

Very often the question is asked, "Why study Latin?" Latin is closely correlated with the study of English. It will be very useful in everyday life, because it is conducive to a better understanding of English and to increased ability to speak and write it effectively; a clearer knowledge of grammatical relationships, which will make easier the learning of modern foreign languages; a knowledge of the source of French and Spanish, which will add to the understanding of and the interest in these languages; a knowledge of many of the technical words which must be used in professional work; a knowledge of the manner in which one of the most famous peoples of ancient times expressed their thoughts, and of the influence of their language and civilization on our own.

Latin is not "dead"; it lives in the romance languages and in a majority of our English words.



With classes in general science, chemistry, physics, biology, and agriculture, Washington fulfills the scientific needs of all students, no matter what their ambitions might be. There are always three objectives in view: to gain an understanding of the scientific method and to apply it to life problems; to gain a broad knowledge of scientific facts; and to discover new fields of interest for leisure time pursuits.


It is easily seen by his record on the next page that Lefty Nelson was the "spark-plug" of the team, but his record would not have been possible without the great team work of all his fellow-players.
