PHS TOPS ALL OHIO HIGH SCHOOLS IN SCHOLARSHIP

Portsmouth High School topped all others in Ohio in the statewide scholarship tests which were held in May 1954. In the classification for all high schools in the state regardless of size, PHS students took nine places among the first 10 in eight of the 21 scholastic subjects covered by the tests.

In English scholarship PHS was the only school whose students placed in all four years of English subjects.

The Scholarship Team was composed of those students (three for each subject offered) who represented the school in the State Scholarship Tests. These tests are planned to help students to greater proficiency in subjects which particularly interest them.

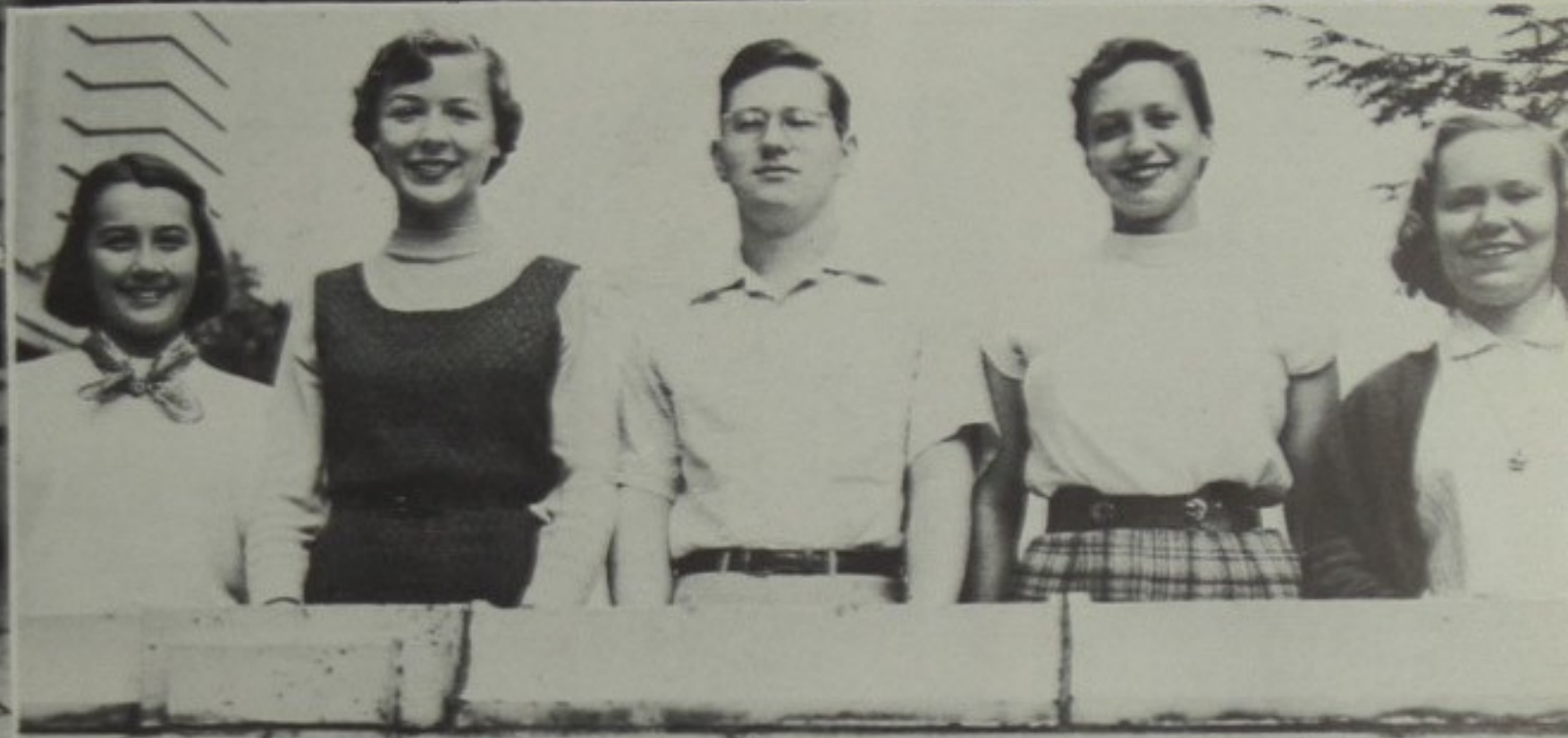

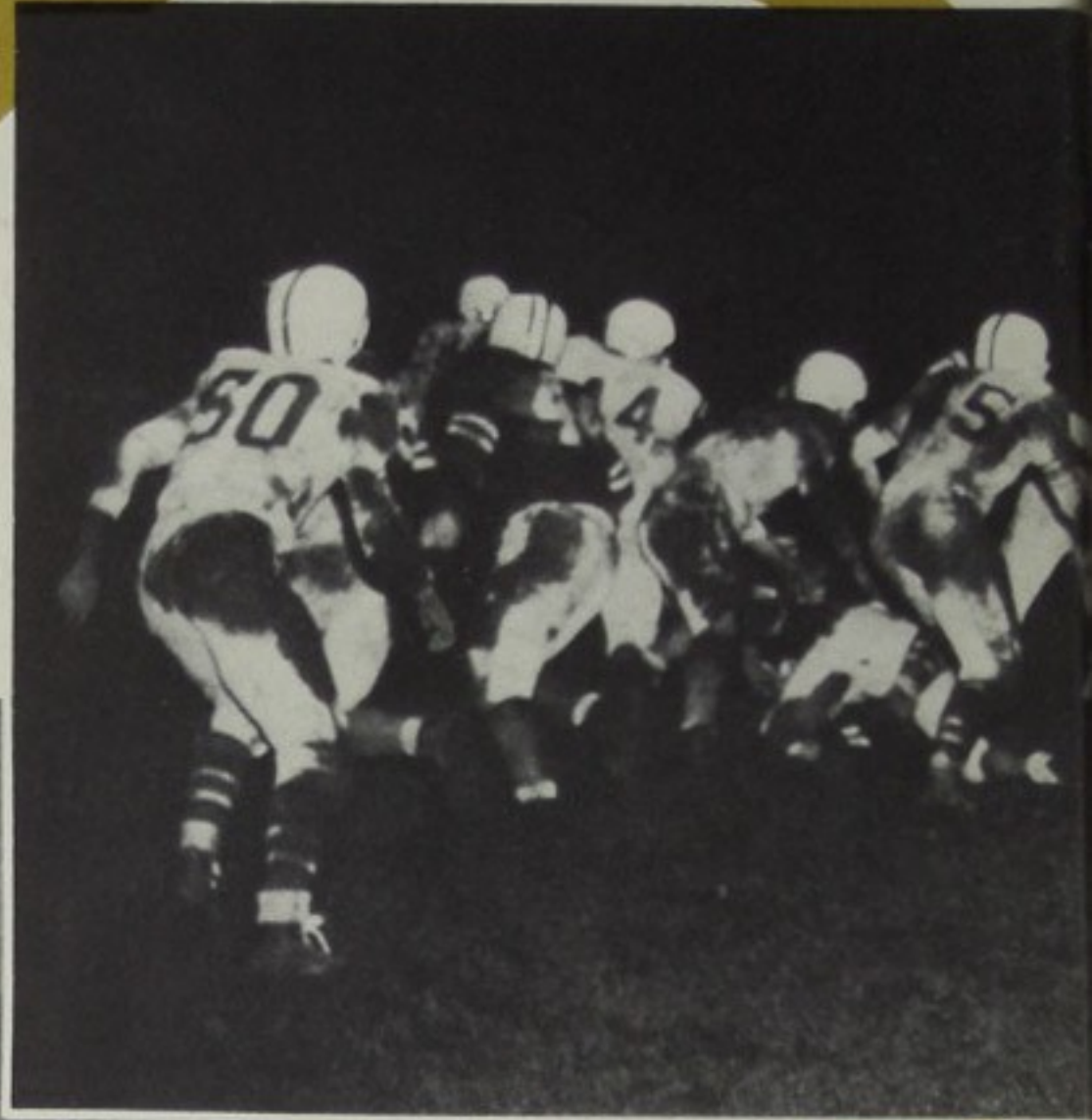

In his position as dean Mr. Elliot takes attendance, counsels boys, and assists the principal.



