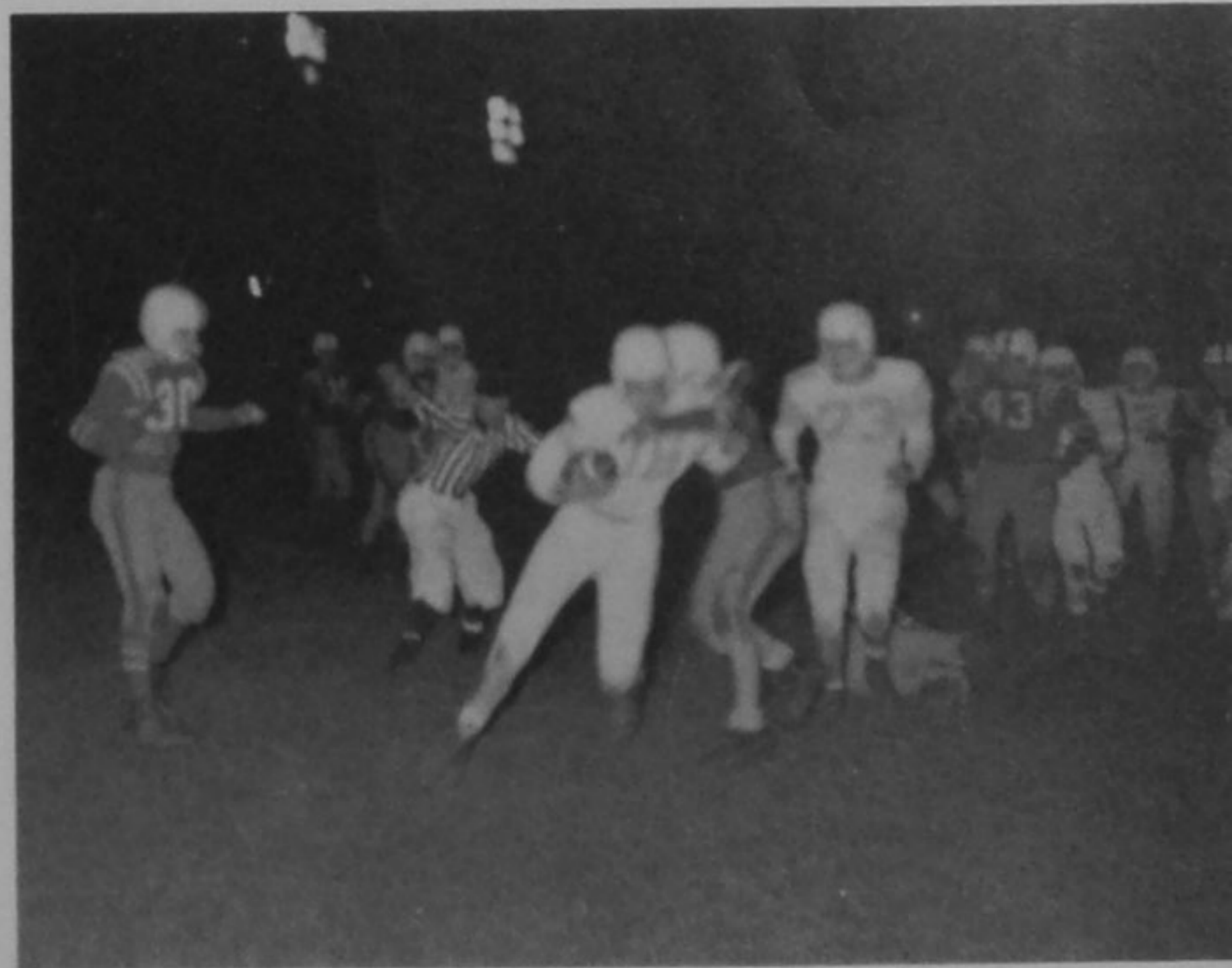


DEDICATION

AN INTERVIEW WITH THE EXECUTIVE HEAD

The following question and answer period was conducted by Falcon reporters Lois Neu and Tommy Brisker during a personal interview with Mr. Duncan about education in today's world.

LOIS: What is the single most important problem facing American schools today?

MR. DUNCAN: Probably the most important problem will be coping with the increased enrollment of 400,000 by 1965. More classrooms will be needed. More teachers will be needed, including elementary, high school, and college.

