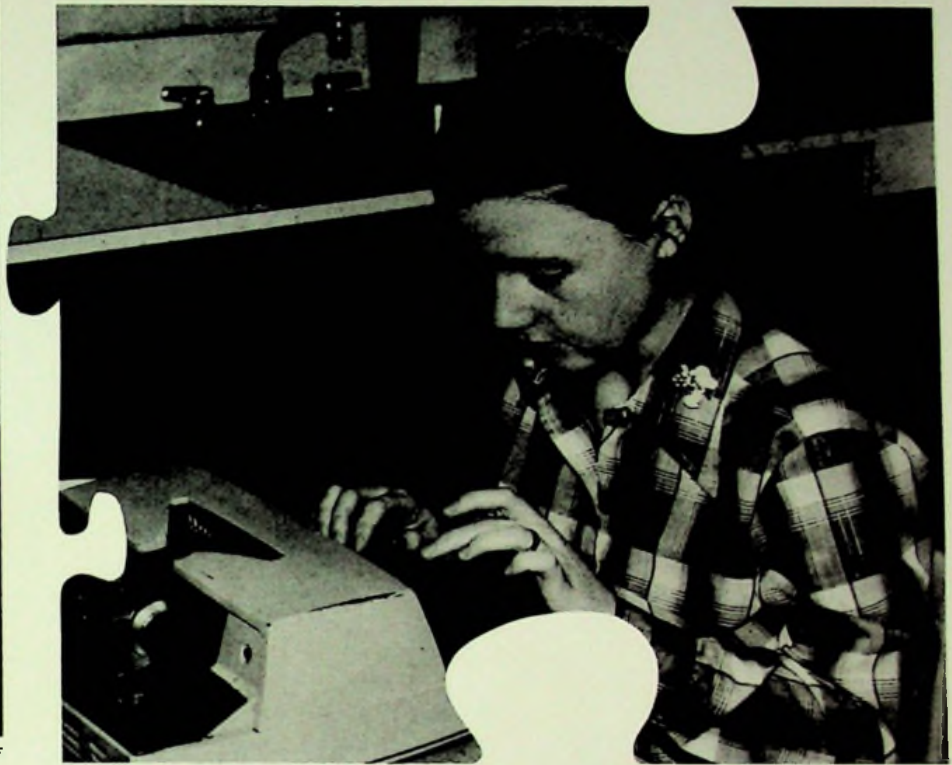

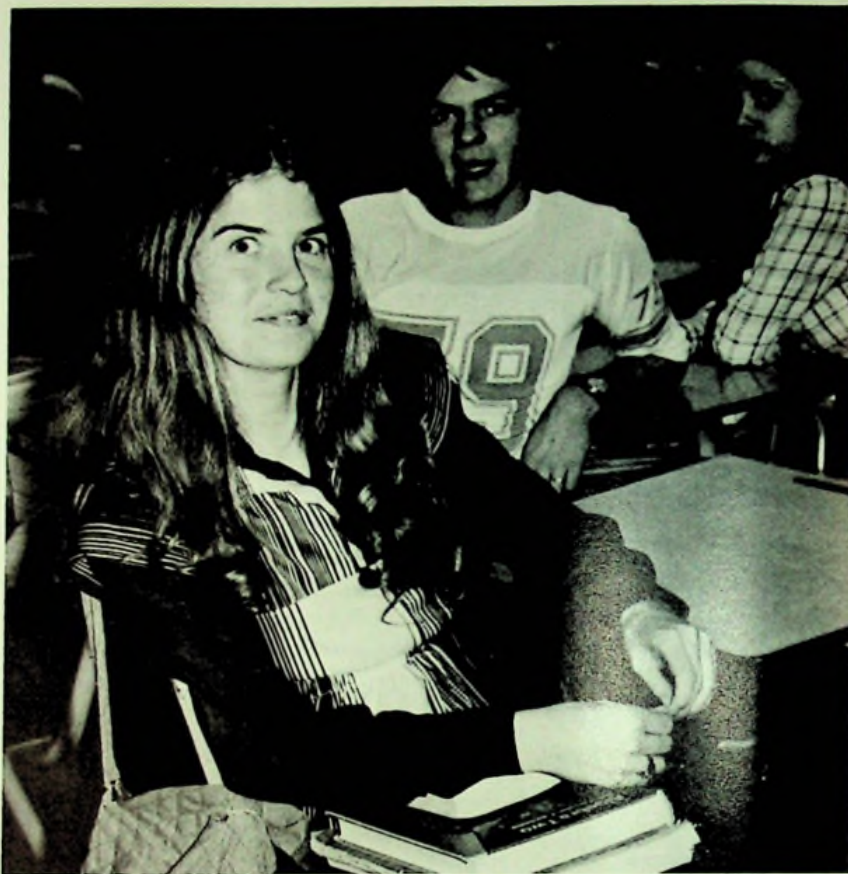




As graduation brings to an end a very important chapter of our lives, it also opens a new and more challenging one.

