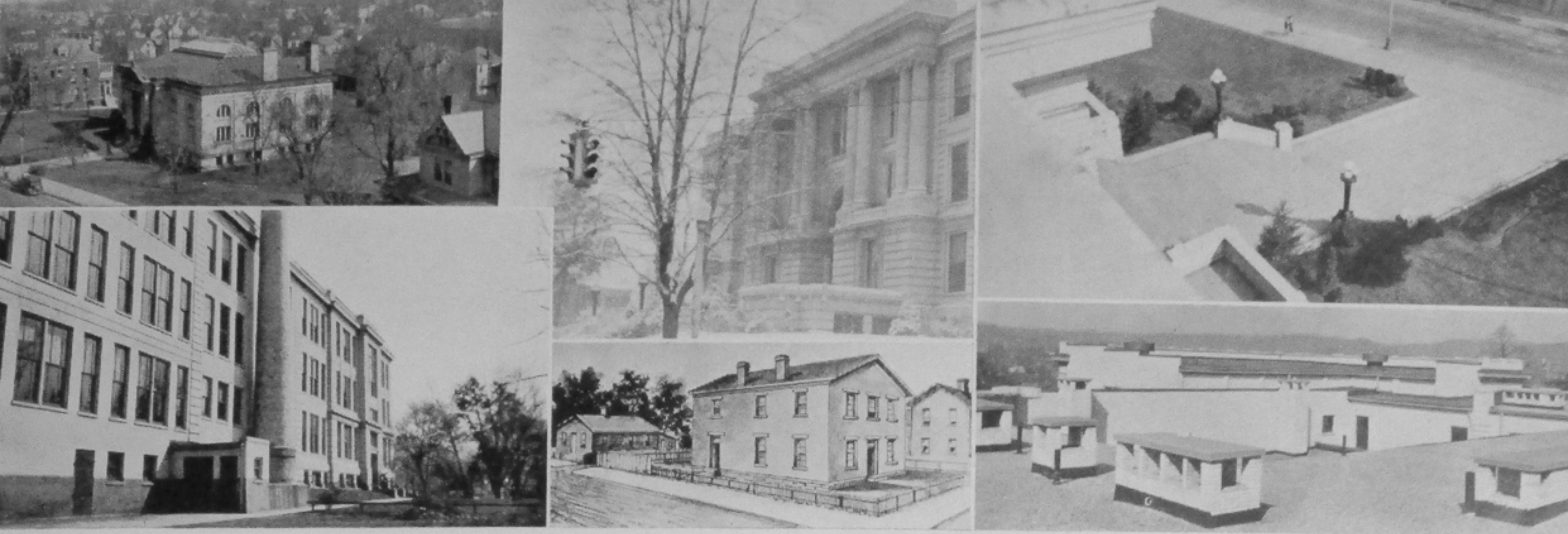

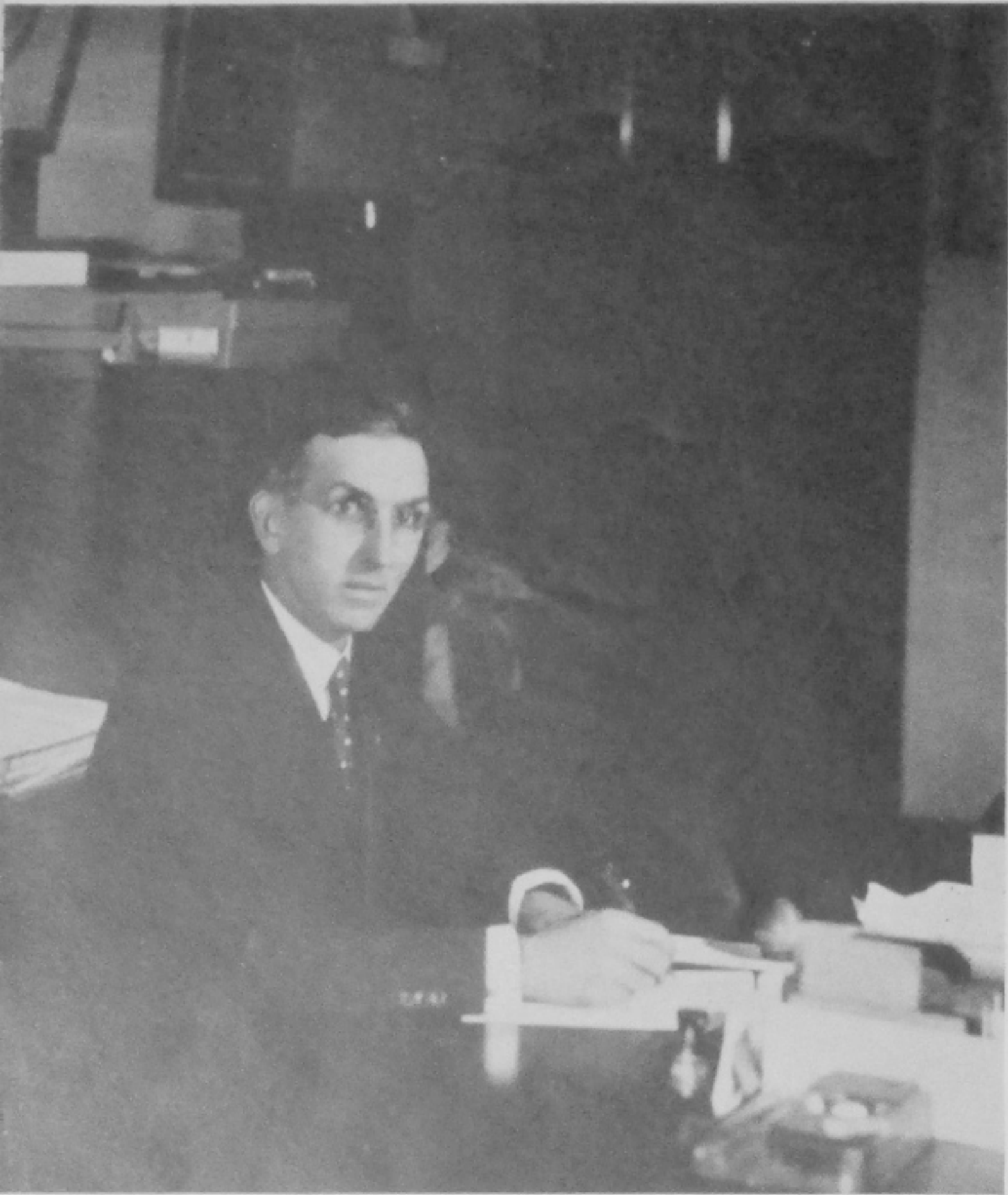


# WE INTRODUCE

# MORE THAN HALF THE STUDENT BODY

## GIRLS' ORGANIZATIONS

Every girl in the high school belongs to the Girls' League! It is governed by a cabinet made up of selected girls who plan parties and assemblies. Last year the highlights in the life of a Girl-Leaguer were the opening Immigration Party, the Mixer Party, Kid's Party, and the Girls' Assembly—in which the maids in P. H. S. who had talent were permitted to demonstrate it. The first of the aforementioned affairs was given mainly to introduce the seemingly naive freshmen girls to the upper class "women", and to the rules and regulations, mannerisms and manners of the high school and its human contents.

The Girls' League is sponsored by Mrs. Leona Wise Felsted, dean of girls and head of the girls' activities in P. H. S. To her office on the second floor are carried feminine absent excuses to be passed upon. Mrs. Felsted's work is primarily concerned with the building and improvement of attitudes in connection with home, social, or school problems—anything which concerns the girl's welfare. She is assisted in her office by eight students, who check the girls absent from class, do minor clerical work in typing, are on hand in case of emergency, and help any girl in the rest room in connection with Mrs. Felsted's office, where a first-aid kit is kept in case of accidents.

The Senior Honor Council, composed of senior girls, holds a meeting with its sponsor every other week. The advisers emerge from this with a greater supply of material on the development of personality, which they pass along to the Freshmen Councils, made up of seven or eight girls—freshmen, and one senior advisor.

Every year more are taking advantage of this girls' organization and are reaping the benefits of it by entering into its activities, which prepare the average girl for wider activities coming after school days.

## ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

To promote better usage of our language and to develop a broader knowledge of English literature is the object of the English department. Students have opportunities every day to increase vocabularies and to improve daily conversation through themes, book reports, and brief talks that are assigned for class.

Those students who are anxious to study journalism are given a chance to display their talents through the Echo and the Trojan. Still others become members of the English Club.

In addition to drills in sentence structure, verbs, and pronouns—poetry, drama, and short stories play a large part in the program of all English classes. By the time a student graduates, he has met Shakespeare, O. Henry, Tennyson, Burns, Chaucer, Milton, Stevenson, Eliot, Dickens, Emerson, Scott, and many others.

Variety in class work always stimulates interest. For instance, those studying Shakespeare put on brief dramatizations for the rest of the class. Oral reports on fiction, plays, and biographies are frequently taken from current magazines to vary material. In this manner almost everyone studies English under the supervision of the teachers pictured on these two pages.

