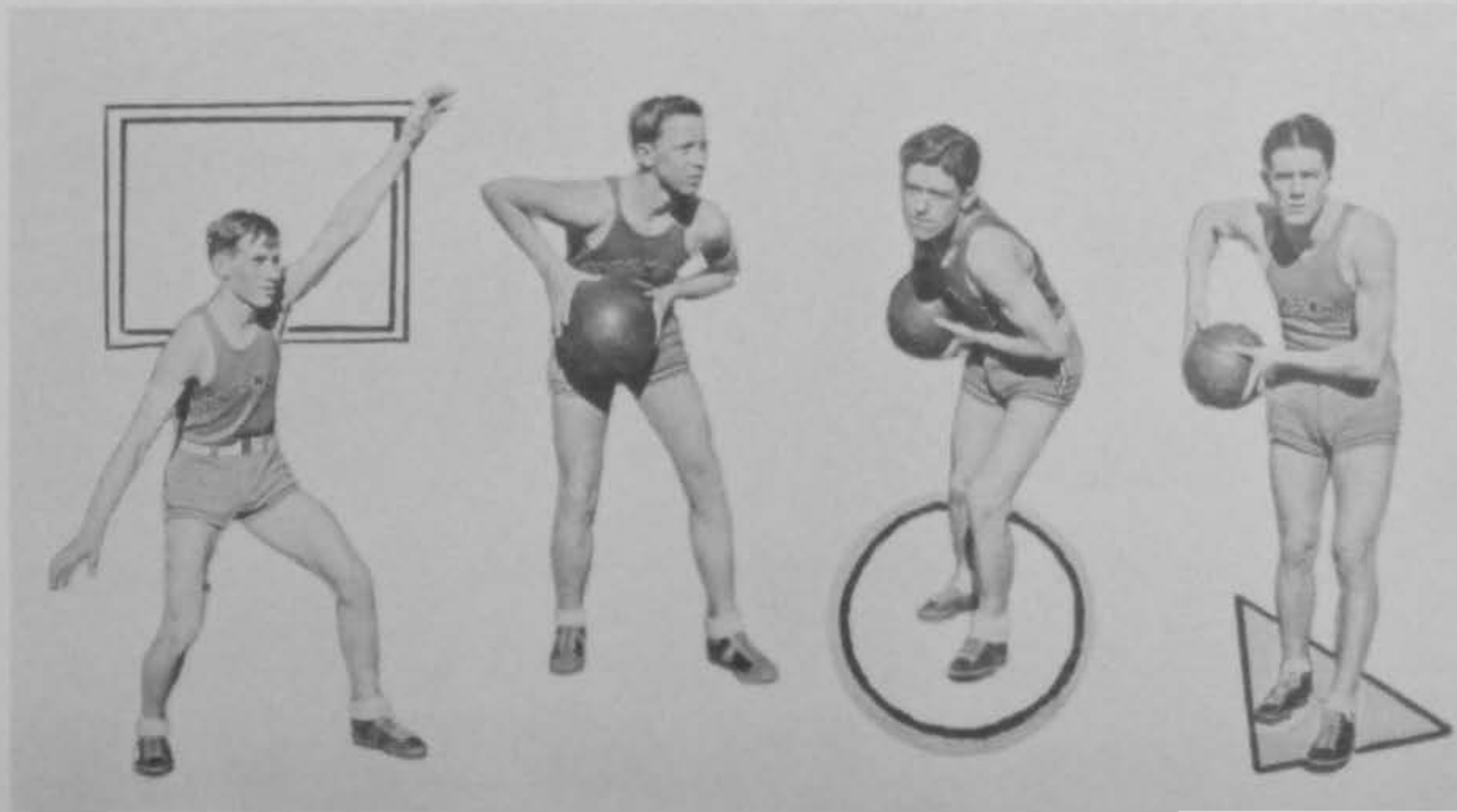

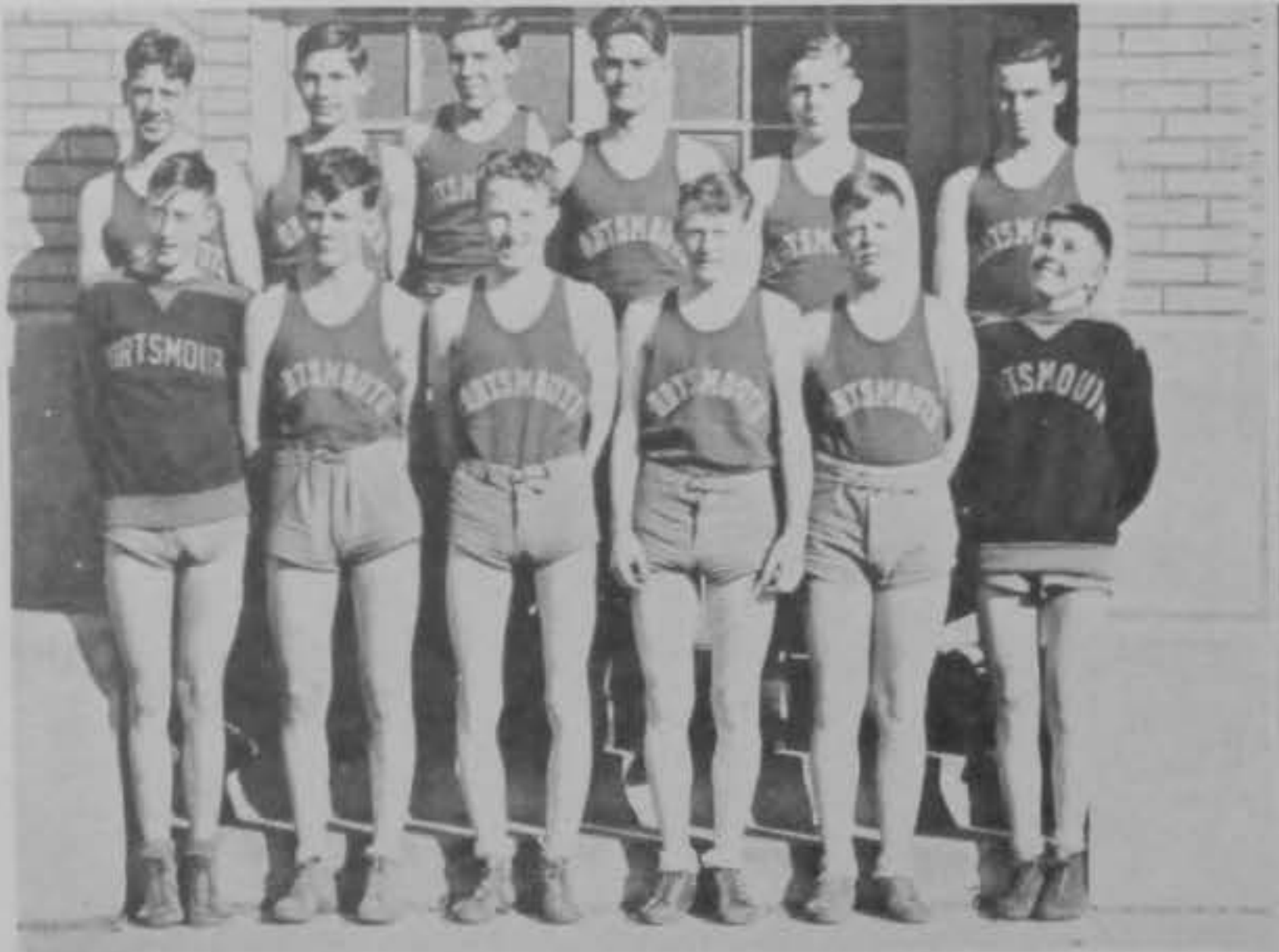

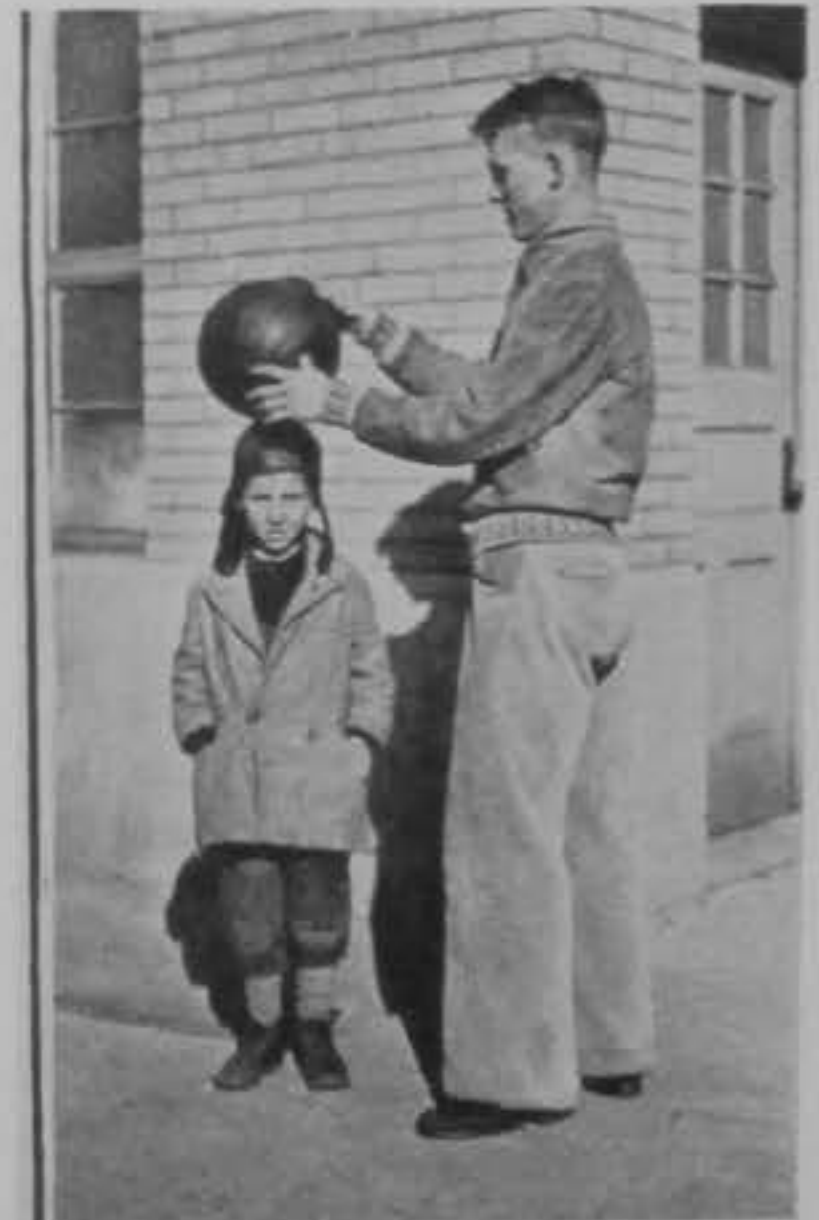

