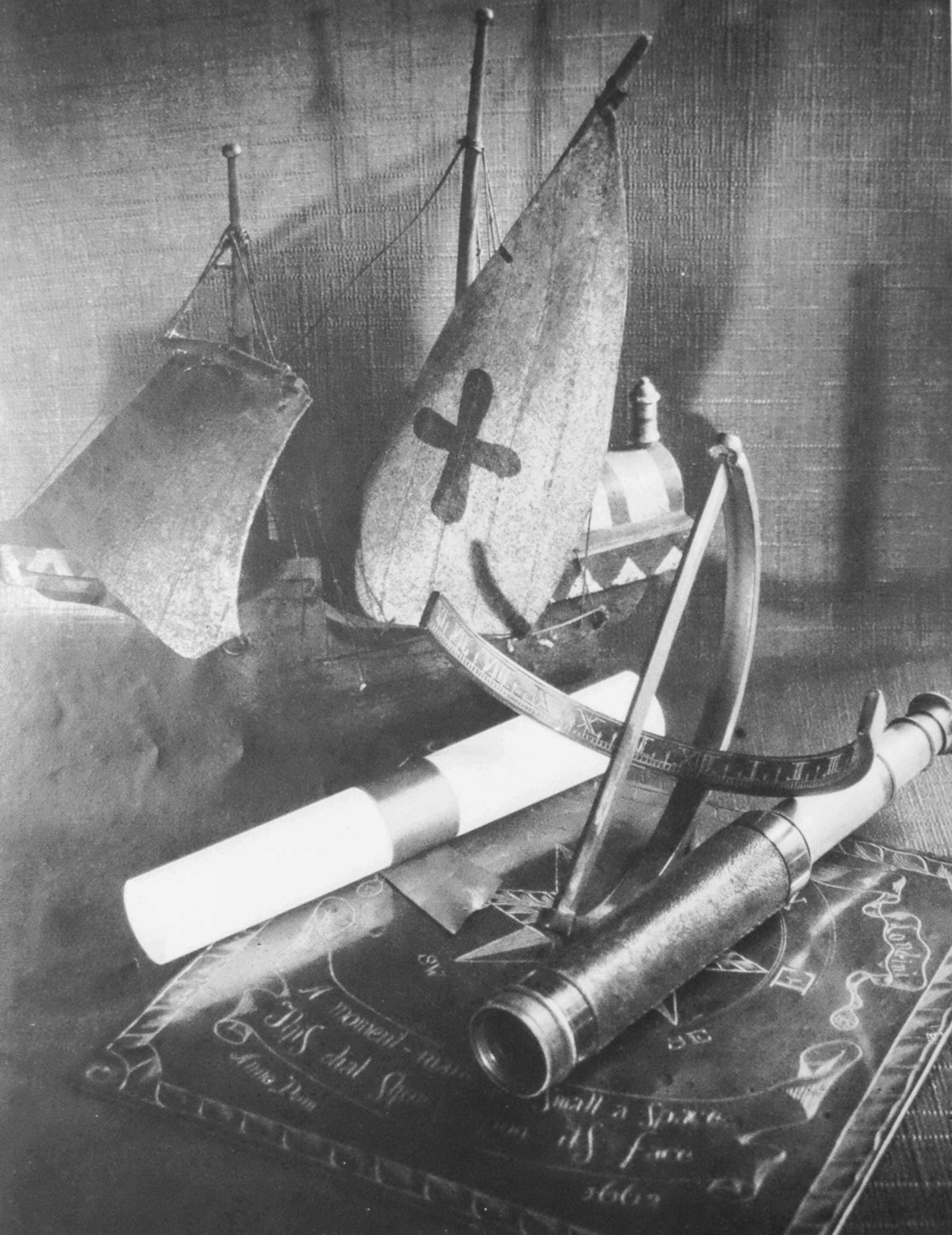

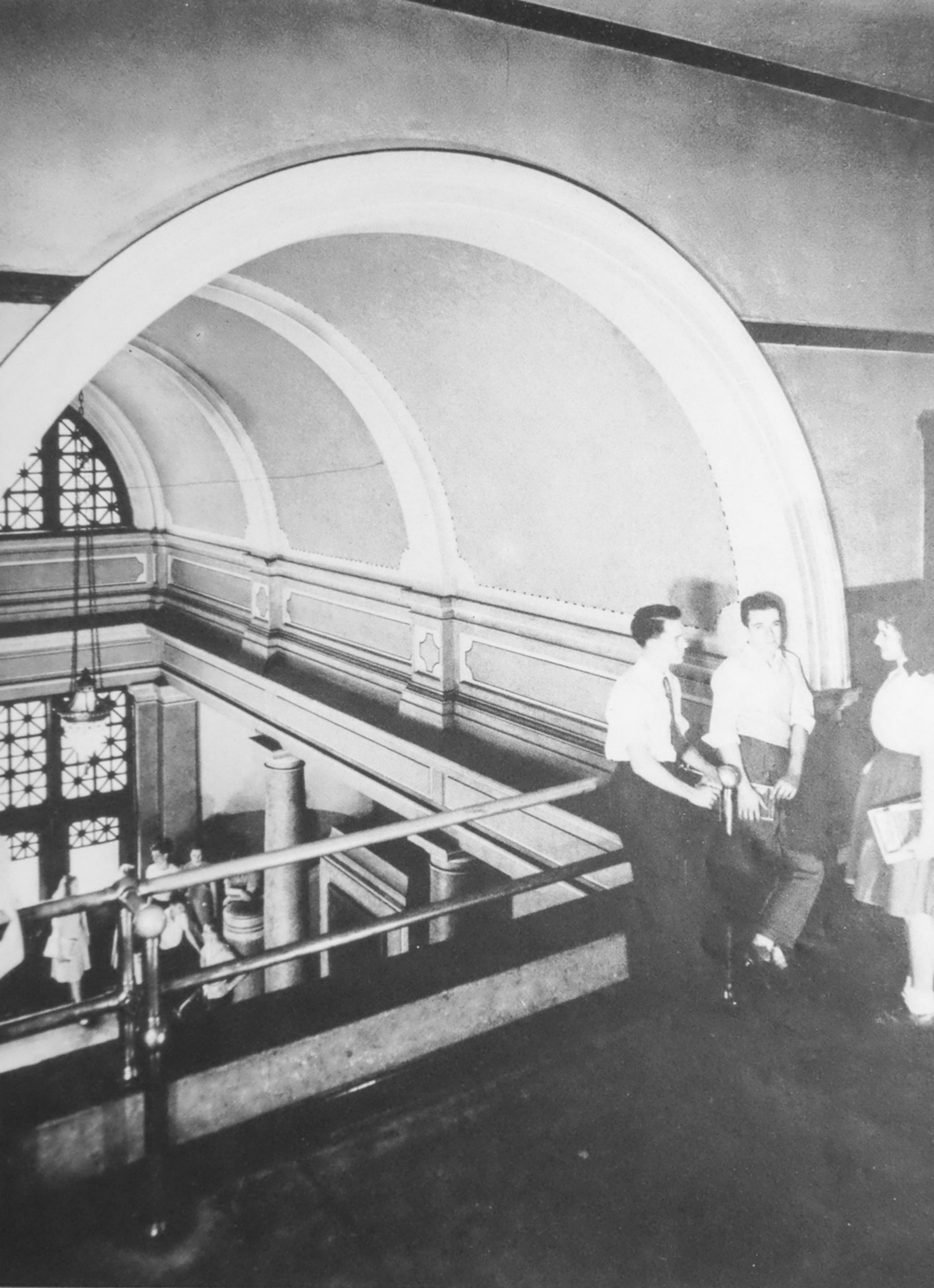

# Stronghands at the helm



Determining and enforcing school policy is the task of the administration. Headed by the law-makers — the school board — this includes also the superintendent and the principal. Members of the Board of Education (pictured, center left) are: Dr. S. E. Moorhead, Wesley Ridenour, clerk; Creighton C. Craigmiles; Lawrence Daniels, President; Arthur D. Lynn, (inset) Vice-Pres.; and Doctor William Stone (inset), now a captain in active service with the U. S. army. Meeting twice each month, they discuss school problems, formulate its rules, and administer to its needs.

Working closely with the school board in overseeing all city schools is the new superintendent, W. Dennis Perkinson, who is completing his first year in office. Last year he served as assistant principal of the high school, and was at one time the principal of Massie Elementary School. Mr. Perkinson received his B. S. degree at Ohio Northern University and his M. A. degree at Ohio State University.

Assisting Mr. Perkinson as secretary is Miss Thelma Hopkins (pictured, bottom left). Miss Hazel Toney serves as Mr. Ridenour's secretary.

# *"There is no frigate like a book"*

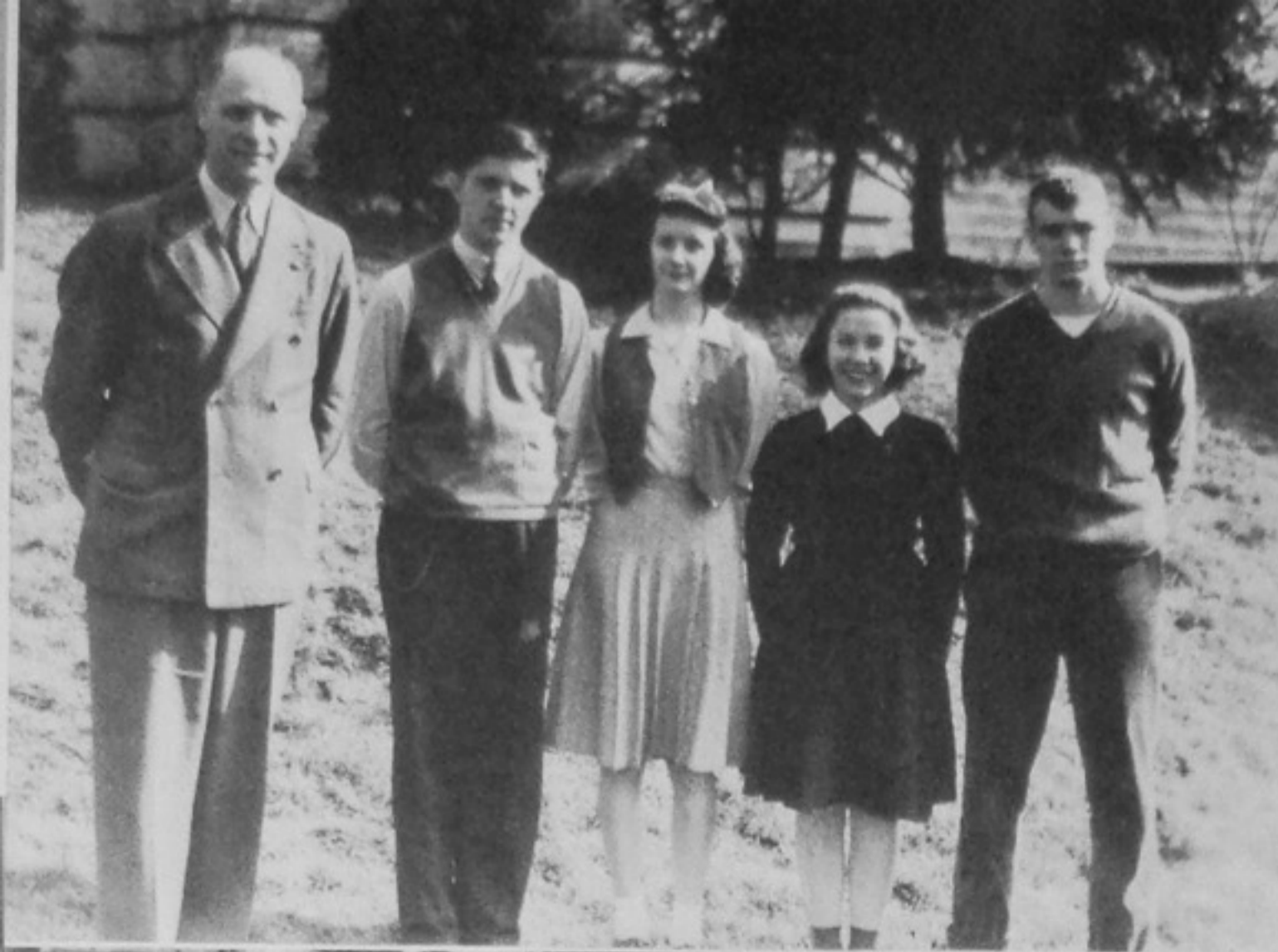
The most popular room in Portsmouth High School is the library. It is estimated that approximately six hundred students use it daily. The library is well stocked with college catalogues as well as reference and reading books. It is considered one of the best equipped school libraries in the state of Ohio.

Miss Martha Warren, the librarian, is a graduate of the University of Kentucky with an A. B. degree. Starting the second semester, Miss Warren taught a library class (lower left) that met once a week. This consisted of 9B pupils from the English classes of Miss Trowbridge and Miss Hazlebeck. Its purpose was to teach them the proper use of the library. Miss Warren stated that the class was very successful, and that she plans to continue it next year.