TOMMY: Are children today learning the basic skills - readin', writin', and 'rithmetic - as well as they did when you were a boy?



MR. DUNCAN: I think the capable students are working and learning the basic skills beyond what they did a few years ago. Everything is more complex and requires more skill and knowledge than a few years ago. Many people today are traveling far from their homes, accompanied by their children. This widening of experience is adding to their general knowledge.

LOIS: Many people say we can make a fast start in life, and earn a good living, without going to college. Why, then, should we go?

MR. DUNCAN: Those who continue their education beyond high school will find employment more to their liking and offering more of a monetary return for their services. In addition to the financial return, you will be better off socially for having gone to college. Your way of life will be broader and more satisfying.

TOMMY: What should be the role in the high school of athletics and other extracurricular activities?

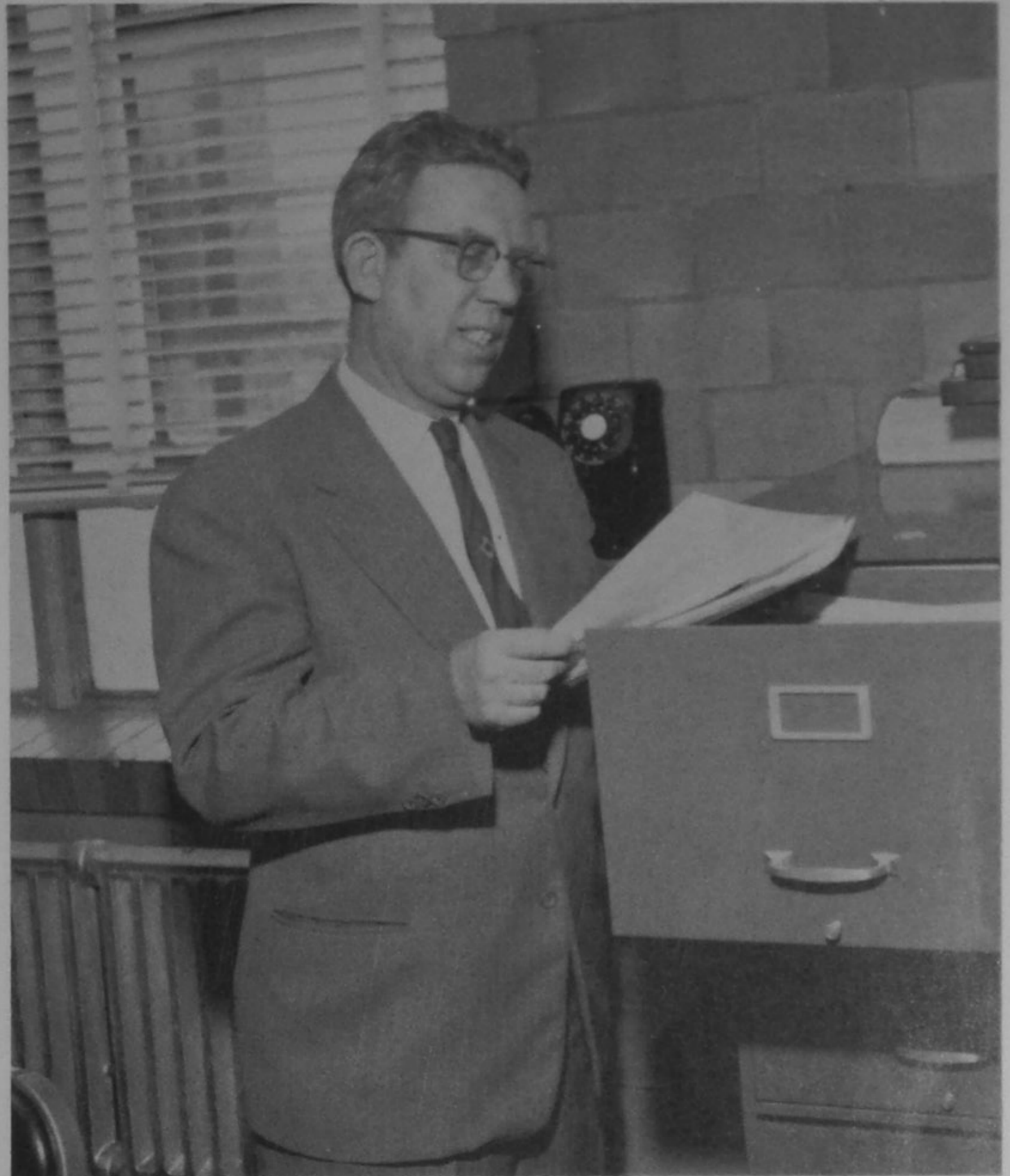
MR. DUNCAN: They have a place in high school. Both keep up the interest of the participant. Neither should be first in school. After all, students come to school to learn - to get an education in the fundamentals. Sometimes it seems that athletics are stressed too much. They have virtues in body building and character training. They also teach getting along with each other.

