









Vicki Caseman won the Betty Crocker Award this year. Vicki scored the highest on the test, which is given to all the senior girls who choose to take it.



Amount of CO_2 exhaled compared to the weight of the body. Barb Lewis, first place Harding, second place Portsmouth.




A study of acids, Sue Roney. First place Harding; second place Portsmouth.


