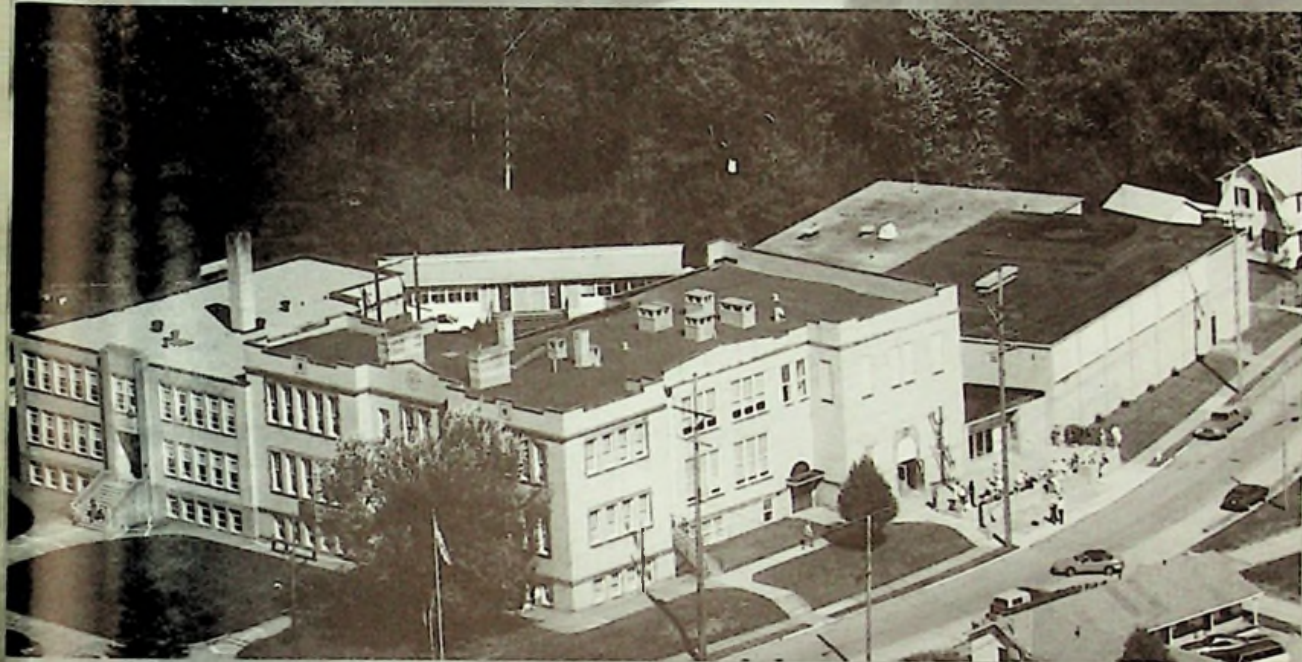

Taking time out of class is not a good thing, but everyone seems to be enjoying the sudden break for a picture. English for this group of students may have been hard, but it was fun.

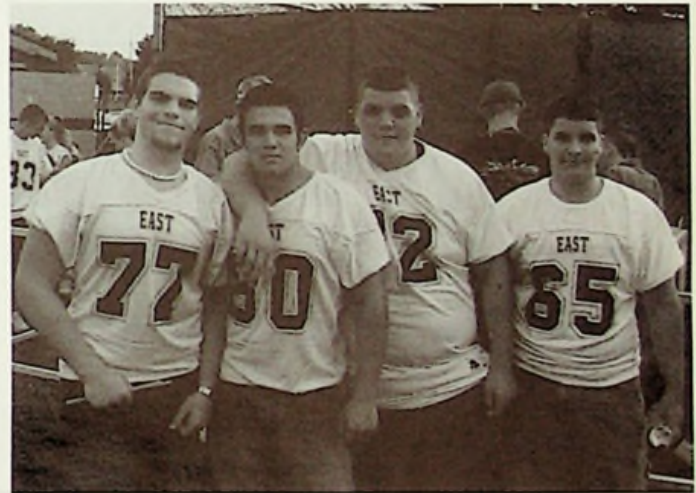


These boys clearly have been paying attention in Nutrition and Wellness class. Each of them always showed a great deal of dedication to their health and fitness.