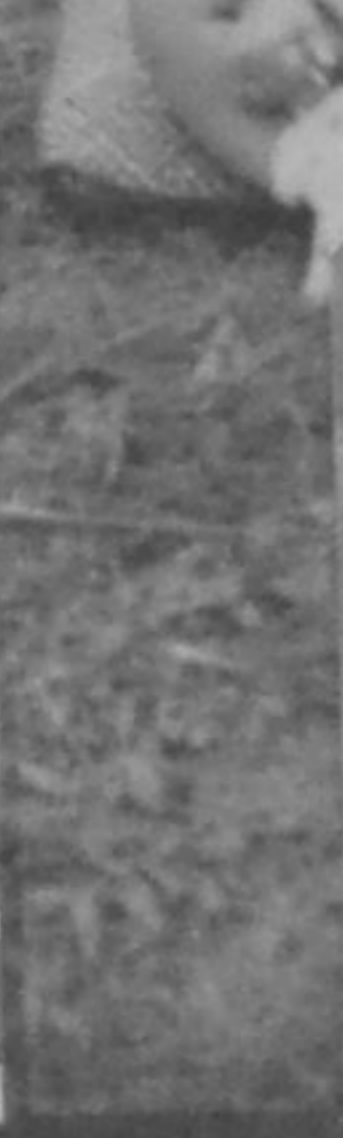


RITA TURNER CHOSEN

A TWELVE-YEAR DERBY



In 1948, 134 tender-foot kids from Madison, Swauger Valley, and Minford, jumped into the saddle to start a twelve-year race. Of that number, 98 of us crossed the finish line. Those first few years were trying - more, probably, for the teachers than for us.

After eight years of grade school we graduated from junior high in 1956. Ours was the first eighth grade graduation in Minford's history. Then we began the second and more exciting part of our race - high school.

Leading us around the far turn in our freshman year were Mr. Lawrence, Mr. Mitchell, Mrs. Fisher, and Mr. Benner. There were 123 green freshmen at roll call. With our gallop into high school came the election of class officers: Ken Murphy, president; Mike Cole, vice president; Sue Johnson, secretary; and Marilyn, treasurer. Tom Brisker, Dave Yeagle, Kay Kitchen, and Rita Montgomery were elected to Student Council posts. Pat McCormick was chosen queen attendant in our first big year. Helped by several boys from our class, the reserve basketball team won 15 games and lost but 5.

In our second year, as we roared down the back stretch of our race, Joe Bennett, Robert Dawson, Marlene Smith, and Kay Kitchen served as officers to 115 sophs. Our sponsors were Mr. Lewis, Mrs. Burton, Mr. Pfleger, and Mr. Scott. Representing the class on Student Council were Tom Brisker, Kitty Stamm, Ken Murphy, Helen Hagerman, and Bruce Hawkins. Sue Johnson was our queen attendant. To boost our teams, Rita Montgomery and Marilyn Smith were chosen as cheerleaders. They kept these posts throughout our high school careers. Howard McGraw was co-captain of the reserve team. Big events that year were the choosing of our class rings and the spring hayride.

As our junior year began, 116 of us were coming around the near side in our race for home. During that year we established a school newspaper. Published exclusively by the juniors, and appearing twice a month, the Junior Falcon was not always perfect; but we had lots of fun editing it. Mr. Wheeler, Miss Williamson, Miss Daily, Mr. Bitler, and Mr. Coburn served as class sponsors, with Sue Johnson, Dave Scott, Harold Kronk, and Pat McCormick as officers. Charles moved away and Lanny Sturgill received the job of treasurer. Bruce Hawkins, Jo Ann Adkins, Dave Scott, and Rita Montgomery were given the responsible jobs of Student Council representatives. Marilyn Smith became our junior queen attendant. Also ten juniors were picked for the Butcher-Coriell chapter of the National Honor Society. Sue Blackburn won the girls' award at the regional science fair in Huntington and went to the national fair in Hartford, Connecticut. Our class play, "Clementine," was a huge success and helped us give the seniors a rousing banquet and prom in May.

