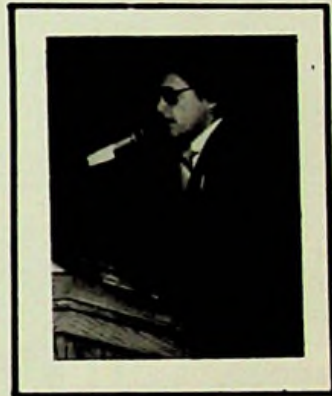


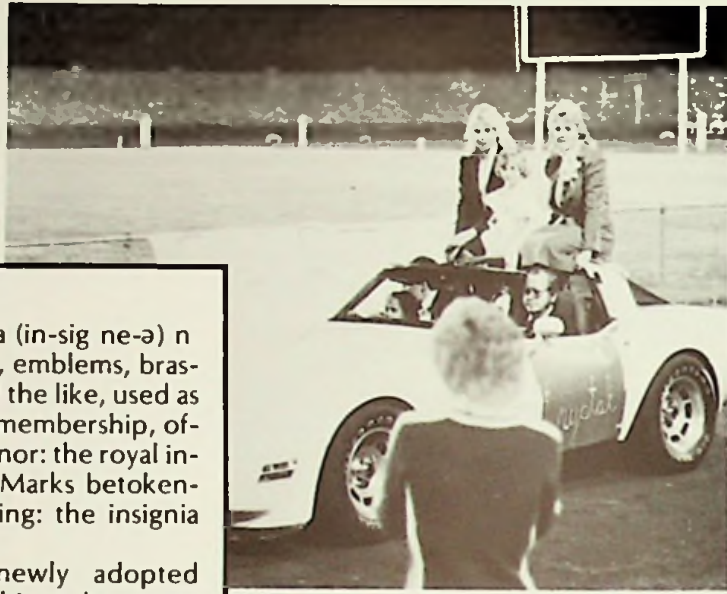

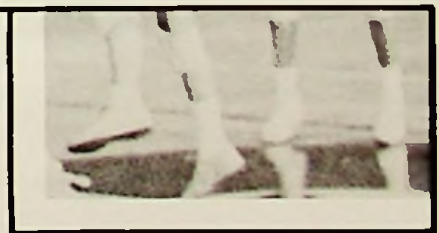

Such organizations are the boys and girls basketball and the musical which was "Hello Dolly".



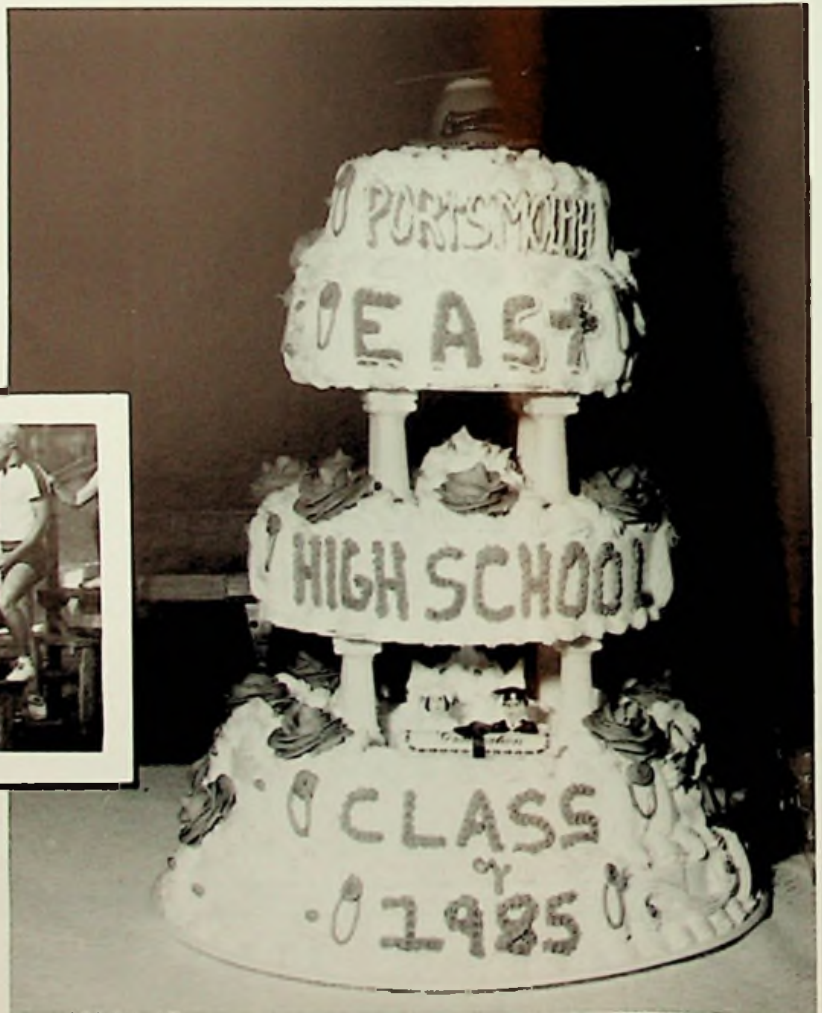
All of these happenings are very special and produce a lot of enjoyment for all who participate and those who attend.