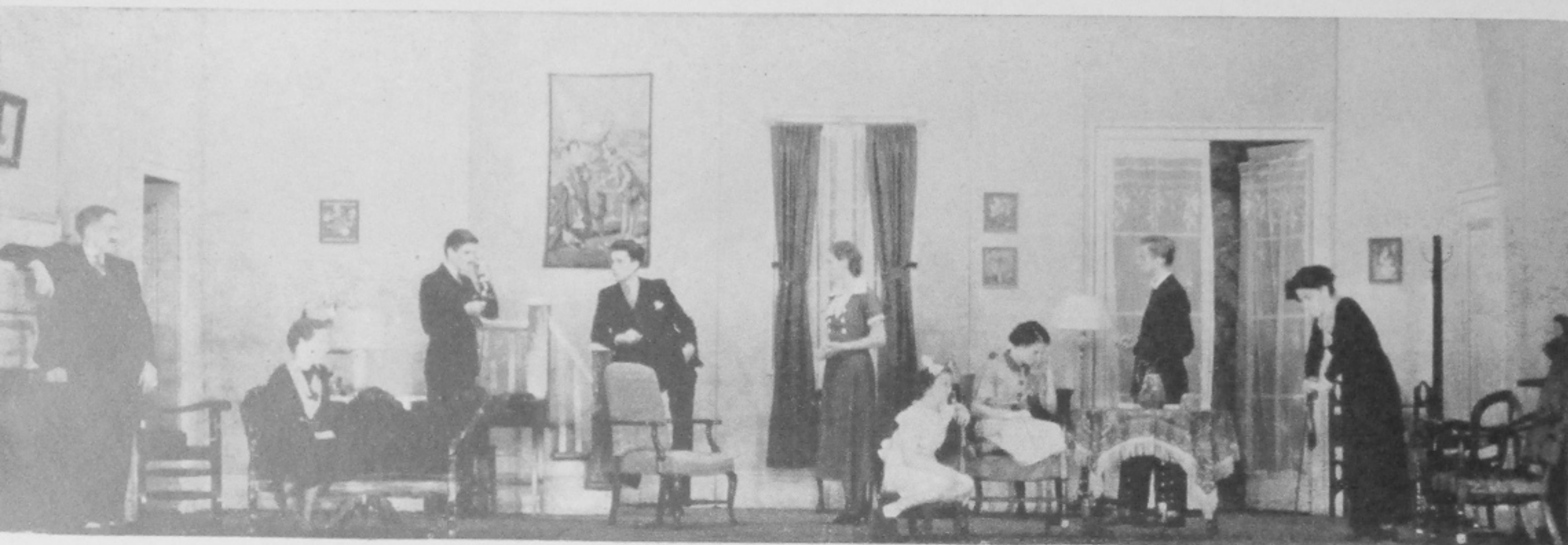
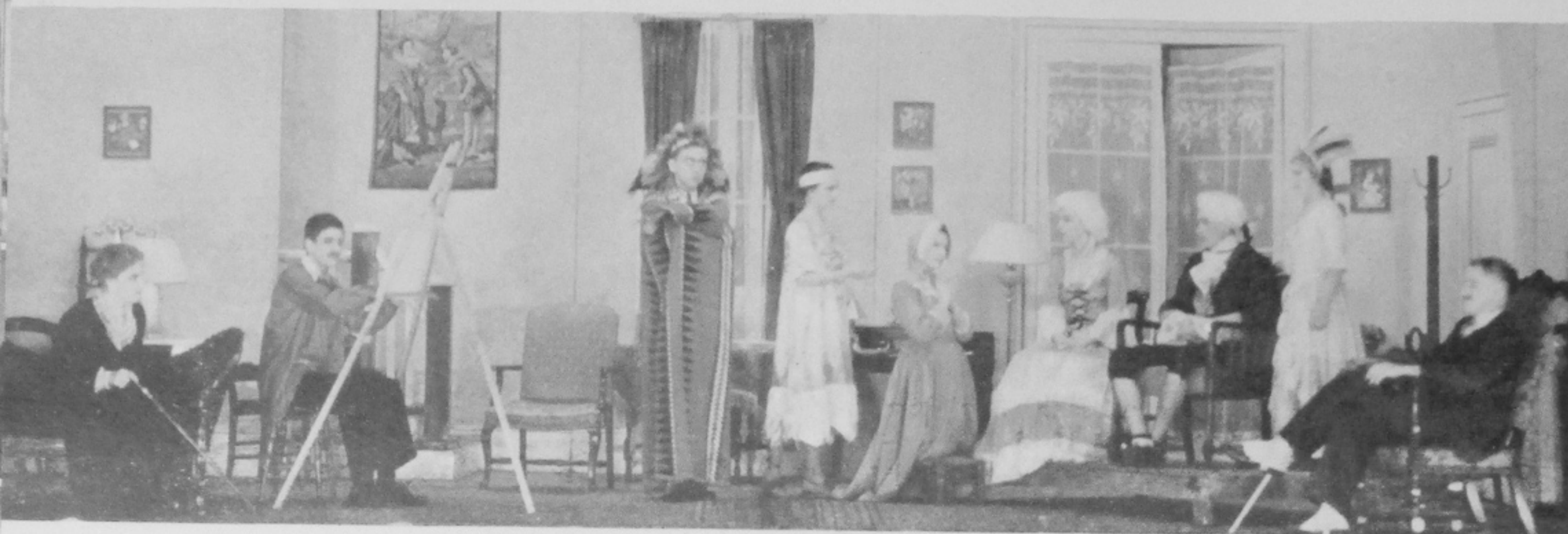

## **“THE MILLIONAIRE” - A RICH PLOT**

“The Millionaire” comically deals with the reactions of six heathen Heaths toward a gentleman Heath who is supposedly quite wealthy.

Handsome, witty Gideon Heath (Robert Reno III) returns to his home town after a long stay in Australia. He arrives to find his various relatives in a very receptive mood, which fact shocks him greatly because he had long been treated as a penniless prodigal.

The family run-about, Fred Lawlor (Vernon Ishmael), informs Gideon that the assumption is that he, Gideon, is a millionaire, thanks to a false newspaper report. Gideon assumes the role as a ruse. Many amusing events follow. He is asked to speak before various local clubs; to donate this and that to public projects; and is treated royally by the family. Johnny Heath (Arthur Ray Prince) offers to paint his portrait—collection to be made later; College President Ronald Heath (Chad Horr, Jr.), offers to dedicate a building to Gideon,—if he supplies the cash; widowed Blanche Heath (Betty Mills), an old sweetheart of Gideon’s, postpones her forthcoming marriage to Ronald in hopes that she and Gideon will share the latter’s money in a life partnership; impish little Blanchette Heath, Blanche’s daughter (played by Jane Gove), boldly hints to Gideon that she expects a radio from him; and the town vamp, Lottie Pringle (alias Mary Kathryn Malcolm), speedily sets her cap for Gideon.

Gideon is in hot water as he listens to the plans made for him. The truth outs; and a hurricane follows. Gideon is ousted, so to speak. He plans to leave town. Dorcas (Mary Louise Hansgen), an orphan in love with Gideon since childhood, leaves her foster Aunt, Adeline Heath (Donna Daniels), to go with him.

As a climax an unexpected telegram arrives for Gideon, restoring to him money lost in gold mine dealings, and also, incidentally, restoring his prestige with the Heaths. He then realizes his true love for Dorcas; and thus, triumphant, really is the Millionaire.

# PORTSMOUTH HIGH BOASTS A

## FOREIGN LANGUAGES

Strange sounds fill the air in certain rooms at P. H. S. "Buenos dias" floating from the Spanish room merges with "Quota hora est" from the Latin head-quarters, with a dash of "Comment ca va" thrown in for the French-minded.

Pupils are helped in their study by newspapers and magazines; notebooks also play a part in their yearly work. Sometimes the students change into ancient heroes and warriors, speaking (to an uninitiated listener) queer-sounding words while acting out their roles.

The Misses Blazer, Colley, and Ball are "officers-in-command" of the Latin posts. Miss Blazer teaches the first year students, helping them lay a good foundation in the subject. Then Miss Colley takes up the work. She leads her army of pupils through ancient Latin battles, and reads with them stories of gods and goddesses, and the history of the European countries during the time when Gallia existed. Miss Ball adds the finishing touches by teaching the third and fourth years Cicero and Vergil.

Students interested in French are instructed by Miss Kauffman. A French novel is read by the advanced pupils, and this language is used almost exclusively by them in their classes. Compositions are written on topics of active interest in past and present France; and "cahiers", that contain newspaper clippings of happenings in France, and pictures of the people and country are part of the course.

Miss Rimer and Mr. Richardson take the part of tutors in the subject of Spanish. The students find it easy to imagine romantic old Spain while listening to the fluent discourse of Miss Rimer, who could pass for a Spanish belle. Mr. Richardson conducts his classes with humor and enthusiasm, creating in the pupils a liking for that tongue.

Miss Margaret Rimer received her B. A. degree at Ohio State University. She teaches first year Spanish and Modern History.

Mr. Robert Richardson was given his B. A. degree at Otterbein; he also attended Ohio State University and Columbia. He teaches Latin and second year Spanish and assists in the Library. He is the faculty advisor of the "Spanish Club," and one of the Junior class sponsors.