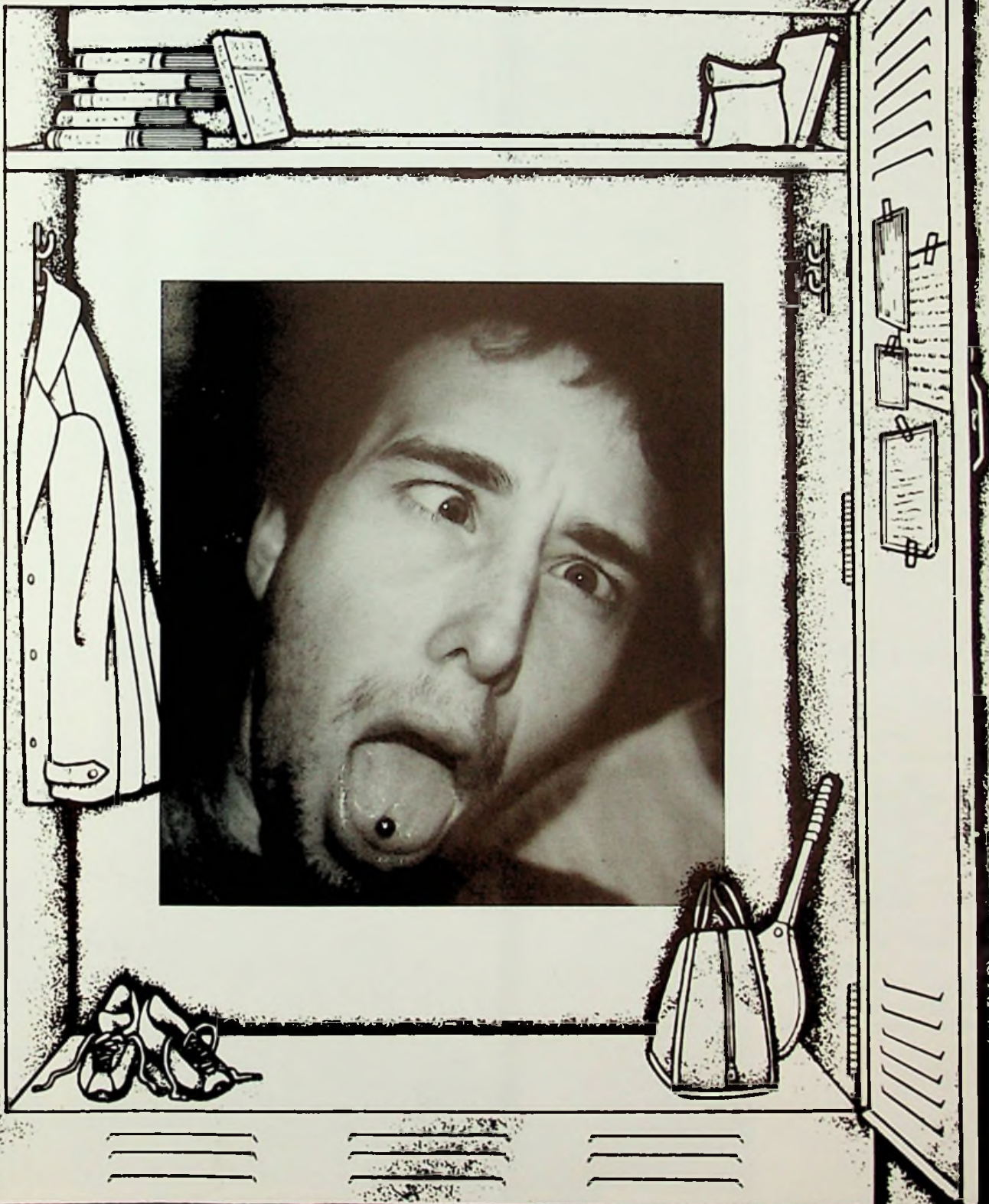

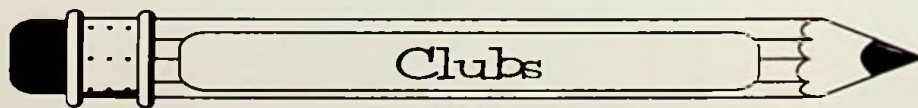

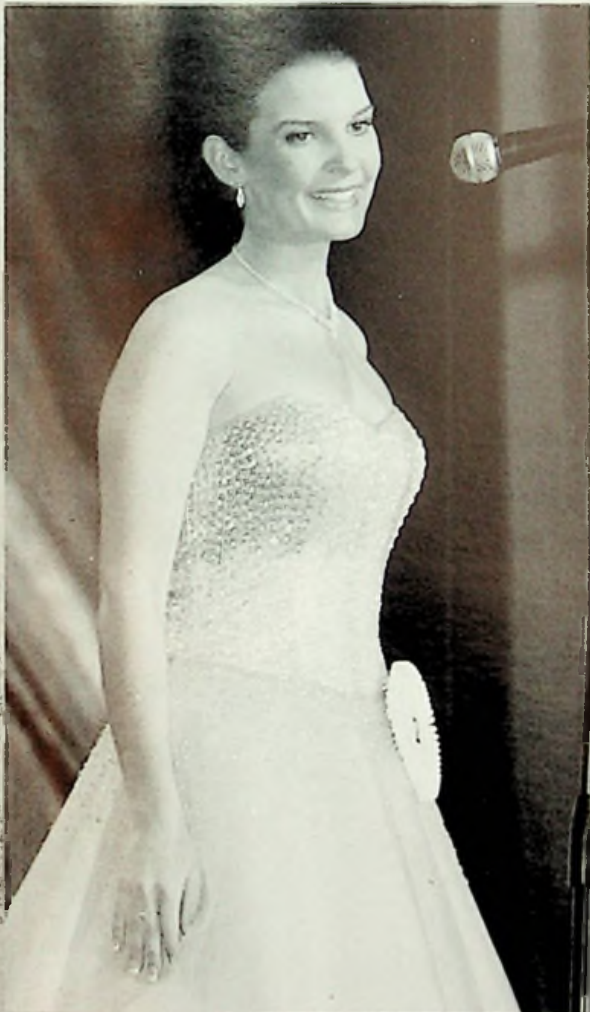

This year, we took our first steps toward adulthood and life. We made more decisions than we expected to and finished the year with few regrets.