Student Council has sponsored all assemblies and has introduced scripture reading and prayer at the beginning of each assembly. It took charge of the weekly War Stamp sale, the total receipts for 13 weeks amounting to \$1500.00.

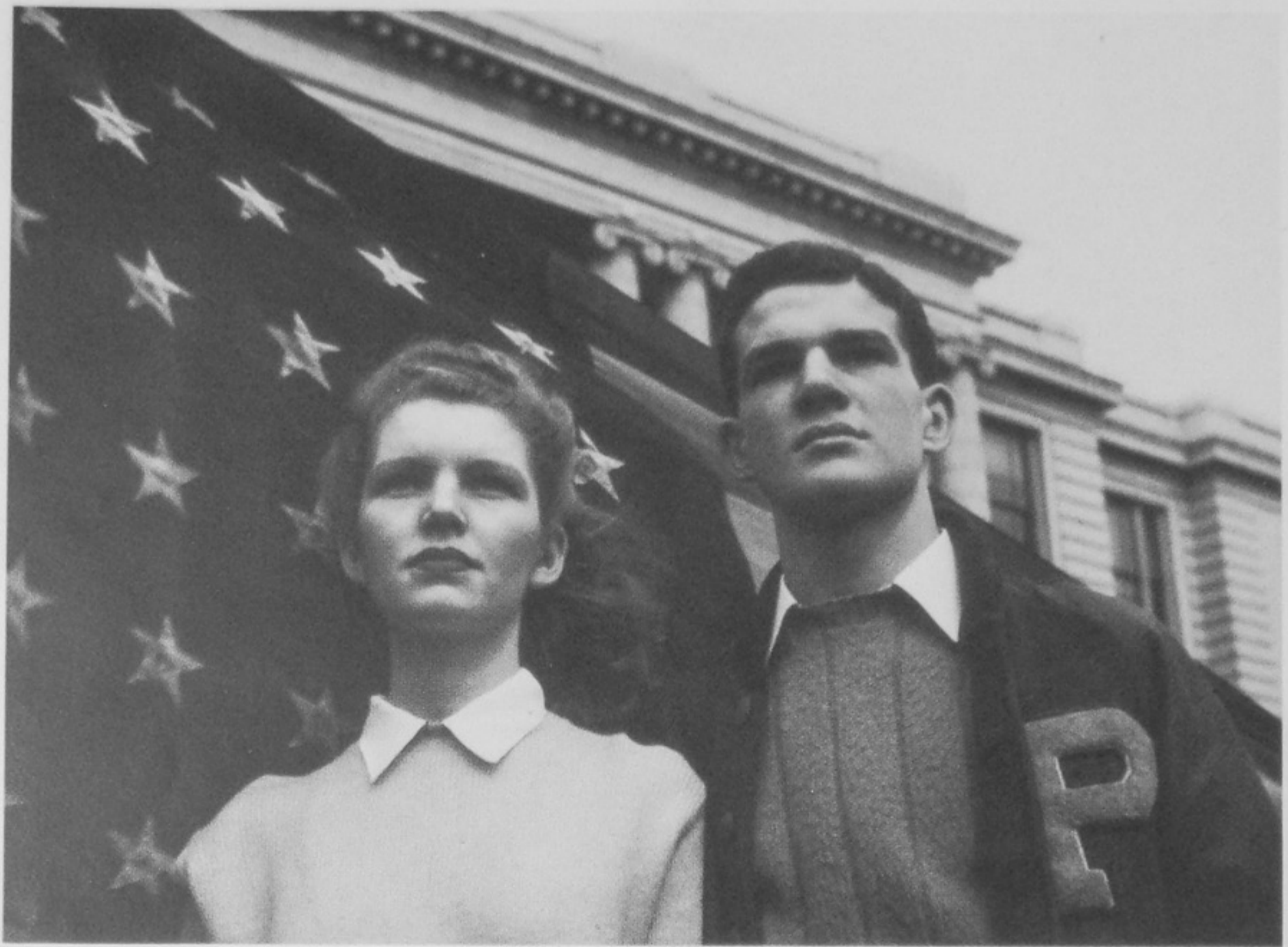
which they have achieved in high school is but a fore-runner of that which they will receive in later life.

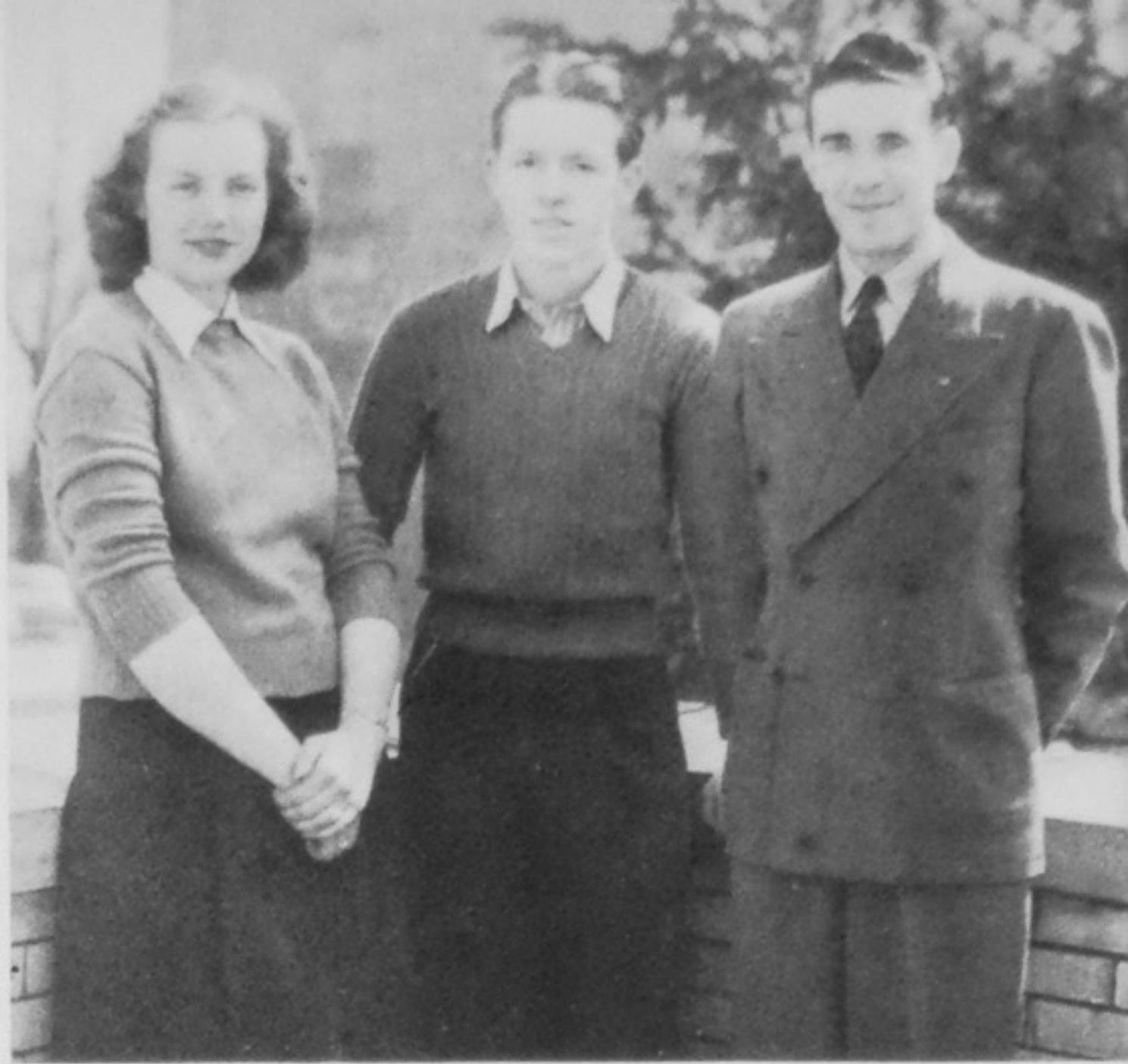

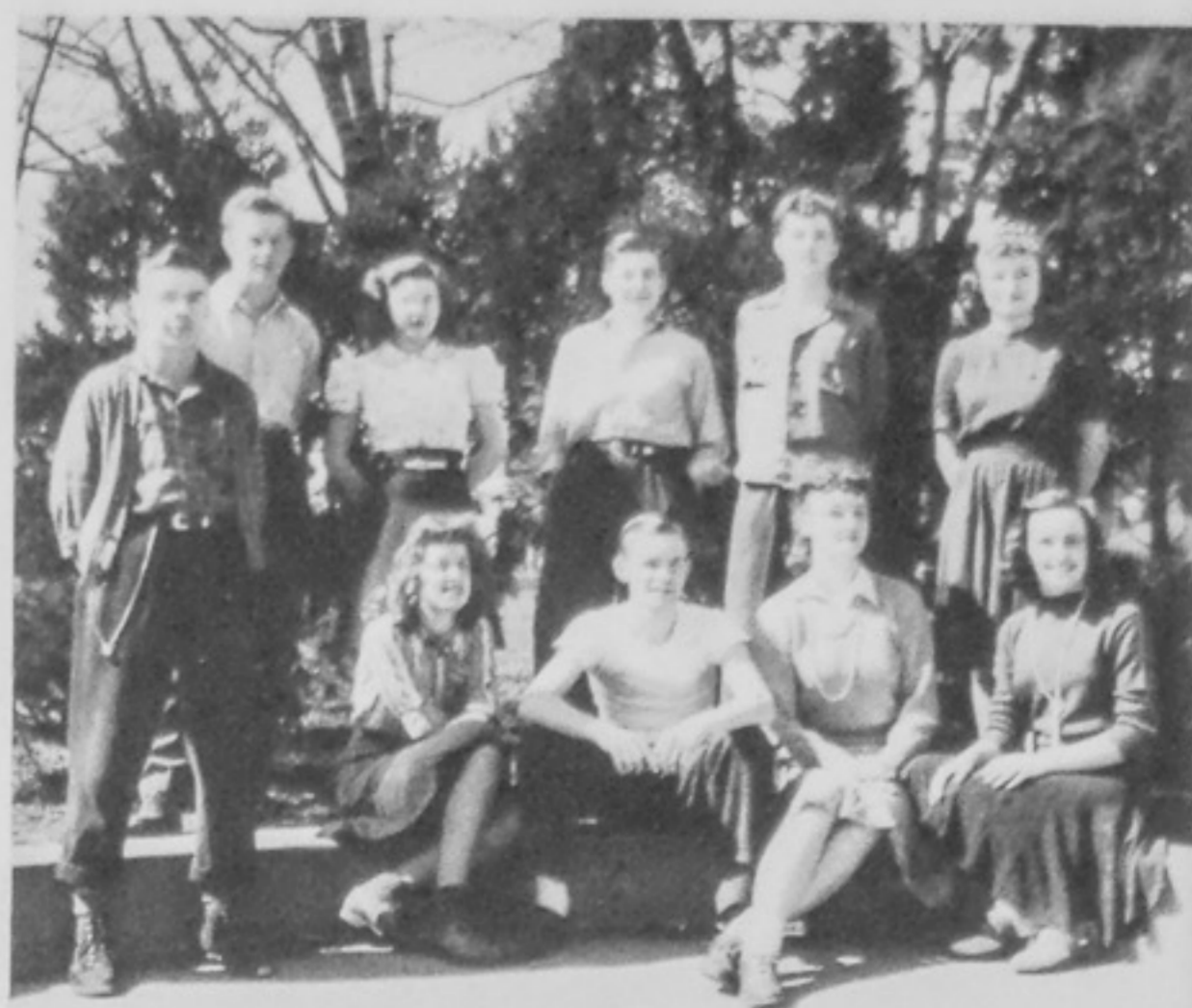

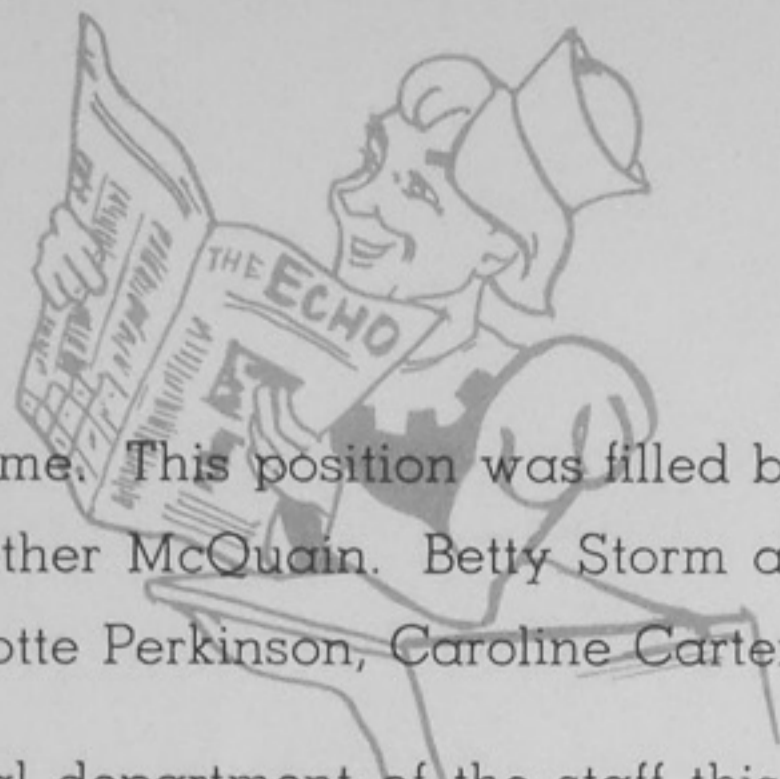

I sat back and laughed at would-be actors such as Rolland Scott, giggling as if he were being tickled, and Patty Denton, weeping as though her heart were broken. One Friday morning, I was excused to go with the selected civics students to attend naturalization ceremonies at the American Legion Hall.