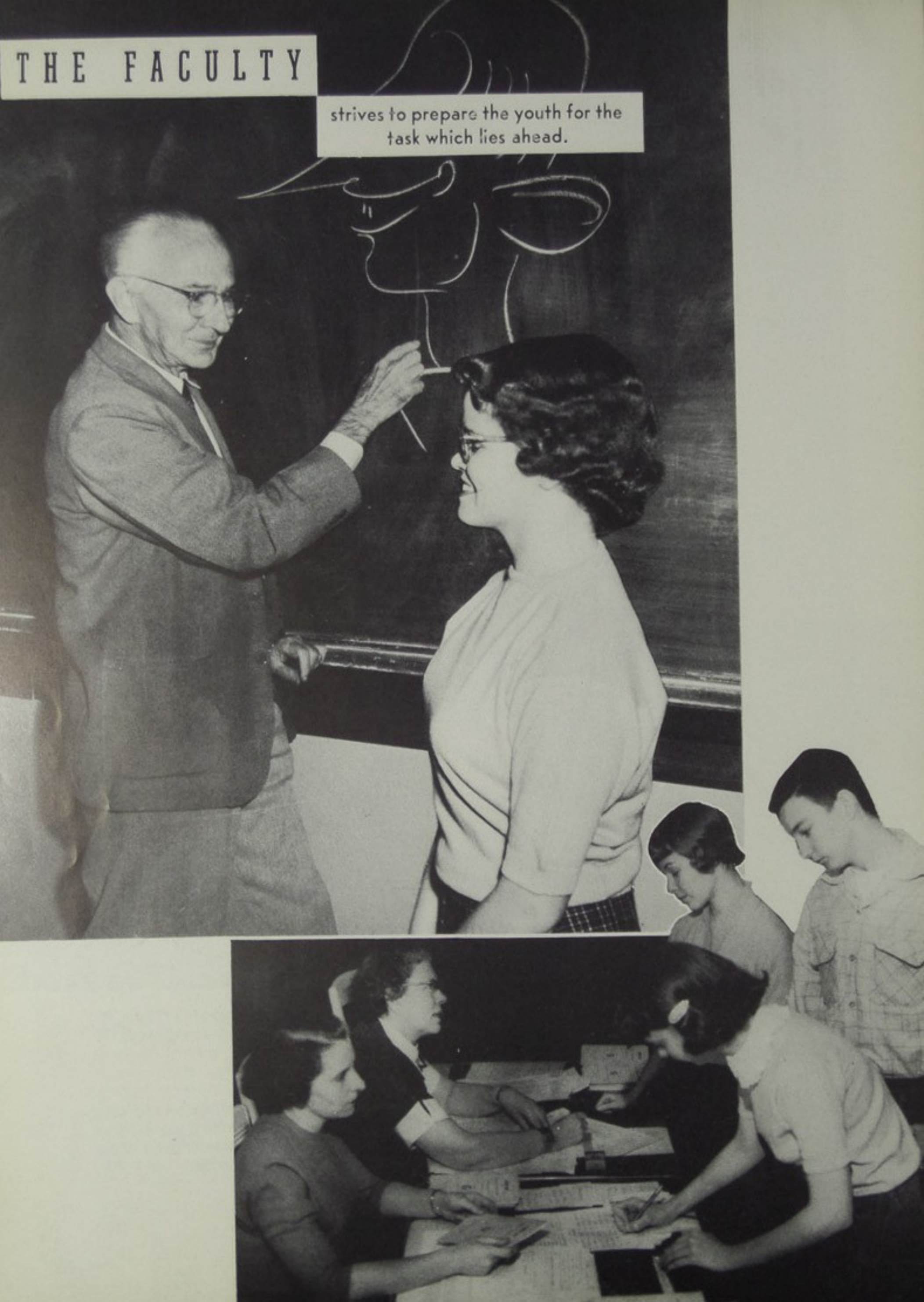


GENIAL PRINCIPAL GUIDES HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

Marketable skills which will help in earning a living

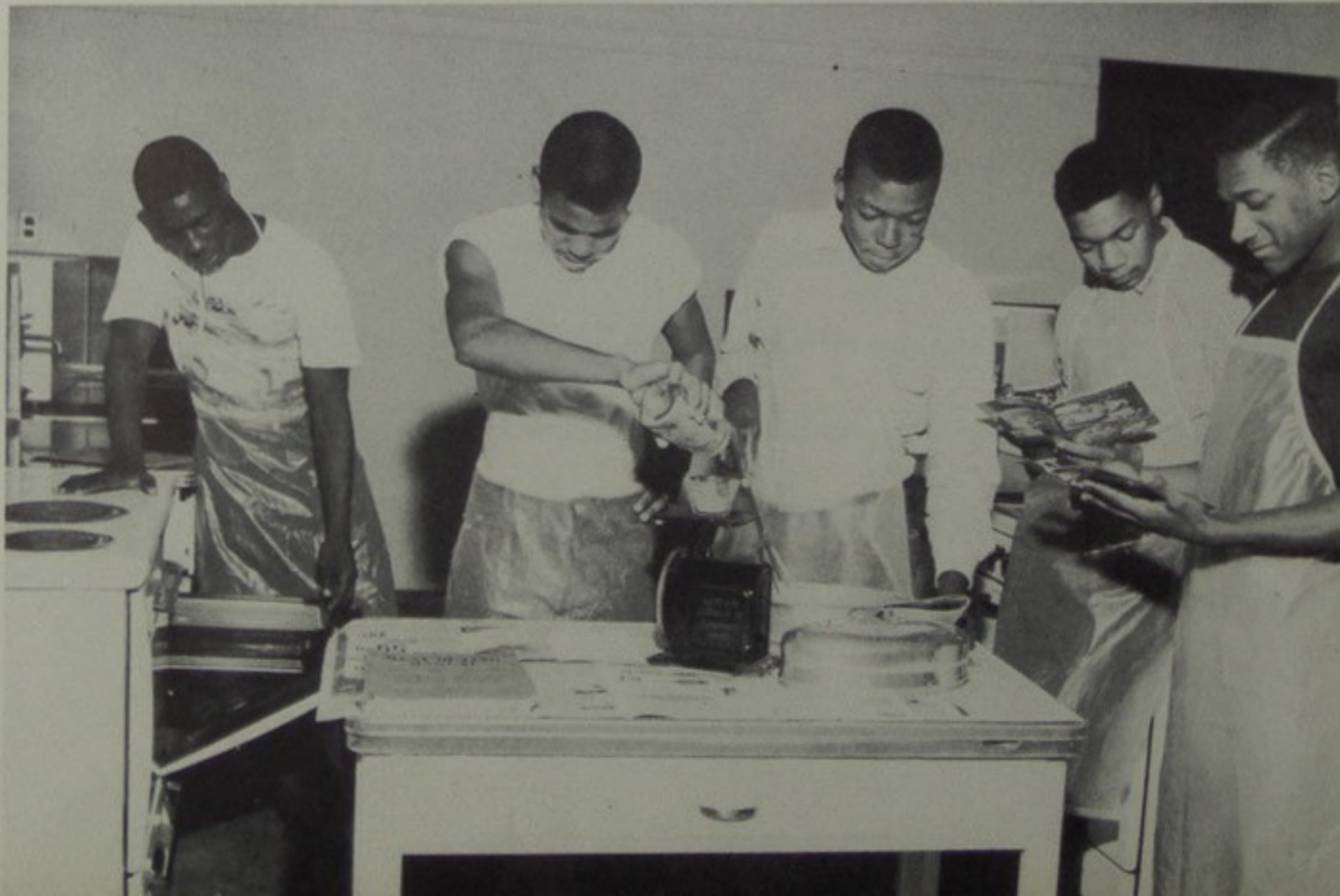

I SPEAK

I speak for democracy. I speak for a way of life which governs my ideals, provides law and order, but, most important, insures my individuality. Millions of people, distinguished and common, have lived under and revered this way of life. Thousands of them have laid down their lives that this "voice of the people" might live.

But it is so easy, too easy, for us just to sit back and declaim the merits of our government and to bellow empty and meaningless words about other governments, but to do nothing about it. Then we wonder why so many of our offers are spurned by these other people.

We fail to see that these nations, practically under the cloak of despotism, are confronted by two grim facts. In one hand—plenteous offers of food, essentials, and luxuries—all of which hide a hammer; and in the other hand, a sickle which swings very low killing, and robbing humans of the ability to think.

In the face of all this, democracy cannot do a single thing about this situation unless we ourselves are willing to let the spirit of freedom come into our lives and work through us. If not, I'm afraid that democracy, real democracy, will become only a remembered utterance of a few men who were willing to sacrifice "their lives, their fortunes and their sacred honor that this nation might live."

I speak for democracy. I have seen, you have seen the suffering and cruelty that liberty-loving nations have had to endure as a result of the greed, lust and tyrannous power of a small group; but these small groups with all their Third Reichs and Black Shirts, their Master Races and Emperors from Sun—all of them lie in ashes and rubble at democracy's feet.

Democracy, as we know it, is based upon the fundamental belief in one God, a Supreme Being Who is the ruler of men's hearts and souls. Furthermore, democracy triggered by this Divine Source can be used for the betterment and uplifting of mankind.

Our nation has existed and advanced under the lofty ideals of God, liberty, and the dignity and worth of individual. We have stayed together because we have had the truth on our side. But we must remember this: That when we cease to have the truth, we shall cease to exist as an independent nation.

For democracy places upon us tremendous responsibilities as well as enjoyable privileges. Our feeling and our desire to advance the cause of liberty, freedom, and equality must be so strong in us for effectiveness that this feeling must show through in our everyday dealings with all people.

Today, right at this moment, by all who profess their allegiance to our country, this challenge must and shall be met. In the words of a poet:

"Come, labor on. Who dares stand idle
on the harvest plain,
While all around him waves the golden
grain?

And to each servant, does the Master
say, "Go work today!"

Stand up for God. Defend the rights of freedom. Speak for democracy!