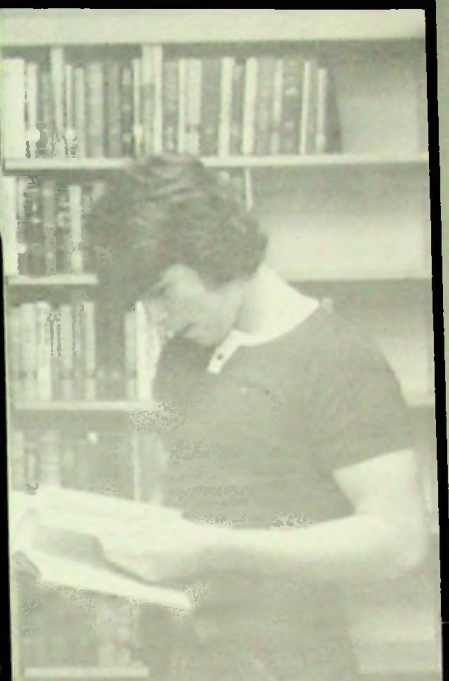

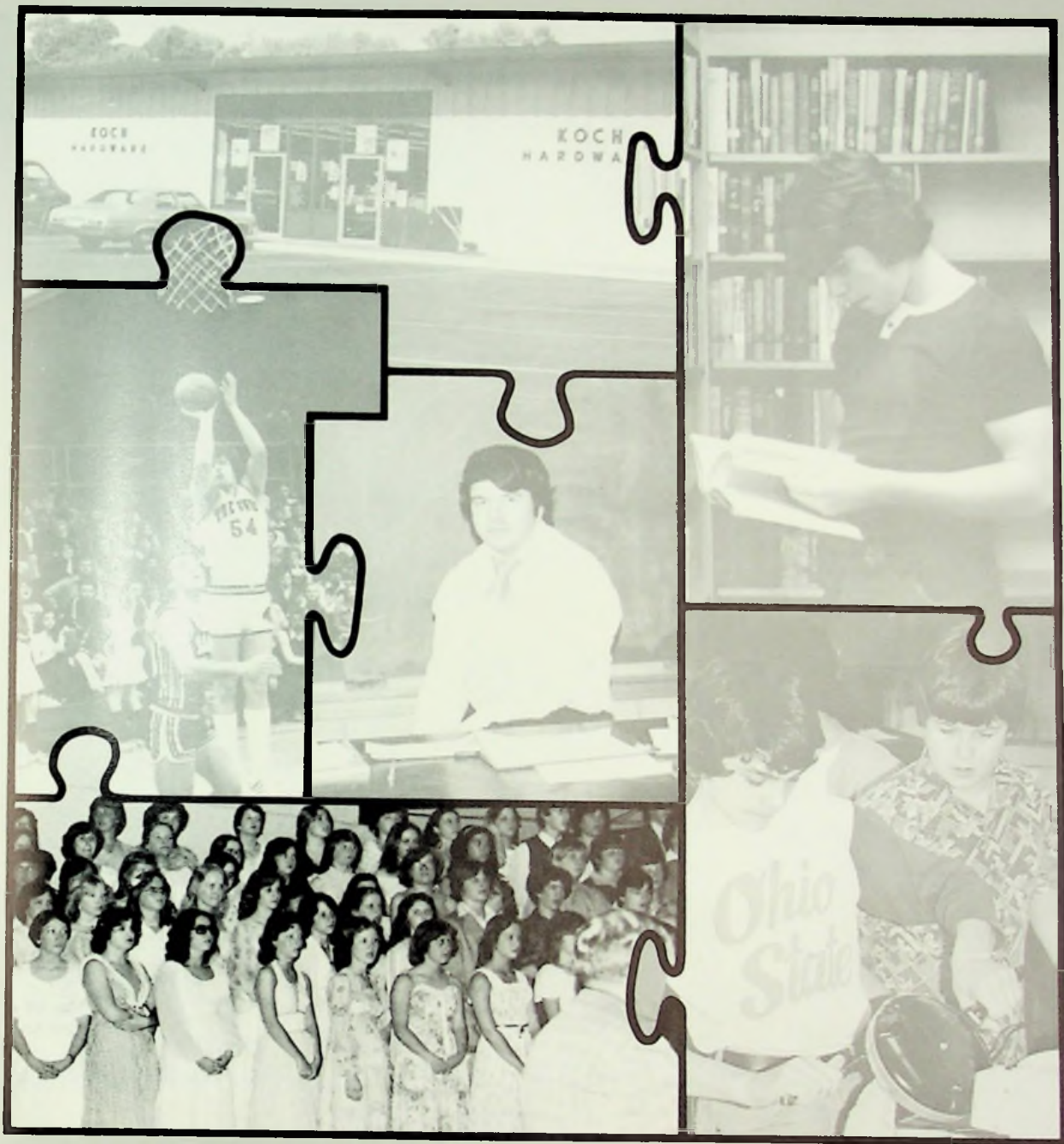

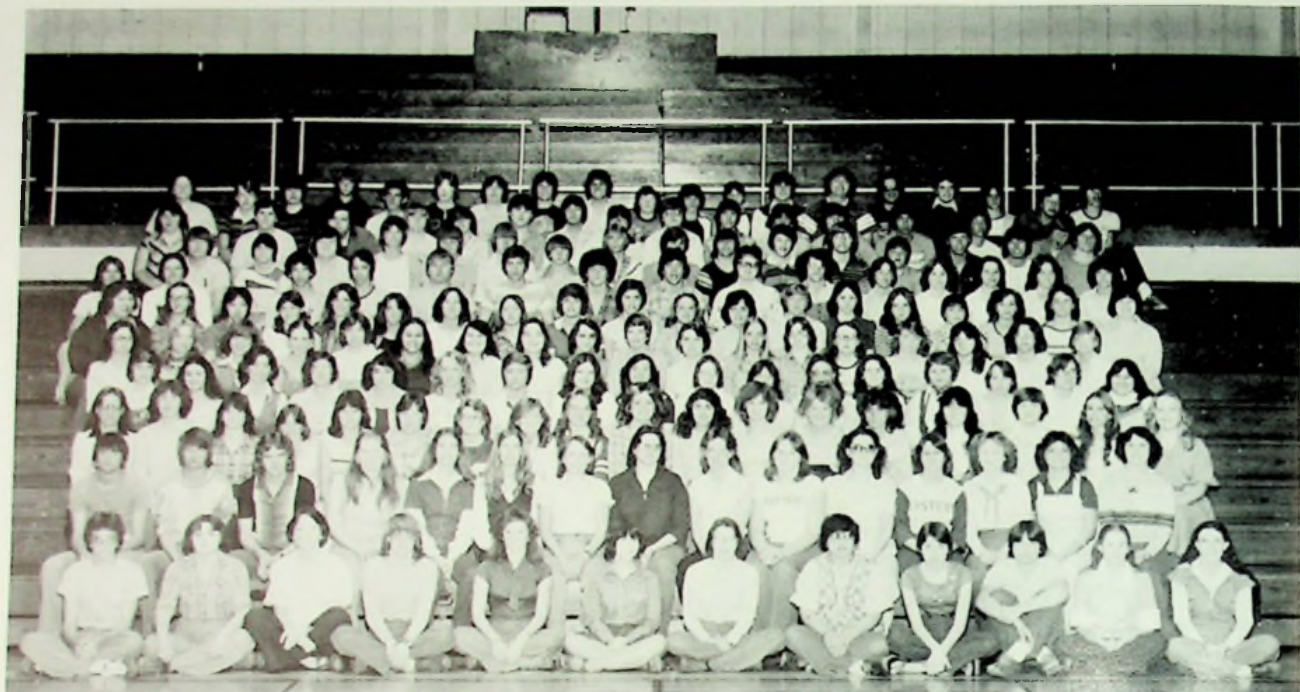

Humphrey Loses Final Battle

On Jan. 20, 1978, Sen. Hubert Horatio Humphrey died at the age of 66 after a lengthy battle with cancer. Humphrey, an outspoken liberal known for his lengthy speeches, was the prime mover behind medicare, the Peace Corps, the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and the Civil Rights Act of 1964. He was vice-president under Lyndon Johnson and made three unsuccessful tries to become President of the United States. He always recovered from his failures and attacked issues with such enthusiasm that he became known as "the happy warrior."