DOROTHY DARRAH—"Dot" plays a fast and furious game of guard. She is a veteran on the Varsity, and proved herself a valuable player.

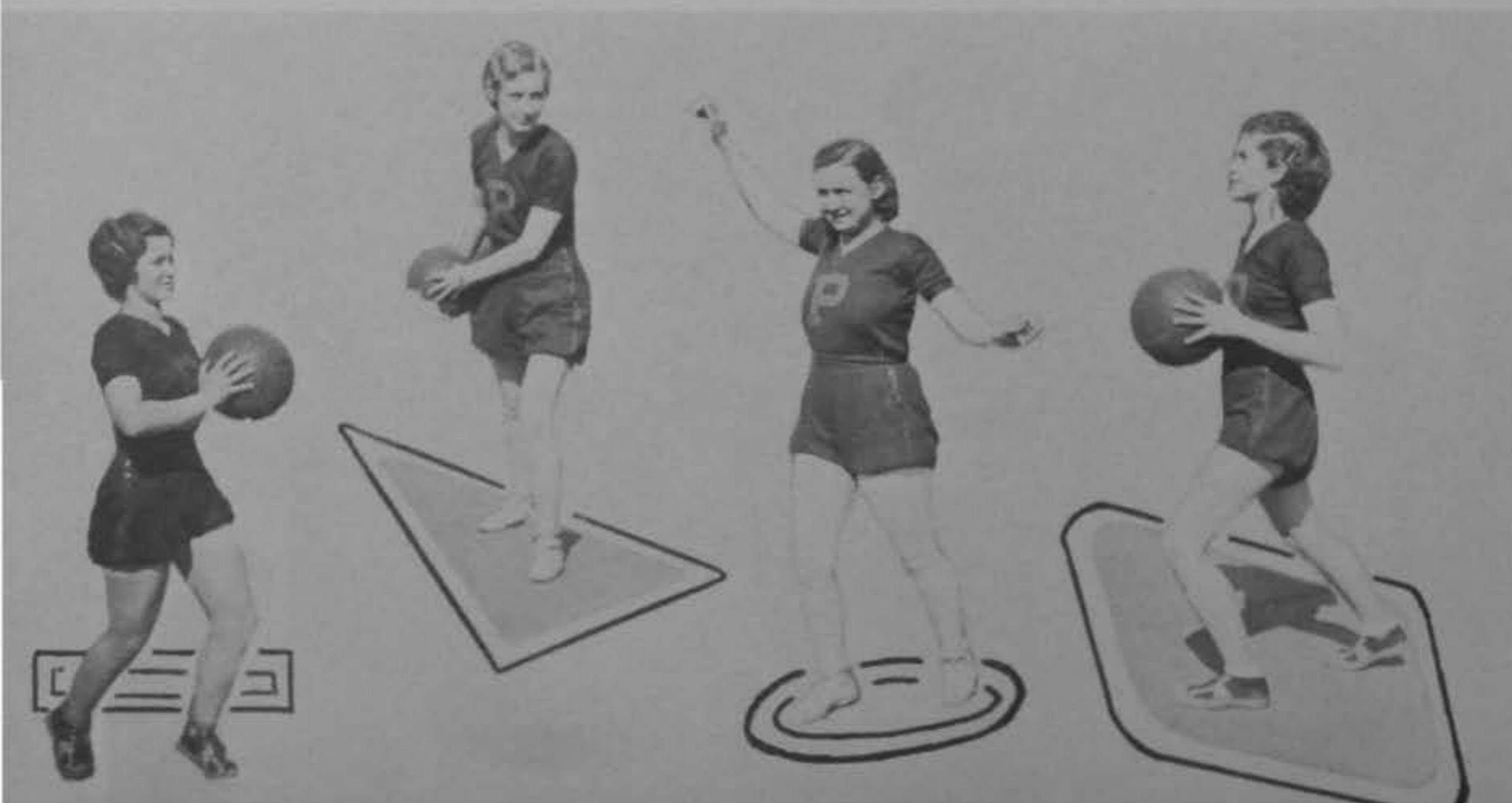
BETTY McFARLAND—The first sub on the Varsity this year was Betty. She was a quick and snappy forward, and never let down.

