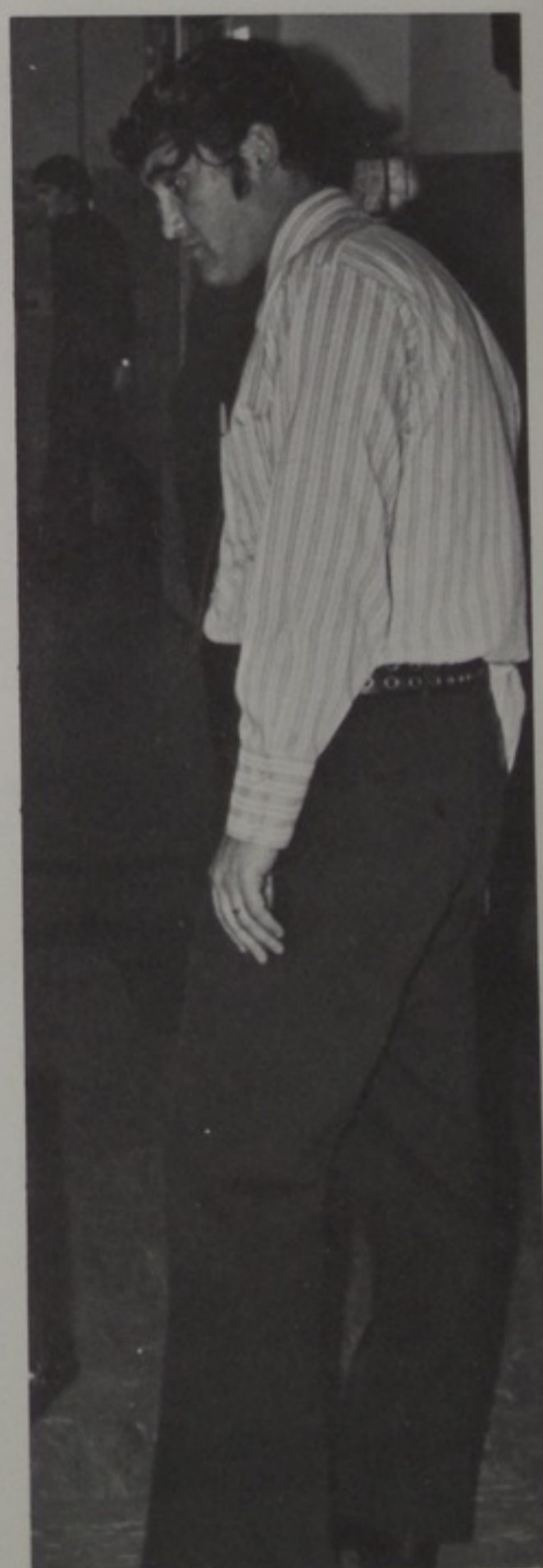
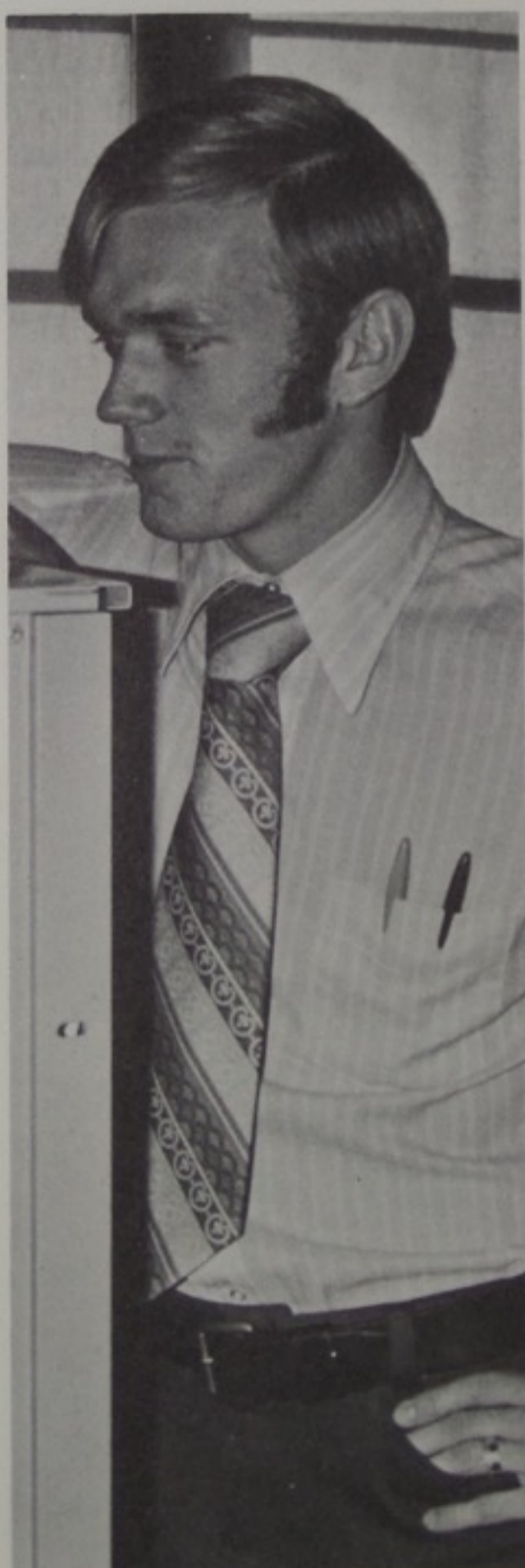


