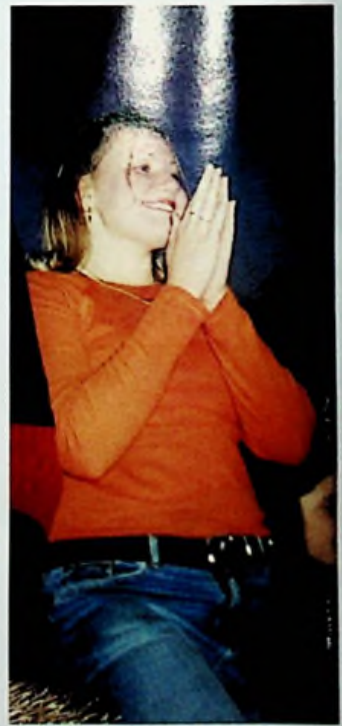

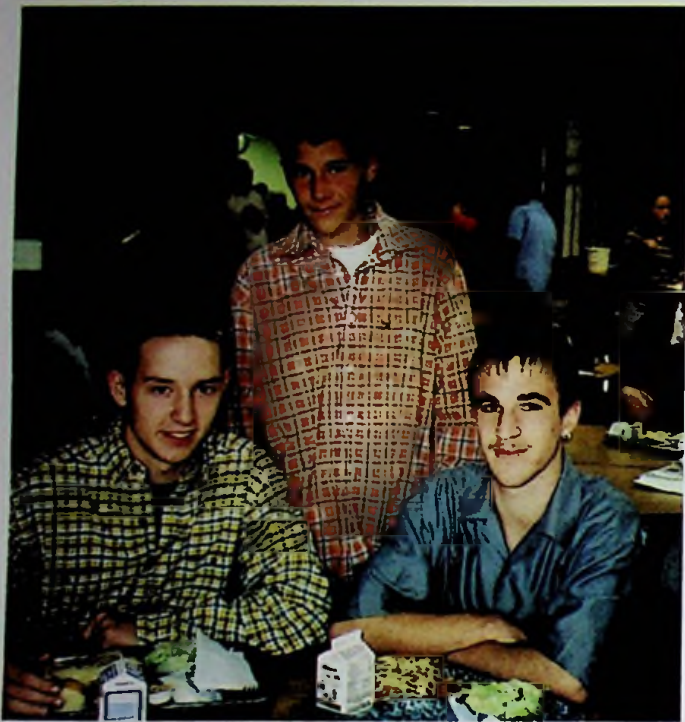

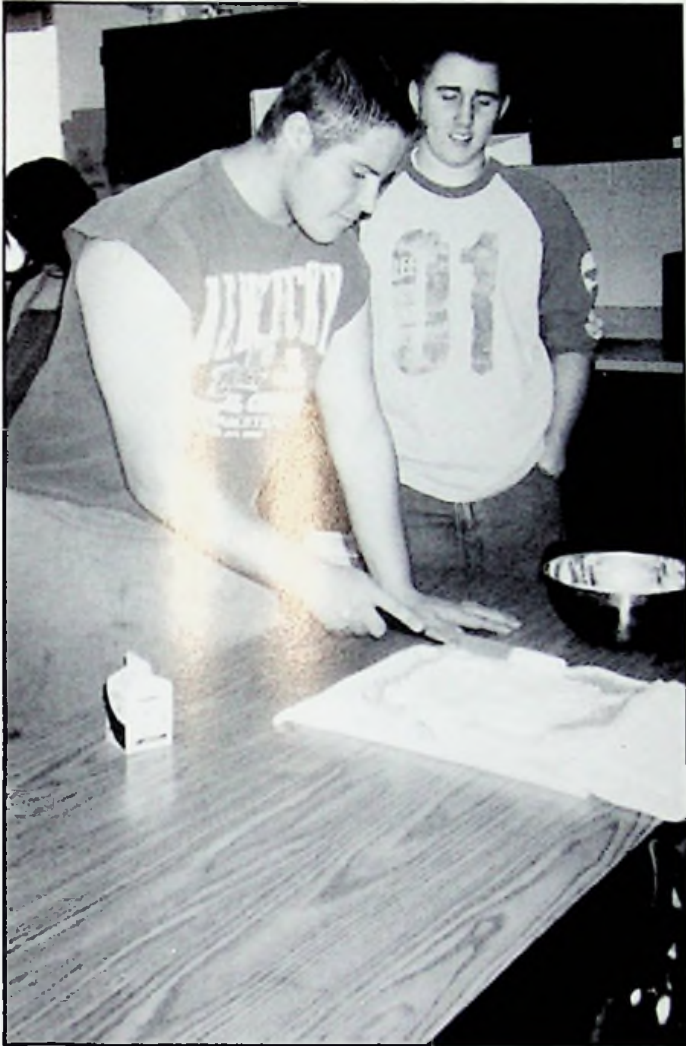

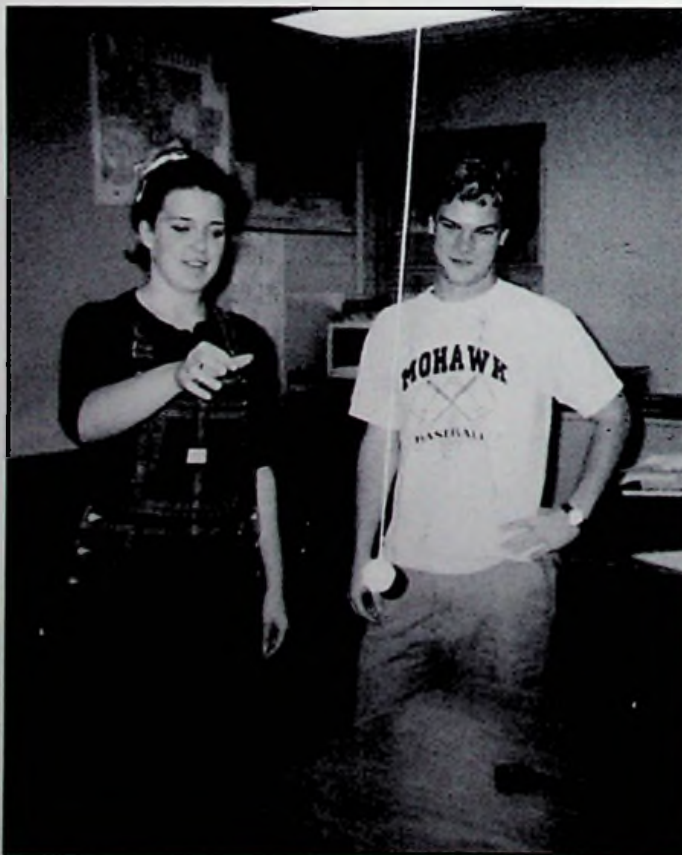
Science

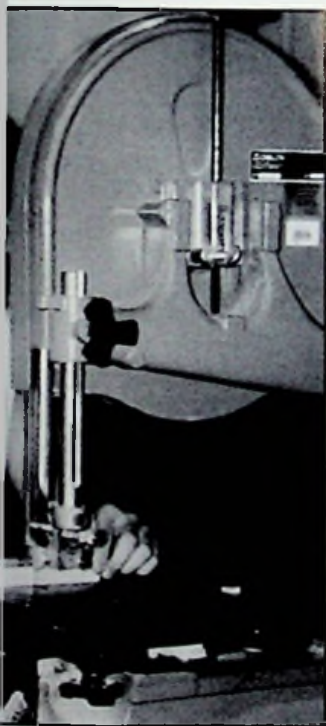

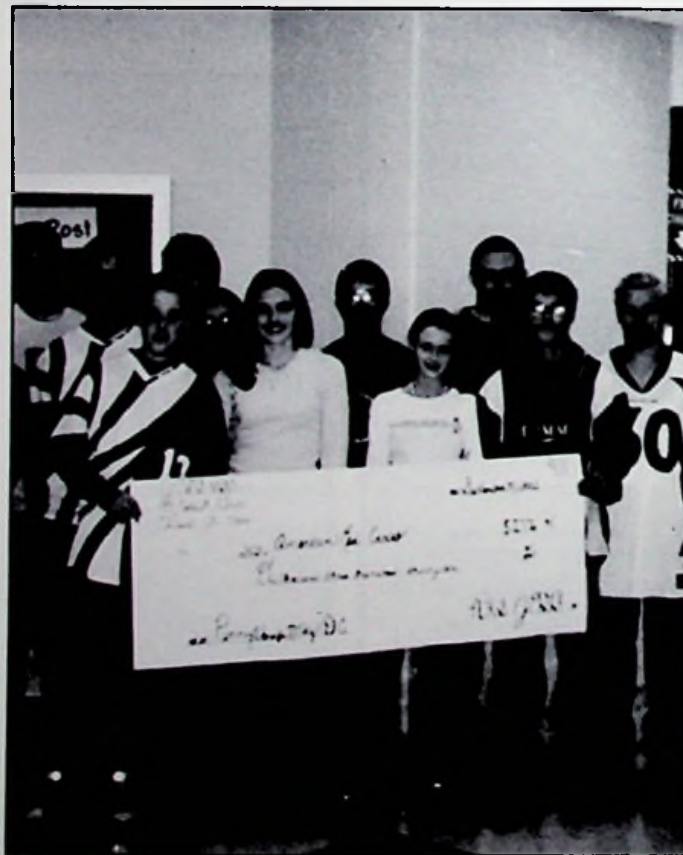