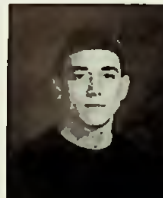

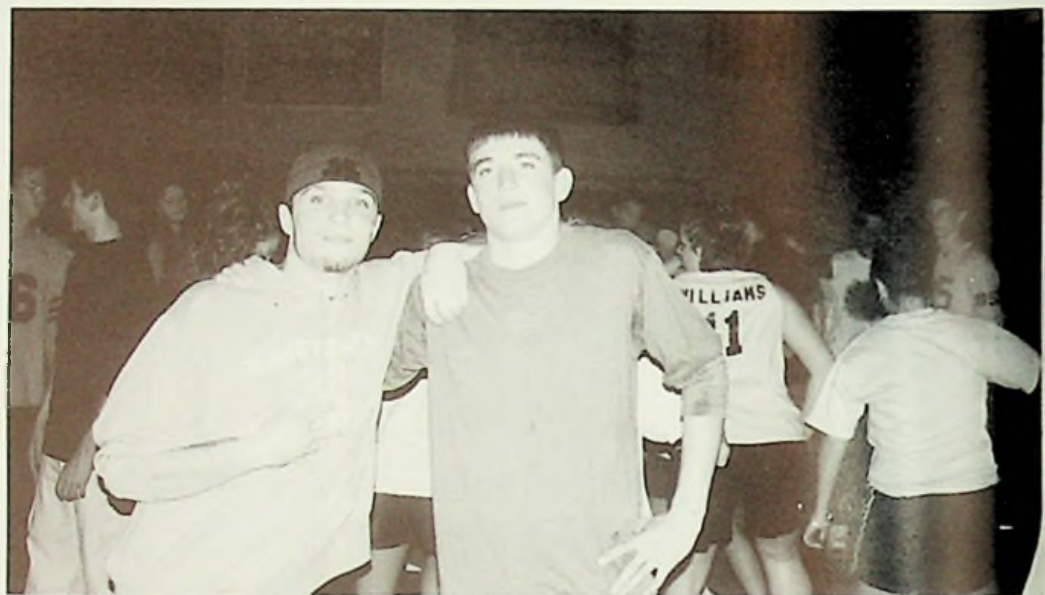

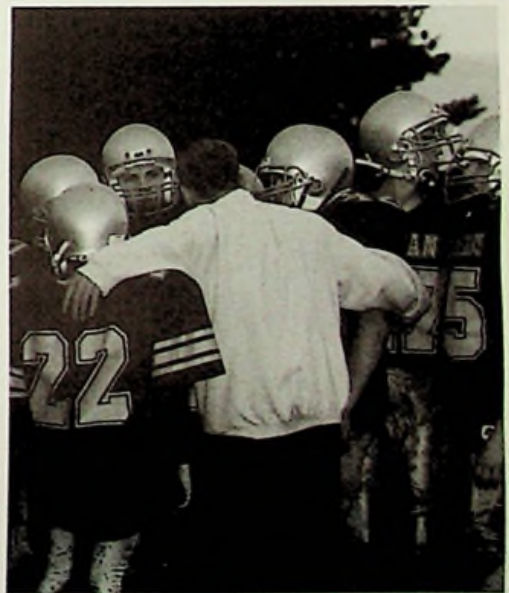

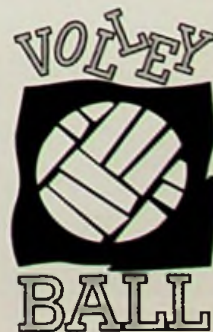

More Potential Than Expected

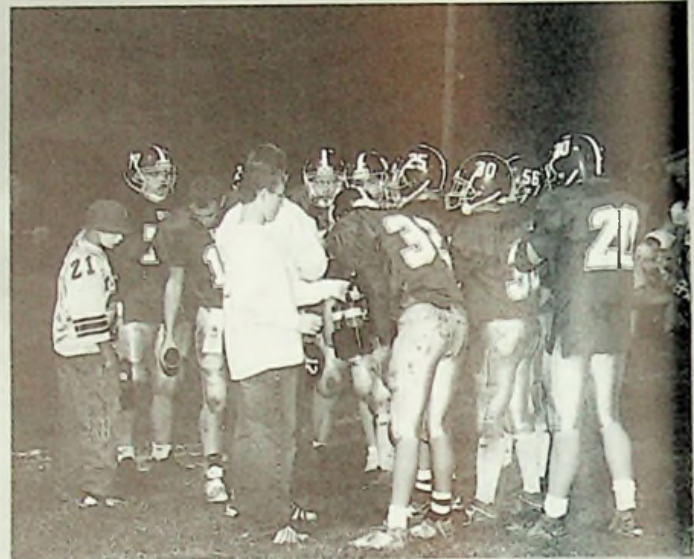

