Class History

Vaughn Williams ranked fourth in the state in the Prince Peace finals at Columbus. Many of us took our first venture away from home to visit Washington D. C.

To hear the word Junior mentioned made us feel slightly "high hat;" we were definitely among the upperclassmen, with Mr. Roy Pfleger and Mr. Emil Haney at the advisor helm. We were even more elated with the arrival of our class rings. Dennis Rider assumed the Presidency; Maxine Conklin, Vice Presidency; James Bowen, Secretariet; and Robert Bowen, the post of Treasurer. "Spring Fever" started our Thespians on the road to success. Dramatis personae included the following; Robert Bowen, Eugene Garner, Vaughn Williams, Joy Swords, Betty Minzelli, Francis Ward, Wilma Adams, Lawson Montgomery, Vivian Bonzo, Ruth Lyons, Douglas Veach, and Billy Anderson. Richard Eckhart represented our class on the Scioto County Championship Basketball Team, also second in the District. To climax school activities we visited Mammouth Cave and other places of Historical interest in Central Kentucky. Our Social Activities ended with our first Banquet, Junior-Senior, held in the High School Auditorium.

At last we could be called Seniors. Mr. Haney was our sponsor; the following results were tabulated from our class election; Lawson Montgomery, President; Jerry Helt; Vice President; Rosemary Seidel, Secretary; and Douglas Veach; Treasurer. Our first important achievement of the year was the instigation of a new type of recreation in high school.

"With Effort, It Can Be Done" was chosen as our class motto. Red and White Roses were chosen as the class flower; blue and white, the class colors. The Nation's Capital was selected as the objective for the class trip.

Social season highlighted with the Junior-Senior Banquet in the school auditorium. Our big moment came when we first marched in our robes for the Baccalaureate May 15. At last we turned over tassels and school days (in high school) were over on the night of May 16.