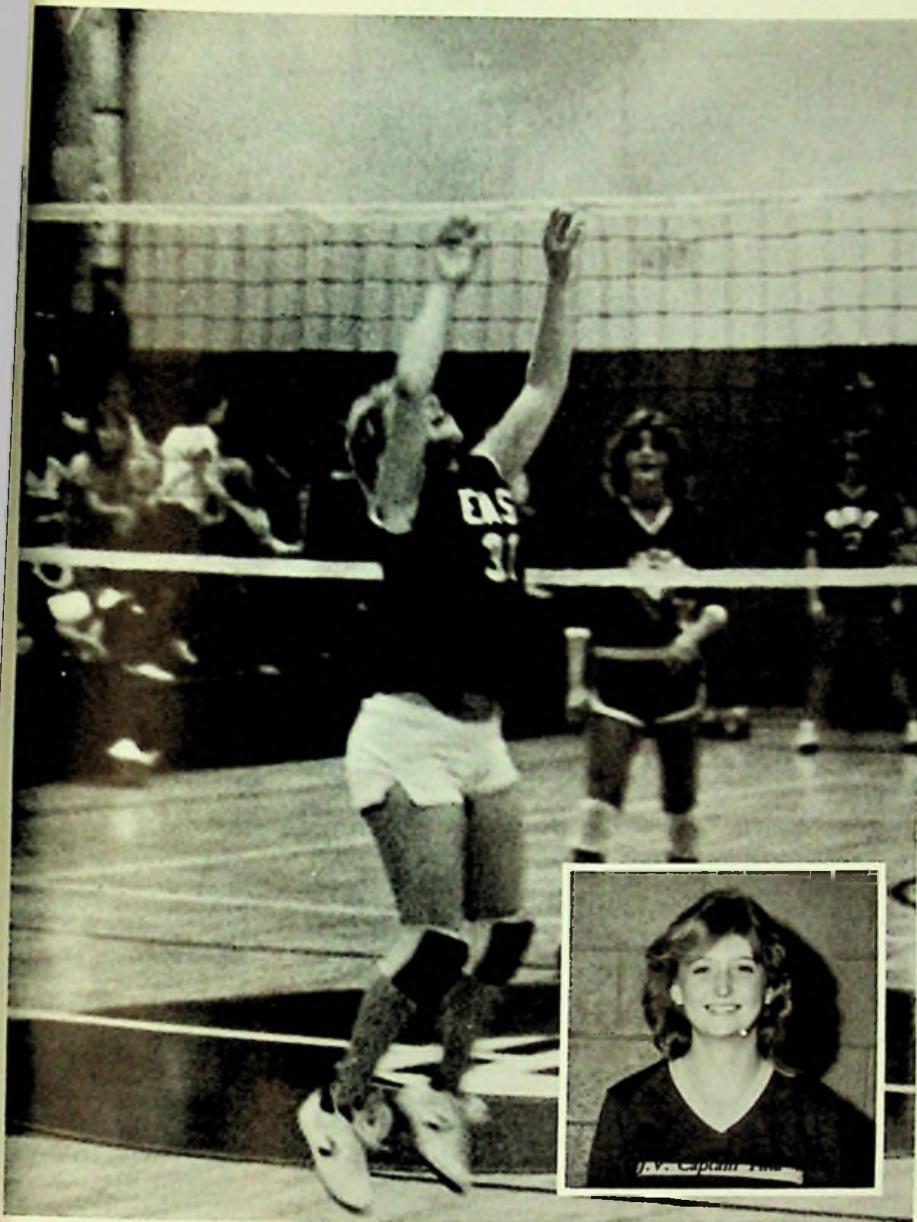

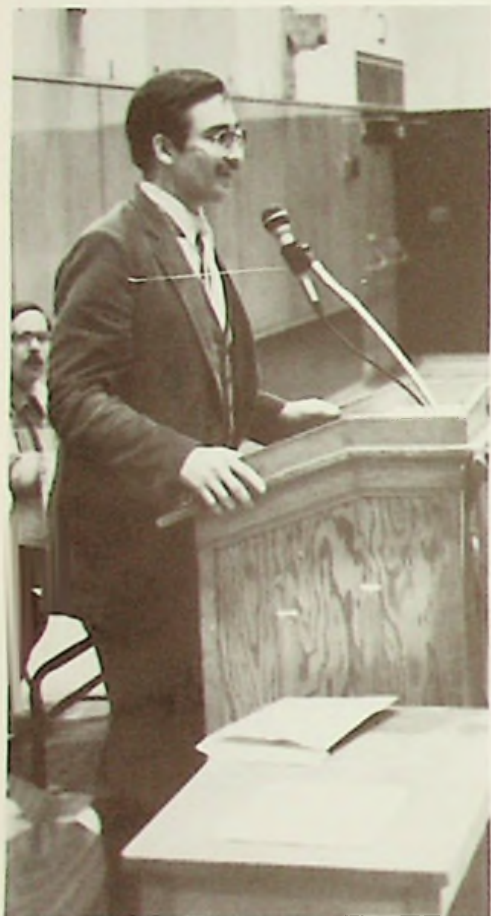

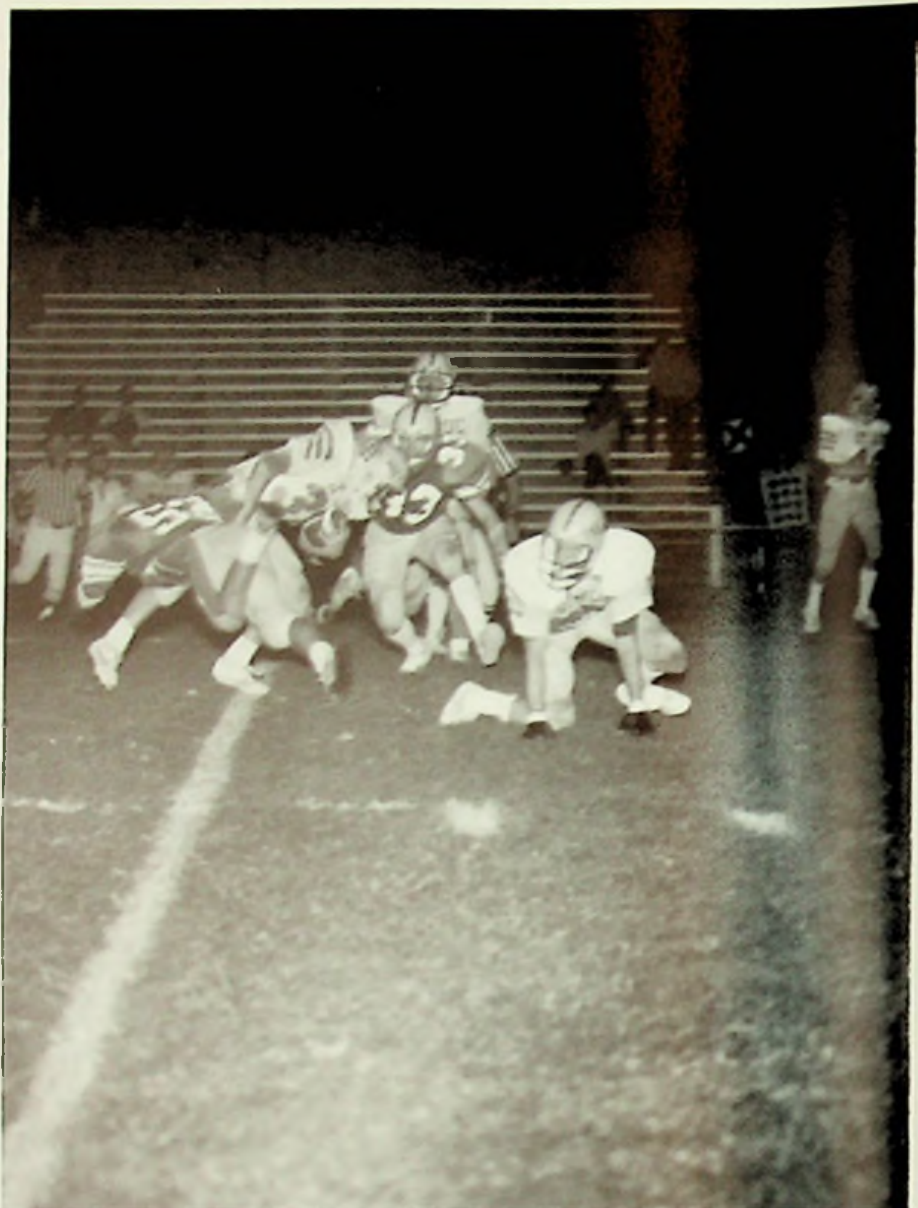

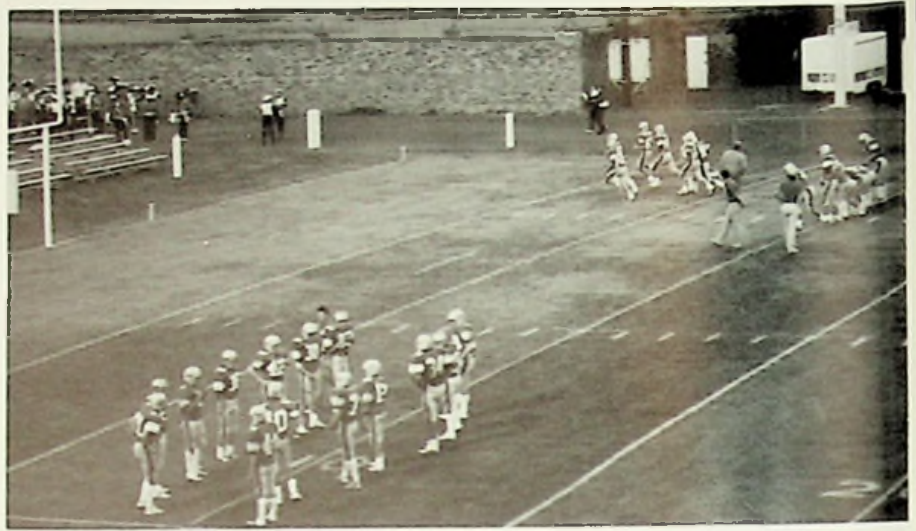

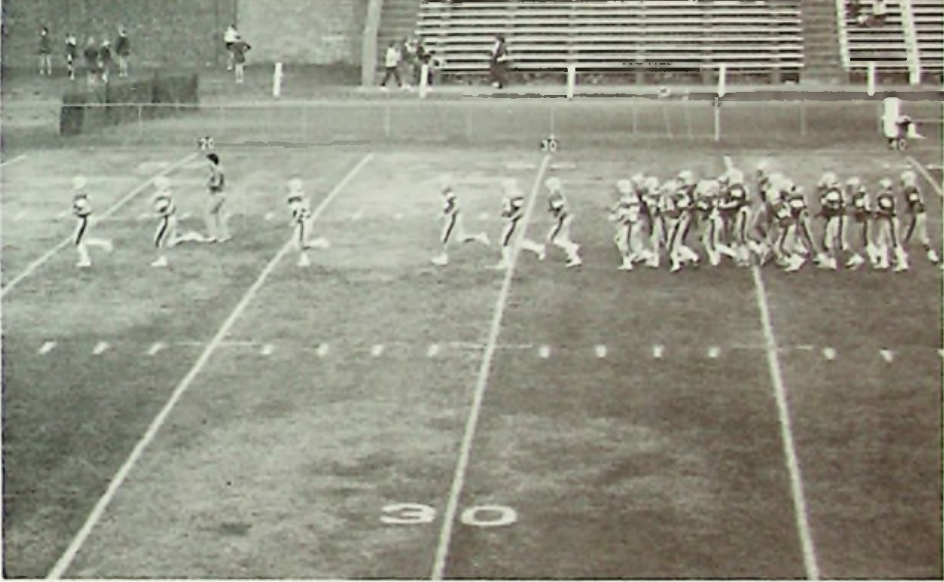

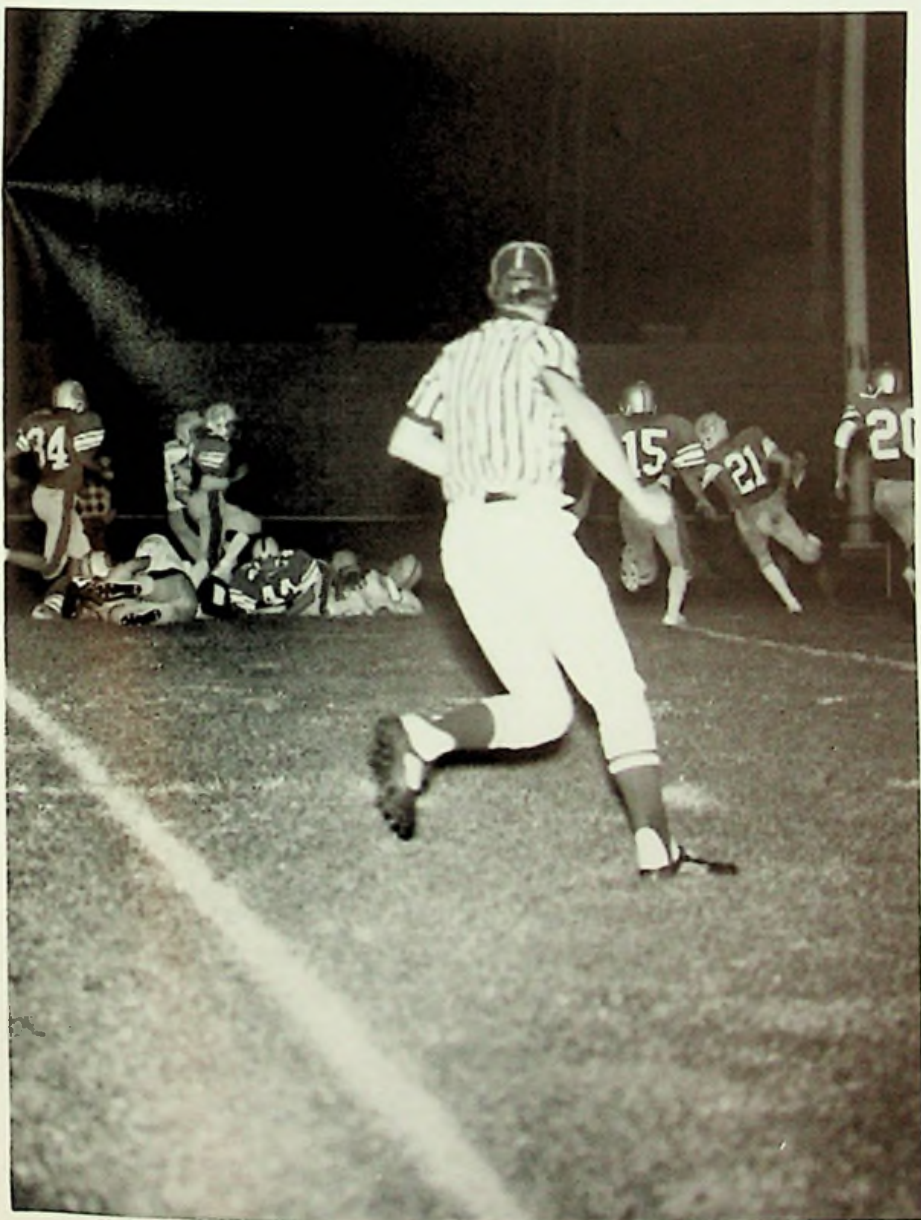

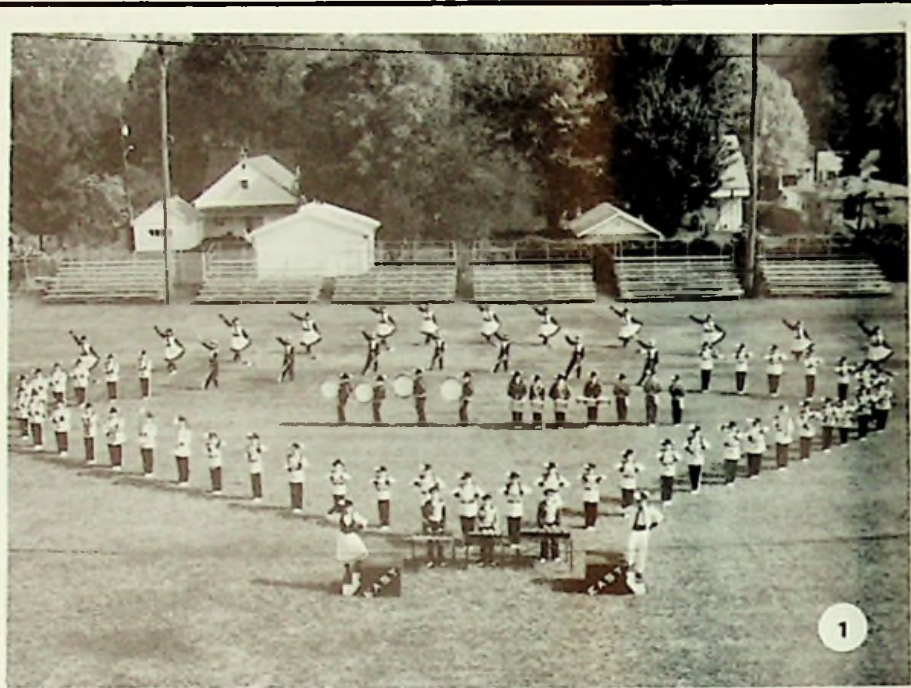
DREAMS DO COME TRUE!

For the Seniors it was our last marching band season, and it was by far our best and most memorable. We ended it by making a dream come true. For five years we had been working for something we wanted and that was to win Grand Champion over bands much larger than ours. We'll never forget the feeling that day at the RockHill Competition when Mr. Horton told us that "today we could do it, and if we did what he knew we could, we would walk away Grand Champs".