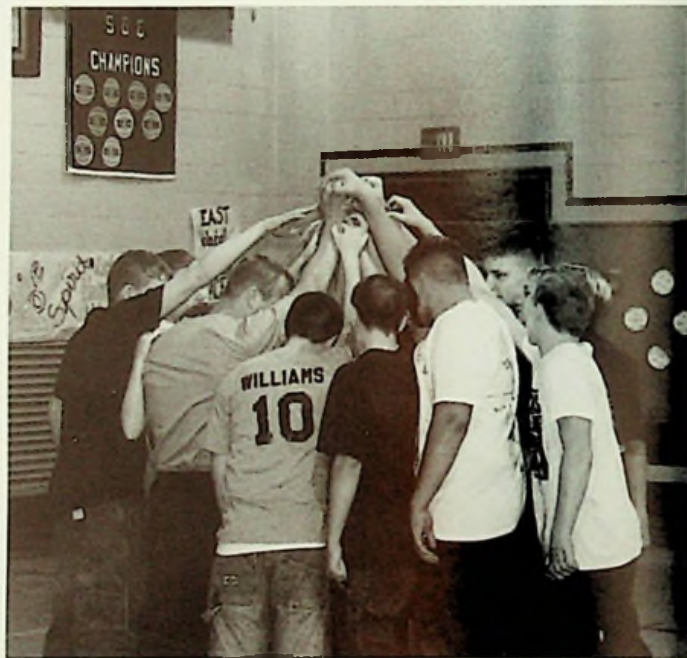

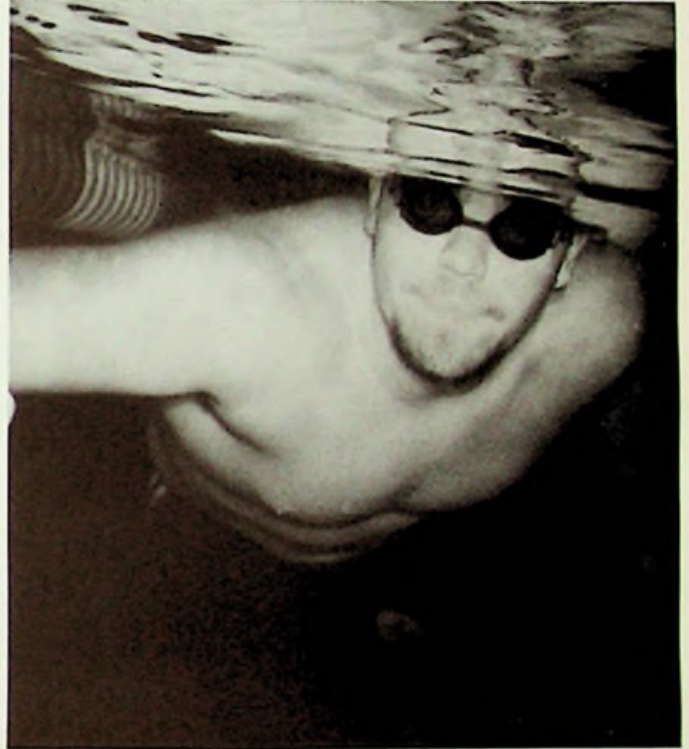

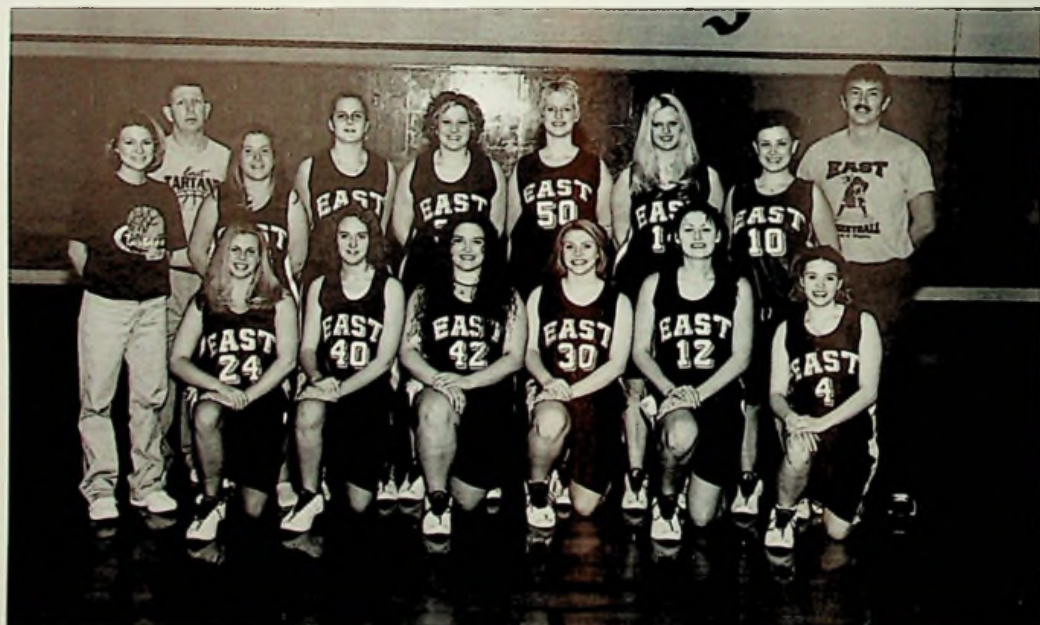

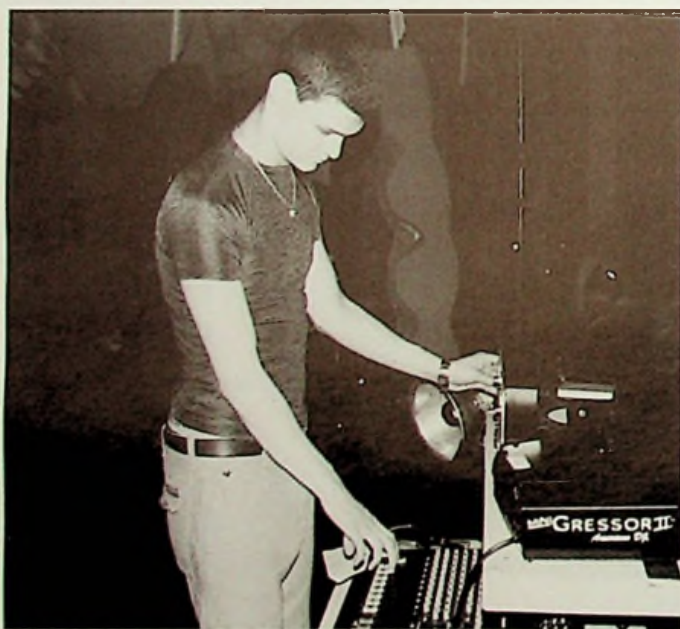
On February 1, 2005, East High School held their 2nd annual Basketball Homecoming. Although the game was extremely exciting, the girls held center court.

The finish of the perfect evening was when the boys basketball team beat Picketon by one tiny point. Afterwards, a dance enjoyed by all was held in the gym.