The football team has opened its season with enthusiasm. In spite of the new yells and cheerleaders, we lost the first game to Akron South, 7-6. A week later, I went to Columbus to see the Trojans tie North High, 6-6.

On the whole, I am quite satisfied with my discoveries, and I feel that I am being received in a way fitting to a representative of your majesty.

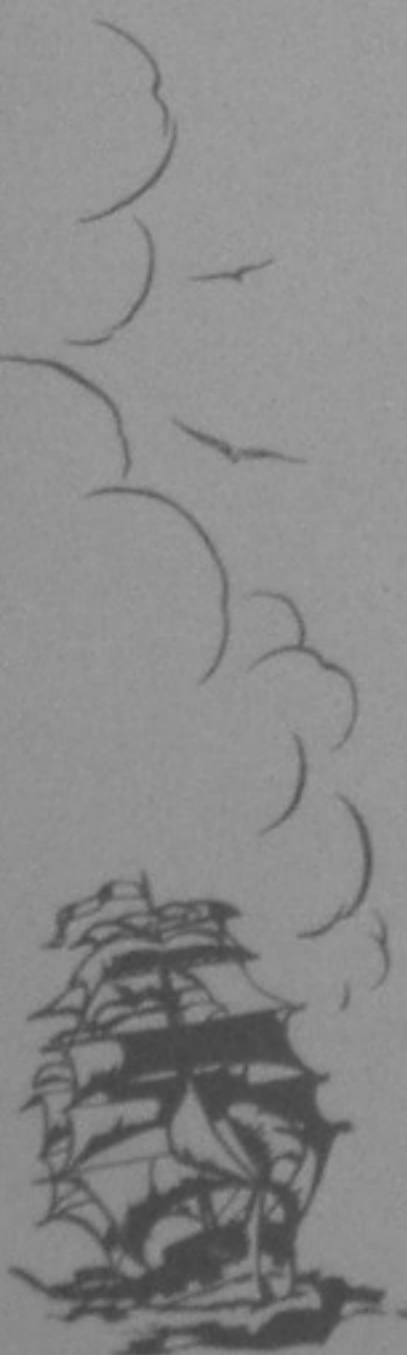
To Queen Isabella:

# Words fitly spoken....

English, our everyday language, plays a major part in every student's curriculum. The first two years are spent mainly in the study of English grammar, while the last two are devoted almost entirely to literature. In the junior year the emphasis is upon American authors, and in the senior year, English literature has an important role.

Miss Lucy Riggs, Miss Helen Dupre, and Miss Ruth Hazlebeck teach first year English. Miss Riggs received her A.B. degree at Western College for Women. She also attended the University of Virginia and took her graduate work at Columbia University. Miss Dupre obtained her B.A. degree at Ohio Wesleyan University and Ohio University was the scene of her graduate work. Miss Hazlebeck secured her B.S. degree in Education from Ohio State University, and also attended Western College, at Oxford, Ohio.

Although the sophomore year deals for the most part with grammar, there is more of a trend toward literature than in the first year English. One of the highlights in sophomore literature is the story

of Silas Marner. Miss Isabel Musser, who teaches second year English, attended Ohio Wesleyan University, where she received her B.A. degree. Miss Genevieve Dupre, who also teaches sophomore English received her B.S. degree at Ohio University. She attended Oberlin Conservatory of Music and took graduate work at Miami University and the University of Wisconsin.

The writings of our own American authors are studied in the junior year of English under the guidance of Miss Mary Elizabeth Schwartz and Miss Carrie Pfarr. Miss Schwartz received her B.A. degree at Western College for Women and her M.A. degree at Ohio State University. She also took graduate work at Ohio University. Writing poetry is one of her chief interests, as is the Verse-makers Club, which she sponsors. Miss Pfarr is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University where she secured her B.A. degree and Columbia University where she obtained her M.A. degree. Also, she is the advisor of the English Club.

The Shakespearian drama, *Macbeth*, is the piece de resis-

tance of the senior year of literature. Miss Gurney Moel and Miss Margaret Anderson are the teachers of fourth year English. Miss Anderson, who is also advisor of the *Echo*, the school newspaper, received her B.A. degree at Ohio Wesleyan University. She also attended the University of Wisconsin, and the University of Arizona. Miss Noel's Alma Mater is Columbia University from which she obtained her B.S. and M.A. degrees.

Speech is studied in the junior and senior years along with the regular English work. This is a very important part of the English department and it can determine whether or not a student fails or passes his English course. Miss Elizabeth Anderson, the speech instructor, has charge of many of the dramatic productions of the school. She is the advisor of Revellers, the school's dramatic club. She attended Ohio Wesleyan University and received her B.A. degree in Education at Ohio Wesleyan. Her graduate work was taken at the University of Cincinnati.

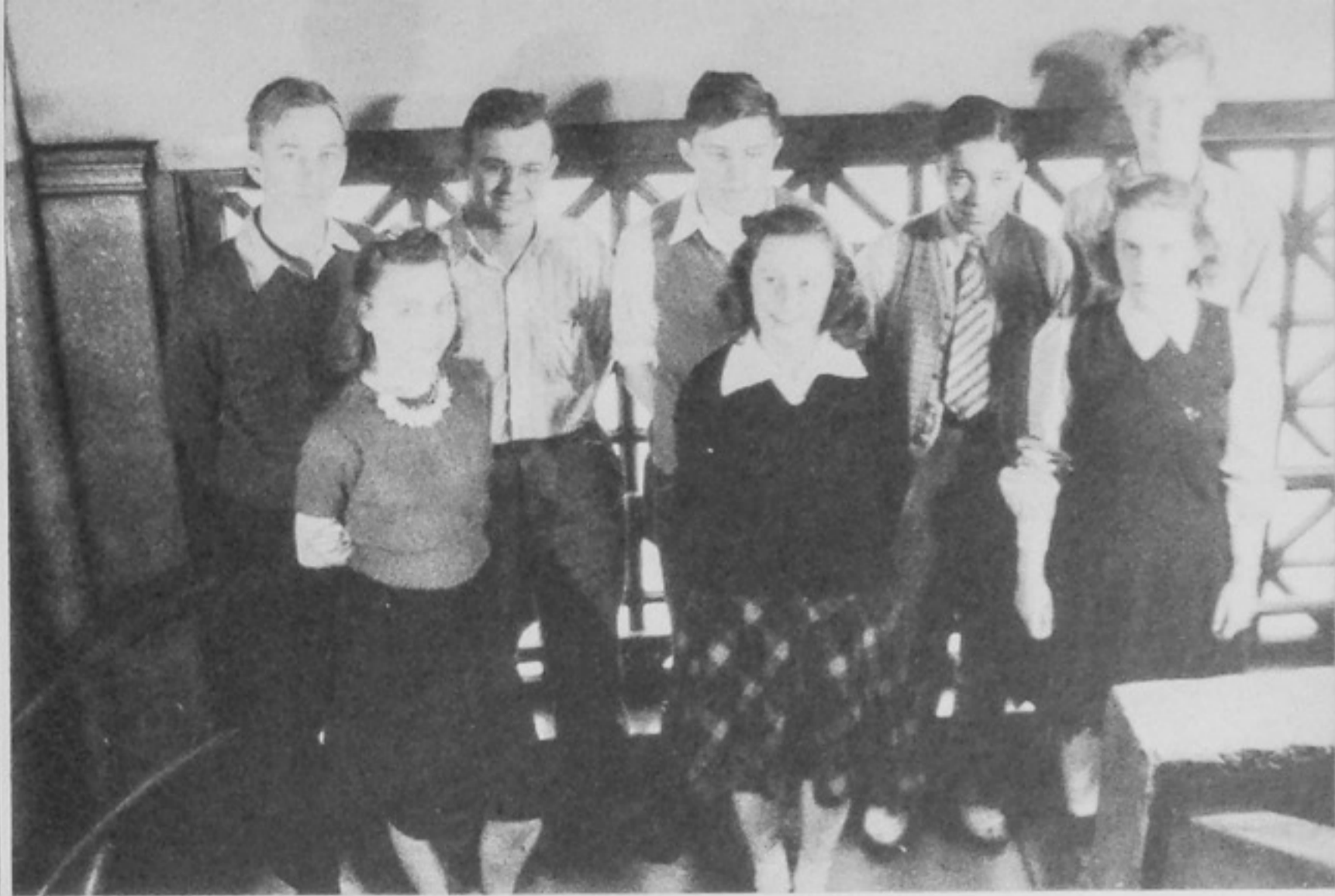
In addition to programs and the above mentioned writers, the anniversaries of Lincoln and Washington were celebrated by selections dealing with their lives. Poems, stories,

Probably the last thing in the world of which the average student believes himself capable is the art of writing poetry. The very word **poet** calls to his mind a picture of a starving man in a garret, striving vainly to find a rime for silver, while the candlelight flickers dimly and the rats play about in the empty larder.

However, the members of Verse-makers by no means undergo such torture as this to compose, even though the fine for not turning in a poem is five cents. The membership of Verse-makers is limited by their constitution to twenty-five. Prospective members must submit samples of their verse which are passed or rejected by the executive committee.

At alternate meetings, original poems are submitted, read, and criticized. Sometimes the assignment is a poem about a special subject. At other times, the members try their hands at different verse forms, anything from the limerick to the sonnet.