We cried before we even left the warm-up area. It was a great feeling, all of us pulling together for something we wanted so much. But with the never-ending support of Mr. Horton, our cheering section, and the determination and love we felt between us, we won Grand Champion that day along with first place Band, first place Drum Major, first Rifles, second Flags, first place Percussion, and Best Overall Marching and Maneuvering. Oh, did we celebrate!

Something like that doesn't just happen. It takes hard work, dedication, and alot of "one more times" (which by Kentuckian definition actually means at least five!). Our season started the first Monday in August learning the music 9:00-12:00. The second week of August we began music rehearsal from 9:00-12:00, and fundamental marching 1:00-3:00, while fighting the bugs in the bottoms. Then in the third week of August we held our camp, which is where we put it all together. Camp took place at North Moreland Elementary School from 9:00-4:00. There we were taught the marching drills written by Phil Shepard, and percussion finally finished recruiting those poor unfortunate souls who had no idea what they were in for. The blacktop we marched on sure was hot, but the dreams of swimming pools and enormous glasses of pop kept us going! Even the eighth graders made it, although they were beginning to fear for their lives because of the upperclassmens threats!

The show this year was awesome. The opening music, "Carmina Burana", made the drill extremely difficult to march to, since it was in three-four time. "Softly As I Leave You", this years ballad, displayed alot of musical ability with dynamics, tempo changes, and the gorgeous solo played alternately by seniors Darreen Lore on the french horn, and Misty Imes on the flugelhorn. The keyboards displayed outstanding talent on "Dawg Grass", while the rest of percussion demonstrated their "water skills" along with some very capable drumming ability. The band and auxiliaries executed very difficult marching maneuvers, while drum majors Kathy Barringer and Brian Workman enhanced the number with a little bit of romance! The final number was "1812 Overture", and it was definitely a crowd pleaser! The music was very demanding and exciting to play, but the marching with 6-6-15 drill, was so difficult hours of practice were spent on it alone. We pulled it off though and brought the crowd to a stand when we released balloons, streamers, and white homing pigeons for general effect.

The 1964 season also marked the Second Annual Blue and White Competition. The Band hosted the competition at Spartan Stadium. It was once again very successful with over 15 bands attending. Portsmouth High School was the Grand Champs of the day.

Morehead State University's Percussion Ensemble provided an extra source of entertainment for the afternoon. The bands and the crowd were amazed at the talent and showmanship the group displayed.

A tremendous amount of work goes into making these competitions run smoothly, and that responsibility was taken on by the Band Boosters headed by Theora Bradley, and it was a job well-done.

