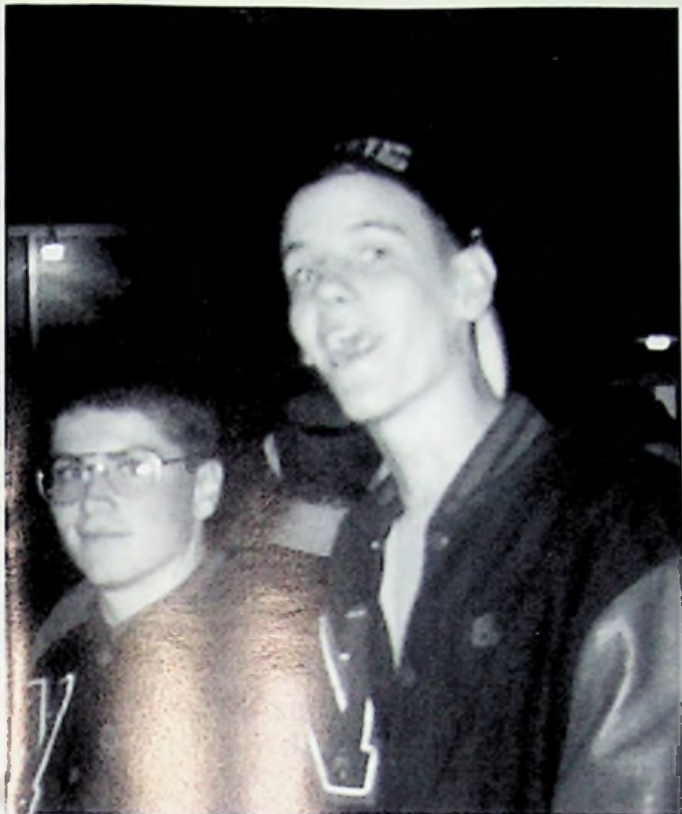

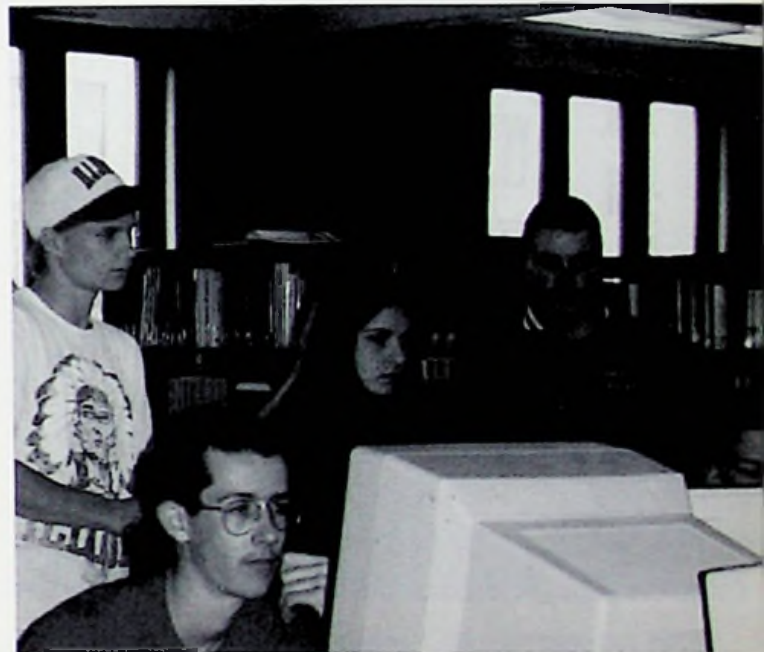

Kristie said that the most exciting part of the pageant was meeting new people and making new friends.

