


With the assassination of John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, youngest president in U.S. history, the country lost a highly-regarded and remarkably capable statesman and administrator.





This book is dedicated to our late President. Yet, we know his memory is deserving of much more than we have to offer. We can only vow that Valley will never forget what a great man he was.






Valley is a world within--a world within a bigger world and a world within itself. It is small from the outside but immense from the inside.






INTRAMURAL SPORTS