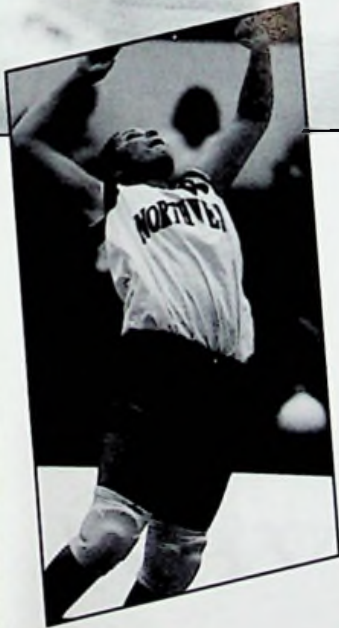

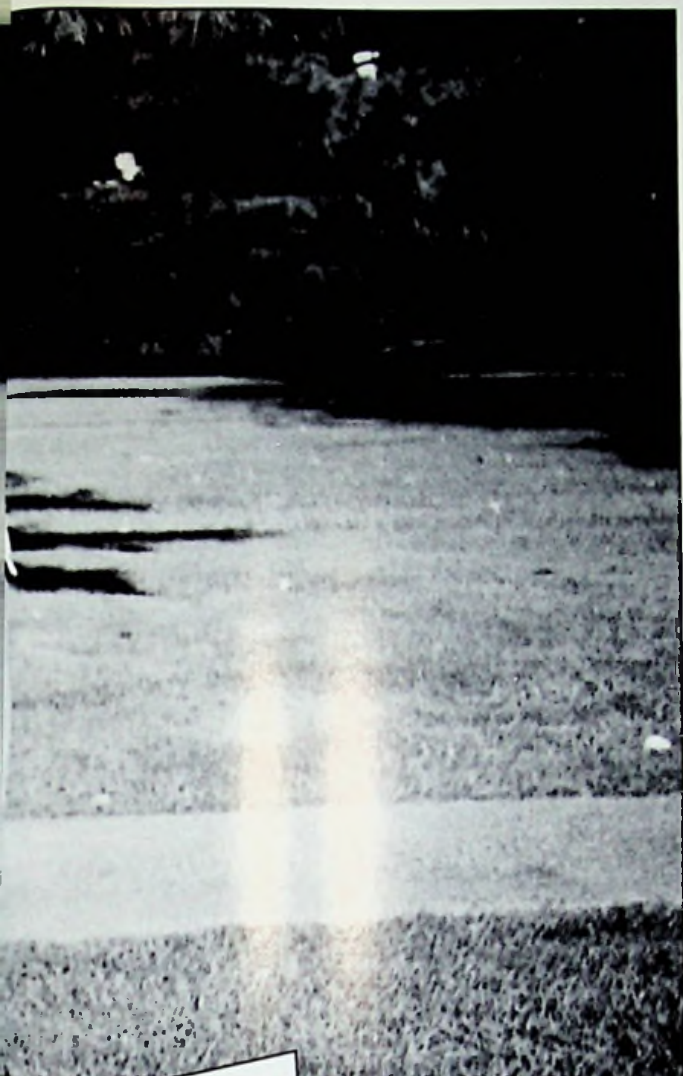

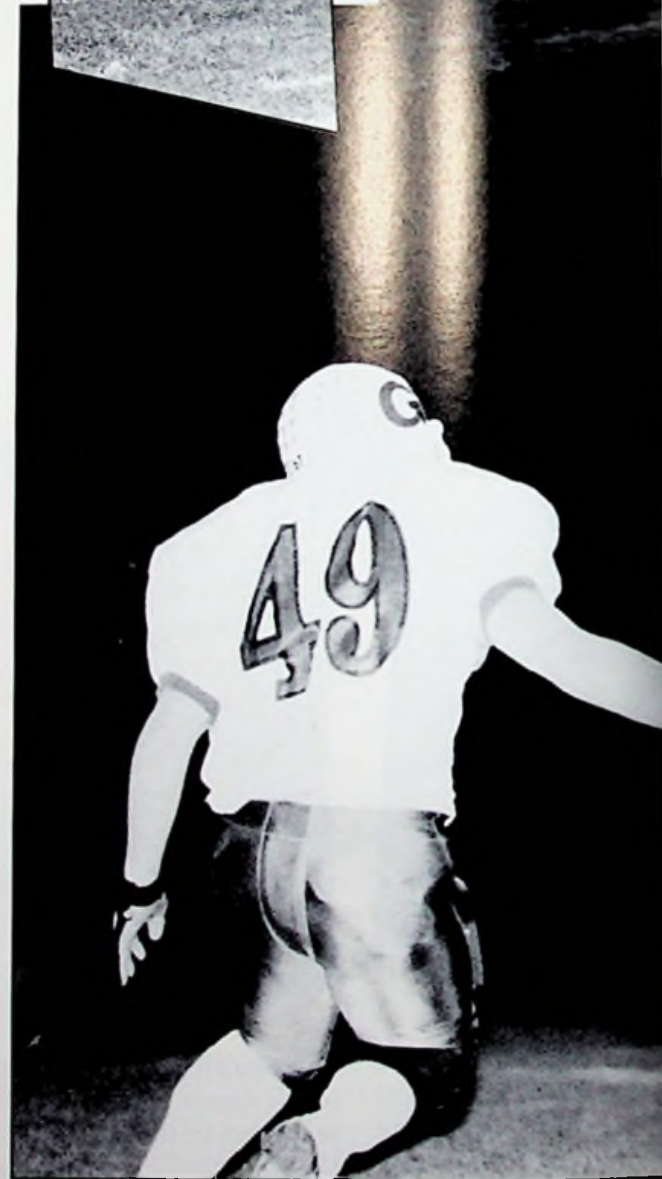

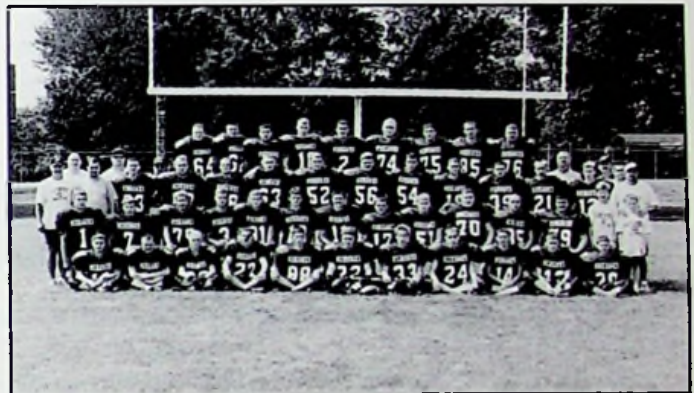

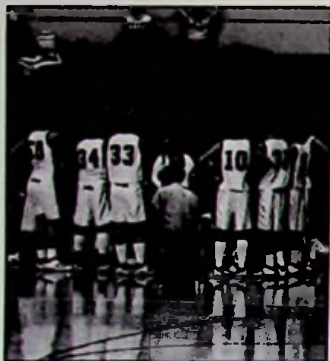

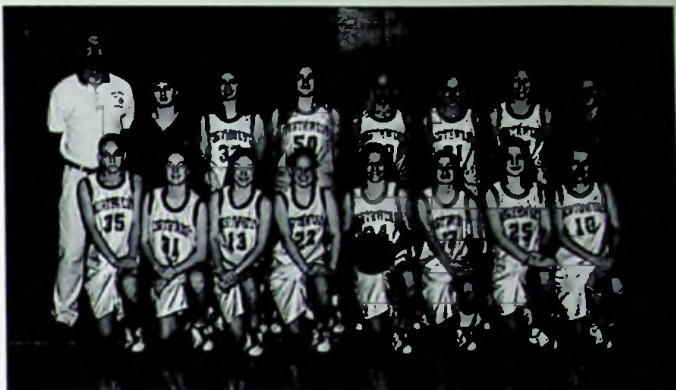

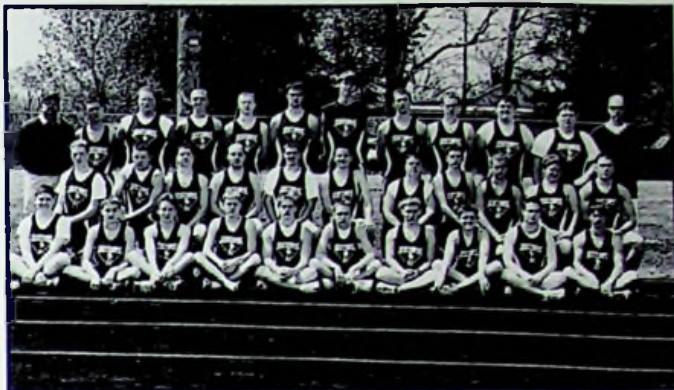

Though having a job may be grueling for some students to bear, it provides not only a little extra spending money, but a feeling of self worth. Although work can make you feel better about yourself, it is not always



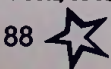
easy to balance and school. "With working at the Dollar Store five days a week and going to school too, I don't have much time to do my homework, so I do it when there are not many