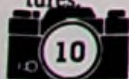

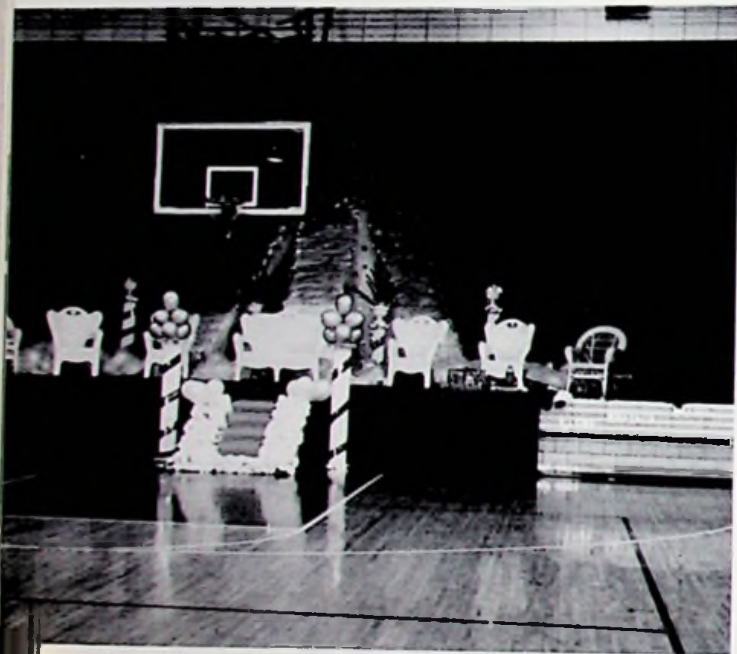
# Stairway to Heaven

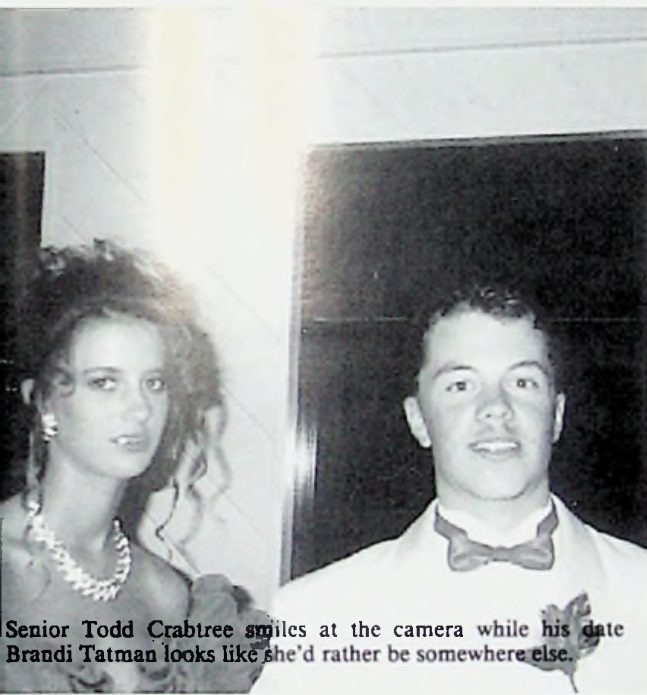

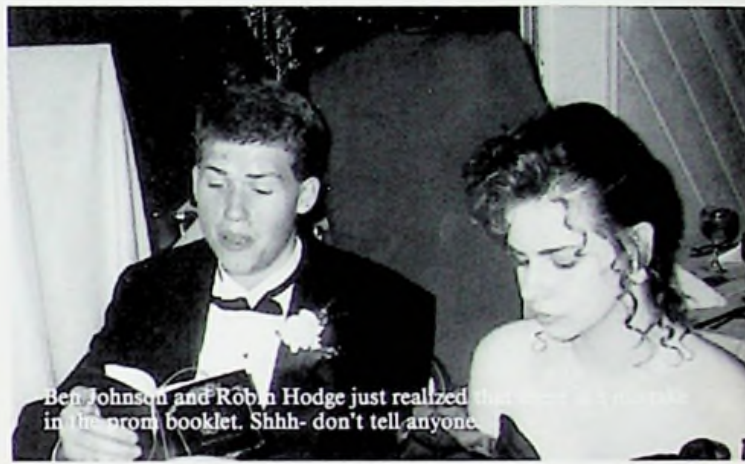

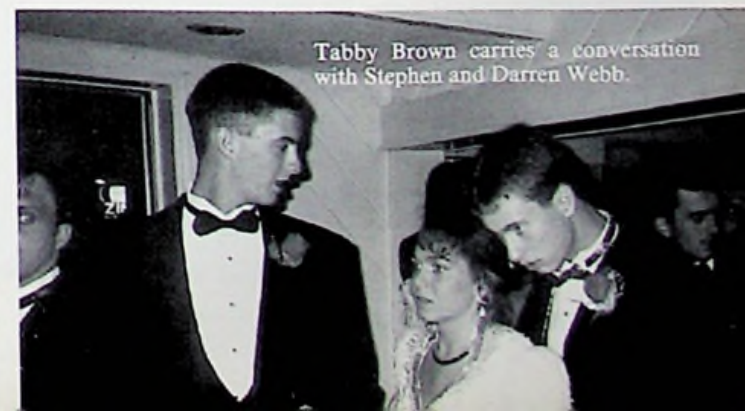

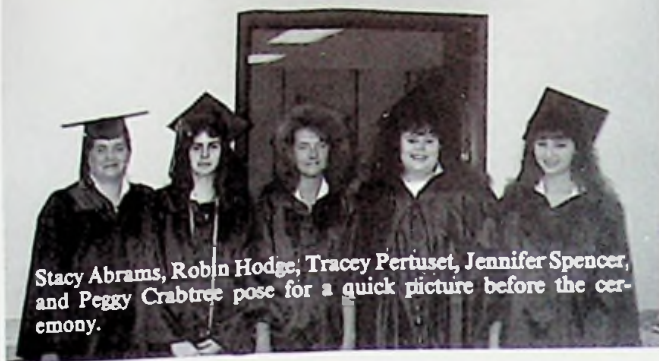

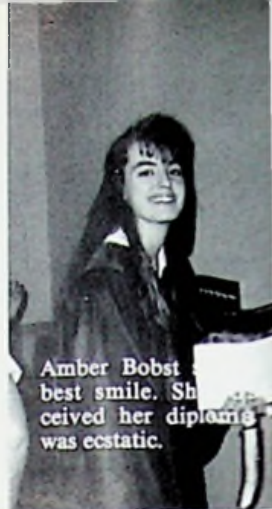

# MICHAEL JORDAN

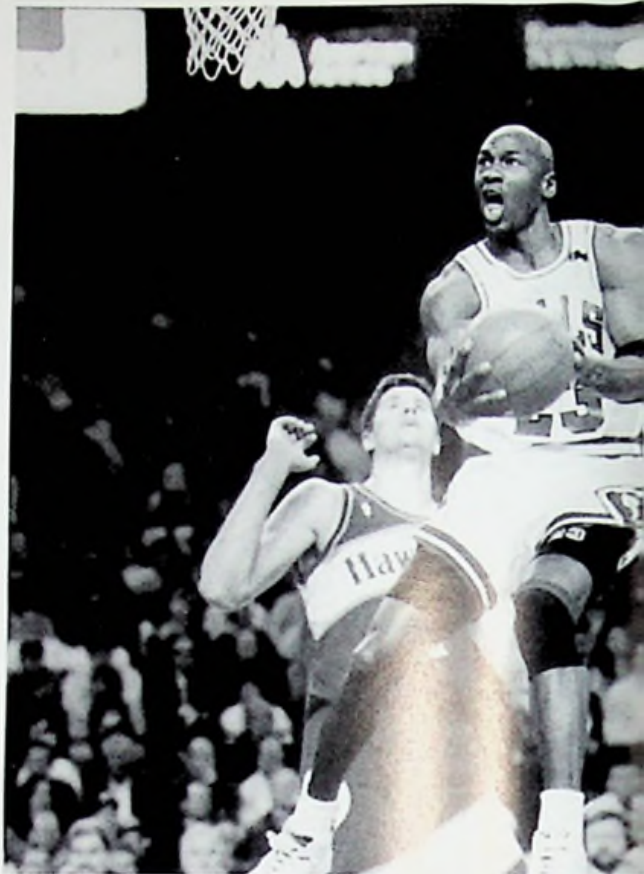
One of the biggest stories of the 1993-94 basketball season occurred before the first pre-season exhibition game. Micheal Jordan, the world's best basketball player and a great athlete, announced his retirement.

