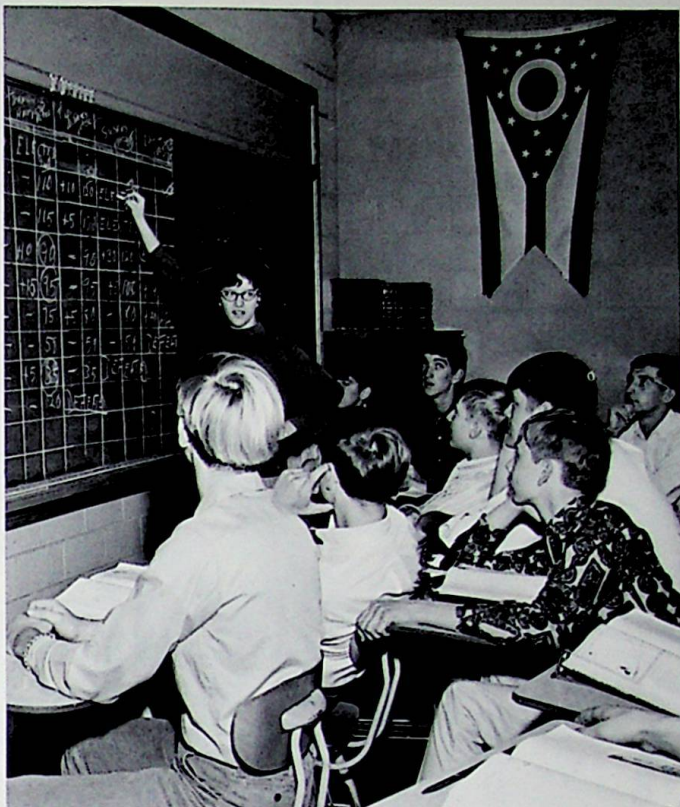
Social studies include courses in world geography, world and American history, and American government. These courses help students learn about the governments, geography, and culture of different countries around the world. Students also study famous people and events through history.