A favorite game played at the

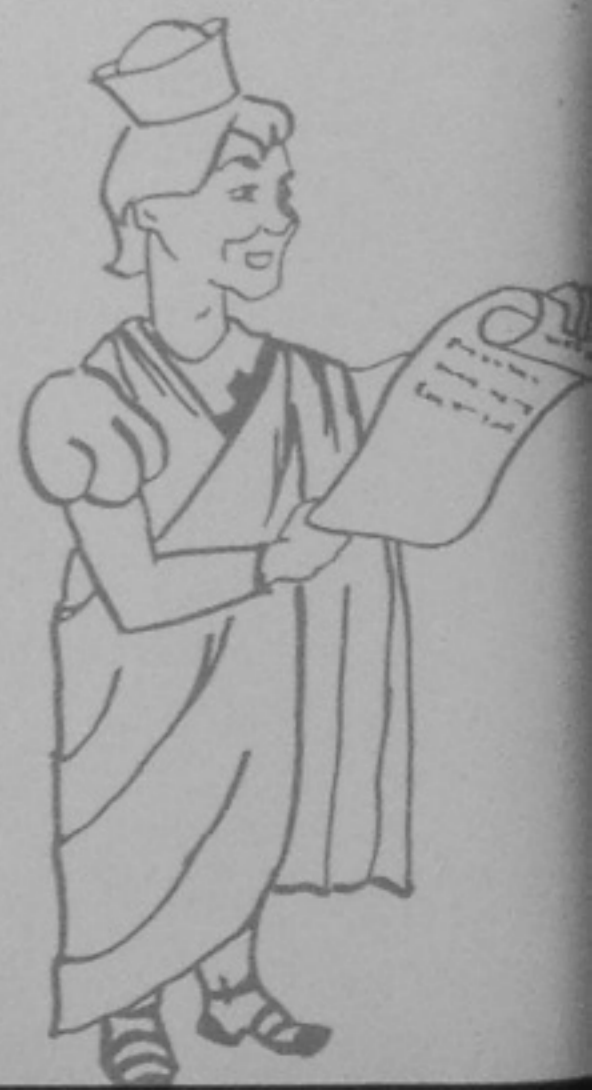

# Peut-etre vous parlez le Francais



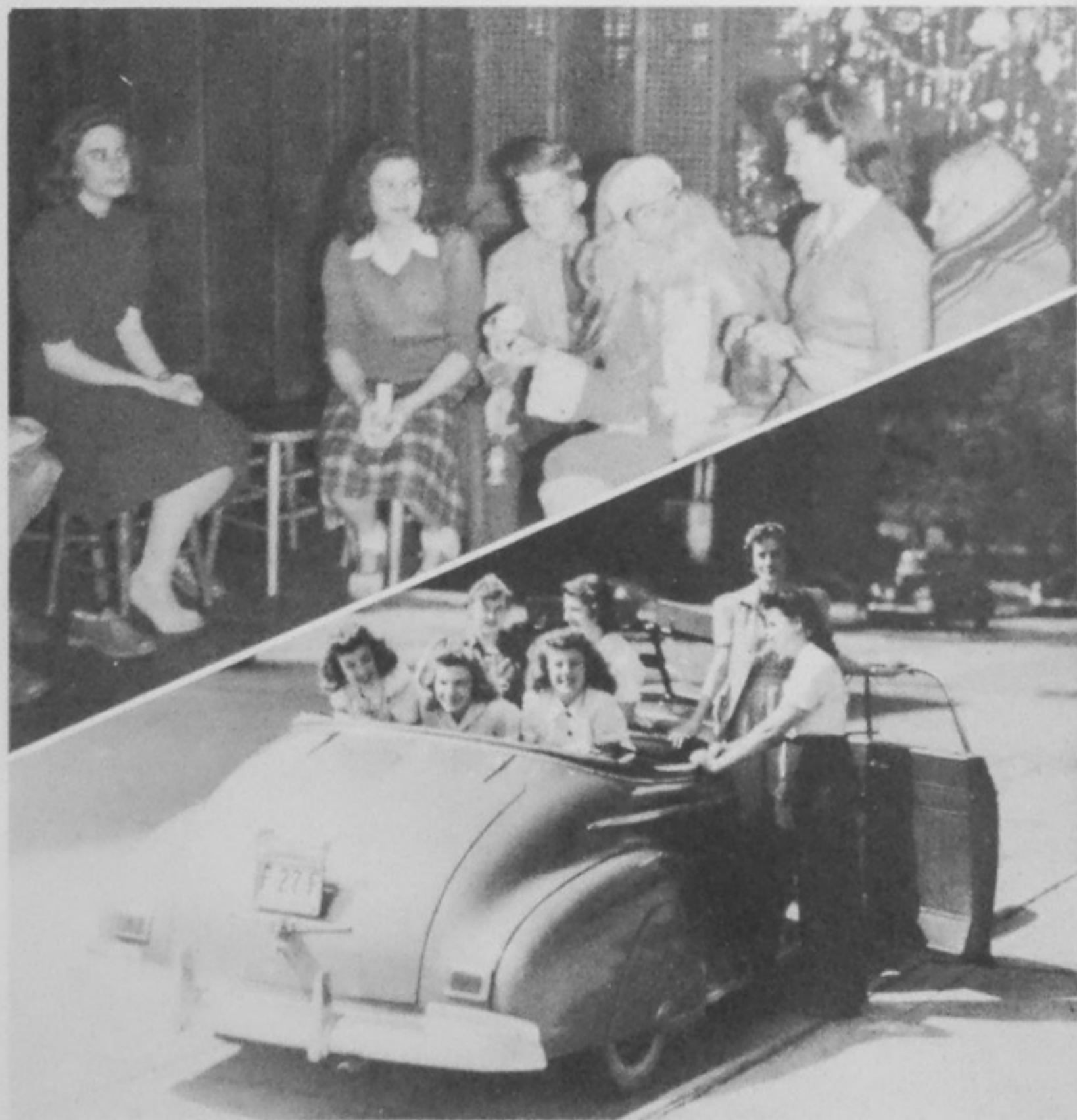

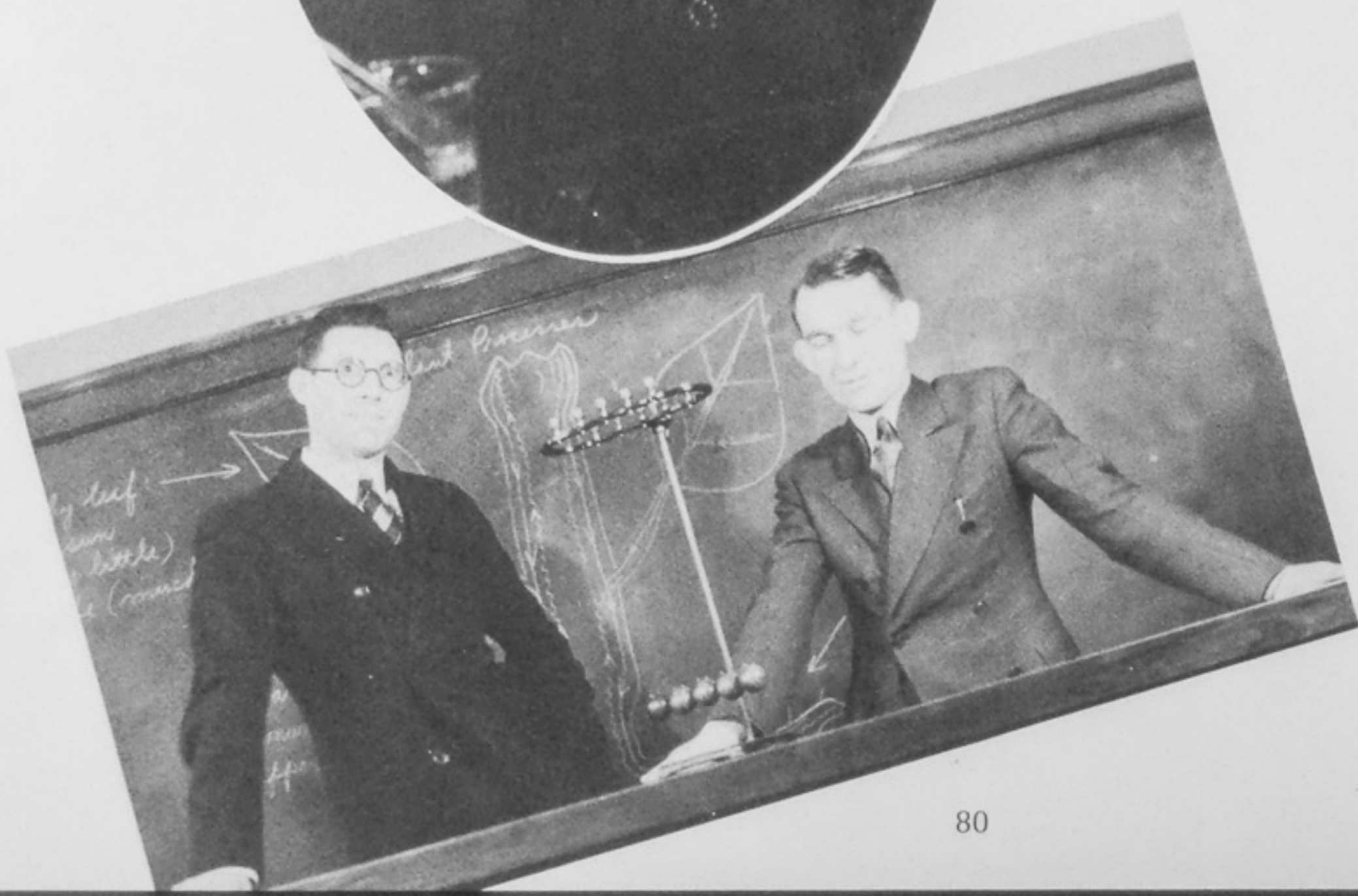

# *microscope and telescope*

Portsmouth High School offers such a wide selection of scientific subjects that it would be very difficult to determine which particular subject is the most popular with the students.

During the first year of high school, the freshman has a taste of practically all the sciences in the study of general science. This is taught by Mr. Howard Long, Mr. Charles Lorentz, and Mr. Lowell Adams.

Mr. Long attended Ohio State University where he received his B.A. and M.A. degrees, and his B.S. degree in Education. Besides teaching general science, Mr. Lorentz coaches the reserve basketball and football teams. He received his B.A. degree at Marietta College. Mr. Adams obtained his A.B. degree from the University of Iowa. Also he attended Miami University, and has taken graduate work at Ohio University. In addition to his general science classes, Mr. Adams also teaches some biology students.

Biology attracts many sophomores and juniors who are interested in delving into the mysteries of the fish, crayfish, frog, and the earthworm. Mr. Carl Meadows, a new member of the faculty instructs most of the biology students. He attended Transylvania College, where he secured his A.B. degree.

Other students select physics for scientific study in their junior year. Mr. A. K. Wheeler is the only physics instructor. He attended Dennison University where he received his B. S. degree. Mr. Wheeler succeeded Mr. C. D. Walden, who retired last June after teaching physics for many years.

Last, but not least, by any means, is chemistry, for the most part a senior subject. This is taught by Miss Elsie Gulley. Miss Gulley received her B.S. degree at Moorehead State Teachers College and attended Ohio State University and the University of Kentucky. She also sponsors the Chemistry Club and teaches general science.





experimenting themselves, but the teacher performs experiments for class observation. In the picture at upper left, Mr. Lorentz demonstrates the telegraph sender to an interested class. In early fall they usually make collections of butterflies, insects, seeds, or wood specimens.

In their junior year, college preparatory students are given a choice of sciences. They may elect either physics or biology. The latter, the study of plant and animal life, offers an opportunity for more laboratory work. Besides collecting and preserving specimens, they also dissect some — including frogs, worms, and crayfish — for closer observation, as in the center picture.

Physics, the alternate choice for juniors, is the study of matter and energy. Students of this subject learn the principles of sound, light, motion, and electricity. They learn to measure temperature and pressure, humidity and specific gravity, and they construct telescopes and microscopes. And they discover that studying physics is not work, in the physical sense!

Seniors may choose to continue their science with chemistry or change to mathematics. Chemistry students learn the characteristic properties of the ninety-six elements which make up all matter. This entails more laboratory work than the other sciences. About two days each week are spent on experiments, and woe to the unhappy pupil who does not know his atoms! He may have an explosion on his hands before he knows it. The careful scientists shown lower left seem to be getting better results.

## *Proving universal truths*

Science is a basic part of any high school curriculum, since it develops observation, logic, and accuracy. Freshmen in the college preparatory course are required to take general science, which introduces them to every science imaginable, from astronomy to zoology. They do little

# Who could live without cooks?



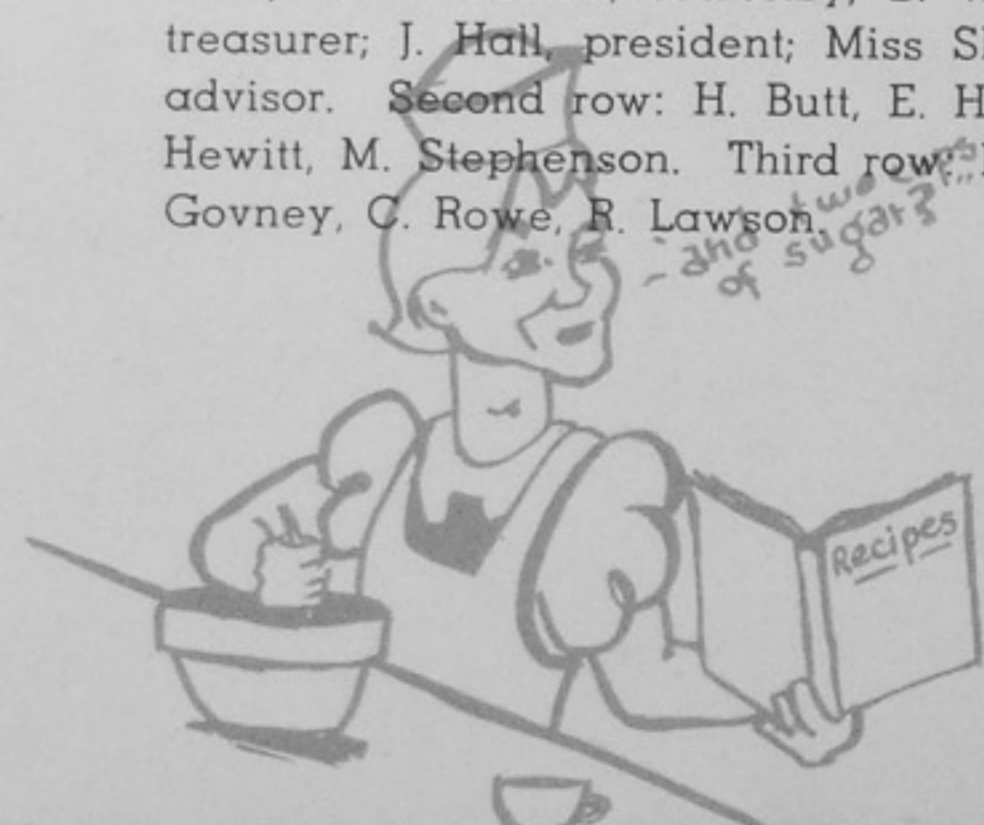

## *Experienced in handicraft*

The manual training classes have taken on a new and more significant meaning in the nation's history. These classes in Portsmouth High are being taught by some of the best teachers in Ohio. Mr. Fred Multer, Mr. Richard Hopkins, and Mr. A. L. Monrad are teaching their students how to shape and use both wood and metal, as well as to understand and read blue prints. Last, but not least, and perhaps the most important of all, they teach how to operate the machines that may win or lose this war of democracy.

The boys in this department make everything from match boxes up to standard desks, from chisels to canons, from a drawing of a pencil up to the complicated machine, the shaper.