Jordan's retirement came after he had led the Chicago Bulls to three straight NBA Championships, with the most recent victory over the Phoenix Suns in the 1993 finals.

His departure, which Jordan announced at a news conference on Oc-

tober 6, 1993, stripped the league of its most recognizable name and robbed it of a breathtaking acrobat who led the NBA in scoring the last seven years. "The thrill is gone. I've done it all. There's nothing left for me to do," Jordan told a reporter before his formal announcement.

Jordan said his desire to retire at the age of 30 was not prompted by his father's murder during the summer; in fact, he said, father and son had already discussed it.



## WORLD SERIES

It was one of the most dramatic home runs in the long history of the World Series.

Joe Carter of the Toronto Blue Jays stepped to the plate in the ninth inning of the sixth game of

the series, with two runners on base and the score 6-5 in favor of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Carter's Blue Jays led the series, three games to two. After one swing of his bat, the game was over and the Jays had won their second straight series.

The right fielder circled the bases, arms out stretched over his head, and slapped palms with third base coach Nick Leyva as the crowd in Toronto's Skydome stood and roared with glee.

## SUMO

In a year filled with horrifying news photos from battlefields around the globe, one photo of human struggle brought a smile: Associated Press photographer Paul Sakema's shot of a little boy's joust with a huge sumo wrestler.

It happened before a sumo tournament in San Jose, California, on June 5, 1993. Competitors included Salevaa Atisano, a 576 pound Hawaiian who goes



by the sumo name Konishi and is known in Japan as "Meat Bomb".

The AP photo of one pushing with everything had against Konishiki's stomach, and getting more than a smile from the giant for all his effort, was carried by the Associated Press Managing Editors Association as the year's best feature photo.

# MISS AMERICA

Kimberly Clarice Aiken, Miss South Carolina, became one of the youngest women to win the Miss America Pageant.

Aiken, who bested 49 women to win the 1994 title in Atlantic City on September 18, 1993, called the honor

“very overwhelming for me.”

Aiken sang a moving rendition of Gershwin's 'Summertime' during the talent portion of the contest's nationally televised finals. She studied last year at the University of South Carolina.

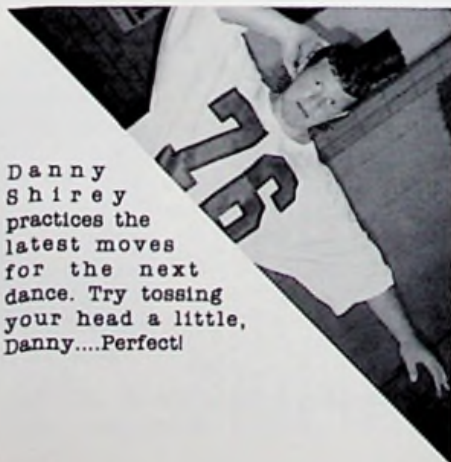

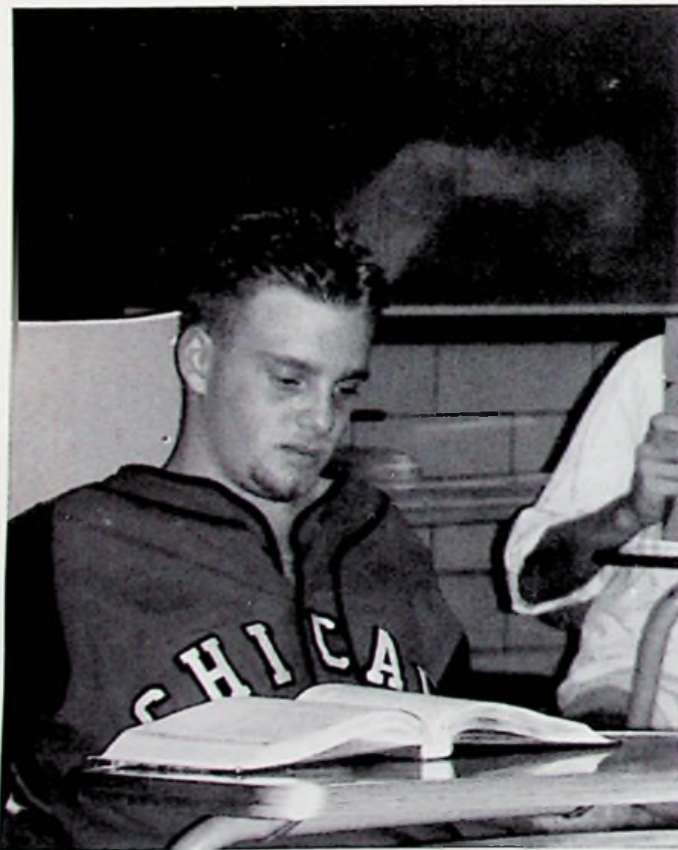

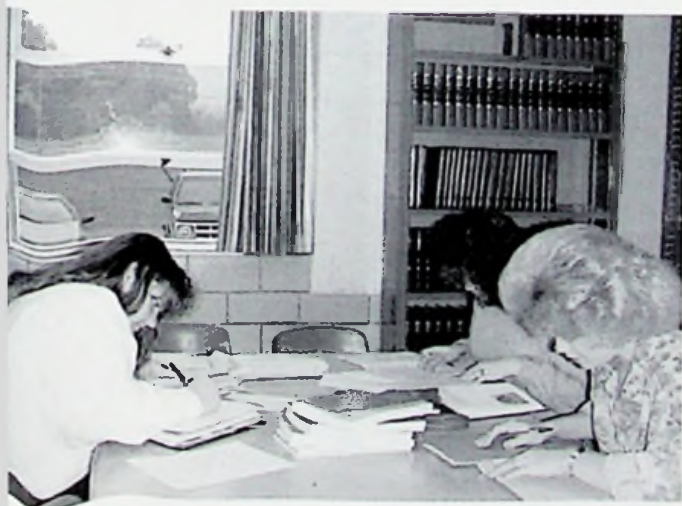

*Jennifer Crabtree: That it's an easy class to take but really it involves a lot of hard work.*