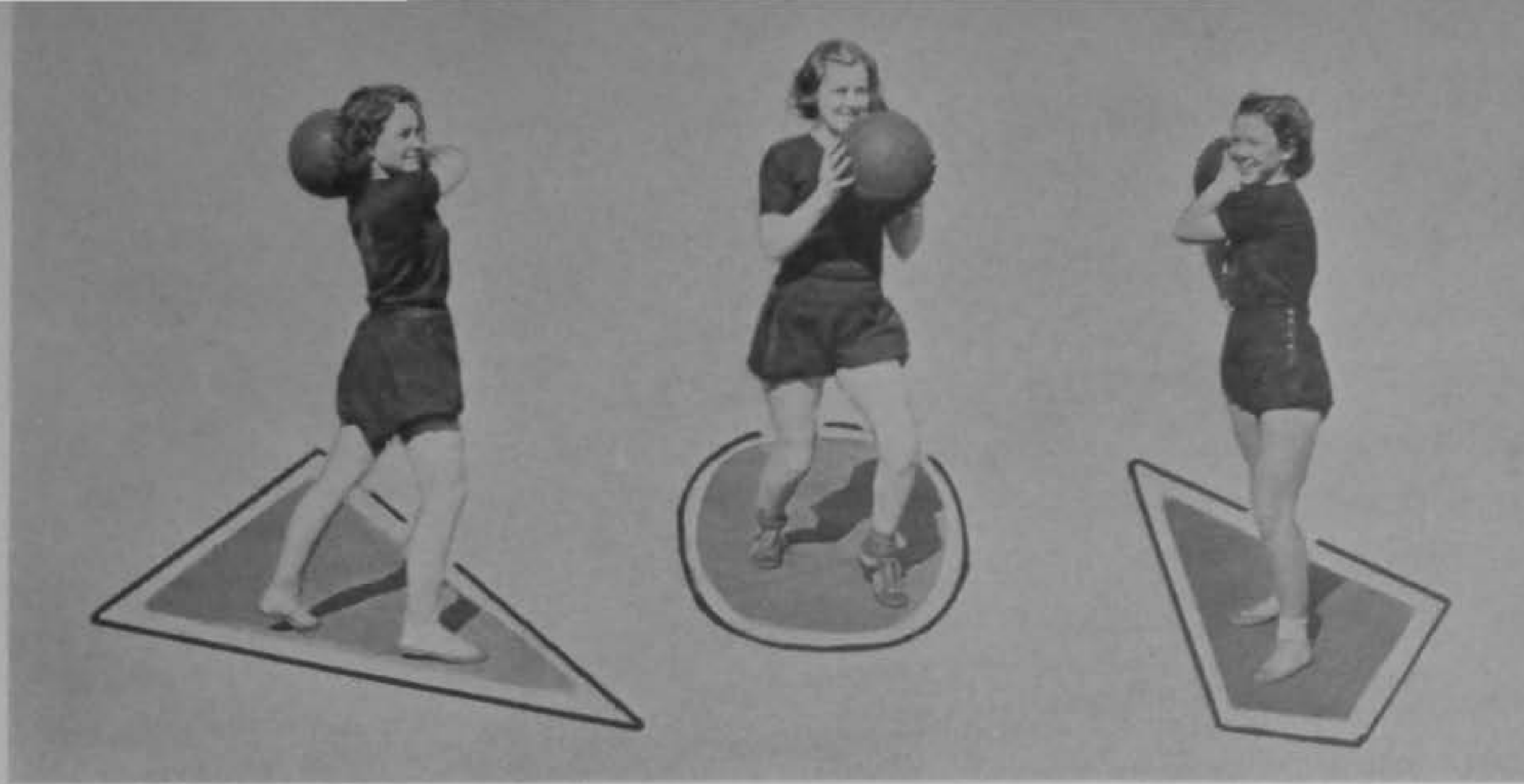

There have been few opportunities this year for the girls to bowl other teams, but strong competition has existed among the girls themselves.

