Examining some archery equipment are Miss Mary Krausz and Miss Freda






## SENIOR CLASS

Intering high school in September, 1939, the class of '43 quickly and easily adapted themselves to a new environment and soon elected officers. The president chosen was Howard Baughman. Scoring various successes in minor attainments, in May the "frosh" reached the peak in entertainment with the annual skating party.

The next year this ever-ready group, now seasoned sophomores, displayed the same enthusiasm for their work. Early in the semester Glenn Russell was elected president. With the class officers to guide them, the committees sponsored a very original sophomore dance.

As upper classmen, these juniors instituted uniform class rings. An election showed Edgar McCall to be official leader of the group. Miss Mary Krausz was chosen sponsor. A senior dance was held; the class play, "Eyes of Tlaloc", played to two large crowds; and committees for graduation were chosen. The prom was given for the departing seniors; caps and gowns were fitted; and then came baccalaureate services. After the long awaited commencement, the seniors looked forward to new fields to conquer.

After seeing their 13 point lead wiped out, the "never-say-die' Trojans pushed over a touchdown in the final minute of play to give a story-book finish that left 3,000 fans limp with excitement. Two long Flamer-to-Monk passes set up Boling's plunge in the second quarter for the first score. Boling again scored after Flamer's open field running and Wales' plunging carried the ball to Akron's one. Monk converted the extra point. Akron then marked up two quick touchdowns and both extra points to go ahead 14-13. Undaunted, Wales passed 23 yds. to Flamer, and on two plays Boling fought his way for 40 yds. to the nth inch line. With seconds left Flamer dove through the air for the winning goal. Whew!

Playing most of the time in East territory, the Trojans could only push over one touchdown, an extra point, and get a safety while East smashed five unsuccessful goalward marches. In the second quarter after End Howard Coburn pounced on an East fumble on the Columbus 36, drives by Barber and Flamer placed the ball on the three. James Jones, substitute back, went over to score and Monk placekicked the extra point. In the third quarter East held another drive deep in their territory and risked some running plays. McKnight of East was smothered by Monk in his end zone for the two point safety. The East team only entered Trojan territory three times and had a net yard gain of 11 yds. from running plays, against 250 for the Trojans.

Outshining the victors by gaining 199 yds. from scrimmage to 152 for the Teddies, our boys lost their first game by a narrow one-point margin. The Trojans controlled the game except for two little jaunts by Claude Henley, Dayton's fullback, the first - 58 yds., the second - 52 yds. His first run on the first play after the kickoff was anteceded by Miller's place kick that meant victory. Then the Trojans buckled down and Danny Wales went over for a few big inches after Monk dived to catch a 45 yd. pass from Flamer. In the third quarter nine straight line plays netted 39 yds. with Wales covering the last 6 in. Monk and Flamer missed the two tries for an extra point. Midway in the final quarter Henley snatched the game out of the fire by his second sprint. 13 just wasn't in the books for the Trojans.

Making eight first downs to the Wildcats' seven, the Trojans scored the hard way while Springfield made just one touchdown in which a penalty was not the all-important factor. Without lifting a finger, the Wildcats were on our 20 yd. Iine by process of penalties. After blocking Flamer's kick, Springfield failed to score; but a penalty helped them and the second score came — 12-0. Boling returned the ball to the 40; a temporary penalty took us back to the 15; and we went back to stay on the 2. Recovering a fumble by Wales, Springfield marched 17 yds. to make the score 26-0 in the third quarter. Jones, Barber, and Flamer carried the ball 52 yds. with the latter scoring and converting the extra point in the same quarter for our only drive.

Sporting a new offensive that found Flamer on the bench injured, the Trojans took the odd game of the three game series with the Highlanders. Defensively our line stood like Stalingrad from end to end. In the second quarter Jones, Boling, and Wales lugged the pigskin for 62 yds. with Boling scoring on the old Statue of Liberty play. Monk's kick was good. With one minute in the half, Boling eased down the sidelines 40 yds. for the second score. At the outset of the third quarter, Jones was trapped after going after a bad pass for a safety and two points for East. Wales picked up 25 yds. and the Trojans pounded forth til Boling plunged through for the third touchdown. Monk converted from placement. The final score was made after Monk had recovered his second fumble. Wales, Reeg, and Boling went the 26 yds. with Reeg scoring. Monk's kick was again good.