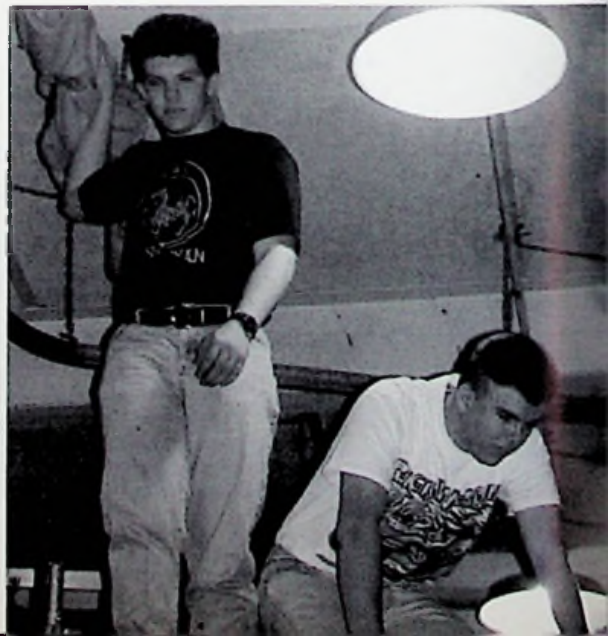

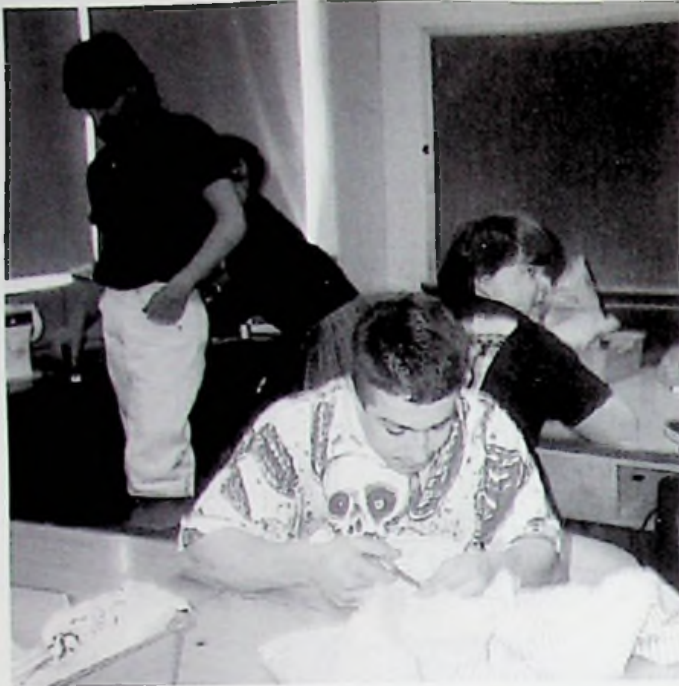

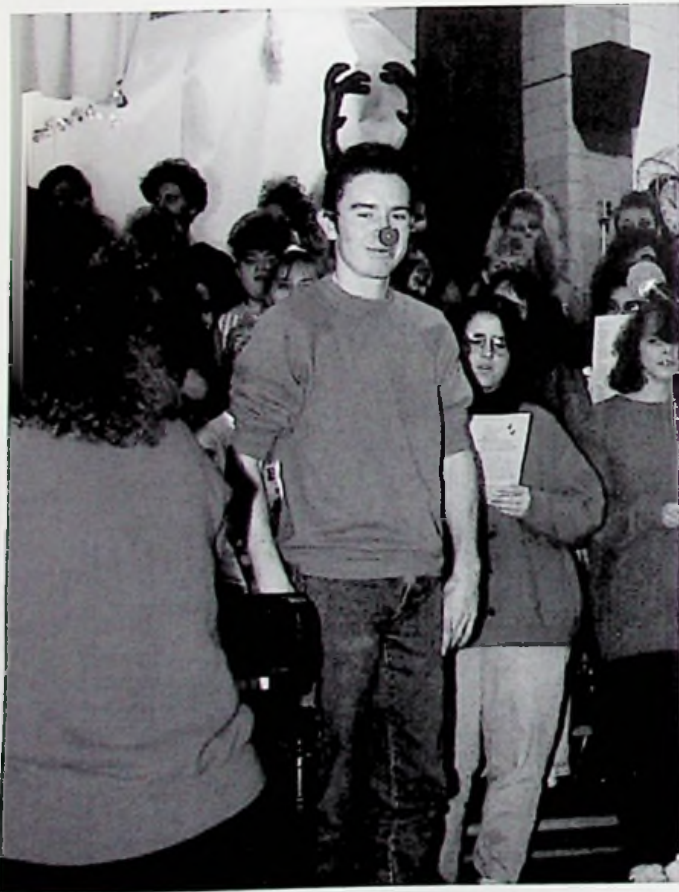

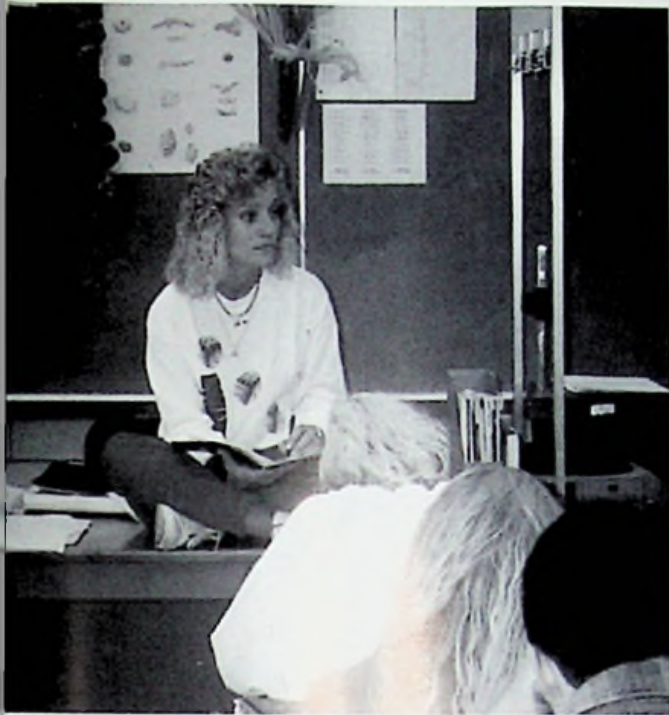

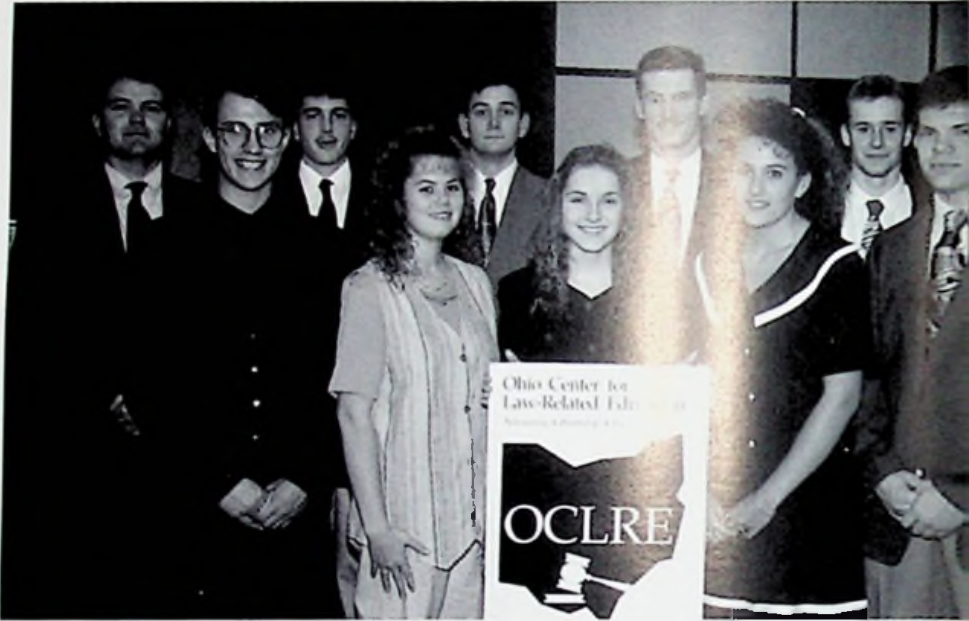