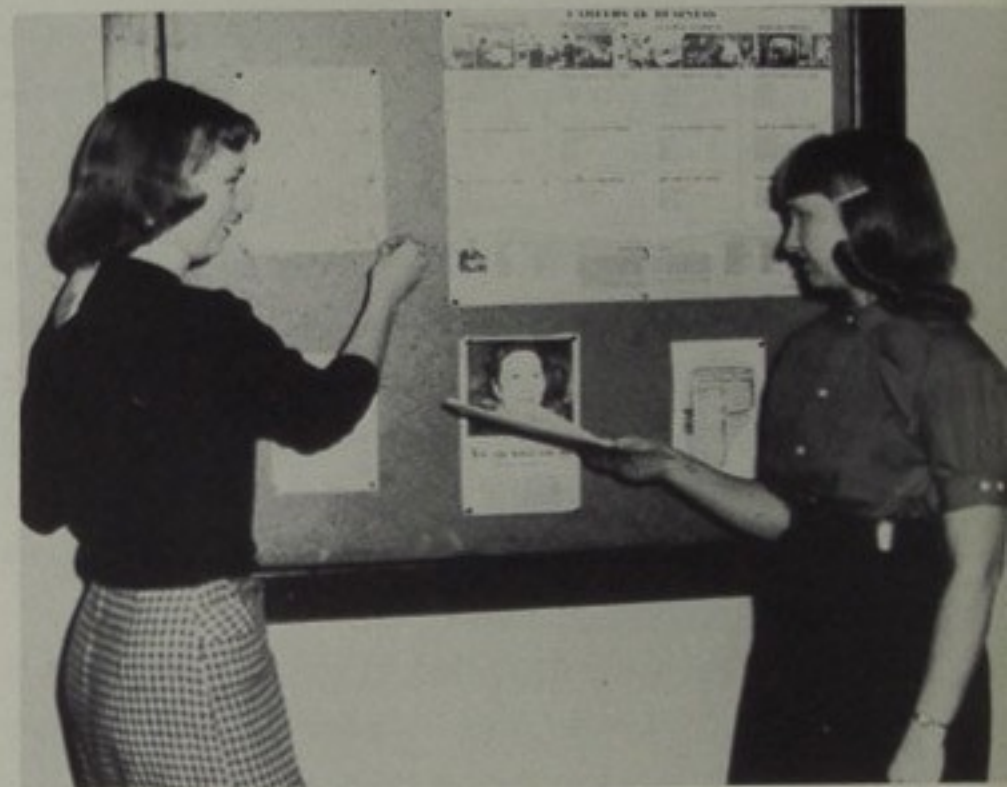

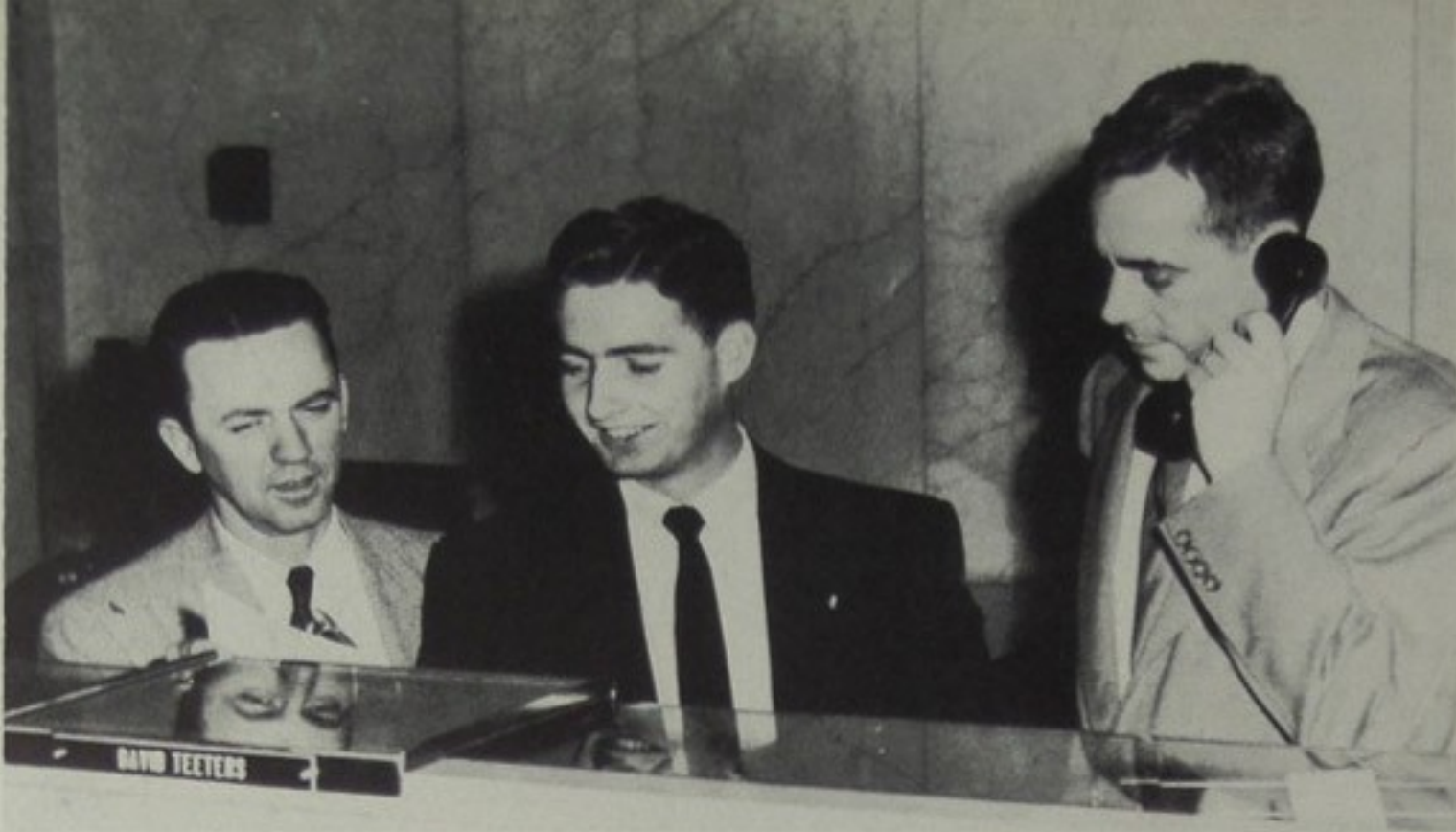

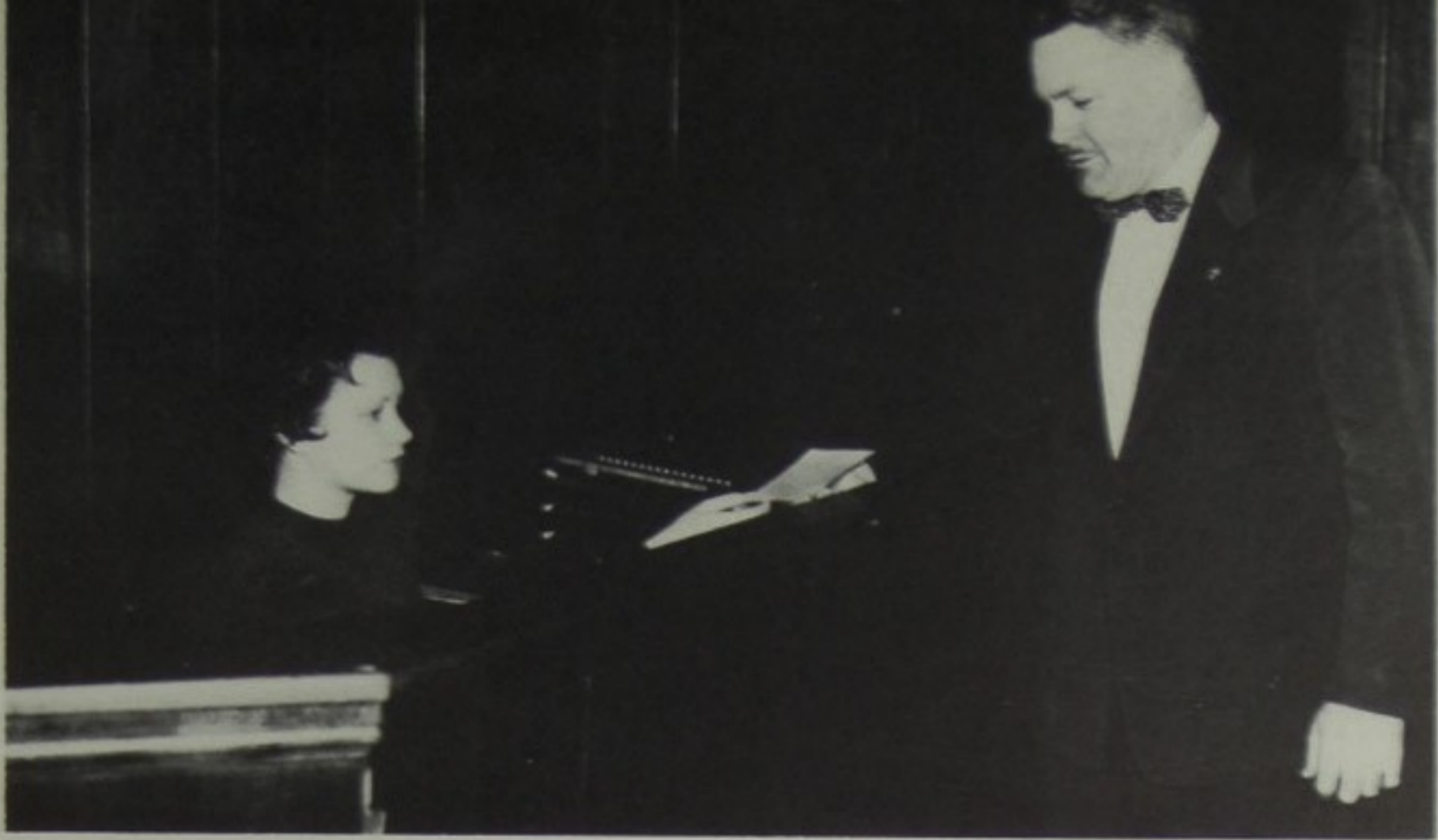

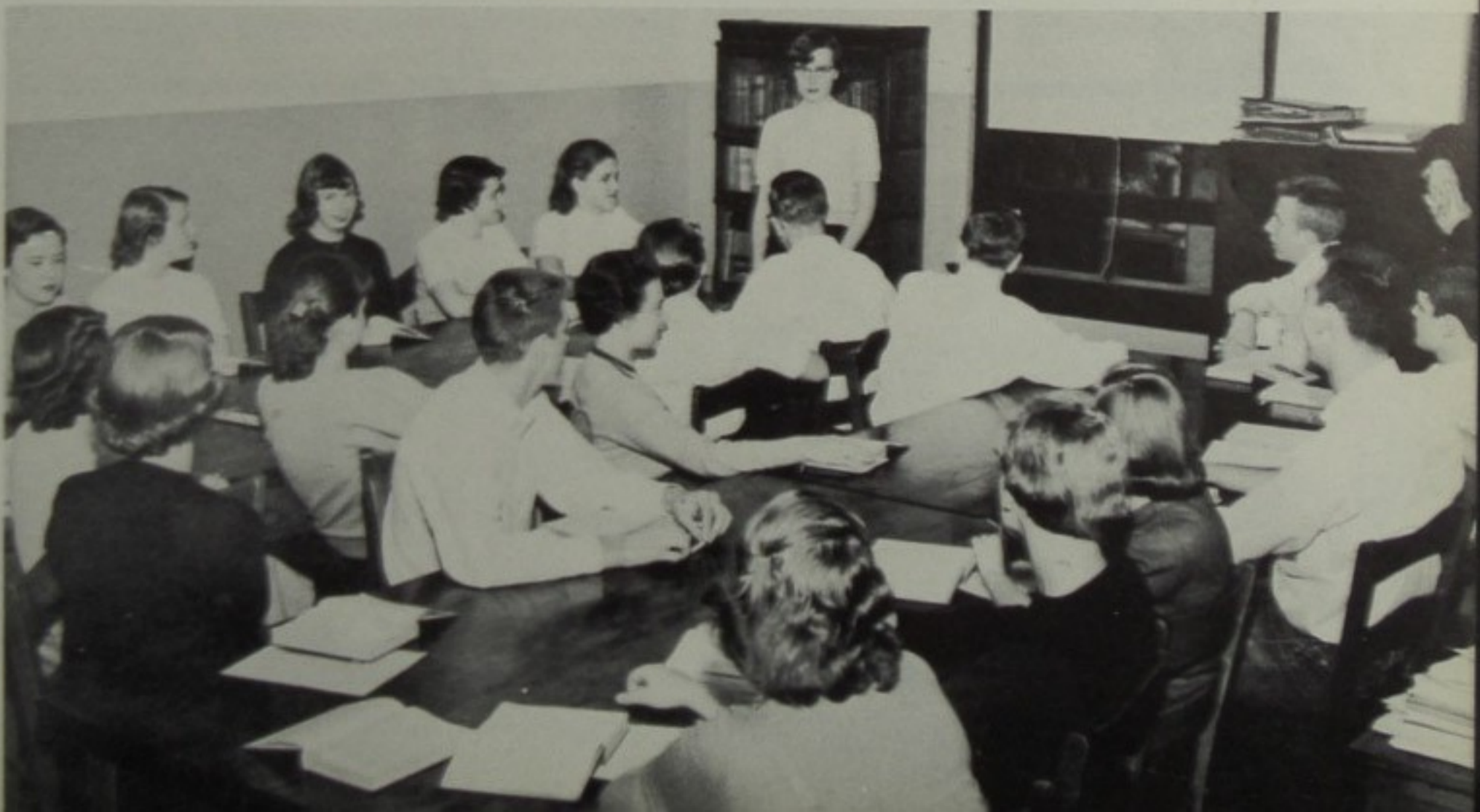

DISTRIBUTIVE EDUCATION

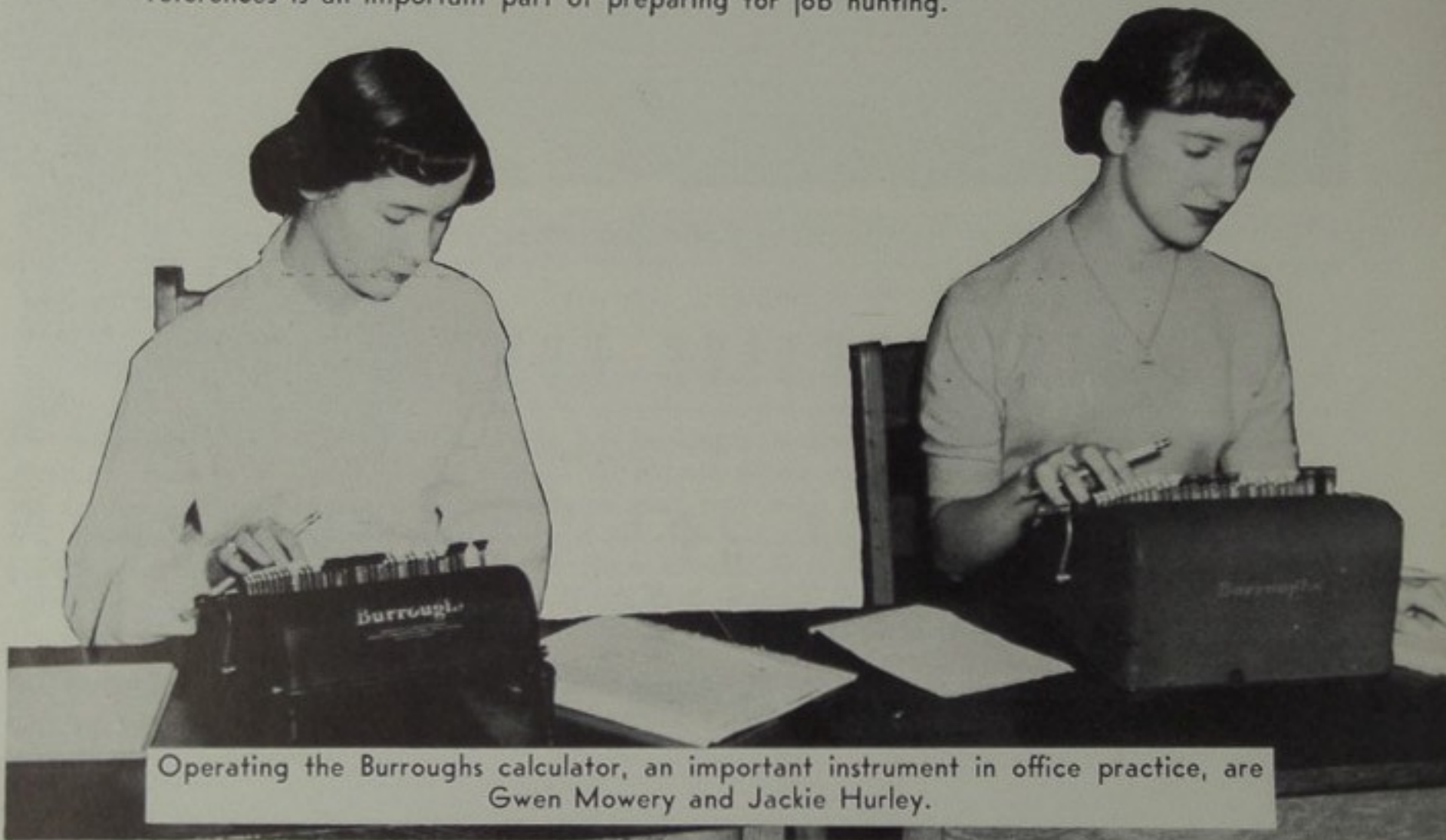
Distributive Education training course is organized and operated by the high school in cooperation with the employers, in order to prepare young people for specific jobs in this field of work. Students enrolled in the training course receive paid, part-time employment, and planned on-the-job work experience, which will enable them to acquire the skills necessary to make them competent workers. The school provides general education and instruction in subjects related to this work experience, during the balance of the students' time. Mr. Charles McClure is the co-ordinator for the Distributive Education course.

1. To develop stenographic skill, which is a combination of shorthand, typing, and transcribing skills.

3. To develop certain character and personality traits, such as dependability, courtesy, initiative, judgment, loyalty, resourcefulness, and above all, adaptability and common sense.