His illness did not slow him down nor dim his hopes. When asked if he might leave his Senate post, Humphrey replied, "Oh, I'm not resigning from anything. I may even join something." Vice-President Mondale said of Humphrey, "He showed us all how to die with dignity, with courage, with spirit, and with meaning."

Miners End Long Strike

After sixteen weeks of a strike, members of the United Mine Workers bitterly voted to return to work with a new contract. During those weeks they chose to ignore the advice of their president, Arnold Miller, by voting down a settlement negotiated by Miller with coal operators. They later largely ignored President Carter's institution of the Taft-Hartley Act.

The strike caused the lay-off of approximately 43,000 industrial and transportation workers and the shipping of 1.5 million tons of coal from the West and South to the eight worst affected states in the East and Midwest.

The new pact will raise wages from an average of \$7.80 an hour to \$10.20 an hour over three years and included other benefits.

Senate Passes Unpopular Canal Treaty

Senate debate on the Panama Canal treaties lasted for 38 days, more than any treaty required since the Versailles Treaty in 1919-20. The first half of the two treaty agreement was ratified in mid-March by an extremely narrow margin of 68-32. One more vote opposing Treaty I which guaranteed neutrality of the canal would have blocked the two-thirds majority needed for passage.

During the last of April, the second part of the treaty squeaked through by the same vote of 68-32. Treaty II states that on Dec. 31, 1999, the 51-mile canal will be turned over to Panama. Until then the canal will be operated by a commission of five U.S. and four Panamanian members with its defenses maintained by the U.S. under a combined board of officers in October, 1979, jurisdiction of the Canal Zone will pass to the Panamanians.

Lance Resigns

The Director of the Office of Management and Budget in the Carter Administration, Bert Lance, resigned his post after he was accused of improper bank dealings and unethical campaign practices. Investigations into his practices as head of two Georgia banks revealed persistent overdrafting by Lance's relatives, bank officers, and campaign committee.

Wheelersburg Gets Community Center

Porter Township received some good news when they were granted \$580,000 for the construction of a multi-purpose community building on land donated to the community by Everett Williams. The building, which is now under construction, is located on the triangle of land

where the old Wheelersburg Grade School had been. Ground breaking was held Dec. 20, 1977.

The center will house a fire station, emergency ambulance squad room, Porter Township offices, and a public library.

Italy Grieves Death of Aldo Moro

Italy's unstable political system was further shaken when the Communists of the terrorist Red Brigades killed Italy's former

prime minister Aldo Moro after kidnapping him 54 days previously. Moro was the president of the ruling Christian Democratic Party who refused to negotiate for Moro's life.

The discovery of Moro's bullet-riddled body found in a van set off a series of demonstrations in protest to the Italian Communist Party while Red Brigades leader Renato Curcio acclaimed the murder as "an act of revolutionary justice." Moro was buried quietly at a private family funeral. World leaders denounced the killing while Moro's personal friend, Pope Paul VI, called it "a stain of blood which dishonors our country."

Girls fashions in 1978 turned more feminine. Ruffled dresses and skirts accented with rows of lace and ribbon were the new look everywhere. The look was made softer by the use of pastel colors, floral prints, Quiana, and gauze. Cowl necks were also very popular during the fall and winter months. Along with these new styles the girls wore higher heels with thin straps and thicker soles.

News Briefs

Sun Day: The U.S. celebrated the first "Sun Day" on May 3 to commemorate the world's dependence on the sun and its hopes for solar energy as being a future solution to the energy crisis.

Gambling on East Coast: New Jersey legalized casino gambling in Atlantic City in 1976 in hopes of restoring employment and construction. On Memorial Day, high-class bankruptcy became available for the first time on the East Coast with the opening of the Resorts International Hotel Casino.

Son of Sam: David Berkowitz who fatally shot six people and wounded seven was captured in August of 1977. Berkowitz, an apparent psychotic killer who signed himself the "Son of Sam" in messages to a newspaper reporter, had kept New York police baffled for months.

Princess Margaret: Britain's Princess Margaret, younger sister of Queen Elizabeth II, divorced her husband of eighteen years, Antony Armstrong-Jones.

Donny Osmond: Half of the popular singing duo of Donny and Marie, Donny Osmond, crushed the hopes of teenage girls over the nation as the 20-year-old star claimed Debra Glenn, 19, as his bride at Salt Lake City's Mormon Temple.

Soviet Satellite: Cosmos 954, a Russian satellite carrying a nuclear reactor crashed in Canada. U.S. and Canadian search planes found an area of radiation near Yellowknife.

Larry Flynt: The publisher of the sex magazine "Hustler," was shot paralyzing him from the waist down. Flynt had turned over control of his multi-million dollar magazine business to his wife Althea after his religious conversion by Jimmy Carter's faith-healing sister Ruth Stapleton. Flynt faces a 7 to 25 year prison sentence for peddling pornography.

Anita vs. Homosexuals

Anita Bryant, nationally known as a singer and former beauty queen who proclaimed the merits of Florida orange juice in television commercials, led a successful drive to repeal an ordinance that had barred

discrimination against homosexuals in housing and hiring. Her stand touched off a campaign against homosexuals and a retaliation by the gays in the form of demonstrations wherever Anita spoke or sang.

Fans Mourn Elvis

Rock 'n Roll fans were shocked when their idol, singer Elvis Presley, was found dead of a heart attack at the age of 42. His sexy bumps and grinds during his performances in the mid-50's disturbed parents and delighted teenagers. Elvis initiated a new era in pop music with a long line of hits beginning with "Heartbreak Hotel," "Hound Dog," "All Shook Up," and "Jailhouse Rock," which caused him to be acclaimed as the "King of Rock 'n Roll."

Elvis' death prompted a rush by fans on his records to the point that RCA had to go on 24-hour shifts to keep up with the demand. The death also touched off a variety of tributes to Elvis while marketing took advantage of the situation to sell such memorabilia as Elvis T-shirts, jewelry, and photographs.