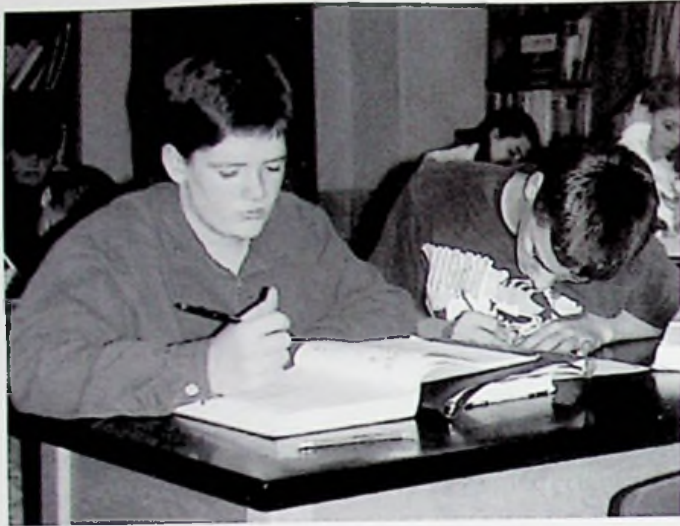

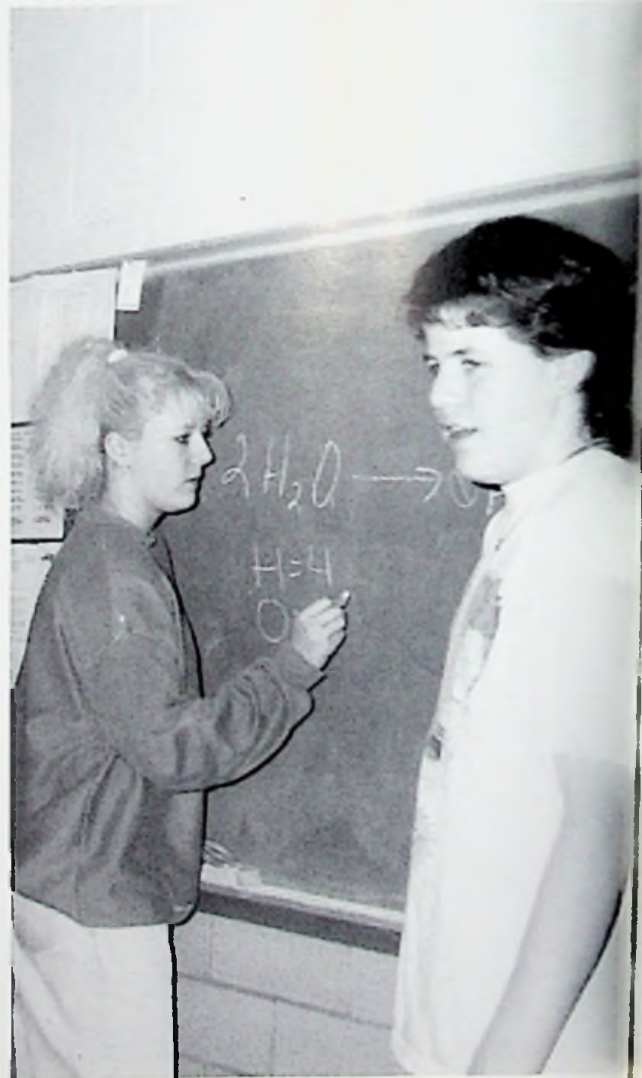

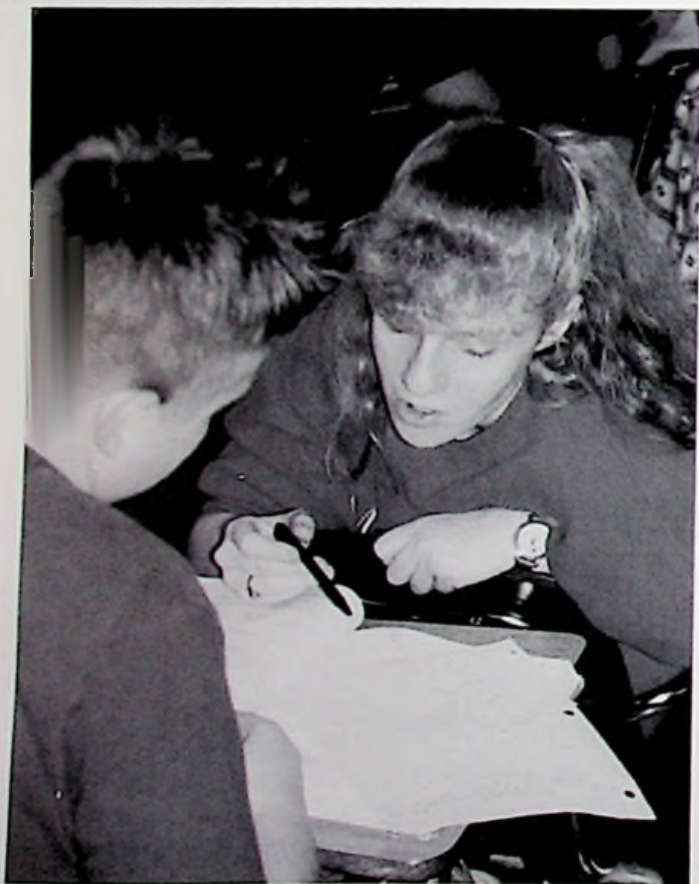

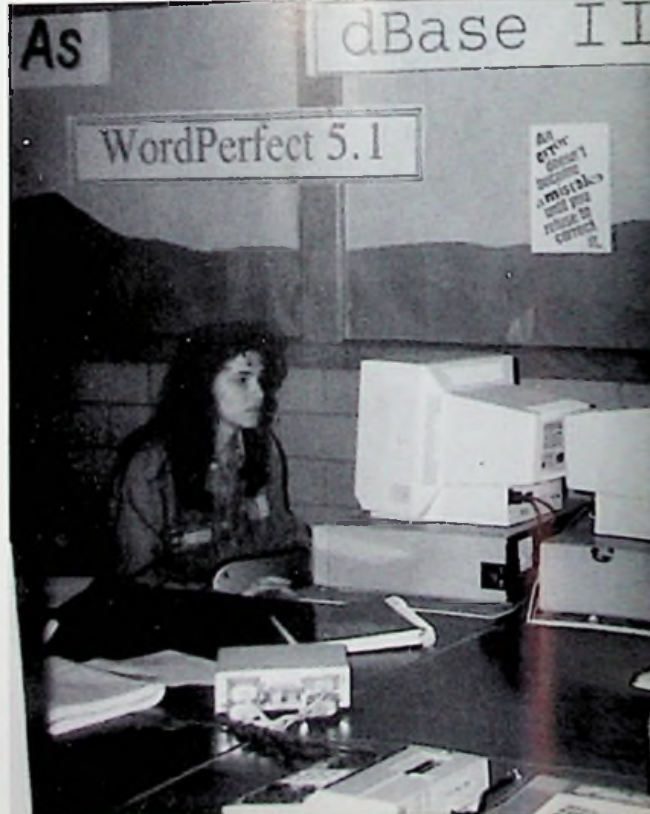