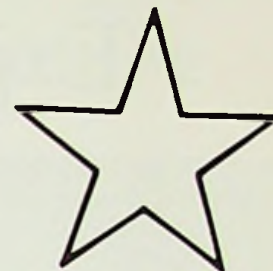

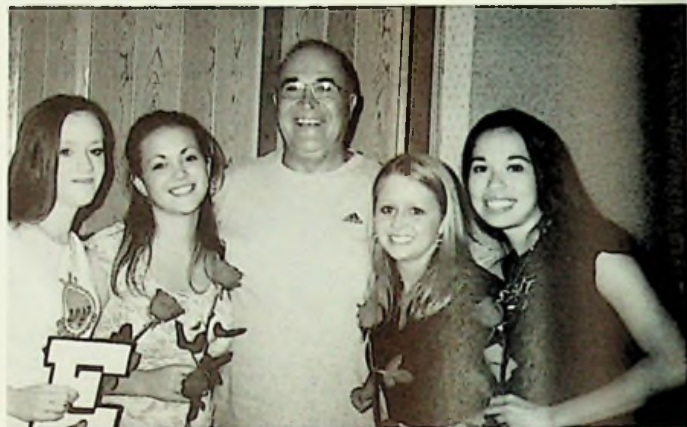

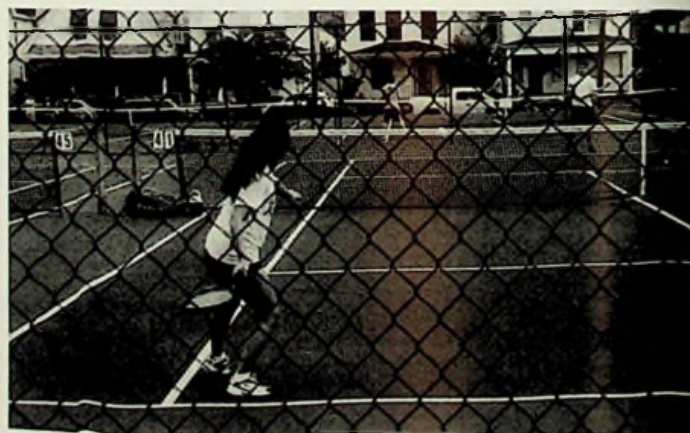