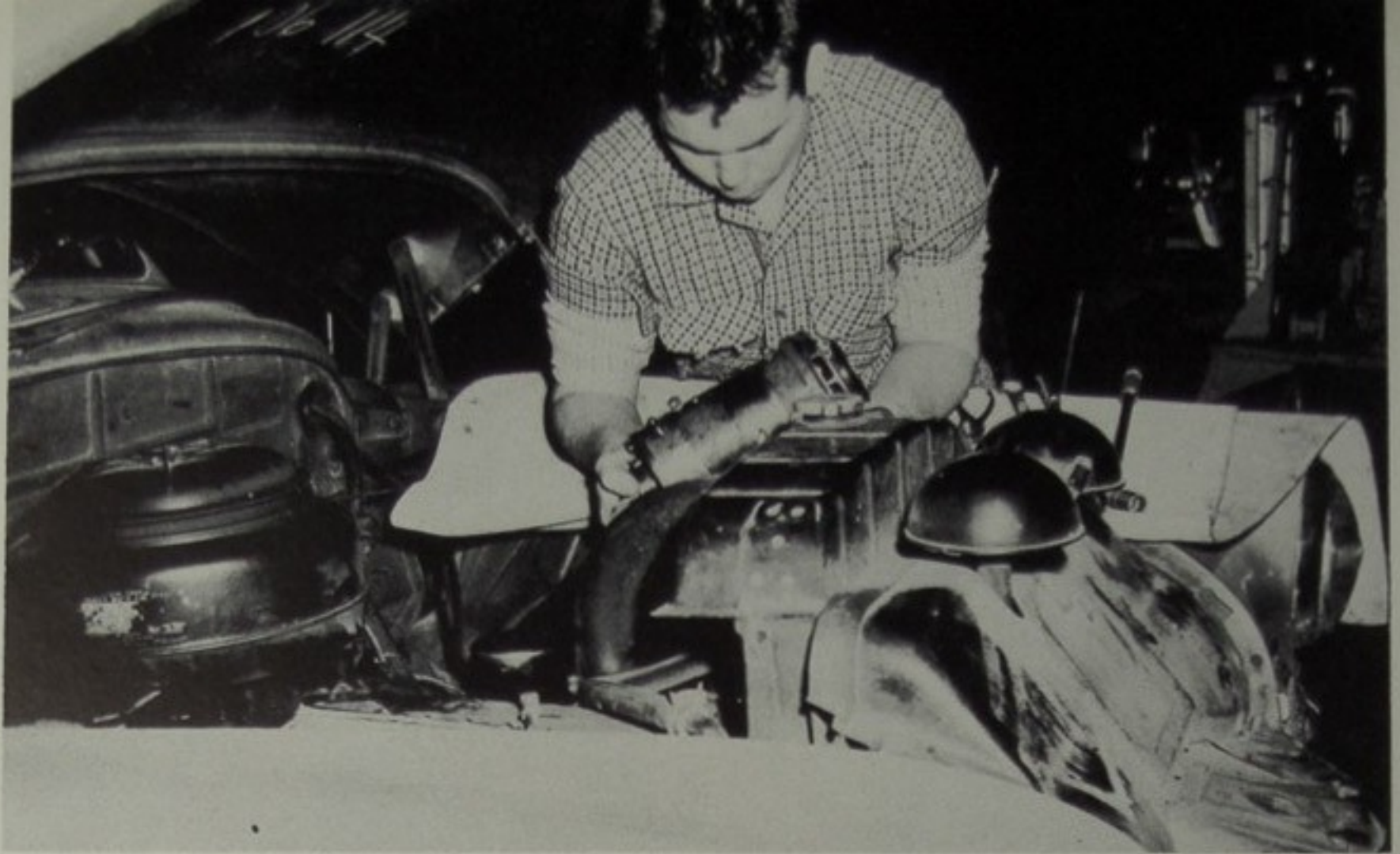

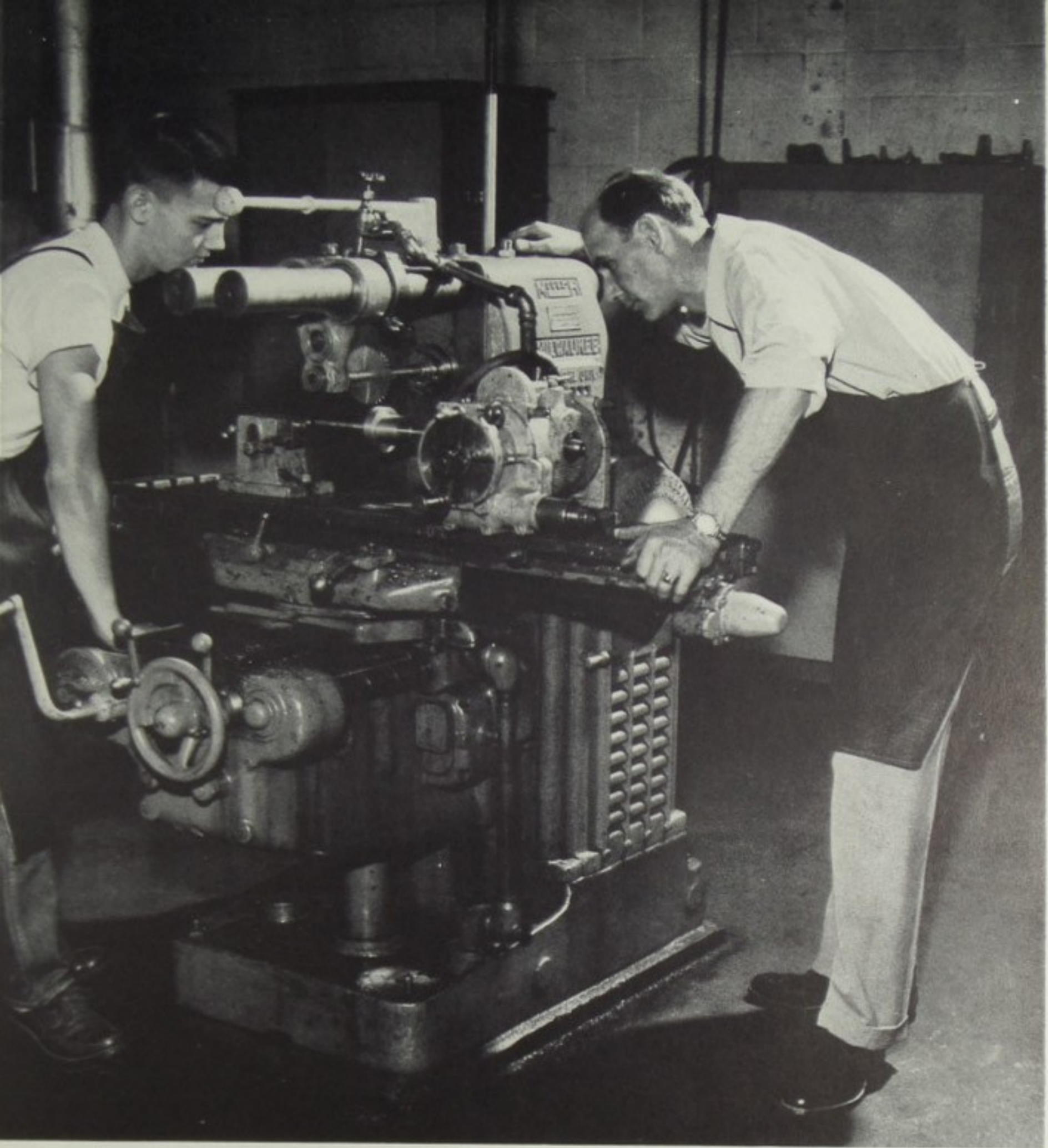

MARKETABLE SKILLS WHICH

Portsmouth High School's fine Trades and Industries School offers students invaluable practical experience in auto mechanics, sheet-metal working and machine shop. Nearly 67 PHS boys are enrolled in this course which is supervised by Mr. O. M. Gwinn. He is aided by five well-trained assistants: Herbert Crabtree, Paul Goings, Ray Humphrey, Marvin McGoron, and Robert Pearson. The T&I group also takes a field trip each spring to Windsor, Canada, where they visit and tour the Ford Motor Plant. This well-equipped vocational department has won much recognition for its well-balanced program.