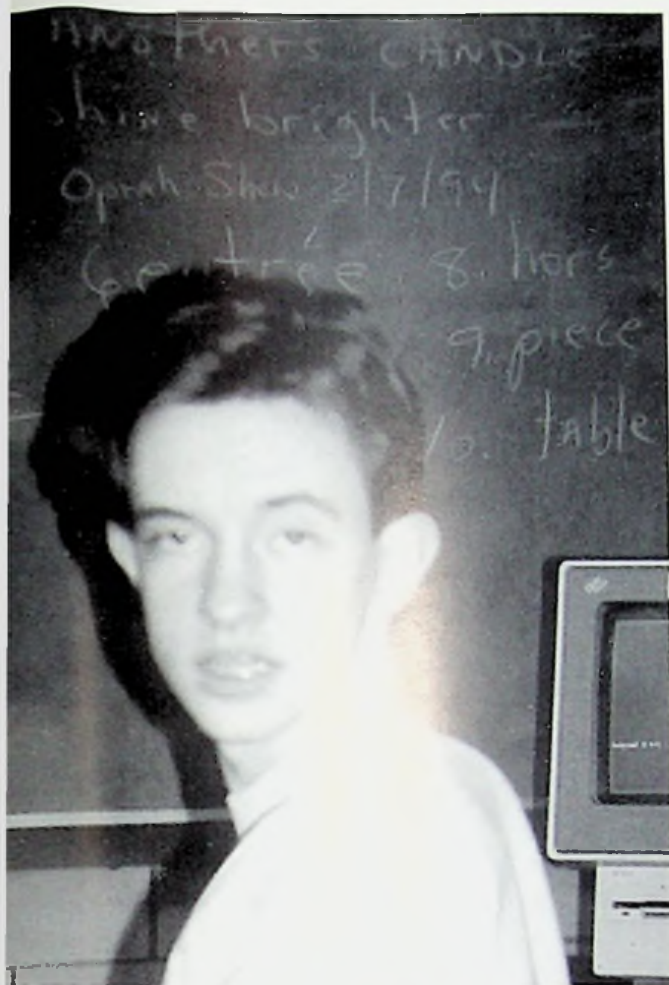

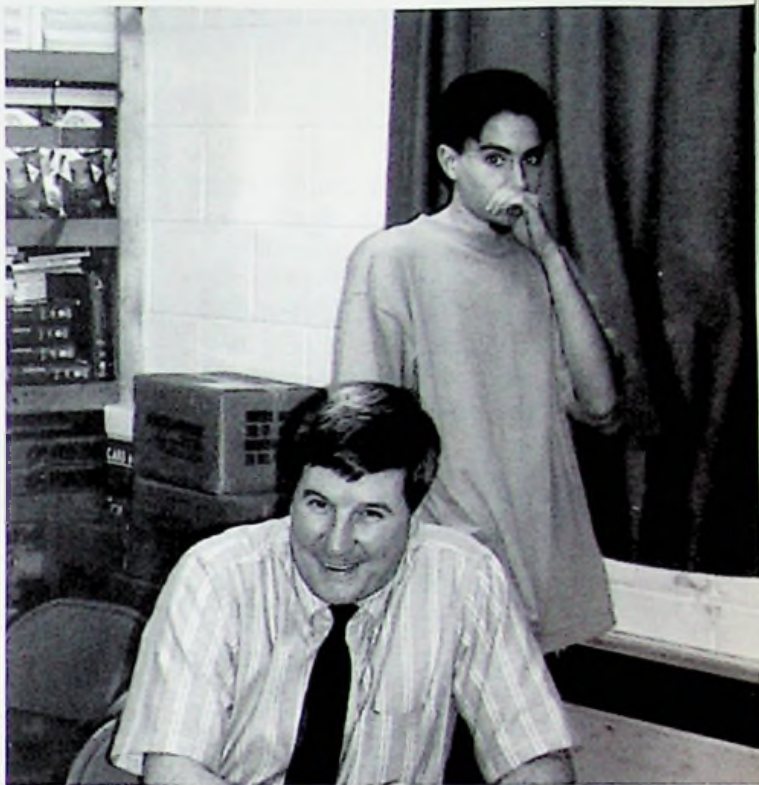

## 1993 S.O.C., Sectional, District Champions!

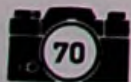

Down 2 to 1, Northwest responded with two goals of their own. 