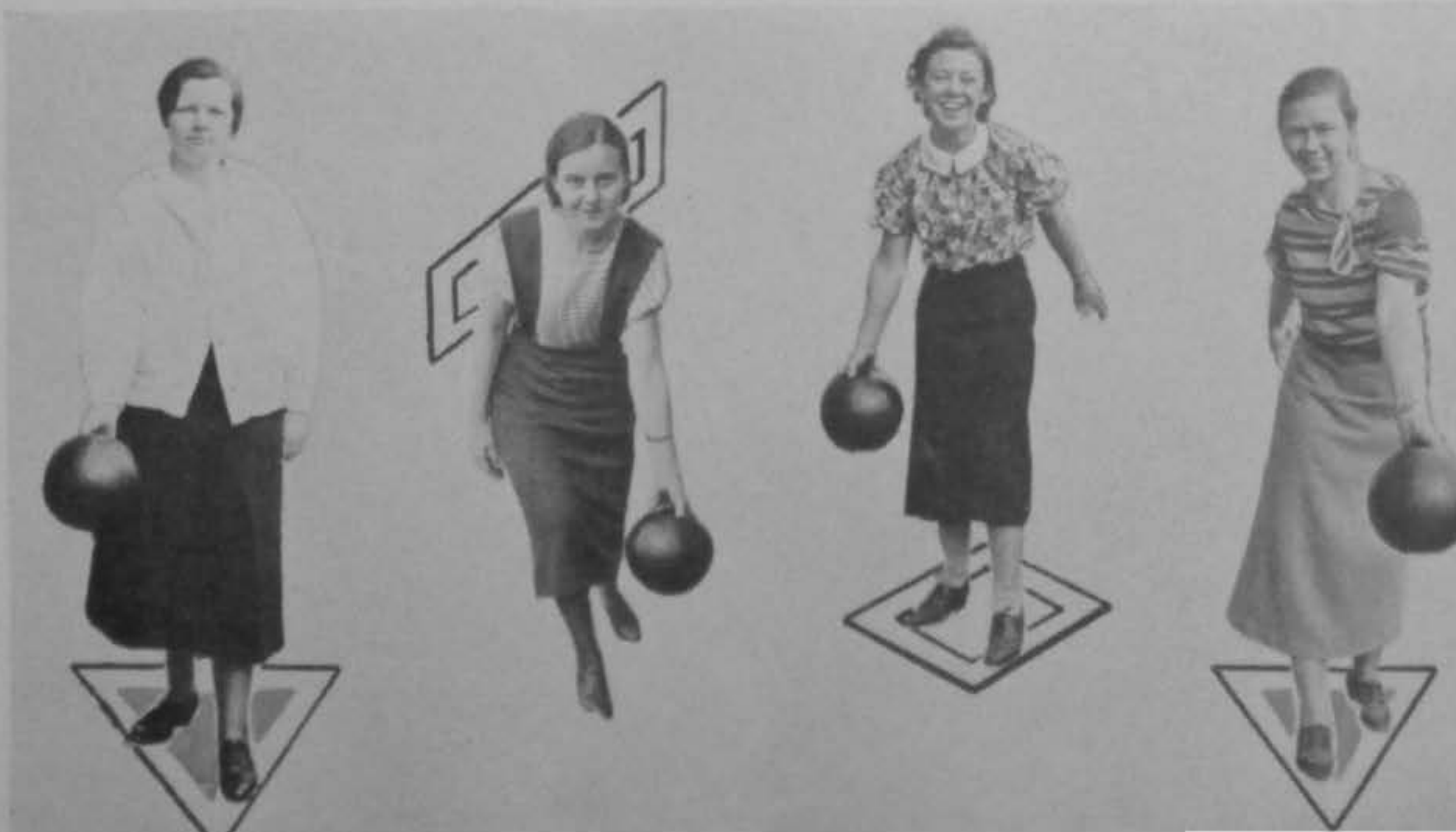

The Rise of Portsmouth High

Did you think that Portsmouth High School was, is, and will be always the same, from the lunch room to 317, and the new gym to 308? All things must start, but how? When? Where? And why? Let us turn back 100 pages of the book of time and follow the steps.

Portsmouth was incorporated as a town in 1815: Right away some ambitious lads and lassies decided that even though they were living in a wilderness, they must be educated.

Henry Massie, who was a relative of Mr. Massie, the present day Chemistry teacher, donated some land to the town for school purposes.

Have you felt that our seats could not be harder if they were made of brick, and that our desks were as rough as a relief map of the Rocky mountains? In the first school, the pupils sat on benches which were made of slabs, had riven legs, and no backs! The desks were wide boards adjusted against the wall, where the scholars took turns at writing. They also served as receptacles for hats, bonnets and shawls, dinner baskets and buckets. There was a large fireplace, which, however, never suffered for lack of fuel, because there was an adjacent forest where the big "he-men" boys were ambitious to display their skill with an ax, while the shy little girls giggled behind their bonnets, looked-on and selected their heroes. The subjects taught in this institution of learning were, reading, writing, arithmetic, and grammer. This was a very select "pay school" which only those who could produce the tuition fee might attend.

In 1829 Mr. Kelley taught the first free school, which, however, survived only three months, because of the lack of funds. The pioneers in learning did not despair, but in 1836 tried the experiment again with Mr. Morrill as its teacher. In the same year the girls, who must have been of a slightly different temperament from those of today, decided that they preferred to attend a strictly feminine school, and used the upper floor of an All Saint's Church building for the "Seminary".