Miss Margaret Ball acquired her Ph. B. degree in Education at Denison University. She is an adviser of the "Plus Ultra Club". She teaches Junior and Senior Latin. She is a faculty sponsor of the Senior Class.

Miss Katharine Kauffman received her B. A., B. Sc., and M. A. degrees at Ohio State University. She is the faculty adviser of "Les Jeunes Modernes" and of the "Trojan Staff". She is teacher of Junior and Senior French.

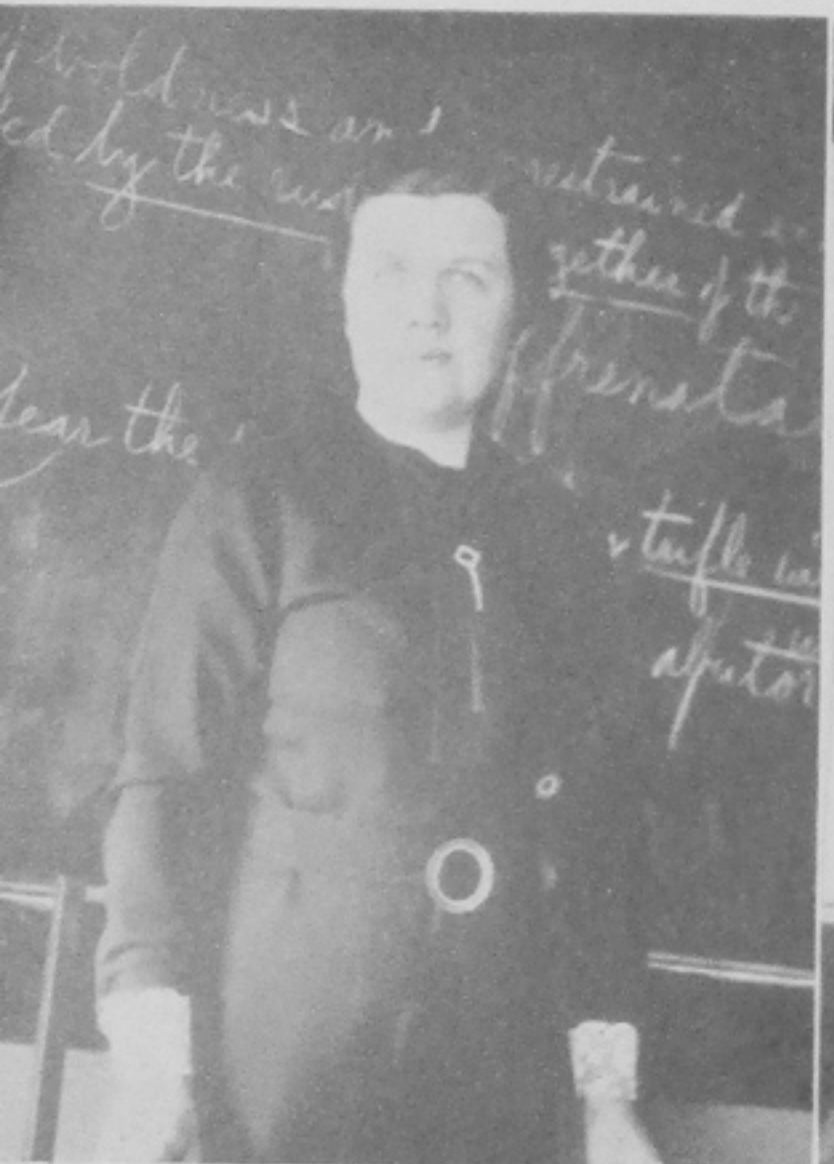

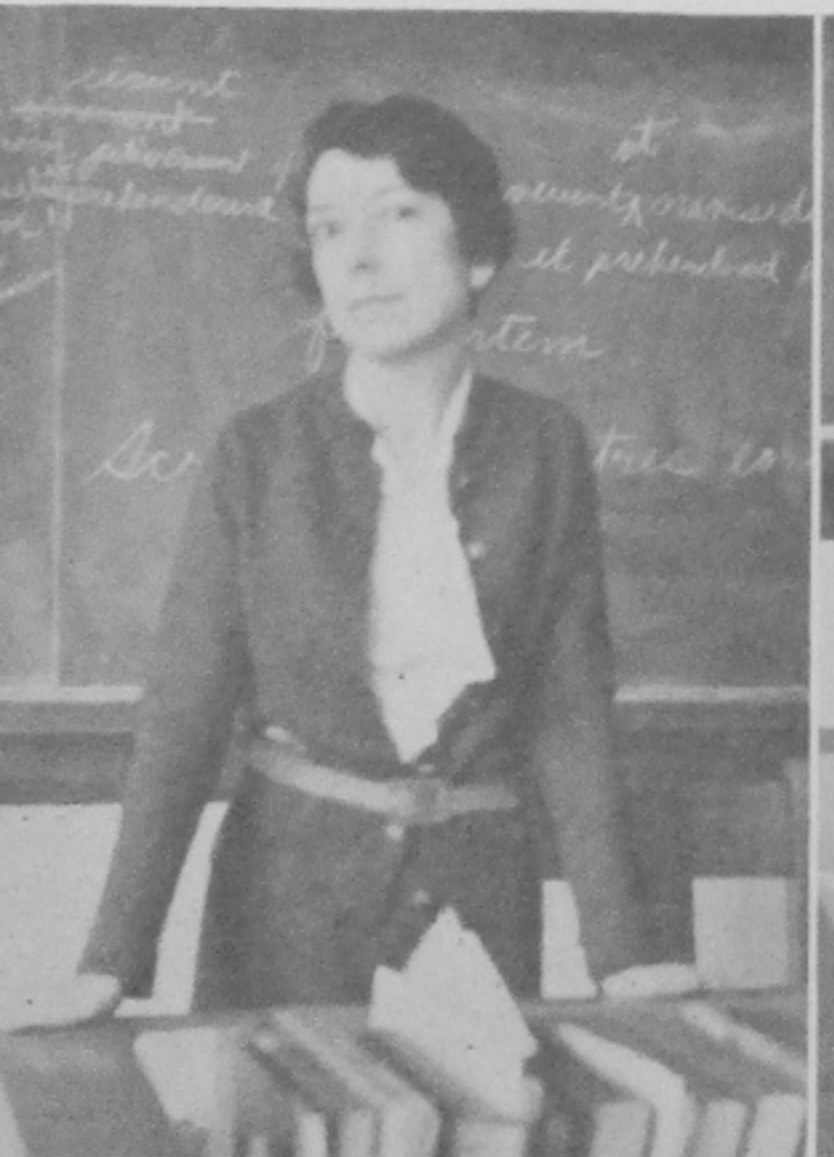

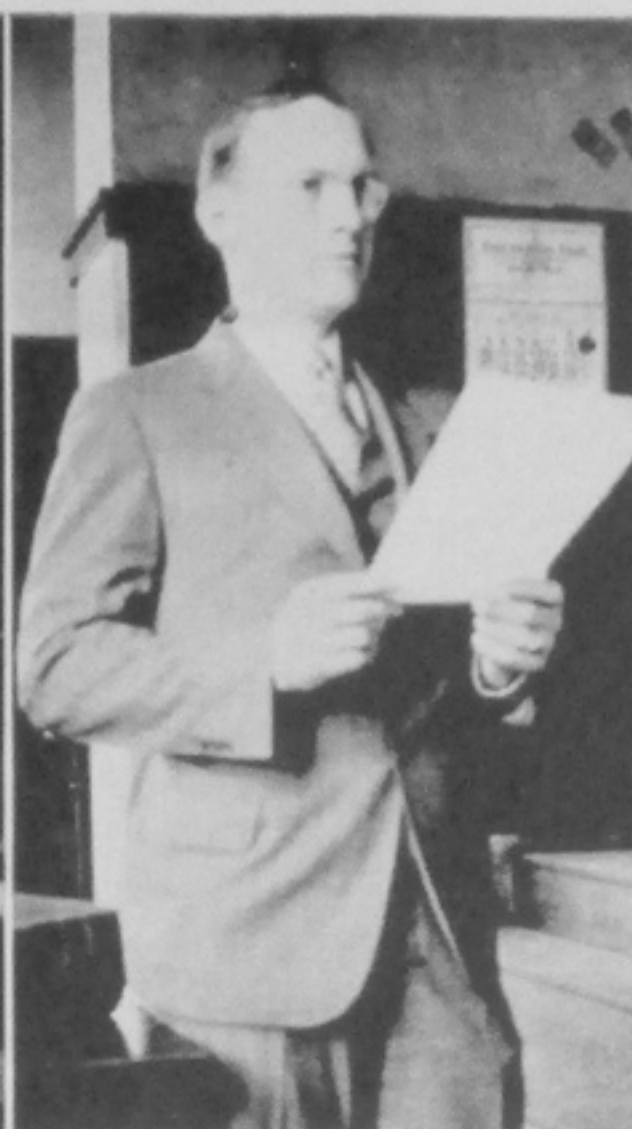
The Civitan Club of Portsmouth added another advantage to our Civics and History departments. This year three awards were given to High School students by this club.