T.V. Shows

Mini-series again proved to be the most talked about programs on T.V. They included "Sybil," a true story of a girl with many personalities; "Wheels," a tale of executives in the automobile industry; "How the West Was Won"; and "Holocaust," a dramatization of the agony and extermination of European Jews under the Nazis.

Few regularly scheduled programs were big hits. "Three's Company" and "Love Boat" both comedies, seemed to be the most popular.

Best liked commercials were those about McDonald's Quarter Pounder Person and Dr. Pepper People.

Wallenda Falls

Karl Wallenda, the greatest of the wire walking family, fell to his death at the age of 73. He was attempting to walk on a cable suspended 120 feet above the ground between two hotels in Puerto Rico when the wind gusted above 30 mi./hr. causing him to lose his balance. The Great Wallendas at one time attempted a seven-man pyramid which fell killing two members of the family and paralyzing Karl's son.

Spinks Wins Title

One of the biggest upsets in sports history came in February when Muhammed Ali at 36 years lost his title of Heavyweight Champion of the World to 24-year-old Leon Spinks. Ali first won the title as Cassius Clay, Jr., in 1964 when he beat then 35-year-old Sonny Liston. Ali continuously boasted as being "the greatest" since that time.

Spinks, a 10-1 underdog, had only seven fights as a pro before winning the decision after 15 rounds with Ali.

Fire in Portsmouth

A fire destroyed five businesses in Portsmouth's historic Boneyfiddle District on May 3 razing most of a block of the city. Some of the buildings were more than 100 years old.



Science Fiction Movies Are Popular

The surprise movie of the year at Academy Awards was "Annie Hall" taking three Oscars for best movie, best actress (Diane Keaton), and best director (Woody Allen). The best actor award went to Richard Dreyfuss for his leading role in "The Goodbye Girl."

Space science fiction was a dominating theme for the movie makers of 1978. "Star Wars" made an unexpected box office smash at the beginning of the year, leading the way for another hit, "Close Encounters of a Third Kind." Both movies feature stunning visual and sound effects. John Travolta made his leading

debut as a Saturday night disco king in the movie "Saturday Night Fever." The movie flaunted its breath taking dance floor action and no. 1 sound track recording. This inspired a renewed nationwide boom in white suits and vests such as Travolta's apparel in the movie and an increase in the hustle on the dance floor.

Other movies spotlighting the '78 year were "You Light Up My Life," a love story; the James Bond flick "The Spy Who Loved Me"; "Julia"; and "Oh, God," a comedy starring George Burns.

Blizzard Hits Midwest

On Feb. 2 the midwest was hit by a blizzard of deadly ferocity which closed highways, paralyzed cities, and buried buildings and vehicles killing people in its wake. Chicago's O'Hare Airport, the world's busiest, shut down completely for only the third time in history. In Cleveland the temperature had dropped in a two hour period from 43 degrees to 18 degrees with a wind chill factor of -50 degrees. Snow and winds of

75 m.p.h. resulted in zero visibility.

Ohio, Michigan, and Indiana joined Kentucky in declaring states of emergency after record snow falls. One trucker had been missing for five days before a relative found him in his truck which had been buried in a snow bank. Governor James Rhodes described the storm as "a killer . . . looking for victims."

U.S. Says Goodbye to Bing

America lost one of its best loved singers when Bing Crosby died in October of a heart attack at the age of 73. Born Harry Lillis, Bing got his name from a favorite comic strip called "The Bingville Bugle." He was well known for his crooning style of singing and his familiar "ba ba boo."

Crosby made 850 recordings during his 50 years in show business that included his best known "White Christmas" which he introduced in movies along with "Holiday Inn," "Swinging on a

Star," and "Going My Way." "White Christmas" sold almost 40 million copies making it the best selling single of all time. He also made about 70 movies including "Bells of St. Mary's" and "Going My Way." His acting brought him two academy awards. He had a gift for comedy which he often paired with good friend Bob Hope in movies.

His favorite type of relaxation was golf, and Bing's death came as he left the eighteenth hole of a golf course. His last words were, "It was a great game."

Wallace Ends Political Career

In what was billed as a routine political speech, Alabama Gov. George Wallace announced with breaking voice that he would not run for the U.S. Senate surprising even his closest aides. Since he could not succeed himself as gov-

ernor, the 58-year-old Wallace apparently ended his political career. Wallace was known for his resistance to federal integration, for his attacks on bureaucracy, and for his three campaigns for the presidency as a populist outsider.