The end of our race was in sight in the fall of 1959 as 103 of us started down the homestretch toward graduation. Our trainers were Miss Coriell, Mr. Coburn, and Mr. May. They led us to one of our greatest achievements - the maintaining of 25% of our class on the honor roll throughout the entire year. We believe this percentage represents the highest scholastic achievement of any Minford class. Another big milestone this year was the introduction of football at Minford. Under the tutorship of Coach Sammons the infant squad, helped by three seniors, Dan Vogel song, Tom Martin, and co-captain Estill Holbrook, won four of six games. Rita Montgomery made a beautiful football queen. Her court included Marilyn Smith, Wanda Diller, Carolyn Gulley, and Kitty Stamm. Our class officers were Sue Johnson, serving her second term as president; Robert Dawson, vice president; Pat McCormick, secretary; and Jeanie Pfleger, treasurer. Members of Student Council were Estill Holbrook, Ken Murphy, and Dan Havens, who served as president. Eleven more members of the class were tapped into the National Honor Society. At basketball time, Jim Butler, co-captain, was in the spotlight with Carolyn Gulley, who was elected 1960 homecoming queen. Marilyn Smith was princess. Kay Kitchen Janet Wheeler, Sue Blackburn, Carol Irwin, Charles Strickland, and Jeanie Pfleger, earned senior scholarship honors. Our twelve wonderful years were climaxed with a five day trip to New York and Washington and a one day excursion to Cincinnati to see "Ben-Hur."

On the night of May 25 the largest class in the history of Minford High School entered the winner's circle after crossing the wire successfully. It was exciting, fun, and at times difficult; but we have fond memories that will be ours forever. You can be sure that we will miss band and the trips to the Apple Festival, those rough Buccaneer initiations, the Honor Society outings, and the yearly glee club picnic. But most of all we shall miss each other - knowing those days of fun and frolic are over. We must, however, understand that commencement is the beginning rather than the end. The future lies ahead - a new race - a new challenge. If we are prepared to work, that challenge can be met, that race can be won, and that future can be the glorious fulfillment of our dreams.



DO NOT DESPAIR

Enter the unsophisticated realm of the underclassmen.

We are the true "lost generation," the downtrodden race of the high school world. We lack the enlightenment of our superior - the senior. Although he won't readily admit it, we realize that the senior peers down upon us from his lofty heights with disdain-filled eyes, wondering how to tolerate our semi-barbaric presence in "his" halls and in "his" classrooms.

But for all this we have no hard feelings because we can reasonably perceive the cause of this attitude. While we are cheerily reaching for these heights of glory, the senior finds himself at a pinnacle, a point above which he cannot climb. He can go no further in high school; he will soon find himself compelled to enter the world, not at the top, but at the bottom.

In the meantime we - freshmen, sophomores, and, yes, even juniors - are too carefree or too busy with the trivia of life to be concerned about a future which seems so far away. We continue our gay life of parties, dates, and amateurish romances. We shed tears not because of the threatening world situation, but because we fear losing a sweetheart or being called a "square."

But please don't pity us or envy us. We like to be as we are, and to be so is the inalienable right of youth. Rest assured, dear reader, that we are destined one day to outgrow this station in life, but that neither we nor any other is able to hasten or hinder the process.

