
Students Enjoy Vacation



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

Bad Weather Closes School


The abnormally low temperatures during January caused some troubles for the local schools. Snow fell to a depth of eighteen inches which made it impossible for the buses to make their runs. 

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

Students Return With Enthusiasm








Rookies Carry on Burg Tradition Wheelers right to be football tea had an under some really Portsmouth to end up Thompson.







Reserves Have Winning Season












Tammie Bailey sprints her leg of the relay.



Yearbook Staff Pressed for Time







Spanish Club Has Active First Year



Staffs Beneficial to Faculty and Students







Chorus Has a Great Year



















Nation Paralized by Severe Winter

Miami, Florida, had the first snow ever recorded, cities reported average January temperatures of 10-24 degrees below normal, deaths resulted from exposure, buildings burned because firemen's hoses froze, barges carrying necessary coal and fuel oil were stilled in frozen rivers, industries and schools were forced to close, and cities exhausted budgets and supplies for snow removal. Such was the winter of 1976-77 which gripped the greater part of the U.S. in the worst weather in over a century. The extremely low temperatures for such a long duration of time taxed fuel supplies causing a wide appeal to set thermostats at 65 during the day and lower at night. Brown-outs were experienced in some cities, and those having enough fuel discovered sky-rocketed fuel bills.

Travel was an impossibility in

many cities with snow removal budgets and salt supplies exhausted compounded by a lack of sufficient snow removal equipment or even an inability to get through the snow with the equipment owned. Commuter trains stopped, cars were left stranded, and accidents increased with Birmingham, Ala., reporting 600 automobile collisions in one night.

Perhaps the city that was hardest hit was Buffalo, N.Y., where a record 175 inches of snow practically buried the city. Piles of snow reached 20 feet in some places trapping people in homes and factories.

Locally, schools and businesses closed for up to a month and the Ohio River was frozen from bank to bank for the first time since 1948. Columbus schools held classes in restaurants, homes, business conference rooms, and churches due to schools closed from the energy crisis.

Explanations for what was happening to cause such severe weather were given, but reasons for why it occurred were unknown. Westerlies carrying frigid polar air dipped almost 10 degrees further south than normal and stayed still over sections of the Midwest, South, and Northeast. This same weather brought a mid-winter thaw to Alaska, melting ice-skating rinks, and caused a severe drought in Southwest U.S. because of a lack of snow in the Sierra Nevada and Rocky Mountains.

One of the most frightening aspects of this winter is that nobody knows if the same thing will occur in future years.

"Roots" Most Popular Televised Best Seller Wheelersburg Gets Cinema

Long specials of best selling books were the choices of television viewers. Of these, ''Roots,'' a story of a negro family, was most widely acclaimed. Other noted best sellers were ''Captains and Kings'' and ''Once An Eagle.'' ''Gone With the Wind'' made its television debut and became one of the most watched events of the year. The most popular T.V. show was ''Charlie's Angels'' which propelled Farrah-Fawcett Majors to sex symbol status. ''Baa Baa Black Sheep'' and ''The Captain and Tenille'' seemed to attract viewer attention.

Some of the songs that made the

charts this year were "The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald" by Gordon Lightfoot. "Feelings" by Morris Albert, "Beth" by Kiss, "Muskrat Love" by Captain and Tenille, "Nadia's Theme," and theme from "A Star is Born" by Barbra Streisand.



U.S. Elects Georgia Ex-Governor Britain Celebrates Queen's Silver Jubilee

During the presidential election of 1976, the nation voted in a relatively unknown ex-governor from Plains, Georgia. After waging a 22-month campaign James Earl Carter, better known as "Jimmy," narrowly defeated President Gerald Ford to be the first man elected from the Deep South since pre-Civil War times. The final vote was 51% to Ford's 48% in the popular vote and 297 to 235 in the electoral college. With a majority in the House and Senate, the election put the Democrats in complete control of the federal government. The Republican party had trouble deciding at their convention between Ronald Reagan and Ford as their candidate. Following the Democratic Convention in July, Carter's popularity well exceeded Ford's by Gallup Poll results of 62% to 29%. As the campaign between Carter-Mondale and Ford-Dole got under way, the gap in popularity began to close which looked as though Ford would surpass the Georgia peanut grower. Three televised debates between the presidential candidates marked the first time an incumbent debated his challenger.

Great Britain began in June, 1977, to celebrate the Silver Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II commemorating the 25 years during which the Queen has served as their monarch. Ceremonies involving all of the pomp and pageantry associated with royalty were held as the British embarked on a year that could be compared to the U.S.'s bicentennial celebration. Also like the United States, the Silver Jubilee was felt to be a shot in the arm of Britain's sagging economy and national pride.



Coffee Prices Climb Gary Gilmore Executed

Soaring prices plagued the nation's coffee drinkers as producing countries raised prices due to a frost hitting the coffee beans. Brazil boosted the export tax on a bag on coffee from \$21 before the frost to \$100 after. Retail prices rose from an average \$1.27 per pound to over \$4.00 in some places. After two stays of execution, death row inmate Gary Gilmore got his wish and was killed by firing squad. Gilmore's execution was the first in the country in a decade. It remains to be seen if his death broke the moratorium on capital punishment for the 358 men and women on death row in twenty states.

Tragedies Result in High Death Toll

Beverly Hills Supper Club in Southgate, Kentucky, was the scene of a devastating fire that killed 161 persons on May 28. Several thousand people had crowded the ''Showplace of the Midwest'' on Memorial Day weekend to hear singer John Davidson. When the fire was discovered, a bus boy took a microphone from a performing comedy team to ask the people to leave but later stated that, ''a lot of people didn't believe me when I said there was a fire.'' Panic accounted for many deaths.

The worst crash in air history occurred when a Pan Am 747 collided with a KLM Jet in the Canary Islands. All were killed on the KLM with 67 survivors on the 747. In all, 576 persons perished.


Support for A-Plant Urged Chemical Spill in Ohio River Is Detected

One of the main concerns of Southern Ohioians was the construction of an add-on facility at the Atomic Plant in Piketon. In his presidential campaign, Carter promised to uphold the decision to proceed with building the 4.4 billion dollar, 300-acre structure creating many needed jobs for the area.

The gaseous diffusion process plans were abandoned in favor of a more economical centrifuge process, but Pres. Carter angered the Ohioians when he said that the plant may be built in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, where laboratories were already established.

A writing campaign followed, reminding Carter of his promise. At the time of this writing, Carter has stated that he may propose building a small plant at both sites which would increase construction costs but possibly would appease both states.

In February a plant in Charleston, West Virginia, spilled carbon tetrachloride into the Kanawha River which flowed into the Ohio where it was detected a week later. Residents using the water were advised to boil it for drinking purposes until the chemical mass had passed Portsmouth.



Artist's concept of the original proposed add-on facility at the A-Plant. New buildings are shown in foreground.


Reds Win Second World Series Comaneci Is Olympic Star








Seniors Say Good-Bye




Freshmen Encounter Transition From Elementary