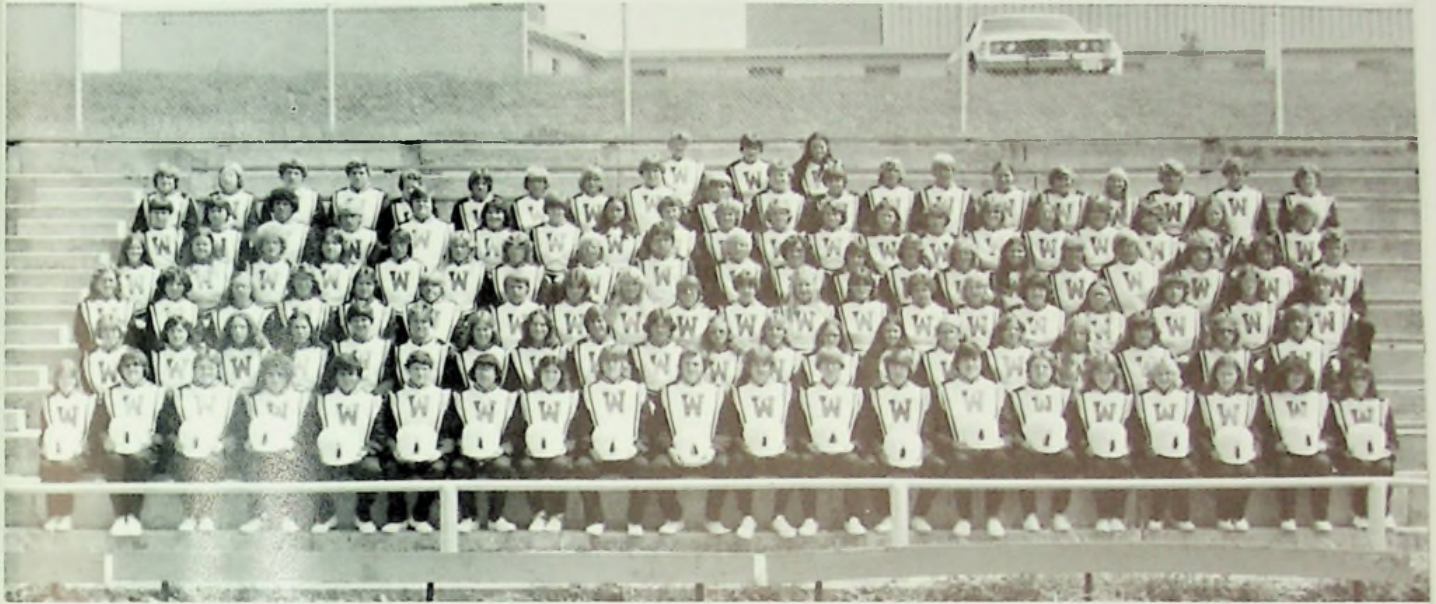

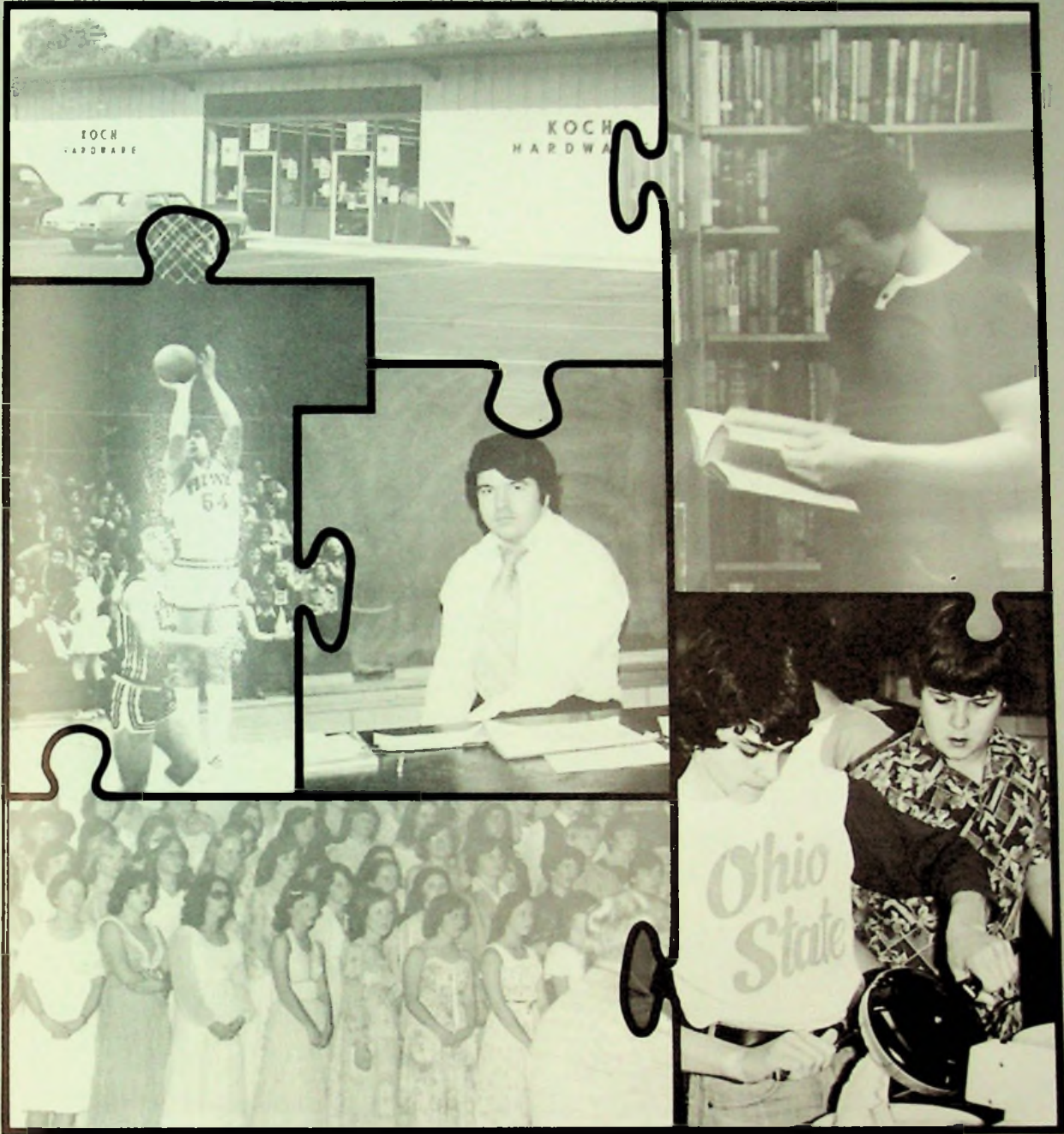

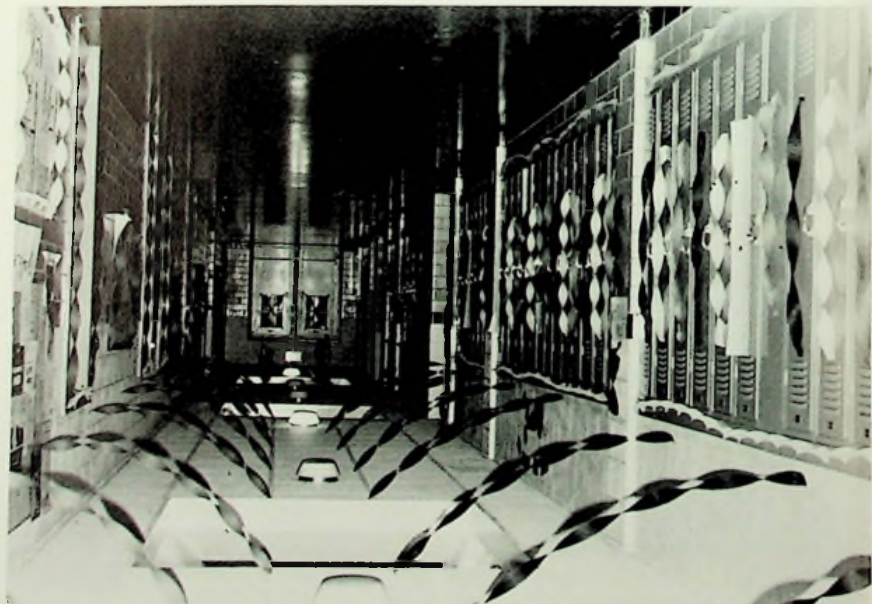

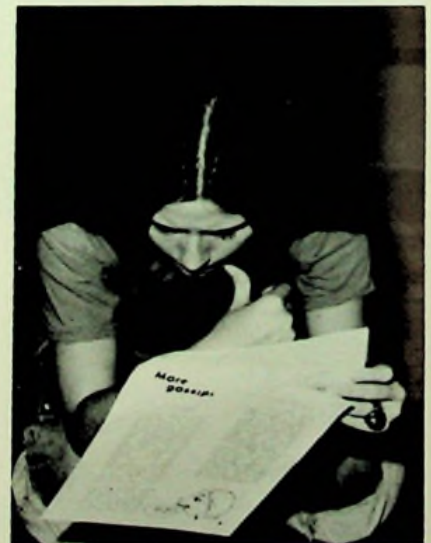

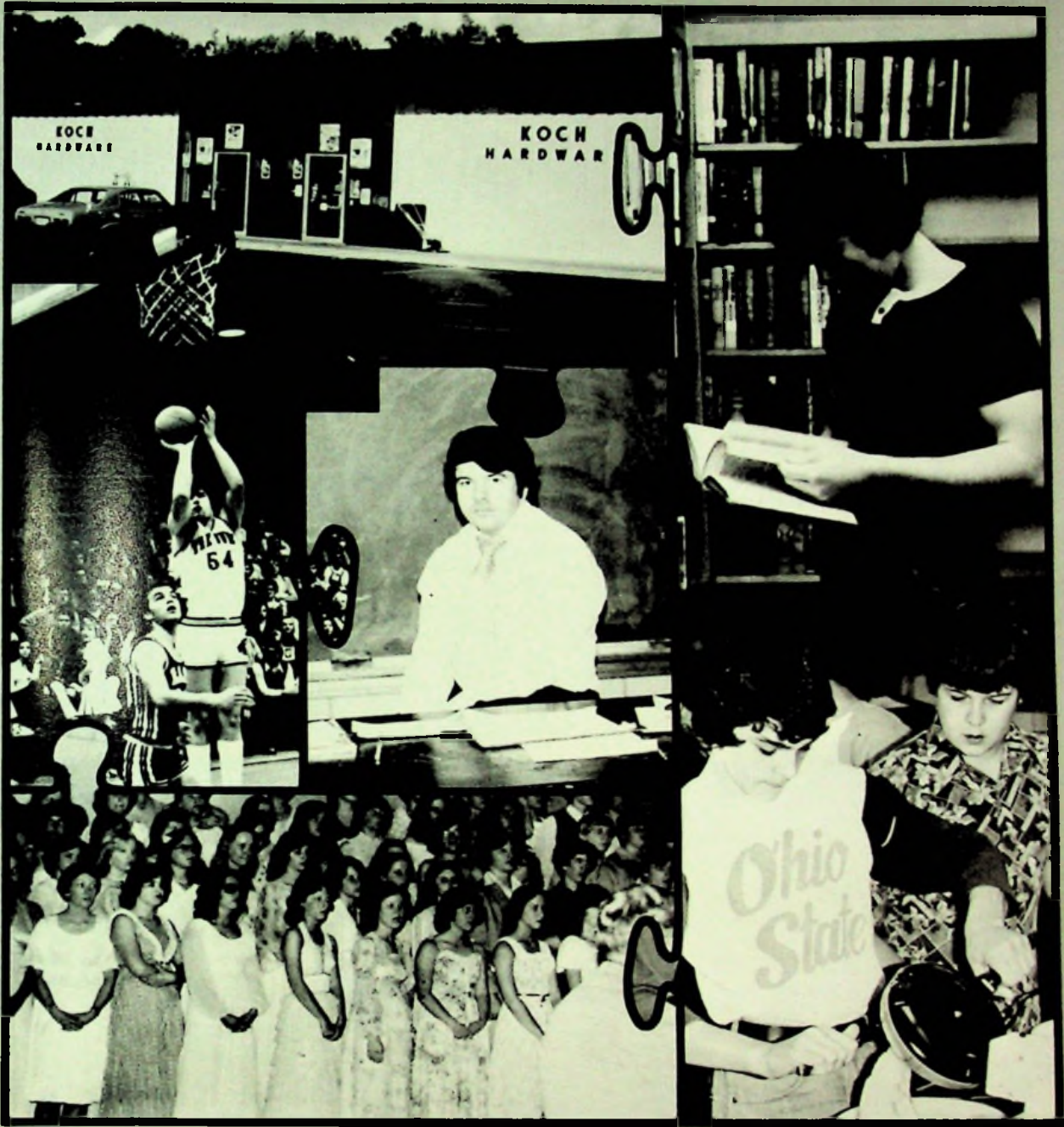

"We really worked hard, and I think we showed a lot of team