

August - 1890.

A mid day.
It was very
warm. Rained
a shower early in
the afternoon
and a hard one
in the evening.
Squire & I hauled
in hay till noon.
He went over in
the afternoon and
helped Jos. Ball
thresh. came over
and got my loads
of hay before the
train. We got ready
for town Pa was
intending on going
to town but when
time came but
Pa was not well.

August 2.

A very warm day. Mattie & I drove all night. Got in town about 4 o'clock. We had a time selling our chickens.

We sold 84 dozens of chickens.

We sold the rest of them to a butcher man.

Got ready and started for home. We got back a little after dark.

August 3

A very warm day. I have been sleeping about all day. Smith went over to Mr. Correll. I have been awful lonesome. If I had not slept the most of the time I would have been terribly lonesome.

Aunt Flora and Edna Hattie is here to day.

They came here before we got breakfast over. I was at home all day. They but it is lunch

August 4.

A nice forenoon
It rained a little
all the afternoon
We hauled in
all the hay we
had raked.

George S. came
up in the evening
to let us know
about the thrasher
He immediately
prepared for
the coming of the
next day.

August 5:

A bad looking
day to thresh
It rained about
all the fore-
noon.

We quitted around
11:30 after dinner
The thrasher
came and threshed
out against
the wind
with us.

We had 102 of wheat
and 69 of oats.

I rode Popkin
down to the
mill after the
mail. Got
terrible disappointment

Aug. 6.

A fine day.
I sowed a
whole this morn-
ing then worked
at the turnip ground.
After dinner Mr
hauled in hay,
finished a
stack and started
another one.

Aug. 7.

A cool night
I sowed a lot
of turnip seed
this morning.
Got down in
time for the
rain that set
in about 10 o'clock.
It has rained
about all the
time since it
commenced.
Mr boys have
been trying to
put the drags
we have after
a couple of hours

A big fog this

Pa finished
mowing.

Abie hauled out
weed and briars
till noon.

After dinner we
hauled in
hay.

Abie went to
the office.

I wrote a note
to Miss Hattie

Aug. 9.
Another rainy day.

to the summer
kidd not get
back till after
dark.