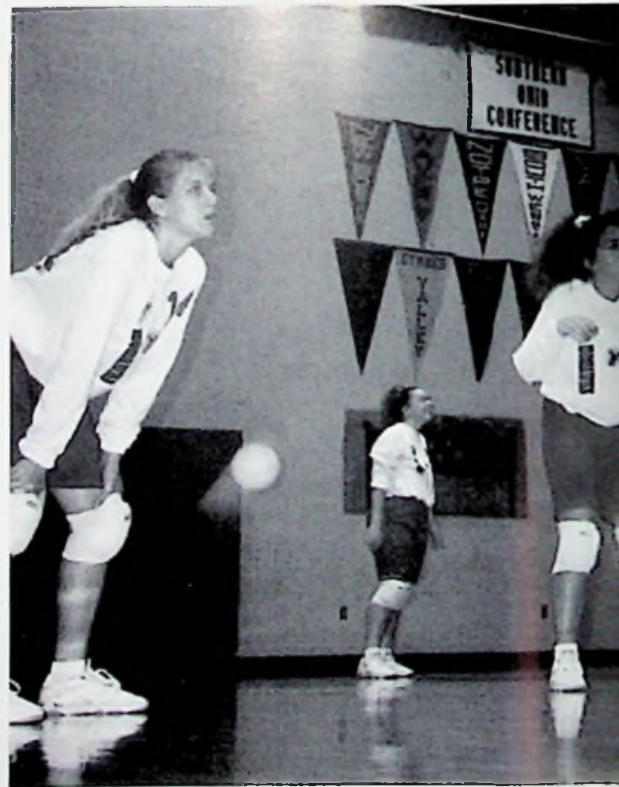

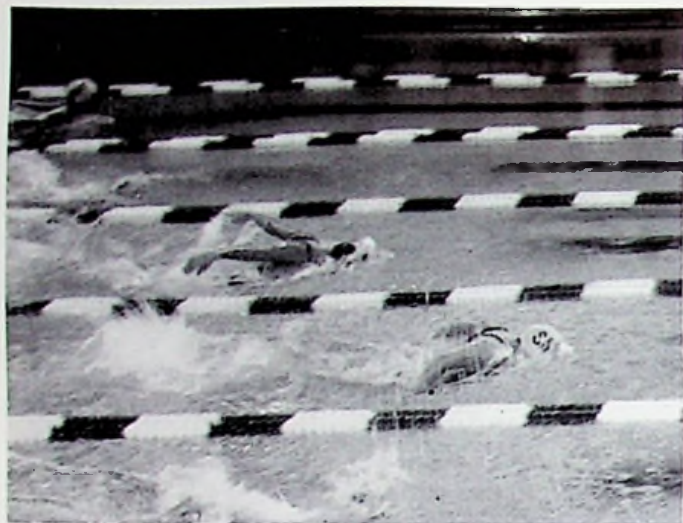
One of the great times was when the parents of the Varsity players sent them roses and balloons