effort," said senior team member Dennis DeCamp.

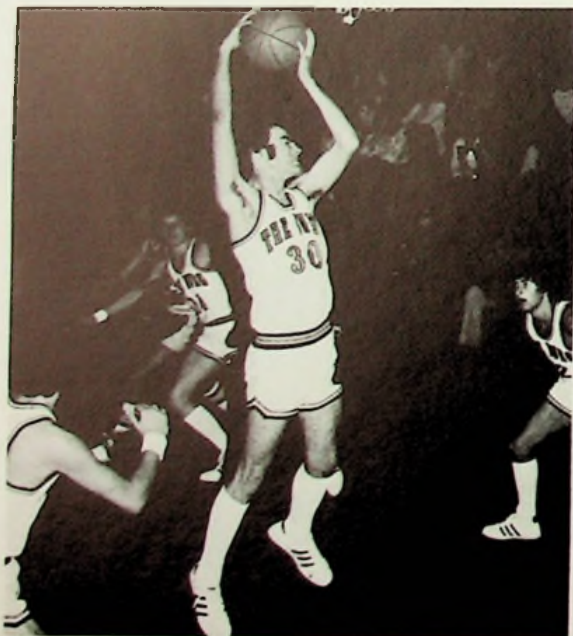
The Pirates had one of the tallest teams in the area with only two of the twelve on the varsity roster being under six feet. The team carried one of their toughest schedules ever.