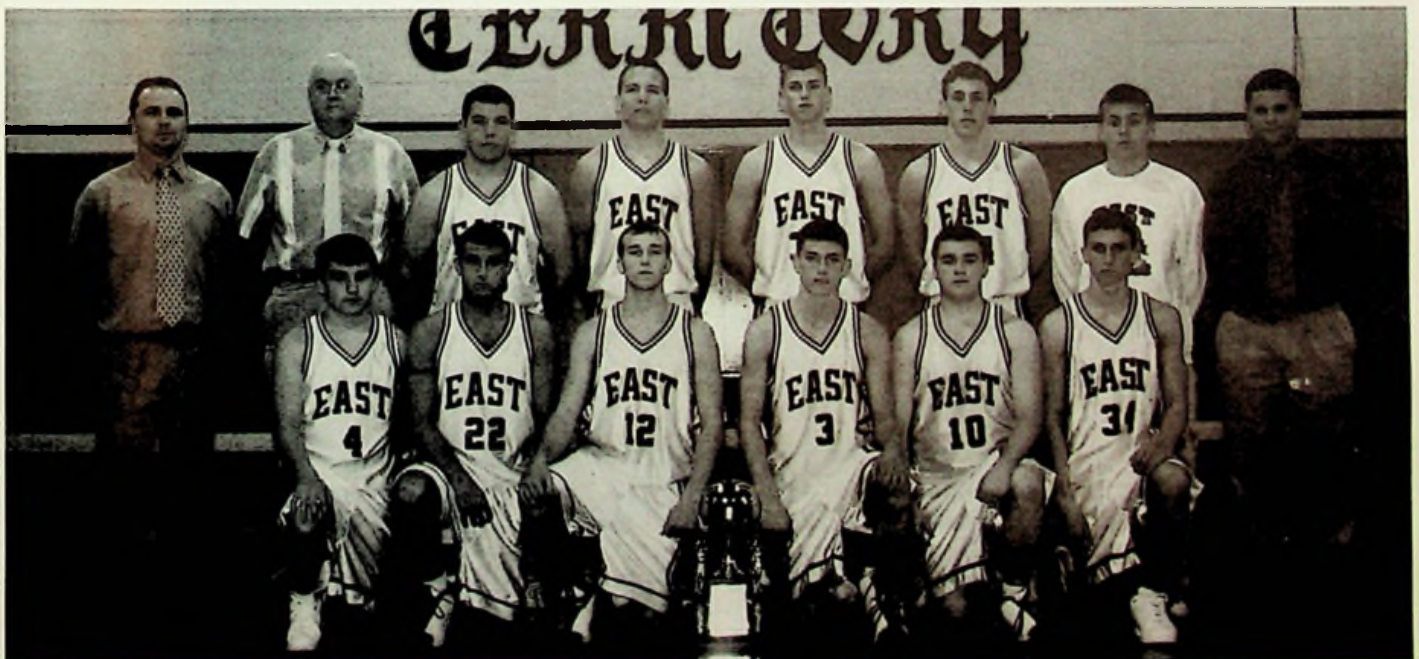

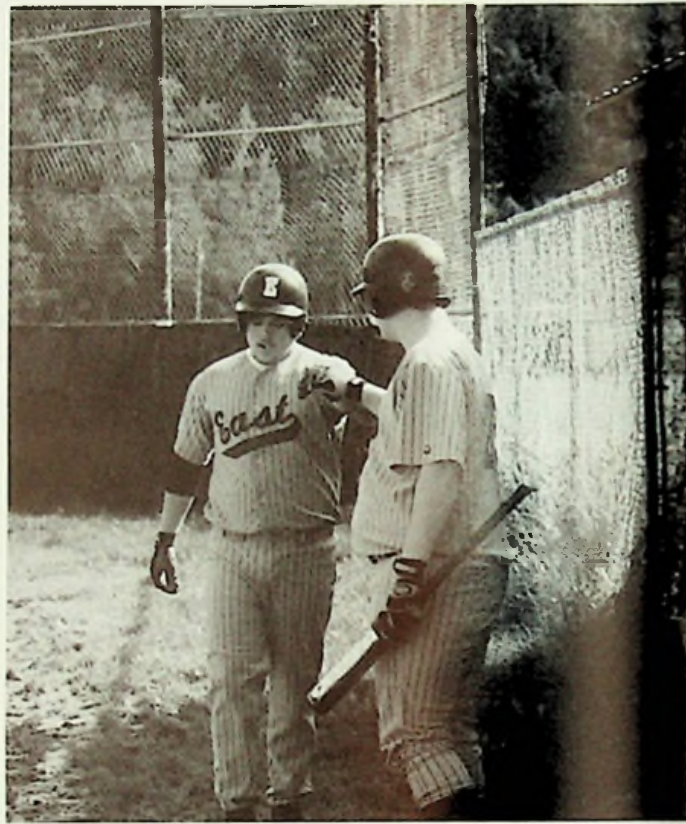
More Than Three Strikes

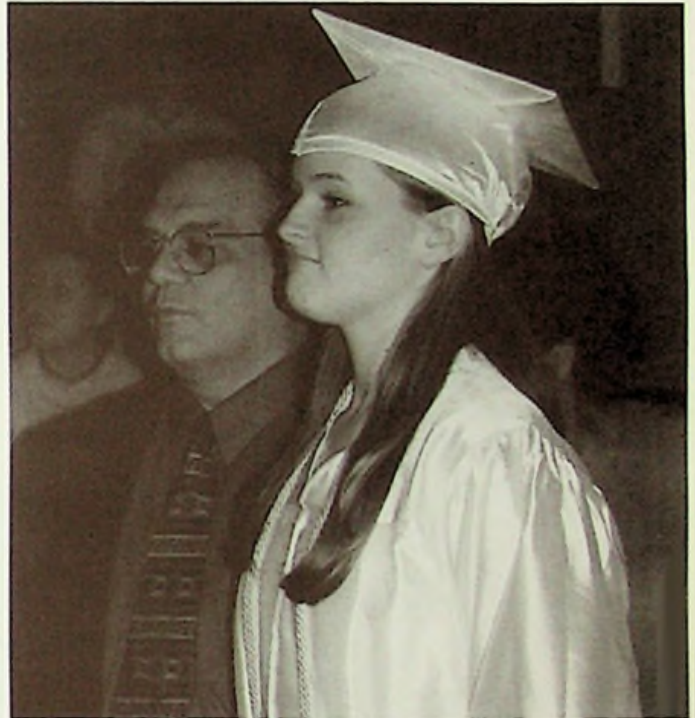
