Mr. Ed Miller, Health and P.E. teacher, graduated from WHS in 1954, and returned in 1972 to serve as head football coach until 1991. His coaching record was 173 wins. 29 losses, and 2 ties, which included a State Championship, 20 SOC championships, state coach of the year 3 times, and 11 undefeated seasons. Coach Miller was inducted into the OHS Football Coaches' Hall of Fame in 1996.

Coach Larry Hall, American History teacher, graduated from WHS and returned in 1974. He served as head football coach from 1992-1998. His regular season record was 59-9, 64-15 overall with 7 SOC chmapionships, 6 playoff appearances, and 2 state semi-finals. Coach Hall also held 3 terms as girls' basketball head coach for a total of 11 seasons. His overall record was 147-90 with 4 SOC championships, 5 sectional championships, 1 district championship, and 1 regional runner-up. Happy retirement!

# Pirates Rush for Another Successful Season and Post-Season Playoffs



The wins over Portsmouth and Ironton were two of the most exciting games and made the Pirates even more deter-







The Pirates were led by a few talented and dedicated seniors. These students set the example for the rest of the team who, for the most part, were young and inexperienced.








## Pirate Volleyball Gets In Your Face
















# NHS Welcomes 32 Members in Annual Induction Ceremony






















### Staffs Take One Last Look









### JOGS Students Assist Community








# Student Council Conducts Election Campaign










# Activity Abounds in Vocal Music Department