MR. GERALD MCGINNIS

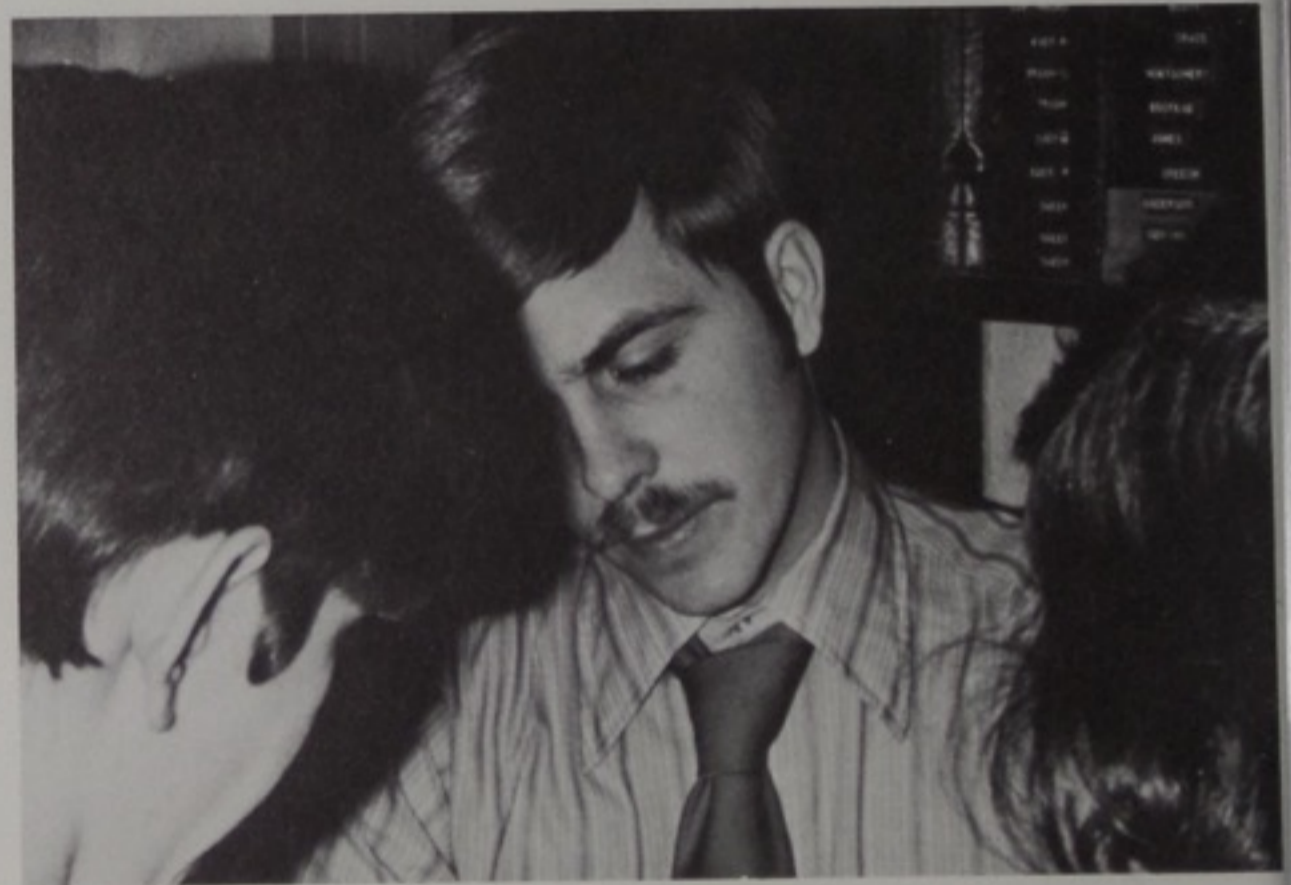
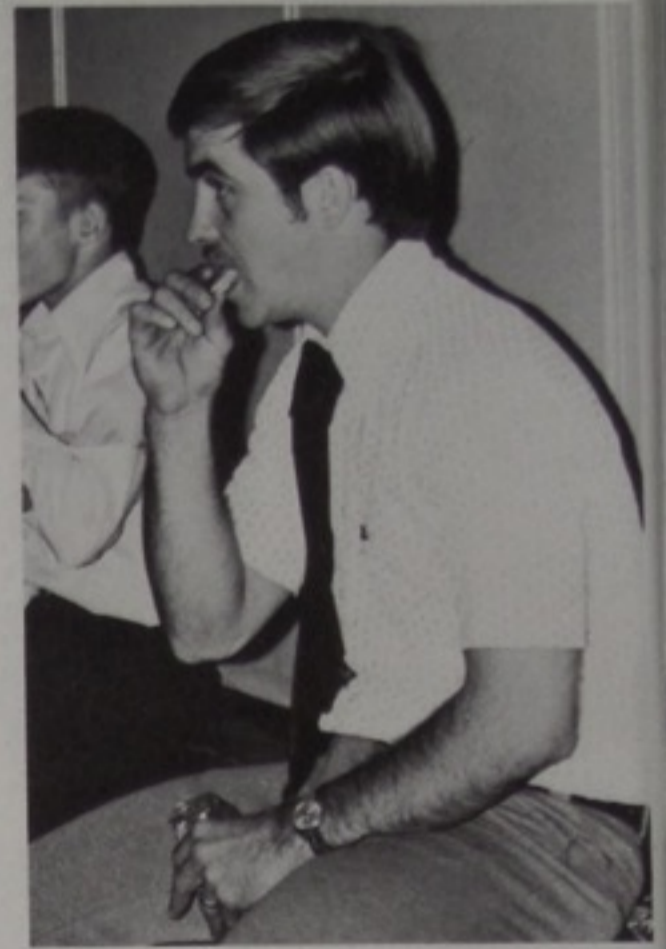