These classes, besides their regular routine work, make things for the school activities through the cooperation of Mr. Hopkins and Mr. Monrad. They also make

parts of the scenery for plays and metal works.

Mr. Hopkins, who is Dean of Boys and faculty manager for high school athletics, received his B. S. degree from Miami College. He instructs the freshmen and sophomores in drawings while Mr. Multer teaches them wood workings. Mr. Multer, who attended Ohio State University, has his B. A. and B. S. degrees. One of the oldest instructors in the high school is Mr. Monrad. He teaches juniors and seniors advanced mechanical drawing and the fundamentals of the machine shop. Mr. Monrad has an M. E. degree from The Oslo School of Technology. He also has taken graduate work at C. S. in Scranton, Pennsylvania, and La Salle Extension University. All three of these faculty members are sponsors of a club organized for these boys — The Industrial Arts Club. Mr. Yonovitz, instructor of Vocational Training, is also sponsor of this group.



# Forging ahead

The new Vocational Building west of the high school is the important outgrowth of the occupational survey authorized by the Board of Education in co-operation with the State Board of Vocational Education. Vocational courses, although they are new in this city, are old and established courses in the progressive cities of Ohio and neighboring states. They have been planned for students who want to enter employment in a chosen occupational field immediately upon graduation from high school.

Since the industrial development of any community is quite dependent upon its program of education, the machine shop course taught here is designed to meet the needs of young people entering the various machine phases of the mechanical industries of our community.

The Vocational Machine Course extends through the 11th and 12th grades, and it is hoped that within the near future a 13th year co-operative will be added. This would permit the students to work half time in industry and attend school half time.

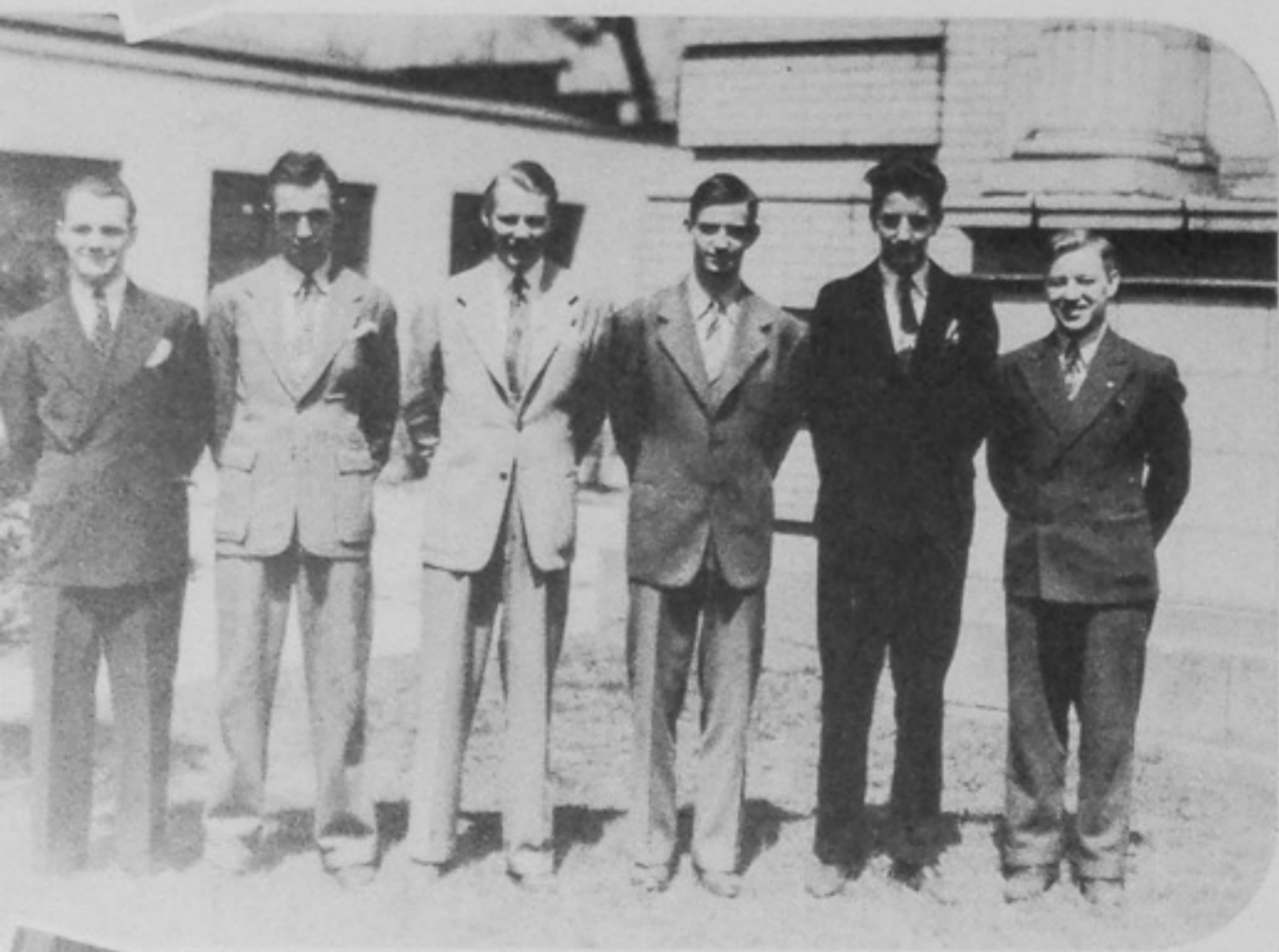

# Commercial Department

Students wishing to follow a business career after they leave high school enroll in the commercial course. In this course, under the guidance of experienced teachers, they are taught the arts of shorthand, typing, and bookkeeping. These subjects ably prepare them for the business world.

In the first year of typing, accuracy is stressed rather than speed.

As the typewriters have no letters on the keys, there is a large chart at the front of the room which shows where the letters are. By looking at this chart and doing simple finger drills, the fingers and mind become trained to find the right keys without looking for them. After this essential step in typing is mastered, the students learn how to write letters, and how to place them properly on the page. In the second year of typing, speed is stressed, although accuracy is still just as important. Manuscripts, business letters, wage sheets, and legal papers are typed during this year. A personal use typing course is open to all students who desire to learn to type even though they are not enrolled in the commercial course.

A subject closely connected with typing is shorthand. To those who do not study this subject, it appears to be all very mystifying. However, if shorthand is learned well from the first, it becomes very interesting. Some like to make a hobby of seeing how many shorthand combinations of words they can make, thus saving a great deal of time. Shorthand brief forms and symbols must be learned so that they come automatically into one's mind when dictated. The symbols must be clearly legible so that the writer can

transcribe them. In the second year of shorthand, letters are dictated and then typed from the shorthand notes.

## *Planning counter attractions*

For the first time in the history of P. H. S. a vocational class was started in Distributive Education last September. This course is open to seniors who meet the required standards of the merchants for whom these students work during the entire year. Juniors are asked to make formal application in the spring of the year. Those whom the merchants hire on a part-time basis are the students who make up the class. Last fall over sixty made application for the thirty-three positions open to part-time students. This spring over eighty have filed application blanks with many more to come in at the time of this writing.

The students earn four units of credit in this work for the year. One unit of the four is Store Practice which represents the work in the

store. A regular grade is given each month for the "in-training work."

# Figuratively speaking

Business arithmetic which is entirely different from either geometry, or algebra, but which is just as important, is also a part of the mathematics department. In the business world arithmetic is necessary. This subject would be beneficial to any student whether he is planning to follow a business career or not, because in some way or another he