After two years of this, the Board of Education softened their hearts and purchased the Seminary for a general school. Mr. Child became the first superintendent in 1839. The population of the school thrived until by 1842 there were 36 members between the ages of 15 and 20.

By this time Portsmouth had grown up and was no longer a little village, having become a city in 1851. With the new dignity upon them, our forefathers felt they must have a high school. So, one was instituted in 1853 with J. H. Poe as the first principal and S. M. Heslet as superintendent. It was reorganized in 1857 until the course of studies included spelling, arithmetic, English grammar, and American History. A small class of more advanced scholars took up physical geography, and a class of Latin was formed.

Have you heard the complaints of the overcrowded conditions in P. H. S. today? In 1870 the high school had an enrollment of 59 pupils who were accommodated in one large room with the aid of the library room. In that year four people graduated from the Senior Class. By 1875, when Mr. Lukens was principal, the enrollment had increased to 96 and it was necessary to hire two teachers.

Meanwhile the number of subjects taught was also increasing. By 1877 besides some of the subjects that are taught today, German, philosophy, botany, trigonometry, surveying, geology, and English History were to be had.

Between 1872-1896 school was held in the Salters building. Among the principals occurs the familiar name of Miss Emily Ball. Six teachers taught in the old Davis building between 1896 and 1910. In 1912 a part of the present day high school was built. The building there remained unchanged until 1922 when the part including the new gym, 320 and 220, was added. In 1928 C. S. Dale became our principal, and so closes this little history of P. H. S.

