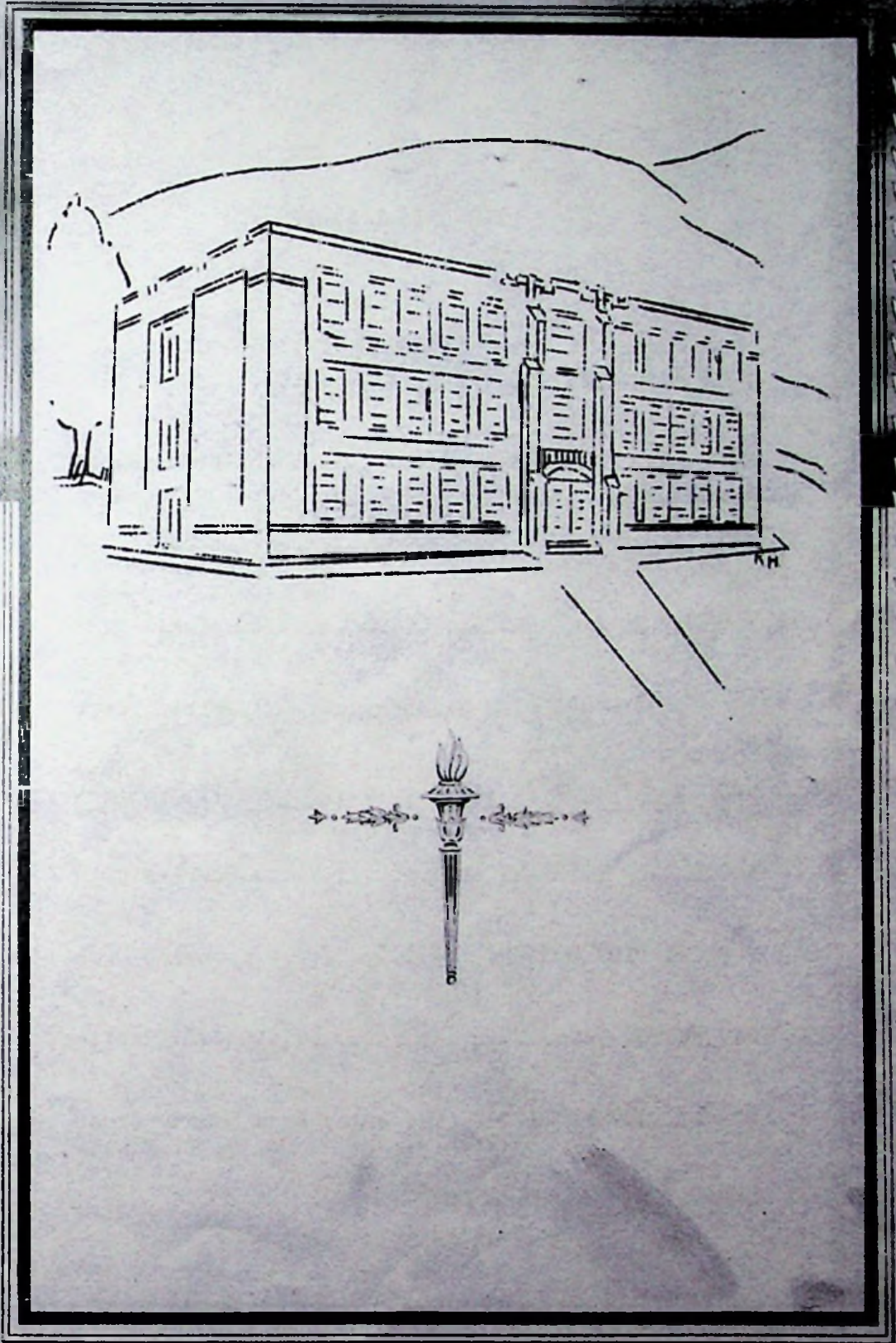

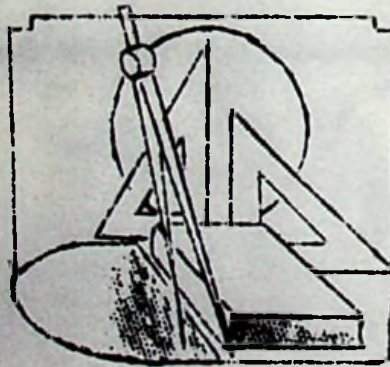

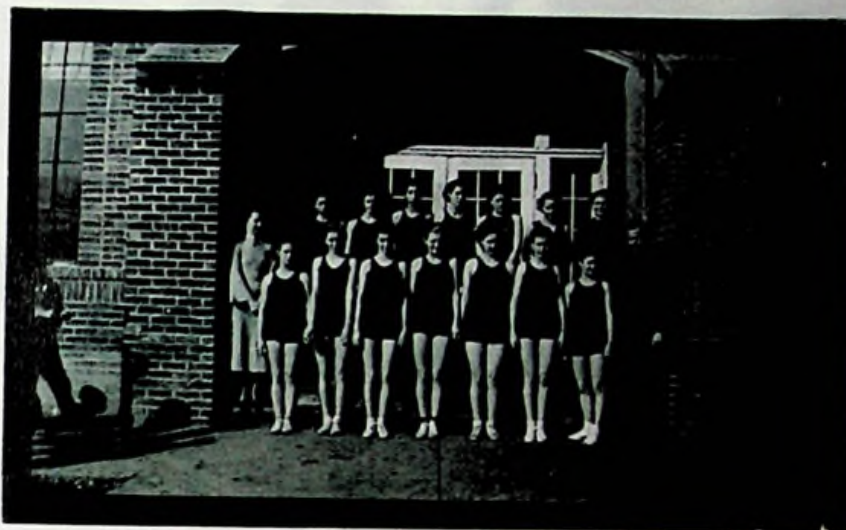

In the only game with Lucasville, Green lost 7-6.

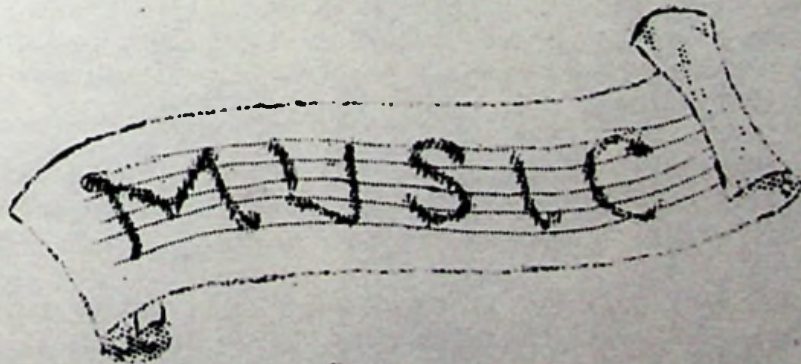
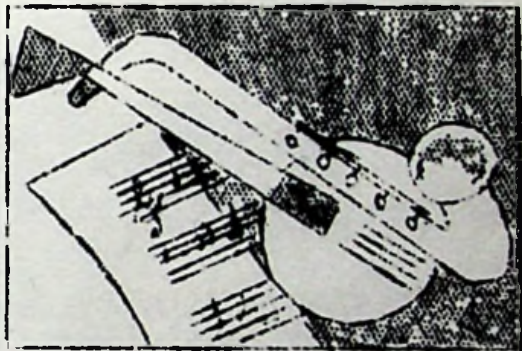
R. Massie holds the honor of hitting the only home runs. He collected two.