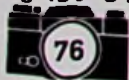

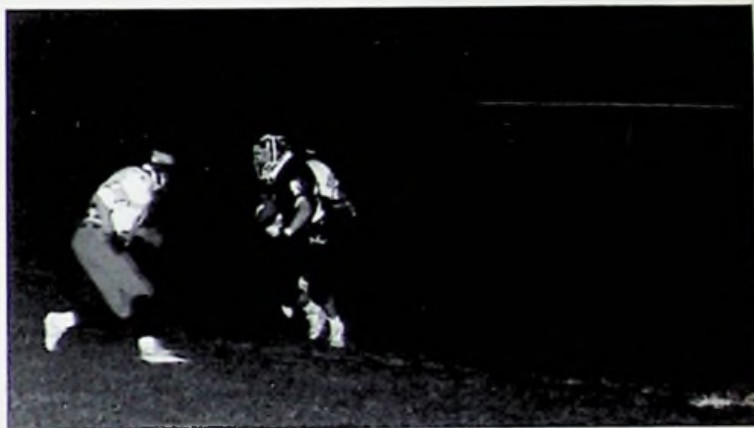

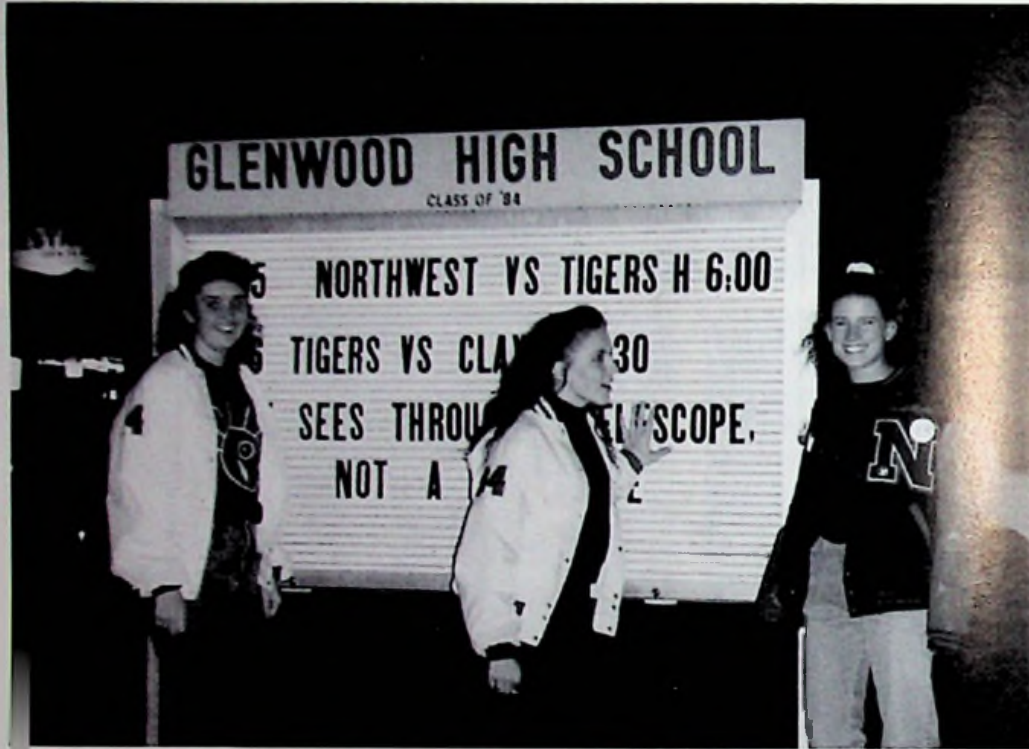

## Young Mohawks Prepare for Future

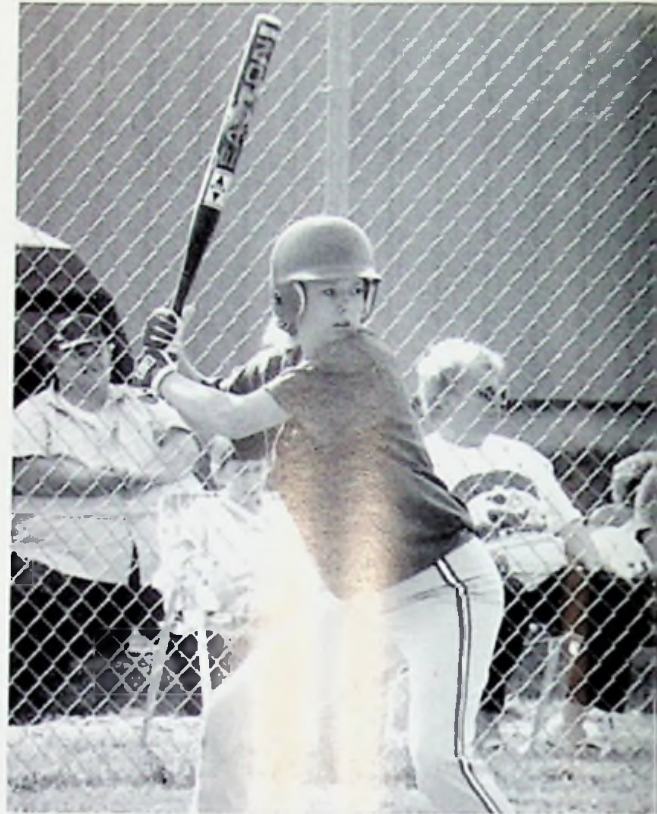

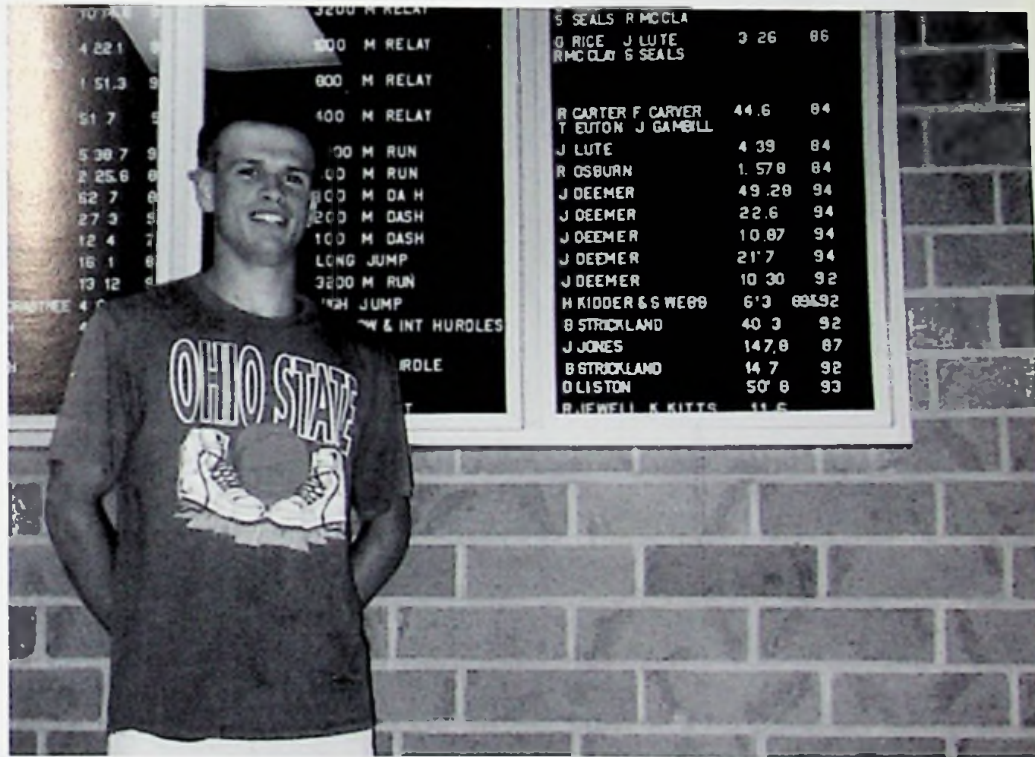