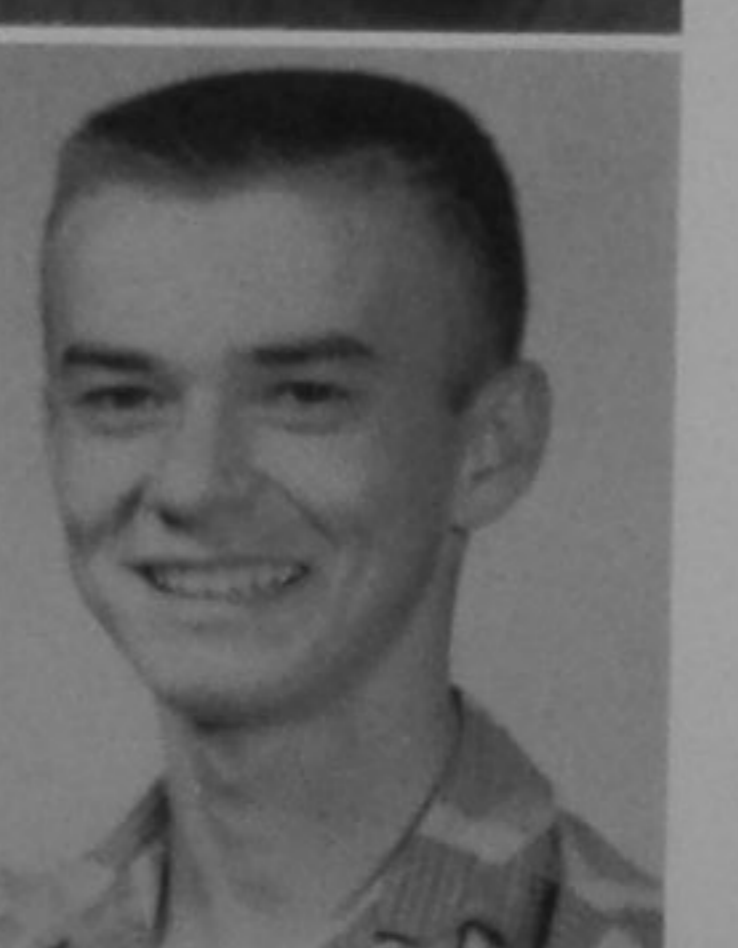

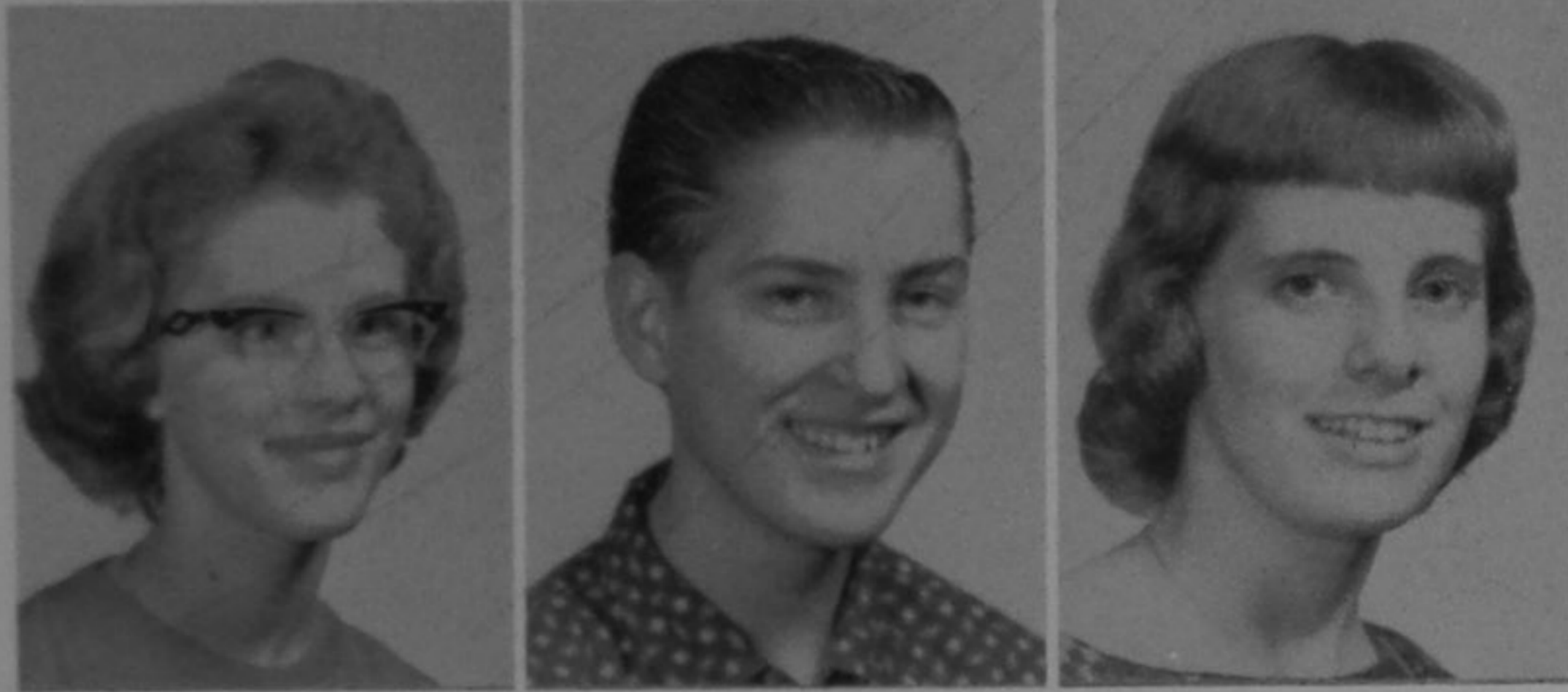

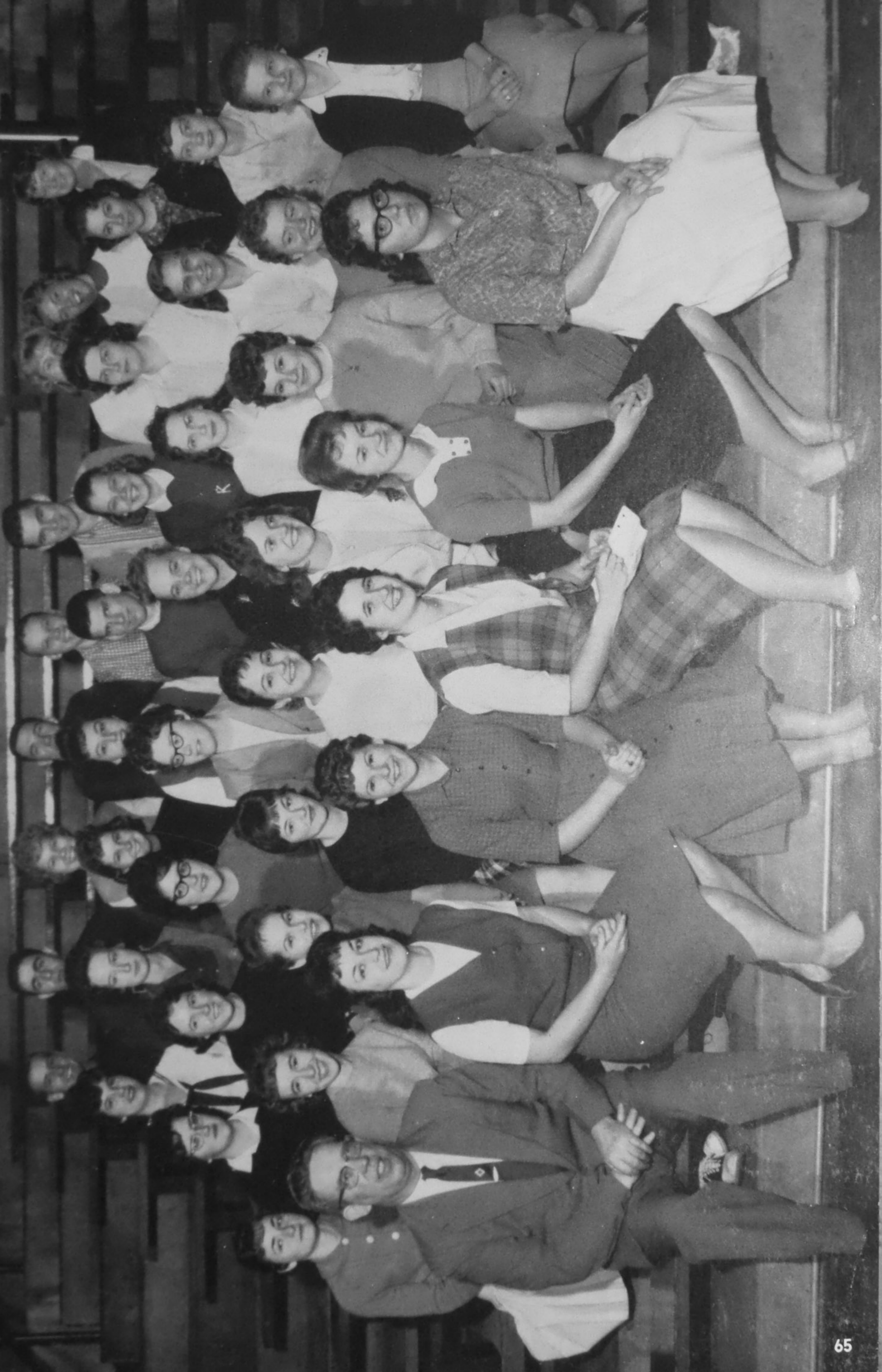
This year rules for student behavior and responsibility, and suggestions for improvement of several elements of the school system, were incorporated in a tentative student handbook.