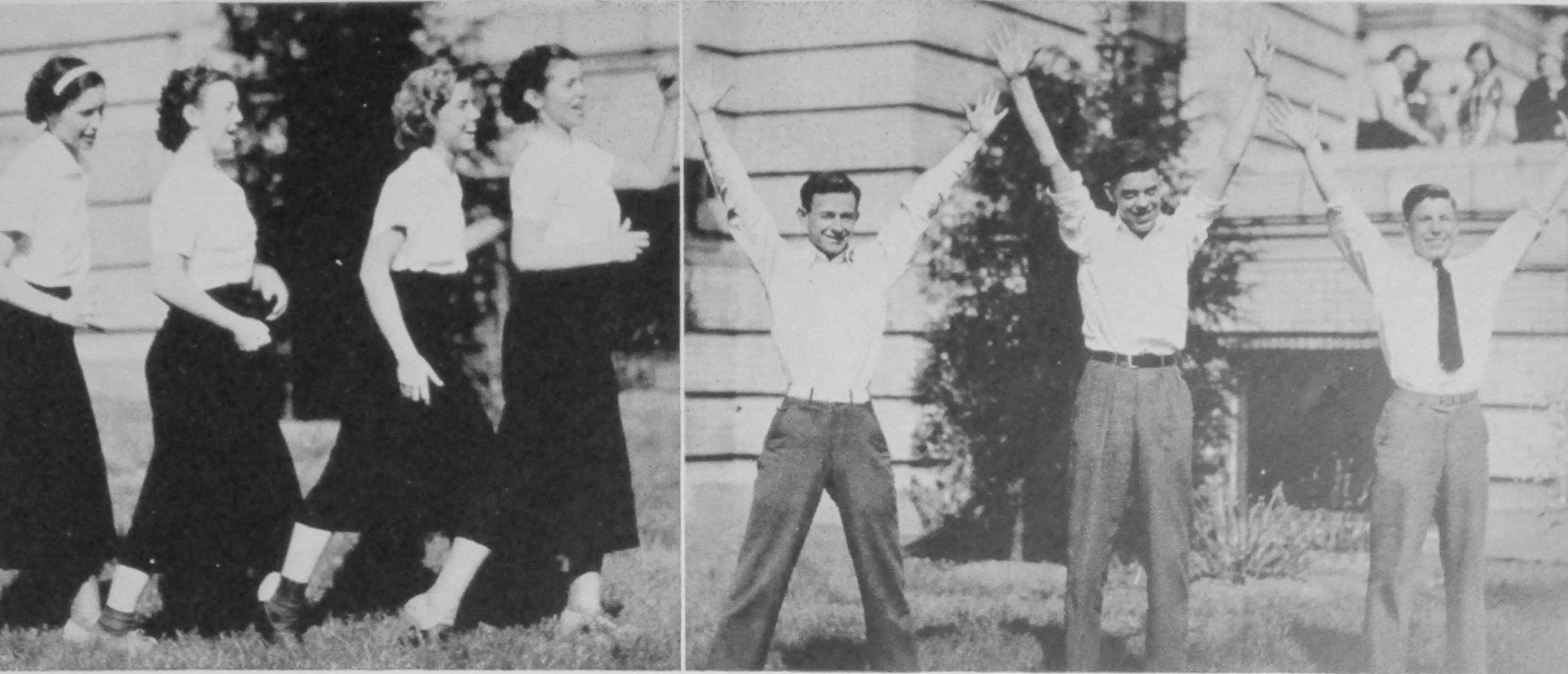
At the conclusion of the basketball season all of the boys who expect to be on next year's fall and winter teams turned out for spring football practice which lasted for four weeks.

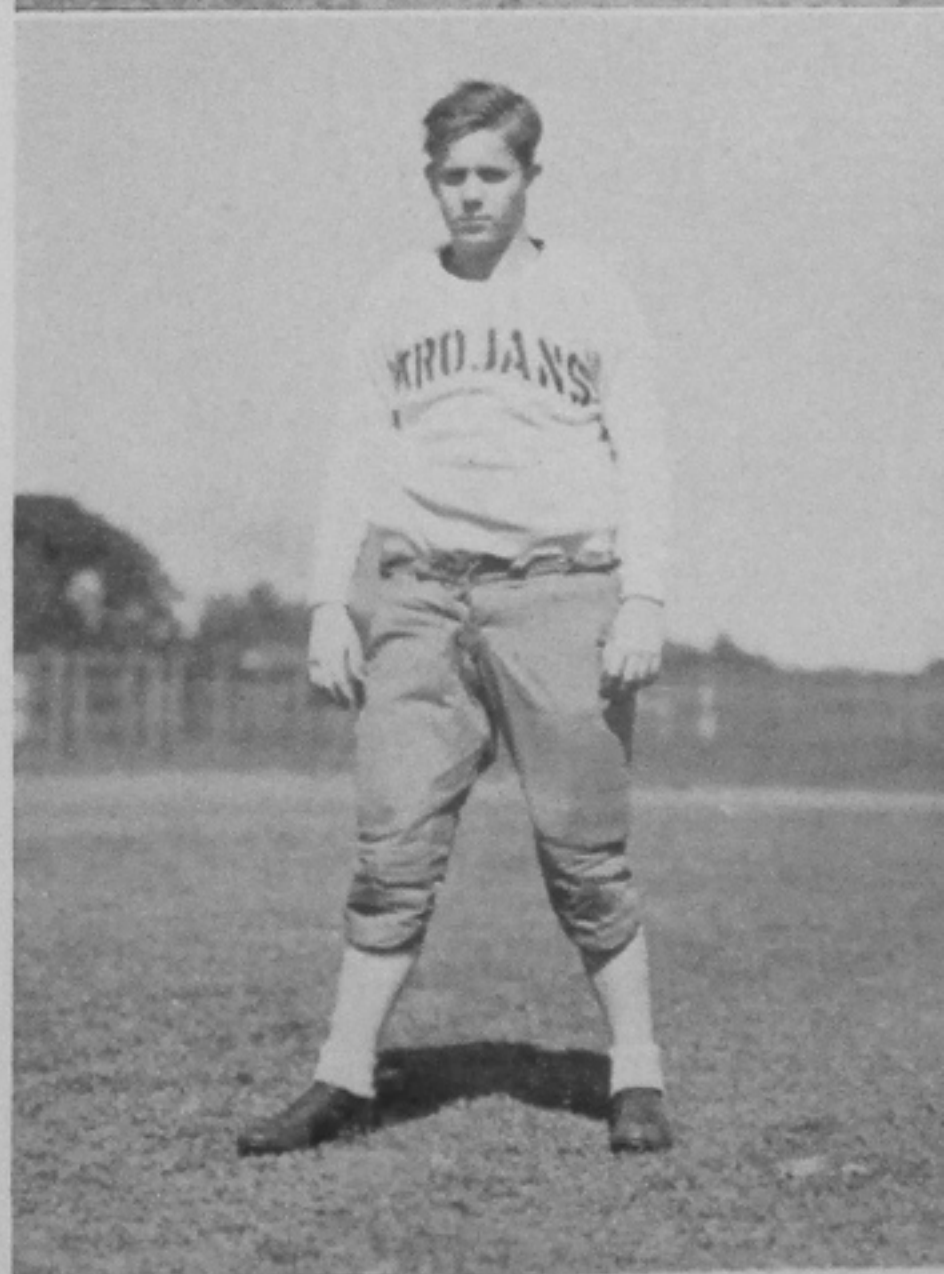
but during their scoring periods they had piled up a score which the Memorial High boys could not overcome. The score at the close of the game stood—21-12.