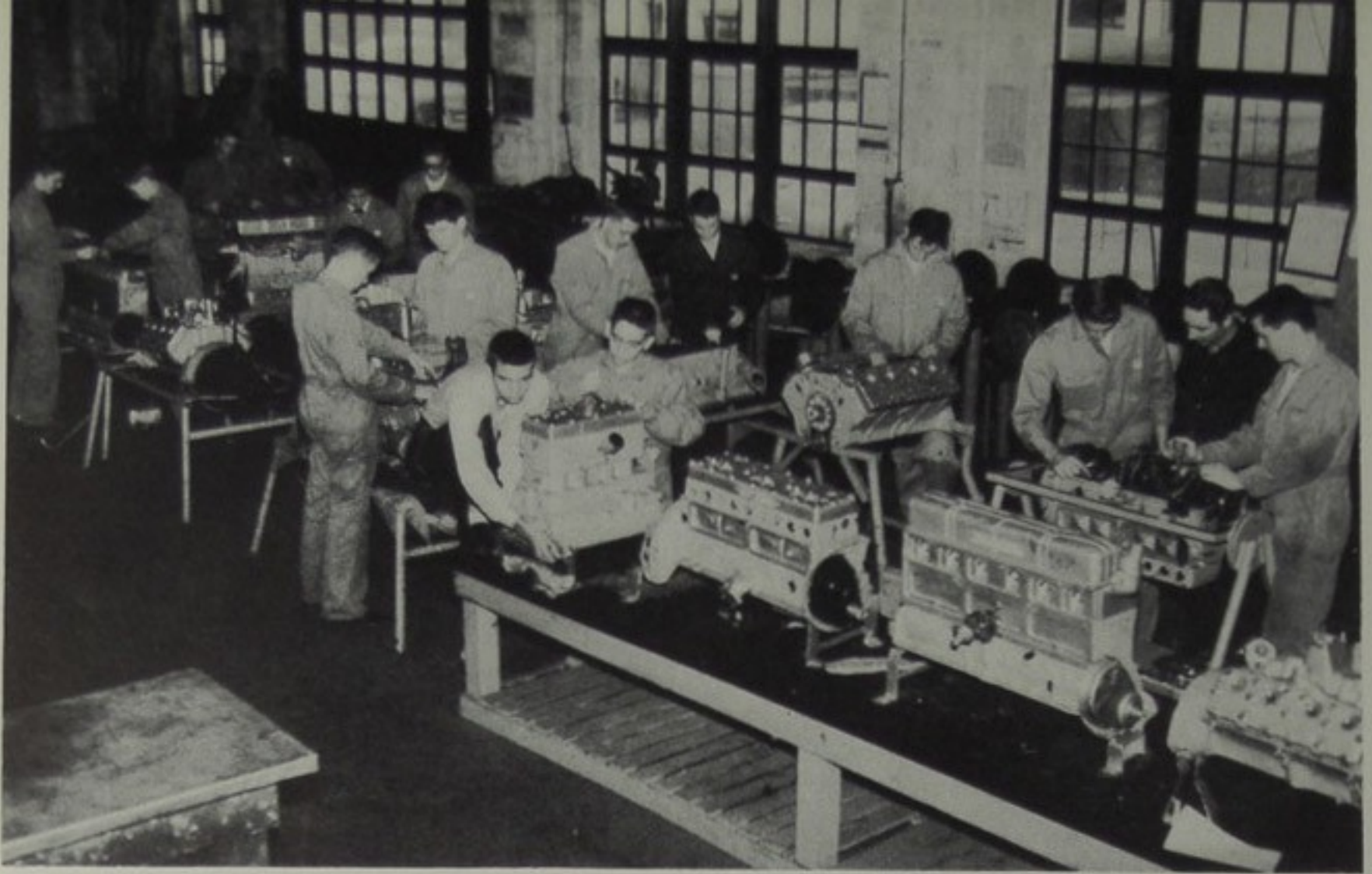

MUNICIPAL STADIUM, Oct. 15

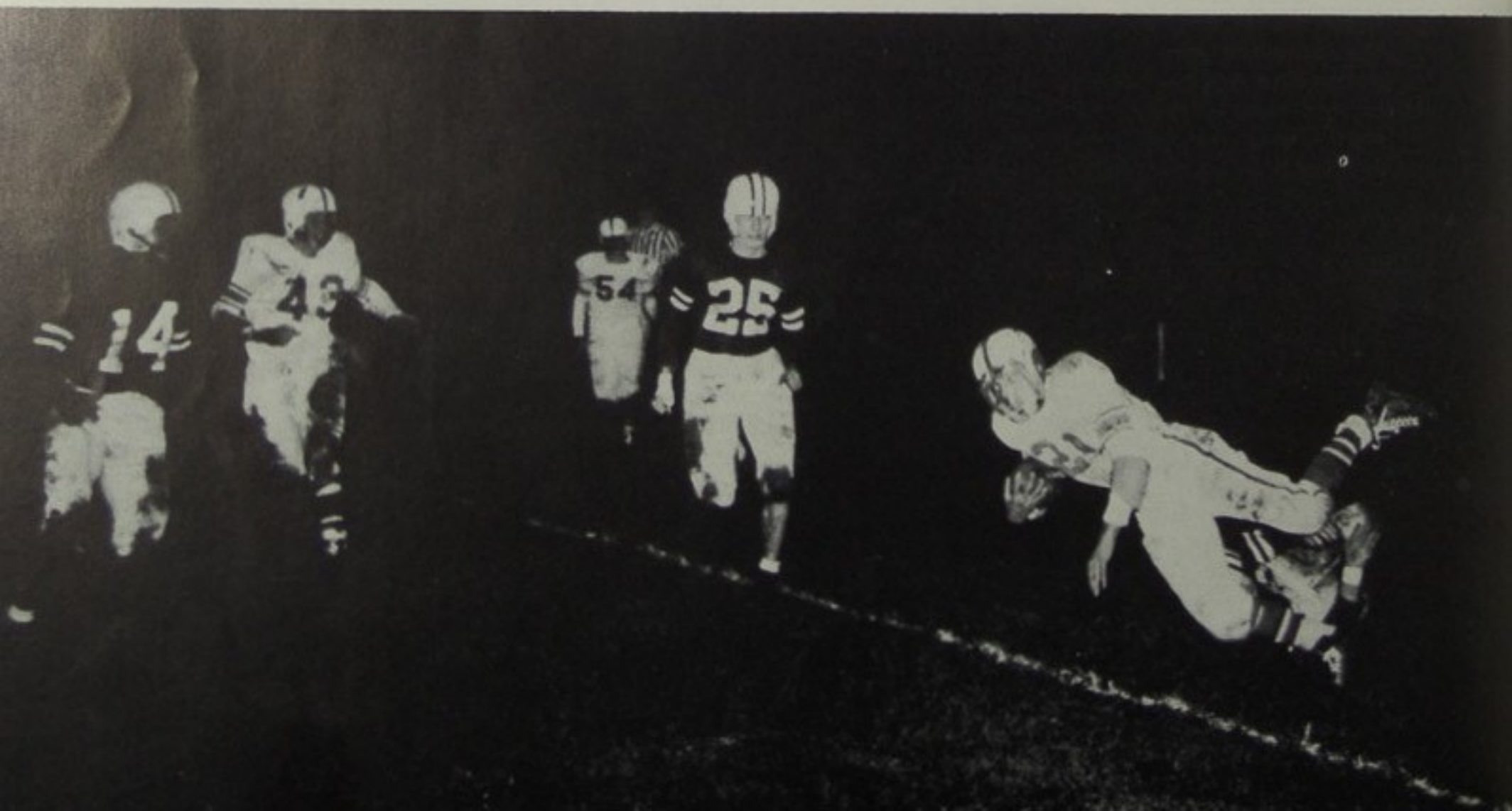