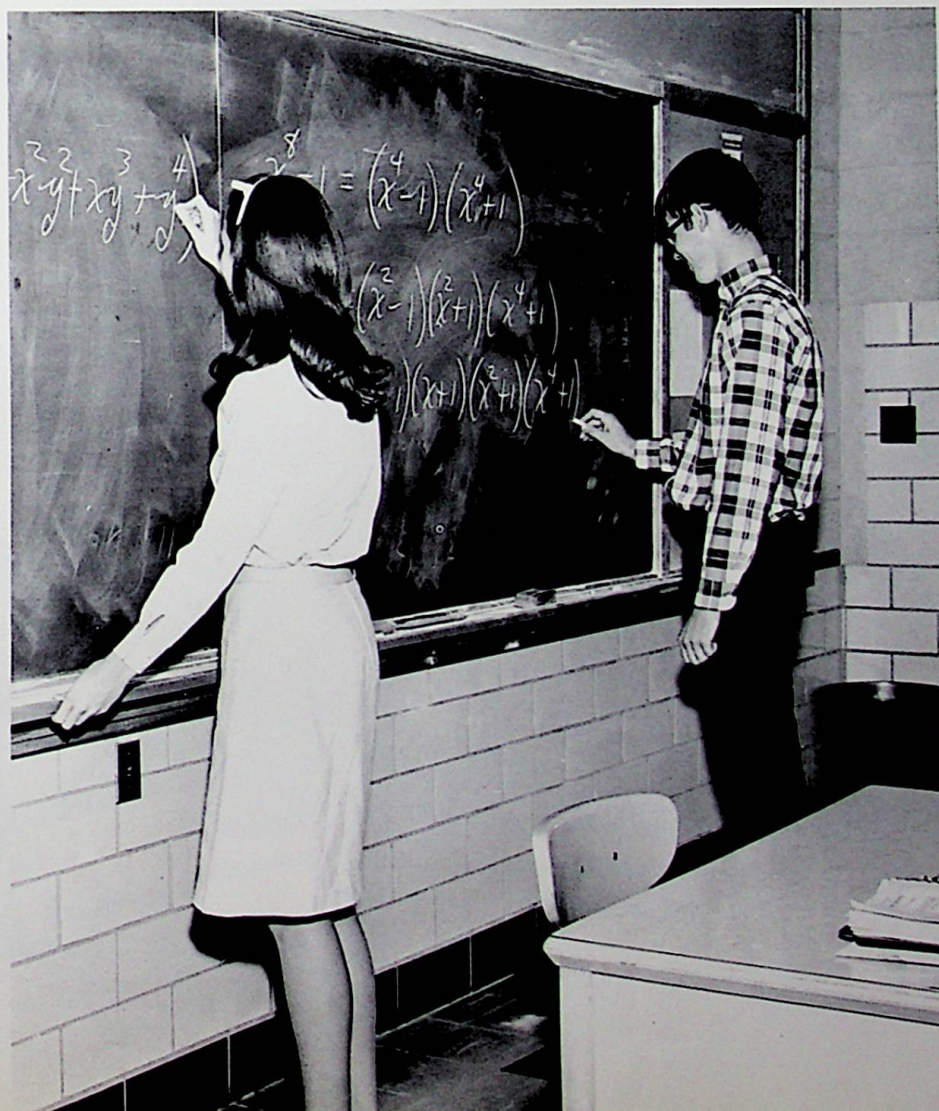

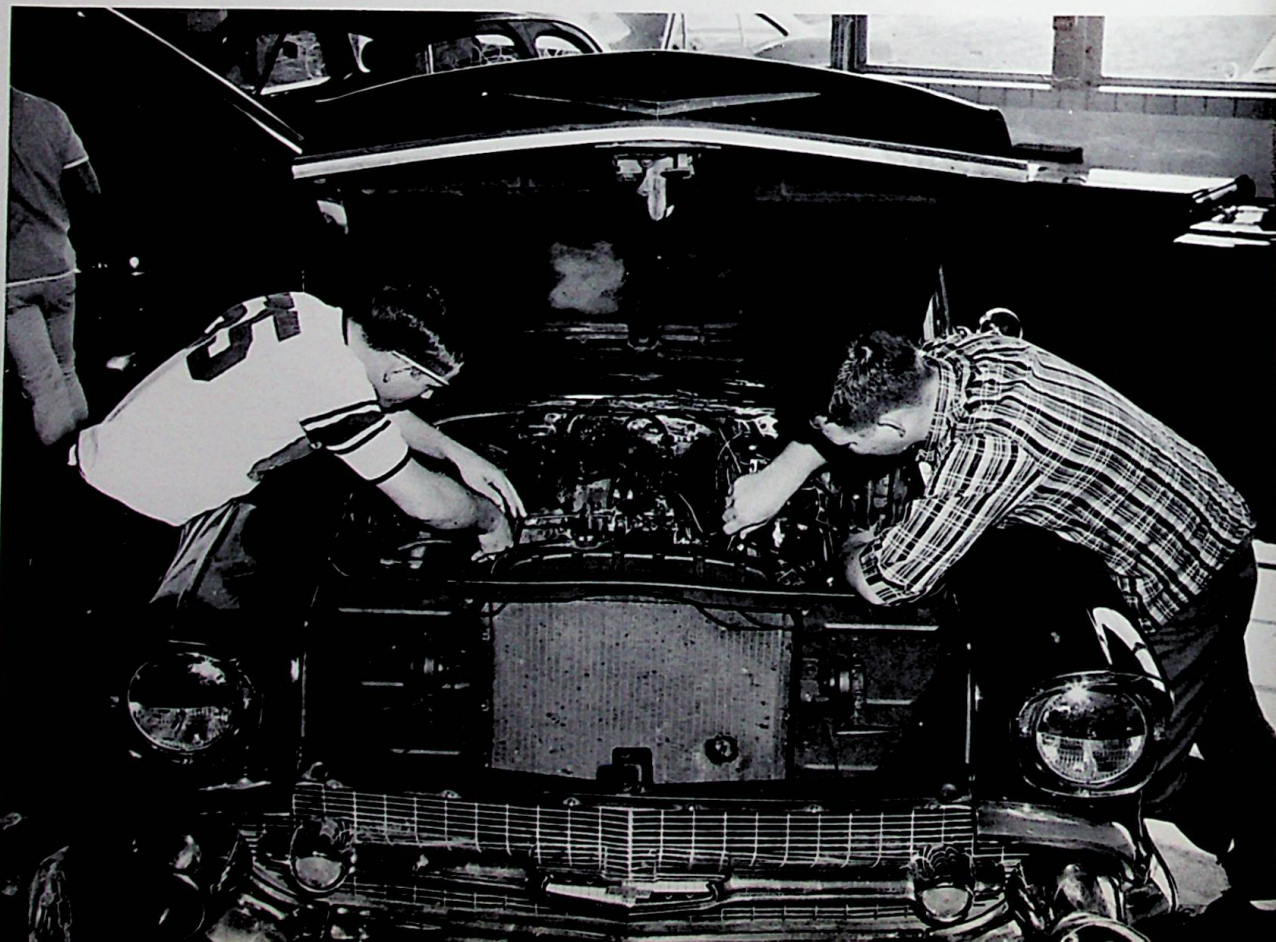

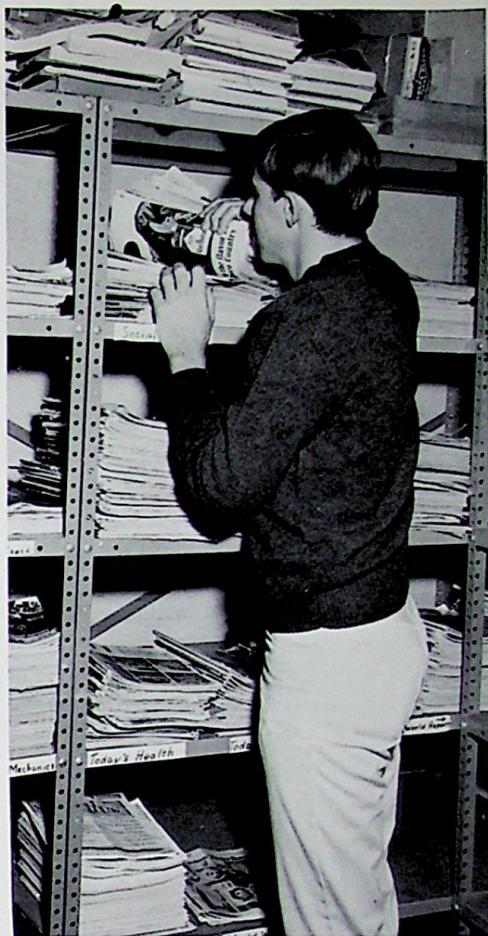

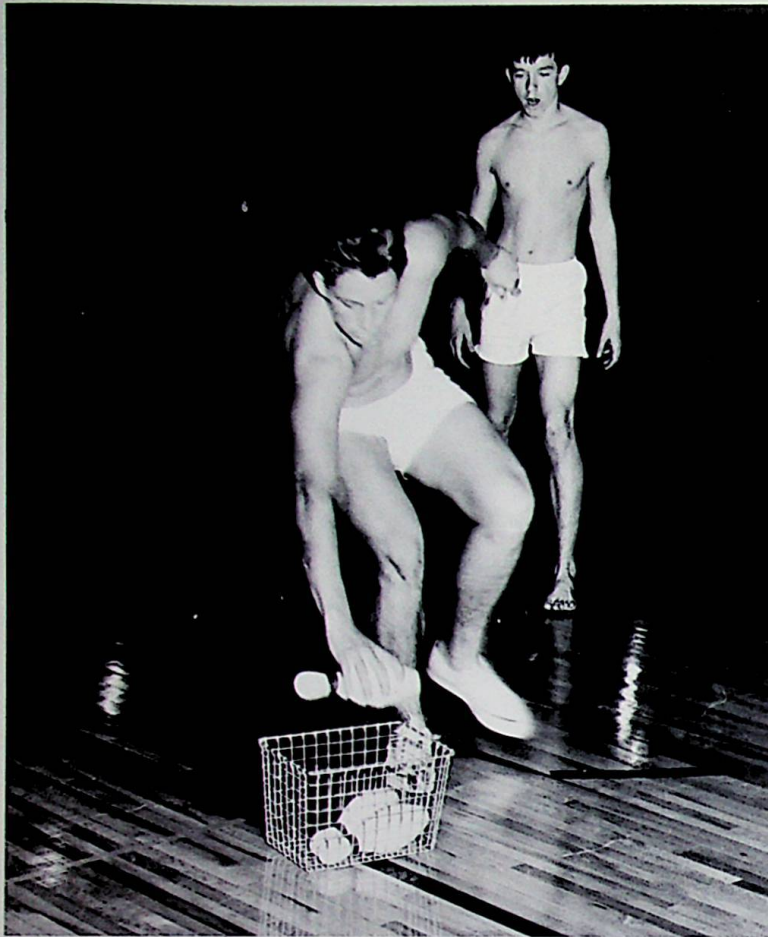

Besides learning how to blend their voices and sing well together, chorus members learn how to read choral arrangements of familiar songs.