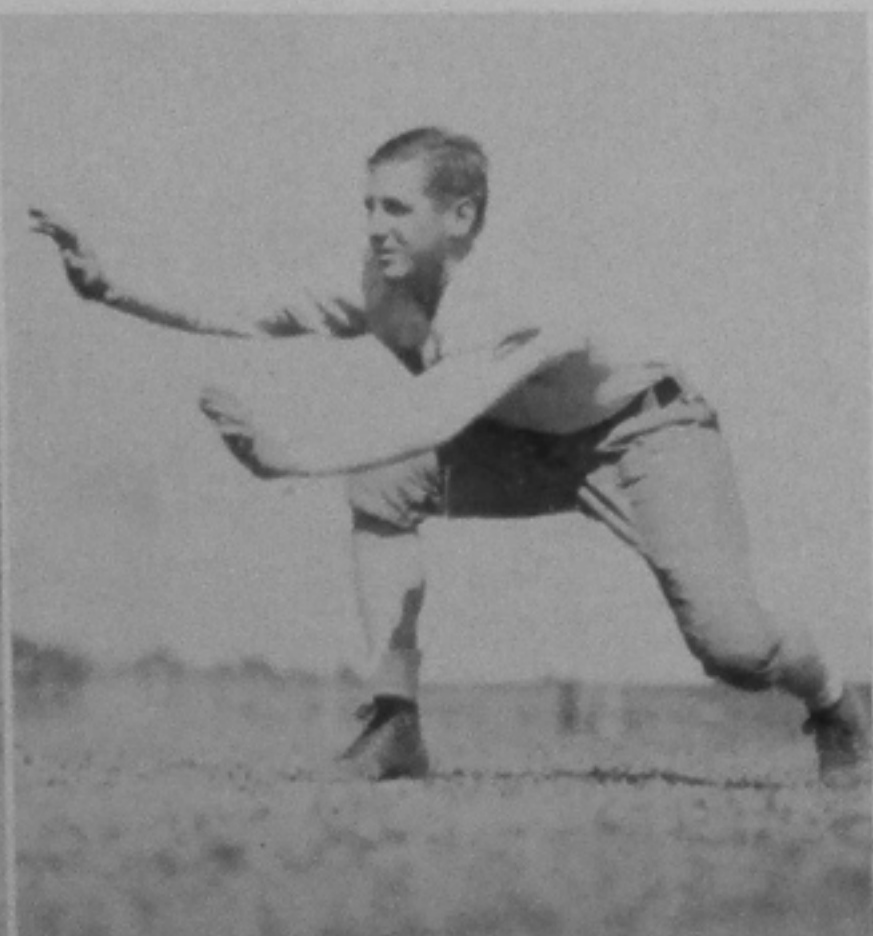

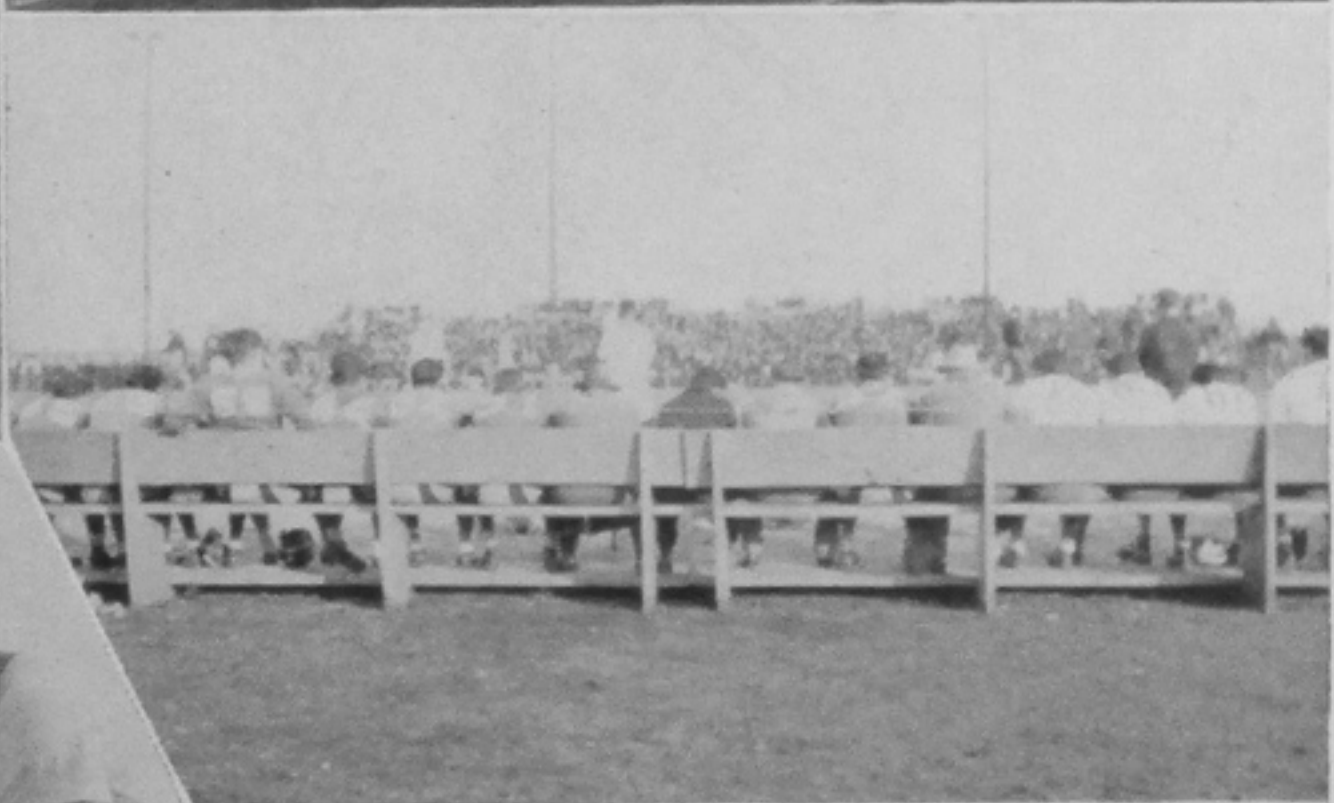
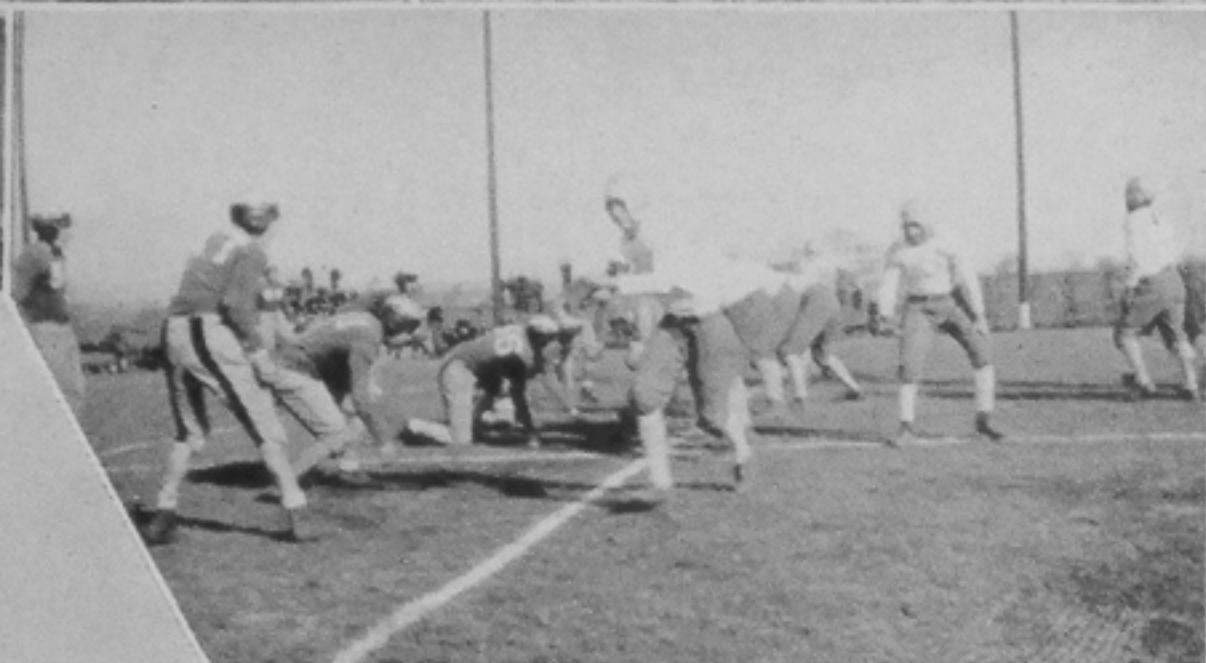
## FOOTBALL MANAGERS - SCRUBBERS