This marching season was probably the most successful season the band had experienced since it began participating in competitions. We attended seven competitions over a two month period. Our first competition was in Lancaster, Oh. There we received a second-place band award. The second competition at Band and Drum Majors, a second place to Percussion, a third place to the rifles. We won two awards at Vinson regardless of class, those were Best Show Design and first place runner-up to Boursville W. 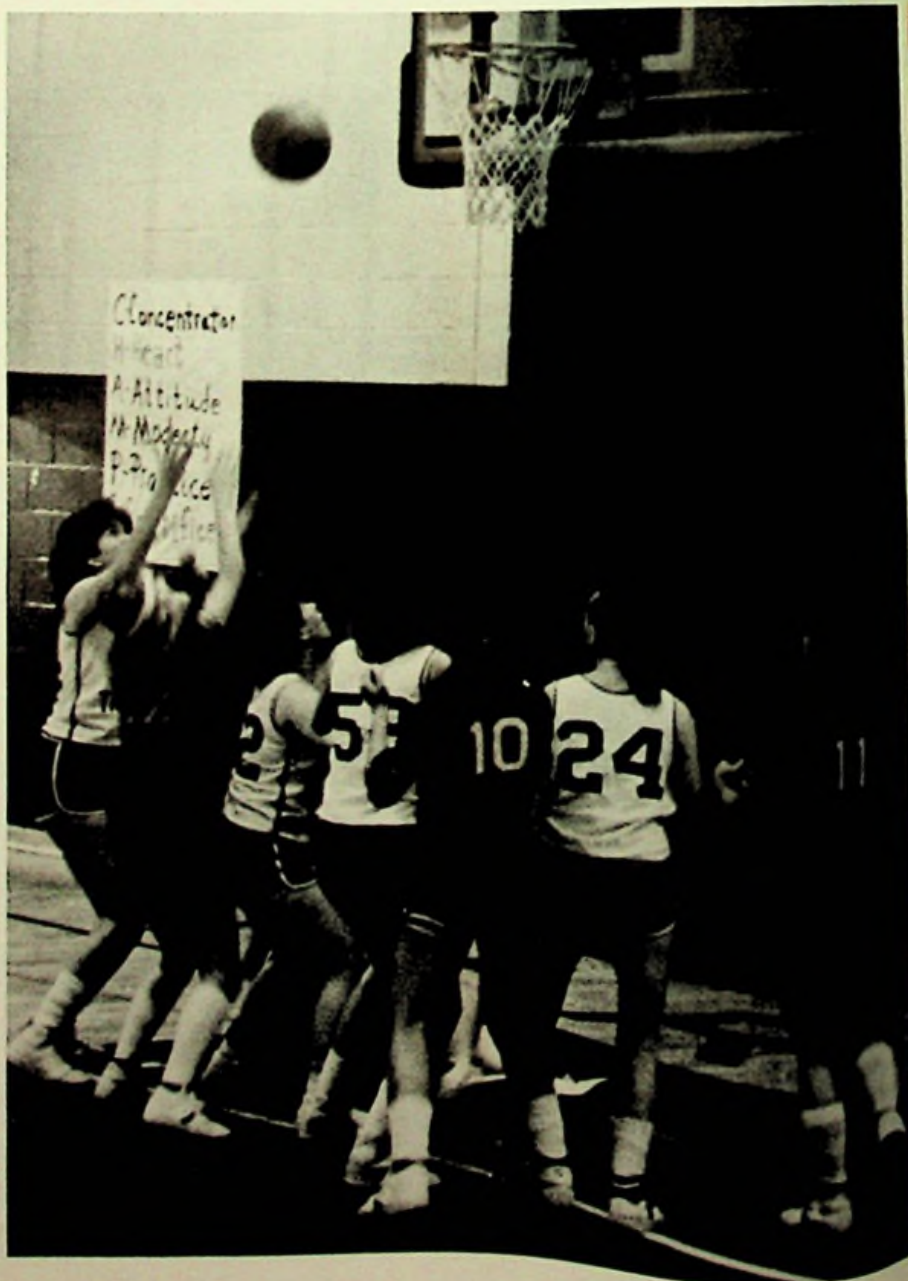

