Sept 7.

A nice day.
A little cool in
the evening.
Pa & Ma went up
to visit Rine's
I went down to
the Mill and heard
Bro. Lockin last
season for the year.
After pulping
John & Eppie &
Bertie back I da
Agna that and
several others went
up to Mr. Bannock
He had a right
nice time.

Sept. 8.

A very warm day. It rained hard in the evening.

The cut by tail grass out of the meadow.

The had to quit a little earlier on the account of the rain.

I wrote Miss. a letter a letter. Rob. one last but failed to send it.

Sept. 9.

A heavy fog. This morning. Rained a little before noon.

I went down to see about moving the press and met Mr. Fadott.

He will not bail any before next week.

I cut the string off the peach trees. Found eight dead. The rest of them was alive.

Sept. 10.

Sept. 13.

Another rainy morning. The boat was about to start and the wagon started. The show started.

Had a good time. Our camp was encamped until we had 15 before arriving.

Our company did not arrive.

Dave & Harry & I brought the wagon down.

We got home all right. It has turned somewhat cooler.

Sept. 14.

A cool morning
and a nice day.

All of them gone
except Pa, Ma & Bill.
I went over to
Mr. Corvill

Had a splendid
time. Got a
letter.

All of them gone
at home and almost
the spinning
machine in
house.

I arrived at
home tolerably
early.

At 11 P.M. stayed
all night with

Sept 15.

Cool. With 8

I went down to

Sept 18.

cool this morn-
ing. The cows

at our hauling
hay.

Worked hard
all day.

down.

Sept. 19.

Turned a little
warmer.

Began to fix
for rain.

Rained a little
this afternoon.

Finished
hauling hay.

Bailed 15 tons
and a quarter.

We got home
about four o'clock.

Pa went to
town this morn-

ing. Has not
yet got back yet.

At home and
feel comfortable.

Received an
order from the
factory by
way of J. W. C.

Sept. 20.

A nice day. Got
the hawc out early
all day.

Pa stayed all
night in town
and made his

later this evening.

I wrote a letter
to Miss. Martha
and intended to
send it by
mail.

the boys worked
at the house
all day. James
is here this
evening.

Sept. 23.

A nice day.
Took a little
like rain.

He worked at
the house.

Took off some
soot and Squire

DD began to make
it rain. James

Smith cut 20
pockets of corn

from the ground.
James & Squire

finished digging
the potatoes this
forenoon.

Washed them
up and put

them in the
crib.

Sept 24,

A nice day. Cold
wind blew a little.
Squill & I mail
on roof all day.
They got things
ready for timber
market.

Hatter & I started
in the evening a
little after dark.
We got down. They
a bout. We click
in the morning.

Sept 25:

Very cool during
the night. Hatter
& I were ready for
market when it
opened. But no
customers. We stamped
around until business
began and then
I went over chickens
and butter here
and there. We started
back a little after
ten. Got home
early. but used
I received two
letters one from
John Dutuit and
a whopper, big and
as good a letter
as I ever read. I
love Hatter

Sept 26.

A gloomy looking
afternoon. No
precip. dry.

It did not
rain much.

We worked at
the saw till

we ran out of
saw. Palderson

Frank & Parker
up to Cape Hill

to day. The situation
late this evening

of course I cut
16 bunches of

corn after we
ran out of saw.

Sept 27.

A rain last night
very wet this
morning. It rained

a little. I guess
I made three

chicken coops
in the afternoon.

We cut corn in
the afternoon.

The air became
chilly after

dinner. There
were two

men down from
Jackson to

buy sheep. He
was out with

the sheep. As
they did not

get to see him.

Sept 28

A very cool
morning. The
sun on a farm where
the air cool.

Walter Smith
took me over to
church to the
Chapelle. Home
back. Stopped
for dinner at
Mr. Jenkins.

Had a very
good time.

We came back
home by Scioto
River. Smith & I
rode down to
the Mill after
the mail and
stayed for church.

Sept 29.

A very cool
morning.
We were up early
looking for fossils
but none.

We made our
morning. Had
21 gal.

I have worked
all day at the
reef on the
farm.

Rec'd two letters
this morning
one for Pa to
Mr. Pratt and
the other one
for myself by
Charles Foster & Co.
Retail. Pen

Sept. 30.

A nice day.
Rained a little
last night.

We have been
spotting all
day.

Pa went down
as a runner on
a road near
James Adams
field and get
back till after
dark.

We commenced
the roof on the
barn.