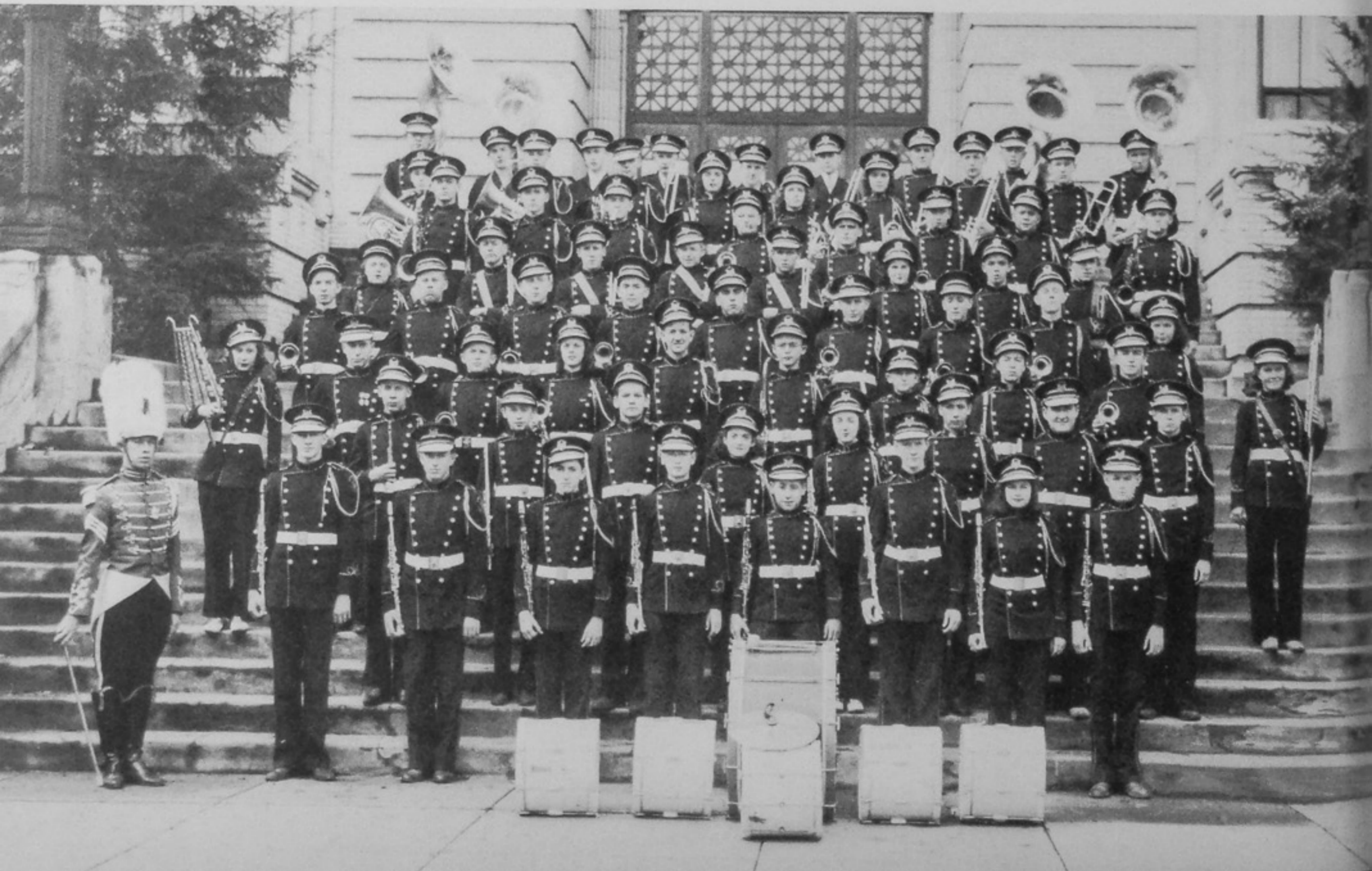

# "H. M. S. Pinafore"

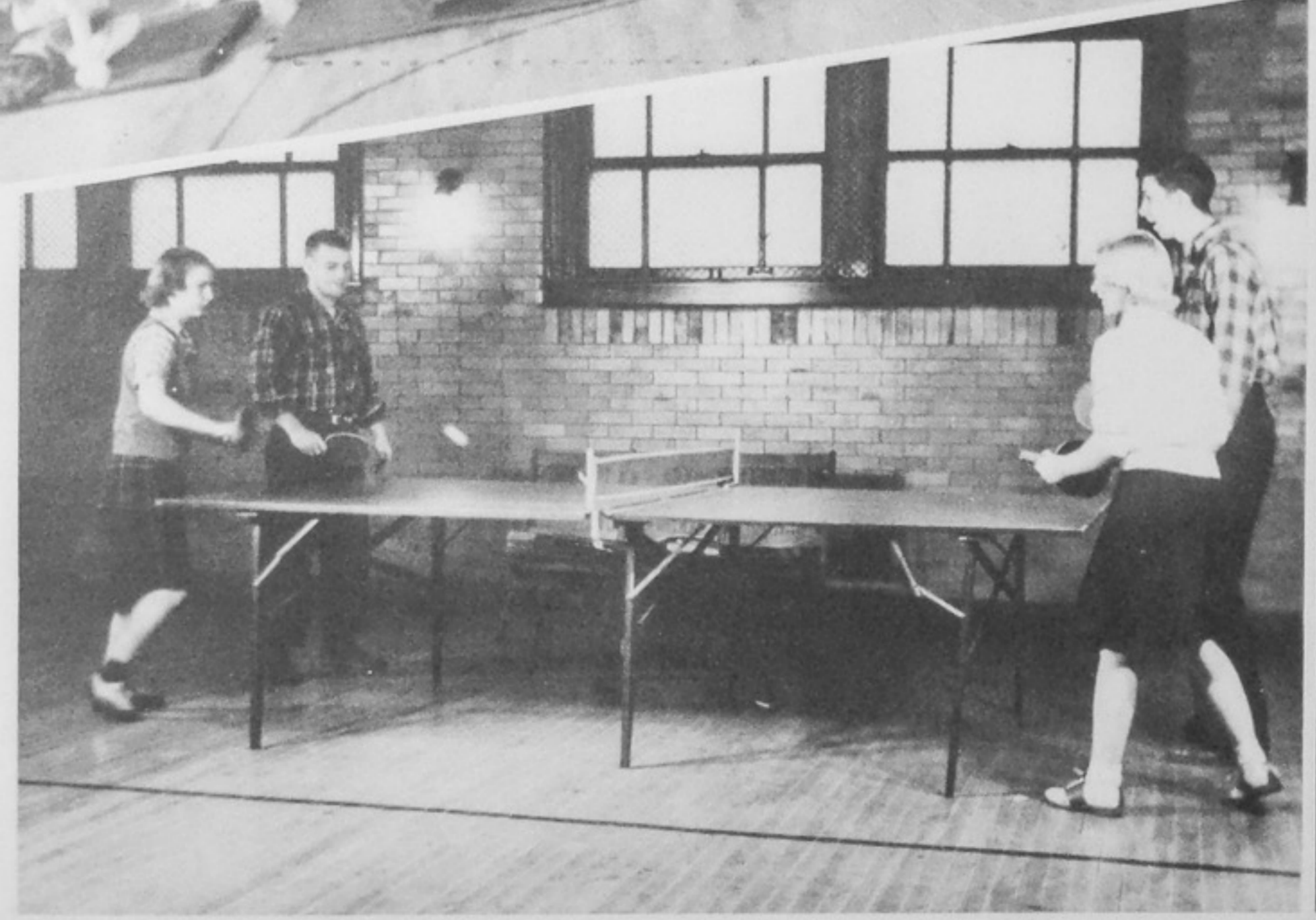
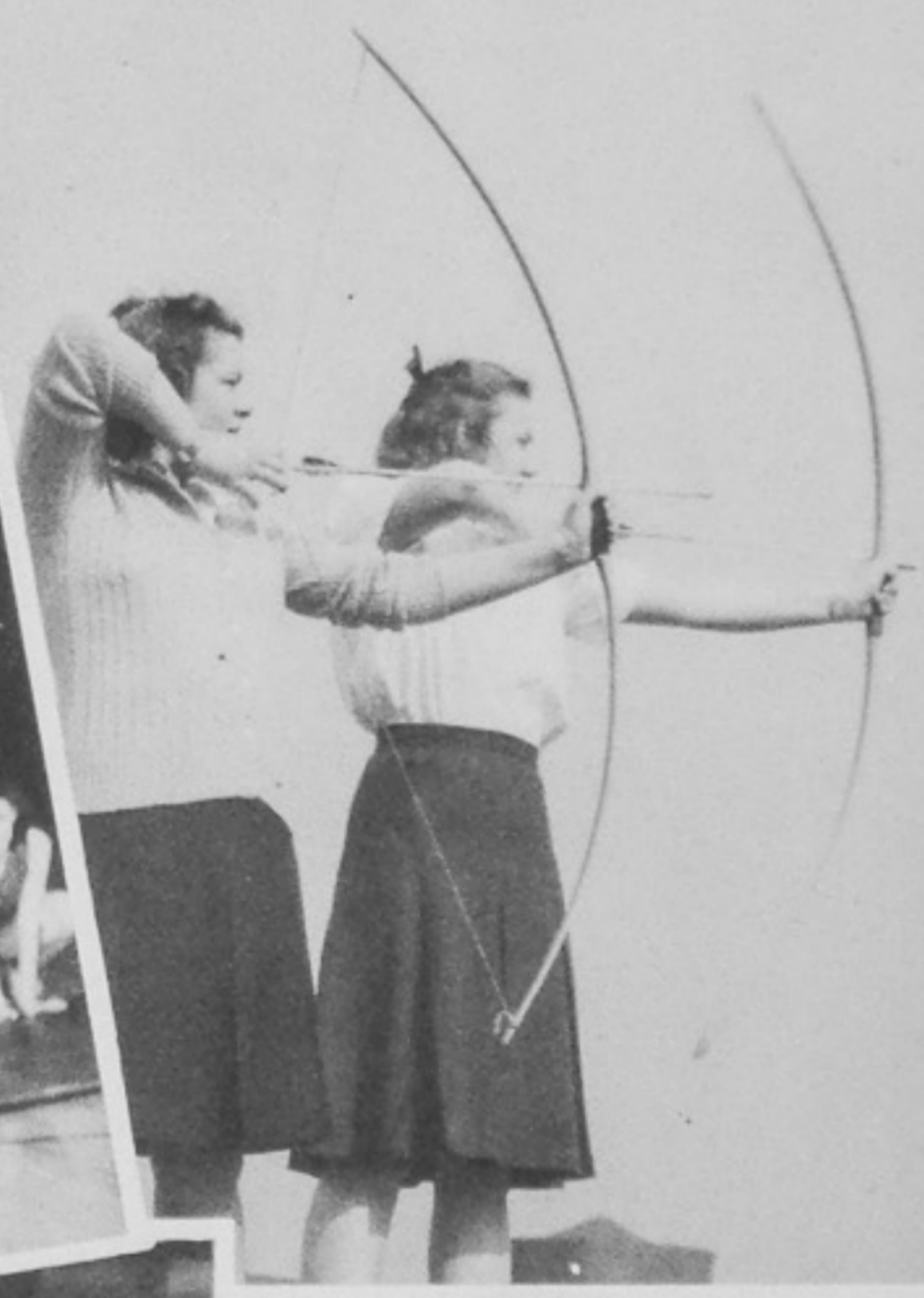
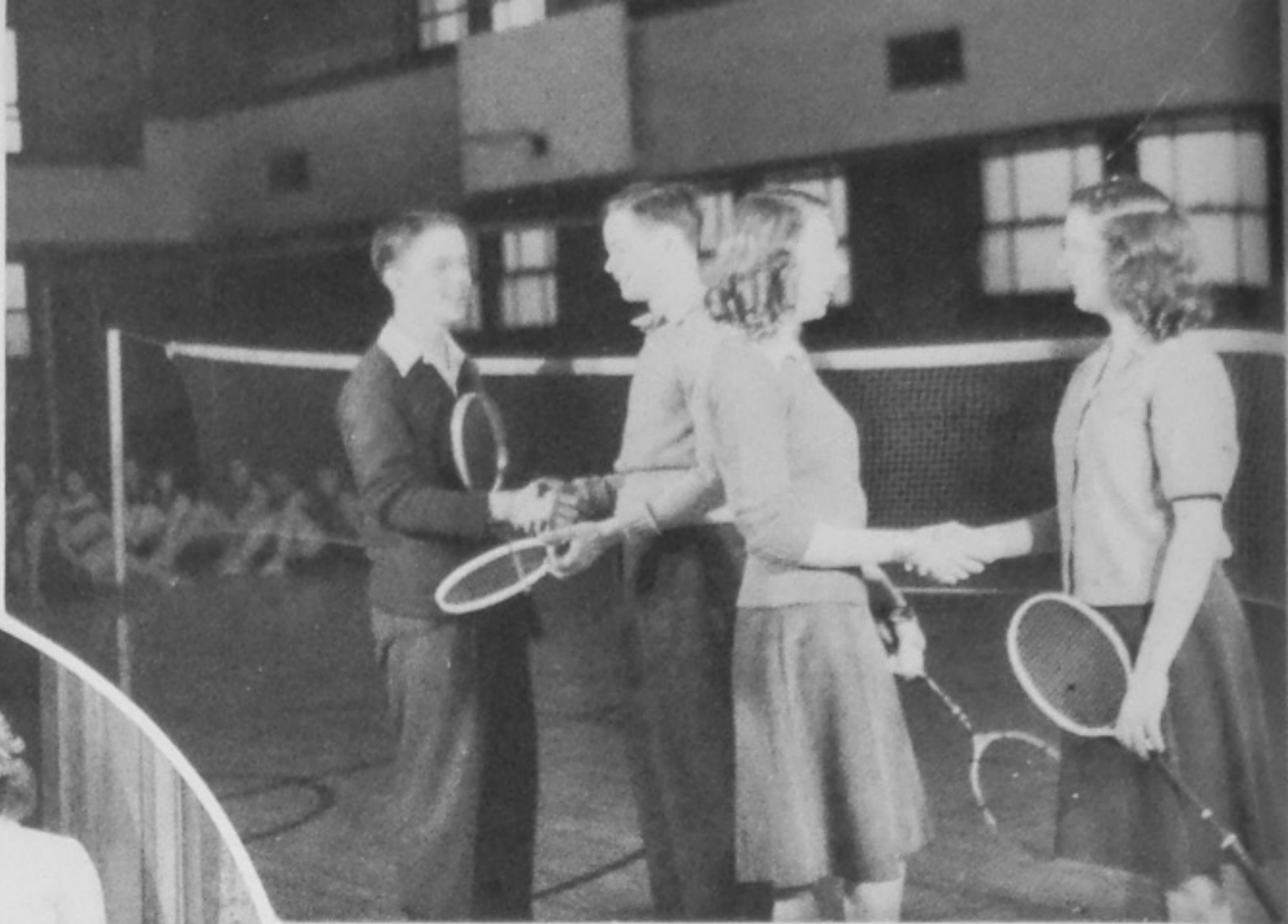
On the quarterdeck of *H. M. S. Pinafore* with a view of Portsmouth in the distance was Scene I—Act I of the P.H.S. Glee Club's Operetta of 1942. Of course Portsmouth in the light opera was Portsmouth, England, not Portsmouth, Ohio. *H. M. S. Pinafore* was written by the famous team of Gilbert and Sullivan. It was first produced in London, May 25, 1878.

The curtain rises revealing the deck of *Pinafore*. Ralph, a simple sailor, lowly born, is in love with Josephine Corcoran, the Captain's daughter. Little Buttercup is in love with Captain Corcoran. However, the Corcorans are of a higher social class than Buttercup or Ralph. This is a barrier between the two couples. The Captain little knows that Josephine is in love with Ralph, for he has arranged a marriage between her and Sir Joseph, "the Monarch of the Sea."

Buttercup tells a long hidden secret of having been a foster mother to Ralph and the Captain. In early childhood she had mixed the children up, so that Ralph was really the Captain and the Captain, Ralph.

In the finale all turns out well, for Josephine and Ralph (now the Captain), Buttercup and the Captain (now Ralph), and Sir Joseph and Hebe, one of his many cousins, all unite in marriage.

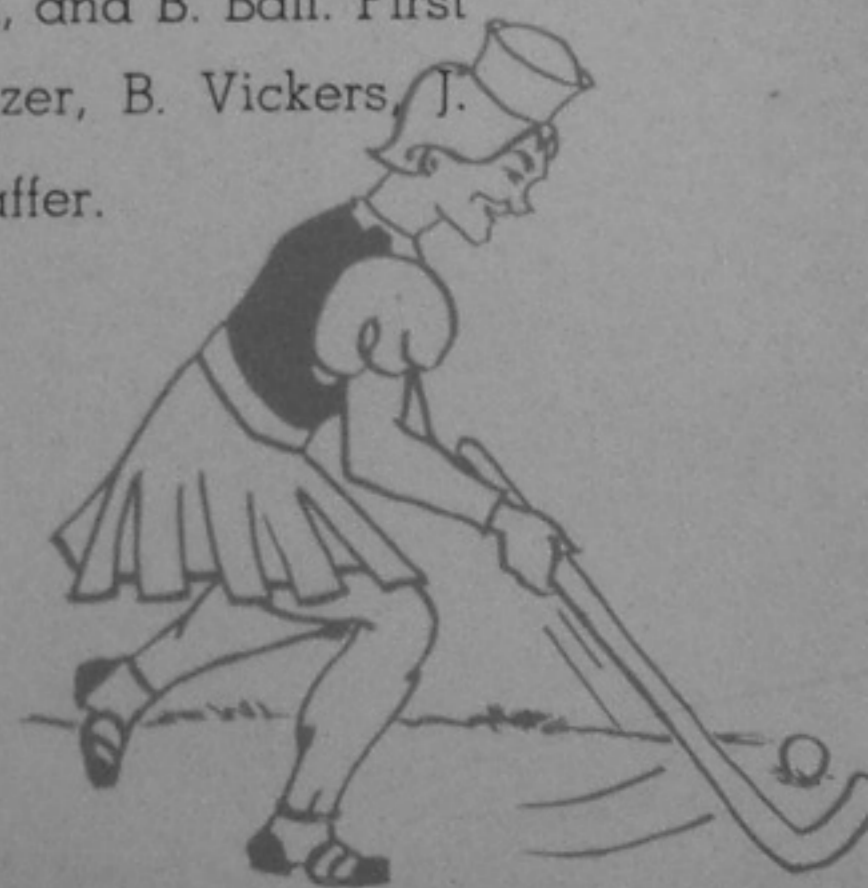
turning in one victory against the freshmen. Due to inexperience and the newness of the game, the freshmen failed to secure a win, but show great promise for the future.