Mr. Robert Schwamberger took over Mrs. Fannin's government and world history classes at the end of the year.

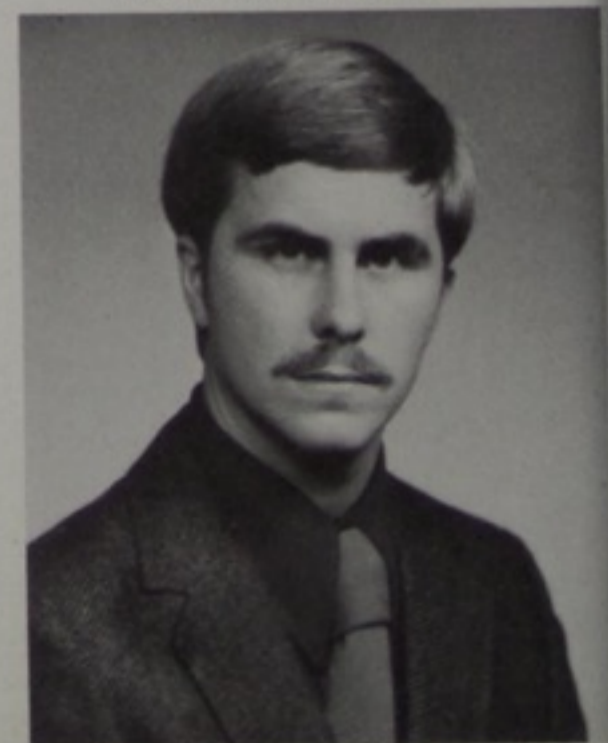

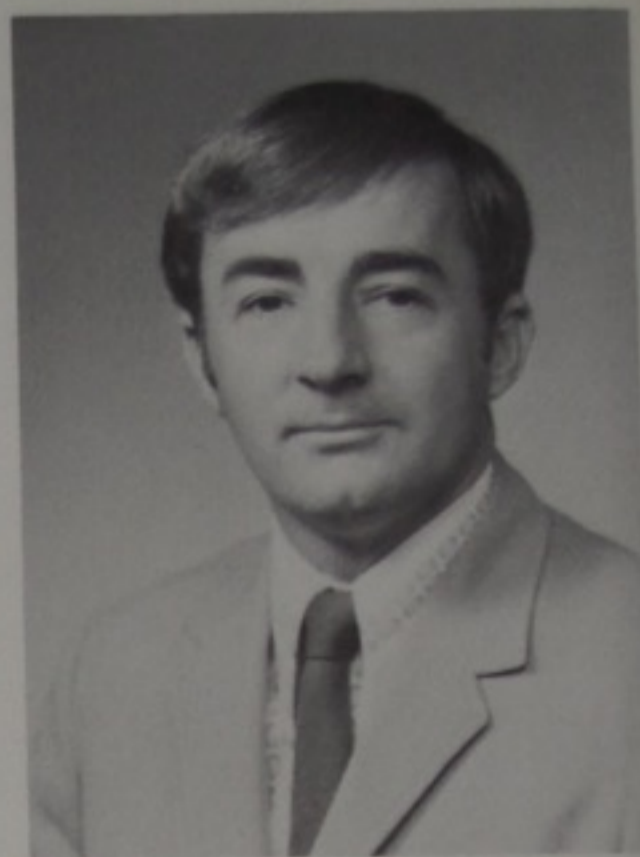
Providing a school with effective leadership is no easy task. Valley is fortunate to have quality administration through able men like Mr. Comer and Mr. Young.