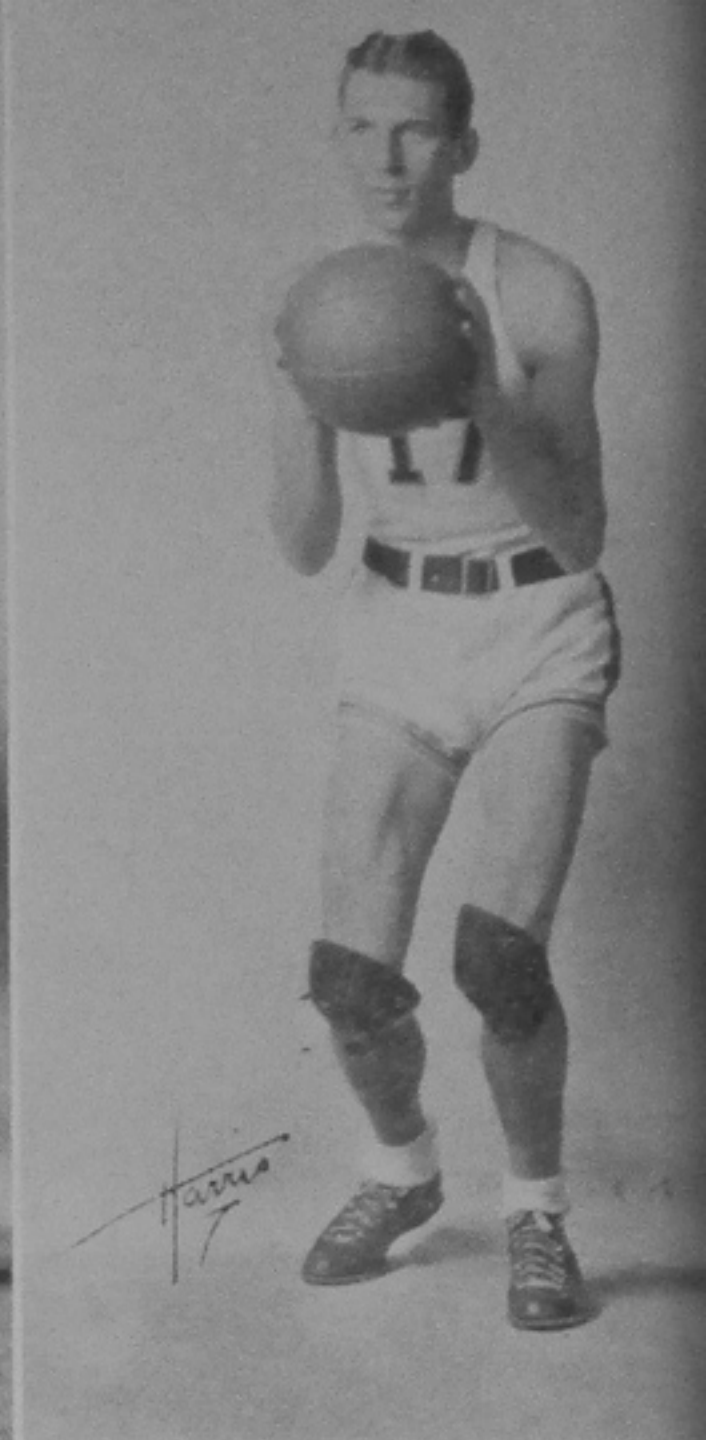

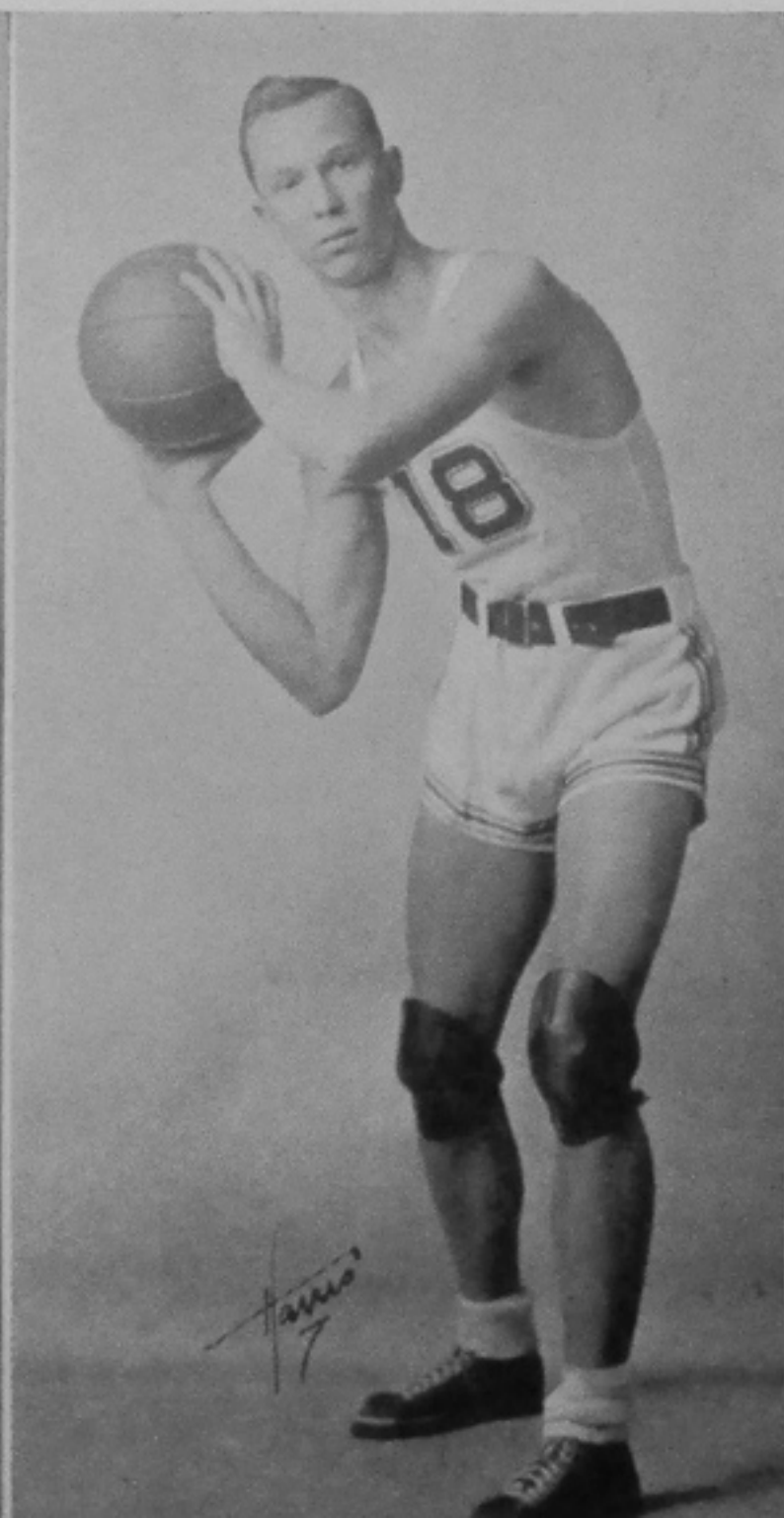
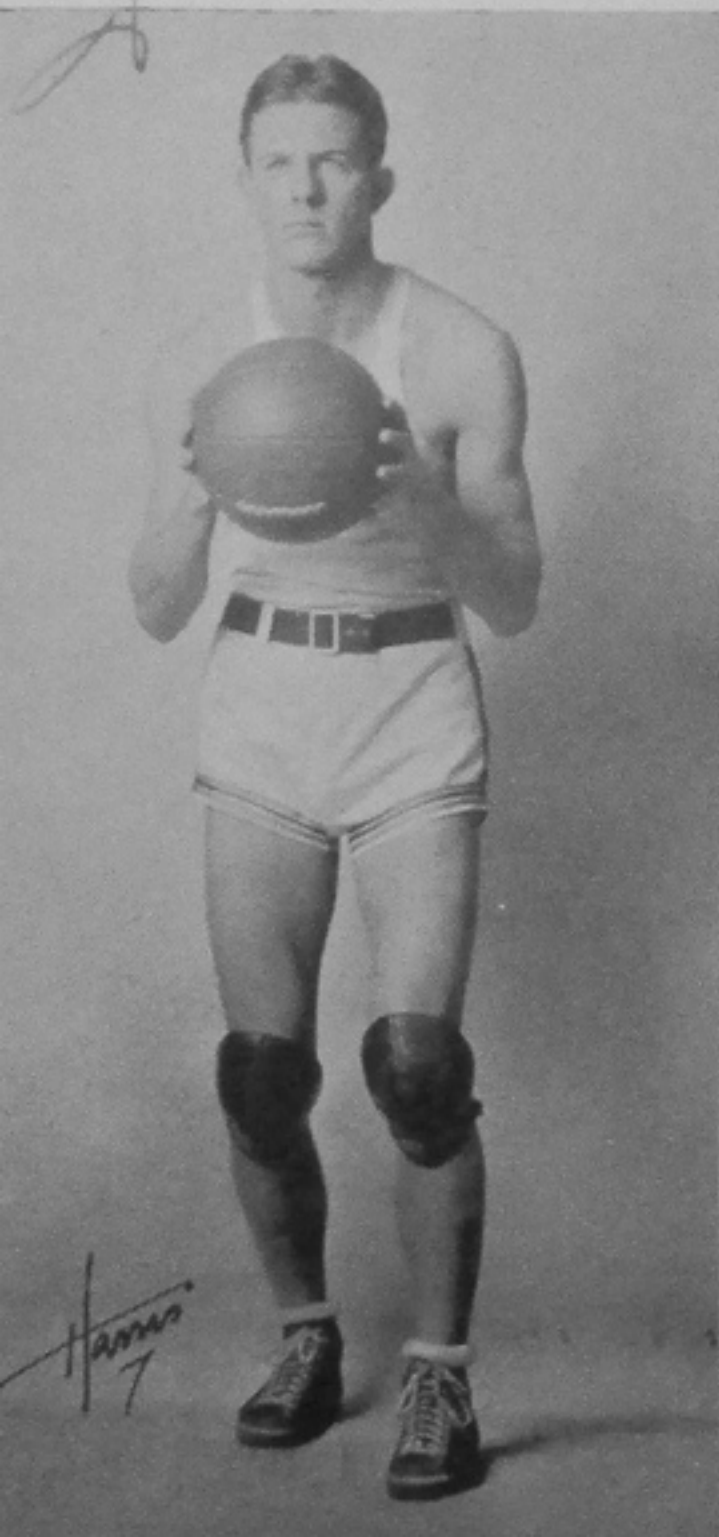
## CAGE STARS