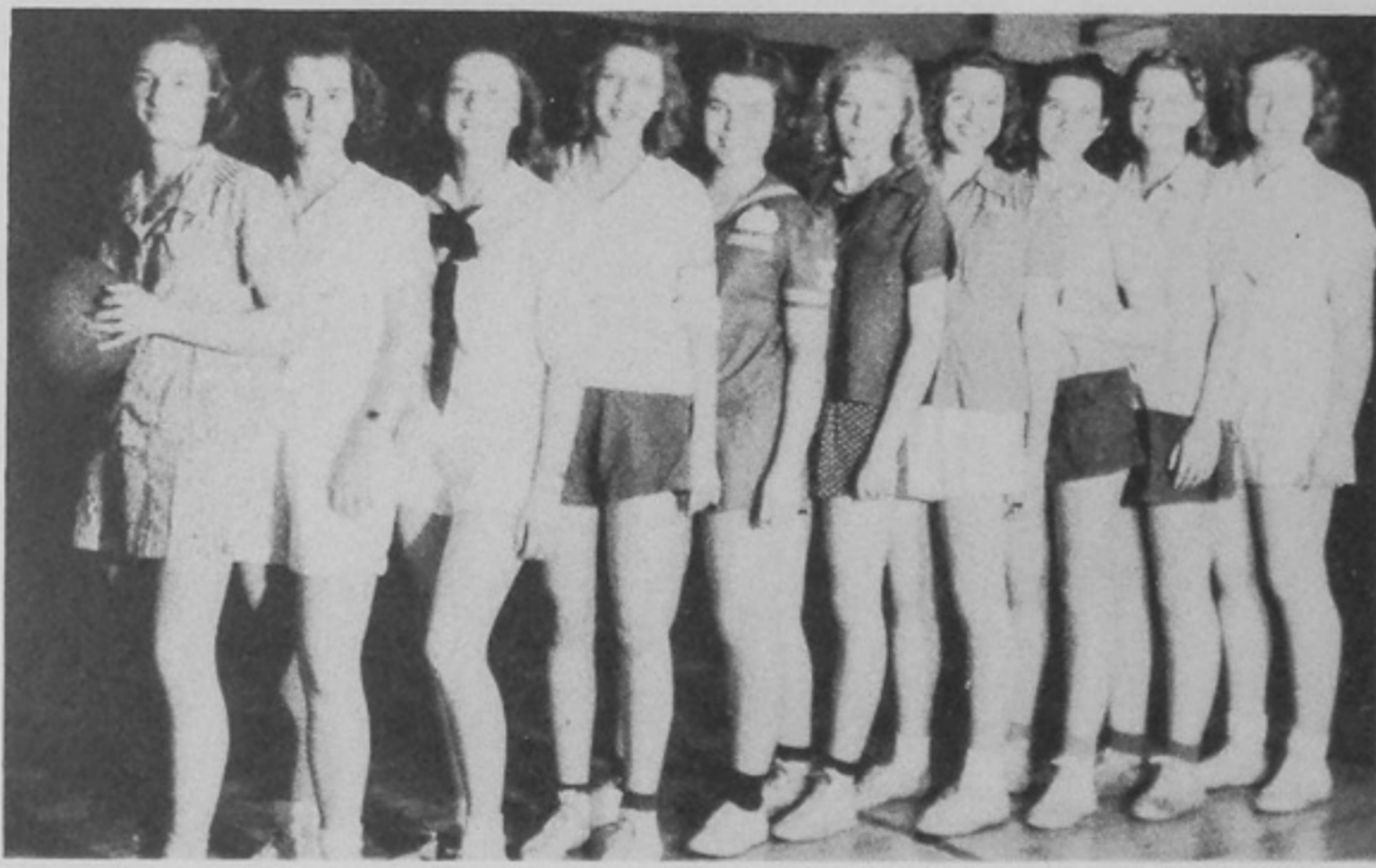
# Seniors land Basketball championship;

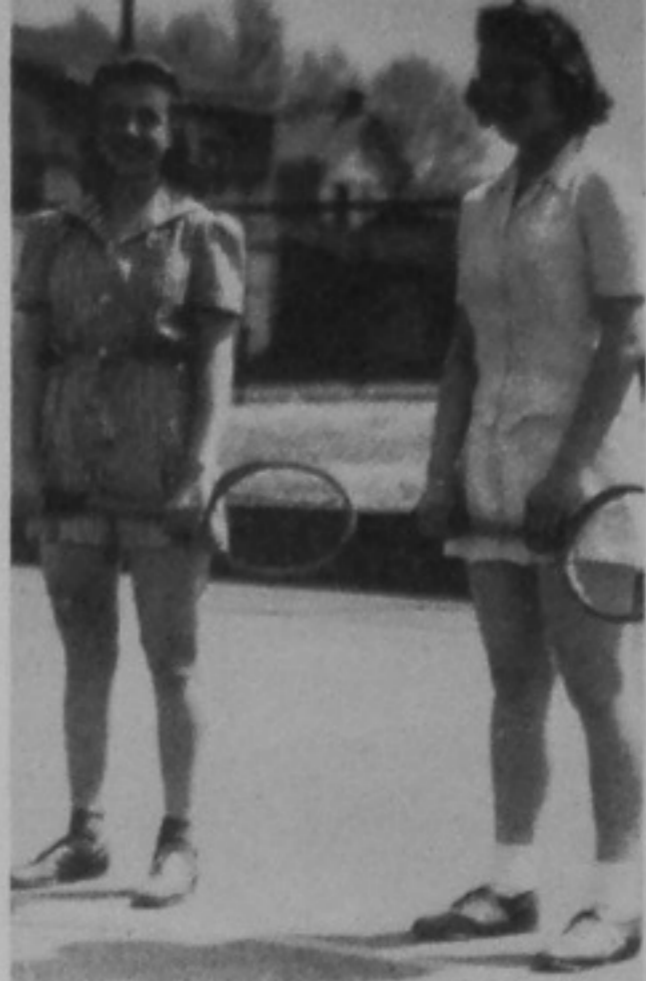

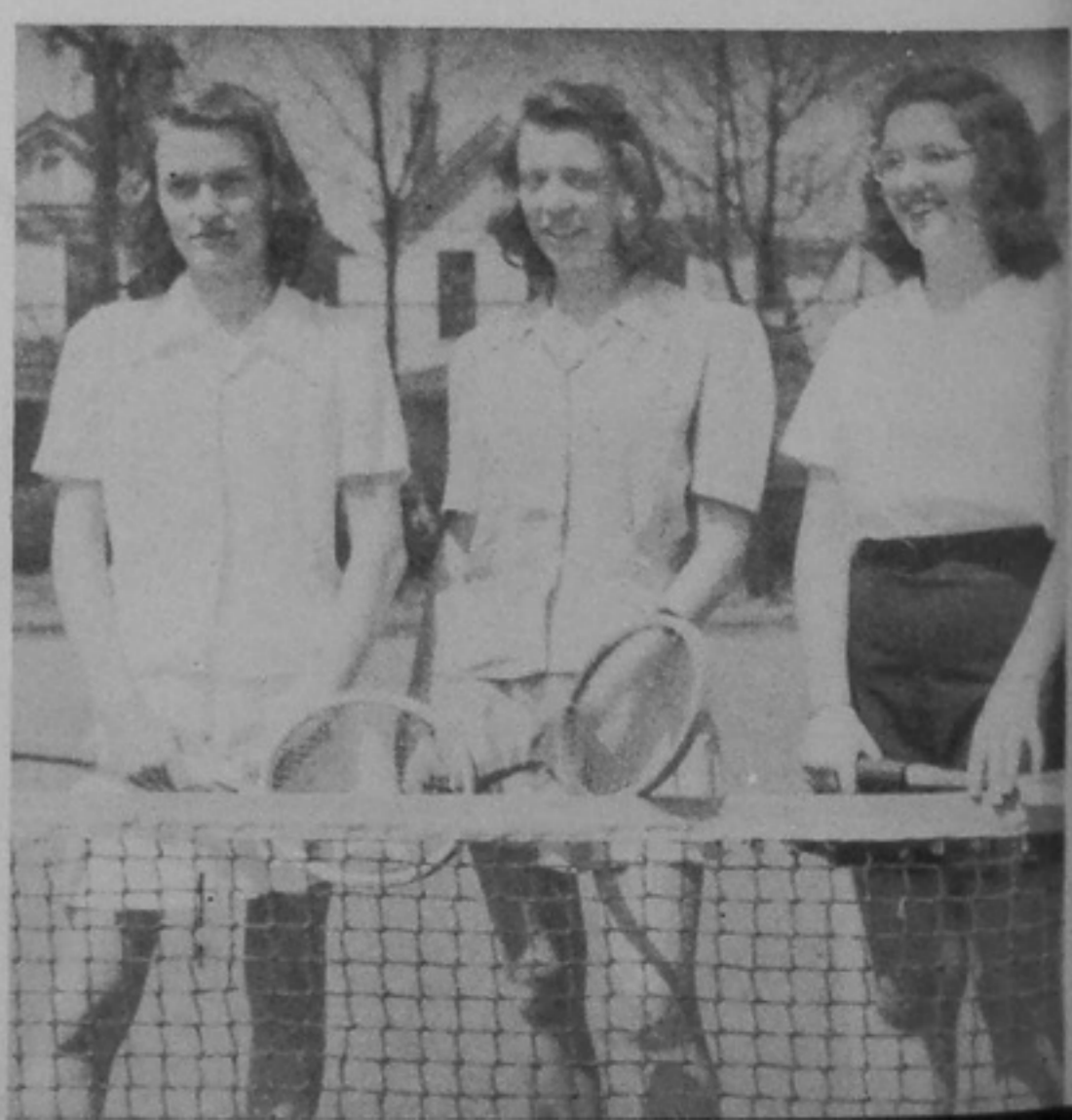

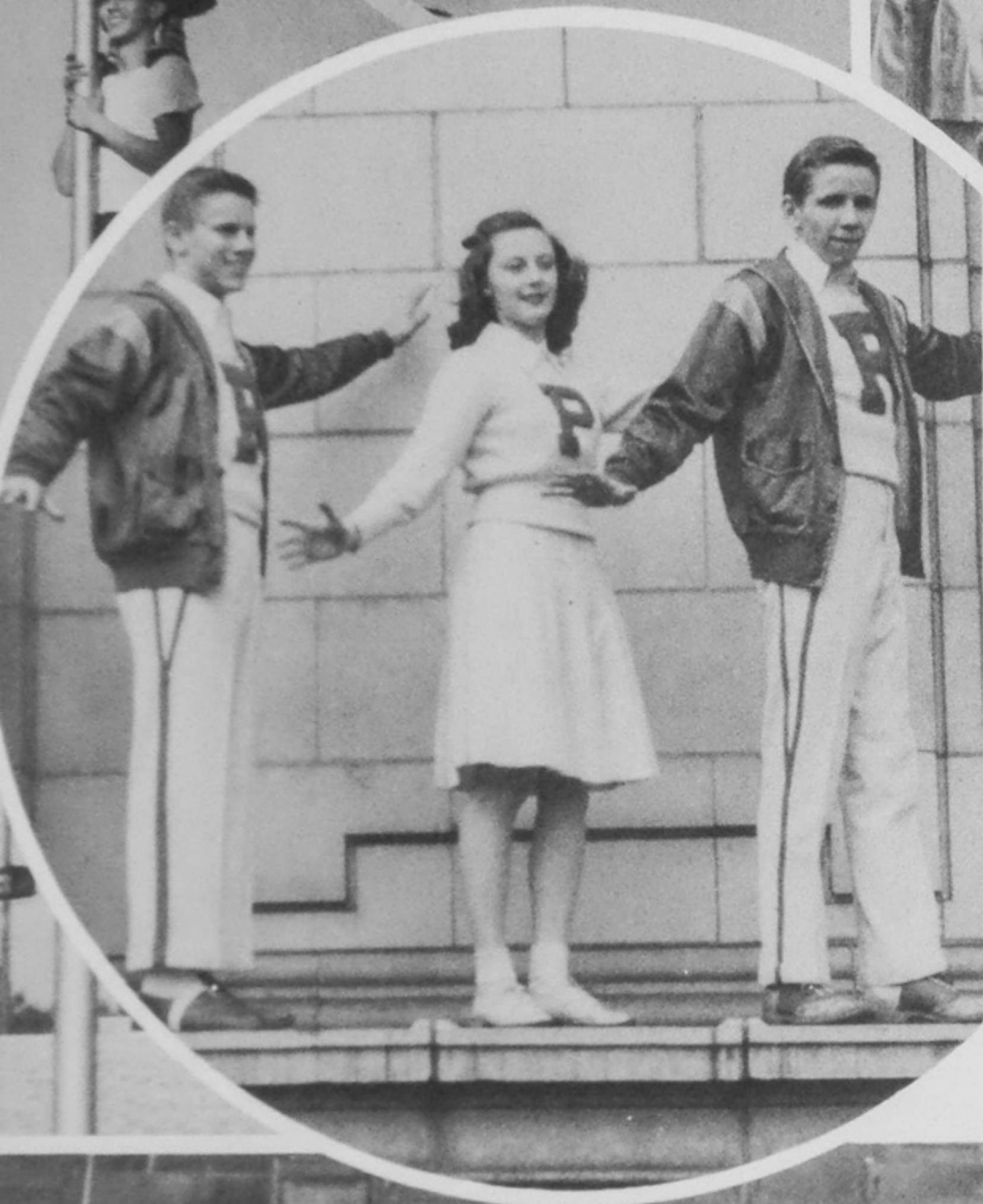

This year's edition of the Trojan football team ended with a fair record of two victories, two ties, and six defeats. Bill Williams, who served the team as captain, was the only regular of last year's squad, and even he didn't play the whole season.