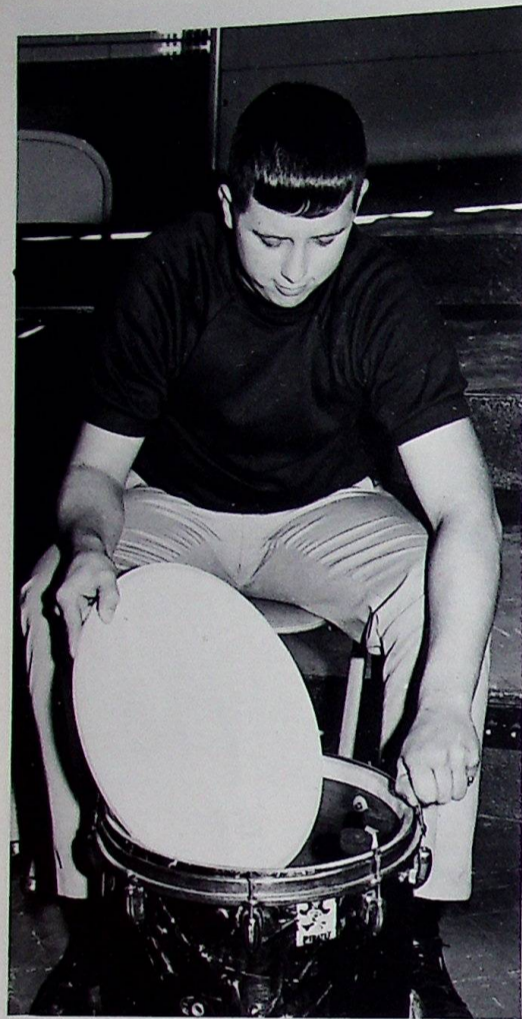

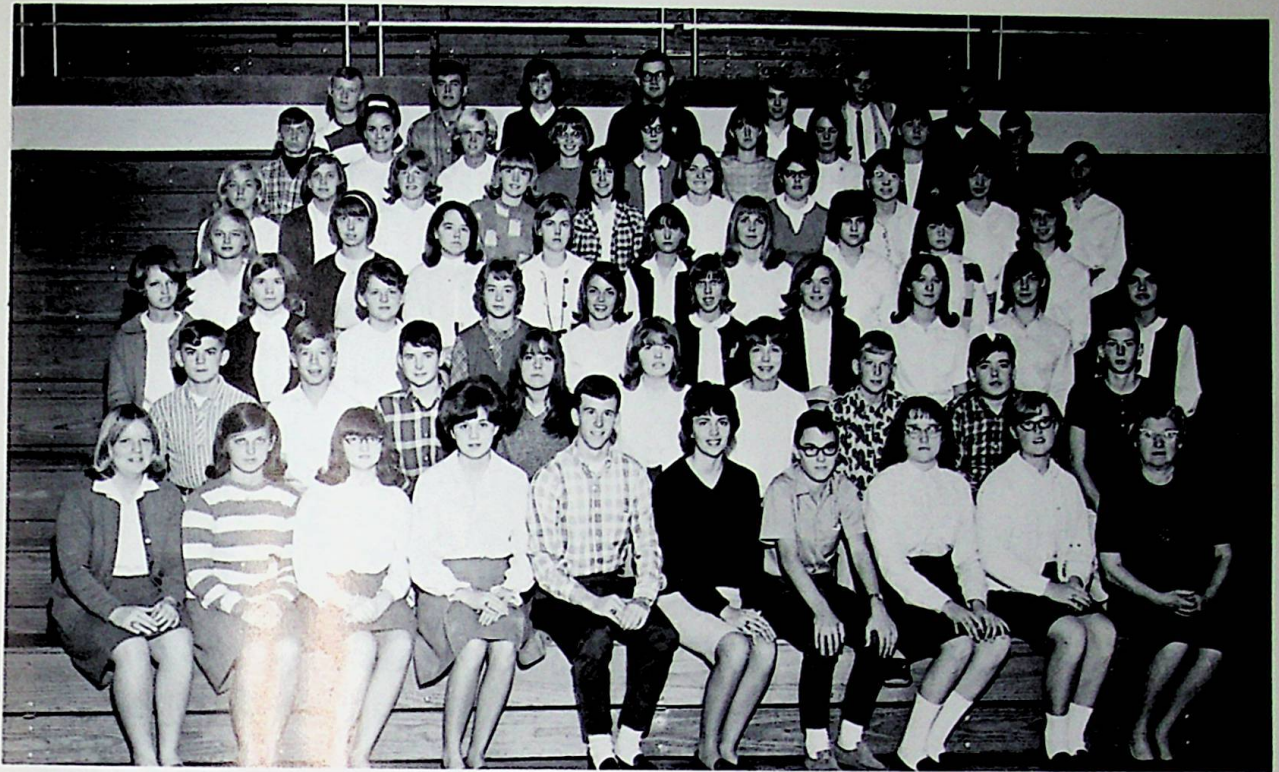

The Language Club was organized to aid the Latin and French students in their study of the languages.

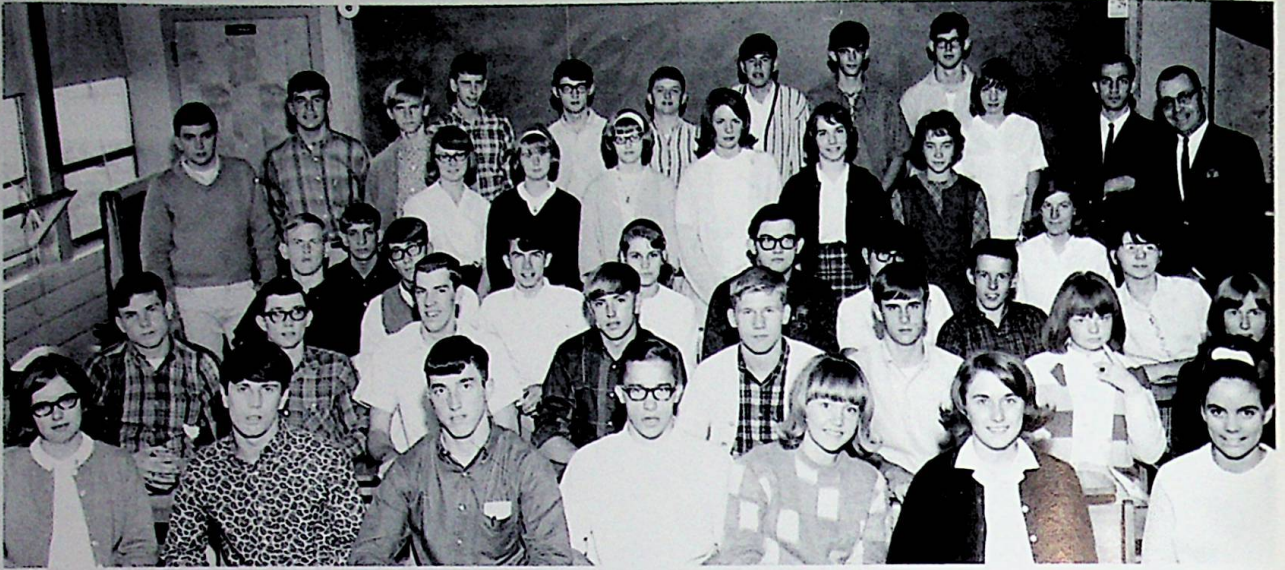
Through a variety of programs, which are concerned not only with the cultures of the French and Roman people, but also of other countries, the student is able to further his knowledge of all people.