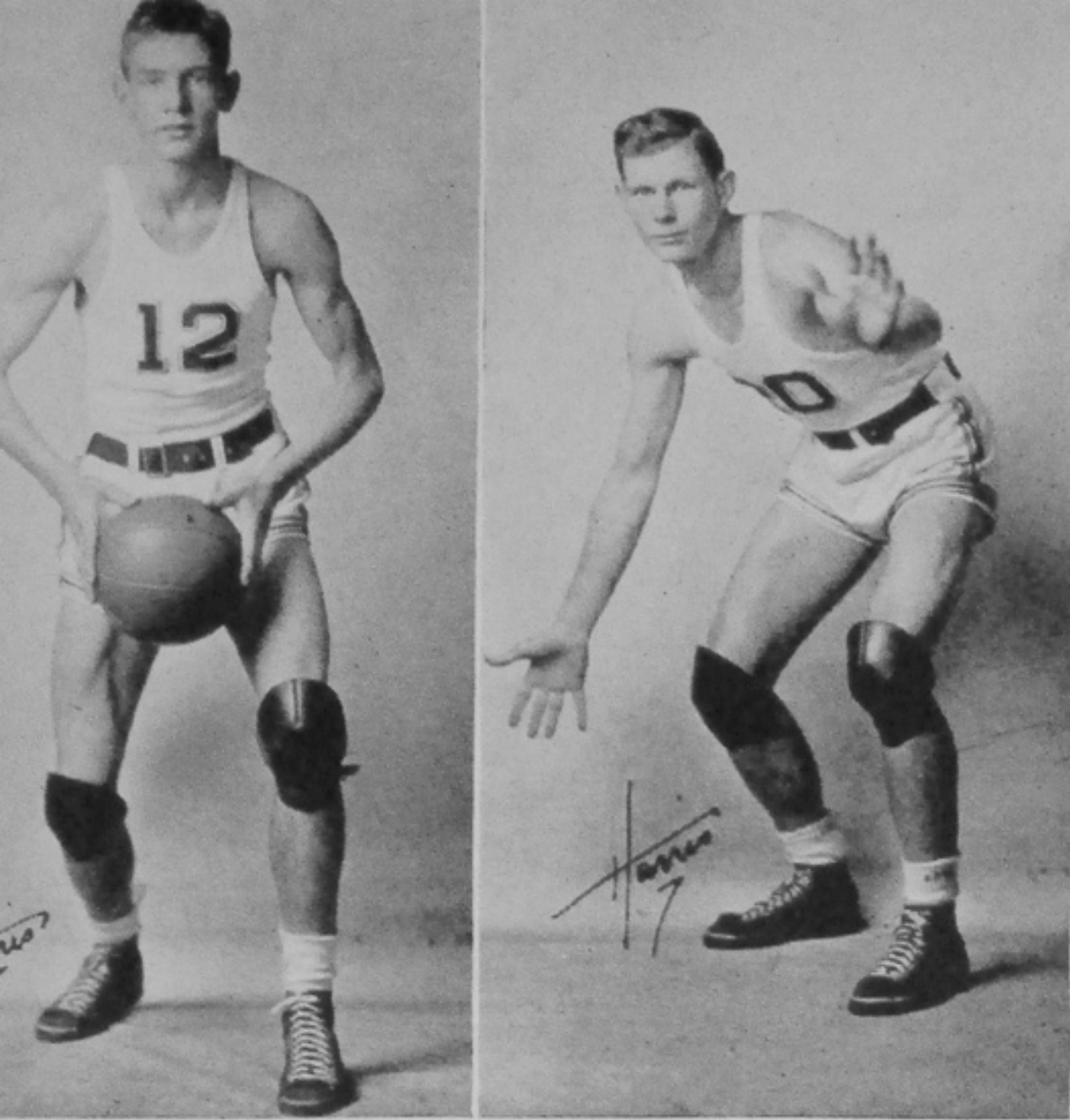

The Trojan Juniors season resulted in winning 14 games and losing 8. They made 473 points to their opponents' 384.

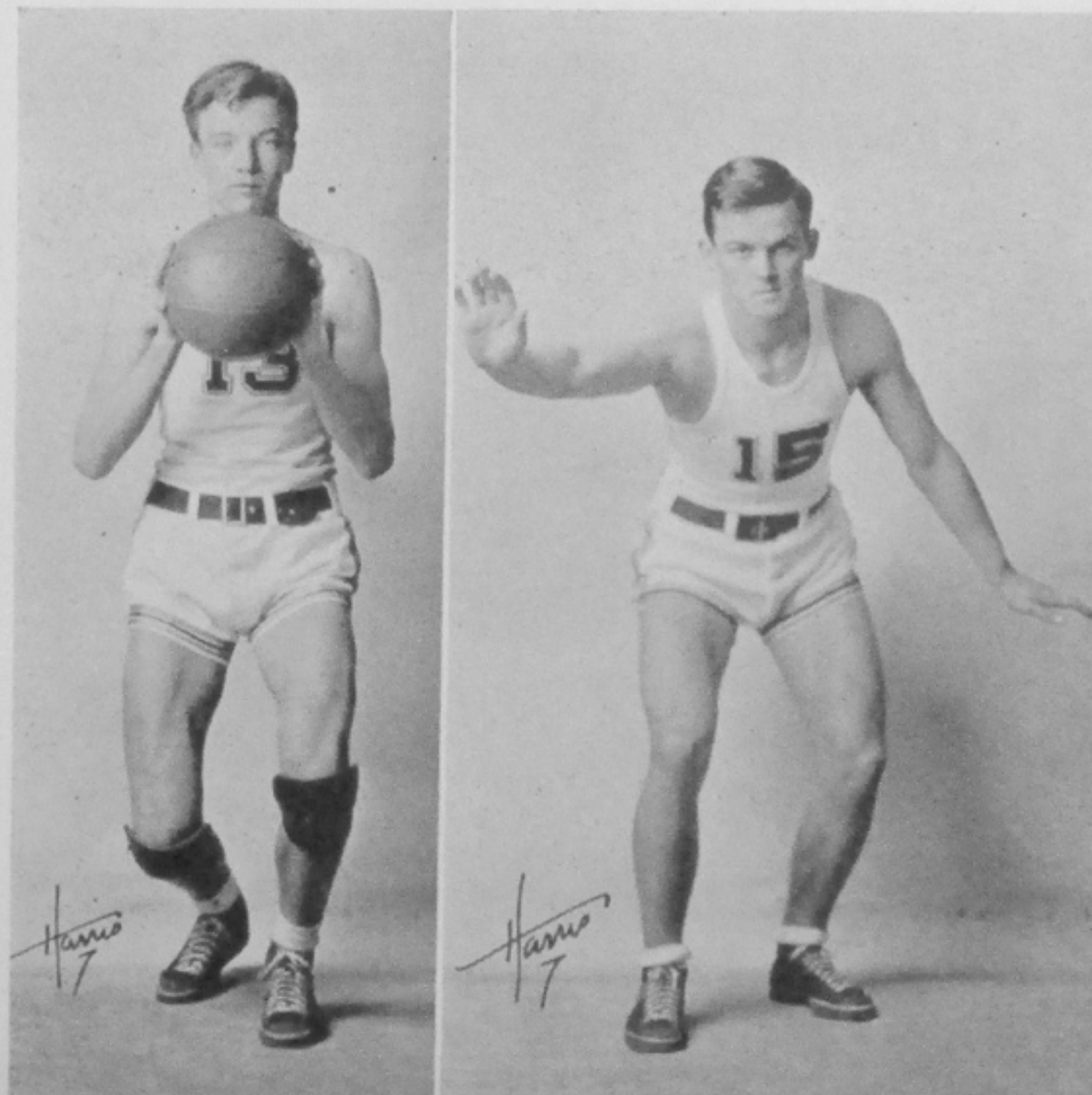
The Tots' percentage was lower. They won 5 out of 14; while the Babes won 6 and dropped 6.