PORTSMOUTH VS GREENFIELD

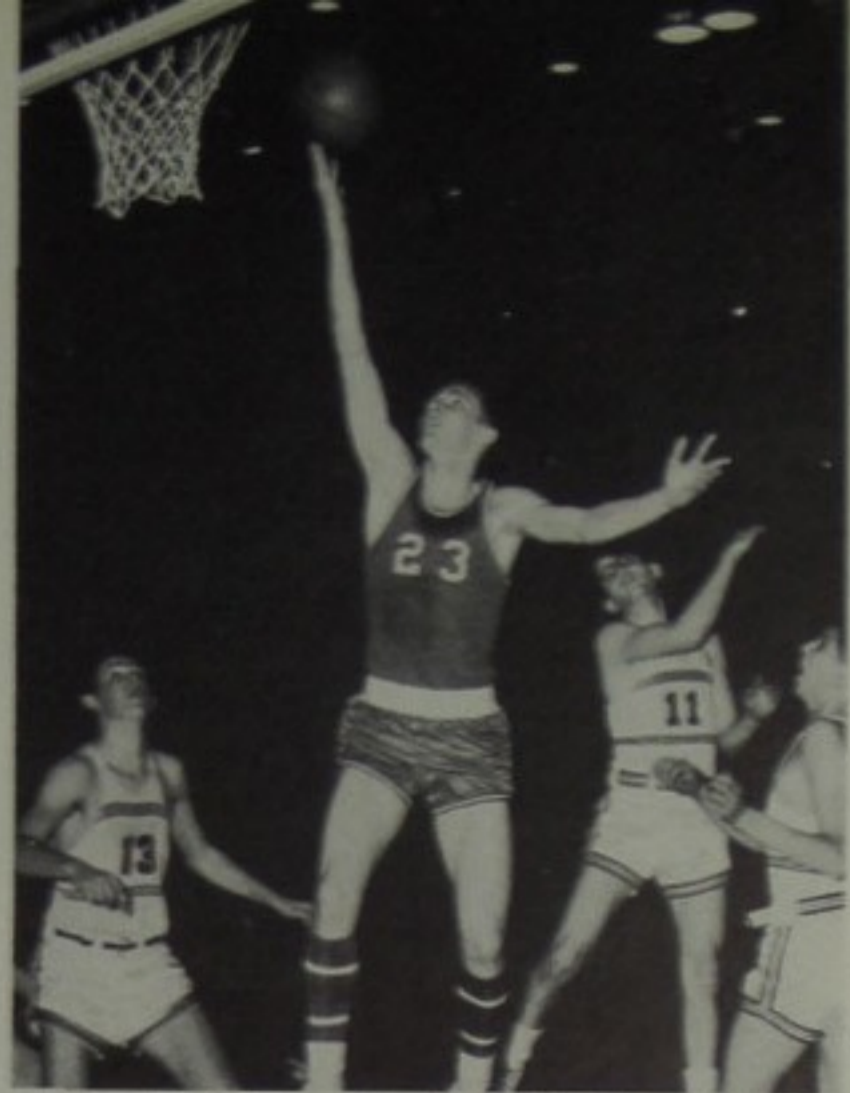

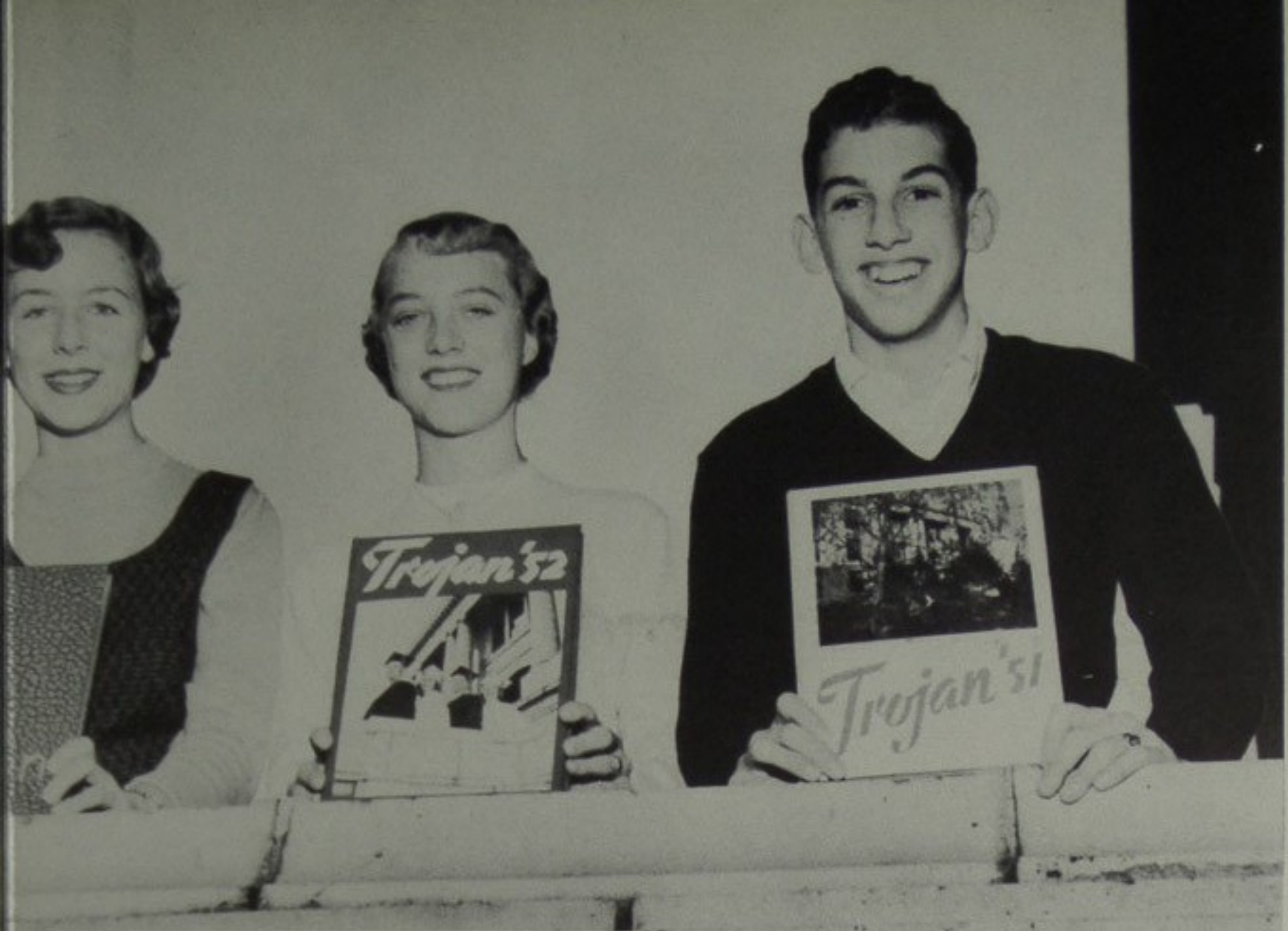