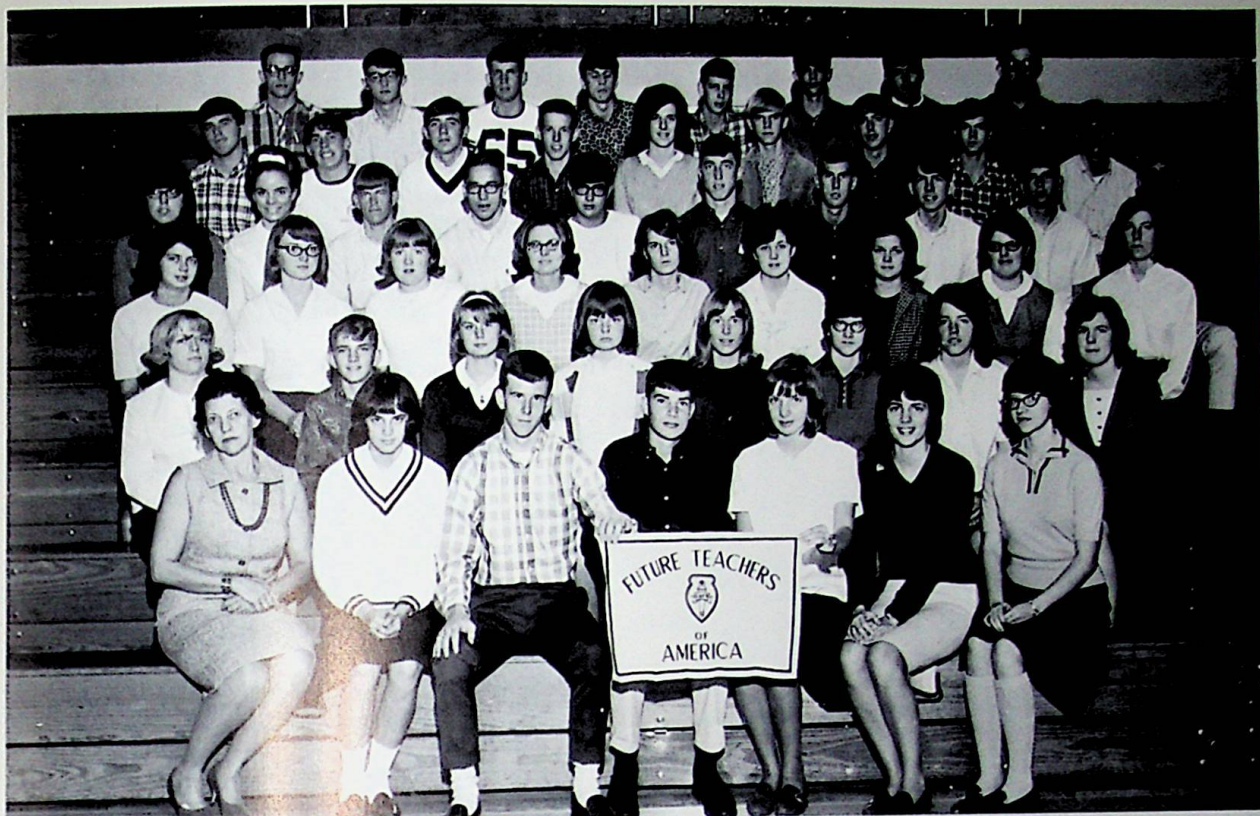

FTA inspires interest in teaching