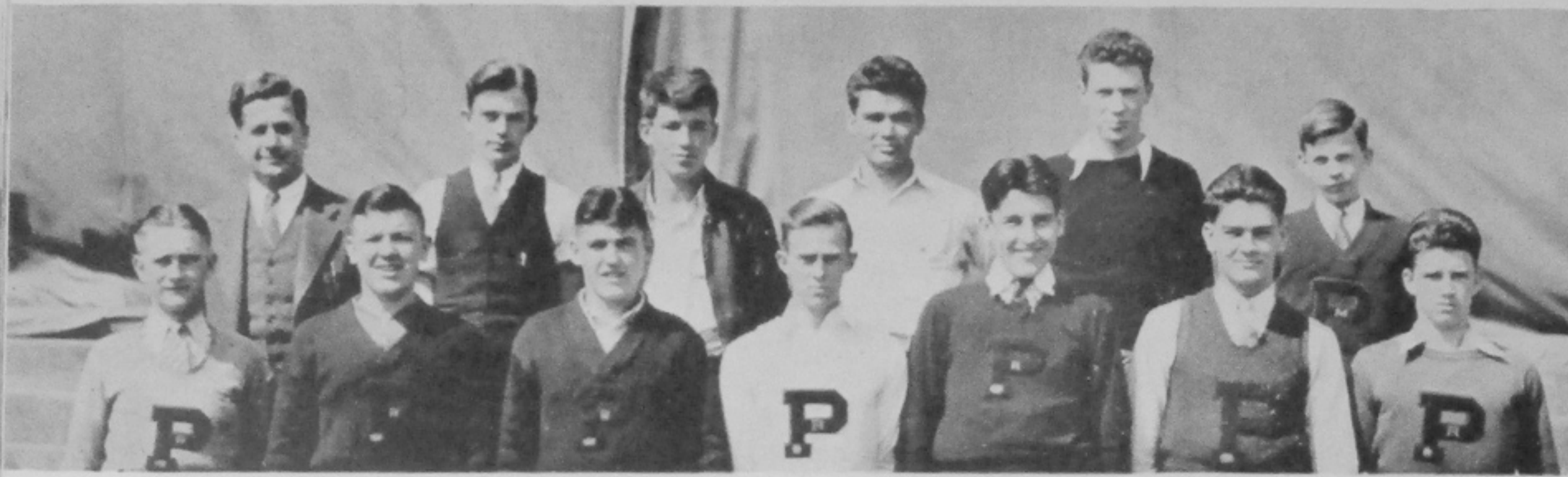

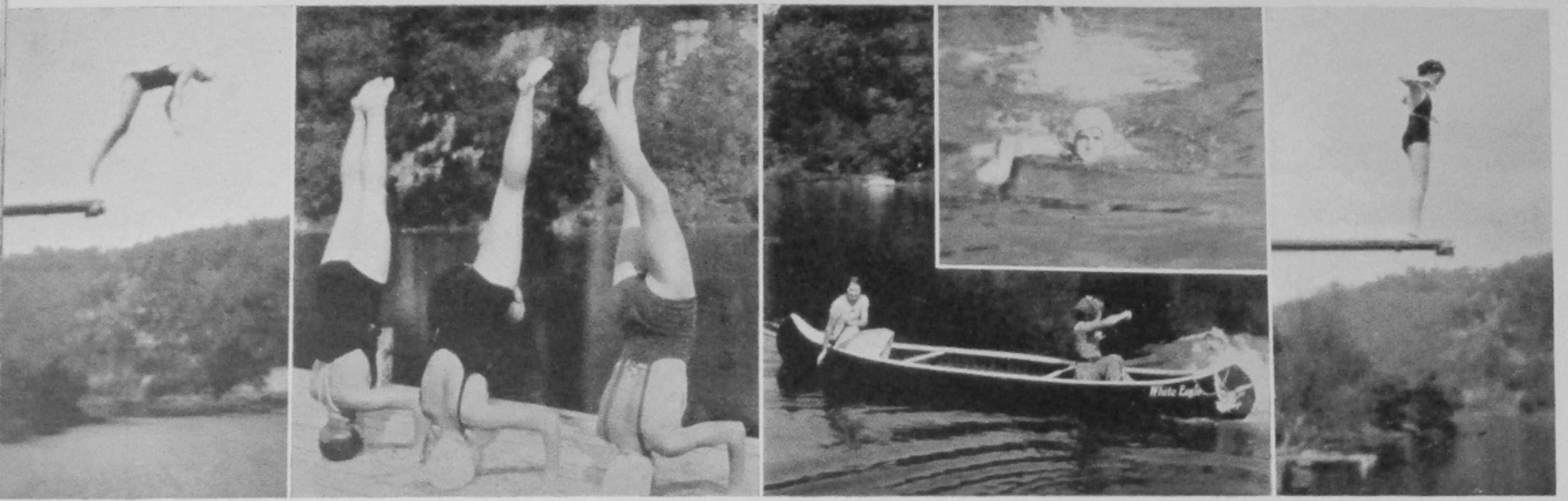

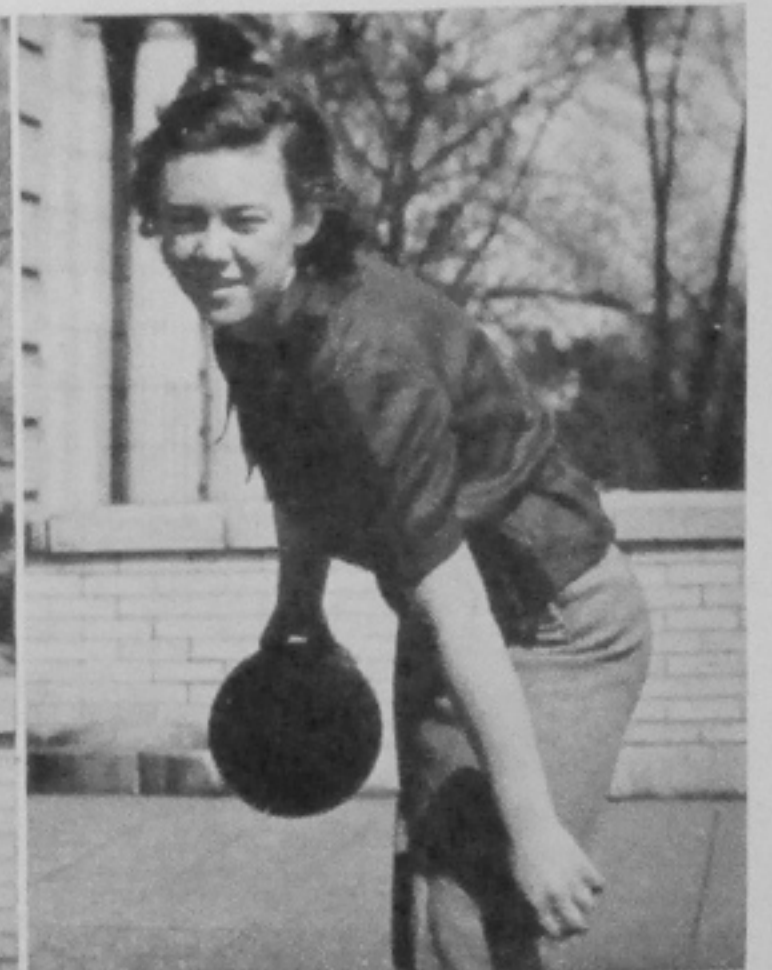

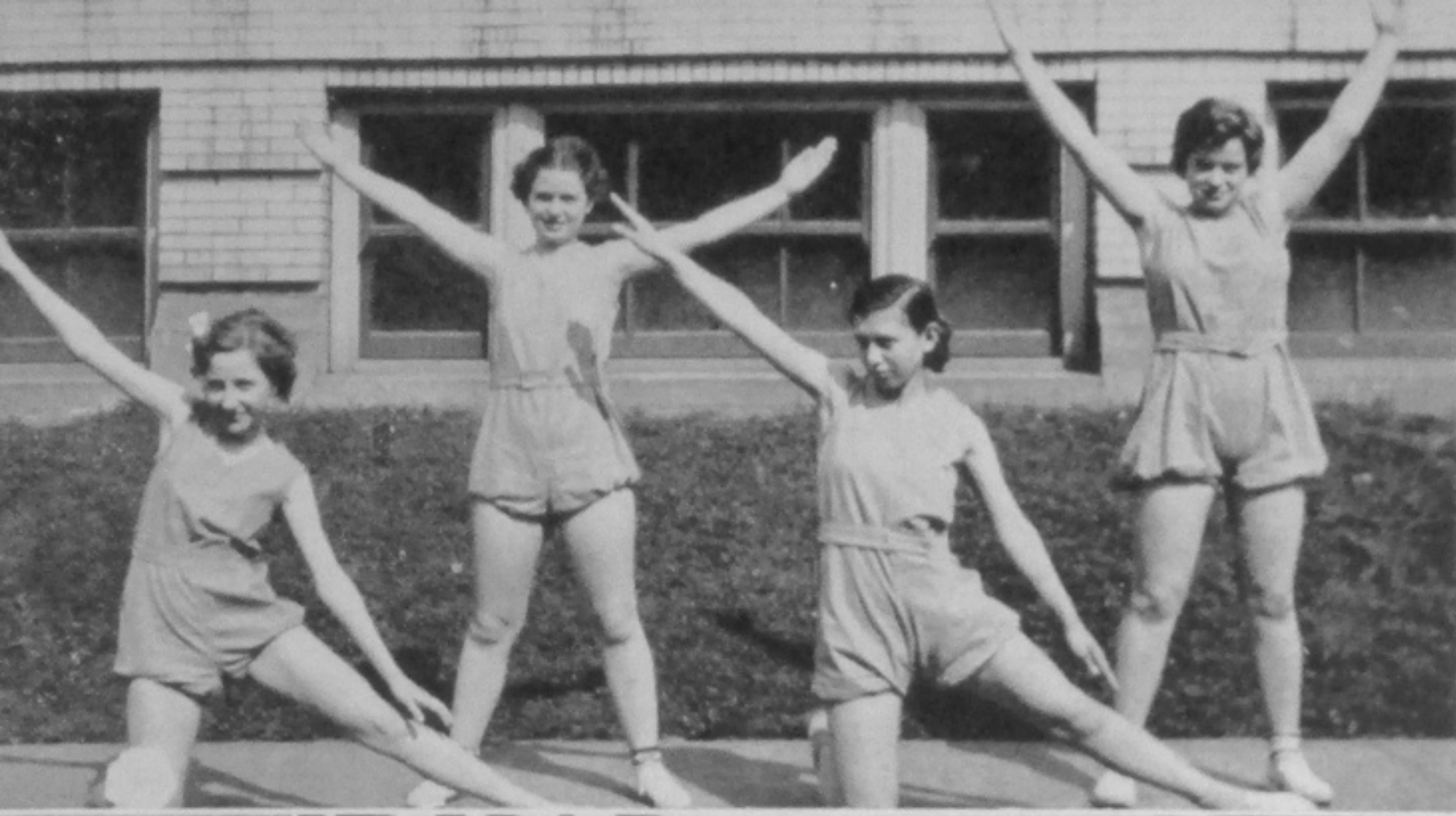