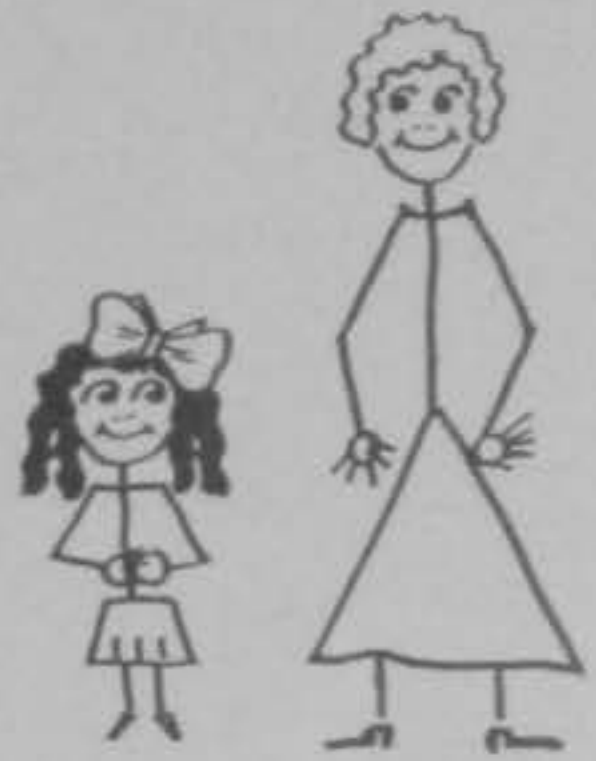
DEAR EVERYBODY—

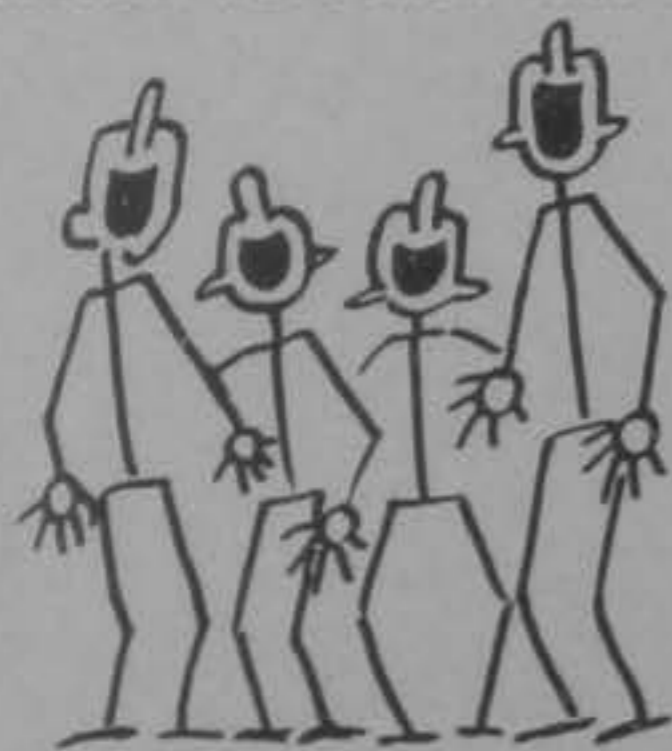
DEAR PORCHUN—

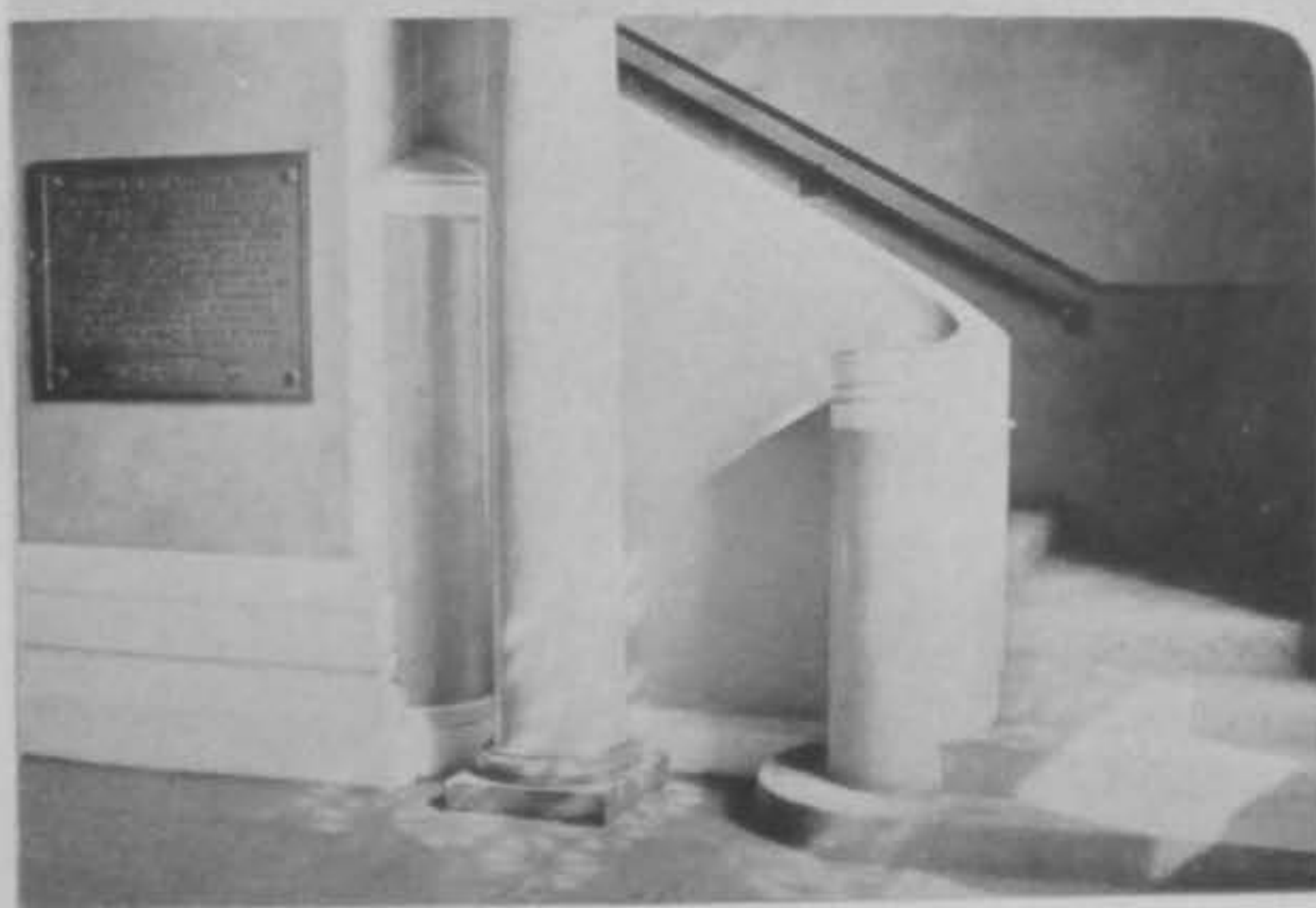

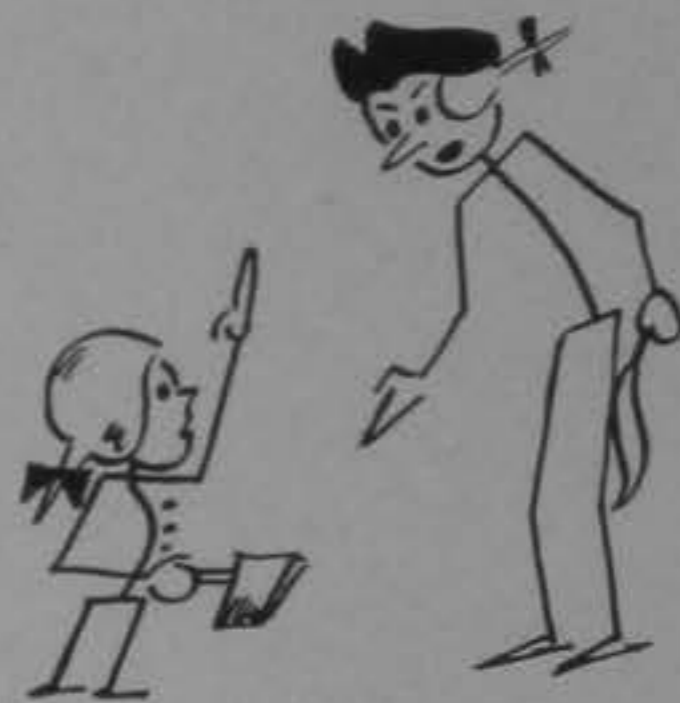
Has prosperity returned or did the teachers just get paid? Mr. Massie has sported a new suit lately. You should see him!

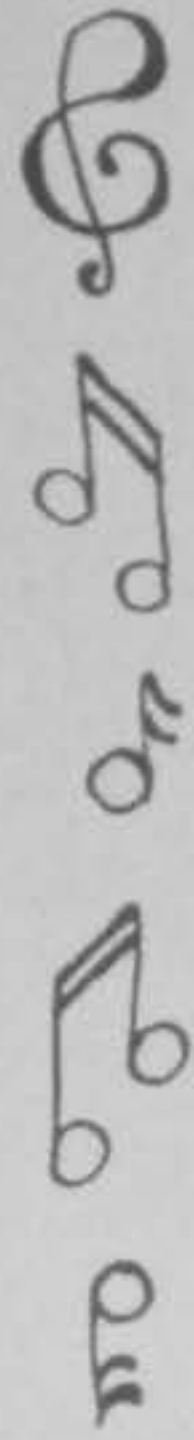
The Girls' League is at it again. They had a special movie showing the various working conditions in the different periods of our history.