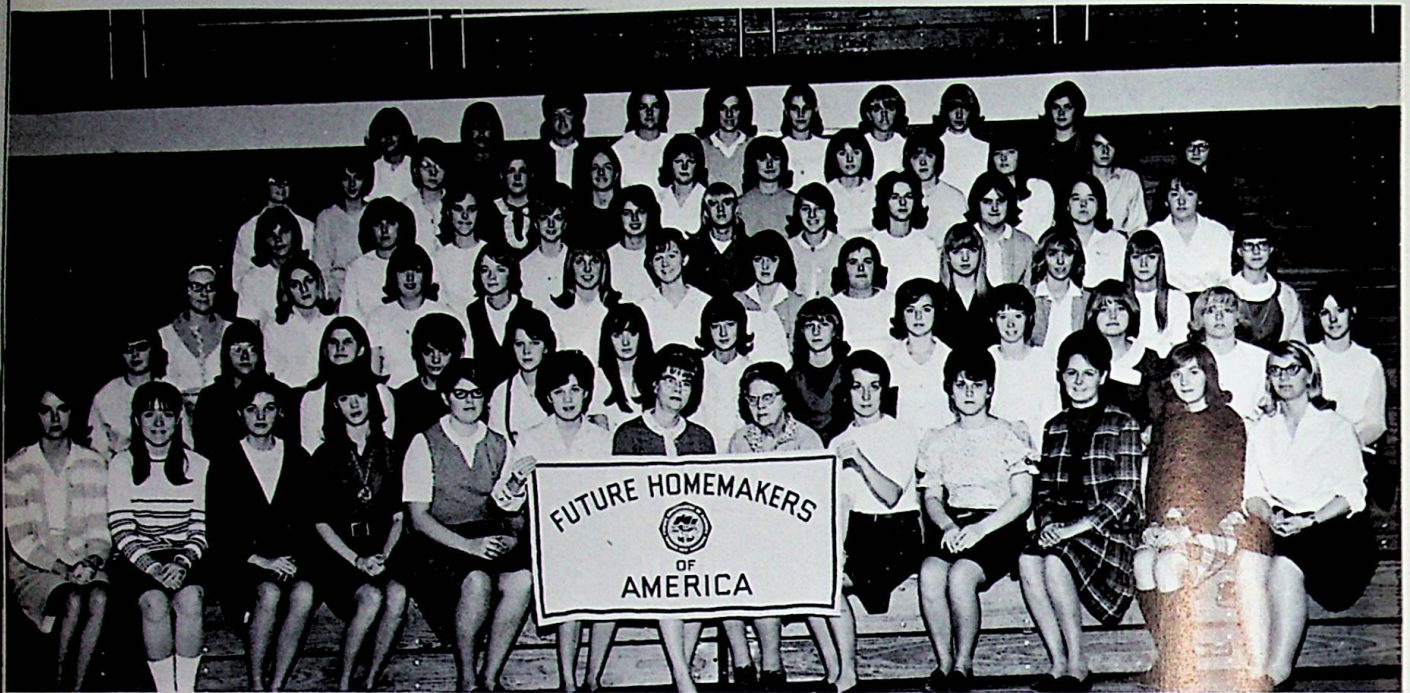

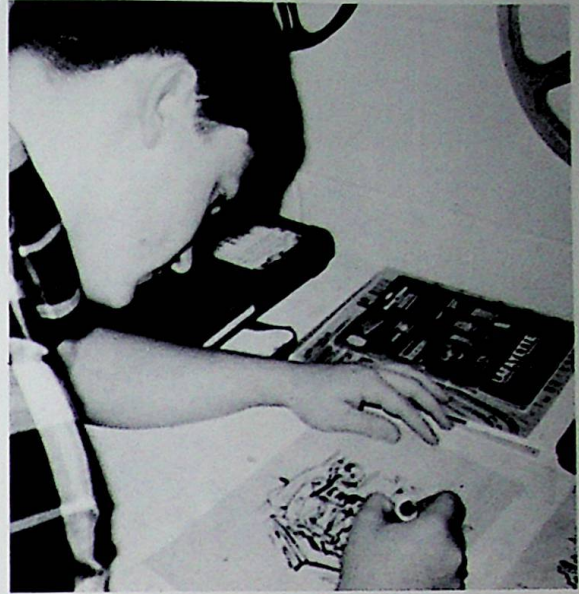