In their initial contest, played under the lights of Municipal Stadium on September 19, Akron South, a highly talented squad, defeated the Trojans by one point. A 51 yard dash and a line plunge by Captain Parseghian of the Akronites, followed by an accurate place kick through the uprights, won the game in the third quarter. Williams carried the ball over for the lone Trojan tally. The try for extra point failed and the Trojans lost their first game of the season.

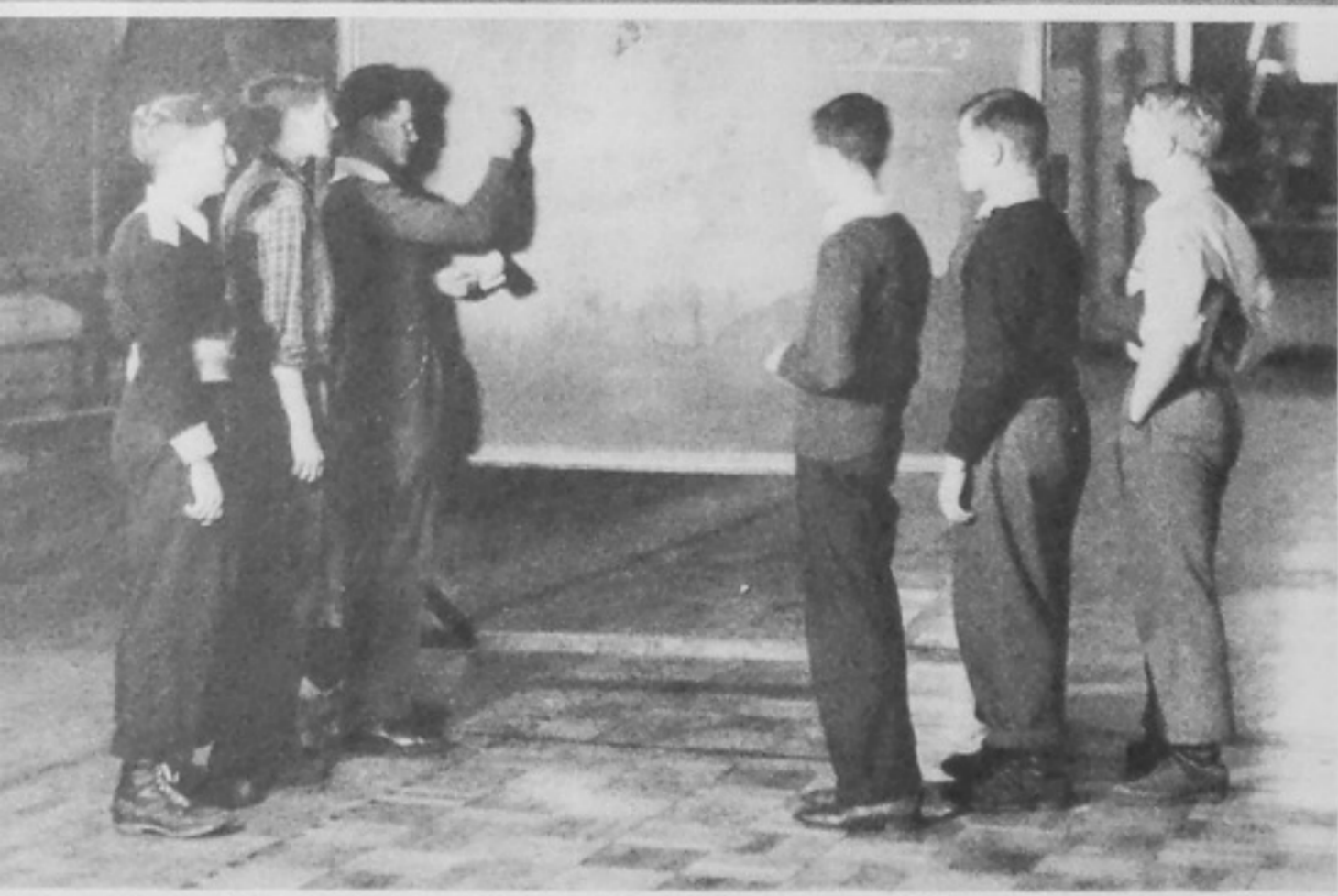

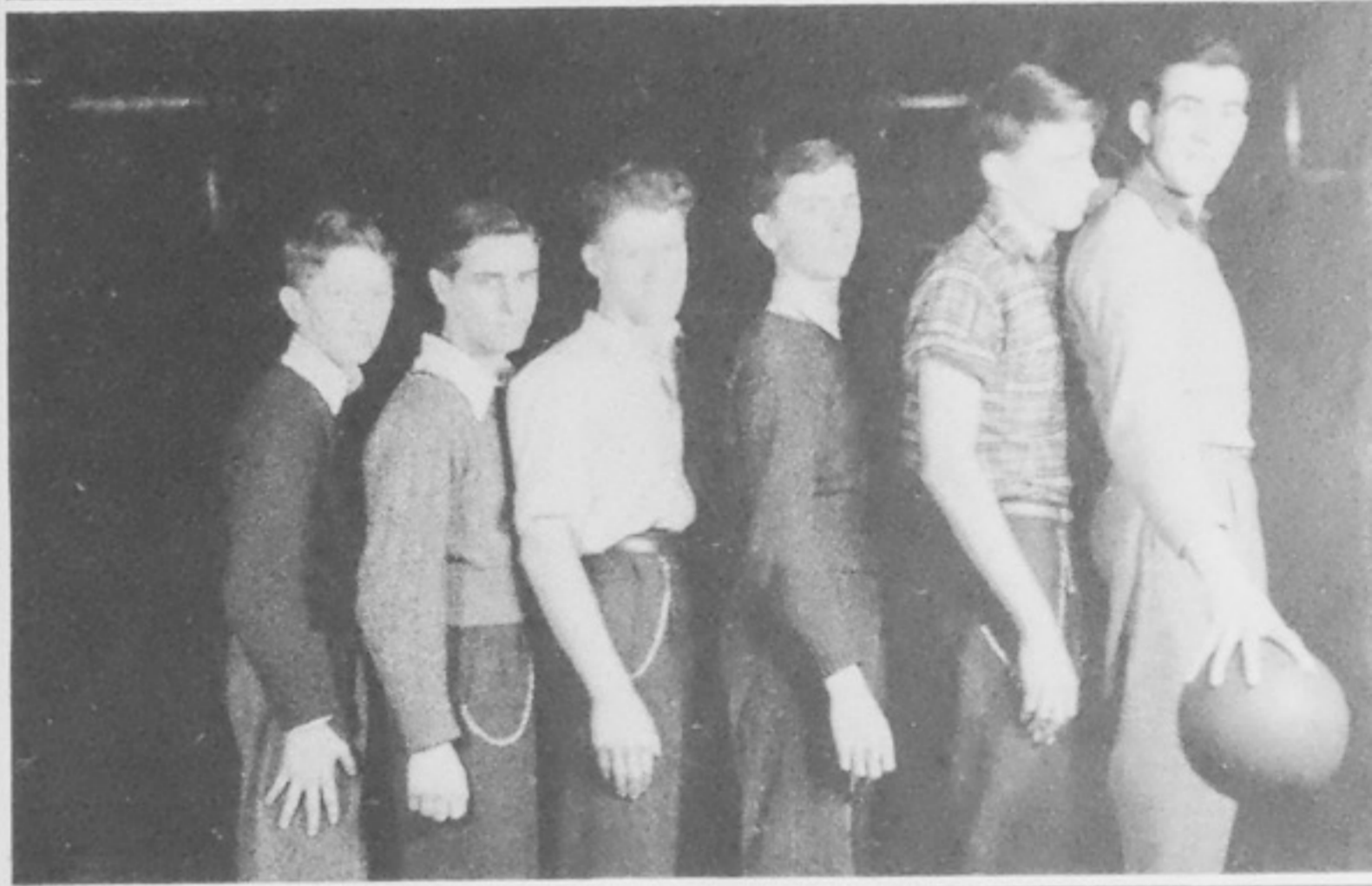
# *Little taters, mufflers tops in*

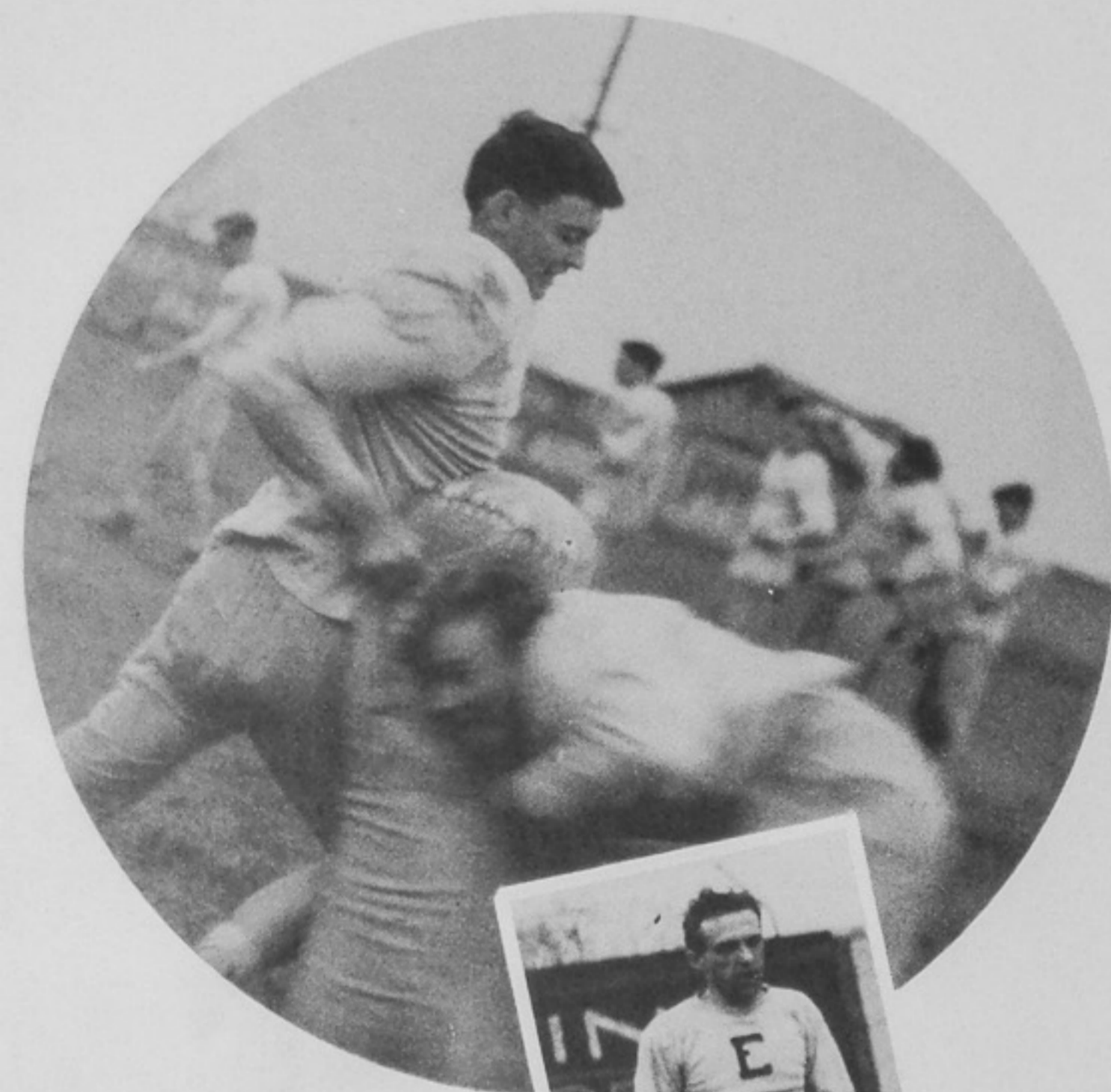