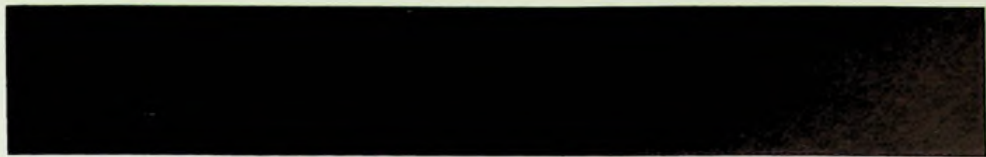

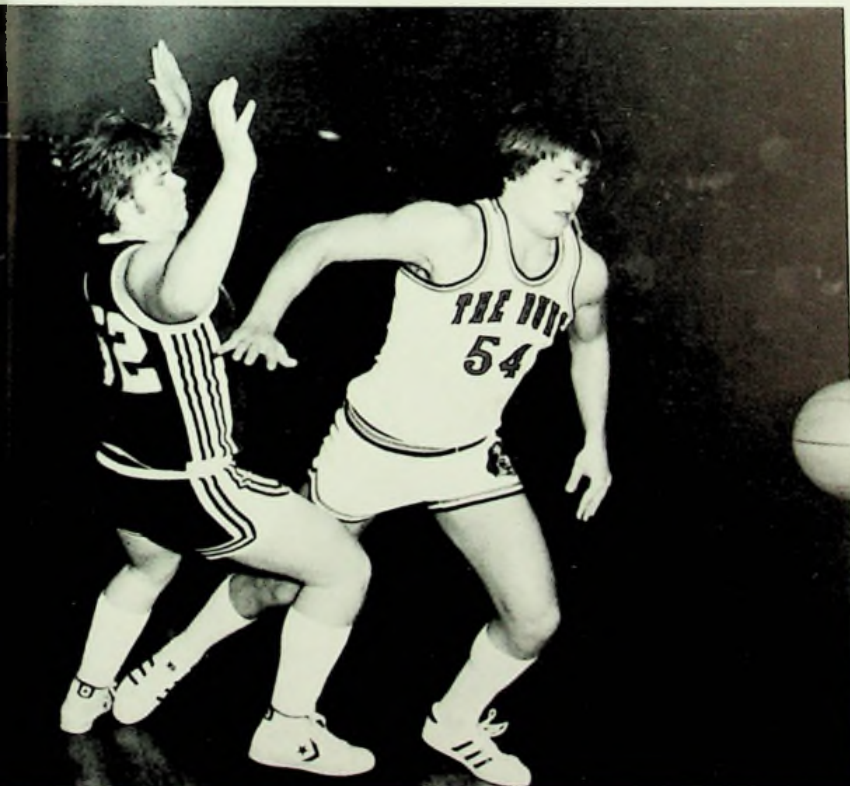

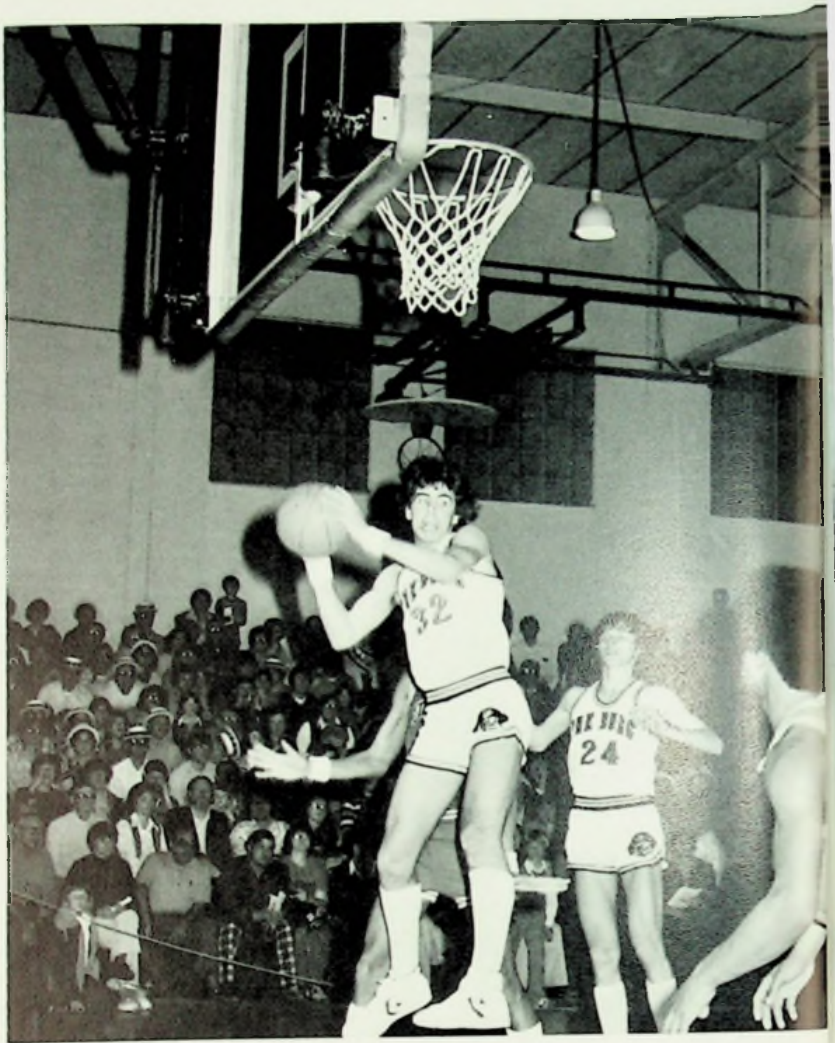