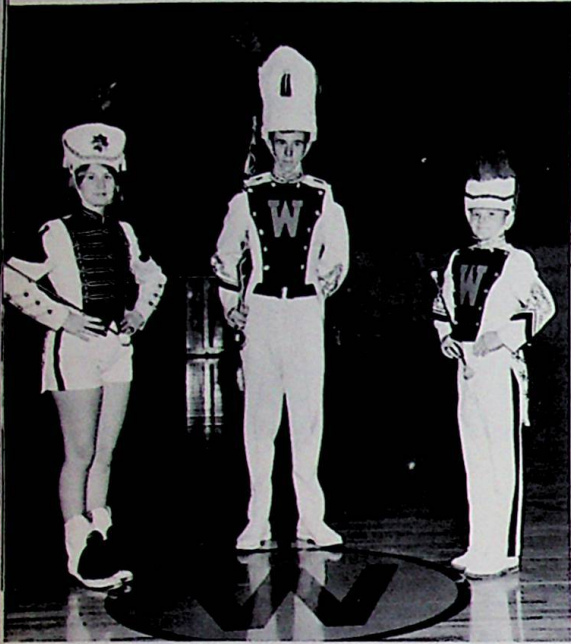

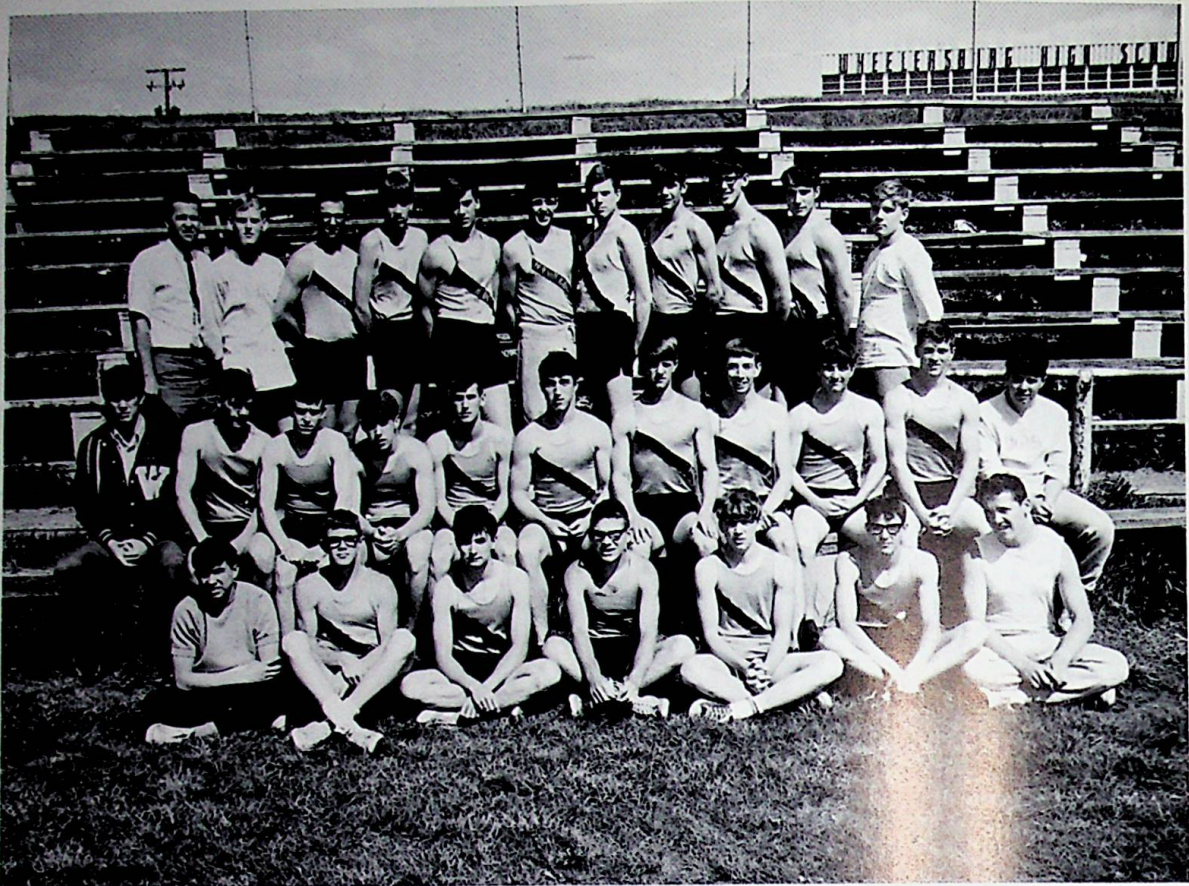