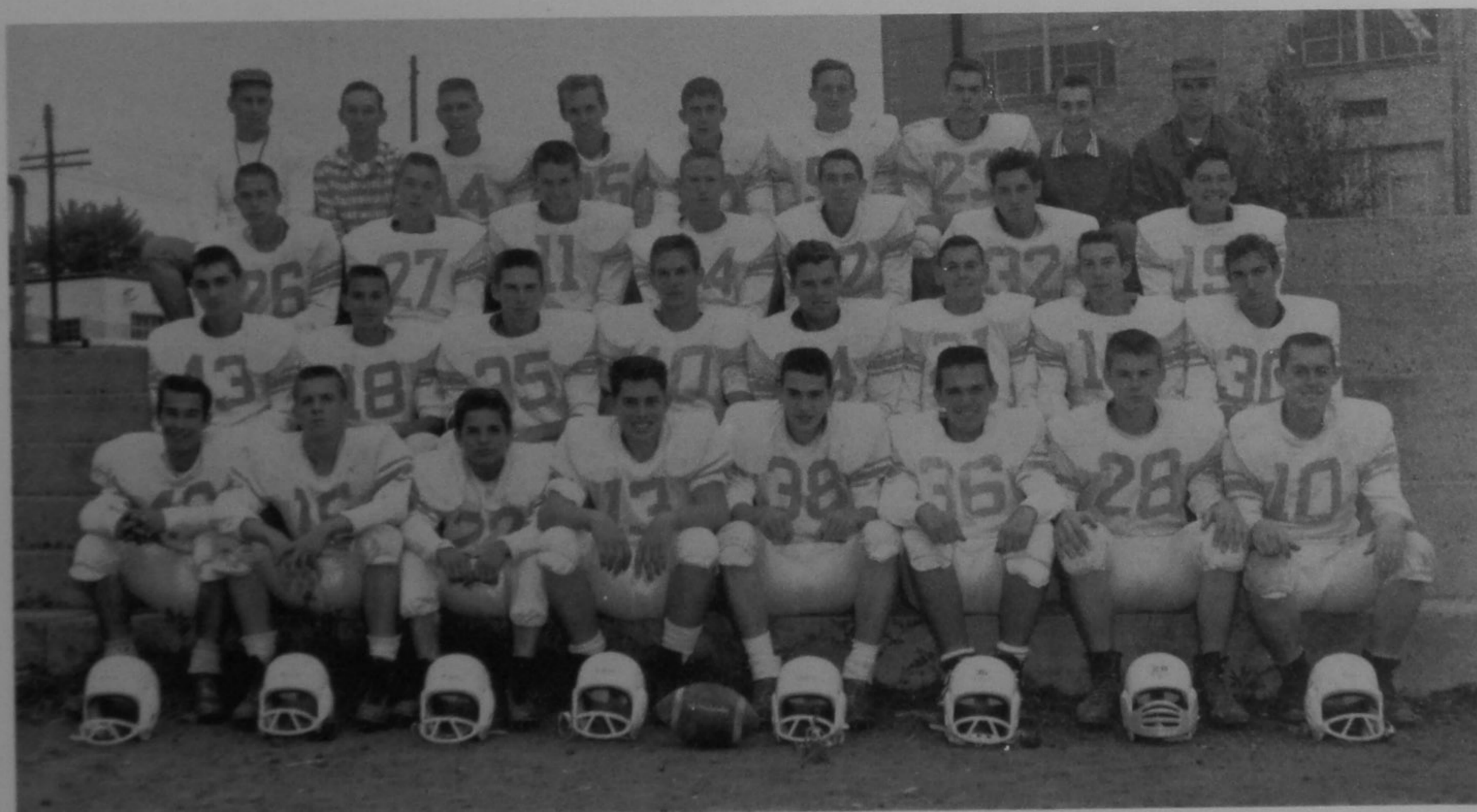
Football was the big event of the autumn months. Although almost entirely without experience, the Falcons, blessed with a popular and able new coach, went out and made a name for themselves in their very first season.