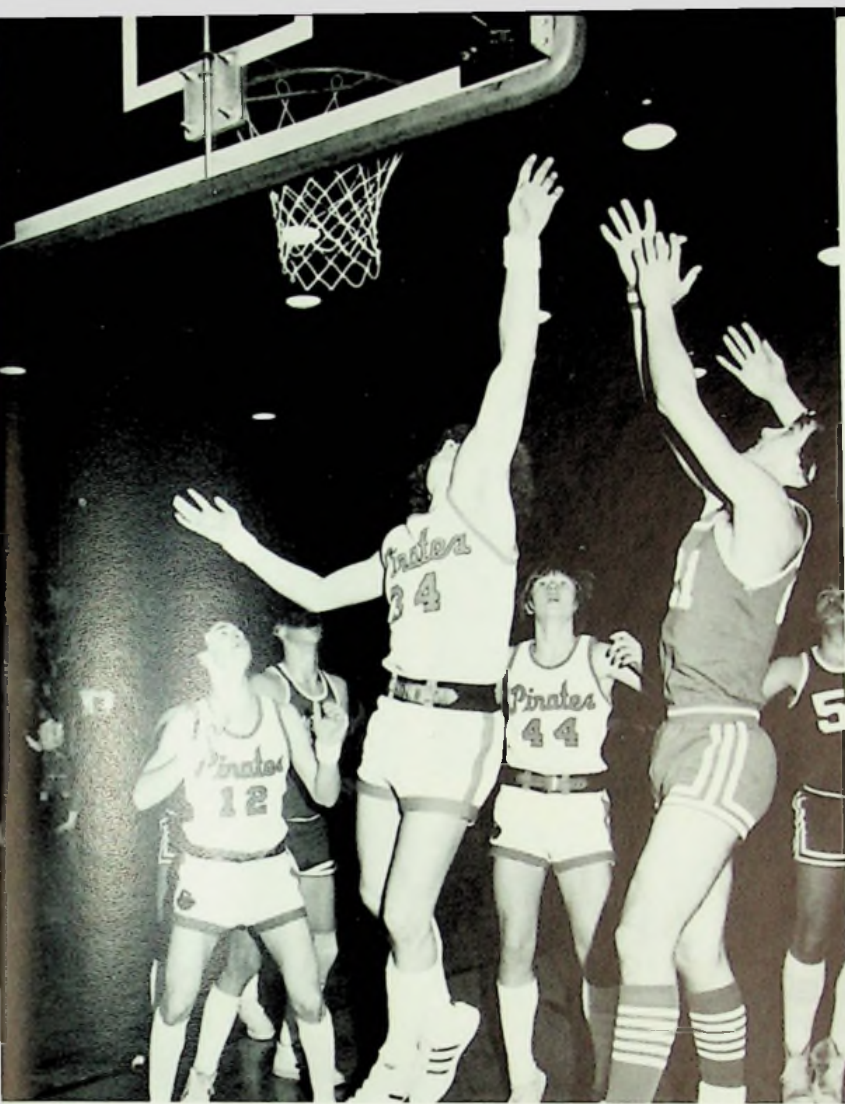

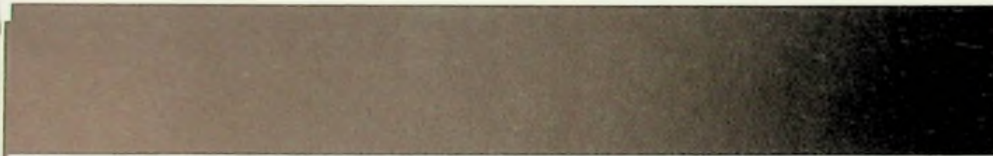

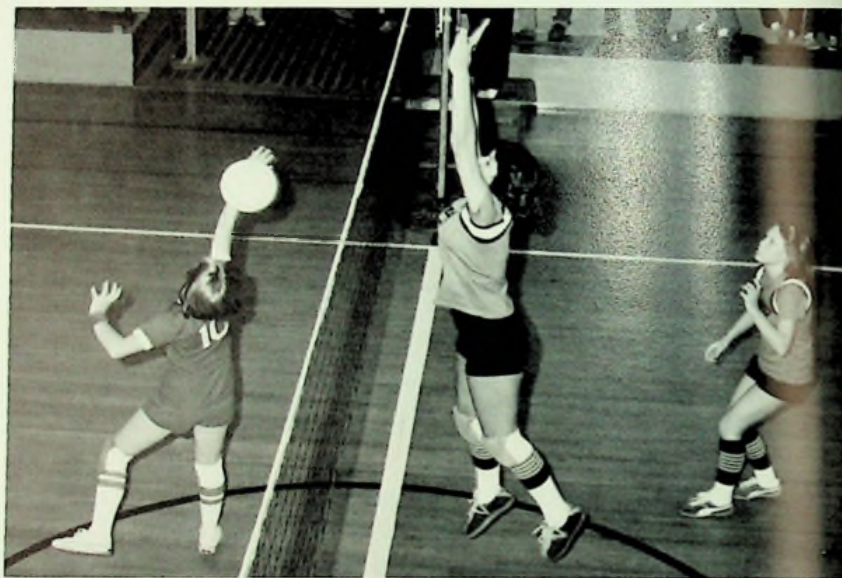

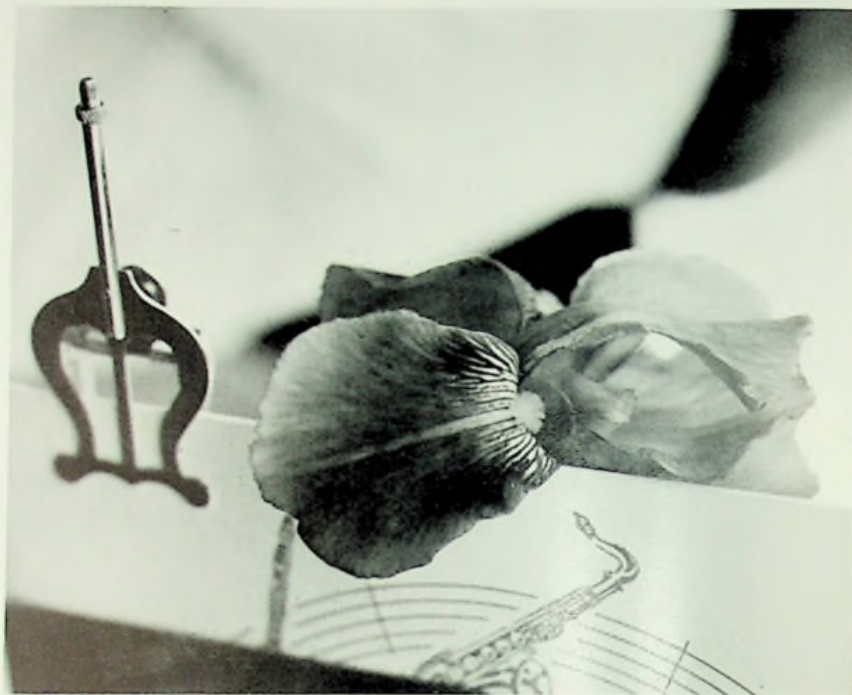