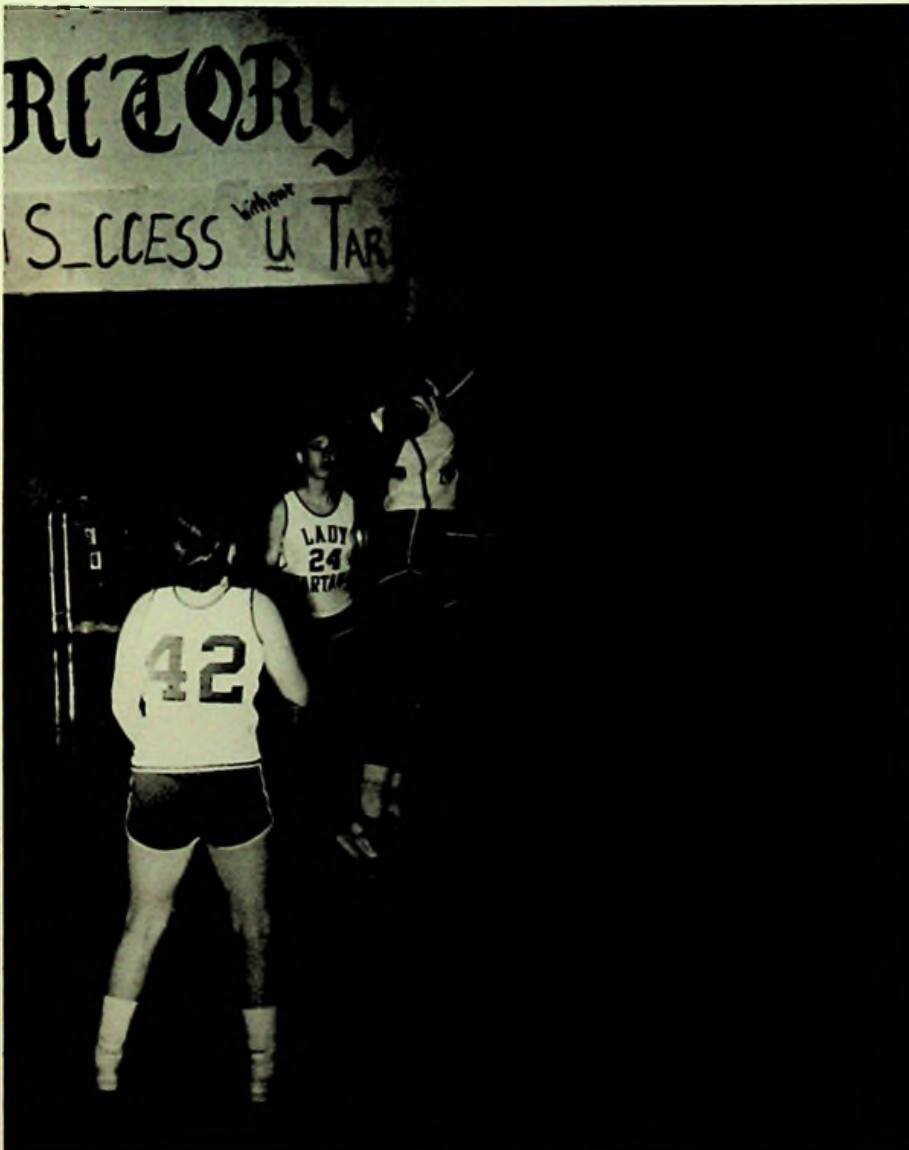

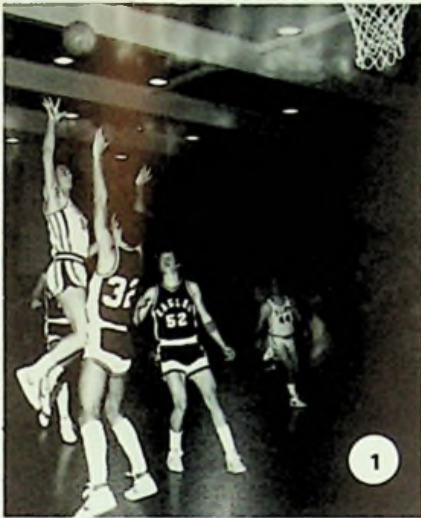

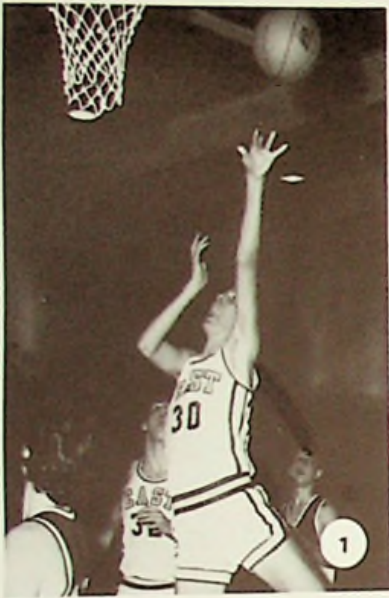


