

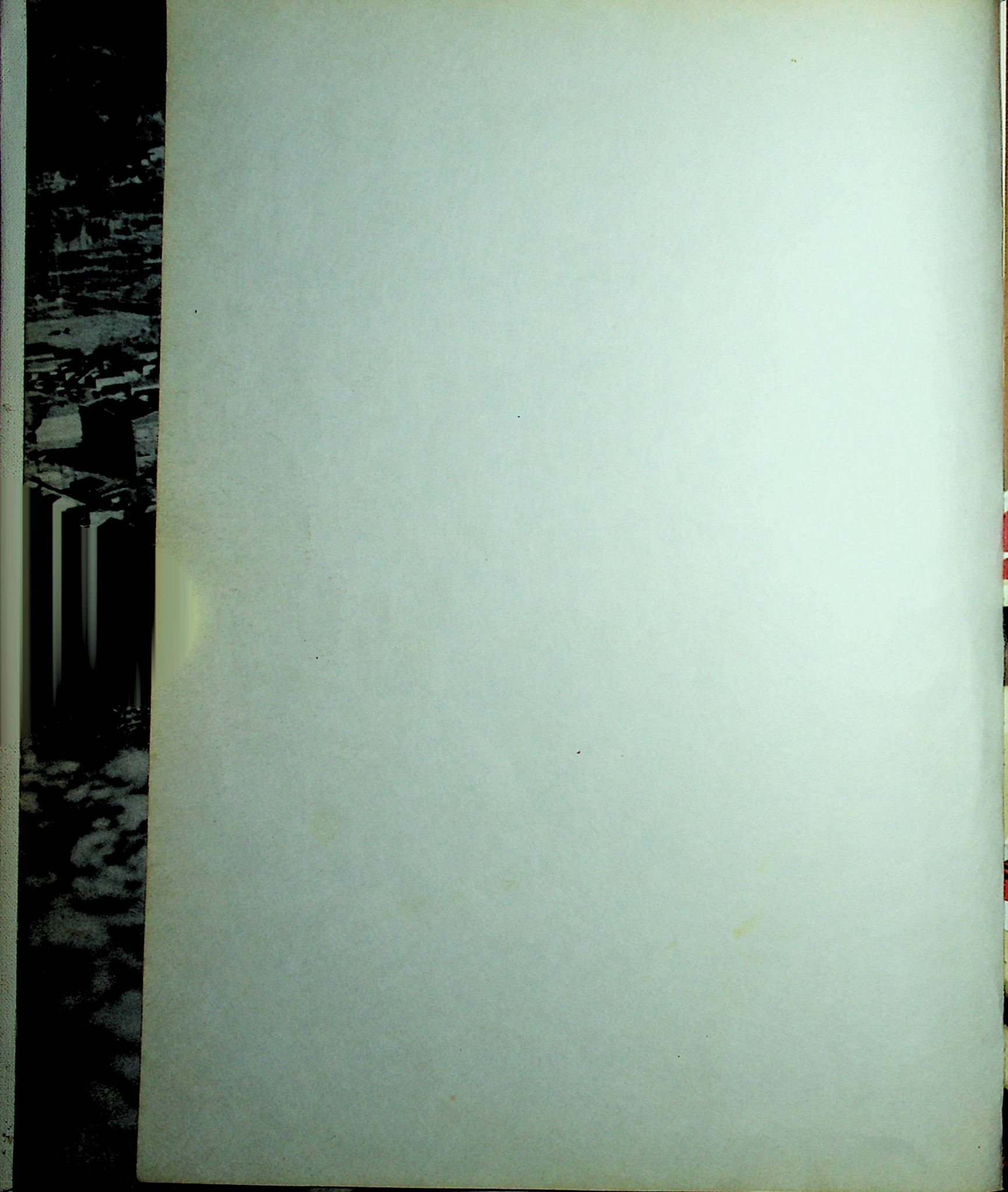

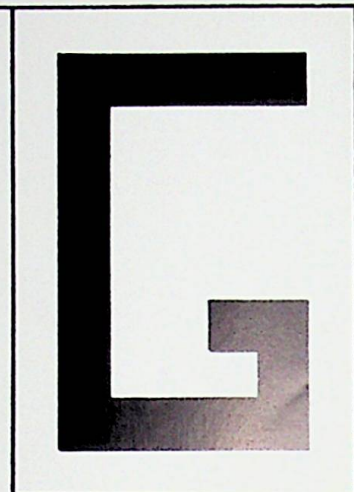

I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation to the staff of the 1957 Tiger Silhouette for the privilege of enclosing a few remarks in this splendid issue. Orchids to each student, parent, and faculty member who played a part in its success.

Health Nurse - MRS. HELEN LEWIS

Helen Lewis Day — February 26 1957

It is said of you, Helen, wherever your name is spoken, that you are the woman who likes to "help" people. Now, all of us like to THINK we are willing to help others (if it does not cost us too much money or time or trouble, that is), but there are great souls who are willing to give freely of both money and time to help their neighbors. You belong to this superior fraternity.

However, it is of your particular kind of helpfulness we wish to speak today. Yours is the helpfulness of the specialized, of the highly educated and trained skill which you bring to those who suffer physical pain; to those who stand in need of physical assistance. The help which you bestow can only be given by a person who has disciplined herself through rigid training until she has the right to the place you attained; the right to the coveted title of registered nurse; the right to enlist in easing human suffering.

You always wanted to do this. When you were in high school, you said you would be a nurse - a surgical nurse. Not just a smiling girl in a spotless uniform giving a cool drink to a patient comfortable in his white bed - but a nurse in the operating room. You wanted to be present at the high drama of the surgical table when surgeons work in frantic haste and fight for human lives, helpless before their judgment and skill. There, where a good nurse is a doctor's right arm, for she must think with him, and even ahead of him to anticipate his wishes - there in the operating room where only the best nurses stand.

Because you really WISHED all this - and did not merely SAY you did, you put yourself through gruelling training and were graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1936. During those years of training, you considered the idea of becoming a missionary nurse - of going to practice your profession on an Indian reservation or in other faraway places.

But fate brought you, instead, to Portsmouth and to the Shirrman Hospital. There for six years, you practiced your

high calling. There for six years you were a surgical nurse. There, also, you taught obstetrical nursing to other young would-be "Florence Nightingales." To them you carefully and conscientiously gave the training you, yourself, had worked hard to attain. In Shirrman Hospital you worked with Drs. Gault, Shirrman, Schaeffer, and others - doctors who are the backbone of our very excellent medical system. And there, you were their right arm.

On July 15, 1942 you made another change. You came to New Boston as our city health nurse. Here another field opened up for you along with your nursing - the field of social service. For your work has been with all sorts of us and in all sorts of situations.

Here you learned to know every school child - for you weighed them, you tested their eyes, you gave them their shots. You knew not only their bodies, but their background. You knew the families of New Boston and their needs. Because physical ills and social problems so often overlap one another and one is dependent upon the other and you were so busy with both, it was often hard to tell whether you were health nurse or social service worker. And you combined the two most successfully and with zest and grace - because you dedicated your life to helping people.

You have become a part of us too, Helen. And this day - your day - Helen Lewis Day - does not in any way say that we are returning anything to you for your years of being among us. We cannot do that. We can, however, tell each other on this day, how we appreciate you, how fortunate we have been and still are to be served by you. And if you overhear us, while we are saying these things, we feel you will not be unhappy because this, too, is in the line of your duty.

Mrs. Lewis passed away on June 7, 1957
