
I'd like to go on record . . .

Nevertheless, the season was a great success because the team displayed a remarkable attitude toward winning. Most evident of all was the great sportsmanship the team showed throughout the season.





Portsmouth West High Band Invited To Cherry Blossom Festival Parade

PORTSMOUTH-The Ports- have listed the Jackson Apmouth West High School Marching Band has been invited to march in the National Cherry Blossom Festival parade April 16, 1966, in Washington.

The band, selected upon the basis of previous awards and performances, by the Festival Evaluation Committee, was given prelimi-nary qualification through geographical location and prior application.

The band, a consistent winner in competitive performances the last three years, is directed by James M. Morgan.

THE RISE in popularity as a marching unit started in 1963 when the band claimed an excellent rating at its first competitive contest in Ironton. A year later, after another excellent rating at Wilmington, the group returned to Ironton and won the top rating of superior.

Performances in the Portsmouth Sesquicentennial and the River Days parade, in competition with 15 to 20 neighboring bands, gave the West High congregation top awards, following a 1964 River Days rating of second in a long lineup of competitors.

Dale W. Gillette, Scioto County High School supervisor, who organized the first Portsmouth West marching band, expressed pride in the unit's selection for the Cherry Blossom parade.

THE INVITATION is believed to be the first for a Portsmouth area school to participate in the event.

Expenses of transportation, lodging and miscellaneous costs are to be paid by band boosters fund raising projects, and special contributions from nonschool sources, Mr. Morgan said.