Whitewashed and not able to muster an offensive, the red and blue faded in the third quarter as the Middles pushed over two quick touchdowns. The first half, mostly defensive on the part of the Trojans, had two beautiful goal line stands by Portsmouth. The third quarter found the first touchdown made after a 70 yd. sustained drive by Middletown. Soon after a 35 yd. pass brought the last score of the game. The Trojans never advanced any further than Middletown's 20 yd. stripe. This loss gave the Middles a one game advantage in the eleven game series.

Statistics again gave the edge to the Trojans — 10 first downs to 3 for Mansfield; but this awayfrom-home jinx worked overtime. To start the game two pass-play mixups of the Trojans gave two interceptions to the Tigers, and led to as many touchdowns. After Burton partially blocked a punt on the Mansheld 7, it was recovered on the 3, and Wales sneaked over to score. Monk booted the extra point. The third quarter opened with the Tigers recovering a Traian fumble on our 21 yd. line. They promptly broke through and scored. Two minutes later Mansheld took the ball on the Portsmouth 15 after a short kick against the wind. Some "razzle-dazzle" netted the last touchdown from this position. Bill Lewis, a former Portsmouth boy, kicked all four extra points for Mansfield.

Playing the first double-bill in their history, the Trojans easily defeated a heavier Tartan team in two quarters 16-0. Two runs by Boling for 70 yds. gave Portsmouth its first touchdown after receiving the kick-off. Center Tom Williams blocked two East kicks keeping them from invading Trojan territory even once. In the second quarter a 51 yd. march with Flamer going over netted the last touchdown. Both of Monk's kicks were good. Later, as Henderson of East attempted to kick from deep in his territory, a bad pass went into the end zone and gave a safety to the blue and red. The Tartans were powerless gaining only 24 yds, to the Trojans' 233 yds., but their job was to wear the victors down for the second ensuing half and a fast Central team.

A fresh Titan team, although losing 7-6, gained a moral victory over a tired Trojan eleven in the last two quarters of the twin-bill. In the opening plays speedster Ed Schmidt of Central slipped through tackle and ran 83 yds. for the first score. His pass to Ferrante was long for the extra point. A couple of plays later after the kick-off, Flamer dashed 57 yds, to score, and Monk made his night perfect by kicking the winning goal. The Titans staved off three more Trojan drives and were heaving long passes to threaten to score at the end of the game.

Close to 3000 fans were in the stands as rival bands cut up; the home-coming queen, Alice Duncan and her attendant, Jeanne Newman, were presented; the players' moms and dads were honored; seniors played their hearts out in their last game; and, oh yes, Ironton was beaten! Two breaks for Portsmouth led to the first two touchdowns. After recovering a fumble. Boling slashed over from the five to score. At the end of the quarter Barber scored after Monk recovered another Tiger fumble in the pay-off territory. Unable to score up close (losing the hall on the 1 and 6 yd. lines) the Trojans made good in the third quarter as Reeg, aided by perfect blocking, returned a punt 64 yds. so score. Monk's kick was good to end the scoring. The season thus ended with five victories, three out of town losses, and one home loss. Billy Southworth, manager of the baseball world champion St. Louis Cardinals, spoke at the annual banquet. Don Monk was given honorable mention on the All-Ohio high school team.













### JUNIOR RETAILERS CLUB


he end of the second year finds the Distributive Education Course an integral part of our curriculum. The seniors in this course combine their work in the local retail stores with technical classroom work so that they are well fitted for their chosen profession—selling.

This year over 80% of the students were employed 35 hours per week in their store work, for which they received one full credit. The other two credits of the course they earned in the classroom. The fourth credit of the regular student's schedule was an elective unit. Besides receiving school credit for their supervised store work, they will have earned an average of almost \$400 apiece for their year's work. Many from the first year's class are now department heads or assistants. By graduation time every one in this year's class will be on a full-time selling job.

Juniors may enroll now in Principles of Retailing as a one-semester subject in order to gain necessary background information useful to them in the co-op work in their senior year. The students in this course form the Junior Retailers' Club which functions the same as all other clubs in our school.




